

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

those Americans who served our country. Last year, according to AAA, about 23 million Americans got in their vehicles and drove more than 50 miles; this year the expectation is that just under 40 million will do so. Back up and running, too, is air travel. Some 400,000 Americans traveled via plane last year and the expectation this year 2.5 million people.

What about Clinton? Although there are no hard and fast numbers, Lake traffic usually increases. According to MoDOT traffic count records in 2000 the annual average daily count for Highway 7 coming into Clinton was 12,104; leaving on Highway 7 towards Warsaw, the count was just under 5,000. By 2005, both route's average annual counts had increased by at least 1,000 vehicles. In 2010 both routes had about the same average annual number of vehicles as 2005, although it did decrease some on the Route 7 Kansas City side. The latest Mo-DOT data (2016) indicated that both routes had average daily traffic of about 10,000 and 5,000 respectively.

So, how many folks traveled last year during the pandemic along those routes? That is an unknown number. It is difficult, too, to find a snapshot of just the Memorial Day weekend traffic counts. Possibly, travel to local lakes, fishing holes, and camp sites might have been, in some part, unaffected. But, getting on the highway and going further? Probably not: aside form the restrictions many motels/hotels had placed on them (whether by their own volition or not), many locations, especially the smaller mom and pops places that thrive on tourism and people visiting, closed.

Tourism, we know, took one of the biggest

economic hits during the pandemic related restrictions. In Henry County it lowered, but probably not as much compared to the national average. The tourism tax report for Henry County (thank you Mark Dawson, Economic Development Director) indicates that that tax revenues from motels/ hotels in Henry Countv ran at about 65% of what was normal. What was lacking? Business travel and, of course, tourism.

"We are starting to see some familiar faces again," said Michelle Carroll, manager at Parkfield Inn (Kansas Avenue, Clinton). On the Thursday before Memorial Day weekend, Parkfield Inn booked 51 of their 61 rooms in one evening. "We have been running at about 90% capacity for the last three months," she said.

It is an indication that things might be returning to normal. Last year Parkfield lost about 1,300 rooms they would normally book: they were down at least 60% (Parkfield, in an average year would book about 40 rooms per night – that was down to about 20 rooms a night or less during the pandemic); "The truck drivers saved us," she said. A little-known facet of the pandemic story is how truck stops around the region (and country) closed: Parkfield Inn was a lifeline for the drivers that needed a place to stay, shower, or just a cup of coffee. "It was a rough year," said Carroll. "But we couldn't close the doors - the truckers needed us."

It has paid off for Parkfield in the long run. Word of mouth got around and now companies trucking who were not familiar with Parkfield at all use them on a regular basis. "One lady changed her route just to get a shower," said Carroll.

Parkfield Inn is a center point for a lot of folks traveling to Branson; Carroll said that she sees a lot of race fans from Kansas City, too, headed to the track. Parkfield is a good mid-way stopping place for them but also a good stop for a lot of traveling nurses; at least one doctor uses the inn for three week stretches.

The "regulars" are making their appearance at the inn as well. Bus tours to Branson are back: there is one group from Minnesota which comes three or four times per year (absent last year, of course).

The Parkfield Inn is seeing folks from all over the country – well, world, actually: Carroll said there are folks from California, Florida, and even as far afield as Alaska. One family from Mexico was staying at the inn while transitioning to the United States. So, did you travel over Memorial Day Weekend? It looks like a lot of folks did.

ventilating, yelling, and it appeared that she might start crying. She admitted to the officer that there were narcotics in the vehicle.

Officer Foreman, after searching the vehicle, found a black bag that contained methamphetamine and an assortment of controlled substances, plastic baggies, a digital scale, meth pipe, and \$2,540 in cash (the substances were later confirmed by the Missouri State Highway Patrol Lab). Following a petition for forfeiture (and trial for it in February 2020), the money seized was ordered to be distributed according to Missouri law; the money, transmitted to the Henry County Treasurer, will be placed in the Capital School fund, and distributed to the county schools according to formula.

Montgomery was convicted of four counts of possession of a controlled substance, 2nd degree trafficking, and driving while revoked. She was sentenced to 10 years in the Missouri Department of Corrections.

who teaches the Missouri Options class, was also a nominee. "Even when they are ready to quit, he sticks with them (the kids)," said Brown. Johnson has been able to work with the kids (Missouri Options provides alternatives for kids needing to graduate) and increase the number of graduates over the past three years to 16 – three years ago it was three.

