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

The Missouri Board of Pharmacy and the Missouri Board of Registration for the Healing Arts are alerting license holders about a mail scam targeting licensed physicians in the state.

A Missouri licensed physician alerted the Board of Pharmacy office after receiving a letter that purported to be from the Missouri Board of Medicine. It was on official-looking paper, and contained identifying information, including a license number, registered address, and the signature of the Acting Division Director.

The letter appeared to notify the physician that his license was being suspended for illegal drug trafficking and cited federal and Missouri statutes. The letter identified an Officer in Charge from the Missouri Board of Pharmacy and the Board's phone number.

The physician called the Board of Pharmacy office to obtain verification of this action and learned this letter was not an official letter generated by either Board office.

If a licensee receives a letter from a licensing board, they are encouraged to: Call the official Board of-

fice phone number found on their website

Check for information that may seem "out of place." For instance, there is no "Missouri Board of Medicine," instead, there is a "Missouri Board of Registration for the Healing

If you are asked to provide identifying information by phone or email, DO NOT GIVE THAT INFORMATION The Missouri boards will not ask you to provide this information in this manner.

Do not provide any banking or credit card information by phone or email.

Be careful that the email addresses and web addresses contained in these

types of communications are legitimate government addresses. They should have a mo.gov in their domain name

# 14 Agency Hazmat Training Held At The Benson Center



ATTENDEES: Clinton Fire Department, Clinton Police Department, City of Clinton Missouri, Clinton School District, Golden Valley Memorial Healthcare, Henry County, Henry County 911 Dispatch, Henry County Emergency Management, Henry County Health Center, Henry County LEPC, Henry County Sheriff, Henry County Water District, Montrose Fire Department, Schreiber Foods

Imagine you are stopped at the intersection of Hwy 7 and 2nd St. in Clinton. A pickup coming into Clinton from Warrensburg on Hwy 13 begins to make a left turn onto Eastbound Hwy 7. Suddenly the pickup is broadsided by a tanker semi that ran the red light as it was travelling Westward through the intersection. What do you do?

This was the scenario that was presented to 26 representatives from 14 different Henry County agencies and businesses assembled at the Benson Center in Clinton, MO for a HazMat tabletop training.

The training scenario, led by Clinton Fire Deputy-Chief Matt Willings, began with the following objectives:

1. Determine the risks as-

sociated with the incident in this scenario and how to mitigate them with the resources immediately available to our County.

2. Identify response shortfalls and needed resources not immediately available to mitigate the incident.

3. Identify training needed, if applicable. 4. Educate ourselves on

the resources available and what agencies the resources are associated with. 5. Utilize this scenario

to prepare for similar real-world situations. INCIDENT INITIAL DE-

SCRIPTION - It is 11:30 am on a Thursday morning, temperature 65 with an expected high of 76 by 4pm. Wind is SSW at 5mph with gusts to 15mph. Traffic is normal for this time of year. Many residents are outside lice officer arrives and re-

enjoying the nice Spring weather. The Clinton School District will be releasing students early at 12:30pm for a teacher in-service.

INCIDENT MESSAGE #1 -At 11:32am many calls to 911 regarding a semi-truck having run a right light on west-bound Hwy 7 at 2nd Street having hit a pickup that had turned left off North 2nd street onto eastbound Hwy 7. Calls to 911 indicate the semi-truck had overturned. Extent of injuries is unknown. Dispatch is unable to keep any callers on the line as some state they are going to "help". Each agency was asked how they would respond given the known information at the time.

INCIDENT MESSAGE #2 - At 11:34am a Clinton po-

ports 2 vehicles involved. Vehicle #1 is a ¾ ton pickup with what appears to be an unconscious occupant in the driver's seat. The vehicle has sustained serious front-end damage and is sitting on the roadway shoulder 300 feet west of the intersection. Vehicle #2 is a pressurized tank trailer, over-turned on the driver's side and about 340 feet west of the intersection. The driver is located sitting on the concrete median. The officer notifies dispatch that a pressurized hissing sound may be coming from the tanker. He states that there is a green placard (inhalation hazard) on the trailer with the number 1005 (Anhydrous Ammonia, liquefied). The roadway is mostly blocked, but gawkers are attempting to drive through the accident area. Each agency was again asked how they would respond given the known information at the time.

