Teen Contest, are just a small part of the excitement on hand at the 73rd Annual Henry County Fair taking place at the Henry County Fairgrounds, Benson Convention


Center and Lonnie Price Memorial Arena in Calhoun, from July 10 to July 18.



10 – 11, prevented the Truck and Tractor Pull from taking place, but it has been rescheduled for September 26, at 3 PM.

“Although attendance at the Fair was not as large last year as in the past, it looks like we will have a great turnout at our events this year,” said Taylor. “We had a lot of teens sign up to be in the Super Teen Contest that has been taking place since 2019.”

Some of the shows featuring exhibits at the Benson Convention Center, according to the Henry County Fair Facebook page, include the Flower Show; Fruit and Vegetable Show; Home Economics Department Food Preparation, Food Preservation, and Household Arts; Woodworking, Arts and Crafts; and FFA Ag Mechanics.

Always popular is the Henry County Fair Royalty. The Fair Board stated on Facebook that it was looking for “strong, kind, and outgoing girls to be Henry County Queens.” Miss Henry County Fair Queen is Kennedy Early. Pre Fair Queen is Lauren Bailey, and Jr. Fair Queen is Brynn Manning. Emerson Dunn was named Wee King, and Maggie Johnson is Wee Queen.

“The Fair is an avenue for youth to exhibit projects,” said Cheryl Early, President of the Henry County Fair Board. “4-H and FFA members decide on a project at the beginning of the school year, and then work on it all year until they can exhibit it at the Fair. If they win a Blue Ribbon, they can take their winning project to the State Fair in Sedalia, in August.”

Early said that in the past the Fair was bigger, and there would have been a carnival and entertainment. But, those events are already provided during Olde Glory Days early in July, and since part of the Fairgrounds were sold to the City of Clinton in the 1990s, there is less room for some historical activities.

Everything is free to enjoy except for the Demolition Derby and Truck and Tractor Pull that bring in funds to support the Fair. The Corn Hole Tournament also charges for admission to fun 4-H Scholarships.

“The Henry County Fair has a lot of sponsors, and although it involves 4-H and FFA Youth, the general public is sometimes involved,” said Early. “On the day exhibits are placed in Benson Convention Center, the public competes in the morning and the 4-H and FFA youth are judged later in the day.”

area and Scout Master Willings attributes part of that to the influence of scout camps like this one. “It is the ultimate scout camp,” said Willings.

“It helps keep the scouts intrigued and the area is such a special place. It is an opportunity to go, as a unit, and put to test all the things we have worked on all year: rock climbing, shooting, water sports and safety to name only a few. They have a great climbing tower and the miles of Osage trails are ones that people come from all over the country to hike. They get to things like shoot black powder rifles and shoot a bow and arrow,” said Willings. Actually, they do a lot more – just too many to name. But there is another thing they get while at H. Roe Bartle Camp, and it is important to get.

“The biggest thing they get from all these activities is life experience.” Scout Master Willings said that what he hears most from the adults, who participated as youths, is that over the years they have been able to use some of the skills they got to practice and experience in those camps later in life. In other words, they learned something that came in handy later on. And the kids who participate these days also get something that is hard to get in today's world:

they get to check out: “With the youth today, everything is so electronic driven,” said Willings. “They get to get away from that.” It is just one of the many positive effects of the scout camp.

Aside from the experience, many of the skills learned and practiced at the camps can actually have life altering consequences. Willings gave the example of his son performing the Heimlich on a friend who was choking. The incident happened while he and his friends were eating in a restaurant and the action most certainly assisted his son's friend. His son's (Wes) actions were possible because he had learned them at scout camp. By the way, they also learn about boater safety and learn CPR. “The scouts learn life skills we often take for granted. They might not use them right now, but they could potentially be useful later on.”

Moreover, the camps provide structure, accountability and also teach morals, respect and the importance of rules. But as a whole, the experience is hard to put into words. “It is hard to explain,” said Willings. “Its partly the atmosphere of the camp, partly the staff, and a mixture of some other things.”

