Clinton City The Council met in open session August 3 at City Hall. All members of the council were present; City Administrator Christy Maggi was absent. Several

topics of interests were discussed at the meeting – including the potential limited Park and Rec tax which may appear on the November ballot.

perience of the participants. If someone has little experience with firearms, then that person would require individualized instruction. Safety is our number one concern. The Firearms Familiarization session will include dry fire (shooting without ammo), stance, and trigger pull. Participants will also go to the range for half a day, probably on a Saturday."

Sheriff Oberkrom said that there will be role players for scenarios such as Domestic Violence, and that students will walk away with a whole new perspective of that type of situation.

"The Citizen's Academy was kind of developed as a Public Relations tool to look at and learn," said Sheriff Oberkrom. "It has been around for a long time. The last time we had the Academy was about nine years ago, and there was not a large attendance. Our maximum attendance is 20 people and the minimum is ten. We hope for more participants this time. The minimum age to take part in the Academy is 18. It is possible that high school students who are completing their final year, or those newly graduated might be interested in getting some information about a possible career path in law enforcement, but the Academy is not a career draw program."

The Henry County Sheriff's Office hosts other citizen training during the year. There will be a women's handgun training session this fall for ladies who want to purchase a gun and/ or improve their skills. The Sheriff's Office also offers the ALICE (Alert, Lockdown, Inform, Counter, and Evacuate) program to local schools, business organizations and churches. This shooter-response training program was created in 2000 by Greg Crane, law enforcement a officer in the Dallas/ Fort Worth area, and a fellow officer. Crane's wife was a school principal, and he thought that the protocols in place at schools for active shooter situations needed to be improved. (More information about ALICE can be found at www. alicetraining.com.) "We have trained all the schools, and they do a refresher every year in August, September or October," said Sheriff Oberkrom. "We shoot blanks, and the trainees run and hide or do what they would do in a shooting event. We trained courthouse employees several years ago and the shots made loud echoing sounds in that open building."

Sheriff Oberkrom said that citizens interested in participating in the Citizen's Academy need to go through the application process, to insure that they don't have a criminal history. Applications are available at the Sheriff's Office, or by email to koberkrom@ gmail.com. Applicants will be notified of their acceptance into the Academy.

restored back to it's original 1920s version. And, no less hard or interesting, there are the muscle car enthusiasts, the folks who delve into the experimental varieties, and the "freelance" ones. You can usually see at least one type at one of the Cruise Night events on the Clinton Square. They all have at least one thing in common: money. "You see the chrome on those four pieces?" asked Dennis Radford while pointing at the lights and fenders on his old Franklin. "That's \$7,000."

But let us get back Buck to Harness. Harness began his car collecting at age 15. Since he is a youthful 84 years old, I'll let the reader do the math. But – as mentioned above, he was always mechanically inclined. Following High School his parents thought he would enjoy being a mechanical engineer. Buck gave it a try, but it wasn't what he thought suited him: "I didn't like high school; college was worse yet,' he said. He went to an automotive school and finished and got his first job. Then he was drafted. After finishing Basic Training, he ended up in Fort Devins, Massachusetts driving a truck. After that, a friend from California visited him one day and convinced him the West Coast was where it was at. He moved, worked as a machinist at Lockheed Martin for a while and learned that the Fire Department needed people: he passed the test (his friend did not) and he spent the next 28 years as a fireman. But his enthusiasm collecting for and restoring cars never stopped. By the time he was 25 he had found an old Duesenberg for \$200 and got it running. At this time there was a lot of horse trading involved in getting the stuff he was collecting. For instance, he saw an ad for an old electric car* for \$700. Just by coincidence, he happened to have found an old jukebox and got it running. "I convinced him it was worth \$700," said Buck and he ended up trading it for the car. Harness said it usually takes about two years to restore a car, but that isn't

always the case. As is the case with most car enthusiasts and collectors/restorers, they will stay with it until they find what they are looking for. "It took me 20 years to find the lights for а 1912 American Underslung," he said. (American Underslungs were made from 1905 to 1914 and kind of look like the original version of a Jeep.) At any rate, he finally found the parts - in Oklahoma.

Right now Harness has 11 cars in his collection - and he drove a 1929 Ford Model A the day of this interview. The Model A he drove is a pretty car: slick black, nice interior; "It has the original paint and upholstery in it," he said. I had to take a second look: the car is in really good condition. He has a variety of rare cars in the collection, too: he even has a steam powered car.

Buck's favorite car in his collection is the 1909 Rausch and Baum electric car. Yes, folks, electric cars have been around that long. The 1909 is his favorite because "you don't have to crank it to start it."

You may see Buck Harness around town on nice days driving one of his old classics, with one exception: you won't see him driving his steam powered car (which is in Appleton City right now). He hasn't figured out how to keep it running without it those old rarities was going to be easy; it is just a rare breed that continues to do it.

