This week marks two years that have been dominated by the Covid-19 pandemic. On Jan. 21 2020, the first US case of Covid was confirmed in Washington. Also on that date, China confirmed that the virus is spread from human to human transmission. Two years, three major variants, and vaccinations into this pandemic the United States has lost a staggering 868K people since the onset

MDC Reports Final Deer Harvest For Season More Than 293,600

nal deer harvest for season more than 293,600

Archery deer harvest was 60,834. Archery turkey harvest was 2,523.

Missouri's 2021-2022 deer-hunting season ended Jan. 15 with the Missouri Department of Conservation (MDC) reporting a preliminary total deer harvest for the season of 293,670. Of the deer harvested, 143,049 were antlered bucks, 26,599 were button bucks, and 124,022 were does.

Top harvest counties for the overall deer season were Franklin with 6,392 deer harvested, Texas with 5,478, and Callaway with 5,452.

Hunters harvested 297,214 deer during the 2020-2021 deer hunting season with 140,855 being antlered bucks, 28,652 being button bucks, and 127,707 being does.

"This year's harvest total was slightly behind last year's mark and about 3% above the previous five-year average," said MDC Cervid Program Supervisor Jason Isabelle. "We've seen an increasing trend in statewide deer harvest for about the past eight years," said Isabelle. "The deer population has continued increase across much of southern Missouri at the same time that we've seen a population recovery in most of the counties impacted by the severe hemorrhagic disease outbreak that occurred in 2012."

ARCHERY DEER

RESULTS Deer hunting ended with the close of the archery season. Preliminary data from MDC showed that hunters checked 60,834 deer during the 2021-2022 archery deer season making it the third highest archery deer harvest on record. Top counties for the archery deer season were Jefferson with 1,563 deer harvested,

reports fi- St. Louis with 1,368, and Franklin with 1.274.

Hunters checked 67,487 deer during the 2020-2021 archery deer season. This year's archery deer harvest total was 10% below last year's record harvest and 8% higher than the previous five-year average. Fall archery turkey hunting also ended Jan. 15. Preliminary data from MDC showed 2,523 turkeys harvested. Top counties for the fall archery turkey season were Franklin with 69 turkeys harvested, Jefferson with 67, and Callaway with 61.

Hunters harvested 2,350 turkeys during the 2020-2021 fall archery turkey season.



Representing other driver Ashley A. Allen of Collins and Farm Bureau

Insurance, was attorney J. Christopher Spangler of Sedalia.

Testimony in court stated that Allen was allegedly negligent, in that her vehicle did rear-end Osterloh's vehicle. Court statements stated the accident caused injuries to Osterloh's children, aged 3 and 8 years old.

"Aliya had a concussion," said Osterloh. "Lily had bruises on her legs."

The mother stated that there were lasting effects from the accident.

"Aliya had headaches and ear problems," Osterloh said. "There was a series of issues from the bruising (Lily)."

The children also suffered trauma from the accident.

"My daughter did not want to get into the car," Osterloh said. "She did not want to leave my side."

Attorneys for both sides had reached a settlement, which was presented by

Wyatt (Osterloh's attorney) for approval by Judge Baker.

"Aliya will receive \$35,000," said Wyatt.

numbers have decreased, while the number of Covid deaths has stayed the same with the onset of the Omicron variant, according to The New York Times, however the page also states that hospitalization rates tend to have lag in reporting.

Windsor. Clinton, and several surrounding school districts have been pushed to use Alternative Method Instruction (AMI) learning hours because too many staff members were Covid positive. The Missouri Department of Elementary and Secondary Education (DESE) reports that 62 Missouri School districts have had to use AMI hours in the past two weeks, which are limited to a mere 36 hours without make-up hours being required. Clinton Schools were not in person learning from Jan. 18-21, returning on Jan. 24 to

class. A parent in the district relayed her experience in trying to get boooster vaccinations on Saturday for her 3 children over 12, as is recommended by the CDC. "We made appointments online at Walgreens and when we arrived for that appointment, there was a sign on the door saying the pharmacy and all testing was closed until further notice". We had to reschedule our appointment and needed to move it to next weekend".

Finding a rapid test in the area is nearly impossible. Nurse Kristy at The Clinton Middle School stated that "they are only testing people who "had nosymptoms" ticeable because tests are running very low in the district".