Jennifer Petry was recognized as a nominee; a student's mother that nominated her. "The kids love her; she provides a positive learning environment." Petry teaches Kindergarten.

Sarah Steffens was a nominee who was unable to be present at the BOE meeting.

Brad Stone, Automotive Program instructor, was a nominee as well. Stone, interestingly, came up through that program some years ago and when the teacher of the program retired, he took it over. Every year he has kids in his program who qualify for nationals.

Kathy Loyd was (again) recognized as being selected for Educator of the Year. Loyd, an English and Language Arts teacher, has worked with the district for 29 years. She is also retiring. A parent nominated her for the award. "She always makes her class a fun place to be and learn."

Under the consent agenda, Teresa Plumlee reviewed the district's financials for the BOE: she reported to the board that the operating balance for the district was \$10.3 million with a debt service of \$1.2 million; the adjusted bank balance is \$10.8 million which is up \$611,000 from this time last year. Plumlee pointed out payments of \$317,000 (for CIS renovations), and a payment for work at the Tech School (much of which is covered under higher education dollars). Payments were also made for server upgrades (\$47,000) and a payment to Launch Virtual (for the second semester, \$202,000). For receipts, a deposit of \$373,000 was received in ESSR I funds. Following the financial report, the consent agenda was approved. Superintendent's re port: Superintendent Brown told the board he spoke with County Assessor Scott Largent about the preliminary numbers for assessed values. Overall, assessed values are going up 24% in the county, however by state law, the raise may not exceed 2% in any one year. The district will need to adjust the levies. "We will get with our financial planners and then get back to you in June to let you know what it looks like,": said Brown. He also said that the district had passed the recent bond with a notax-increase message and would like to stay

The board approved changes to the classification of employee categories using a system which tracks employment time in months instead of in days. The change will allow the district to align its policy with actual practice. The categories are now: nine-month employees (174 - 192 days), ten-month (193-202 days), eleven-month (203-239 days) and twelve-month (240-245 days). The vast majority of the employees in the district are nine-month employees. The policy

change will ensure that fringe benefits for employees are given fairly.

The board approved the low bid of GKC (out of Booneville) for auditing services for the district. The district received two bids, although they solicited for 7. GKC had good references and a recommendation letter will be sent from the district to them for their services.

The board approved the auction of surplus items (mainly welding equipment) to be sold (on gov deals). The district has been cleaning out space for a new nursing pro-"There gram room. is no more storage," said Superintendent Brown.

The Clinton BOE entered closed session at about 6:30 p.m. for personnel matters.

Roadrunners Earn Academic Honors

Eight State Fair Community College Lady Roadrunners earned Easton/NFCA All-American Scholar Athlete Awards from the National Fastpitch Coaches Association for their academic studies. Student-athletes must maintain a minimum grade point average of 3.5 (or higher) for the academic year to be eligible for the award.

Sophomore pitcher Aleah Paxton of Lincoln, sophomore catcher/third baseman Brooke Conner of Sweet Springs, freshman catcher/ second baseman Haley Mackey of Lincoln, freshman first baseman Olivia Butler of Holden, and freshman pitcher Tabitha Imhoff of Jefferson City all achieved 4.0 grade point averages. Freshman pitcher/infielder Averi Eckhoff of Houstonia, freshman outfielder Ellie Eckert of Auxvasse, and freshman infielder Kelsey Webb of Oak Grove also were honored for having grade point averages of 3.5 or above. Cyclists Ride To Support National Parks Foundation



By chance, a couple of folks were eating lunch at Square 109. They were not the ordinary everyday folks that go eat there – but showed up with two bicycles loaded with gear. What were they doing? They are bicycling across the country to every national park. Their goal is to raise \$50,000 to donate directly to the National Parks Foundation. Scott Parkinson, one of the riders, works at the University of Arizona and is an experienced trans-continental bike rider. His companion, a family friend (Alex Zelek, from Chicago), is along to record and promote the event. She is the "tech side of things," he said.

The ride will take them (if all goes according to plan) about 18 months and started in Arkansas (Hot Springs). From there they are making their way along the Katy

Trail towards St. Louis, up the Mississippi River, onto Lake Superior through South Dakota – eventually they will finish in Arizona. The southern portion of the trail/trip will be done in the winter (Florida, etc.) and the spring/summer portion will incorporate the east coast. They plan on incorporating every national park (in the contiguous US). "I've been wanting to do this for years," said Parkinson.

