He was on the Jackson County Court stumping and state when he arrived in Warsaw. His visit was to help promote a bond issue to rebuild dilapidated state hospitals and prisons. Harry pulled his model A Ford into a parking space on Warsaw's gravel Main Street for an overnight stay at the Osage Hotel (Now the Yellow Deli). Rooms were \$2.00 a day and meals were fifty cents. He was having breakfast when a call came for him. It was from Jim Pendergast, an old Army buddy and Jim Aylward, Democratic State Chairman. They wanted him to run in the primary race for U.S. Senate against John J. Cochran, St. Louis and Congressman "Tuck" Milligan of Richmond. Truman was quoted as saying, "I was too astounded to give them an answer until the next day." He won the primary and defeated Senator Roscoe Patterson, Springfield Republican in the general election. You could say that Truman's major political career, the one that led him to the Presidency had its start at a hotel in Warsaw, only a mile

When I was a kid Millie Kauffman would word for word. send me from the Enterprise office up the street to the Osage Hotel to get lunch. The proprietor was Agnes West and she'd fix Millie and I grilled ham and cheese sandwiches. 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




formed a live show for the kids. Her show, "Wild Heart", is an interactive entertainpresentation ment about animals and their relationships to people and the earth. The kids seemed to like it and it wasn't long before Syrigus had some volunteers on the "stage" participating.

"It's awesome!" said Maddison Mullen, who was standing at balloon-animal making table. Several of the kids had grouped up to get balloon animals made, and others were wandering over to the snow cone stand. Still yet there were many others heading to the bouncy-house. There was a lot to see and do. There are different levels of the program (which runs June 6 – August 7): the listeners program (for kids who cannot read independently), the readers program (kids who haven't started 7th grade but can read independently), and the young adult program (kids 7th – 12th grade). And, there are prizes: for the youngest kids there is a bubble machine and a bug catching kit; the older kids could win a Fujifilm camera and film. There are other things available for kids who complete their reading lists: coupons, certificates, books, and a

treasure box. The point of the summer reading program, however, is to keep kids engaged in reading throughout the summer. By the look of the crowd, it appears a lot of kids will. "It is going really well, and we have a good turnout," said Stephanie Rogers, the Henry County Library Director as she looked around the library parking lot at all the kids. She said she hopes to make this an annual program (with different themes every year). "We want to keep kids excited about reading and engaged during the summer months." Shelia Jensen (at the library) helped organize the events; Assistant Director Debbie Jones booked several of the events, too. One of the later teen programs that sounds interesting is "edible insects". Paul Latimer will be giving an educational presentation about how other folks in other countries often eat insects; the kids will even get a chance to try a few of those "treats" themselves. Of course, the idea is to help expose kids to other cultures and learn about insects as a resource. Next week's theme

is "How Can We Help the Animal Shelter?" Later programs include an animal shadow drawing, a presentation of the bald eagle program, Annie

the therapy dog, animal zoo train, animals that blow bubbles and even exploding sidewalk chalk. materials cheaper and making the decision to drive and get them the other day was just one example. Gray isn't exactly happy about it: he suspects that there is no real supply problem anymore with lumber at this point, but the prices are staying high. Like many, he wonders if it is just good old fashioned price gouging at work. In fact, a lot of people are going with metal fencing to avoid the high cost of a traditional wood fence. But Gray, who also races boats, noticed that the alcohol fuel for the racing boats is nearing the price of a gallon of gas, too. It is just another indicator that the economy might be on its way to more severe problem.

Lumber costs aside, staple grocery items are taking hikes, too. Taylor Adkinson said that even the cost of the Ramen noodles he usually buys has risen 50 cents for a ten-pack box at his hometown store. "It seems small," he said, "but it is adding up." And Adkinson has a point: when the staples go up (bread, milk, and eggs) it can be an indicator that an economy is in trouble. A dozen eggs in 1974 cost 74 cents. At the beginning of the 70s the price of a dozen eggs was a mere 53 cents; the lowest price a dozen eggs had been in the previous two decades was 49 cents and had hovered around the 60-cent mark since the 1950s. In the 1940s, especially post war, a dozen could be bought for a whopping 72 cents – a fortune in 1948. By 1980 they had risen to over 80 cents per dozen and a year later in 1981 they hit the 90-cent mark. By 1984 they were \$1 a dozen and stayed about the same price, give or take a nickel or two, until the turn of the 21st century (data from the dailymeal.com). In a sense, we can track the economic conditions and problems across the decades by examining the humble egg. Eggs were somewhat affordable until 2010 when, for a five-year period,

they started climbing

again (reaching 1.82

a dozen in 2015). By

2016 they dropped back down to about 80 cents a dozen. But the prices are climbing again.

