## Annual Deepwater Picnic Returns After COVID Hiatus

Over the weekend neighboring communities were filled with celebrations for Labor Day. One community in particular was celebrating their

119th Labor Harvest Picnic event and that place is none other than Deepwater! Tom Dehn, the Henry County historian gave a little background on the celebration "When the first DLHP was held, Deepwater had a population of about

2000 residents and many farm families in the rural area. According to an old article in the Deepwater World newspaper, the last Grand Union picnic was held on July 4, 1903, followed by the first Deepwater Labor and Harvest Picnic on

September 7, 1903. For years the farm families in the area had helped each other at harvest time by going from one farm to another, harvesting the crops. Many times, the day would end with the families coming together for food, music, laughter, and games. While sitting around and visiting after a hard day of harvesting, someone came up with the idea of having a big city/rural wide picnic that would give everyone a chance to show off their crops, livestock, garden produce, baked goods, handwork items, etc. This tradition has been held for well over a hundred years." Mr. Dehn had a fun story about the carnival

## SFCC Opens Search For New College President

State Fair Community College has officially begun the search for the next college president following President Dr. Joanna Anderson's recent announcement to retire when her contract ends June 30, 2022. ## Hurrah! Senior Center Re-Opens With Guidelines

The Clinton Senior Center plans to resume indoor dining on Monday, Sept. 13. The center at 970 E. Sedalia Ave. will welcome adults 60 and older to dine indoors, Henry County Services Director Kathy Wilson said. The center will be open for activities and meals from 9 a.m.

to 3:30 p.m. Monday through Friday. Lunch is served from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. Guests will notice fewer tables than before, and seating will be limited because of social distancing protocols. Guests will be requested to answer health questions about COVID-19 exposure or

symptoms and to sign a COVID-19 waiver. Everybody will be required to wear masks while in the building. Home-delivered meal drivers will be required to wear masks, sanitize hands between clients, and stay socially distanced during the delivery of meals. The meals are provid-

ed for people 60 and older for a suggested contribution of \$4.50; the center cannot make change. Updated menus in October will include items such as Cuban sandwiches, Hungarian goulash, and barbecued pulled chicken sliders, as well as traditional favorites such as meatloaf

and fried chicken. Call (660) 885-3482 or visit goaging.org to get a current menu. Transportation within Clinton city limits is available by calling the Area Transit Service (ATS) at 660-885-3114. The center still will offer curbside pickup of meals for those who

are not ready to dine in. To receive a curbside meal, please call by 10 a.m. The center will resume delivery of daily hot meals to homebound older adults; leaders are recruiting volunteers to deliver meals and help in the kitchen and dining room. Contact SENIOR PG. 3

(2): Never give a campaign card to a personal friend.

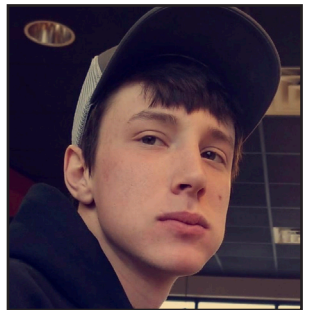
(3): Never tell anyone that someone else is going to vote for you.



