"Meat processors went down for a bit, and people started going to local butchers," said Hetherington. "We are a custom butcher, and we have been cautious so we don't get caught up with COVID illnesses. We used to do 15 beef a week before COVID. Now, we do 20 to 24 a week. This is a good time to fill freezers because prices are just going up."

Jackman's Meat Market, at 36892 Jackman Avenue in Warsaw/ Fristoe, said that they have recently had some cancellations of orders and that may be due to some large meat processing places opening back up. But, the owners said that they have had a steady business for two years custom butchering beef, pork and deer, and they get a lot of calls. Retail shop prices for meat that is bought to sell in the store tend to fluctuate.

www.bbc.com reported last month that four giants – JBS, Cargill Meat Solutions, Tyson Foods, and National Beef Packing Company – control between 55 and 85 percent of the meat market and part of the problem of high prices is that they are allowed to charge what they like. The present administration is investigating "Price-fixing" in the chicken-processing industry, and it plans to tighten the laws governing competition in the meat industry.

Deer meat might seem like a cheaper alternative to livestock meat, and MDC reports in a current news release that deer numbers look good and a strong harvest is expected. However, a hunter's cost of harvesting deer can be expensive after buying all of the necessary gear for the sport.

Conversations with an MDC official, as well as anonymous hunters in the area, could not confirm that hunters are harvesting more deer because of high retail meat prices. However, MDC did confirm that hunters harvested a total of 297,214 deer during the 2020-21 deer season. That was an increase of over 11,000 harvested deer the year before. Harvest numbers for the 2021-22 deer season will not be available until January 2022. The MDC news release stated that "This season's harvest should be higher than average due to increasing deer numbers around most of the state coupled with increased firearms antlerless permits in a number of counties, and the extension of the antlerless portion."

One hunter and butcher (for 27 years) from Edwards, Bill Dreffs, spoke with this reporter about the benefits of venison, for those who properly process it.

"Deer sausage is a good base for a lot of meat dishes, especially sausage," said Dreffs. "But it has to be processed properly and not left on a truck for a long time and driven around town. I have one recipe for hamburgers made with one-third deer meat and twothirds of fat hamburger (70 percent lean and 30 percent fat). The hamburger meat usually takes away the unpleasant or wild taste of the venison. I used to process 350 to 500 deer for hunters a year, and learned that no matter how much someone doesn't like deer meat, it can be made tasty with good seasoning and processing."

MDC reminds hunters and landowners that providing grain, minerals, and other consumable products used to attract deer is prohibited year-round within all counties of the MDC CWD Management Zone. Hunters who hunt within this zone also need to be mindful of the carcass movement restrictions that went into effect last year. Whole carcasses and

heads may only be transported outside the county of harvest if delivered to a licensed meat processor or taxidermist within 48 hours.

Economic Development Director Mark Dawson reported to the council as well: he highlighted three new retail projects for the council; Dawson said that there has been a lot of development interest lately. He also thanked the council for renewing the contract with the Clinton Chamber of Commerce.

Dawson reported that a manufacturer meeting was held October 10; they discussed workforce issues and potentially using the Department of Corrections as an employee source. Dawson said that a job fair recently scheduled was delayed because of a lack of sign-ups. He said they would attempt to arrange another job fair later. Director Dawson also said he was exploring obtaining a new sign for the Gerhart Industrial Park.

Recently, Dawson participated (along with Springfield and St. Charles) in a "virtual tour" which included representatives from Antwerp, Germany and even Seattle. One subject raised was that of taking Haitian and Afghani refugees. Dawson pointed out he was not endorsing the idea, but that the idea raised was that refugees often, to show they are willing to acclimate, work harder than average folks. 

### **COUNCIL CONTINUED**

Although the bid (\$52,500) is a little outside of the estimated budget, it was accepted because of fears that the project cost will only rise if the matter is delayed. Construction is expected to begin in the spring.

City Administrator Christy Maggi said that the city was happy with how the Franklin Street Bridge project is proceeding: that project, which has involved the cooperation of several entities, is expected to go out to bid by January or February 2022. The scoping project for Vansant Road and Rives Road bridge are actively being surveyed. Surveying plans for the Vansant Road project will include a widening of the road when the project should come to fruition.

Councilwoman Raysik reported that the Kids' World shelter house bids are being solicited for and that the restroom for the playground is nearing completion – it still needs a roof and plumbing installed. The caboose at the Katy Trail head will be painted: currently volunteer groups are planning the painting project.