Chickens are basically corn with feet, which can explain some of those ups and downs. When corn and grains are high, so are the eggs. Eggs, which today are a little over a dollar a dozen, were about 70 cents a dozen a few months ago. Much like the lumber price hikes, eggs have been subject to supply-demand laws: the explanation is that more people were buying eggs during the pandemic and the prices rose as less eggs became available. But it is not the only staple item that is getting more expensive. Bread, too, has risen considerably for the consumer.

According to the US Bureau of Labor and Statistics, bread rose about 3% overall for the consumer. Some breads (like the traditional loafs) have recently hit a 12% hike. As Mr. Adkinson said above: it doesn't seem like much, but it is adding up. Presently, the effects are somewhat flat - few people are choosing to skip buying eggs or bread at the current prices, but what if they rose another 25 cents? It is not the only consumer good going up, either. "That 5 pounds of beef that was \$20 is now \$30," said Taylor. Beef prices, very recently, went up again.

What is another economic indicator? Gas? Back in the late 1980s and early 1990s gas stuck around the \$1 per gallon mark. In the first decade of 2000, gas prices steadily increased to the point where they were well over \$3 a gallon (average of \$3.52 per gallon in 2011 according to Statista.com). By 2016 they were back to about \$2 per gallon but slowly going back up. Today we are nearing the \$3 mark again. The big question is this: how bad is it going to be? For now, the gas prices are flat. Since people were couped up for a year it makes since they will start getting out again. But if the prices keep rising, and this time next year a gallon of gas is \$3.50, are you going to take that family trip? That is not to say what that impact would have on trucking and shipping. Everyone, it seems, are

holding their breath. "Do you think it will be this way next year?" Adkinson and Gray weren't sure. Gray said that he has been told the price of lumber should return to "normal" by next year. But does that mean everything will? "I know that you have to have \$30,000 extra on hand right now just to buy a house," said Gray. True, real estate has risen sharply recently; even used cars are getting pricy. "I think it could go either way," said Gray. "We could see a depression, or it could flatten out." Although hopeful, Gray doesn't appear to have a lot of faith in the government to see America through this. When asked if he thought the current administration could address any economic problems that may come up, Gray said: "I don't get into politics, but I don't think Biden has a plan." But for now, Gray is worried about the future of his business. "I just know that if lumber prices went down, our business would pick up."

was held from Tuesday, June 1 through Friday, June 4.

The first few days of the week-long event is spent inside the hospital: the students visit the ER, sit in on some procedures, visit surgery, radiology, and medical inpatient; they even shadow the IT department.

The last day of the

visit includes a "MASH Camp" which is held outside of the hospital under a tent. The setup includes the students visiting several stations at 90-minute intervals which are designed to allow them to practice and observe various medical skills. The stations are interesting: there is a mannequin (which gives birth) at the OB station: Gwen Meeks (an OB nurse) demonstrated the birthing process for the students at that station. The students also get to practice their suturing skills on cow parts, and practice giving injections. One station was set up for orthopedics. The students got to drill into bones and place plates to stabilize fractures; they also learned how to wrap a broken bone. Fred Habel and Greg Pro from Stryker Orthopedics (the folks that make the plates and equipment for the procedures) were guiding students through those processes. The students even got to ventilate pig's lung.

A few of the students liked some of the aspects of the hospital better than the others: Patience Laserta, a high school student from Leeton said she was more interested in the OB side of things. Most of the others, however, had not made up their minds. The students' shadowing was done during normal operating hours - and since hospitals don't stop running - they got to see some interesting things: life flights, the emergency nature of an ER, and also medical procedures and surgeries. In general, they got to observe

how the various de-

partments and floors of the hospital were run and managed.



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

Highway Patrol Report

Six Traffic Fatalities, One Boating Fatality, & One Drowning Over Memorial Day Weekend

Six people died in traffic crashes over the 2021 Memorial Day weekend counting period of 6 p.m., Friday, May 28, through 11:59 p.m., Monday, May 31, 2021.