INCIDENT MESSAGE #3 - First EMS units arrive on scene at 11:36am. Paramedics report a strong irritating odor while the unit exited the ambulance bay and that the odor got stronger as they approached the scene. Once again, each agency was asked how they would respond given the known information at the time.

INCIDENT MESSAGE #4 -At 11:40am, Clinton Fire units arrive on scene. Additional Clinton Police and Highway Patrol also arrive on scene. A final opportunity was given each agency to give their response given all the information available.

A followup session to review the training objectives and how the responders reacted, good or bad, was done to critique the quality of the response to this accident.

I was impressed with how keeping you, yours and the entire Henry County community safe 24/7 during an emergency is much more complicated than one might suppose. A considerable amount of coordination between agencies is required in a response to an incident of this nature.

If you know a first responder, or meet one while you are out and about in Henry County, why not thank that person for committing to the hours of training throughout the year and the potential putting of his or her life on the line to keep our community safe from the unexpected, but inevitable moments when life isn't going our way?

utive year, the Clinton School District Board of Education is prioritizing strategies to recruit and retain highly-qualified staff, and one such method is an increase to the base salary of the teacher salary schedule. This increase of \$1,142 will take effect in the 2022-2023 school year and helps to make salaries in the Clinton School District competitive with other school districts of a similar size in the region.

The Clinton School District's 5-Year Strategic Plan, developed in 2018, outlines action steps to "increase salaries to be in the average range of other districts of similar size and demographics." The Board of Education believes that a compensation schedule that is comparable to other districts will ultimately benefit all students in the district.

"As the newly established Clinton School District Board of Education charts its course for the next year, a top priority has been increasing teacher pay. Recent years have taken a toll on the energy and resources of our students and staff. Ensuring our teachers have a pay scale equitable to nearby districts allows them to secure the resources they need for their quality of life and for their families. Ultimately, more security means our teachers can better support our students," says Board of Education President, Susan Jones-Hard.

In the weeks ahead, the Board of Education will also be making adjustments to the classified salary schedules in order to raise them

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

It is hard to know where to start. There have been a ton of sports heroes that either became known by playing in Missouri or were horn and raised here



He was a star basketball and baseball player for Shelbyville High School, small town one hour west of Hannibal. He went to MU and played both sports. At 6'5" he was strong on the court scoring 1,112 points in three seasons. On the baseball field, he pitched a nohitter in 1954 leading the Tigers to the College World Series Championship. He went on to earn letters in both sports for three consecutive years, a rare

Norm played professional basketball for a short time but quickly came back to MU to be an assistant coach. (He was also drafted by MLB, but stayed only one season). He coached basketball in Iowa but later came back to Columbia to become the head coach of the basketball Tigers. He held that job for 32 years and 634 wins. His fame as the Tigers' head coach has overshadowed his personal fame on the court and the field. A true Missouri Legend.

He has been inducted into several HOF's. He still lives in Columbia. Norm, at 87, has had serious health issues, but still tries to stay

They also reviewed a request from the City of Windsor, for \$300,000.00, from the county's ARPA Fund. The request is for support of the city's Inflow and Infiltration project. They also reviewed Windsor's request of \$251,444.00, to expand broadband in the city. No action was taken.

Clerk Rick presented population data, from the 2020 Census, to the Commission. The data indicates that the South Commissioner District is currently representing a population of 12,692, vs the North District Commissioner representing a population of 9,254, a difference of 3,438. Clerk Rick shared a proposal that would shift both Walker and Davis Townships from the North to the South, and shift the 3rd Ward of Clinton from the South to the North. (Clinton's 4th Ward is already in the North District) This proposal would give the North District a population of 11,113, and the South District a population of 10,833, a difference of 280 persons. After review and discussion, Commissioner Fosnow made a motion to change the North and South Commissioner Districts, as proposed. Commissioner Lawler seconded the motion. The motion passed with a roll call vote of Fosnow yes, Lawler – yes, and Stone – yes.

