limited sales tax for the voting center (the Clinton Benson Center) for most of the day. This was the only voting location available for this special election.

One poll worker described it as "a trickle" of people that came in to vote. A single voter did show up at one minute before the polls closed at 7 p.m. to vote (and did vote). The breakdown: there were 50 absentee ballots cast for the park tax issue, 33 of those were "yes" to 17 "no".

Of the remaining 578 votes cast, 343 were "yes" to 235 "no". The total voter turnout for this election was 12.45%, of the 5,067 eligible registered voters in city limits. Please remember that this passed park tax is limited and will only run for 5 years. It would require voter approval at the 5 year sunset to continue after that.



The national competition began with a virtual team activity in September, which consisted of five equine science practicums and a breed & tack identification exam. During last week's in-person portion of the national contest, students judged eight classes (five performance classes and three halter classes) and presented four sets of oral reasons. Team member Alana Alexander placed 7th in the nation and was 5th in oral reasons. Riley Heerdink placed 8th in the nation and was 3rd in halter and 3rd in oral reasons. As a team these students ranked first, making them the 2021 undefeated national champions!

Students are led by FFA Advisor, Tanner Robertson, "This group of students drastically exceeded my expectations. My goal when I started coaching was to teach kids about one of my strongest passions which is the Horse Judging Contest.

Their growth was my biggest reward and the accomplishments are just icing on the cake. They worked extremely hard and

I am incredibly proud of each of them. This is something that most students never get to experience and I am so thankful that I got to guide them to a win on the national stage. Coaching a team like this has been the most rewarding experience of my teaching career and I feel blessed to be supported so strongly by the community of Clinton."

This is Mr. Robertson's second year with the Clinton School District. Under Tanner's leadership, the Clinton School

District's FFA program has seen exponential growth and success in a short period of time. "We are so proud of our FFA program and the National Champion Horse Judging Team! Under Mr. Robertson's leadership, FFA has taken a growth in membership and competitive success. We look forward to many more awards from this program. contact. With the arrival of COVID we continued the classes, but did them virtually through Zoom. The attendance dropped to about 8 to 10, because many people did not have good internet at their homes, or they

didn't have the skills to connect to Zoom. We are now back in the Senior Center, but still offer the virtual option. There is even one member of the class who is in Canada and I wouldn't want to lose her if we gave up virtual classes."

Steinhauser said that each person has a chair available if it is needed for rest or if someone is off balance. She said that some of the exercises require that one foot be off the floor. The exercises practiced are good for balance, coordination, and endurance. They also keep people with arthritis moving. Steinhauser said that even some of the class members in the early stages of Alzheimer's disease have seemed to be reversing or slowing some of the symptoms.

"I have had several class participants in their 90s, but I remember one in particular who was 93, and came in to class with a walker," said Steinhauser. "His 60-yearold wife brought him in because he had been in the hospital and didn't seem to be improving in his movement. He became my 'poster child.' Within six months he put his walker away, didn't have a cane and started coming to class early to help set up chairs. When his wife told me he was still having trouble lifting his arm, I remembered that he loved to eat cupcakes that she baked and put on the counter for him. I told her to put them on top of the refrigerator so he would have to reach for them. After that, he got better motion in his arm."

Steinhauser said that she is always looking for more class members, and those interested in the virtual route can call the Clinton Senior Center to get on a list so Care Connection can connect them. She said that there is another volunteer who is capable of taking over a class if necessary, but other volunteer class leaders are also welcome.

optimism for the North Intersection Project (North Highway 13 by the Pizza Hut).

"I think that project has a good chance of bringing upward pressure on wages," said Williams. "That would be a very good thing for Clinton area work-

According to online sources, new employers can sometimes hire the brightest & best of available employees away from other employers, creating the upward raising of pay to keep good workers.

"We have been asked by interested companies to make infrastructure access improvements," Williams said. "The interested parties said they would then talk seriously with us."

Dawson and Chamber Director David Lee went over just that, as they produced their Economic Development October News Release.

"We will begin pouring concrete this coming week," said Dawson. "It looks like the weather is going to be good."

Local developers and investors are footing the bill for the North Intersection project.

"Gary Scott Excavating is one," Williams said. "Jim Smith is also participating."

Development is also underway in the downtown area.

"We have an investor that has purchased the building where Bev's School of Beauty was," Williams said. "The historic building is at 102 S Washington."

The building will be available for rent by another business.

"It is one of our oldest buildings on the square," Williams said. At this time Williams and Dawson are unable to say who the building owners are. They also cannot reveal who is interested in the North Intersection Development.