Golden Valley Memorial Hospital has opened up more testing availability however, now running tests in the Clinton Clinic Monday through Friday from 8 am- 5 pm. They also offer curbside testing in Clinton on Monday and Friday from 7-8 am. In Osceola Monday-Friday from 2-3 pm, and in Windsor Monday -Friday from 7-8 am.

While the area experiences a surge in positive cases higher than we have seen during the pandemic as a whole, the Hen-County Health Center is encouraging Henry Countians that "the best way to protect yourself from COVID-19 is by wearing a mask, getting vaccinated and following up with a booster shot".

Happy Thursday to you all! This week's story is one that I found to be very touching, both during my visit and when I sat down to start putting it all together. It's about the most precious of all precious things that there could possibly ever be in any of our lives. Our children.

Imagine for a moment if you will what it would be like if all of our children came to us with an owner's manual. And inside that manual was everything in the world that we would ever need to know in order to raise our children to all be happy, healthy, fun, loving, and to the rim full of an exuberant zest for life. A pretty novel ideology don't you think? But unfortunately, they do not. There are more children out there, many from right here in the very community that we all call our home, that you can even begin to imagine, for whatever reason, just do not receive the love, attention, patience, and TLC they need. Instead, they are neglected, overlooked, verbally abused, sometimes even considered as a nuisance by their very own parents. They are undernourished, abandoned, not kept clean, warm, dry, and safe, and sometimes even physically abused.... God bless their little souls. And that is the sad reality of it folks.

Just as I am sure the vast majority of all you parents out there would feel about your own children, my children mean more than the world itself to me and I unconditionally love them all with everything that I am worth. And I don't think that there is any accurate way out there to even come close to beginning to try and measure the joy, the enrichment, the pride, and the wonderful times and memories our children add to our lives. The way I see it, being a parent, a father in particular, is by far the most important, gratifying, rewarding, and fulfilling role I have ever experienced in my life.

Children give you the perfect opportunity to share your love. And when you do, the love which comes right back to you is the sweetest and most tender kind there could possibly be. All children need to be loved. They also need security, protection, someone to hug, and someone to tuck them in at night. I'm sure that all of these things and so much more would have to be found in that owner's manual. The little things that any young child needs are so easy to give them. But unfortunately for many children, those things are nowhere to be found for them.

The silver lining in the cloud, if there could possibly be one pertaining to this subject, is there are some very special people out there who have opened up their hearts and their homes to try and help fill some of those missing pieces for some of those children who need it the most. And it's one of these families that this week's story is about. I consider it a true honor and privilege to write a story about Larry and Carolyn Mendenhall of Clinton.

All for the love of children.....

Larry Mendenhall was born right here in Clinton in 1943. His parents are Charles and Anna Mendenhall. Charles was a farmer, and Anna was a farmer's wife and a mother. Larry also has a deceased brother, Mr. Harold Mendenhall. For those people who know Larry the best, they all have a nickname for him, "Gutter Baby". I know that nickname sounds to be a bit on the odd side, but there is actually a pretty good explanation for it. Now I'm not sure about it, but Larry just might possibly be the only baby ever born right there on the sidewalk of our city square, hence the nickname. The Mendenhall family doctor's office was upstairs there on the square back in 1943. And when his mother went into labor, she was rushed into the doctor's office. But unfortunately, the doctor was out. A short time later, Larry was born right there on the square. Larry graduated from Urich High School in 1961.

Miss Carolyn Dalton was also born here in Clinton in 1943 as well. Her parents are Gene and Jewell Dalton. Gene was a general handyman, and Jewell was a homemaker who had also worked at Rival and JC Penney at one time. Carolyn has three siblings. Her brother Richard is deceased, brother Jim Dalton lives here in Clinton, and sister Linda Bailey resides in Clinton as well. Carolyn graduated from Clinton High School in 1961.

Larry and Carolyn talked about how, back in their teenage years, cruising around the Clinton square was what everyone always did on Friday and Saturday nights. And it was on the square they first met through some mutual friends. In 1962, it was actually Carolyn who first asked Larry out. She hoped that he would join her for an upcoming dance. All I can figure is Carolyn must have been a terrific dancer, because they have been together ever since that night.