Missouri State Highway Patrol troopers investigated the following over the 2021 Memorial Day holiday weekend:

Traffic Statistics

Crashes -- 270 Injuries -- 82 Fatalities -- 4 DWI -- 112 Drug Arrests -- 77 [Note: Springfield Police Department and St. Louis Metropolitan Police Department each investigated traffic fatality.]

Boating Statistics Crashes -- 10 Injuries -- 2 Fatality -- 1 Drowning -- 1 BWI -- 8

Drug Arrests -- 2 (Note: During the 2020 counting period, the Patrol investigated 310 traffic crashes, which included 126 injuries and six of the 10 fatalities. Troopers made 118 arrests for driving while intoxicated last year. Also, over the 2020 Memorial Day holiday: Marine operations troopers investigated 11 boating crashes involving seven injuries and one fatality; and arrested 11 people for boating while intoxicated on the state's rivers and lakes. One person drowned over the 2020 Memorial

Day holiday.) Troopers investigated four of the six traffic crash fatalities. One fatality occurred in each of the following areas: Troop A, Lee's Summit, MO, Troop C, Weldon Spring, MO, Troop E, Poplar Bluff, MO, and Troop F, Jefferson City, MO. The remaining two fatalities were investigated by the Springfield Police Department and St. Louis Metropolitan Police Department.

One person drowned Saturday, May 2021, in Iron County, MO. No further details are available at this time.

One boating fatality occurred on Sunday, May 30, 2021, on Rinquelin Trail Lake in Maries County. Paul W. Becker, 77, of Crocker, MO, died after he fell overboard and didn't resurface. There were no traffic

fatalities within the

counting period on Friday, May 28, 2021. Two traffic fatalities occurred on Saturday, May 29, 2021. Brenda E. Mahoney, 55, of Wentzville, MO, died when the vehicle she was driving struck another vehicle headon, then struck a third vehicle before it traveled off the right side of the roadway and overturned. Mahoney's vehicle was traveling westbound in the eastbound lanes of Missouri Highway 364 east of Bryan Road in St. Charles County at the time of the crash. A St. Charles paramedic County pronounced Mahoney dead at the scene. The driver of the second vehicle sustained serious injuries; the third driver sustained minor injuries. All three drivers were wearing seat belts at the time of the

crash. Barry W. Light, 32, of Pevely, MO, died when the motorcycle he was operating struck a concrete traffic barrier. The crash occurred on Interstate 64 just after the 11st Street exit in St. Louis, MO. The St. Louis Metropolitan Police Department investigated.

Two fatalities occurred on Sunday, May 30, 2021. Timmy L. McIntire, 29, of Rockville, MO, died when the motorcycle he was operating ran off the right side of the roadway. McIntire was ejected from the vehicle. Both vehicle and driver then struck a utility pole. McIntire was not wearing a helmet at the time of the crash. The crash occurred southwest of the intersection of W. Vernon Avenue and Fourth Street in Rockville, which is located in Bates County.

Nathaniel L. Linkins, 20, of Republic, MO, died when the motorcycle he was operating struck the curb as it a came around a curve. The motorcycle traveled onto the grass median and struck a tree. Linkins was thrown from the motorcycle; he was wearing a helmet at the time of the crash. Debris from the motorcycle then struck a northbound vehicle. The driver of the vehicle was wearing a seat belt; she was not injured. The crash occurred at the intersection of Kansas Expressway and Broadmoor in Green County. The Springfield Police investi-Department gated.

fatalities oc-Two curred on Memorial Day, May 31, 2021. Leonard R. Byars, 80, of Eldridge, MO, died when the vehicle he was driving ran off the right side of the roadway. Byars overcorrected, the vehicle returned to the roadway, then ran off the vehicle, fine \$50.50 right side of the road-Byers was not wearing a seat belt at the time of the crash. Dorman House Closed To Public

The Dorman House, part of the Henry County Museum Complex tour, is currently closed to the public due to some structural integrity issues noticed on the building a few weeks ago. The closure will include the dates for the Olde Glory Days events. The matter is currently being addressed and it is hoped to have the building safe for tours again in the coming months. Many local folks will recall that the Dorman House was the first two-story structure built in Clinton (in 1852) and was the home of Judge J.G. Dorman, his wife Udolpha Miller Dorman, and their seven maintained as an early 19th century example of American architecture and furnishings by the Henry County Museum.