All the participants are hopeful for another industrial site northeast of town.

"We call it the MEGA project," Dawson said. "We can offer rail service and 100 megawatts of electric power."

The site is served by both Evergy and Osage Electric Coop.





# Updates From The Henry County Prosecuting Attorney

The Clinton Daily Democrat stopped by Assistant Prosecuting Attorney LaChrisha Gray's office November 1 to catch up on cases recently filed by their office: several updates were obtained.

AP Gray said that the office filed second degree murder charges against Casey Graham (37, of Independence) on September 28. The charges stem from an incident that occurred in southeast Henry County where a report of an individual shooting and killing Kenneth Isenberg was taken by the Henry County Sheriff's department on November 10, 2020. Isenberg was found to have suffered from three gun shot wounds, one of them to the head. The incident is alleged to have occurred when Isenberg and Graham got into an altercation at Isenberg's residence. Graham was found at the scene when the Sheriff's Department arrived and taken into custody, although later released pending a full investigation. Charges were filed once the full report was obtained. Graham is currently being held without bond and has a bond hearing scheduled for November 5 in front of Judge Harold Dump.

A second case involves charges against Joshua Gann (40, Springfield) of statutory rape, second degree. Gann was charged following allegations of him picking up a Henry County youth (teenager) a number of times and transporting her back to Springfield. This had allegedly been going on for months. In early October, police officers located him and the teen in a public

place: according to reports the teenager was not clothed. This case brings about a statement of caution from the Henry County Prosecuting Attorney's office in regards to online safety with young people: "The Prosecuting Attorney's office strongly suggests that parents keep an eye on their kids' social media and, especially, gaming platforms and that they utilize the parental control settings," said AP Gray. It is alleged that the victim and defendant met online.

Another incident involves charges of 1st degree assault on a law enforcement officer. Clinton Glaspy (Clinton) had the charges filed against him after a Henry County Sheriff's Deputy was called out to investigate a possible attempted theft incident on September 24. The responding officer made contact with Glaspy, who ran when confronted and engaged in a struggle with the responding officer when caught; Glaspy reportedly strangled the officer. Glaspy was taken into custody a few hours later near the Pogue Wildlife area after he fled again following the incident with the deputy. Additional charges in this case may be forthcoming from the Prosecutor's office.

The final update from the Prosecutor's office is that of a trial date being moved. Already delayed several times, the trial of Ian McCarthy (charged with killing Clinton Police Officer Gary Michael) has now been moved to June 2023. The Henry County Prosecuting Attorney's office had tried to get the trial set for summer of 2022, however one witness had medical issues which prompted the trial to be moved back. McCarthy is facing the death penalty and is to be sentenced by a jury. The matter is in front of a Jackson County Judge.





#### **Capital School Fund Of Henry County Receives Check**



The Henry County Prosecuting Attorney's Office announces that \$7,235.04 has been collected for the Capital School Fund of Henry County. Assistant Prosecuting Attorney LaChrisha Gray, Missouri Highway Patrol Corporal West, Clinton School Superintendent Destry Brown, Windsor School Superintendent Scott Ireland, Henry County Treasurer Ann Julian and Circuit Court Clerk Patricia Doll attended the transfer of money.

In January 2018, a trooper with the Missouri State Highway Patrol seized \$6,940 from Randal Gibbs after Gibbs was found to be in possession of several bags of methamphetamine, paraphernalia, and the large sum of cash. In December 2019, Gibbs pled guilty to his charge associated with that arrest and was sentenced to twenty years in the Missouri Department of Corrections.

Subsequently, the Circuit Court, Judge M. Brandon Baker presiding, ordered that the cash money seized be forfeited and the proceeds be distributed to the Capital School Fund, which is dispersed to all the school districts of Henry County.

Thereafter, the Missouri State Highway Patrol provided those funds and the interest it had earned to Henry County.

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

# Daughters Of American Revolution Present Award



HENRY COUNTY Daughters of the American Revolution (Windsor) presented a well-deserved Community Service Award to Joicie Appell who was one of the founders of the Heartland Theater in Clinton. She received a certificate and pin (presented by Marlyn Henry).

In the mid-1990s a member of the Clinton, Missouri Area Arts Council who knew that Joicie Appell often left her home in nearby Calhoun to do stage and TV work, asked Joicie to put on a play for the Council. For the next several years she wrote and directed skits for CACC and in their name directed a few classic plays performed in Clinton and Calhoun. But Joicie, then in her mid-60's and a veteran of 45+ years of professional work in print ads, film acting, and in writing, acting and directing for radio, TV and stage, was ever on call for work nationwide and found she could not always fit her availability into the Council's time frame.