The H. Bartle Camp is one of the bigger scouting events that the youth (and adults) look forward to every summer, but it isn't the only one. For example, Troop 430 is currently preparing for the Philmont Expedition: “Backpacking in the Rocky Mountains for 12 days. How cool is that?” said Scout Mas-

ter Matt Wilings. You could hear the smile in his voice. Troop 430 (and others) leave next Monday for that excursion.

It goes without saying that Boy Scouts is changing, but Willings said he didn't think all of the changes were so bad and he is happy to get kids involved in Scouts. In fact – if you think your child might want to give Scouts a try, he can be reached at (660) 924 – 1156. Boy Scouts is for 5th – 12th grade; those interested in becoming a Cub Scout, which is Kindergarten through 4th grade, should contact Sarah Duncan at (660) 924 – 3346. (These numbers are for Troop 430 here in town. Another Troop (225) is headed by Jack Huff and he can be reached at (660) 351 – 2773 – Troop 225 is for Boy Scouts only, not Cub Scouts).

By the way, H. Roe Bartle donated the land near Osceola (the location of the Scout Camp) just for the purpose of Scouting. Bartle, a former Mayor of Kansas City, is probably best remembered for helping bring the Dallas Texans football team to Kansas City in 1962. Of course, the team would get a better known name later on: The Kansas City Chiefs – so named in honor of Bartle whose nickname was “the Chief.”

destinations are not allowing citizens to come without records of vaccination. For example, there are some cruises that will not let you board without proof of vaccination. According to U.S. News, there are some territories as well, such

as Anguilla, a Caribbean Island, that require you to be vaccinated at least 3 weeks prior to your arrival. To add to that list the Bahamas, Barbados, Belize, Bermuda along with other islands and most of Europe have similar requirements. Upon returning from international travel, you should check with the State Department. However, whether you are vaccinated or not and traveling in airports or coming to the US from other countries you need to have a COVID-19 negative test result done within three days of their flight. Although, if you are traveling locally or within the US in your vehicle there are not any new restrictions than what many are used too.

We have had a travel increase locally as well! Break Time could possibly be one of the busiest local gas stations during this time of year located right off the main stretch of 7 highway is the perfect location for travelers to stop in and refill their tanks or their stomachs during their trips. A break time employee stated that “oh yes, we have seen an extreme increase in travel lately” when asked if there was a noticeable change in travel since restrictions for covid have lifted it was also stated that a few precautions, such as masking up, that customers were once taking have now began to rapidly slow down the employee said, “There's just a few people we see wearing masks nowadays.”

The local Parkfield Inn has also seen an increase in guests re-

cently. The manager mentioned that many of the guests “about 75% of guests are headed to Branson and the other 25% are just passing through on their way home”. Staff was asked if the hotel still any restrictions had set into place due to the pandemic and if there were plans on changing these restrictions “we do not have any restrictions at this time and we do not plan on changing that”.

Although with restrictions lifting and travel increasing it is important to keep in mind that COVID-19 cases are currently rising in Missouri. I reached out to Dr. Dailey with Golden Valley Memorial Healthcare to ask about tips and precautions to keep in mind during this time and what he had to say about restrictions and mandates being lifted “I am a big fan of personal responsibility. I think restrictions are less important than behavior. Generally, restrictions have not been helpful at changing behavior locally. The behavior that is important is getting vaccinated, masking, distancing, and generally being sensible about groups. That does not require a mandate although mandates make it concrete and send a signal that is a good one. Every patient I have seen that has gotten sick but forgone the vaccination has regretted that choice. Some are paying the ultimate price for that decision.”

Money Seized Goes To Henry County Schools



The Henry County Prosecuting Attorney’s Office announces that on June 29, 2021, \$1,080 that was seized during a September 2018 criminal arrest has been collected for the Capital School Fund of Henry County. Assistant Prosecuting Attorney LaChrisha Gray, Clinton Police Officers Michael Nelson and Patrick Barry, Clinton School Superintendent Destry Brown, Henry County Treasurer Ann Julian and Deputy Circuit Court Clerk Wendi McGhee attended the transfer of money.

