

Governor Parson Announces Missouri's COVID-19 Expired **State Of Emergency**

Governor Mike Par- the nation have state Governor son announced that Missouri's COVID-19 related State of Emergency will expire and not be renewed on December 31, 2021. Governor Parson first issued an Executive Order (EO) declaring a State of Emergency existed due to COVID-19 on March 13, 2020.

"Thanks to the effectiveness of the vaccine, widespread efforts to mitigate the virus, and our committed health professionals, care past needs to continue the state of emergency are no longer present," Governor Parson said. "Over the last 22 months, we have coordinated with local, state, and private partners to mitigate COVID-19 and work towards returning to normalcy. We all now know how to best fight and prevent serious illness from this virus. The State stands ready to provide assistance and response, but there is no longer a need for a state of emergency."

Governor Parson extended the COVID-19 related State of Emergency five times before issuing a final targeted executive order for health care needs in August 2021. Currently, only three of Missouri's border states and 20 other states in

of emergencies related to COVID-19 in place. At one time, nearly 600 statutory and regulatory waivers were approved across Missouri state government. Since that peak, waivers have reduced by nearly 80 percent. All remaining COVID-19 related waivers authorized under EO 21-09 will

terminate on Decem-

ber 31, 2021. Agencies, boards, commissions, and departments are able to pursue rulemaking if permanent changes to regulations are needed after December 31 to improve long-term outcomes for Missourians, health care facilitates, and businesses. The General Assembly can also make any needed policy changes when they return for the 2022 legislative session on January 5.

The state has communicated to its health care partners that there will be flexibility during a transitional period to fully resume pre-pandemic opera-

With the expiration of EO 21-09, the Missouri National Guard will no longer be activated for COVID-19 related

"In Missouri, we never had mandates or forced lockdowns,"


Parson said. "The main focus of our state of emergency was to provide regulatory flexibility to support and assist health Missourians, care facilities, and businesses and coordinate a COVID-19 response that saved lives and livelihoods. We encourage Missourians to consider COVID-19 vaccination and to stay diligent, but we can work together to fight COVID-19 while living our normal lives. It is time to take this final step and move forward as a state."

The best method to prevent serious illness from COVID-19 is vaccination, and more and more Missourians continue choosing to get primary and booster vaccinations. In the month of December alone, more than 565,000 doses of vaccine were administered and 42 percent were part of a primary vaccine series.


Nearly 94 percent of Missourians 65 and older, the most vulnerable, have received at least one dose. More than 73 percent of Missourians 18 and older and over 62 percent of all Missourians have chosen to initiate vaccination.



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


Well, it is 2022. Despite the events of the past almost two years, time still keeps marching forward. Of course, many have made some resolutions for the new year. Others have opted out of making any promises to themselves they might not be able to keep. For me, I am just sad Betty White didn't make it to her 100th birth-

I have a list of books I usually cycle through in a year: they are the same books and once I have finished the list, I start over (I mix it up with new works as well). I've done this for many years and, aside from the enjoyment of certain literature, it really serves no purpose. This year, I've decided to switch up my list a little. Why not? Everyone can use a little change now and then.

When I started looking for books "I have already read, but will read again" I ran across a book I had not read grad school: "The Shoemaker and the Tea Party." I won't give all of the details away in case it is something you might wish to read for yourself, but it was written by Alfred F. Young, an historian who primarily studied social histories of the American Revolutionary time frame. He was interested in the "regular Joe's" experience and stumbled across a gem concerning his academic scholarship: George Robert Twelves Hewes, a shoemaker who lived from 1742 to 1840 and was the last surviving participate in, what we now refer to

as The Boston Tea Party. The book is not really about that famous event tied to the American Revolution, but about why we remember what we do and, more importantly, what we remember as important. Young admits that he had been unable to even find it referred to as "The Boston Tea Party" until about 1820 – some 60 years after Americans protested the politics of Great Britain in December of 1773 by dumping crates of tea into the Atlantic at Griffin's Wharf. It was not that Americans had "forgotten" the event (it had been referred to under different names), but it re-surfaced as "important" during a pretty critical time in our history and became a symbol for defiance and independence. So, a few newspaper guys caught wind of "the last surviving participant" in the "Tea Party" and sought to get his recollection of what happened. Young learned that memory is fallible, but also surprisingly accurate. And, in the context of American History, there is contest for public memory over such events: "willful forgetting and purposeful remembering," is what Young refers to it as. It happens over and over again in American History (and probably in non-American History as well). For example, for a long time the event of British soldiers firing on a crowd which helped spark the American Revolution was only known as "the matter on King Street." We remember it today as "The Boston Massacre." Again, I won't give away too many details of the book, but Hewes, who lived in Boston through the Revolution, has a certain take on events which is important to us today. Even monuments have their own "willful forgetting and purposeful remembering" of sorts and are part of the public contest for memory. We all have our personal memories, too. If nothing else the book reminds us that we also tend to discard memories we do not find "useful" and recall the memories that support what we believe. That is, our perspective of what we remember changes with the situation we currently find ourselves in. We are, after all, human. At any rate, may the new year bring you



all you wish for and prosperity find its way to

your doorstep. Happy New Year!



People can learn about owls Jan. 7 at **Springfield Nature Center** Indoor and outdoor activities will provide opportunities to see and listen for owls.

Owls are infrequently seen because of their nocturnal lifestyles. But that doesn't mean they're not appreciated. Because they hunt mice, rats and other rodents that can be pests for humans; these fascinating creatures are a beneficial part of Missouri's outdoors.