In 1996 urged by actor friends, she started a theater group whose work schedule she could determine and called it Heartland Community Theatre of Clinton, MO. With auditions and a month of rehearsals, the group put on three performances of A.R. Guerney's Love Letters at Clinton's Christian Church. They served post performance refreshments of home-made pies iced tea and lemonade. Audience response was overwhelming. Soon a Heartland board was formed, 501c-3 designation obtained and logo adopted—comedy and tragedy masks within a

heart. Other productions around town followed. Not long after, the group rented the Delozier Building on the Clinton Square, and Joicie fell into a routine of directing two scripts a year, April and October—classic comedies, dramas, mysteries, each running for four performances, auditions always open, refreshments always offered... Several years later, Clinton's Crest Movie Theater across the street came up for sale. HCT purchased it, gutted the interior and installed a set construction area in the rear.

A few years later on, the adjoining building south of the Crest had a roof cave-in. HCT bought the building, painted it, made roof repairs, built a portable stage, installed lights and sound and called their new space the Pavilion. Joicie now was writing and directing one-act Readers Theatre (RT) plays for Clinton's Olde Glory Days each July, two performances each; these added to HCT's full-length productions in Spring and Fall whose audiences often approached 300. And HCT skits continued—a "bank robbery" on the Square, a "revolt" at the new Henry County Jail

Out-of-towners joined in—a professional comic from NYC, a TV newsman and wife from Kansas City and a guest director from Sedalia's State Fair Community College. HCT several times trouped full productions by truck and car—to the College, to Whiteman Air Force Base, Warrensburg, to the Liberty Theatre in Sedalia, and to the Truman Lake Opry. A Kansas senior theatre group borrowed one of Joicie's RT scripts and with film footage and music sexted added, toured Kansas libraries.

2021 marks Heartland Theatre's 25th year. It has put on skits, 50+ full-length classic script productions, 15 one-act RT productions, plus four full-length productions written by Joicie to accommodate actor turnout. She has seen 25 years of volunteers' tackling building repairs, lights, sound, set construction and decoration, costumes, stage management, advertising, ticket sales and refreshments. One actor hosts free movies once a month. Another handles rental of the theater space-it can seat 100 on folding chairs-- for celebrations, meetings and music revues. For the future, HCT sees this Pavilion space not only for productions but also as a large dining area for audiences who attend performances in a restored attached Crest building, comfortable theater seats already purchased.

Joicie in 2021 is in her 77th year of a professional career, starting with a radio commercial in Kansas City at age 16. A long-time member of two entertainment unions, Actors' Equity for stage work and SAG/AFTRA for film, television and radio, she has performed in some 90 stage productions across the Southwest, Midwest, and in two Off Broadway, NYC, one a starring role. She has appeared in ten feature films, in more than 100 radio and TV commercials and numerous print ads. For 11+ years she wrote and narrated a weekly 15-minute radio show aired over WHB Kansas City repeatedly winning its time slot for the station.

As to her founding of HCT and the 25 years of volunteer work with the group, she finds it has in no way interfered with her professional career. Her reward is seeing HCT actors come to appreciate classic comedies, mysteries and dramas, savor the words, learn them, then offer them with actor ego held firmly in check. It is a goal she herself addressed recently when she found herself acting for the first time on the HCT stage—opposite one of her actors in Gurney's Love Letters.

#### Vivian Taylor Represents Missouri Jobs Report: September 2021

Missouri non-farm payroll employment increased from August 2021 to September 2021, and the seasonally adjusted unemployment rate decreased by a two-tenths of a percentage point. Employment, seasonally adjusted, increased by 7,500 jobs over the month, with job gains in service-providing industries. The state's seasonally adjusted unemployment rate was 3.8 percent in September 2021, down from 4.0 percent in August 2021. Recovery from COVID-19-related layoffs continued with an increase of 70,800 jobs from September 2020 to September 2021.

#### **UNEMPLOYMENT**

Missouri's smoothed seasonally adjusted unemployment rate decreased by a two-tenths of a percentage point in September 2021, dropping to 3.8 percent from the August 2021 rate of 4.0 percent. With the start of the COVID-19 pandemic now more than a year in the past, the September 2021 rate was 1.6 percentage points lower than the September 2020 rate. The rate had reached a low of 3.1 percent starting in August 2018, before gradually edging up to 3.5 percent by the end of 2019, and then to 3.7 percent in March 2020. The COVID-19 effect hit in April 2020, spiking the rate to 12.5 percent for that month. The rate decreased monthly for the rest of 2020, reaching 4.4 percent in December, and continued gradually downward through the first four months of 2021. The increase of twotenths of a percentage point from April 2021 to June 2021 appeared to be related to a temporary shortage in the supply of semiconductor chips, which caused production slowdowns in some manufacturing industries.