The Waste Water Treatment Plant's pump #1 is installed and running well: pumps 2 – 4 are still scheduled to be installed in November as is the Calvird Pump Station pump. The re-grading of Block 316 at Englewood Cemetery is complete; monuments have been reset and seeding in that area complete: Councilman Gene Henry said he had two compliments about how nice it looks there now. The final report from Councilwoman Raysik was that there were no bids received for the demolition of the property at 807 E. Franklin. A few ideas about how to proceed with that were mentioned, however it appears that Community Development Director Chuck Bailey will be contacting contractors directly to get pricing. Councilwoman Debbie Smith gave the Public Safety Committee report: a meeting with CARE (Animal Shelter) was held. The shelter will be purchasing a \$1,200 dehumidifier to replace the old ones. This dehumidifier will be of a more industrial grade and be more efficient. There was a mold problem at the shelter a few years back and the animal shelter is trying to stay initiative-taking about prevention. Also, the shelter will be purchasing two kennel dividers. The shelter is currently at its max capacity – they are having to turn pets away. CARE is trying to foster pets to ease the burden and are looking for foster homes for pets. It is suspected that many people took pets in during the pandemic and are now returning to work and unable to care for them anymore, which is leading to the surge at the animal shelter.

Councilwoman Carla Moberly gave the Finance Committee report. It was reported that city employees will be able to stay with the same insurance plans they currently have. Insurance rates did go up 10% this year, however. A motion to renew the Blue Cross/Blue Shield option was made and approved by the council.

A work session Wednesday (at City Hall at noon) will explore the possible combination of certificates of deposits and bonds for the city. The idea is to streamline some of the city's debt obligations and maybe save some money in the process.

The City Administrator's report (Christy Maggi) included a discussion about Parks and Rec continuing to plan for the Snowflake Garage Sale: the city's COVID positivity rate continues to be below the threshold for concern according to CDC standards. The council approved proceeding as planned (there was no Snowflake garage sale last year). Administrator Maggi also reported that there are a couple of concrete pours remaining to be done concerning the Airport's apron project; the apron is mostly complete save for the reflectors to be installed. Permanent striping will be installed in Spring 2022.

Administrator Maggi asked the board to suggest names for potential committee and board members: "We would like to have a good variety to choose from," said Maggi. An updated list of the current boards, their members, and terms will be made available to the council soon.

Mayor's appointments/re-appointments approved by the council: Ann Julian, Cemetery Board; Dan Huey, Rod Balke, and Craig Thompson, Airport Board; Barb Mosely (alternate), Allen Huff, Barry Glasscock, Historic Preservation Board; Linda Martin, Jake Kenney, Debbie Vanwinkle, Matt Perry, Park Board; Jim Martin and Roger Cook, Personnel Board; Blayne Paxton and Don Turner, Planning Commission; Don Eaton, Craig Thompson, and Chris Walker, Tax Increment Financing Commission.

The Clinton City Council entered executive session at about 6:45 p.m.

# **Graham Denied Bond**



A Warsaw man charged with 2nd degree murder, will stay locked up.

Casey Graham, 37, stood before Associate Circuit Judge Harold Dump on Nov 5 at the Henry County Courthouse in Clinton.

Appearing by video link, Graham was represented by Harrisonville assistant public defender Harold Trull, who requested bond be made available for his client.

"Denied," was the stern response from Judge Dump.

According to the probable cause statement, Graham allegedly shot County resident Kenneth Isenberg, 53, three times, once in the head during a dispute on November 10 of 2020 near the Finey Baptist Church in the southeastern part of Henry County. The encounter occurred inside the victim's home.

Isenberg succumbed to his gunshot wounds, while being transported by Warsaw-Lincoln **Emergency Medical Services.** 

According to Henry County Sheriff Kent Oberkrum, Graham was released at the time, but a full investigation was begun. It concluded in July of this year.

Judge Dump issued a no-bond arrest warrant in September and Graham was brought into custody by law enforcement from the Independence area.

Sheriff Oberkrum stated that the investigation remains ongoing.

"That is correct," stated Oberkrum on November 7. "The prosecutor (Henry County Prosecutor Richard Steele) will release further details as they become available."