Commissioners adjourned at 12:00 p.m.

### **APRIL 26** The Henry County Com-

mission met pursuant to adjournment at the courthouse in Clinton, Missouri. Those members present were: Jim Stone- Presiding Commissioner, Rick Fosnow-North District Commissioner, Dale Lawler-South District Commissioner, Rick Watson - Countv Clerk

# **Alumnus Executive Produces Marvel** Studios' Six-Part 'Moon Knight' Series

While Moon Knight first appeared in a comic book in 1975, this character may not be on the tip of the tongue in comparison to superheroes like Captain America, Spider-Man and many others who went from the printed page to the big screen. With help from a production team that includes University of Central Missouri graduate Grant Curtis, a new spotlight is shining on this unique character in the Marvel Cinematic Universe (MCU).

Curtis, who earned a master's degree in mass communication from UCM in 1997, serves as one of the executive producers for Marvel Studios' new sixpart "Moon Knight" series. He worked with individuals

such as prominent Egyptian filmmaker Mohamed Diab, who is making his U.S. directorial debut, and a cast that includes Golden Globe® winner Oscar Isaac in the title role, Ethan Hawke as Arthur Harrow and May Calamawy as Layka El-Faouly. The series was introduced March 30 exclusively on the Disney+ streaming service.

"It's different, which continues to be the success of the Marvel Studios brand," Curtis said about the series, which he describes as "a bit spookier, a little bit darker and a bit grittier" than most MCU presentations.

In the series, the audience follows mild-mannered museum gift-shop employee Steven Grant, played by Isaac, on a trek that unfolds into a psychological thriller after he experiences blackouts followed by memories of a life that far exceeds the mundane existence he has known. Steven, who has Dissociative Identity Disorder, discovers that he shares a body with his exact opposite, Marc Spector, a former marine and CIA operative who became a mercenary and ultimately the earthly avatar of Khonshu, the Egyptian god of the moon and vengeance. Steven and Marc learn how to navigate their complex identities and become part of a battle waged among the powerful gods of Egypt, with many enemies converging upon them.

Curtis' work on this project is part of a long history of involvement in film. The author of two books, his background as a movie producer has included projects such as the widely acclaimed "Spider-Man" trilogy with director Sam Raimi for Columbia Pictures, "Oz: The Great and Powerful" for Walt Disney Pictures and "Teenage Mutant Ninja Turtles: Out of the Shadows" for Paramount Pictures. He also directed, wrote and produced "Delaney," a documentary for ESPN Films "30 for 30 Shorts" about a former Kansas City Chiefs player who drowned saving a child, and was an executive producer on Disnev's "Let's Be Tigers." These are just a few of many projects in which he has been involved.

Curtis said he was excited about the opportunity to introduce "Moon Knight" to a new audience. The main character appeared for the first time nearly 50 years ago in the comic book "Werewolf by Night" (Issue 32). Development of this superhero has taken various iterations over the years, although the relationship between Khonshu and Moon Knight has remained consistent. Working hard to stay true to that relationship, Marvel Studios' production team creatively pulled together for its screen presentation several character attributes, gleaned from decades of written materials, to create one of the most unusual superheroes of all time.

"One of my first tasks was going through and reading every comic book Moon Knight ever appeared in, whether that was 'Werewolf by Night,' or whether that was his [comic book] run that started in 1980 with 'Moon Knight' No. 1," Curtis said. He added that he and the writers on this project were intrigued by the intense character study the film series offered.

The series combines adventure, drama, mystery and a bit of comedy to keep the audience engaged in each new episode. True to the comic book tradition, the screenplay weaves plenty of unpredictability into this multipart story.

"One thing the writers always do very well, just when you think you've got everything figured out on page 22, you turn to page

23 and realize that nothing you thought is as you expected, and it always keeps

you on your toes," Curtis said. "It's never a gimmick. It's always through the character's point of view as he's going on these adventures and having to try to figure out what's going on."

In addition to creating a fast-paced adventure that keeps the audience guessing, there are many other reasons the creators of "Moon Knight" are excited about this project.

"Another aspect that appealed to us is the Egyptology, and the backdrop. We all seem to be fascinated with all things Egyptian," Curtis said.