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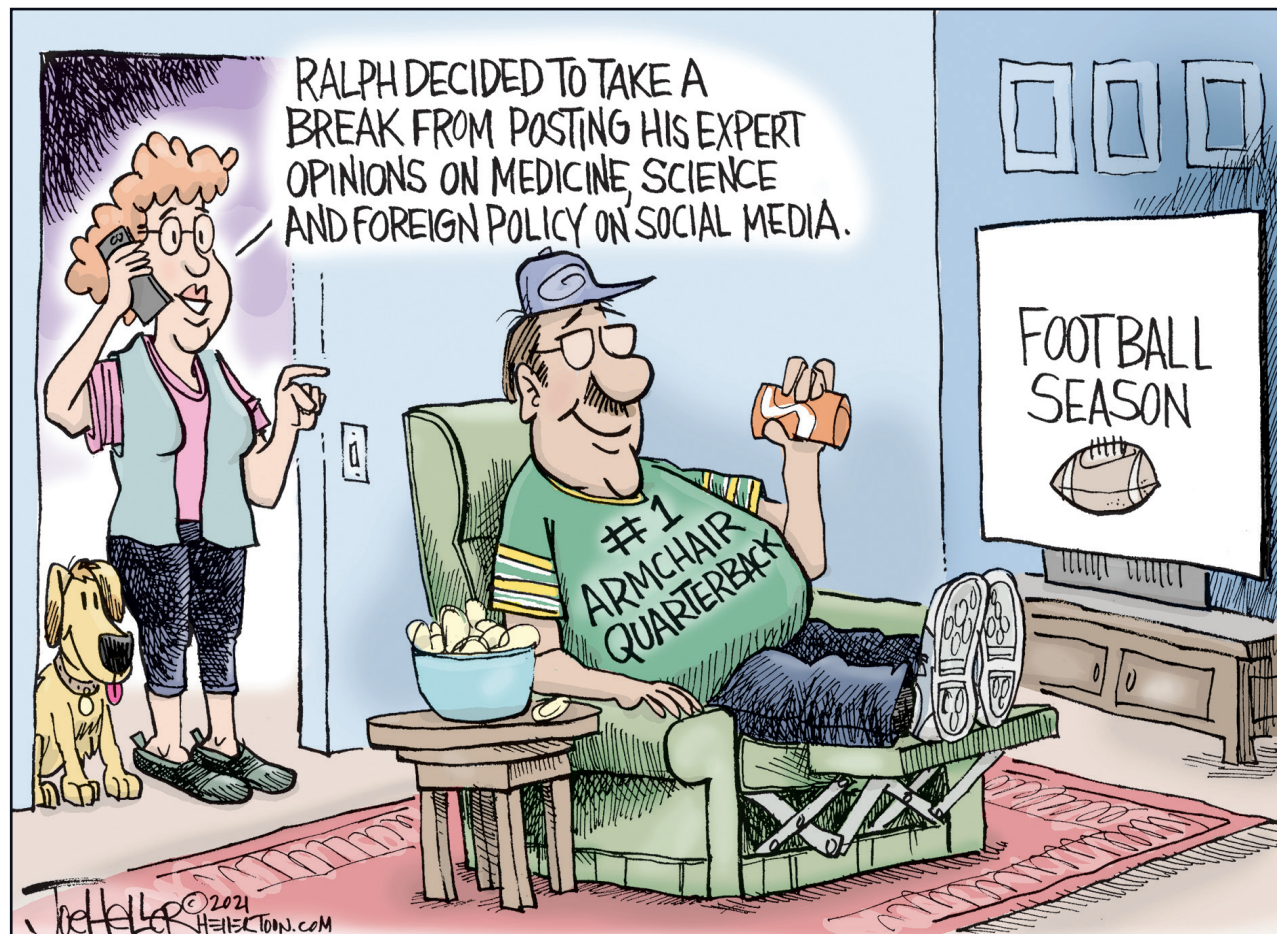

formed, one each on Friday and Saturday evening. The Septemberfest Parade had to be cancelled due to rain on Saturday, but everything else took place, sometimes indoors.

Long-time Septemberfest Committee member, Danny Hampton, said that the Man and Woman of the Year were Angela Roberts and Greg Frencken, who were automatically scheduled to be Grand Marshalls of the Septemberfest Parade.

"They were nominated by people in the community and our committee read the nomination recommendations and then voted, in secret, for the two title holders," said Hampton.

Windsor, the crossroad where Katy Trail and the Rock Island Spur intersect, is well-known for its large Amish community with bulk stores, greenhouse and other services open to the public. It is also known as the Northern Gateway to Truman Lake.

However, it is also a thriving community of businesses and organizations who make life interesting with public celebrations throughout the year. The Septemberfest Committee, has 15 members and a lot of volunteers. It started 16 years ago after the Windsor Sesquicentennial (1855-2005), when some people in the community met and decided that since other small towns nearby had festivals, they would have one of their own.

"It was rough getting started," said Danny Hampton, long-time committee member. "We had decided that if we made it to five years then that would be good. And after that amount of time people saw that we were serious and started coming and volunteering for the festival. Planning for the event takes all year and our committee starts meeting for the coming year right after each year's Septemberfest. We try to make a list of things that went right and those that went wrong so we can do better in the following year. This year, in all the hustle, we forgot to do a couple of things, so we will try not to let anything fall through the cracks next year. Housing for out-of-town visitors is provided by a motel, several bed and breakfast houses and some stay with family. There are also several restaurants in town. The festival is becoming popular enough that we have reunions scheduled at the same time. There were about five reunions scheduled this year during Labor Day weekend."

Hampton said that some of the popular

events included the new Corn Hole Tournament which drew 39 teams (some from Kansas City), the Wine Stroll where people went "strolling" even in the rain, and the Lighted Semi Truck Parade that attracted 21 semis from Windsor, Sedalia and other areas. This was an increase from 16 semis last year. Hampton said that they wanted to show off their rigs.

Hampton's job during the festival was to be the announcer for events uptown, and to make sure everything was running smoothly. He said that certain events brought in funds to support the next Septemberfest. They included money from entry fees for the Baby Show, Pie Auction, Pet Parade, 5K Run, Wine Stroll and the Truck and Tractor Pull. Some business also sponsored events such as the bands and Wine Stroll. A local man makes benches, hope chests and other wooden furniture each year, and donates them to the Septemberfest raffle.

