In total, more than 4 million vaccine doses have been administered in Missouri, nearly 2.4 million Missourians have initiated vaccination, and more than 1.8 million Missourians have been fully vaccinated. Missouri's dashboard shows that over 38 percent of all Missourians have initiated vaccination, and nearly 50 percent of Missourians 18 and older have received at least one dose.

Of Missourians 65 and older - some of the most vulnerable Missourians - nearly 66 percent have been fully vaccinated, and 76 percent have received at least one dose.

There are no plans to cancel currently scheduled state-supported vaccination events in May. However, operations will begin to shift so that a full withdraw of MONG members can be achieved by June 1. Local partners, along with AmeriCorps, **FEMA** vaccinators, and the Missouri Disaster Medical Assistance Team, will assist as needed with assignments previously filled by Guard members.

The State Emergency Management Agency will continue to supply PPE for local events and will also continue its efforts in providing it clinical and non-clinical volunteers as needed for local events.

for the last couple of years. His wife, Carolyn, sat in the old Ford and smiled.

Many come to look at the cars, but many of the cars they look at are entered for different reasons. Some people restore cars and turn them into hotrods: Martin Grisier, however, spends a lot of time on his 1961 Rambler keeping it as close to original as possible – he even has the original notebook and manual that came with the car – and a vintage emergency kit in a tin box, too. Martin and his wife Connie have been going to Cruise Nights for the past 16 years displaying their car. One of the recent additions to his Rambler is an old surfboard strapped to the top, which lends a touch of the 60s vibe to it. After all the large four-door car was made for traveling with a lot of people.

Many others on the square are also frequent flyers – or drivers, if you will. They have been putting their muscle cars and vintage autos on display for several years here, but there are some new cars/trucks every year. Not everyone is there strictly for the cars. Chester Jones, with the VFW, partnered with the Cruise Night committee and maintains a booth downtown during the events. This year he took the opportunity to tell folks that the VFW has several locations for flag disposal boxes around town. The VFW holds an annual flag retirement ceremony and the drop-box project for flags (so they may be retired appropriately) is a project developed by Eagle Scout Caden McCartney (locations are at the VFW, Fire Station, the Benson Englewood Center, Cemetery, and Adkins Printing); Jones thought he would help with the project and it is, of course, something he is happy to support.

There are other things at Cruise Nights: normally, there is some form of entertainment, just not at this first one. They are also raffling off a bench made from a Chevy truck tailgate (Bowers Designs). Folks can get ahold of Clinton Main Street for instructions on how to participate. Cruise Night events typically draw more cars and crowds as the summer months come on; the next one is June 8.

project - a project at least four years in the making. She thanked the city council, mayor, Friends of the Park and the Park Board – as well as everyone else who was part of bringing the project to this point.

Administrator Maggi described the four journey; she year pointed out how City Clerk Wendee Seaton had applied for close to 100 grants to find funding for the

described project, the formation of the playground committee, and how staff had toured other inclusive playgrounds in other communities to get an idea of what could be done in Clinton. However, fundraising for this project was a critical component – the total price tag came in at about \$600,000. In addition to grants and cooperation between city departments to save money, there was still a long way to go to reach the financial goal. Thankfully, people in the community were willing to step up and contribute: Golden Valley Memorial Hospital, who was the first local commitment to the project's funding, was not hard to convince to be a part of it. "The project aligns closely with our mission," said Craig Thompson. "It is an asset to our community."

Christian DeLozier, who was also key in obtaining public donations for the project, has been tireless in his pursuit of seeing the project funded. He said he had lived in other areas and saw what a project of this type can do for a community. "Fundraising is tough," said De-Lozier to those gathered, "until you talk about kids." He also thanked the many others who contributed to the project financially - and recognized the Rise Community Service group present at the groundbreaking event (Rise Community Service is from Warrensburg).

Mayor Lowe was thankful the project has come into being and he was key in getting the largest project donor on board: the Skidmore Foundation. Kyle Sisney told folks gathered "they were happy to have their name on it" and that the fresh air and good ground (for playing on) would be welcome in the community. David Maggi, speaking to the crowd, pointed out that the purpose of the playground was to remove barriers and allow people to focus on similarities with each other, rather than differences. He encouraged those present to picture children smiling and laughing while playing on the playground and picture adults driving past the playground in the future and seeing that: "These are the things that make for peace," he said.

The groundbreaking is just the start of the construction; however, the project should be completed sometime in late summer.

planations out there about why the number remains low, but at least some of the responsibility must be on the continuation of unemployment insurance. One could argue the influences of that piece of legislation on a number of factors: workers waiting for better wages to return to work, higher prices because of shortages of material (because people did not work during the pandemic), workers making more staying at home simply because they make more, the lack of schools reopening causing some folks to not be able to return to a normal work environment – or it might just be highlighting how a lot of people just don't want to work. The root cause, however, was likely the extension of those uneminsurance ployment benefits – for better or for worse.