*The 1909 Rauch and Baum Electric Car is currently on display at the Henry County Museum along with a couple of other amazing old cars. They are free to the public to view but won't be on display much longer.

the exception of a few technological glitches at the last meeting which has been addressed (some new equipment has been purchased to reduce the problems concerning remote attendance at such meetings). Dawson reported he presented at the Rotary meeting last month and that he is working with Kaysinger Basin for grants involving housing assessments, coal cessation for the county and some railroad grants. Unemployment numbers this month for the county are relatively static. Dawson did report a concern about the number of people in the area who are having problems paying rent. He reported between 300 and 500 families are in this category: "It is a concern and a nationwide issue," said Dawson.

The second reading of bills: Bills Nos. 2021-07 and 08 were held and passed (conflicts of interest for officials and court costs in line with Missouri Supreme Court rulings); Bill No. 2021 – 09, regarding the "tiny house" zoning was approved by the council, opposed to the "tiny house" concept but thought that any such zone needed its own development area so as not to potentially detract from property values on surrounding homes in the future. "There ought to be a development [area] of small houses," commented Councilman Henry.

A lot of discussion was had about the proposal of Bill No. 2021 – 10, the authorization of a limited Parks and Rec tax for the purpose of renovating and repairing the city outdoor pool facilities. The vocal detractor of the proposed tax was Daniel Councilman Wilson who appeared to be unconvinced the city could not find the resources within the Parks and Rec budget to accomplish its goals. It appears that arguments to the contrary were persuasive, however. If the money was there, it would have became apparent during the previous budget work sessions held by the city. The proposal is to outsource the parking lot repairs – which is in a state of disrepair (and has been for many years), get an up-todate chemically stable paint for the pool itself (complete with sandblasting and repairs) which has a 30 year warranty, and also address the poolhouse which is no longer ADA compliant and was built in the 1970s. Multiple issues have been surfacing at the poolhouse: things like a female grandparent taking a male grandchild to the pool (having to go to separate facilities to change), no family room stations, out of date shower/toi-

issues which have increasingly become a problem for the pool staff. The tax would appear on the November ballot at 1/8th cent for 5 years or until it reaches \$1.1 million dollars – the estimate for the projects' costs. Councilman Wilson was a little hesitant about going forward without an exact cost for the poolhouse portion of the proposal, but Parks and Rec Director Brad Combs (present at the meeting) said that any portion of that would have to start with paying for a design proposal – which cannot be had without funding (hence, a tax). Coun-Wilson cilman reuncomfortmained able with the proposal and explained he still thought the Parks and Rec budget should be explored - especially in light of inflation and other factors. He ran into some council resistance, however: "You want to drain the money out of the Parks and Rec budget?" questioned Councilwoman Carla Moberly. "If evidence that the funding [potential] existed it was not brought before the Public Works Committee," Councilman Cameron Jackson added. Mayor Greg Lowe weighed in as well: I think it is right that an 1/8th cent tax is all we can go after and do what we can do [with it]. Councilwoman Moberly said the ballot language was specific as well and supported placing

We spend most of our lives in the process of getting to know God—establishing a deeper relationship with him and as we worship, we are introduced to his attributes; God is good, loving, just and absolute truth. We explore these virtues not just so that we can know and worship God better, but so we can seek these same attributes in ourselves and take them out into the community. We must imitate God individually and collectively as the body of Christ—the Church-supporting one another in the effort to be more loving, more holy, more righteous. When we fill our worship with these attributes of God it brings us closer to his presence.

God is always acting in and through his people, but we may not always recognize it. But perhaps the most important attribute of God that we practice in our own faith walk is speaking the truth. In Ephesians 4:25, Paul begins with a call to be people of truth; "Putting away falsehood, let us all speak the truth to our neighbors." If we are the ones who choose not to perpetrate lies-ones who have put away falsehood, seek after truth, refuse to pass on opinions because they sound like truth-then we seek the truth because God is a God of truth.

Paul proclaims that our behavior must shape our interactions with one another and with the world. This is true in person or online. How do we measure our encounter with the world? Do we seek to be people of truth? Do we seek to imitate God? Indeed, this testimony to the Ephesians runs the risk of meddling in our lives, because imitating God is more than just what we think. Imitating God is also what we do. John Wesley said it best, "Love God, do good, do

In those moments before Ab'solom was killed, what was his thoughts? Was it remorse for starting the insurrection against his father or did he panic of what was going to happen to him? Did he realize that he had done things that were wrong and had abused his power? He felt he was between Heaven and Earth. After hearing of Ab'solom's death, his father King David wept. He even verbalized that he should have been the one who had died. He realized what had happened and had remorse over the events in his life.

Our lives at times have been well ordered, but often we are left with the feeling that we are betwixted and between. We often get swept up with those attitudes and flaws of the past. These are a brokenness of humanity that can be passed through generations. We find ourselves in a place that we do not know where we are or where we will land. It is a terrifying position to be in. We are stuck between Heaven and Earth. We have been sucked up and realize that when we won't be in the same place we were from before.