"We have great sponsors," said Hampton.

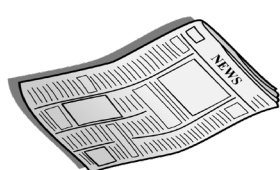
Coming soon to Windsor will be the October Halloween Downtown, to be held at the Odd Fellows Lodge. On Saturday after Thanksgiving, Moonlight Madness, sponsored by the Chamber of Commerce, will offer a lighted Christmas tree, and free tickets will be given out for the holders to get a turkey or ham.

A monkey bridge, inflatable bounce houses, FFA Fish Dinner, Lakeland All School Reunion, and Ice-Cream Social, VFW Opening Flag Ceremony and Veteran and Military Recognition, and Royalty Crowning were also included during Saturday. ## Henry County Announces 29th COVID Related Death

Henry County Health Center has received confirmation from the State Public Health Department of another death due to complications related to COVID-19. This patient was hospitalized at Golden Valley Memorial Hospital in Clinton, MO at the time of their death. This Henry County resident was an 89-year-old male from the town of Windsor. This brings the total number of COVID-19 related deaths in Henry County to 29.

“The most difficult part of the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic continues to be the loss of our residents to this virus,” said the Henry County Health Center Administrator, Peggy Bowles. “We know that everyone is weary and tired and would like for COVID to go away. However, in order for us see a reduction in cases and deaths in our county, more residents will need to be vaccinated. If you are unable to be vaccinated, we ask that you follow the CDC recommendations of social distancing, washing hands, wearing a mask when unable to distance, and staying home when you are ill. It is the simple things that will help reduce the spread of this disease, and could potentially save the lives of your family members.”

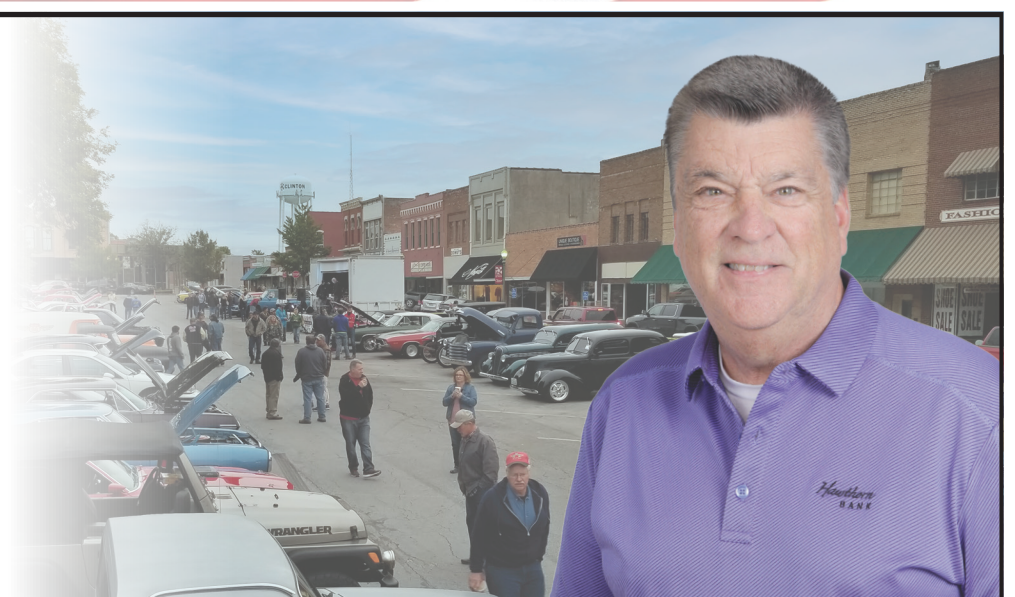

Timing for the start of the spring and fall seasons of the year varies, depending on the equinox. For example, autumn (or fall) normally starts in our area on September 22 or 23. It can start on the 21st, but it has been thousands of years since that has happened; however, should you be alive in the 2090's decade, you will see this date occur twice, in 2092 and in 2096. The fall date of September 24th is also rare; the last time that date happened was in 1931, and will not occur again until 2303. This year (2021) also had a rare date that you may have been unaware of. Spring normally arrives on March 21st, but this year it arrived on March 19th--the earliest arrival day of spring in one hundred twenty-four years. Other calendars, different from our Gregorian calendar,

also have peculiarities. While we celebrate the new year on January 1st, the first day of the new year in the Jewish calendar is called Rosh Hashanah, which falls in either September or October. This is the date set by God; it is also known as the Feast of Trumpets (Lev 23:23-25).

If we stick together in love, and remain in Jesus, we will go and bear fruit (John 15:16).

We are all on different paths as we journey to God. But, remember that while we think we are searching for God, God is always searching for us. And when we find the revelation of God's Grace and accept that Grace, it transforms us.