Larry and Carolyn were married in 1963. They have four biological children, son Rick is deceased, son Ronnie resides here in Clinton with his wife Jean, daughter Renee Garrison also lives

here in Clinton with her husband Larry, and son Ryan resides here in Clinton as well with his wife Laura. There are also three adopted children, daughter Michelle is here in Clinton, daughter Krystle Wolfe and her husband Dave are from over in Sedalia, and son Randy, who is a student here in Clinton, is still at home. The family pets are two friendly little critters named Sophie and Sasha. To round out the Mendenhall family, there are also twelve grandchildren and three great grandchildren. Both Larry and Carolyn told me that they love all of their children very dearly. And judging by all of the many pictures that I noticed in the living room, it was very easy for me to assume that they love their grandchildren just as much




IN JULY OF 2010, the Mendenhall family lost one of their sons Mr. Rick Mendenhall. Carolyn says that they all love and miss him every day.

Larry works out at the Golden Valley Memorial Hospital. Carolyn is a full-time housewife and mother. Carolyn also talked about how she has been a babysitter from nearly as far back as she can remember, and that she has always loved children. In 1973, ten years after they were married and after they had already started their own family, Carolyn said that she heard something on the radio that really sunk right into her. It had to do with foster children and foster parenting. Later, when she and Larry talked about it, they both immediately understood this was exactly what God had intended for them to do. A short time later, after contacting the proper agency, receiving some required education training, and passing a number of inspections, which included a home study, criminal background checks, finger printing, and an overall assessment screening, the first child came their way. And since that time, they guesstimate they have opened their door to well over four hundred children thus far. Carolyn even kept a scrapbook for many years of all her children. She sort of just let it go back when they were at around the three hundred and sixty something. That folks, is an amazing amount of love to be shared!

Some of the children that have come to them were only with them for a very short while, others for a much longer time. Some have come back to them on more than one occasion, and three of them were eventually adopted. Larry says that once they got started in foster care and were able to actually see they were making a big difference in these children's lives, he just knew that it was his calling to do everything he possibly could to help them. And he has assumed the role of a father figure with a great exuberance. For those children that were old enough, he began getting them involved with Cub Scouts, Boy Scouts, Little League, and any group activities that he could find for them. He taught many of these children to ride a bike, and for those near to driving age, he even taught them to drive. He also coached a number of sporting teams for his children. For the younger kids, there was potty training, Christmas, all family-oriented holidays and daily activities, and he even took them all to church. The Mendenhall's attend services at Drake's Chapel. Larry said there were times they had so many children with them that they nearly took up an entire row of seats. And Carolyn added there have been times during an emergency situation where they have tucked in as many as fifteen children in the same night. For both Larry and Carolyn, they have always felt they were doing exactly what God intended for them to be doing, and they both have always done the very best at it they could. On more than one occasion, they have even built onto their home in order to provide more room for the kids.

Larry and Carolyn also said that over the years, some of the children that had years before spent time as part of the Mendenhall family have returned back to them to say thank you and have even brought along their own families to introduce them. What a touching experience that must have been! And even to this very day, there are others who continue to call and stay in touch with them, and even some who feel comfortable enough to ask them for advice on life issues. I think this speaks volumes about the character of the Mendenhall family!


In 2008, Carolyn received the Clinton High School Distinguished Alumni Wall of Fame Award. It was presented to her at the annual City Awards Banquet by the Clinton Chamber of Commerce for her many years of loving, caring, and having such a tremendous impact on the lives of so many children. She says that she was really flattered by the standing ovation she received from the large crowd. In 2005, Larry and Carolyn received the "Heart of Gold Honor Award" which was also presented to them by the City of Clinton. Both Larry and Carolyn say that they never could have done this without the support of each other, as well as their own children. The Mendenhall family has all played a huge role in the foster parent program.



Here in Clinton, The DFS/Family Services office is where you can go for information pertaining to the foster care program. There are many different classifications of foster care to consider, and the State of Missouri also has specific guidelines and restrictions which must be followed, all pertaining to the privacy, protection, and welfare rights of the children. For additional facts and information, you can also go online and find an endless number of resources and research sites as well.

Near the end of the interview, I asked Larry and Carolyn what the future holds for them as foster parents. Larry says that kids are his life, and as long as their health allows them to and God has the will for them, they will never say no to a child in need.

