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
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
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ri? The answer is certain influential people want the gas tax raised and they know the voters of Missouri don't want higher taxes. So, they did an end-around. They sidestepped the voters. In the Missouri Constitution, there is a provision known as the "Hancock Amendment," which quires voter approval for any tax increases more than a specified amount. A 12.5 cent, per gallon, gas tax in-

in the High School gym; CHS Principal Jerrod Steffens gave some awards out to various students of all grades; there were incentives for exam taking and other classroom related materials – students got gift cards to some local restaurants, one student got a "leave early" certificate, and some others got a surprise grab bag. Then the Senior Awards were given: there were a few state recognitions and a late basketball award (Maddy Allard got her "1,000 career points" ball), and the seniors voted on their own awards (best dancers, best smile, most athletic, etc.). Also important, Bright Futures was recognized (comprised mainly of Compass Health folks) for giving out hot chocolate, cookies, and assisting students throughout the year in a multitude of ways.

But the big moment came: a tunnel was made for the students to walk through (parents and faculty raised hands to form the tunnel), and the seniors were off; it was their last day of high school. Outside, they were offered ice cream and then asked to hang around for a senior photo; all of them knew what was coming because it is hard to miss the fire truck parked just outside the doors of the school. Some were more willing than others to line up for the photo that Mr. Steffens was trying to stage (within reach of the fire trucks water spray). After a little coaxing, most of the students lined up; Fire Chief Mark Manuel climbed up the extension for the ladder truck (which has a directional water sprayer attached to the bucket atop the ladder). And then it happened: water shot forth and the students reacted in various ways. Some ran, some ran through the water, some just stood there; others stepped backwards out of reach. In any case, all of them got their traditional send off and another year of tradition has been upheld.

"Kelsey Webb being named to the First-Team in the infield is a big deal," said Talbot. "She was consistent in everything we asked her to do.

Freshman outfielder Ellie Eckert of Auxvasse was named First-Team All-Conference Second-Team and All-Region in the outfield. Eckert led the team with 10 stolen bases. Eckert led the team with a .423 batting average and tied for the team lead in triples with three. Eckert finished second on the team with 35 runs and 47 hits. Eckert had a .454 on-base percent-"Ellie had a great year

at the plate for us," said Talbot. "She broke her finger during the season, so her numbers towards the end of the season were not what she wanted but, I also wanted to make sure that she was able to appreciate what she did during her freshman season in a particularly good region." Sophomore infielder Alexis Gilliland of Jefferson City was named Second-Team All-Region as a utility player and Honorable Mention All-Confer-

ence. Gilliland played in only 33 games with 98 at bats returning from an injury with 35 hits. Despite the injury, Gilliland still finished fourth on the team with a .357 batting average and third on the team with eight home runs, eight doubles and 30 RBI.

Team will be back in full force this year, too. with a full competitive schedule. Swim Team starts June 1. The outdoor pool has a great concession stand – nachos, pretzels, and, of course, snow cones. Also at the outdoor pool are the water slides, the spray park (a big hit) and the baby pool/ splash park. Family nights at the pool this summer are Mondavs and Wednesdays from 5 p.m. - 8 p.m. at \$3 per person. Individual swimming lessons will be available after May 31 – just call (660) 885 - 4300 to arrange those. But the big opening is May 29: open swimming is from 1 - 8 p.m., daily admission (3+) is \$4 per person. Season pool passes (3+) are \$300 per person. Lap swimming is from 6 a.m. - 7:15 a.m. on Mondays and Wednesdays, and Tuesdays and Thursdays from 6 a.m. - 9 a.m. (\$4 admission). The pool will be open Saturdays and Sundays from 1 - 5p.m. for open swims. too. Clinton is fortunate to have the outdoor pool: it is one of the few Olympic sized pools in the area. It was reported that Harrisonville may not even be opening their outdoor pool this year. Of course, the shelter houses and restrooms at the Artesian Park have gotten a face-lift: there are new roofs on the shelter houses and the restrooms have news sinks and stalls. At Artesian, disc-golf is picking up and there are plans in the works to add a back-nine to the existent course. "I think a lot of people forget about the Paws Bark Park, too," said Desty. For an annual fee of \$5, you can register your dog and let them run around and play for as long as you like. The Paws Bark Park is located just behind the Clinton Aquatic Center portion of the Community Center. And, don't forget, there is also a skate park just next to

the dog park. "People also tend to forget there are more parks than just the Artesian Park," said Director Combs. There is Hurt Park (on Main street), the Antioch Park – which along with the Artesian Park, has a horseshoe pit; "It is a neat little park," said Combs about Antioch. "It has a gazebo, trees, and nice equipment." He was also quick to point out that the Optimist Park (on Franklin street) also has a little corner park which is located more to the Green Street side. Of course, the Wagoner Field Complex with ballfields and open grassy areas are a favorite spot in