Toops was another key piece to the Lady Roadrunners defensive effort this season. Toops registered a goal and assist on the season. Toops converted her only penalty kick opportunity.

"Megan Toops was the other central defender in our backline," said Beltran. "Our backline was definitely our strongest unit. This is supported by how the coaches voted."

Moon contributed four goals and three assists this season. Moon also scored two game-winning goals.

'Sabra Moon is another player who has a good shot from the outside," said Beltran. "She is also another really good finisher."

Overbay contributed a goal and an assist on the season.

"Leah Overbay was the third of our four defenders to earn post season recognition," said Beltran. "Leah really came into her own this year. She made runs up and down the field and contributed for us both offensively and defensively."

Bauer also contributed a goal and an assist on the season.

"Emily Bauer was a really good addition to our midfield," said Beltran. "She was always calm and collected."

MDC Protection Branch To Launch New Canine Unit

The Missouri Department of Conservation (MDC) is set to launch a new canine unit through its Protection Branch this summer. The new unit, consisting of five dogs and their conservation agent-handlers, will be stationed around the state and used as necessary to work throughout Missouri.

According to MDC, the capabilities of canines are extensive in conservation-related work, but common uses include tracking, evidence recovery, search and rescue, wildlife detection, and public outreach programs. Another rapidly growing use of canines is in the field of endangered and invasive species. There are currently 36 other states using dogs in their conservation efforts.

"Canine programs have been successfully used by conservation agencies since the late 1970s," said MDC Protection Deputy Chief Dean Harre. "The implementation of this canine program will help continue MDC's mission of protecting Missouri's fish, forest, and wildlife resources."

Retriever-style dog breeds were specifically purchased for the MDC program, which consists of three Labrador Retrievers and two German Shorthaired Pointers. The dogs will be used for a dog food.

variety of enforcement investigations, such as evidence recovery and wildlife trafficking. They will also be used in public outreach programs at fairs and schools.

The approved conservation agent-handlers and canines are:

- Swem Susan and Lab, Astro, stationed in the southwest region;
- Justin Pyburn and Lab, Korra, stationed in the Kansas City region; Agent Caleb

Trinity Lutheran Church The 5th New York Volunteer Infantry, "Duryée's

Zouaves," was one of the most renowned fighting regiments of the American Civil War. Their colorful Zouave uniform, precision maneuvers, effectiveness in combat, and steadiness under fire gained universal respect and recognition. "I doubt whether it had an equal." General George Sykes said of the 5th New York.

On the afternoon of August 30, 1862, the third day of the Second Battle of Manassas, the famed "Texas Brigade" launched a massive attack. There were few Union troops there to meet the onslaught. Among those who engaged in the battle were two Zouave regiments: the 5th and 10th New York. In less than 10 minutes, 85 lives of 525 men of the 5th New York

Brigadier General Hiram Duryee, a former commander of the 5th New York, would later comment on that fateful day in a Memorial Day tribute at Manassas in 1907. General Duryee had purchased the land for the erection of a monument to his beloved Zouaves. He said:

"We stand on holy ground! For this field was the altar of God. The Master said, 'Greater love hath no man than this, that a man lay down his life for his friends.' Here, our comrades laid down their lives for the love of country, for human rights, the love, and the service of man. We sorrow at their loss, but we rejoice at their glorious death and achievements. God grant that the fruits of their sacrifice be preserved in our country.

We honor the service and sacrifice of the brave men and women who have served our country throughout the years on this Memorial Day. Blessings.

Missouri Passes **Industrial Hemp Amendments**

On May 27, 2021, the Missouri Department of Agriculture announced federal approval of the state's amendment to the Industrial Hemp Plan. With the approval, the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Agriculture Marketing Service affirmed that Missouri's amended plan complies with federal law and regulations.

The entire amended Missouri State Plan can be reviewed here. Key changes include: Increasing the pre-harvest window for compliance sampling from 15 to 30

days Allowing remediation options for eligible crops that initially test above 0.3% total THC Updating requirements for testing laboratories to be ISO 17025 accredited and after 12/31/2022, also registered with the Enforcement Drug Agency (DEA)

As one of the first plans approved under the new federal final rule, Missouri's producers will help launch a new era of domestic industrial hemp production. Remaining states, tribes and territories must have plans approved by the end of the year, or defer regulatory authority to the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

Last year, more than 200 Producer Registrations were issued in Missouri and 811 acres of industrial hemp 83,100 jobs. Boeing ing varieties grown for flower, fiber, seed, and grain. As a national leader in third-party sampling, the program certified 80 Certified Industrial Hemp Samplers across 38 counties - allowing for increased flexibility for Missouri's producers, and a business opportunity for those certified.