The question is how do we continue? How do we break those negative and unfruitful ways?

As we really look at our lives and wonder how we got swept up in the events of the day and why things happened to us; we are reminded that we are God's sons and daughters, so, when we do come back down, we will see things more clearly. So when we rely on Jesus, He will bring us the strength, courage, kindness and a sense of goodness to our lives to help others and keep them safe and do what we need to do in His Holy name. Amen

ton [for the people]," she said. She had also commented that there "weren't many 45 year old pools around anymore."

Additional concerns if something is not done include: parking - "The parking lot is tore up," said Street Superintendent TJ Williams. It was also brought up that baseball, frisbee golf, and the park shelter houses use the pool's parking frequently, too - it is not just pool patrons. And, of course, the ADA compliance – as well as the necessity of addressing of the pool's state of disrepair which will need to be attended to fairly quickly. Voting on the first reading was: all "yes" except for Councilman Wilson's single "nay" vote.

Several minutes of the council's time were spent ascertaining if the recreation management software from CivRec should appear again at the next council meeting or just be approved unless the city attorney found something amiss. Recall that the city was looking for a way to make much of their Parks and Rec programs (the ability to pay for programs/ sports, view brackets, schedule things, etc.) online for folks. In the end, the original motion was withdrawn (through а vote), re-stated, and voted on, and will now only come up again if the city attorney finds a problem in the agreement contract. CiviRec appears to be the best choice for the city and the Parks and Rec department has done due diligence exploring the software/program options available. The council approved the purchase of the CivRec software/program. The bid from Rehammer Roof for the community center was approved. Also, the bid from BRAM for \$39 per ton (for 60 months) for the disposal of bio-solids at the Wastewater Plant was approved unanimously by the council. The council approved the slight increase for services from Alliance Water – which is still below operating costs if the city would have continued to operate Wastewater by themselves. A bio-solids injector was approved to be declared surplus property, and the Price Lane sewer will be treated with an herbicide to eliminate root growth. It has yet to be determined if more repairs will be necessary to the service lines. Public Safety (given by Councilwoman Debbie Smith): the city approved a resolution to have Dr. James Alford provide medical director services for the city – especially concerning the Clinton Fire Department. Fire

Chief Mark Manuel said the use of Alford is an improvement (as it will provide training opportunities) and that the Department, by state statute, has to have one. The cost will be \$4,800.

The Mayor's report included the recommendation of Cameron Jackson to serve as the liaison for the Main Street Board: the council approved the Mayor's recommendation.

The council adjourned to executive session at 7:09 p.m.





Sometimes I wonder if we are headed in the right direction as a country. But I know that historically Americans have felt this way before: it isn't the first time a generation has wondered about the future of our country or if we will have what it takes to "make it." I tend to think about how when George Washington died he seriously questioned whether or not there would even be an America for too much longer, such was the state of turmoil following the Revolutionary War. Of course, it survived with some bumps and bruises, another war, and a period of time where the country expanded to the Pacific.

Americans, again, were thrown into a state of "will America make it" in 1861: would there be two different Americas? A north and a south? And, again, Americans put themselves on the right course. There was, no doubt, the period of time following the Civil War when the country was about as unbalanced as could be. But, again, we were finally able to reconcile, legislate, and eventually correct the wrongs our country had began with.

The saving grace for our country has always been the people. Not all the people, of course – there have been some seriously messed up people in our country. But for every one degenerate or ill intended person that has been, there have been ten who have not been so messed up and had the courage and integrity to put things right. We seldom hear about those folks, though. For example, Charles Haysler.

Imagine you have several siblings and were living in a fragmented Germany in the 1850s. You want to avoid conscription in the army there but there are only so many options. You pick option "b": the option that means that at age 15 you decide its a great idea to sail to America, land in Booneville (Mo.) and try to establish a new life. But the fate you were trying to avoid smacks you in the face: war. So you enlist in the cavalry, serve for four brutal years with the Union Army, and come home, move to Henry County, marry, and set up shop on the square. Your harness shop passes on to your kids and you die in 1911. That's pretty descriptive of "American," isn't it? Or imagine you are a slave in Henry County – you came with your owners from Kentucky and are settled in the Marshall Creek area in the 1850s. Following the Civil War you were freed, obtained land next to your former owner, married your neighbor's freed slave, farmed, had children, and they grew up. The children served in World War I, came home, and got an education and moved. One got employed in the newspaper business until he could afford to buy the paper he worked for. That's the story of Nathaniel Sweets who owned the St. Louis American until 1981. How American is that? These are only two examples from this county. And with over 100 counties in Missouri, I'm sure the stories are not as unique as they may seem. And just how many counties are in the United States? I think about that. The saving grace for America will always be the people. America will be just fine, folks. Even in today's world.