The writers' room was filled with numerous reference books on ancient Egyptian culture and deities, Curtis said. Experts in areas such as Egyptian archaeology visited with writers regularly to help ensure authenticity, and the same care was given to the backdrop. Much of the movie was actually shot at Origo Studios in Budapest,

Hungary, where there were many sound stages and access to field-specific experts who had vast knowledge of ancient statuary, pottery and hieroglyphics. A team of sculptors from Italy was brought in and spent three months creating the statues of Egyptian deities that stand in the Chamber of the Gods, a prominent setting for action sequences.

Similar attention to detail was given to helping the team develop its main characters. Curtis noted, for example, because the series addresses a mental health issue through the character of Marc Spector, the writers and the cast wanted to approach this topic with sensitivity.

"We wanted to be very reverential and respectful to a very serious issue, so we brought in consultants to help guide us on that," he said. "Our head writer, Jeremy Slater, always led the charge from day one about being authentic and respectful, and Oscar Isaac, our lead, had to act these parts on the screen in the same way."

This is the first time Curtis has worked on a multipart series. He said it was a valuable opportunity to explore his craft as a producer, but it was not without challenges, particularly considering the way filming is scheduled.

"You don't film in sequential order. You don't start on page one and shoot that on day one," said Curtis, who has devoted approximately three years to this project.

He noted that scenes are shot according to what is best for production, and sometimes a scene can be moved to a different place in the film. Such was the case for the opening scene in which Harrow is seen putting on a pair of shoes

filled with broken glass. These images were actually intended for inclusion further into the film, but were moved to the front for a more powerful effect and to provide early insight into the character of Spector.

"That scene was not supposed to go there," Curtis said. "As we were looking at the whole film in post, we realized if we put that scene up front then that would inform the audience about this character from the very first time you meet him in the Alps. You realize from the beginning that this guy is a little off center."

Curtis, who grew up in the Warrensburg area, spoke fondly about his time at UCM, where his father, Dr. Dan Curtis, taught for years as a professor of communication and was a former department chair. Grant Curtis came to UCM, known then as Central Missouri State University, in the 1990s after completing a bachelor's degree in marketing at the University of Missouri-Columbia. While working on his graduate degree at UCM, he developed close working relationships with faculty members who became his mentors.

"There were two influential teachers in particular – Keith Mellinger and Dr. John Graves. They were the reasons why I went back to UCM to get my degree. Keith was a screenwriter who got his MFA from UCLA, one of the top screenwriting schools in the world. Dr. Graves worked in Hollywood for decades on numerous TV shows. It was his knowledge and experiences in this whole community that I gravitated toward," Curtis

As he was finishing his master's degree, Curtis landed in Los Angeles in 1997 for an internship on "The Late, Late Show With Tom Snyder" and to finish work on a screenplay, which was a requirement in his graduate program. While residing in LA, a friend who lived next door told him famous director Sam Raimi was searching for an assistant. Curtis believed his opportunity to work with Raimi was a stretch, but the great director saw something in him. Curtis went from being an assistant to Raimi to much tougher decision-making roles on films such as the "Spider-Man" trilogy, "The Gift" and others. He built within five years after earning his graduate degree the kind of resume that gets noticed, leading to his selection in 20002 as a UCM Outstanding Recent Alum-

Adding "Moon Knight" to his lengthy film resume is a great source of pride for Curtis. He spoke enthusiastically about his role as an executive producer on the project and the opportunity to bring the main character to the forefront for the first time in many people's entertainment experience.

"From 1975 until now, there's been a lot of Moon Knight stories told by great artists and writers, and we think we reflected that in the Disney+/Marvel streaming episodes," Curtis said. "We think we also brought a new thread to this tale."