Defense Contract Spending Impact

In Missouri Governor Mike Parson announced on May 26th that more than \$14 billion in military defense contracts were awarded to Missouri companies in Fiscal Year 2019, the latest year data is available. A new report highlights impacts of this spending statewide, as well as by county, state legislative district, and

congressional district. "We are proud to have dedicated defense companies and employees statewide who work every day to protect our nation,' Governor Mike Parson said. "Military investment in Missouri not only strengthens our economy but the defense of the entire country."

The latest report focuses on the value of U.S. Department of Defense and related agency contracts awarded to Missouri companies and further analyzes a previous statewide impact report that was released in August 2020. The report provides a closer look into the significant share of contract awards to Missouri vendors. Its analysis helps to better understand distribution in the state and gives more context to sectors most impacted by spending. The 2020 report also included military bases and defense agencies and showed that defense spending in Missouri supports more than 180,000 direct and indirect jobs with \$29 billion in total impact.

"The importance of Missouri's military installations to our economy is undeniable," said Rob Dixon, Director of the Missouri Department of Economic Development. "Defense investment in our state impacts more than 25,000 businesses and supports the livelihoods of countless Missourians working in industries such as manufacturing and technology."

The new report analyzes total contracts during FY2017 through FY2019 and shows an average of more than \$13 billion spent on Missouri contract awards. This spending supported were planted - includ- Defense and its supply chain companies received 73 percent of the annual contract awards on average. Statewide, manufacturing firms received 79 percent of all the average annual contract awards.

"This new report underscores the importance of the military services and defense companies that call Missouri home," Missouri Military Advocate Joe Driskill said. "Many Missourians are unaware of how much defense funding comes to our state each year and how many jobs and increased earnings are directly and indirectly produced for citizens. We hope this report helps citizens understand how much local communities depend on defense industry jobs."

"While I believe most Missourians understand we have a large military presence in our state, I do not think they realize what a significant economic impact it has," Senator Sandy Crawford said. "I look forward to supporting even more growth in the future."

"I am very proud of the confidence shown in our Missouri military installations and supporting business partners," Representative Dave Griffith said. Carlyle, III, grant-"We in the Missouri House of Representatives are and have been doing what we can to support our active duty service community as well as our Veterans."

The Missouri Military Preparedness and Enhancement Commission (MMPEC) and its Office of the Military commis-Advocate sioned the study to better understand the local impacts of defense contract spending. MMPEC and the Office of the Military Advocate work proactively to support military installations, assist defense contractors, and help veterans find work in Missouri. These efforts support the state's economy and help keep skilled workers in Missouri after their military ser-





It may be a touchy subject these days, talking about gender and being a dad. The concept of what a dad is and what that means has changed considerably since I was a kid. What "role" a dad has in a family is certainly not what it was in 1974; in fact, there seems to be an identity crisis of sorts going on these days about just what is or isn't acceptable as a gender label. Yet it wasn't the

America I grew up in: guys were guys, girls were girls. However, during the 1980s, there was a push to promote the inclusion of other identities and be more tolerant of sexual identities that were not the "norm." In fact, I realized the other evening that what was missing from a lot of today's mainstream music was a challenge to the norms of our society: today's music, to my ears, is very reflective of how to be "mainstream" and popular, cool, or "like everyone else." Not that music of that caliber didn't exist in the 1980s, it just seems more prevalent today; I spent a lot of my youth listening to music my grandparents wouldn't like because of the messaging: and the message was mostly clear: "How not to be like everyone else."

That music

chal-

lenged the status quo in every respect: Metallica? Pink Floyd? Oueen? AC/DC? Bruce Springsteen? The Cure? Talking Heads? Ice-T? Run DMC? And many, many more. The whole music scene from country to punkrock – was nothing but a big counter-cultural statement about how not to conform. I know it didn't start there: think about the 50s and 60s – or just about rock-n-roll in general. Rock and roll was an affront to every parent in the early 1950s who didn't agree with Elvis being shown from the hips down in front of their kids – or possibly in front of anyone. About a decade later, the musical content started reflecting Elvis's hips, only in lyrical form. Words became the new revolution of counterculture, then, by the late 70s and early 80s, the musical scene blended all

things offensive to parents: the styles of mu-

sic, the lyrics, and the

artists' appearances.