After my initial visit and interview with Mr. and Mrs. Mendenhall, when I sat down to start preparing this story for print, I quickly realized that there are not even close to enough pages in the entire Democrat to mention all of the things that I feel really need to be said on this matter. I only hope that I have been able to come close to giving it the justice it so rightfully deserves. Also, I can tell you that there is far more to Larry and Carolyn's story that I could ever cover in one column. During my first visit with Larry and Carolyn, I also met their son Randy. On my second visit, I met the rest of their family and a few of the grandchildren as well. In Larry and Carolyn Mendenhall, I see a couple who has worked together as a team to open up their hearts and their home, and sacrificed of themselves, all for the love of children. They are some very amazing folks! What they bring to the table as a part of our community is tremendous!

Pastor David's message, "One Body", was prefaced by a New Testament reading from 1 Cor. 12:12-31a, and a Gospel reading from Luke 4:14-21. Have you ever walked into a really tough situation—something you felt like you could do, but probably not do very well. The Gospel reading from Luke tells about Jesus going through this when he was asked to preach in his hometown of Nazareth. Everything was going great until he did something kind of radical. He opened the scroll from Isaiah and began to read; "the Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because he has anointed me to bring good news to the poor. He has sent me to proclaim release to the captive and recovery of sight to the blind, to proclaim the year of the Lord's favor." Then he rolls up the scroll and declares: "today this scripture has been fulfilled." Jesus was proclaiming that he is the Messiah-the one

the prophet Isaiah was telling them about. He was God's anointed. To be anointed means to give authority to rule, to interpret, make decisions, have power over. This is the point at which Jesus lost the crowd. They considered him as someone who had stepped way out of line. As far as his hometown was concerned, Jesus would always just be Jesus, son of Joseph and Mary, not the most-high God.

But Nazareth is the place where Jesus chose to announce his ministry to the world. He was telling them he was starting his ministry right there-but he was rejected. Jesus' story was bigger than Nazareth. He came to change everything. His name would ring forth, not just from the old synagogue of Nazareth, but throughout all the lands of the world—the Roman Empire—the Far East—the New World. Everywhere and every person would come to know this Jesus who had read the Isaiah scroll in his hometown. Jesus shook the dust off his feet and took his message and gifts beyond this group of nice, but close-minded people.

So, never let small thinking stand in the way of a big vision. When the world discourages you—when the Nazarites of the world do not believe in your vision or ministry or ideas, do not listen. Paul tells us that we are made one body—united in Christ—and that we each have our special gifts. Do not stifle the ministry of Jesus because your vision is too small and do not be like the people of Nazareth and remain complacent when some novel and wonderful vision of God is revealed. Embrace the vision and be supportive of those other members of Christ's body, cherishing the mission of God in communal unity. Amen



Jane Froman, former resident of Clinton

Jane Froman was born in 1907 – her parents separated when she was five. She spent her childhood in Clinton and attended the Holy Rosary School. She was musically gifted and her talent for music appeared early (by age three). When she was five years old, she was sent to live with her grandparents (in Clinton) – Thad and Ellender Barcafer. When her mother arrived in Clinton after her, it was without her husband.

Jane sang in school concerts, at various churches, and even landed the role of Snow White in the school play. And, although it never surfaced when she sang, she experienced a problem stuttering which had surfaced at the age of five.

In 1919 she attended the Christian College in Columbia, Mo., and then the University of Missouri eventually studying at the Conservatory of Music in Cincinnati. In Cincinnati, Jane's singing talents were recognized by the owner of a radio station, Powel Crosely, Jr., and she soon found herself singing radio commercials. After spending time working in various radio gigs, she landed a spot in New York on The Chesterfield Hour, a nationally popular radio show – that was 1933. For the next decade, Jane (and her first husband) would alternate between Hollywood and New York as she found success and opportunities to perform.

Following the entry of the U.S. into World War II, Jane helped with bond-drives, and sang over the Armed Forces Network to entertain troops; in February of 1943, she embarked on an overseas USO Tour – but never made it to her destination. While flying over Portugal the plane carrying her and 38 other passengers crashed into the Tagus River. Only 15 survived.

Jane had severe injuries to her legs and right arm. With the help of the copilot (John Burn, who would later become her second husband) she stayed afloat in the river until rescued. It took about an hour before ships were launched to the scene where Jane, John, and 13 others were waiting in the icy waters. There was an added 20 minutes to the rescue as two of the men fell overboard lifting Jane into the launch while the boat drifted away. John's injuries were severe as well: his back was broken in two places, and he had fractures to his skull. Somehow, he helped lift her up and keep her above water. Jane's injuries were no less severe and would affect her for the rest of her life. "Hang onto me a second," Jane told John in the water. "I think there's a bone broken in my leg."

