Back Of House: Health Inspector Keeps Us Safe

BY KENNY RAGLAND Staff Reporter

Keeping town and county residents safe, is a big part of the job for the environmentalist at the Henry County Health Department.

Gary French is charged with Inspecting restaurants, septic systems, coordinating school based health programs, food safety presentations, and other duties for his typical

Covering Clinton and all of Henry County, French has a lot of responsibility.

"I inspect high risk business kitchens a minimum of two times a year," said French. "Anyone that serves fresh chicken and cooked poultry meats, is on that list."

Other restaurants and food services still get inspected, but not as often.

"Medium risk kitchens that serve frozen meats directly to the cooking process, I inspect annually," French said. "Low exposure, where packaged or baked foods are served, get annual inspections."

Education is a big part of the environmentalist job.

"People will get sick from eating something, and try to figure out where they got it," French said. "Well, it takes 3-5 days for that illness to show up."

French cautions sick individuals to not prematurely cast blame.

"People have a lot of meals following a possible exposure," French said. Handling complaints is a

part of his job. "We take complaints very

seriously," French said. "We will go to where the individual thinks they contracted the food illness."

French has had to close restaurants, but prefers to do so in a diplomatic way.

"Putting up signs, temporarily closed for maintenance is one way," French said. "It also gives management time to make corrections, replacements and repairs."

The health department inspector said that simple rules can be followed.

"Keep the hot foods hot," French said. "Keep the cold

Clinton Man Asks Council To Take On Grave Problem

met in open session March 15 at City Hall. All members of the council were present; Mayor Greg Lowe presided. The previous minutes were approved.

A personal appearance was made by Kenny Ragland. Mr. Ragland asked that the council consider paying him \$14,000 per vear to maintain and look after the Oak Grove Cemetery. "I would like to take over care-taking that cemetery," said Ragland. He explained to the council that he had experience caring for grave sites and cemeteries in the past. He also told the council that he would use products that would protect the graves from vandalism (protective coatings, for instance, to protect from paint, etc.). One of Ragland's references was the current Sexton John Wilson. He told the council that the Parks and Rec Department should be encouraged, and that he was sure they did the best they could with the equip-

Live Long and Add Sugar???

In March, 100 years ago, in the Windsor community: In 1920, the community of Windsor was invited to celebrate the 100th birthday of Mrs. Thankful Jane Dorriss. Dorriss would have been alive to see a great many changes in the US and, indeed, did.

She was born in Tennessee when it had only been a state for about two decades (it was the 16th state) and recalled her early education as being in a small log schoolhouse with split-slabbed flooring (puncheon), sitting on benches with no backs, and using sharpened goose quill pens for writing. We have all heard of a neighbor lending another neighbor some sugar or other necessary item, but she recalled a time when a neighbor, literally, would lend another neighbor fire – they would carry it to the neighbor's home in times of need.

In 1841 she married Pope Dorriss at the age of 21. Pope served with Price's Army in the Civil War but died the year after the war ended. Thankful Dorris, at her 100th birthday, had been a widow for over five decades and was blind (and had been for previous 20 years), and it was reported she was starting to have problems with her hearing in the few years before her 100th birthday. She did, however, have a keen memory and sense of humor. She was actively interested in what was going on in the world and U.S. and was supportive of women's suffrage, education, and the prohibition of liquor.

So, what did she attribute her long life to? Sugar well, at least partly. Mrs. Dorriss said she ate a great deal of candy and used a lot of sugar in her coffee. However, she also said she did not eat "heavy meats" and was partial to fish, some wild game, fowl, and vegetables. Dorriss loved the Windsor community and said it was the best place in the world to grow old and that living there had contributed to her longevity as well.

But who knows? Maybe it was the sugar...

re-scheduled to be held at 6:00 p.m. April 4th.

An update about opening the north bound lane on the east side of the square was addressed. There were some proposals given to make this happen by Street Superintendent T.J. Williams. There has, thus far, been no response from Main Street about the proposal.

City Wide Clean Up: the Clinton City Council approved the dates of April 25 - April 30.

After some discussion, the council agreed to move forward with the purchase of a 2022 fleet truck for the Street Department. Three bids were received, but the bid from Max Chrysler for a 2022 Dodge Ram Truck (\$50,500) appeared to be the best option considering price, type of truck, miles, and availability.

Resolution 04-2022 was adopted by the council. The resolution approves the task order and agreement (for \$98,000 – which is a lower and amended amount) with CJW concerning the Franklin Street Bridge Project.

Westport Construction was awarded the bid to construct the shelter houses at Kids' World. The amount is \$23,480. Councilman Gene Henry asked about the impact on the budget and suggested that, perhaps, some third-party donations might be available to offset the cost (and therefore not affect the city's budget).

At the Artesian Pool, the rehab of the pool's interior is on schedule. The council authorized a request for qualifications for engineering services for the bathhouse portion of the project. That project would, hopefully, be started in August once the pool closes for the summer.