Due to benchmark revisions, Missouri's unemployment rate rose a tenth of a percentage point higher than the national rate in January and February of 2020, but has been below the national rate for every month since February 2020. The national unemployment rate decreased from 5.2 percent in August 2021 to 4.8 percent in September 2021. The estimated number of unemployed Missourians was 118,110 in September 2021, down by 4,992 from August's 123,102.

The state's not-seasonally-adjusted unemployment rate also decreased in September 2021, dropping by 0.6 percentage points to 2.9 percent from the August 2021 not-seasonally-adjusted rate of 3.5 percent. The corresponding not-seasonally-adjusted national rate for September 2021 was 4.6 percent.

A year ago, the state's seasonally adjusted rate was 5.4 percent, and the not-adjusted rate was 4.8 percent.




# Cards Fall To Osage 2-1, Season Ends



#### Take to the Air?

Flight: one of the biggest dreams of man was finally achieved in...1783? Well, the first successful hot air balloons were, anyway. Hot air balloons that could carry passengers were developed by brothers Joseph and Etienne Montgolfier and in November of 1783 they dutifully sent up a rooster, duck and sheep before sending a person. It traveled about a mile at an altitude of 6,000 feet.

Nearing the turn of the 20th century, however, folks started to experiment with gliders, such as those developed by George Cayley, or those of the German aerodynamics tester Otto Lilienthal - who was killed testing one of his own experimental gliders. The Wright Brothers later used some of his texts to develop their first flight at Kitty Hawk.

But here in Henry County, in 1893, a man named Albert A. Kellogg had dreams: he wanted to fly, too. And very little was going to stop him from his dream. Kellogg, a Civil War Veteran who resided somewhere in the Fourth Ward here in Clinton, was an inventor. His dream was most likely fueled by the likes of Henri Gifford who had developed a cigar-shaped, self-powered, air machine in 1852 - the prototype of the later and more famous Zeppelins developed in 1900.

Kellogg had a place to build it: the Exposition Building (the location of which I have yet to discover); he had the materials – ordered and shipped from as far afield as the West Indies. He had an assistant: one Oscer Caspar, an "expert mechanic of Clinton;" and some other interested parties (a "Professor Hall" of which I could find no other information on). With the space, time, help, and probably a considerable amount of capital investment (I wonder how much it cost to have materials shipped from the West Indies in 1893?), Kellogg was hopeful: by May 13 he thought he would have his airship air-born and flying over the rooftops by the Fourth of July. One reporter for the Clinton Eye remarked that

Mr. Kellogg portrayed a "confident manner" and had "no misgivings" about being able to successfully navigate the air.

At any rate, the rattan framework had been assembled by May and it was described as looking like a 40-foot-long basket with no bottom. Kellogg had some problems getting materials and was, apparently, a little apprehensive about that, but still hopeful: while the ribs of the machine were all in place (which took about a week to assemble): the delay in getting those materials left his flying machine in a state "not so far advanced as he expected it would be at this time."

The Fourth of July Celebration of 1893 came and went, and Kellogg's flying machine never left the ground because at some point during construction the machine was destroyed by fire. The amount of money to replace and repair it was simply too much. By July 8th (1893) Professor Hall had visited Clinton again and provided an update to the interested public: he said that Kellogg's "great airship" had been moved to "the country" by a Mr. Casper Oswald. We know that at least some of the canvass to cover his ship survived because Oswald said they were "to be made into haystack covers." Kellogg was still hopeful it could yet be made into a great success, but it does not appear that ever happened.

The 1910 census shows that Mr. Kellogg was 63 years old and living with his wife and motherin-law. His profession was listed as "carpenter," but Kellogg was still an inventor at heart and the chance to show it came about when the U.S. entered World War I in 1917. Perhaps incensed by his earlier failure, he was finally able to invent something that worked: an instantaneous detonator for shells. The invention replaced the fuse which did not explode on contact something very useful when trying to get through German trenches and wires in World War I\*. It would be an interesting coincidence if it were ever discovered that whatever caused the fire to the airship was what sparked his invention of the instantaneous detonator, but we shall probably never know. Kellogg died in May of 1926; his wife, Louisa, died in 1931.



Although longtime Independence resident Phillip (Phil) B. Roberts only briefly attended the University of Central Missouri, he has never forgotten the impact the institution had on his life. He recently expressed his appreciation for what his higher education experiences have meant to him, and his desire to help students, through a \$1 million gift to the UCM Alumni Foundation.

