Fatal Police Sooting 911 **Dispatch Error Case Is Settled**



The March 6,2018 911 call that ended with the tragic shooting death of Clinton Police Officer Ryan Morton was dispatched to an incorrect location at 306 W Grandriver Street in Clinton. The call originated in Windsor, roughly 20 miles from the location that Morton and two other officers were fired upon. Officers Kapsar and Bettencourt were also injured in the shooting that occurred at the mistaken address. The courts have settled a wrongful death lawsuit for \$1.6 million, according to documents. court The parents of Officer Christopher Ryan Morton filed the lawsuit in September 2019 alleging that Henry County and its 911 emergency system was faulty and led to the mistake that left Morton dead and two other officers injured. The woman, Tammy Widger, who met

officers on the porch to cover attorneys fees of 306 W Grandriver, was charged with first-degree murder and four other felonies, told them that there was no emergency and that no one was inside the home. Seconds later, James Waters, who was inside the house, opened fire officers were forced to return fire. Waters fatally wounded Morton and injured two other officers, police said. Waters also died in the gun battle. Cass County Judge William B. Collins approved the settlement in December. Under the judge's order, about \$691,647 will go to parent's attorney, the Schmitt Law Firm,

and expenses for the case. About \$6,910 will be used to cover a lien.

The remaining \$926,843 will go to Morton's parents, Darrel and Tara Morton. The lawsuit, originally filed in Henry County but was transferred to Clinton County, named as defendants: Henry County 911 Emergency Communications, Harris Systems USA, which is also known as Caliber Public Safety, and Colossus Inc., which is also known as InterAct Public Safety Systems, which provide 911

Great Backyard Bird Count

low many



Beginning Friday, February 18 and going through Monday, February 21, the Cornell Lab of Ornithology, in conjunction with the National Audubon Society, will be conducting the 25th annual Great Backyard Bird Count (GBBC). Anyone can take part in this great citizen science project. Last year, 268,674 people from 194 countries participated (over 160,000 from North America). Their observations created the largest instantaneous snapshot of global bird populations ever recorded. This information helps learn ornithologists about bird populations and how to protect them and the environment we share.

The Cornell Lab, in collaboration with other researchers, recently published a study which determined that North America is home to nearly three billion fewer birds than in 1970. That means that almost one out of every four birds has disappeared from our lives over the last fifty years.

Anyone can take part in the Great Backyard Bird Count whether you are an expert, novice or just like to watch the birds at your feeders or in your own yard. I would encourage you to participate. It is fun and can be very educational for you, your kids or grandchildren, plus bird populations are always shifting and changing. You can indeed help make a difference. Your information would be a great help to research.

You can spend as little as 15 minutes or as much time as you want counting birds. Protocol asks you to count for at least 15 minutes at one site during the four days or you can do as many counts as you want. You can stick to looking out your window in your yard or do counts at various locations such as in your neighborhood, at parks, wildlife areas, nature centers, conservation areas, forests, fields, streams, etc. You can move between locations and spend as much or as little time as you want. Each time you do a count record start and end times, each species (and how many of those species) you saw or heard. You, by no means, need to be an expert birder to participate in this project. There are lots of easyto-use resources to help ID birds in your area. During the winter there will be 10-15 different species of birds you will see the majority of the time. Even if you are a first time birder, use your phone or computer, do a web search for "winter birds in Missouri" and you will have the knowledge to conduct a winter bird count. iNaturalist is an excellent site for any type of nature identification. Download the app to your phone, take a picture of any birds you need to identify, post it on this app and within seconds you'll have a reply.

Be as accurate as possible but don't panic if you can't identify each and every bird. It's the same with the numbers: counting a flock of birds fluttering around can be challenging, estimate when you have to.

If you are interested, go online and type in birdcount.org to sign up. There will also be lots of information on sites to help with bird identification.

He graduated in 1984 and started teaching at the Clinton Technical School. Wells graduated in Warrensburg in 1986, and worked in Columbia for a while before moving to a job at a bank in Clinton. She met Richard in December 1986, and they married in May 1987. Richard later became director at the Clinton Technical School, then took the position as Superintendent of the Montrose School District.

The Wells have three sons. The oldest, Andrew, is a college teacher in Iowa. Middle son Justin worked in Carrolton, and then at Henry Elementary for several years where he talked his mother into taking the job as school secretary. He is currently Assistant Principal at Windsor High School. He and wife Jill have two boys. Well's youngest son, Garrison, is a car salesman at Gregg Smith Ford.

"I try to keep in touch with my friends from Clinton High School," said Wells. "We get together for a reunion every five years and everyone looks the same. Only 40 to 45 people show up out of a class of 240, but it is hard to coordinate when a lot of people live other places."

Pastor David's message, "Speaking for God", was prefaced by a New Testament reading from 1 Cor. 13:1-13, and an Old Testament reading from Jeremiah 1:4-10. What does it mean to speak for God? Is there a difference between speaking for God and speaking for Jesus? Of course, Jesus is God, but Jesus revealed his commands to the faithful in The Great Commission found in Matthew 28:16-20. In this passage Jesus tells his followers to baptize and teach and obey as he had taught them.