Our Scripture in Jeremiah reminds us that God is always guiding us on our journey and the Holy Spirit is always leading our hearts back to God. God knows what he wants for you and God has ideas and plans for you. So, if you are alive your journey is not over yet. You may have been to the mountain top and seen the shekinah glory and fellowshiped with God—like Moses—but God's plans are not done. Moses still had to walk through the desert with God for forty years. We still have a walk to do with God and we still have to seek out God's truth, justice, and love. God still has work for us to do. We just gotta find that "right rock".

It ultimately comes down to allowing the Holy Spirit to work in our lives—to seek and seek again the glory of God and then to embrace the Grace of God on this marvelous journey of life. We just have to keep looking, praying, seeking, learning—allowing ourselves to be lead—until we find that perfect "rock". Then we will know and be satisfied, safe in the light of the Triune God.

### LABOR DAY HOLIDAY STATISTICS

Seven people died in traffic crashes during the 2021 Labor Day holiday weekend. Last year, there were 18 fatalities. The 2021 counting period for the Labor Day holiday ran from 6 p.m., Friday, September 3, through 11:59 p.m., Monday, September 6.

The Missouri State Highway Patrol reports the following enforcement activity during 2021 Labor Day Holiday:

(Note: During the 2020 counting period, the Patrol investigated 278 traffic crashes, which included 140 injuries and 11 of the 18 fatalities. Troopers made 146 arrests for driving while intoxicated last year. Also, over the Labor Day holiday 2020: Troop- ers investigated 20 boating crashes involving six injuries and one fatality; and arrested seven people for boating while intoxicated on the state's rivers and lakes. There were no drownings over the 2020 Labor Day holiday weekend.)

Troopers investigated all seven of the fatal traffic crashes over the 2021 Labor Day holiday weekend. Three of the fatal traffic

crashes occurred in the Troop C, Weldon Spring, MO, area; two fatal traffic crashes occurred in the Troop I, Rolla, MO, area; and one traffic crash fatality occurred in both Troop A, Lee's Summit, MO, area, and the Troop F, Jefferson City, MO, area. The boating fatality occurred in the Troop D, Springfield, MO, area.

One boating fatality occurred on Saturday, September 4, 2021. A 14-year-old female from St. Louis, MO, died when a personal watercraft struck the personal watercraft she was operating on Table Rock Lake in Stone County. The 14-year-old was ejected. Dr. Pallohusky pronounced the juvenile deceased at Mercy Hospital. The juvenile operating the other personal watercraft sustained minor injuries. Both operators were wearing life jackets at the time of the crash.

Three traffic fatalities occurred on Saturday, September 4, 2021. Godfrey G. Gitau, 35, of Hazelwood, MO, died when the vehicle he was operating traveled off the roadway and struck a guardrail end cap. Gitau was not wearing a seat belt and was ejected from the vehicle. The crash occurred in St. Louis County on Interstate 170 south of Interstate 270. Hazelwood EMS personnel pronounced Gitau dead at the scene.

Jaswant Singh, 31, of Fremont, CA, died when the commercial vehicle in which he was a passenger traveled off the right side of the roadway, struck a guardrail, an embankment wall, and then overturned. Singh was not wearing a seat belt. The crash occurred in Crawford County on Interstate 44 at the 214.8-mile marker. Deputy Coroner Nikki Bussell pronounced Singh deceased at the scene. The driver of the commercial vehicle was wearing a seat belt at the time of the crash; he sustained minor injuries. The Crawford County Sheriff's Department and the Bourbon, MO, Police Department responded to the scene.

Renee D. Honor, 47, of Detroit, MI, died when the vehicle she was driving traveled off the right side of the roadway, struck an embankment, and overturned. Honor was not wearing a seat belt at the time of the crash. The crash occurred in Callaway County on Interstate 70 at the 146.6-mile marker. Dr. Salman Ahmad pronounced Honor deceased at University Hospital in Columbia, MO. A juvenile passenger in Honor's vehicle sustained minor injuries. He was wearing a seat belt at the time of the crash.

Three traffic fatalities occurred on Sunday, September 5, 2021. William C. Moore, 28, Lyons, KS, died when the driver of the commercial vehicle in which he was a passenger attempted to exit the roadway causing its load to shift and overturn into the median. Moore was not wearing a seat belt at the time of the crash. The crash occurred in Jackson County on Interstate 470 at Missouri Highway 291. Jackson County Medical Examiner's Office Investigator Amanda Bogacz pronounced Moore deceased at the scene. A second passenger in the commercial vehicle sustained minor injuries. She was wearing a seat belt. The driver of the commercial vehicle was not injured; he was wearing a seat belt. The Lee's Summit Police Department also responded to the scene.