This generous contribution will be used to establish the Phil Roberts Scholarship, benefiting students in the Adrian and Margaret Harmon College of Business and Professional Studies. The way the award is structured, more than 20 students per vear will benefit.

Roberts also served honorably in the United States Army, and attained his higher education on the GI Bill.

This includes providing a smaller gift in 1991 to establish a scholarship fund at UCM to aid physical education majors who plan to teach at the secondary level. Jose Mercado, dean of HCBPS, emphasized the value of Roberts' recent gift, noting it "will further the growth of future leaders in their fields."



#### **Graham Receives Second Degree Murder Charge**



The Henry County Prosecuting Attorney's Office has charged Casey Graham, 37, of Independence, Missouri, with murder in the second degree.

Assistant Prosecuting Attorney LaChrisha Gray filed the case on behalf of the State of Missouri.

On September 28, 2021, the case was filed and a no bond warrant was soon thereafter issued by Judge Harold Dump.

The charges stem from a report of an individual shot in southeast Henry County on November 10, 2020. The Henry County Sheriff's Office responded and investigated the incident. The victim, Kenneth Isenberg, was found to have three gunshot wounds, including one to the head. He was pronounced deceased after being transported from the scene by emergency medical personnel.

According to the probable cause statement filed in this case, an altercation occurred between Graham and the victim at the victim's residence regarding the defendant's presence at the home. During the altercation it is alleged that Graham shot the victim three times.

The Henry County Sheriff's Office found Graham at the scene and placed him into custody. Graham was later released pending an investigation.

Graham is currently being held without bond at the Henry County Jail, but is scheduled for a bond hearing in front of Judge Harold Dump on November 5, 2021 at 10:30 AM.

#### **Brame Case Continues**



A Warrensburg woman accused of 1st degree burglary and possession of a controlled substance, asked for and received a second continuance of her criminal trial.

Kristin D. Brame, 41, went before Associate Circuit Court Judge Harold Dump on October 15 at the Henry County Courthouse in Clinton.

According to Missouri Casenet entries, Brame and her attorney Holly Griffith of Harrisonville requested and were granted a continuance.

Brame allegedly assisted Clinton resident Eric Kelce, 41, in a copper theft burglary of a local factory building in Clinton in July of this year.

Kelce has already been tried and released. He received a suspended sentence and five years of probation.

Brame is also charged with possession of methamphetamine.

The punishment in Missouri for meth possession can be a fine of up to \$5,000 and up to seven years of incarceration.

This is the second continuance for Brame.

Her original trial date was October 5.

She is released on a \$10,000 bond. The defendant will next appear for her criminal trial at 9 a.m. on November 5 at the Henry

County Courthouse in Clinton. Judge Harold Dump will preside and Henry County Prosecutor Richard Steele will represent the state.

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#### **Governor Parson Loans** Hannibal \$750,000

Governor Mike Parson announced a \$750,000 interest-free loan to the city of Hannibal to ease the impact of excessive wholesale electricity and natural gas costs associated with the February 2021 extreme weather event. The loan was made possible through the Municipal Utility Emergency Loan Program.

"The Municipal Utility Emergency Loan Program provides municipal utilities and commissions the opportunity to recover from the high costs associated with the extraordinary cold snap we experienced in February," Governor Parson said. "We were happy to create this program that has aided our cities and towns and helped Missourians avoid excessive monthover-month utility bill increases. This \$750,000 emergency loan to the city of Hannibal will lessen the financial impacts for the city and its residents.'

The loan program was established when Governor Parson signed legislation on May 13, 2021, to provide \$50 million for interest-free emergency loans. The program is administered by the Missouri Department of Natural Resources' Division of Energy and serves municipal electric and natural gas utilities, as well as municipal utility commissions, by providing loans for wholesale electric or natural gas costs incurred as a result of extraordinary prices from February 10-20, 2021. Approximately 53 municipalities have applied individually or through municipal utility commissions since the department began accepting applications on June 2.

When the unusual cold snap occurred in February of this year, prices for wholesale natural gas and electricity rose as demand increased and production stopped at some facilities in the United States. These increased prices severely impacted Missouri communities.

"We're honored to be able to assist Missouri utilities that experienced unprecedented energy prices earlier this year," said Dru Buntin, Director of the Department of Natural Resources. "The priority has been to meet the needs of our communities and provide financial stability for municipal utilities and their customers. We are grateful to the Governor for acting so quickly to work with the legislature to secure funding."