Until the time of Jesus God's law and revelation came through the mouths of prophets. God's call to Jeremiah shows this to us. God says to this young man, "I have known you since I formed you. I have had a plan for you since I formed you." Having a plan and preordaining everything are completely different things here. We all have plans but plans do not always work out because of free will and chance. But here God tells Jeremiah, "I want you to speak for me."

Groundhog Day, Candlemas, Some Local History And A Little Fun adhog's Day traveled to the United States Downtown Clinton Clyde'

Groundhog's Day traveled to the United States with the German immigrants. Originally the day was celebrated on February 14, with ties to Candlemas, dating back to 345 BC.

Candlemas was a Christian holiday which celebrated the end of winter and the beginning of the sowing and planting season.

"If Candlemas Day be dry and fair, The half o'winter to come and mair:

If Candlemas Day be wet and foul, The half o'winter gone at Yule."

Just how and when the Groundhog became the weatherman is somewhat unknown.

From History.com, "On February 2, 1887, Groundhog Day, featuring a rodent meteorologist, is celebrated for the first time at Gobbler's Knob in Punxsutawney, Pennsylvania. According to tradition, if a groundhog comes out of its hole on this day and sees its shadow, it gets scared and runs back into its burrow, predicting six more weeks of winter weather; no shadow means an early spring.

Groundhog Day has its roots in the ancient Christian tradition of Candlemas, when clergy would bless and distribute candles needed for winter. The candles represented how long and cold the winter would be. Germans expanded on this concept by selecting an animal-the hedgehog-as a means of predicting weather. Once they came to America, German settlers in Pennsylvania continued the tradition, although they switched from hedgehogs to groundhogs.'

Through the years, The Clinton Democrat has covered Groundhog Day, with the first article appearing in the Clinton Advocate Feb. 11, 1886 "Groundhog day did not produce much of a shadow".

On Feb. 5, 1887, The Clinton Eye published a poem about Groundhog Day.

The individuals are: Marilyn S. Parratt (refiled); Cody E. Westendorff (refiled); and Rhonda S. Cox (newly filed). There are still a few other issues (tax issues, etc.) which will appear on the April ballot which have not been reported on, although they have been turned in on time (by January 25th). As soon as those ballot items are organized and put together by the H.C. Clerk's office, The Clinton Daily Democrat will report on those as well.

Rick State Sen. Brattin, R-Harrisonville, announces he has filed two important pro-Second Amendment bills in the Missouri Senate. The first bill expands Missouri's Stand Your Ground law and strengthens protections for Missourians in self-defense situations. "Law-abiding Mis-

sourians should have the right to defend themselves and their families, period," said Sen. Brattin. "This practice of rogue prosecutors and state governments weaponizing the law against people, like Kyle Rittenhouse, who are acting in self-defense has to stop and that's exactly what my bill would do."

Under Sen. Brattin's Senate Bill 1104, there would be a presumption that an individual



acted reasonably in using physical or deadly force when defending themselves against a threat, rather than the current law, which places the burden on the individual to prove they acted reasonably. Any person who uses physical or deadly force, or threatens to use such force in self-defense, would be immune from criminal prosecution and civil action. Beyond that, the bill also gives individuals in these situations the right to raise a pre-trial claim of self-defense, which would move the burden of proof to either the prosecution or plaintiff in these cases. Senator Brattin also filed Senate Bill 1102, which exempts firearms and ammunition from local and state sales, and use taxes. "The Second Amend-

ment is a fundamental

right guaranteed by the Constitution," said Sen. Brattin. "Government should not be profiting off or creating financial barriers to our right to keep and bear arms. Knowing the tactics of the left, it won't be long until they are taxing firearms and ammunition beyond what anyone can afford, and that's how they'll try to undercut our Second Amendment right."

Both of Sen. Brattin's pro-Second Amendment bills will be referred to committee in the coming weeks.

Senator Brattin represents the 31st Senatorial District, covering Barton, Bates, Cass, Henry and Vernon counties. Senator Brattin resides in Harrisonville with his wife, Athena, and their five children.

AccuWeather Chief Meteorologist, Jonathan Porter: "Accu-Weather meteorologists are forecasting a brief, but significant and impactful cold surge into Texas lasting from Wednesday into the first part of the weekend. Temperatures can be 20-25 degrees below normal with readings below freezing across much of the state. Temperatures will begin to moderate over the weekend, but remaining chilly. Although this will be a notable surge of cold air as well as snow and ice, it does not appear that the cold will be as intense or long-lasting as last February. For instance, Dallas experienced near or below freezing temperatures for over a week in February 2021 whereas this upcoming cold wave is expected to bring near or below freezing temperatures Wednesday night through Friday night. The cold wave will set the stage for ice across much of central and northern Texas. Travel can be difficult and dangerous in this area starting late Wednesday and continuing through Thursday. The greatest risk for signif-

icant ice accumulation that can bring down trees and powerlines is forecast in and around Dallas and northward toward the Red River." AccuWeather Global Weather Center - January 31, 2022 - Alarge, slow-moving storm system is expected to deliver a massive area of snow and potentially damaging ice from the southern Plains to the Midwest and Northeast this week.