People can learn more about the species of owls found in Missouri on Jan. 7 at the Missouri Department of Conservation's Springfield Conservation Nature Center's "Owl Prowl and Evening Stroll" event. This owl-themed evening will have both indoor and outdoor components.

For the indoor portion of the program, Dickerson Park Zoo docents will offer programs in the nature center auditorium at 6 p.m., 7 p.m., and 8 p.m. that will feature live owls. There, people can see several species of owls that reside in Missouri and people can also learn more about the unique physical characteristics that make owls effective nocturnal hunters. COVID procedures will be in place for this program which means masks are strongly encouraged.

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25 New Troopers To **Graduate From Highway Patrol Academy**

Governor Michael L. Parson will provide the keynote address and Col. Olson will also speak to the class during the graduation. The Honorable Patricia Breckenridge, Supreme Court of Missouri, will administer the Oath of Office to the new troopers. Provost Roger K. McMillian, vice president

of College Affairs for Mineral Area College, will confer an associate of applied science degree to eight of the new troopers. The Troop F Color Guard will present the colors and Sergeant Andrew Henry (H) will sing the national anthem. Pastor Dale D. Richey from Pisgah Baptist Church in Excelsior Springs, MO, will provide the invocation and benediction.

Four class awards will be presented. The recruits accumulate points toward graduation in the categories of physical fitness, firearms, and academics throughout their 25 weeks at the Academy. The person with the highest number of points in each category earns the respective award. Award categories include physical fitness, firearms, academics, and the Superintendent's Award, which is presented to the person with the most points overall.

election to the State Senate in 2012 by defeating a Republican incumbent

In the Senate, he led a record 40-hour filibuster of an amendment attacking marriage equality. He also fought to ban lobbyist gifts to legislators, expand Medicaid and protect victims of rape, domestic violence and sexual abuse. Scott filed legislation to rein in the municipal court system, fought Republican efforts to water down Missouri's employment discrimination laws and helped secure passage of the Ferguson Commission's recommendation on the use of force standard into law. He won a second Senate term in 2016, overperforming amidst that year's Trump wave.

answered Sifton questions from his constituents for the Blunt, a Republican remainder of the evening. He was clear and concise in his answers to questions regarding his stance on immigration, the economy, Medicaid expansion, Biden's Build Back Better plan, and many other concerns that are looming large in Missouri's Senate race. This will be a race that the nation is watching and listening to.

In an article from CNN's Simone Pathe titled "The 10 Senate Seats Most Likely to Flip" Pathe ssid "Trump has also suggested he'll be endorsing in Missouri's Senate race, where GOP Sen. Roy Blunt is retiring. The biggest concern has been that he'd pick disgraced former Gov. Eric Greitens, who resigned from office following a probe into allegations of sexual and campaign misconduct. Trump was noncommittal in an interview with Hugh Hewitt earlier this month, who implored him not to endorse the former governor. "Well, that's an interesting opinion, that's true. He's right now leading by quite a bit," Trump said.

"I know, but he will lose the seat. We will lose the seat," Hewitt said. "I understand that. Okay, some people feel that," Trump responded. Kimberly Guilfoyle, a top official on Trump's 2020 campaign and the girlfriend of Trump's son, is the national chair of Greitens' campaign. GOP Rep. Billy Long met with Trump at Mar-a-Lago last month, so he could be another potential endorsee. But the field keeps growing, with state Senate President Dave Schatz announcing his campaign last month. The fear is that an increasingly splintered field will only mean more votes for Greitens, who could jeopardize what should be a safe Republican seat much the same way Todd Akin did in 2012."

"A seat in deep-red Missouri probably shouldn't be competitive. But Democrats would like their chances a whole lot more if GOP voters nominate Eric Greitens — a former governor who left office mired in scandal — to succeed Sen. Roy not seeking re-election. The Republican field also includes state Attorney General Eric Schmitt, Reps. Vicky Hartzler and Billy Long and attornev Mark McCloskev, best known for waving a gun at Black Lives Matter protesters outside his St. Louis home in 2020. A poll of likely GOP primary voters this month by the political news service Missouri Scout found Greitens and Schmitt locked in a close race, with Hartzler a distant third.

Democrats have at least a half-dozen candidates in the mix, including Scott Sifton, a former state legislator. Marine veteran Lucas Kunce has earned some buzz in national progressive circles. But two of the state's most familiar and formidable Democrats former Gov. Jay Nixon and former Secretary of State Jason Kander - are staying on the sidelines."

With the race heating up over the next ten months, Missouri politics will be thrust onto a national stage yet again.

Robert L. Elliot, was charged with felony resisting arrest, attempting to flee and creating a substantial risk of serious injury to another person.

Originally charged with operating a motor vehicle in a careless and imprudent manner, and operating a vehicle without a proper license, those additional charges have since been dropped by the office of prosecutor

Richard Shields.

Also, the 24-hour-hold the suspect was placed on, has now resulted in

\$50,000 bond required for his release. Elliott will make his first appearance before Associate Circuit Judge

Harold Dump at 9 a.m. on Friday, January 7 in the Henry County Courthouse in Clinton.

At press time, Elliot does not have an attorney or public defender. The suspect will likely have a not guilty plea entered for him, and another hearing scheduled.

Assistance for document filing for a public defender, will also likely be initiated.

Casenet documents show Elliot as having a former address in Sedalia, but arrest records show him with a Clinton residency.

Missouri online sentencing guidelines, show the penalty for felony resisting arrest to be up to four years in the Missouri Department of Corrections, and fines up to \$25,000.

Elliott remains in the custody of Sheriff J. Kent Oberkrum, in the Henry County Jail in Clinton.

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