The roofing project for the community center is still on pace for a June Start. The bid from Red Hammer Roofing still stands, however, it is with the understanding that roofing materials may have increased since the original bids were set – and that may reflect on the price tag once those materials are purchased. The previous bid for the project was \$189,000.

The Aquatic Center has undergone some repairs of late: in late January the boilers were down, in mid-February multiple leaks were discovered and wiring had to be replaced. It was suggested by Johnson Controls Inc. that the boilers be housed in a separate building. Councilman Henry questioned why JCI did not inform the city in previous repair jobs that housing the boilers in a separate building might reduce the amount of maintenance costs to the city overall. There was no answer to that question, however, there was a suggestion that the city may look into a salt-water pool (which may reduce the chemical corrosion causing many of the present repair issues).

At the Waste Water Plant, the #4 lower-level pump check valve is to be installed in mid-April. Evergy replaced a transformer at the plant last week, and there will be some more discussion held regarding the CIP (Capital Improvement Plan) for the Waste Water Plant which includes sewer line rehabilitation. Testing equipment has been installed at the plant for E-Coli. The installation (and training for the equipment) will essentially save money on lab fees. Waste Water is still looking for the best price on soft starter for the sludge pond. The quarterly Alliance compliance letter will start in the second quarter this year. Also, the surveillance program for COVID (the sewershed surveillance program) has indicated a downward

trend in COVID presence in the sewer samples. It was noted that the only COVID variant found recently is Omicron.

The council passed the demolition bid of \$6,825 to Stunz Construction (for the property at 807 E. Frank-

The Public Safety report

was given by Councilwoman Debbie Smith. She reported that the Clinton Fire Department is still on track to lower the ISO rating for the city. Fire Chief Mark Manuel reported to the council at the previous session a three-phase plan to get the ISO rating lower over the course of the next several years. The first two of those phases included increased staffing and the building of a training facility. The third was to eventually construct a satellite fire department. Chief Manuel spoke to the council to explain the progress this evening. He reported there was a federal grant found that would pay for the salaries (100% including clothing, insurance, etc.) of nine new fire fighters. Applicants for the grant can reapply. The idea is to get more staffing for the fire department (which is also tied to the ISO rating). Chief Manuel explained that between the building of the training facility and the ability to increase staff, he saw additional staff as the priority. Chief Manuel said that the current staff numbers are leaving the fire department personnel vulnerable - especially when the department has a rural call to go to and still needs to maintain staff at the station. At times, the fire crews are undermanned at the scene of a fire which could potentially lead to some serious consequences. "It is leaving us in potentially dangerous situations," said Chief Man-

The grant application period does not open until later this year (probably around December) and it would be another year before it would be awarded. In the meantime, even if awarded there is not a pressing population of budding firemen and women out there – and training anyone hired would still need to take place.

The Finance Committee

report was given by Councilwoman Carla Moberly. The council authorized the Clinton Chamber to proceed pursuing an EDA grant for the purpose of funding the construction of an additional road at the Gerhart Industrial Park. The grant request is for \$1.2 million. Councilwoman Also. Moberly requested that the city put \$50,000 towards GVHM's latest project: the construction of a radiation treatment facility. The measure has already been proposed to Governor Parson; it was suggested that a partnership of the county and city in regards to the project may make the American Recovery Plan Act (ARPA) grant odds for the project much better. It was reported that the land for the project was donated by Oak Star Bank and about \$3.1 million towards the project has already been raised. The proposed \$50,000 to be put towards the project from the city will come from the city's ARPA funds (which will leave about \$800,000 in reserve for other projects). The city authorized Councilwoman Moberly's

suggestion unanimously. The Mayor's Report included recommendations for appointments to the Planning Commission. Troy Bohannan, Howard Bullock, Barbara Mosely and Galen Dody were all approved by the council for appointments to that commission. Councilman Gene Henry abstained from voting on Howard Bullock's appointment, and Councilwoman Debbie Smith

abstained on the voting for Galen Dody.

New business for the council included the designation of a building commissioner for the city. City Attorney Doug Harris explained that, in the event a hearing has to be held or some official action needs taken, the city would need a designation. The council unanimously chose the Clinton City Council as a group to serve as the designated building commis-

Council adjourned to executive session at 6:48 p.m.

What is the main challenge you foresee as Mayor? And how will you solve problems that arise?

Carla- The world is an unstable place right now. We need to work together and make good decisions for our community on the things we can control.

Thomas- Trying to move beyond the way things have been done in the past; that is always the challenge. To move forward into a new way of doing things to build a brighter future for Clinton, accountability of local government will be a huge step in going forward.

What's the most important priority of our city right now?

Carla- From our largest employers to the smallest, we keep hearing about the lack of available, quality housing needed to attract and retain workers. We are seeing more business expansions with new jobs being added - with more to come. More housing, either to buy or rent, in all price ranges is critical. Some businesses have shared stories about the difficulty recruiting new employees to Clinton due to the lack of housing in all price ranges. 
The Henry County Prosecuting Attorney's Office has filed the charge of murder in the first degree against Shane Chesher, 36, of Windsor, Missouri.