This storm has the potential to produce significant travel disruptions to ground and air transportation, Widespread power outages are also anticipated.

accumulation of ice from northeast Texas through the Ohio Valley and into parts of the interior Northeast. There will likely be enough ice to snap tree limbs and damage power lines, which may result in extensive power outages. Untreated roads and sidewalks are expected to be covered in a layer of ice, making for dangerous travel.

Residents in the regions where we expect significant ice accumulations of over a half inch should make preparations for a loss of power, which may last for days in many areas. Also, in these areas there may also be a risk for freezing pipes, which may burst due to an extended loss of heat due to power outages. In the warmer air to the south, rain and thunderstorms may lead to localized flooding across portions of the Lower Mississippi Valley Wednesday into Thursday night.

From KDKD News and The Clinton Police Department...With the incoming snow event, Clinton Missouri Police Department would like to make sure that our citizens are updated with the procedures and protocols you can expect from your police service during the impact times of the storm.

1. PARKING PRO-HIBITIONS ON DES-**SNOW IGNATED** ROUTES

Parking is prohibited on the following streets during a declared snow emergency-which can be called by an authorized individual for weather related hazardous conditions- but automatically goes into effect as soon as 2 inches of snow accumulates. A. Second St.

Emergency Management Services Is A Misnomer

Managing for emergencies, is quite different than the name of the agency suggests.

Vin Journey, coordinator for Henry County Emergency Management in Clinton, talked about it on January 20."I actually coordinate," said Journey,

"I really don't manage anything." With the separate

911 office, Journey coordinates emergency management for everything else.

"I handle radio, cell phone and HAM radio communica-tions," Journey said. HAM radios have not been replaced by modern communications. "HAM

communications were the only thing left working during the Joplin tornado," Journey said. "It is a very viable communication method we need here in Henry County."

The county has a large 65 foot tower that handles a lot of their radio communications. Inside is less than state-ofthe-art modern interoperable systems to allow radio, cell and HAM calls to talk to each other.

"Our ACU-1000 is inter operable," Journey said. "It's not as modern as what the (U.S.) military has, but it works well."

When a large tornado or other big emergency occurs, Journey has to coordinate chain-of-command requests.

"Jim Stone, presiding commissioner for Henry County is the designated person (boss man) to ask the governor (Missouri) for National Guard assistance,' type Journey said. "The presiding commissioner is who would ask the governor, who would ask the president (U.S.) for FEMA assistance.'

Besides coordinating all that, Journey is also responsible for PPE (personal protective equipment) for emergency management personnel.

"We supply the police, deputies and fire departments," Journey said.

Coordinating hazardous waste situations falls under Journey's responsibilities.

"I'm qualified with (hazardous that waste training)," Journey said.

Grant application and disbursement, are a big part of Journey's job.

"We apply for a lot of grants," Journey said. "They paid for half the cost of our backup generators." Journey likes his job.

"Emergency management involves a lot of coordination,' Journey said. "I help people (government officials) find resources.'

Alleged Burglar Set For Trial In Clinton Robbery



A Warsaw woman telling authorities she was looking for her dog, was charged with

1st degree burglary. Christine M. Stacherski, was originally scheduled to appear for a criminal hearing on January 18, at the Henry County Court-

house in Clinton. According to the probable cause statement, in January of 2019 a Henry

County resident reported the theft of a 9 mm handgun, \$500 in cash, jewelry and the storage device for his security system.

A neighbor provided video footage of the suspects vehicle, a tan Chevy pickup.

Another Henry County resident, reported security video showing the same vehicle present. The resident further stated the suspect knocked on the door, and attempted to turn the door knob. Further video footage identified the suspect

as Stacherski. A post miranda (miranda rights) interview, taken by authorities stated that Stacherski claimed to be looking for a lost

dog. Alec Lawson, deputy with the Henry County Sheriff's Office made the decision to arrest Stacherski at that interview. She was originally charged with 2nd

degree burglary. Prosecution authorities later upgraded that charge to 1st degree.

Additional PC statement information, noted that Stacherski was on parole for 2nd degree burglary from a previous Benton County case.

Casenet information shows that Stacherski was originally released, but failed to appear in February of 2021.

Circuit Judge M. Brandon Baker, immediately placed a warrant for her arrest. She was later picked up by authorities.

\$50,000 bond Α amount was placed at

that time, which remains unposted.

Casnet shows multiple rescheduling of her criminal setting hearings, including the most recent one from January 18.

Stacherski is scheduled to appear for another criminal setting hearing on

February 22.

Attorney James La-Salle of Kansas City will represent the defendant.

At press time, Ms. Stacherski remains in the custody of Sheriff J. Kent Oberkrom, in the Henry County Jail in Clinton.