the summer, too. The Clinton Community Center is open from 5 a.m. to 8 p.m., through Monday Thursday, and Fridays from 5 a.m. - 5p.m. The Community Center closes on Saturdays and Sundays during the summer, but during the week youths can be seen playing basketball in the gym or starting a

game of h.o.r.s.e. "We are really excited to have the youth sports back and all the activities, said Director Combs. Last year, of course, most of the usual summer activities were canceled,

limited, or closed. The Benson Center will pick up in the summer, too. The Henry County Fair will use that location in late July. The Katy Trail traffic also picks up considerably in the summer. Most folks don't know that the Community Center allows people to park their campers for free if they are using the trail (you'll need to register inside) for a multi-day run, hike, or bike ride. If you are just looking for an evening of entertainment, the Men's Softball league has already started and will run through July 1: there are 8 teams, and most games are played on Tuesdays or Thursdays in the evening with games starting at 6:30 - 8:30 p.m. Tournament play for the league will run through mid-July.

ton from 480 to 500 customers. E&B also takes furniture as well as garbage and trash. Golden Valley Disposal, located in Clinton, supposedly handles the majority of trash pickup in Clinton, but the Benton County Enterprise was unable to make contact with owners of the company for information before press time. Much of Clinton's trash is taken to landfills in Warrensburg or Seda-

Although the City of

Clinton does not spon-

sor trash pickup, it offers other services. The Clinton Transfer Station, at 1401 North Washington St, accepts trash from residents who don't have anyone else picking it up. However, the Transfer Station does not accept chemicals, hazardous materials or yard waste. The City of Clinton Waste Water Department, at 1101 S. Vansant Road, takes yard waste in the form of leaves, grass, and brush that is less than four inches in diameter. It is a free service for Clinton residents, but they must bring in the items to the location on Vansant Road. Henry County Industries, located at 516 Price Lane, (near the Benson Aquatic Center) handles recycling. Anyone can drop of recyclables at the facility into the bins provided. Some businesses have a membership with the Henry County Industries for pick up on a weekly basis. It takes certain products including paper, cardboard, aluminum and tin cans, plastics 1 and 2, and clothing. Clothing is only accepted during business hours of Monday through Friday, 7:30 AM to 2 PM. According to https://

e360.yale.edu, China jammed the works of recycling programs around the world by essentially shutting down what had been the industry's biggest market. China's "National Sword" policy, enacted in January 2018, banned the import of most plastics and other materials headed for that nation's recycling processors, which had handled nearly half of the world's recyclable waste for the past quarter century. The move was an effort to halt a deluge of soiled and contaminated materials that was overwhelming Chinese facilities processing and leaving the country with yet another environmental prob-

https://dnr.mo.gov reports that recycling only works when there are businesses to buy the collected materials and reprocess them. Much of the material collected in Missouri is delivered to markets outside of the state. The recycling industry is trying to adjust and find other domestic and international markets for our materials. In many instances, sheltered workshops like Henry County Industries, have stopped accepting certain recyclable materials.

Several years ago the

Missouri Solid Waste Advisory Board provided an annual report about the importance of keeping organic wastes out of landfills as well as scrap tires, household hazardous waste, and electronics. www.gminsights. com reported that in the majority of cases across the U.S., trash is accrued and disposed of in landfills or incinerators. However, incineration and land filling of waste poses significant threats to the environment. Thus, many states are emphasizing the importance of adoption of sustainable municipal solid waste management programs and practices, with primary inclination toward recycling.

There are methods available to Clinton residents who want recycle more than paper, cardboard and plastic. Old tires are a serious issue, but there are places in the city where they can be taken for recycling. One business is Loyd's Tire at 922 N. 2nd street, and another is Marolf's Tire and Radiator Service, at 311 Main Street. The latter shop recycles tires for a service fee of \$2 each. Old tires are picked up from these shops as well other tire businesses by Champlin Tire Recycle out of Concordia, Kansas. This company picks up old tires in 22 states, but mostly in Missouri, Kansas, Nebraska, Iowa, Arkansas and Colorado. It grinds up the tires and makes outdoor furniture such as picnic tables and trail benches, and also makes landscaping mulch. The company also considers itself a state-of-the-art retreading plant.

www.recycledrubberfacts.org reports that a school in New Bloomfield, Missouri, received \$12,000 from the Missouri Department of Natural Resources Scrap Tire Material Grant, which supplied the district with funds to purchase 23 tables and benches made out of majority recycled tires. The crumb rubber used to make the furniture

CHS Counselor Mc-Coy then recognized the students who had enlisted or had plans on enlisting in the military.