Their lifestyles were

also subject to scruti-

ny: no parent wanted

their kid growing up

and acting like Tom-

my Lee (Motley Crue).

It got bad enough that

the government got involved. And, once the government got involved in anything, it was a traditional sign to the youth that they (the youth) were right and should continue all the harder. Maybe today's youth are a little more accepting about what they are told (group think). Like I said: today's music is about "how to be like everyone else." I don't know that they think for themselves very well.

Does anyone remember just how vehemently the youth in the 1980s reacted to Tipper Gore when she advocated for the censoring of music and putting warning labels on them (and teenagers suddenly could no longer buy the music they wanted)? To put it in modern parlance (for any youth reading this), it would be like not being able to get on a Facebook Page or Twitter account of one of your favorite musicians because they were blocked and their content was deemed, by someone else, to be offensive or to be promoting a message that was "bad for you." At the time of Tipper Gore, I remember plainly thinking that it was none of her business what I found "good" or "bad" and that I could make up my own mind (thank you very much).

Despite the government's (okay, I'm lumping in all things Tipper Gore in with "government" – but it's basically the same thing in my mind) disapproval of my tastes in musical messaging, tones, and content, I managed to listen to all of it anyway. I also managed to grow up and not become a menace to society. It is why I don't like censorship to this day: if you are dumb enough to believe everything you hear - or do everything that you are told to do without checking it out first, then according to the way I grew up, it was on you, not the other person. What was the original messaging we 70s/80s kids got? It wasn't just "don't be like everyone else." Really it was "don't just be like everyone else who is trying to be the same but ignoring some real problems by doing so." For one example of how seriously kids in the 80s took their music, look at one band from Australia who only produced one hit in the US with one song. The song was a lament of how

people could remain

unaware of an issue

but go blindly on their way in their daily routines. Do you know the song "Beds are Burning" by Midnight Oil? Name one other song they did. Go ahead -I'll wait.

The reason it reso-

nated so soundly, and

therefore became a

huge one-time song, was because America was having similar issues: we also had violence in the streets, problems with poverty, problems with race, homosexuality, the AIDS epidemic, and glass ceilings. But for a brief time, it seemed like it all started to heal – and it was because music rejected the "do as you are told" messaging or "we know best." At least, the effort was there. Most of this challenge to society started well before I was born. I remember being told a story about how a college professor my dad had would only teach Paul Simon lyrics in her poetry course (true story). By the 1980s the stage had been set for some of the finest and most American values to begin rising to the surface again: the ideas of the American Revolution, the ones that had to wait 200 years to bloom: that everyone in the U.S. has a right to exist, pursue their dreams, and be treated equally with respect to their character and accomplishments, not based on some superficial trait. I think most people know the most important part of a person cannot be seen. If you ask someone "what makes you. you?" they often stumble for a bit. And if you ask them if their answer would change if they were painted blue and yellow with red polka dots, they will still tell you they were themselves. "What if you lost an arm or a leg? Would you still be 'you?" "Of course, I would," they would respond. You see: the most important part of a human being cannot

be seen. So, if I can pass down anything that I learned from my youth to my children it would be this: it is okay to challenge the status quo and it is even better to think for yourself, and always judge people based on who they are rather than what they appear to be. You know how I learned it? I learned that from my dad.

A Nichols Worth Of Nature

On Saturday, June 12 at 9:00 AM, the turtle races will be held in downtown Warsaw in conjunction with Jubilee Days. Turtles and tortoises represent the oldest living group of reptiles on earth. They are known from fossils as far back as the Triassic Period, over 200 million years ago, and have changed little since they became established. There are currently more than 260 known species of turtles and tortoises in the world. Missouri has seventeen species of turtles with several subspecies that represent four different families. We are going to concentrate on our two land-dwelling species: the three-toed box turtle and the ornate box turtle. Box turtle refers to the ability to tightly close its shell when frightened. . Turtle shells have two main parts: upper and lower sections called the carapace and the plastron respectively. The shell is composed of bony plates covered by a layer of horny scales called scutes.