A 13-year-old male from Cedar Hill, MO, died when the driver of the vehicle in which he was a passenger lost control. The vehicle began sliding,

traveled off the roadway, struck a tree, continued to travel northbound off the roadway, and struck a second tree. The juvenile male was not wearing a seat belt at the time of the crash. The crash occurred in Jefferson County on Engledow Road south of Blackwell Road. Valle Ambulance District personnel pronounced the juvenile deceased at the scene. The 17-year-old driver of the vehicle sustained minor injuries; he was not wearing a seat belt. A 13-year-old passenger sustained serious injuries; he was not wearing a seat belt. A third juvenile passenger, age 16, sustained serious injuries. He was wearing a seat belt.

Matthew W. Hedrick, 27, of Aledo, IL, died after falling off the tailgate of a pickup truck when the vehicle hit a bump while negotiating a curve. When Hedrick fell from the tailgate, he then struck the ground. The crash occurred in Crawford County on a road within the Bass River Resort. Dr. Srivastava pronounced Hedrick deceased at Mercy Hospital Creve Coeur. The driver was not injured in the crash; he was wearing a seat belt.

One traffic fatality occurred on Monday, September 6, 2021. Mark W. Higginbotham, 54, of Farmington, MO, died when the motorcycle he was operating traveled off the left side of the roadway and overturned, ejecting him. The vehicle then collided with the median cable barrier. Higginbotham was wearing a helmet at the time of the crash. The crash occurred in St. Francois County on U.S. Highway 67 south of Missouri Highway 8. St. Francois County Coroner Jason Coplin pronounced Higginbotham deceased at the scene.

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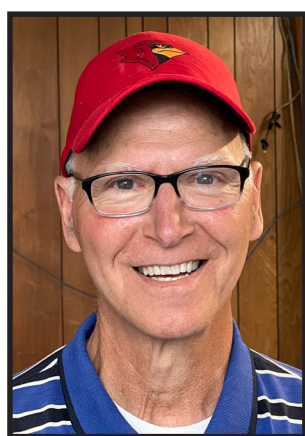

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## NHTSA National Child Passenger Safety Week

The Missouri State Highway Patrol joins the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA), the National Safety Council, Safe Kids Worldwide, and other safety advocates to commemorate National Child Passenger Safety Week (September 15-21, 2021). The primary goal of this program is to remind all parents and other adults responsible for children traveling in motor vehicles of the importance of child safety seats and seat belts. Every year, children suffer needless injuries. In 2020, 11 children under the age of eight were killed in traffic crashes, and another 1,438 were injured. Troopers issued citations to 1,040 drivers who failed to secure children less than eight years old in a child restraint/booster seat in 2020. Troopers issued citations to an additional 141 drivers who failed to secure a child 80 pounds or more or over 4'9" in a seat belt in 2020.

Troopers investigate traffic crashes every day. Nothing is more disturbing than a traffic crash that includes a child being hurt or killed. The Missouri State Highway Patrol encourages every driver to make sure child passengers in their vehicles are restrained properly.

Missouri law states:

\* Children less than four years old are required to use an appropriate child passenger restraint system.

\* Children less than 40 pounds, regardless of age, must be secured in a child passenger restraint system appropriate for the child.

\* Children ages four to eight years old who weigh at least 40 pounds, but less than 80 pounds, and are under 4'9" tall, must be secured in a child passenger restraint system or booster seat appropriate for that child.

\* Children ages eight through 15 must wear seat belts regardless of the type of vehicle in which they are riding or where they are seated (front or back). Like the child restraint law, this is a primary law, meaning you can be pulled over by law enforcement for noncompliance.

\* Persons less than 18 years of age operating or riding in trucks (regardless of gross weight for which licensed) must wear seat belts.

\* No person under age 18 is allowed to ride in the unenclosed bed of a truck with a licensed gross weight of less than 12,000 pounds on lettered highways, federal, state-maintained highways, and within city limits. There are exemptions for agricultural purposes, special events, and parades.

\* It is the driver's responsibility to ensure passengers under the age of 16 are buckled up safely. Those 16 and over are responsible for themselves.

There are many styles of child safety seats from which parents may choose. Infant seats are designed for children up to 22-30 pounds depending on the seat manufacturer. This type of seat should be placed into a vehicle so the infant faces rearward in a semi-reclined position. It is important to remember rear-facing infant seats should NOT be used in a front passenger seat equipped with an active air bag. If deployed, an air bag could hit the infant seat and injure or kill the baby. Airbag or not, the back seat is the safest place for a child.

Most convertible child safety seats are designed for children from five pounds up to 40 - 80 pounds, depending on the manufacturer. Like all seats, they have manufacturer's labels on the side indicating the maximum height and weight of the seat. They recline and face rearward in an infant position and convert to sit upright and face forward for the toddler position. Most newer convertible seats can hold children who weigh up to 35 or 40 pounds in the rear-facing position. NHTSA recommends keeping children rear facing until they reach the maximum height and weight for the car seat. The child can then be turned around forward facing.