Not only did she have a compound fracture in her leg, but her right arm was broken along with three broken ribs and she had a large cut below her left knee that ran to the bone. She was battered and bruised. The injury to her right leg was severe enough that she made the doctor promise not to amputate it. Over the next nine years she spent 36 months in hospitals undergoing operations, bone-and-skin grafts, 25 operations in all, and eventually was able to perform with a brace and enjoy a professional career in night clubs and on television.

Two years after the accident, on crutches and with a leg brace that ran to her hip, she finished the USO Tour she had started. At first, she sang in hospitals but eventually borrowed General Eisenhower's car and toured places few (if any) USO Tours had visited.

A few years later (1952), a movie was made about Froman's experience called "With a Song in My Heart" which starred Susan Hayward (as Jane). In 1962, after moving back to Missouri (she retired and made her home in Columbia), Froman married again, this time to an old college acquaintance Rowland Smith (who worked at the Columbia Tribune). One of her last performances was in Arrow Rock, Missouri, when she came out of retirement to sing a Christmas program in 1969. Jane Froman died in Columbia in April of 1980.

Hartzler Leads Hawley's Efforts in House to Ban Insider Trading in Congress



Congresswoman Vicky Hartzler (R-Mo.) joined Senator Josh Hawley (R-Mo.) in his effort to ban insider trading in Congress by introducing the Banning Insider Trading in Congress Act in the House. This legislation would prohibit Members of Congress and their spouses from holding or trading individual stocks. The bill will require Members found in violation to return their profits to the American people.

"When Speaker Pelosi can trade millions of dollars in stocks per year, outperform the market, and receive classified briefings at the same time, it's no wonder she defends the trading of individual stocks by Congress," Hartzler said. "It's past time for Congress to crack down on this potential corruption and work for the American people, instead of their own wallets. I am pleased to join Senator Hawley in our fight to restore decency and truth to Washington. No one – not even the Speaker of the House – should benefit from public service."

"Year after year, politicians somehow manage to outperform the market, buying and selling millions in stocks of companies they're supposed to be regulating," Hawley said. "Wall Street and Big Tech work hand-in-hand with elected officials to enrich each other at the expense of the country. Here's something we can do: ban all members of Congress from trading stocks and force those who do to pay their proceeds back to the American people. It's time to stop turning a blind eye to Washington profiteering."

This legislation is the House companion bill to

Sen. Hawley's version in the Senate.

Specifically, this bill would:

Prohibit Members of Congress and their spouses from holding, acquiring, or selling stocks or equivalent economic interests during their tenure in elected office. Any holdings in diversified mutual funds, exchange-traded funds, or U.S. Treasury bonds are exempt from the prohibition.

Give Members of Congress and their spouses six months, upon assuming office, to divest any prohibited holdings or place those holdings in a blind trust for the remainder of their tenure in office.

Ensure Members or their spouses forfeit any investment profits to the American people via the U.S. Treasury if they are found to be in violation if the Act. Members who violate the requirements will also lose the ability to deduct the losses of those investments on their income taxes. The ethics committees of Congress may levy additional fines and will publicize violations.

Require that after two years of the Act's implementation, the Government Accountability Office (GAO) will conduct an audit of Members' compliance with the Act.

Ranchers Eager For New Herbicide

ProClova, a new product from Corteva Company, is very easy on white clover, a much needed clover forage.

Designed to reduce spray kill on legumes such as clovers and lespedeza, the new product allows most of the white clover to grow through the spray damage.

Kevin Bradley, University of Missouri weed scientist, has studied the new spray

"This is the first time we have a product that doesn't kill (out) white clover," said Bradley. "It's safe to use on lespedeza too."

ProClova controls thistles, ragweeds, cocklebur and a broad spectrum of other common pasture weeds.

The new spray does have some drawbacks.

"It won't control thistles quite as well," Bradley said. "Growers will have to spray them at an early emergent stage."

Just like 2,4-D products currently used, ProClova hurts red clover.

Test results from Mizzou showed a 60 percent loss of red clover. But again, the white clover survives very well. The trial results showed only a 20 percent loss of white clover.

"It will yellow up some," Bradley said. "But it will survive."