The first of two student speeches were given by Katie Mitchell. Mitchell plans on attending the University of Missouri and pursuing a degree in business. She talked about the favorite memories of students from the past four years and distilled lessons from them. She recalled the class failing to correctly yell their "battle cry" rally at a pep assembly, getting their driver's licenses and learning to explore, and doing things that bound

them together as a class: "It is okay to make mistakes," was lesson one, the second lesson was to "listen and explore," and the third lesson was to "live in the moment."

"It is never too late to change," was his first bit of advice. He talked about changing majors frequently before settling on education and mathematics. "If you need to reinvent yourself, you can," he said. His second piece of advice was that failure was not the end. He told the students that their failures can often be opportunities and for them to not be afraid to fail: "It is possible to do everything right and still lose," he told them.

Following Mr. Luther's speech, CHS Senior Emma Gover gave the courtesy instructions for those gathered (when to hold applause, etc.) and Principal Jerrod Steffens certified that all 137 Seniors were eligible for graduation. The presentation of the diplomas concluded the ceremony which ended at about 3:15 p.m.

Clinton Youth Tours County Courthouse



"WHAT TO YOU DO HERE, AGAIN?" Many questions were asked as local 3rd-5th graders toured the County Courthouse, which Deputy Clark Kelly Marriott, Presiding Commissioner Jim Stone, and Commissioner Dale Lawler did their best to answer.

Presiding Commissioner Jim Stone explained, in simplified terms, what the commission did and their role in the county. It was a nice explanation and included things like "overseeing road work" and "paying bills."

"Any questions?" he asked the crowd of wide-eyed youths sitting in the basement of the courthouse in the commissioner's room. A hand shot up in the back: "What is it you do here?" The third grader was perplexed. What was all this nonsense about bridges? The second hand that raised was probably more to the point: "What is a bill?" Good question.

The questions did not get any easier for the courthouse officials and employees which the Clinton Intermediate school kids (3rd – 5th grade) toured on May 13. County Clerk Rick Watson, standing outside showing the kids the repair work going on at the handed courthouse, out some information sheets. One kid noticed the courthouse pictured on the flyer did not quite match up to the one they were looking at in real life: "Why did they take the tower down?" Watson tried to explain that it had become unsafe. The kid still looked like he thought the tower should still be there, though, after the explanation.

County Assessor Scott Largent, for reasons unknown, seemed to have one of the more interesting jobs at the courthouse. You never know what a kid will find fascinating, but it might have had something to do with him being able to pull up an overhead view of any house in the county. Upstairs, 3rd graders climbed around the juror seats, and several kids sat at the prosecution and defense attorneys' tables in front of the judge's bench. They, too, had pressing questions: 'Who was the second President of the United States?" Thankfully, Assistant Prosecutor LaChrisha Gray

knew the answer. Of

course, explaining that the Judge's room was referred to as a "chamber" solicited a comment: "Scientists use chambers, too," said one kid. When Gray explained that her office was not special and was just called an "office," the same kid worried our AP's feelings might have been threatened and needed a boost: "You are special, too," he told her. Debbie Powell (juvenile office) had the difficult job of explaining the term "juvey" to some of the kids who wanted to know exactly how different "real prison" was from the juvenile detention center. It prompted several questions, however, about the screen at the front of the court room and the microphones hanging down from the ceiling for recording used for the sound system - you know, the important stuff a prosecutor must deal with. It was reassuring that almost every hand in the room was raised when she asked them if they had seen CSI or Law and Order of which neither show depicts a courtroom with any accuracy.

The children in this group, who also toured the Recorder's and Treasurer's offices, were invited to tour the Henry County Museum grounds. At the museum, kids were given a tour of the old schoolhouse; Connie Grisier, dressed appropriately in 19th century schoolteacher attire, explained the slates that children used to write on. Next door, in the old cabin, kids clambered outside when Klein Spangler gave them all permission to ring the bell one time each: of course, they were more than willing to oblige. Following their tour of the cabin and schoolhouse, kids got to go through the museum itself and finish it off with a look at the World War I display.

There were at least two groups of CIS students who toured both the courthouse and museum grounds. There were probably some other good questions asked, too.







Seven of her student-athletes earned All-MIAA honors and 19 of her student-athletes earned MIAA Academic Honor Roll recognition.

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Stock Market Insights

The U.S. economy growing quickly, possibly even quicker than expected, as it recovers from the COVID-19 crisis. The Gross Domestic Product (GDP) could grow as high as 8% this year which would be one of the fastest paces in over thirty years.