In September 2018, Clinton Police Officers Michael Nelson and Patrick Barry seized the \$1,080 when they arrested Alix Kissee at the Clinton Wal-Mart. Kissee was found to be in possession of various controlled substances, paraphernalia, and the large sum of cash. In October 2019, Kissee pled guilty to her charges associated with that arrest and was sentenced to ten years in the Missouri Department of Corrections.

Subsequently, the Circuit Court Judge M. Brandon Baker ordered that the cash money seized be forfeited and the proceeds be distributed to the Capital School Fund, which is dispersed to all the school districts of Henry County.

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

If we're not doing something to make disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world, then we're not doing what Christ has commanded us to do.

We see in Mark's Gospel Jesus calls the twelve, ordains them with authority over the powers of evil, and sends them into the world. Their mission? Spread the Good News of Jesus Christ and show the power of God over nature and the forces of evil. Their mission was to spread the faith. Their answer to His call was; here I am, Lord. Use me as a vessel—allow me to be your hands, feet, and mouth here on earth. This mission of the Gospel is like our own—have faith in Jesus and tell people the story of Jesus.

Encourage them to allow the power of the Holy Spirit to transform their lives. If you sometimes fail and people just don't want to listen, do not worry. The world does not always want to hear why it is in conflict with God, because it usurps the individual will as ultimate authority. The world does not want to hear this so it dismisses it, it dismisses Christ, it dismisses us.

The prophet Amos found himself in a similar situation. God calls him to speak truth to power. He was

to tell King Jeroboam to purify the worship of God throughout Israel, but they did not like what Amos was saying, so they dismissed him. His truth was inconvenient to them so they sent him away, referring to him as a judgmental bigot. As a result of their denial, God allowed the Assyrian army to destroy the kingdom of Israel and take them captive.

Our mission is to spread the Good News of Jesus Christ, even though there will be times when we must "shake the dust" off our feet and go elsewhere. God's word is never proclaimed in vain. Even when you don't think you're making an impact, you are. Be receptive to the Holy Spirit. Be receptive to the mission of Christ, and when God calls upon you, accept that mission and carry it out for the glory of God, who died that you might be set free.

Brad Combs: “I have always been a huge Royals fan. I certainly remember the 1985 and 2015 World Series but what sticks out in my memory maybe even more are the Divisional Series losses to the Yankees in 1976-78. Especially the 76 series vs the Yankees when Chris Chambliss hit a walk-off HR off of Mark Littell to defeat my Royals once again. I was maybe nine years old. That loss, that HR, devastated me. The Royals finally got over the hump and made it to the 1980 World Series. I am still a huge Royals fan. Funny how memories work.”

EDITOR’S NOTE: Brad’s memory of the dreaded losses to the ‘Damn Yankees’ in 76, 77 and 78 are also permanently burned into my memory. A neat bit of trivia about the HR hit by Chambliss; he never touched home plate. He literally couldn’t because the fans flooded the field. He came back on the field later to satisfy the rule only to find out that home plate had been stolen. He touched the ground. Later MLB changed the rule to say the bases must be touched, unless it is not possible to touch them (aka the Chambliss exception).

Stephanie Rogers: “When I was a senior in high school, I was at the top of my game in softball. I played third base that year and worked so hard with my team on our goal of winning the 1-70 conference championship. That year, Concordia had a new pitcher for the tournament. Our hearts sunk as we quietly watched the arm of the replacement pitcher from our dug-out bench. Her pitches were much slower and we knew then that the timing of our swings would be off. Although our coaches tried to encourage us, it didn’t work. Three of us were able to get a hit off of the replacement pitcher and only two of us made it on base. Needless to say, we ended up winning second place, final score of 3 to 2 in the final game that year, because unfortunately, our team was not prepared. I think about that game a lot. I did get an RBI that game. Had our team only practiced with several different pitching speeds in those final weeks, as we did in our normal practices, we might have won.”