Ranchers have mixed legumes such as clover to improve grazing forage for decades. But killing out unwanted broadleaf weeds, yet maintaining the legumes has always been a challenge.

Steven Tucker with Midwest Farmer's Association (MFA) agri-chemicals has been keeping up on the study results for MFA.

"The new spray looks very good," said Tucker. "It looks like some outlets may have it later this year."

Right now, it is still in the finishing stages of EPA approval.

"We (MFA) don't have it on our availability or pricing lists," Tucker said. "But


I think it will be approved soon."

e thing cattlemen that are wanting to re-seed pasture ground can do, is to use white clover over red. Prices of the more tolerant clover are around \$4 per pound. The red is cheaper at around \$2.85 per pound, but again it won't take the spray like the white.

ProClova is a combination of 2,4-D and florpyrauxifen. Under the trade name Duracor, florpyrauxifen is available now, but without the superior control of ProClova.

It is not labeled for ranchers to mix 2,4-D and Duracor, on their own to spray their pastures. The EPA will require cattlemen to wait for the ProClova product approval and subsequent distribution.

Work Is the Solution

For the last year and really, since COVID started, the labor market has changed. Forced-shutdowns and manufactured fear caused a lot of businesses to close their doors and either send their workers home or lay them off. These businesses undoubtedly hoped the shutdowns would be temporary and eventually things would return to normal. For a big portion of the country, this didn't happen. Big-city governments and leftist states kept businesses shut down and their workers at home. If that wasn't enough, the federal government made the problem worse by throwing cash and government handouts to folks, encouraging them to stay home and collect welfare checks instead of working.

All of this combined to create the problems we are seeing today. You can't drive anywhere in Missouri without seeing a "Help Wanted" sign or long lines because those businesses don't have enough workers to meet demand. Now, restaurants and retail businesses are cutting operating hours because they can't find workers while some in the federal government are talking about paying people a \$1,000 a month to stay home and do nothing. Our country wasn't built by people sitting around collecting welfare. This country was built on hard work and the entrepreneurial spirit – people taking risks to make their country and community better. These misguided liberals, instead, are trapping Americans in a vicious cycle of government dependency. Instead of discouraging hard work and initiative, government should be pushing people back into the workforce and making it easier for businesses to do what they do best – growing our economy and creating jobs for hardworking Missourians.

One obvious way government makes the problem worse is by not connecting those on unemployment with employers that need workers. There's no reason so many Missourians are on unemployment when there are unfilled jobs all over our state. Unemployment is a temporary hand up for those transitioning from one job to the next. It's not intended to be permanent replacement income or a program people come to every year when their seasonal jobs go on hiatus. This is especially true when the state unemployment rate sits at 3.5% - which is lower than before COVID and lower than the national average. If someone is not working in this economy, it's because they don't want to work.

This situation led me to file Senate Bill 777; the Employment Security and Job Referrals Act of 2022. This bill would require the Division of Employment Security, which administers unemployment in Missouri, to connect businesses and employers that have open positions with people filing for unemployment. If the individual on unemployment refuses to take a job offer, he or she would no longer receive unemployment benefits. Here's an example of how it might work: The Division of Employment Security would pick out five jobs that are very similar to the one the worker previously had. Employment Security would send those referrals to the worker and require him or her to make a legitimate attempt to get one of those jobs. If the worker refuses or ignores the referral, they forfeit their unemployment benefits.

This is a commonsense idea. There are jobs available and there are people out there who need jobs. Why would we pay them to do nothing when they could be working? This isn't just about dollars and cents, either. It's about encouraging work ethic and building a workforce that can meet any challenge, both here in our country and globally. Our state and our country are competing to turn out the best products and best services. Americans are known for their hard work and for their ingenuity, and we can't afford to fall behind or lose what has made this country great. The bottom line is that employment and the self-respect that comes with it is one our greatest assets and it is the best tool we have to grow our economy and overcome poverty. Our laws and programs should reflect that and that's what SB 777 will do. Missouri Attorney General Eric Schmitt, shown during a November press conference in St. Louis, has now sued 45 school districts over COVID-19 policies.

Updated Jan. 24 with additional lawsuits and reaction from school districts.

Missouri Attorney General Eric Schmitt on Monday, Jan 23, filed nine additional lawsuits against school districts over their mask mandates.

In total, he has sued 45 districts, including 28 in the St. Louis region, in recent days over mandates and other COVID-19 mitigation policies.