### **CIVIL WAR PRISONERS** AND ANDREW MC-**QUEEN OF LEESVILLE**

At various points in the Civil War, over 400,000 soldiers were held prisoner. Union and Confederate prison camps were uniformly undesirable, although some had worse reputations than others: Andersonville, for instance, is largely considered the worst of all Civil War prison camps. Somewhat different in their design, many southern prison camps were "open air" stockades; the conditions at Andersonville (an "open air" example) contributed to the disease and discomfort. Clean water and food supplies were rarely present, and the crowded conditions, without the benefit of sanitary practices, spread a lot of misery and death. By the end of the Civil War some 56,000 prisoners had perished (both sides); Andersonville, by August of 1864, held over

30,000 prisoners. Usually, however, old buildings were modified to house prisoners, and, in a few cases, islands were

converted for the purpose of holding captives - such is the case with Belle Isle. Henry County pioneer Andrew McQueen (Leesville Township) was held at two Confederate prison camps: Libby Prison and Belle Isle. Andrew McQueen, though perhaps fortunate he was not at Andersonville, still underwent con-

siderable suffering. He had enlisted in September of 1862 with the 110th Ohio Infantry (Company K). The Ohio Infantry ended up in Virginia at the crossroads town of Winchester in June of 1863.

Winchester, which Stonewall Jackson had already secured in May of 1862 by besting Union General Nathaniel Banks, was still a prime piece of real estate and part of Robert E. Lee's overall plan to take the fight to the North (Pennsylvania, Maryland, etc.).In May of 1862 Stonewall Jackson had been able to kill a third of the Union men present there, take 100 cattle, about 15,000 pounds of bacon, and somewhere upwards of a half million rounds of ammunition; the

town was firmly in Confederate hands.

By June of 1863 Stonewall Jackson was dead, and the Confederates faced a new Union Commander at Winchester. But the new Union Commander (Major General Robert Milroy) had very little to show against southern forces there, either. Major General Milroy found himself cut off, surrounded, and outnumbered. In an effort to sneak out of the predicament he found himself in, he ordered his men to leave anything that made noise behind (wagons, canons, etc.) and at 1:00 a.m. in the morning proceeded to leave the fort. Confederates under "Alleghany" Johnson anticipated his movements and left even earlier to cut him off: the result was a confused early morning skirmish where Milroy placed the 110th (and the 122nd and 123rd) in harm's way to try to break out of the Confederate hold. It was unsuccessful - Milroy and many of the Union troops escaped and fought on towards Harper's Ferry (Milroy yelling: "Men! Save yourselves!"). The Confederates only lost about 300 men and were able to inflict nearly 4,000 casualties on the Union forces. They also took 4,400 men prisoner and Andrew McQueen was one of them.

Libby Prison, where Mc-Queen was initially taken, was in Richmond. It had originally been a warehouse and through some of the barred windows the tents on Bell Isle could be seen. It is where McQueen would eventually end up. The treatment was harsh. He lost 40 pounds in 40 days. One Confederate officer had a habit of cursing at the prisoners and beating them for no reason and one Irish prisoner with Mc-Queen eventually knocked the officer senseless for his brutalities: the other prisoners did not give up the name of the Irishman that retaliated and as a result all lost food and water rations for two more days.

Prisoner exchanges were common, and McQueen was exchanged in August (1863) and returned to his regiment - he was soon sent home. In early Spring of 1864, he married his sweetheart and then re-enlisted into the 157th Ohio Infantry for 100 more days. There was a third battle for Winchester (Mc-Queen was not a part of) this time, General Sheridan of the Union Army soundly defeated Lt. General Jubal Early, who had been a part of the victorious forces the previous year at the same spot.

McQueen suffered from health problems the rest of his life because of his experience in the war but was able to eventually settle down. Initially, he purchased 80 acres in Indiana but left because of the poor condition of the land (and his health) after four years. In 1869 he came to the Leesville Township and purchased 200 acres (for \$13 an acre), bought a team of horses, some livestock, and tools. The first few years for him "were lean years." To get settled, he cut logs, trimmed and finished them, and built his first home – a two-room log cabin. However, by 1885 he was prosperous enough to possess 700 acres and was able to build a framed house. He and his wife (Sarah) had several children and Andrew served as the Justice of the Peace for Leesville Township for 20 years and taught school.

McQueen used his home as a meeting place for the Dan McCook Post #312 of the Grand Army of the Republic and continued to do so until there were no longer any Veterans of the war to meet there.