Missouri ag producers who need to obtain or renew a private pesticide applicator license to purchase restricted-use pesticides can attend an on-line Zoom class or complete a worksheet based on the training manual, according to Pat Miller, University of Missouri Extension agronomist. The manual is optional to purchase for the Zoom classes. The Zoom classes are offered state-wide and there are a number of dates and times available through the summer. Producers can register for the Zoom classes at the following link: <https://extension.missouri.edu/programs/pesticide-applicator-training>. Miller will be teaching the July 15 Zoom class but producers can attend any of the classes taught by MU specialists across the state. Producers choosing the worksheet option will need to use the manual, which is still the 2007 M87. Manuals can be purchased or ordered through your local Extension Center. Manual costs have gone up considerably so if you are recertifying and already have a manual, you can avoid purchasing one. For the worksheet option, contact MU Extension agronomy specialist, Pat Miller, or your local Extension Center. There is no longer an option to view a video at the Extension Center to complete the training. This class also completes the EPA worker protection training program for ag employees who handle pesticides. Miller reminds producers that if their license expired in May, 2021 or earlier, they will need to use the form for a new license instead of the one for recertification. If ag producers have questions or need more information, contact Pat Miller, agronomy specialist, at 417-448-2560. University of Missouri Extension programs are open to all.

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Representative Rodger Reedy Capital Report

The Governor called the legislators back to Jefferson City the last week of June to pass the FRA (Federal Reimbursement Allowance) bill. The FRA is important as it provides the state with 4 billion dollars to help fund our Medicaid program. Missouri providers pay this money to the federal government, they match it and the state draws it down as a funding source for our present Medicaid program providing for the elderly, disabled, children and others who are eligible. This provides about 40% of the Medicaid budget. With the new budget year beginning on July 1st this was important to balance the budget. Without it the Governor would have to start withholds to keep the state solvent.

The Senate acted first passing SB1. It included the FRA and prohibited Medicaid from paying for abortifacient drugs used to induce an abortion. The House took up SB1 and passed it. I voted for this bill. The House also passed HB2. It prohibits any taxpayer funds from being paid to facilities that perform abortions and their affiliates. I voted for this bill as well. The Senate did not act on this bill. Both bills are Pro-Life. The Governor signed SB1 and the budget bills before the deadline.

I am now back in the district and I continue to work daily on constituent issues. As usual my legislative assistant Blake will be in the Capitol office Monday through Thursdays from 8:00 – 5:00 and from 8:00 – Noon on Fridays.

Substance Abuse Rehab And Education

Across most of the US, states are struggling to quell a worsening opiate epidemic. While this is happening, one problem continues to rage on in states across the country.

NBC News reported on meth with some shocking results. Not only is meth, also known as ice, crank, speed, chalk and gak, the highly addictive and damaging drug is still a huge problem throughout the US. According to the U.S. Sentencing Commission, in 2015 meth of-

fenders made up the highest proportion of federal drug offenders in 27 states.

Meth has some of the most serious physical ramifications out of any drug. The damage can be lasting as well with the bodies of a meth addict still damaged even after methamphetamine rehabilitation. It can destroy a person's teeth, cause damage to the cardiovascular system and dramatically change a person's appearance.

Some signs of meth abuse include

- lack of sleep
- loss of weight
- tooth decay
- hyperactivity
- hallucinations

In the event you know of someone struggling with methamphetamine addiction, you should quickly get them into treatment.

Methamphetamines don't only take a toll on those who use them, but they have nasty effects on communities as well. When a house is used to create meth or even someone just uses meth in the house long-term damage can be created in that house presenting health risks for any later inhabitants. This is because when meth is created or used, the drug releases dangerous chemicals which are embed themselves in carpet, wood and even the walls.

Decontaminating a house can cost tens of thousands of dollars, so many times the house stays vacant or people end up living in it and dealing the health problems.

For now, it is unclear what long-term exposure is created for those living in meth-contaminated houses. It is however clear that children are most susceptible with the short-term effects including a headache, nausea and eye irritation.