Booster seats are designed for children who have outgrown other safety seats and must be used with an adult lap and shoulder belt. Lap/shoulder belts are designed for children who are at least 4' 9" tall or 80 or more pounds. Make sure the lap belt stays low and snug across the lower hip/upper thigh area, and the shoulder belt does not cross the face or the neck.

For safety reasons, the Missouri State Highway Patrol discourages the purchase of child safety seats at a garage sale or other secondhand outlets. Also, a safety seat that has been in a vehicle during a traffic crash should be replaced.

There is no one "safest" child safety seat. Use the one that fits your child, fits in your vehicles correctly, and one that you will use correctly every trip, every time. 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## Biofuel Funds Awarded To Retailers/Distributors

The Missouri Agricultural and Small Business Development Authority (MASBDA) announced the Biofuel Infrastructure Incentive Program (BIIP) to increase the distribution and use of biofuels in the state of Missouri. Funds will be awarded to fuel retailers, fuel distributors, terminal companies or fleet operations that dispense, or will soon store or dispense, ethanol blends of E15 or higher or biodiesel blends of B6 or higher.

Applications are due Oct. 29, 2021, and projects receiving funds will be notified no later than Nov. 30, 2021.

The MASBDA Board of Directors has approved up to \$2 million for the Biofuel Infrastructure Incentive Program, with half appropriated to biodiesel projects and half appropriated to ethanol projects. Applicants must be a business entity that is constructing new, retrofitting or improving existing infrastructure or equipment that handles biodiesel fuel, biodiesel blend fuel or ethanol blended gasoline at a facility in Missouri. The project may include multiple locations within the state. The maximum award per category (ethanol or biodiesel) to any single entity is 50% of eligible costs, or \$250,000, whichever is less.

"An investment in expanding Missouri's biofuel infrastructure is an investment in Missouri agriculture," said MASBDA Executive Director Jill Wood. "Biofuel production increases the demand for two of Missouri's top commodities, corn and soybeans, and also benefits livestock producers in the form of soybean meal and dried distiller grains."

Funds may be used for, but are not limited to, costs associated with the construction, installation, upgrade or retrofit of:

- Fuel dispensers/pumps
- Related/attached equipment
- Underground or above-ground storage tanks
- Tank system components

Other infrastructure located in Missouri with the sole purpose to ensure the environmentally safe availability of blends of ethanol or biodiesel "Biodiesel is a Missouri-made, renewable fuel that supports Missouri soybean farmers and provides more options for fuel suppliers and fleets," said Missouri Soybean Merchandising Council Chairman Kyle Durham of Norborne. "This program is an important step in our efforts to build new demand and access for biodiesel and growth for our economy here in the state."

"Ethanol is a high octane, performance fuel that provides cleaner air, better fuel economy, cost savings at the pump and is ready and available today," said Missouri Corn Merchandising Council Chairman Jay Schutte of Benton City. "This program provides another great opportunity to increase options for drivers across the state while supporting Missouri farmers and rural communities."

Within each fuel category, up to 75 % of the funds will be awarded to Tier 1 projects. Up to 25 % of funds will be awarded to Tier 2 projects.

Tier 1 – Any terminal company, fuel distributor or fuel retailer with more than five locations.

Tier 2 – Any fuel retailer with five or fewer stations, fleet operations or individual businesses.

Earlier this year, MASBDA awarded nearly \$700,000 in funds that will improve and expand infrastructure of the biofuel industry in Missouri by more than 14 million gallons.

## Historic Campus/Ghost Tour Returns To UCM

As the University of Central Missouri's sesquicentennial celebration continues, UCM will host for the second time this year the Historic Campus Tour and Ghost Buildings of the Great Fire. No tickets are required for this free event that begins at 6:30 p.m. Friday and Saturday, Sept. 24-25, on the main campus in Warrensburg.

Participants will begin each evening at McClure Archives and University Museum in James C. Kirkpatrick Library, Room 1470. From there they will embark on a campus tour - one per night, viewing and learning more about the history of the institution and its many buildings. Each tour both evenings will conclude at the quadrangle, where there will be a presentation and "footprint" installation of UCM's campus before the fire in 1915. This includes an outline on the ground of where buildings of the past once stood, and projections of archival photos on the exterior walls of quadrangle buildings to provide a glimpse of how the institution appeared more than a century ago. Sesquicentennial Committee Chair Amber Clifford-Napoleone, professor of anthropology and director of the McClure Archives and University Museum, will lead the tour and discuss the installation from the steps of the Administration Building. Mick Luehrman, chair and professor emeritus of art, will conduct the installation with assistance from Jeff Yelton, associate professor and coordinator of anthropology at UCM, and his students.