Assistant Prosecutor LaChrisha Gray, who is prosecuting the case on behalf of the State of Missouri, filed the murder charge on March 15, 2022, after reviewing of the allegations presented by the Henry County Sheriff's Of-

The case stems from an investigation into a crash that occurred on March 4, 2022 involving a vehicle and a pedestrian on Jefferson Street in Windsor.

According to the probable cause statement filed in the case, the victim was struck by Chesher's vehicle after a previous altercation between the two. The victim, unfortunately, succumbed to his injuries several days

The defendant was located in the State of Kansas on March 15, 2022. Assistant

Prosecutor LaChrisha Gray sought a no bond warrant from the Henry County Associate Court in an effort to ensure Chesher's return to face this pending charge. The Court granted that request.

The Henry County Sheriff's Office transported Chesher from the State of Kansas and he is now in the Henry County Jail being held without bond.

Chesher is currently set for a bond reduction hearing in front of Judge Harold Dump on March 25, 2022 at 10:30 AM.

Andy Bailey, National Weather Service out of Pleasant Hill, MO presented Henry County Commissioners and Emergency Management with our StormReady sign. Mr. Bailey stated there were 44 counties in their warning area with less counties having the StormyReady designation than counties that do not have it, this put Henry County in the minority of counties actively supporting Hazardous Weather Warnings though StormReady.

What is StormReady®? It is a National Weather Service program designed to recognize communities (e.g. counties, universities, military bases) that have reached a high level of severe weather preparedness. To be recognized as StormReady®, a community must meet criteria established jointly between the NWS and state and local emergency management officials. These criteria include:

Establishing a local 24-hour warning point and

Having multiple ways of receiving NWS warnings Creating a system to monitor local weather/river conditions

Having multiple ways of alerting the public

Promoting public readiness through community seminars and presentations

Retirement offered time for Clark and Lois to travel and spend more time at their lake house, which was a whole family gathering spot for many years

Joining the First Baptist Church in 1955, Clark's membership spanned 67 years. Ronnie and Jeri were




Our expectation when we plant something, is that it will grow and produce fruit. But we know our responsibilities are to observe, nurture and care for these plants to be able to harvest them.



It took many volunteers and funds from the Tony Komer Foundation and the Clinton Tourism Board.



Deepwater actually led before the Shamrocks made two late free throws to beat the Demons, 63-62. Deepwater's Marvin Hills was named to the All-State team and the All-American team. He scored 2,019 points in his HS career. He was recruited by K-State and other large schools. I was told he played professionally for the KC Steers.

In 1959, the Demons returned to the postseason, coached by John Morgan with a record of 28-2. Pleasant Hope got past the Demons 41-38 mainly due to Deepwater's All-State center Rich Hendrix, getting injured in the third period. Hendrix led his team with 14 points. Deepwater was not done yet. In 1960, they returned. They were coached by John Morgan again and had an amazing record of 30-1. Unfortunately, they got stopped in the first round again. Goodman beat them 61-57. Rich Hendrix led the Demons with 15 points and received All-State honors again. Note this, the Deepwater Demons lost three post-season games by a total of 8 points. The Demons had their own demons it seemed.

Maybe you went to a school that no longer exists. Back in the day, many small schools were absorbed via consolidation. My first school, call Salem, was 'swallowed' in 1956 by Savannah. Salem was a one-room K-8 district about four miles from our small farm, and yes it was uphill both ways. I have fond memories of this beautiful "Little House on the Prairie" school. I was the best student in first grade. Of course, I was the only student in first grade; we had a total of 11 students. Sports wise I only remember recess, but no basketball team.

Beginners can learn about paddlefish and go snagging for them

The Missouri Department of Conservation (MDC) will offer a free paddlefish snagging clinic on Saturday, April 16, in Warsaw. Two sessions will be offered, but space is limited. This clinic is for newcomers to learn about paddlefish snagging and get first-hand experience. Participants will learn about snagging gear and techniques, then go snagging for two hours on the upper end of Lake of the Ozarks.

Session 1 will be from 8 a.m. to 1 p.m., and Session 2 will be from 10:30 a.m. to 3 p.m. COVID-19

safety precautions will be followed. Participants are encouraged to register in groups of two to four. Each boat for the fishing outing will include only families or a small number of friends who have signed up as a group. This program is offered to first-time participants only. MDC will pro-

vide boats and equipment. Paddlefish are a prehistoric fish and one of Missouri's largest. They filter feed on plankton and other small organisms. In the spring, they make spawning runs upstream. At Warsaw, their upstream migration out of Lake of the Ozarks is blocked by the dam for Truman Lake. The paddlefish

fishery that anglers enjoy is sustained by MDC stockings of hatchery-reared paddlefish.

Participants must have a valid Missouri fishing permit unless they fall in an exemption category. Life jackets are required when on the water. Life jackets will be available, or participants can bring their own. Youths 17 and younger must be accompanied by an adult. Besides snagging tips, participants will learn how to clean paddlefish. Attendees will meet in the Harbor Room in the lakeside Warsaw Community Building.