On Monday, some districts said they were consulting with their attorneys. Others said they still had not officially received lawsuits but would discuss with counsel when they do. A few districts have statements released condemning the lawsuits. Both the Francis Howell and the St. Charles districts said the cases are a waste of taxpayer dollars.

"The lawsuit filed by Schmitt is a waste of taxpayer money - on both sides," the Francis Howell School District wrote in a statement. "The claims are tenuous at best and this unnecessary lawsuit represents another attack on public education in Missouri. This latest action by AG Schmitt is disheartening, unfounded and frankly, shameful."

Maplewood Richmond Heights Superintendent Bonita E. Jamison said the lawsuit is not a prudent use of taxpayer money or human resources required to address it.

"We believe these lawsuits continue to be a distraction to school leaders regionally who are already taxed with efforts to keep school doors open and students safe," Jamison said in a statement.

Missouri Attorney General Eric Schmitt filed lawsuits on Friday against more than 35 school districts he said were illegally instating health policies. Schmitt tweeted links to suits filed against the school districts, including Francis Howell, St. Louis Public Schools. Columbia Public, Kansas City, Rockwood and Fort Zumwalt.

The suits allege that school districts do not have the authority to impose public health orders for children. Several parents within the districts are named as plaintiffs in the suits that were filed in the counties where the school districts are located.

The lawsuits are part of Schmitt's ongoing effort to force Missouri schools to drop mask mandates and other COVID-19 mitigation policies. Schmitt is a Republican running for U.S. Senate.

"Parents and families, not bureaucrats, should have the power to decide what's best for their children," Schmitt said in a press release Friday.

In a letter to school districts last month, Schmitt told the districts to cease enforcement of public health orders that he said were declared void by a recent court ruling.

In November a Cole County judge ruled that health orders passed by an "unelected official" were unviolation of Missouri's separation of powers.

"Missouri statutes give elected legislative bodies, not individual health agency directors, authority to create county-wide laws related to communicable disease," Cole County Circuit Court Judge Daniel R. Green wrote.

Schmitt's office says it sent letters to more than 50 school districts in December, more than 20 of which are in the St. Louis area, telling them to cease and desist "illegal" mask, quarantine and other public health policies.

The majority of local school districts still have mask mandates in place and believe their policies are legal, according to statements and letters sent to parents.

The districts believe their power to enact health policies is spelled out in two Missouri statutes, said Paul Ziegler, CEO of EdPlus, a cooperative of about 60 public school and charter school systems.

Ziegler pointed to Missouri statute 167.191, which says it is unlawful for children to attend school with an infectious disease they may spread and revised statute 171.011, which gives school boards the ability to adopt rules and regulations.

"Between those two statutes, to me, it's very clear that school boards not only have the ability but have the obligation to do the things they're doing right now to try and keep kids safe," Ziegler said.

The districts also believe their power to enact health policies is reinforced by the fact that in most cases, elected school boards voted to approve the policies. The Cole County ruling presented the argument that unelected officials have limited authority, said Duane Martin, an attorney at EdCounsel, which represents public school tricts across Missouri, including Francis Howell, Holden R-III, Jefferson City, Independence and Kingsville, which were sued by the Attorney General on Friday.

"By putting it before the people who are elected by the local community to make these very decisions, I think it just bolsters their ability to make these kinds of determinations in the best interest of their kids," Martin said.

Health implications The lawsuits come during a wave of

constitutional and a COVID-19 infections that was three times higher than previous waves at its peak and has filled local hospi-

> It has put a strain on school districts that are struggling to staff classrooms amid a big increase in educators who are out sick.

Rob Gatter, a professor of law at St. Louis University School of Law at the Center for Health Law Studies, said the lawsuits are creating confusion and sending a dangerous message at a concerning point in the pandemic.

"[Hospitals] barely have the beds and they barely really have the nurses and the Missouri Attorney General, Eric Schmitt, is adding to the problem by creating confusion about what's legal and what's illegal," Gatter said.

The lawsuits will take time and resources from school districts, Ziegler said.

"It's not only a distraction for school leaders to have to deal with it, to have to prepare themselves for potential litigation or deal with litigation if a suit is actually filed," Ziegler said. "Those leaders would be much better served working with their communities to make sure they're keeping kids safe and keeping our school doors open."

And Martin points "taxpayers are out, paying both sides of this."