The fast growth this year, along with the central banks' continued quantitative easing has caused some inflationary concerns. To date, the word "inflation" was mentioned 800% more in this quarter's earnings reports than last quarter. This is because businesses are seeing a significant increase in prices which are cutting into earnings. The consumer price index (CPI) has risen, but it isn't expected to stay at that high level. The Federal Reserve, according to their meeting notes, expects the higher prices we are seeing to be "transitionary". Whether that is true or not remains to be seen, but either way, we aren't expecting a return to the 1970's level of inflation.

The Federal Reserve has stated it will not raise short-term interest rates until employment has returned to pre-pandemic levels or until it is sees rise in inflation as more permanent. Inflation is expected to rise around the world in the coming weeks and months because of supply chain bottlenecks. However, as the economic reopening expands to other states and countries, we should see raw materials and component shortages disappear which should shorten supplier delivery times. If this is the case then inflation is expected to fall to a level that the Fed and other central banks are comfortable with, which would keep them from premature tightening monetary policy.


Performance has been more mixed recently because of a higher-than-expected consumer price report and wholesale price inflation that stirs up investors with inflation worries. It seems everyone is keeping one eye on the inflation numbers and the other eye on how the Federal Reserve might react to it.

Henry County, probably like a lot of other rural areas and counties, has interesting history. Because of the World War I display over at the museum, and some conversations with folks I tend to run into, I get a lot of stories: some of them are credible; some of them are hearsay, but even those may have a grain of truth in them. For instance, I was talking to a guy who was walking and was retold a story about how Puny White and Dan Miles, Sr., while in the Army (World War II), ended up going and taking photos around the Great Lakes area (or, so they supposed – they were asked if they could take photos and when they said they could, were put on a plane and flown to the location). What they photographed were weather balloons. Weather balloons sent from Japan carrying explosives. There are a few other stories I was told about some photos taken by these men, but I'll save them for another time.

The point is, Henry County has a varied history. While perusing the museum for some local World War I stories I ran across John Barkely, a war hero who, not far from the German line, repaired an enemy machine gun, mounted it to a French tank, and survived a barrage of 77-millimeter gunfire and shelling, only to repel a second enemy attack allowing our troops to hold their position. There are a few other Henry County stories from World War I, too.

But, mostly around Memorial Day, my mind drifts back to an overgrown field in Calhoun - a cattle pasture. In an out-of-the way pasture, mostly forgotten, is a headstone which has been trampled by cattle, has vine growth and saplings surrounding it, and a chain link fence surrounding a portion of the grave site which is now in disrepair. The headstone is old, and it is not even the original one. It was placed there in the early 1900s by the Daughters of the American Revolution to mark the only known Revolutionary Soldier grave in Henry County: William Baylis.

William Baylis was in advanced age when he traveled from Kentucky to Henry County. I can't imagine making the trip at all in the early 1800s let along being around 70 years old and taking up that long trek:

there were, of course, no roads and travel was slow and difficult in the best of weather and conditions. Nothing was tame or domesticated. And, once you made it to your destination, the real work began - you had a home to build, provisions to prepare, and a daily struggle just keeping food for the hearth.

Bayless was an interesting character, too. Supposedly, he was at the surrender of the British at Yorktown in October of 1781. His recollection of how that went down and how history records are at odds: he didn't remember it being as stately and peaceful affair as was later remembered in paintings and official accounts. Apparently, the British and German soldiers were resentful at the Americans winning a long siege (which had been accomplished by American and French troops) and took no pains to hide that fact. The famous painting of British General Cornwallis surrendering his sword to General Washington with all the men in the painting looking dignified (and some bored) was probably a far cry from what the tone and mood really was. Some quotes from the Revolutionary War

•"Don't fire unless fired upon, but if they mean to have a war, let it begin here."

•"What a glorious morning for America!" •"Don't fire until you see the whites of their eyes!" ...

•"Issue the orders, sir, and I will storm hell!" ...

•"In the name of the great Jehova and the Continental Congress!"

Although there are a lot of news headlines to choose from, my favorite this week involves the creative ways in which COVID vaccinations are being promoted: lotteries, free beer, games, and food are some of the ones I've seen recently from various states trying to entice folks to get their shot(s). But in Bucharest, where the heart of vampire lore lives (Romania), folks wanting to visit the castle famed for being the home of Vlad the Impaler, the original Dracula, doctors and nurses are giving free Pfizer COVID vaccinations out to tourists who visit along with a free admission to the Medieval site. Instead of a puncture hole in your neck, you'll get one in your arm.