In Henry County, job postings are plentiful but there are few people applying for them. Henry County's employment sectors are varied. In the short term, there are not enough people filling positions which is straining those already working and making it hard on businesses to keep staff, run efficiently, or even provide the quality of service that a business might have been providing before the pandemic. Some industries, like lumber, are still trying to catch up with the demand and prices attached to that piece of plywood being purchased reflects it: the cost is about triple the amount it was a year ago. How much of that is price gouging versus legitimate shortage is a little hard to determine. It does show how one sector of the economy can affect the rest of the nation in a broad and, potentially,

adverse way. According to the Clinton Chamber website, there are at least 361 businesses in Clinton itself – there are about 600 in the county. But the biggest employer in the county? That would be Golden Valley Memorial Healthcare at over 900 employees.

To put that into perspective, the county's labor force (as of 2020) was about 9,600 people which means that roughly 10% of the

county works in the healthcare industry and that does not include Compass Health employees who are also a top employer in the county. GVMH has partnered efficiently with the school district and community college (State Fair) to help create a path for those wishing to become nurses - which is helpful in eliminating nursing shortages. Missouri is in a better position than some states in this regard: in 2020 Missouri had about 14-16 nurses per 1,000 population (compared to Texas, for instance, which has less than 10 per 1,000; California and Nevada had similar numbers according to nurses-

journal.com). Nurses, which make up a large portion of the base of healthcare employees, tend to make better than average wages too (registered nurses average about \$60,000 per year in Missouri: on the mental health side, LPC's, licensed counselor's, also make about 60,000 per average in Missouri).

Other top employers for Clinton include Schreiber Foods, TC Transcontinental, and Tracker Marine. Henry County's labor pool was at its highest in 2000 (11,000+) but has steadily declined since. The population of Clinton itself has remained steady at about 9,000 for the last decade; the county's population has also remained steady over the last decade at about 22,000.

What does that mean for Clinton? It means that there is a 1 in 10 chance a person you meet works in health-

Local Arrest Gets Physical

The Henry County Prosecuting Attorney's Office announces that on May 4, 2021, Cody Jennings, 29, Clinton, was found guilty by a Henry County jury of assault in third degree of a law enforcement officer and felony possession of a controlled substance (methamphetamine).

Assistant Prosecuting Attorney LaChrisha Gray prosecuted the case on behalf of the State of Missouri. Jennings was represented by his counsel.

The Prosecutor's Office filed charges based on a June 2018 incident in which Corporal Graham with the Henry County Sheriff's Office had contact with Jennings inside Windsor City

Hall and discovered that Jennings had an outstanding warrant. Corporal Graham attempted to take Jennings into custody on that warrant, but Jennings physically resisted Corporal Graham.

The physical struggle with Jennings led Corporal Graham to

dispatch for assistance from other officers.

After other officers arrived to assist, approximately ten minutes after the beginning of the physical struggle, Jennings was finally placed into custody and then found to be in possession of methamphetamine.

Throughout course of the incident, Corporal Graham sustained injuries to his head and hand. There were also damages to the inside of Windsor City Hall.

Jennings pled not guilty and requested a jury trial, which was conducted on May 4, 2021.

Eighty Henry County citizens were summoned to appear for the jury selection process.

Prosecu-Assistant tor LaChrisha Gray presented witnesses, video, and other evidence of the incident to the jury for consideration. The case was submitted to the jury of twelve at approximately 5:15 PM and a verdict was rendered a short time later.

The jury returned a verdict of guilty to both counts. Sentencing is not yet set as a sentencing assessment report will need to be generated by Missouri Probation and Parole and

Jennings has another case pending for assault in the first degree of a law enforcement officer.

According to Assistant Prosecutor LaChrisha Gray, Jennings faces up to 10 vears in the

Missouri Department of Corrections on each of the two counts.

Concerning Language In Senate Bill

School to utilize her experiences and help students decide on a future career path.



Processors Awarded Millions By Missouri

The Missouri Department of Agriculture has awarded \$16,716,406 million in CARES Act funding to nearly 150 small and medium sized businesses. As a direct result of the reimbursement grant, more than 40 businesses were assisted in initiating or expanding their level of meat processing through a new grant of inspection or custom exempt inspection status.

"As a cattleman and former small business owner, I am passionate about raising, processing, and buying the products produced right here at home," said Governor Mike Parson. "Investing in small businesses is a way to ensure that our food supply is strong and that Missourians are able to continue feeding their families during future emergencies. These grants will not only benefit Missouri meat processors but also consumers as their access to meat and poultry increases."

The Meat & Poultry Processing Grant was created to support meat and poultry processing establishments that employ fewer than 200 people with the end goal of creating stronger food supply resiliency across the state. The Missouri General Assembly appropriated the federal funds from the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security Act ("CARES

ACT") to help support

these establishments and their communities.

"Our local meat processors were the backbone of our food supply chain during the COVID-19 pandemic," said Director of Agriculture Chris Chinn. "Last year, our team doubled the amount of red meat under state inspection, so we know the demand is there. We are proud to say that this grant has helped bring 27 businesses into state inspection status, also doubling the number of state inspected facilities in Missouri."

Funds were awarded to federal, state and custom exempt meat and poultry processing facilities.

"Many members of the Missouri Association of Meat Processors received the Missouri Meat and Poultry Processing Grant,' said Niki Cloud, executive secretary of MAMP. "Processors were able to make further improvements to their businesses, which helped their local economy, and ultimately keep their communities fed."

The grant funds were used to reimburse costs associated with purchasing or improving equipment, upgrades to utilities such as water, electric, heat or cooling, packaging equipment, costs associated with becoming an inspected establishment and more.

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
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