Founded in 187 as the State Normal School for the Second Normal District, in the early morning hours of Saturday, March 6, 1915, a massive fire destroyed the institution's four-story "Old Main" along with the Science Annex, auditorium and Training School. Dockery Gymnasium and Normal's Powerhouse were the only two campus buildings spared from the flames. Despite this setback, classes were back in session by Monday morning, March 8 in borrowed rooms across town.

Refreshments will be provided at the event by the UCM Alumni Foundation, Warrensburg Convention and Visitors Bureau, Warrensburg Main Street, and the Warrensburg Chamber of Commerce. 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## Stock Market Insights

Sometimes you have to carry your canoe. If you have ever been on a float trip in the Ozarks you've probably run into some shallow water and had to carry your canoe downstream to better water.

You don't like it. It's hard getting out and the canoe is heavy with all your coolers and snacks. But you know that's part of floating in late summer.

September is the shallow-water equivalent of the investing year. It has historically been the S&P 500's worst month of the year for returns and since 1980, September has been the only month to average a loss.

Don't get me wrong, not every September has been negative. It has had market gain 45% of the time, but the trend I notice is that it has been negative 55% of the time since 1980. There has also been some notably bad September's for the S&P 500 such as 1986 (-8.5%), 2001 (-8.2%), 2002 (-11%), 2008 (-14%), 2011 (-7.2%) and 2020 (-4.2%) according to Argus Research Company.

The reason for this is that September is a transition month. The traders are all back from vacations and the companies we invest in start focusing on the second half of the year. By September the companies on the stock exchange have a pretty good idea if they are going to hit their projections and start dropping hints.

Leading into this year's September we find the markets at near all-time highs despite the Afghanistan withdraw disaster, the beginning of social restrictions due to the spiking Covid cases, and the Fed's possible tapering by year-end. All of these things put more pressure on the markets during the already historically difficult September pattern.

It could be a bumpy or volatile month for the markets, but if you are invested as you should be you will be fine. It's not a time to take great risks that are outside your investing norms. Stick to your investment plan and you will get through it.

I remember complaining to my Poppy as a boy about having to carry our boat over the shallow water rapids. I don't remember his exact response, but it was something along the lines of, "Suck it up buttercup and help me carry this boat." With the possibility of a volatile September market just go with it. Get through it because there will be calmer water up ahead.

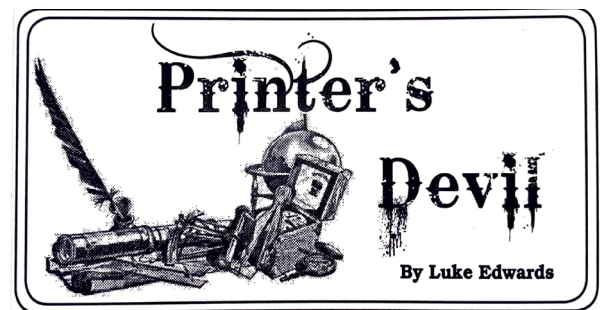

We get about three or four inquires each week, sometimes more, from the public wanting to know about places to rent in Clinton. 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The other day a woman from the Pettis County Historical Society called the Henry County Museum and asked if she could meet a guy there to deliver a Bible to him. No, she wasn't handing out Bibles or trying to spread the Word: she was returning a family Bible that she had come across, restored, and tracked the lineage of. The young man she was to meet was from Kansas and the halfway point for him was Clinton; so, instead of meeting at a restaurant or something, she decided a museum would be more appropriate: the Henry County folks were happy to assist.

I thought about that for a while. Family Bibles used to be a way to record major events – births, weddings, deaths, etc. My grandfather, who was a Baptist preacher, had hundreds and hundreds of names recorded in it: every marriage and funeral he had ever conducted. That Bible was passed on to family (as it should be), but I wonder about that old method of keeping records. It seems to have faded out of style.

The Bible that was faithfully restored to its original family that day at the museum was from the 1880s, but there are some Bibles that go back a long, long way: take for instance the Bible of Duncan Sanderson which dates to 1572. That family Bible was eventually handed over for safekeeping to the Bible Society of Australia (which looks after rare Bible collections) and might have dated back further if not for the fact that before Queen Elizabeth it was entirely possible to be put to death for owning a Bible printed in English. No joke: Queen Mary, Elizabeth's predecessor, banned Bibles in English as part of her Marian reforms. But think about the longevity of the Sanderson Bible: 1572 – one year before Sir Francis Drake became the second person to circumnavigate the globe; 16 years before the defeat of the Spanish Armada; about 40 years after the French began exploring America; about 60 years before the first Pilgrims on the Mayflower would land around Cape Cod. It has seen a lot to be handed down generation to generation.