The Dog-Trot Cabin and late 1800s One Room School House are still available as part of the museum tours as is the Museum building which currently has World War I Memorial display (available to see through June 30).

FTC Issues Scam Alert

As part of the American Rescue Plan Act, eligible families will get monthly payments from the government from July 15 through December 2021. The Internal Revenue Service (IRS) will send these monthly payments directly to people through direct deposit, paper checks, or debit cards. Unlike economic impact payments, these payments are an advance on families' child tax credit. People who are eligible will get up to half of their child tax credit in these monthly payments and the other half when they file their 2021 taxes.

If you qualify for payments — which depends, in part, on how much you make you'll get them on about the 15th of each month, automatically, without having to do anything. The IRS is working to get online systems set up on

children. It has been its webpage and make sure all questions get answered. Go to IRS. gov for the latest info on who qualifies, how much you'll get, and how to address any problems you might run into.



MDC Creature Feature: Missouri's Periodical Cicadas



MISSOURI won't experience periodical cicadas until 2024, but its annual cicadas (pictured) will make their appearance this summer. MDC encourages the public to learn more about these unique insects and the vital role they play in the ecosystem.

It wouldn't be a Missouri summer without the pulsating hum of its annual cicadas. The Missouri Department of Conservation (MDC) encourages you to learn more about these bugeyed insects and the important role they play in the ecosystem.

Periodical cicadas are making headlines this year as numerous states will be visited by Brood X after spending 17 years underground. However, MDC's Forest Entomologist Robbie Doerhoff says Missouri won't experience periodical cicadas for another few years.

"Periodical cicadas won't emerge in Missouri until 2024," explained Doerhoff. "But the dog days, or annual cicadas, we see each summer will be present, and are super cool in their own way!"

Doerhoff said that several species of cicadas occur in Missouri, and they start to emerge in midto-late June.

"Annual cicadas look like larger and greener versions of the famous periodical cicadas," she explained. "They spend two-to-five years living underground as nymphs and sucking juices from plant roots with their straw-like mouth parts. During the dog days of summer, nymphs will tunnel to the surface, climb a tree or other object, and molt to become a winged adult."

After molting, which takes just a few hours, cicadas leave behind their famous shed skin. They will then sing, mate, and produce the next generation – all within just a few weeks of living above ground before dying. Notable species of annual cicadas include Robinson's cicada, scissor grinder, buzz saw, and Northern dusk singing cicada.

"The thing that's so neat about Missouri's annual cicadas is how unique they are," said Doerhoff. "You can identify species by their song and the time of day they sing."

For example, the call of a Robinson's annual cicada is a repetitive, rhythmic "pZEE-ape, pZEE-ape" and mostly occurs in midday. Buzz saw cicadas call from high trees with a distinctive "WHEE-oo, WHEE-oo" during the evening

Though their unique calls can be bothersome to some, the annual singing of males is imperative to finding a mate.

"The adult males have sound-producing membranes called tymbals that emit that loud, raspy call used to attract females," said Doerhoff. "Studies have shown cicada calls can reach 92 decibels - which is louder than a lawn mower!"

Annual cicadas can be found statewide and are most common in wooded areas, parks, and forest borders. Females lay their eggs in the woody twigs of trees and shrubs, occasionally causing the tips of twigs to turn brown. After hatching,

nymphs fall from the twigs and burrow underground to feed off tree, shrub, and perennial plant roots.

"Cicadas really thrive in areas where the land is relatively undisturbed for the years it takes the nymphs to develop underground," explained

Like many wildlife members, cicadas play an important role in Missouri's ecosystem. They provide a food source for many species of birds, insects, spiders, and other animals that feed on large bugs. The small nymphs help aerate the soil while they burrow underground. Once they die, cicada bodies serve as an important source of nitrogen for trees.

Doerhoff stressed the importance of celebrating cicadas, as broods may be getting smaller.

"The lifecycle of a cicada is so incredible because they spend so much time underground preparing to emerge, especially the periodical cicadas, and it's unfortunate their numbers are potentially declining," she noted. "There are several factors that could be to blame, including urban development and pesticide use. Because they only spend a few weeks aboveground, we still have much to learn about this species."

To help support cicadas, Doerhoff suggested steering clear of chemical use on lawns.

"Using pesticides above ground can ultimately harm cicadas," she said. "Don't use weed-andfeed products as they can kill tree roots that cicadas feed on. Avoid unnecessary insecticide applications to your trees and grass as these types of pesticides can kill soil-dwelling organisms that help make your backyard a healthy ecosystem."