At press time, Casenet has not listed Graham's next appearance. He remains in the custody of Sheriff Oberkrum in the Henry County Jail in

# Windsor Keeps Rolling

The State ranked Windsor Greyhounds go to 11-0 by winning the C1D4 Semi-Final game over the 7-3 Adrian Blackhawks, 36-12. The game was played at the David Powell Memorial Field in Windsor on Friday, Nov. 5. In the first quarter the Greyhounds started the scoring going up 8-0 on a run by Dalton Witherspoon (Dalton scored four TDs in the game). 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# **Special Baseball Meeting**

Thursday night, Nov. 4 at CHS a large group of local baseball enthusiasts attended a meeting of CHS coaches and their guest Clinton alum, Nick Petree. Cardinal A.D. Alex Johnson opened the meeting thanking everybody for coming and announcing the recent baseball coaching change. Eric Silkwood has been the Cardinal head baseball coach for three years, but he is now the assistant coach with last years assistant John Lersch moving into the head coach position. Coach Gary Bowers will remain as an assistant. The switch was amicable to help Coach Silkwood with his young family.

Coach Lersch spoke about this coming year's program. He covered a lot of expectations and things to do to prepare for the Spring season. He said there are already 46 young men showing interest in being a Cardinal baseball player.

Coach Lersch then introduced Nick Petree. Most remember Nick was a 3 time All-Stater for the Cardinals. He graduated in 2009. During Nick's four years as a Clinton Cardinal the team was Conference Champs three times, District Champs three times and placed third in State in 2007. Nick hurt his pitching arm in Summer Ball before he attended Missouri State. He rehabbed from Tommy John Surgery in 2010 and started his college career in 2011 still on scholarship. Nick received a long list of awards during his time as a Bear, including 1st team All American. Simply put, Nick is the most decorated player in Missouri State history. He was drafted by the St. Louis Cardinals in 2013. He had three successful pitching seasons in their minor leagues before he need for another arm surgery that forced him to give up his playing career. Nick has been coaching since, first at State Fair and now at Missouri State. He is in charge of player development. He gave a speech that covered a variety of positive thinking skills that can help a young player on the field and in life. He emphasized that baseball is a challenging sport where 'failure' is a constant. (For example, even great players fail 7 out of 10 times at the plate.) Finding ways to turn those challenges into opportunities is key. He said, "As a player you can not run away from the 'storm' but find ways to run toward it." Nick also talked about goal setting skills. He had many baseball goals that he met, but he also had education goals. He wanted to finish his degree and he did, now having a Masters Degree. Nick gave several examples how he used positive thinking in his own playing career. Nick talked with the coaches after his speech but because of college recruiting guidelines was not able to talk directly with any CHS player at this time.

My visit with Nick was a lot of fun, we talked about his career, especially about how tough it was to hang up his spikes. He always knew he wanted to coach and now he is getting that opportunity. Nick's parents are David and Becky Nelson. Thank you Coach Petree for coming back. We wish you well. Go Bears.



# Stock Market Insights By Dr. Richard Baker

"Baker, slow down!" I will never forget Mr. Hemphill, my driver's ed teacher, yelling at me as he slammed the passenger side brake. I wasn't slowing down fast enough for his comfort at the stop sign next to our county library.

Similarly, on November 3, the Federal Reserve announced at the end of its Open Market Committee meeting that it was going to begin hitting the brakes on the pace of the monthly amount of its bond purchases this month (quantitative easing). They aren't slamming on the brakes completely but are beginning a gradual slowing of their asset purchases. The Fed has been purchasing \$120 billion in Treasury and mortgage-backed bonds every month in an attempt to keep long-term interest rates low and keep the economy strong after the pandemic. It's expected that they will be lowering their buying by \$15 billion each month until they get to zero sometime in the summer of 2023 according to the Wall Street Journal.

Neither the Fed nor Chairman Powell said anything about a fed funds rate increase, but analysts at Charles Schwab expect rate hikes to begin late next year and there could be a total of 7 fed funds rate hikes by year end 2024.

Hopefully investors will like the Fed's timing and will continue to ride a wave of solid returns. According to Yahoo Finance the S&P 500 reversed September's 5% loss and ended October with an all-time high. Corporate profits are strong and consumer sentiment seems strong too. Investors love November because it has been the best month for stocks on the S&P 500 dating back to 1980. Not every November is great, but I hope this one continues the positive trend.

It seems like Mr. Hemphill was always questioning my speed. He was also my baseball coach, and I don't ever remember him giving me the signal to try to stretch a single into a double. Then again, I wasn't known for foot speed. Have a blessed week!