There are things anyone can do to protect those they care about. If you witness a house you believe to be a meth lab or where meth is being used, you should contact law enforcement. In addition, if you move into a house and notice your loved ones starting to show exposure symptoms, you can have your houses tested for a relatively small fee.

Legislative Day: The next legislative day will be held on February 8, 2022.





"I wonder how many parades the old DeLozier building has seen?" I thought to myself as the 2021 Olde Glory Days procession made its way around the Washington Street corner.

The DeLozier building has seen some remarkable history: buildings on fire, explosions, horses, cars, buggies, accidents, and a lot of shenanigans from kids of all generations on Friday nights.

It has stood there when Americans have been called to war, have come home from war, have been economically depressed, economically enthusiastic, and been afraid, happy, sad, and reluctant. It has seen the progression of technology and was standing there when man landed on the moon.

It has seen men and women come and go; shops and stores come and go; generations of children who walked passed it have since passed on.

It has seen rallies, gatherings, court trials and even a few hangings. It has watched the town of Clinton grow up and watched its downtown dwindle and then slowly rejuvenate. It has watched dirt streets turn to brick then to pavement. It watched the fountain be placed on the southeast corner of the square and the first stone of the courthouse be laid. It has seen a lot.

We often wonder why people leave old things standing: some say it is to give us a sense of immortality. That is, in some sense, things we make will still be here when we are gone. And maybe that is true. But it is just as true that human beings tend to collect the past anyway.

In the early 1900s, the Mclane house – which used to be on Second Street, was the home of the original Henry County Museum. It was even the home of a library. When it burned, the history of the county kind of went stale and stagnated for a few generations before someone again thought it necessary to collect our history. They put the museum, such that it was, on the third floor of the courthouse. Then, in the late 1960s, they reorganized the historical society and opened a new museum on the country's bicentennial in 1976. Since then, all sorts of things have been collected, cataloged and researched; new items and properties have been placed as part of the museum and everyone in the county can come experience the past when they want. And part of that "collection" is the DeLozier building.

We never know what will still exist in the future: what the next "DeLozier Building" will be. Preservation tends to be the exception not the rule. But for now, standing on the corner of Franklin and Washington, the old building again watched another parade unfold and will hopefully stand silently observing history unfold for years to come.

Stock Market Insights

Do you ever turn off your alarm and lay there in bed and think, "I really don't want to go to work today?" Well, it looks like a lot of Americans are following through on that idea.

The Labor Department issued its latest Job Openings and Labor Turnover report (JOLTS) which showed that U.S. job openings went up 0.2% to 9.2 million to set another record in May. New employee hires fell 1.4% to 5.9 million because of a shortage of hireable applicants. Some analysts think this is partly due to a mismatch of the unemployed skill level and the skill level needed by the hiring companies. One positive note from the report is that employees quitting their jobs in May dropped to 2.5% from 2.8% in April which shows strong worker confidence.

An interesting side note is that the number of people receiving unemployment benefits is falling faster in Missouri and the other 21 states who canceled the federal enhanced unemployment benefits. This suggests that ending the federal aid might be pushing more people to apply for a job. The U.S. Labor Department showed that Missouri's May unemployment rate was 4.2% which was significantly lower than the national average of 5.8% according to Eric Morath and Joe Barrett of The Wall Street Journal.

On the stock market front, the major indexes are beginning to show some weakness after setting record highs. It seems investors are trying to decide whether they should stay with riskier bets or begin moving into less risky value stocks as a defensive stance because of soft economic data and concerns about rising COVID cases. If the rising COVID cases cause Americans to slow down their buying it could lead to more market indecision and possible volatility in the coming weeks.

Overall economic conditions are improving, but we have some serious risks to work through. A key to the second half of this year for the market is how the country handles this latest uptick in COVID and how quickly the rest of American gets back to work. The employment situation is better than it was a year ago, but we are far from full strength.

I believe the American worker is the best in the world. No one likes getting up with an alarm clock, but I believe Americans are starting to go back to work and that's great for our country.

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