The Wastewater Plant operations report included information about finding a long-term solution for replacing vertical pumps with submersible pumps at the pump stations. The ones that are presently there are outdated (installed in the 1980s) and pose a safety threat.

The council, after some clarifying discussion about contracts related to the Inclusive Playground construction, proved the Resolution (Res. 07-2021), and the accepted the bid of \$37,980 from Westport Construction. Also approved by the council was to allow Mayor Lowe to approve restroom construction (project related and not to exceed \$25,000). All the accepted bids and approval of funds are accounted for in the budget for the Inclusive Playground Project. City Administrator Christy Maggi said that she does expect delays on construction projects for a while come. Councilman Wilson clarified those delays might be because of material shortages and labor issues.

Councilman Jackson said that concerns raised about trash on the square from late night activities has

been passed along to patrol officers on appropriate shifts to help address the problem.

The Livable Streets project is moving forward; currently they are identifying how to best proceed with developing a plan for bike and pedestrian paths.

Public Safe-The ty report was given by Councilman Gene Henry. The first item addressed was that of the update of the standard operating guidelines for the Clinton Fire Department. Fire Chief Mark Manuel explained that most everything in the SOG update is new; the old one has not been updated since the 1980s. Councilman Daniel Wilson wondered why, in the updated SOG, that the driver of a firetruck needed to be 20 or over. It was explained that the fire department has found that those 20 and over seem to be more responsible concerning the operation of the complicated apparatus of the fire trucks. The motion to accept the updated SOG was approved by the council. Councilman Henry

introduced the Cadet Patrol Officer Program to the council. The concept, as explained by Officers Chad Nepple and Paul Abbott (present at the council meeting) should help the police department acquire and retaining new officers. It is not a new concept; many departments use this as a recruiting tool and the Clinton Police Department does struggle to keep up with the larger departments' pull of new officer candidates from this area. The proposal for the program includes the compensation of cadets while they attend school and would require a commitment of the cadet after their training and school for two years with the Clinton Police Department. The council approved the program.

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

Land Value Reassessments

Well, it is that time again.....reassessment time. I might as well let you in on the worst kept secret around. HOME/ LAND VALUES are going up. I have been warning of this for the last year and a half, and it is here. My office has spent the last 20 months combing through the County and verifying our data. We have looked at every parcel in the County (just shy of 17,000 parcels) and are continuing to review the new aerial imagery taken in March/April of this year. The Missouri State

Tax Commission (the Agency tasked with verifying that our numbers are correct) visits my office every month and selects a random sample of files to review. We get feedback from them monthly and an annual report of the accuracy of our values. While I try to be accurate with the values in the County, this last housing/land boom has affected our values tremendously; so much so that we could be out of parameters set by the State. While being a little low does not bother me at all, there is a line that we as a county can't afford cross.....the one that would allow the State to increase values across the board without regard to equity and fairness. I will not allow that to happen.

The increases throughout the County are aggressive and I understand that better than most. I also understand that an increase of this kind will result in a "rollback" of the levies for all taxing entities in the County. I have been in contact with most of the taxing entities and given them the heads up on the increases and EV-ERY ONE of the taxing entities that I have talked to have committed to "rollback" as necessary. While I understand that the whole "rollback", assessment, assessed value, appraised value and levies are more than any of you care to know about, my job is

- Ensure that values are applied fairly and equitably for everyone.
- Treat everyone that calls or comes into our office with respect. Be avail-3. from able 7:30am 5:00pm Monday through Friday and available after hours/ weekends by appointment so everyone has access to the Assessor's Office.
- Attend all 4. tax levy hearings in the County to ensure that all levies are set ("rolled back") as dictated by Revised Missouri State Statures.

Appraised values in this State are required to be between 90% and 110% of market value (the value at which your home/ real property would sell on the open market....not a "flip", short sale, distressed sale, repossession, or family/friend discounted value. When/if the **State Tax Commission** determines my values are below 90% (some Counties near us are below 80% and some below 70%) they can and DO unilaterally increase all values across the board to get the County as a whole to 100%, increasing the values of homes/ properties that are correct, close to correct and way off by the same amount which is NOT FAIR and NOT EQUITABLE. With the ever increasing cost of materials to build new houses it is hard to plan for the increases needed 2, 4, or 6 years ahead.