I suppose there are many younger folks today who turn their backs on old methods of keeping family histories. To be certain, religion itself has been under attack for many years now and seeing a person with a printed Bible in public is a little less common these days, if not for the simple fact that many people just read their digital editions on their phones or tablets. But family Bibles are a way to connect generations together and still hold a place in the homes of some folks – and they still write in them, too: updating and recording as events take place; hoping the next generation will do as they have done and pass it onto the next generation as well.



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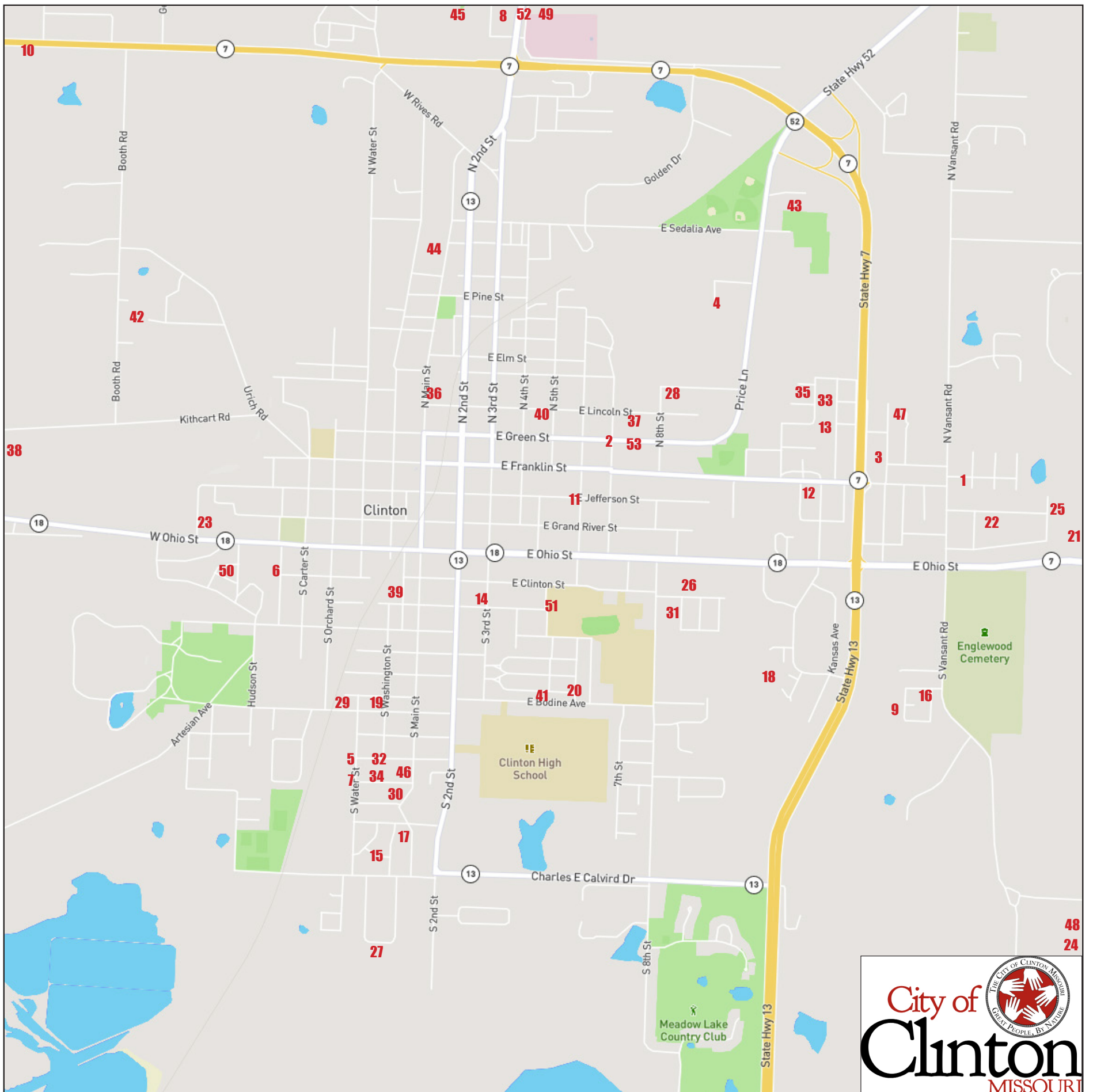
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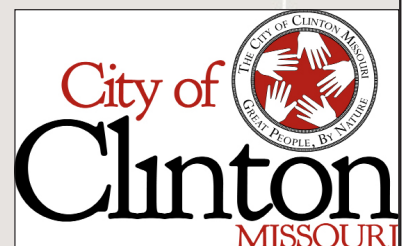