Turtles do not have teeth. Both the upper and lower jaws are covered with a sharpedged beak. The lower jaw fits inside the upper jaw, thus allowing turtles to use their jaws like scissors to bite off bits of food. All turtles lay eggs on land selecting well-drained, sandy or loose soil to deposit the eggs.

Three-toed box turtles have high-domed shells and normally have three toes on

each hind foot (some individuals may have four). Coloration of the upper shell may be plain olive or olive brown with faint yellowish lines radiating from the center of each scute. The lower shell has a distinct hinge across the forward third of the shell which allows the turtle to close the lower shell against the upper shell for protection. The lower shell is plain yellow with some brown smudges. the head, neck and limbs may be brown or black with a varied amount of vellow and orange, depending on the age and sex of he turtle. Shell length is 4 1/2 to

5 inches. Daily activity of this species begins with a period of feeding, followed by basking in the sun in an area (often on roads). They prefer a habitat of oak-hickory forest with numerous openings and edge areas. Young box turtles eat mostly insects or earthworms, but older turtles eat a large amount of plant matter.

Ornate box turtles are fairly common in Missouri grasslands and native prairies. The upper shell of the ornate box turtle is normally brown with numerous yellow lines radiating from the center of each scute. The lower shell is brown with distinct yellow spots and blotches. There are normally four toes on each hind leg. They are 4-5 inches long as adults. Although insects make up most of their diet, a small amount of plant matter is also eaten.

Both species have average life spans of 40-50 years. The sex of both species can be determined by eye color. Three-toed males have red or reddish brown eyes. Ornate males have red to orangish eves. Females of both species have brown eyes.

Females lay from 3-8 elongated white eggs. One or two clutches may be laid per season. Both species lay their eggs in late June or early July taking 75-90 days for incubation. Young usually dig our of the nest in September or October, but sometimes overwinter in the nest.

Interestingly, the sex of these turtles are determined not by genes, but by temperature at the time of incubation. If the temperature is 88 degrees or above, females hatch, 77 degrees or below it's males.

All species of turtles found in Missouri are protected under state law as either a game or non-game species.

Although turtles have been around for millions of years, like so many other wildlife species their numbers are declining due to the draining of swamps and marshes for agriculture, water pollution, stream channelization, destruction of forests and grasslands. Without these natural habitats, our turtles, as well as many other species, are in peril.

Stock Market Insights By Dr. Richard L. Baker, AIF

is like a Silver Dollar City roller coaster right now. It surged during the pandemic but seems to be cooling quickly.

Home sales surged because of late to the game millennials and urban flight. Many millennials, who had resistant homeownership, saw the benefit of owning a home after being stuck at home during the shutdown. The pandemic also led to an urban flight because many families fled the cities to the suburbs and countryside to enjoy more space. When vou add in historically low mortgage rates you can understand why the home inventory shrank and home prices went up. Literally, there were many than more buyers there were sellers.

Though it feels like houses are still selling out of control, in actuality home sales are slowing considerably. Last week's April report of month-overmonth home sales showed that sales fell in April for the third month. consecutive During the pandemic when many parts of the economy were getting hammered, economists pointed to the surging housing market as hope that the rest of the economy would follow, but this once bright spot is now beginning to falter.

So, why is the housing market slowing? Simply because the conditions have changed dramatically. There are four areas that affect the housing market the most: mortgage rates, material costs, available inventory, and the most importantly, home prices.

Mortgage rates have climbed, building materials have increased, and home prices have

The housing market risen significantly. The average 30-year fixed mortgage rate rose from 2.67% on December 1, 2020, to 3% on May 1, 2021.

> Building materials have risen in cost, lumber especially. In January 2020, the Random Length Lumber continuous contract, which prices in dollars per 1,000 board feet of lumber in the futures market, was about \$400. On May 7, 2021, the Random Length Lumber continuous contract peaked at \$1,670 but as of May 27, 2021, has pulled back some to \$1,315. Though not at its high, lumber is still expensive. Buildconfidence high last fall but has flattened out in the last few months as the cost of materials prices keep edging up. At the end of April 2021, the National Association of Homebuilders said rising lumber prices added \$35,872 to the building price of a new single-family home.

> The housing market will continue to slow, as will new building starts because home builders and potential buyers are facing a headwind of higher mortgage rates and rising home prices. These costs are beginning to price many houses outside the reach of the remaining potential homebuyers. Owning a home is still a major part of the American dream but the housing market might be in for a rough patch even as the economy continues to rebound, at least until prices come down or wages go up.