In short, increase notices should start showing up any day now, and some of the increases are significant. Of the 17,000 parcels, one half will be receiving increase notices....that is 50% of all property owners. With the expected "rollback" (and I do not know yet what that will be), I expect that 40% of those getting increase notices will actually pay LESS REAL ESTATE TAXES than you did in 2020. So, just because your appraised/assessed value increases, do not think that automatically means you will owe more in taxes.... for many of you, it will not result in increased

If you receive an increase notice and do not believe that your home/property been valued correctly, you have many options.

Call our office 1. and talk to me or one of the outside appraisers. You may be asked to leave your name and number and we will call you as we get the opportunity.

Come to our office and bring your increase notice. We will be happy to assist you as quickly as possible.

If you can't call or come by during regular office hours, we will make appointments after hours or on weekends.

If, after we discuss the changes, we can't agree on a value with the facts available, you can ask for a reevaluation both inside and out to be conducted. (This is normally done when there are issues that can't be observed from outside inspection.) This has to be requested and finished prior to the deadline for the Board of Equalization.

After all of that, if we still can't come to an agreement, there is the possibility of having a private appraisal done. If the value from the private appraisal comes in higher than what we have on the property, we will use that value and you will have to pay for the appraisal. If the value comes in lower than what we have it at, we will use that value and we will pay for the appraisal. (We have offered this option for several years. We have rarely needed to make it to this option and our office has never had to pay for a private appraisal.)

The next option is appeal to the Board of Equalization. This must be done by the second week in July, 2021. Utilizing this option entails presenting your information/evidence as to the value of your property to a Board empanelled to hear such matters.

If that does not 7. result in the outcome you feel is appropriate, you may then appeal to the State Tax Commission.

There is one more option after that and I will be glad to share it with you if all the other options are not successful.

The goal of my office if to be accurate and fair. Nobody (no person or taxing entity) gains one dime of tax money by raising or lowering values on real property. It is done this way so that levies are set AFTER appeals to the Board of Equalization are settled. Please be prepared for any of the options listed above by having evidence or documentation to support the value that you think is fair. While I value evervone's opinion on these matters, they are just that, opinions. Just because your values have been too low for many vears, doesn't mean that the value we have placed on your property is incorrect. One of our standard questions is "would you sell it for that?"

On the other side, we are human and we do make mistakes. I can tell you now that there are some mistakes in the 17,000 parcel values. We appreciate it when you bring those mistakes to our attention so we can get them fixed. I can assure everyone that nobody on my staff nor the two previous office holders or their staffs have ever knowingly placed a wrong value on anyone's property. The market swings over the last 3 decades have been wild as evidenced by land increases from \$380/acre to \$6,000/ acre in 30+ years and average home prices more than doubling in 30 years.

Stock Market Insights By Dr. Richard L. Baker, AIF

"You can have this for free!" I remember my mom and dad's skepticism when someone would walk up to them and say that as we walked around our county fair when I was boy. My parents knew there was always a catch.

With the stock market doing so well and near all-time highs so soon after the pandemic, a constant question I'm being asked is: "Will we see a June Swoon?" After the first-quarter earnings season, mostly exceeding expectations, and with the markets so high one has to wonder, what's the catch?

I understand the uneasiness the investors are feelings. In the last few weeks, we have seen some interesting things. Inflation (CPI) rose 4.2% on a year-over-year basis. The stock market danced a little in the middle of May before recovering at the end of the month. Probably, the most interesting thing we have seen is, as of June 3rd, the S&P 500 has gone over 250 days since its last decline of 5% or more. What makes that significant is the S&P 500 has averaged 177 days between declines of 5% or more since WWII.

The good news is that historically June isn't known as a volatile month for the market. It's had only five 5% or more declines (second lowest only to December) since WWII. June is tied for second lowest one-month decline, and in the past 10 years has averaged up 1.0%.

All that to say, a pullback in the market wouldn't surprise anyone, but it is historically unlikely because major market weakness seldom starts in June. The summer months in general are traditionally sluggish for the stock market because of reduced trading volume. There is a lot of optimism (life without a mask is wonderful) about the pandemic recovery and though investors might be asking "what's the catch?", they are generally positive about the next few weeks of economic outlook.

I also think if more families were walking around county fairs together our country would be in a much better place, but that's a discussion for another place. Have a blessed week!




