Henry County Voters Head To Polls In Heated Primary

The voting turnout for Henry County was high, as was expected. Of the 13,573 registered voters, 34.5% cast their votes – well above projections. Although we won't know for sure until later (The Clinton Daily Democrat's news cycle closed immediately after the local polls were tabulated), Henry County favored Vicky Hartzler for the Republican candidate for U.S. Senate, and Trudy Busch Valentine for the Democratic candidate.

For State Auditor, Henry County favored Scott Fitzpatrick (2256 votes) for the Republican candidate; Alan Green was the only Democratic candidate and received 605 votes.

The Republican District 4 Representative candidate most favored in Henry County was Mark Alford with 1553 votes. Votes (for Henry County) for the other candidates were as follows: Jim Campbell, 104 votes; Rick Brattin, 1479 votes; Bill Irwin, 213 votes; Kalena Bruce, 266 votes; Taylor Burks, 176 votes; and Kyle S. LaBrue, 64 votes. For the Democrat's ballot Jack Tru-

man was favored with 604 votes and was the only candidate.

Henry County favored Republican candidate Sandy Crawford for District 28 State Senator with 1981 votes; Janet Arnold received 787 votes, and Bill Yraberry received 729 votes.

The District 126 State Representative Republican can-

didate David Kelsay received 1968 votes from Henry Countians, and Jim Kaberloh received 1840 votes.

Unopposed Republican candidates: Harold Dump (Associate Circuit Court Judge): 3264 votes; Rick Watson (County Clerk): 3418 votes; Wendi McGehee (Circuit Clerk), 3342 votes; and Gail Perryman (Recorder of

Deeds), 3315 votes.

Contested races: Presiding Commissioner – Jim Stone received 2082 votes to get the commission spot. Taylor Bush received 1753 votes.

Prosecuting Attorney – LaChrisha Gray received 2969 votes beating out opponent Zac Maggi who received 956 votes.

Who You Gonna Call? Vintage Hearse Still In The Spotlight

The iconic hearse with the red-and-white Ghostbuster logo on the door from the movie went missing a year ago in Italy, where it had been on display as a promotion for a sequel. The hearse was probably stolen, authorities say, but it puzzled them how such a recognizable ve-

hicle was taken without anybody noticing.

Even parked at Matteson Auto Repair on Ohio, Clinton's vintage hearse draws attention from passers-by, who stop and ask about it.

The hearse is a 1952 Packard that belongs to Curtis and Shelley Mills and their family, owners of the Vansant-Mills Funeral Home.

The Past In The Present: Civil War Re-Enactment

During the month of September, the Henry County Museum is bringing Civil War characters out of the history books and into the spotlight. Scheduled to speak are re-enactors and storytellers, including a Civil War doctor, a female spy and a Buffalo Soldier, plus the only female Buffalo Soldier to serve in the historic military group.

On Saturday, Sept. 17, Union soldiers will camp on the grounds of the Homestead, across from the museum complex on Franklin Street, just off the Clinton Square. The Living History Encampment includes the Missouri Irish Brigade and the 8th Kansas Infantry, according to Connie Grisier, an event organizer.

"This is an opportunity to talk to soldiers about what it was like to survive a battle," Grisier said, "and view their tents, military weapons and gear."

The idea for September's living history events originated with Luke Edwards, a museum staff member who

is doing research on the Civil War for the fall Cemetery Walk. Grisier, the museum's children's program coordinator, suggested adding speakers and Civil War re-enactors.

There is no charge to visit the encampment or attend the presentations, on Satur-

day afternoons and Thursday evenings throughout the month. They start on Saturday, Sept. 10 at 2 p.m. with Charles Cunningham portraying a Civil War doctor. Cunningham, a member of the Missouri Brigade Medical Services, will bring examples of medical equip-

ment used during the war and discuss its use.

On Thursday, Sept. 15, at 6 p.m., John Bruce rides out of the pages of history to deliver stories of the Buffalo Soldier. Bruce, a veteran, is president of the Alexander/Madison **Civil War Page 3**

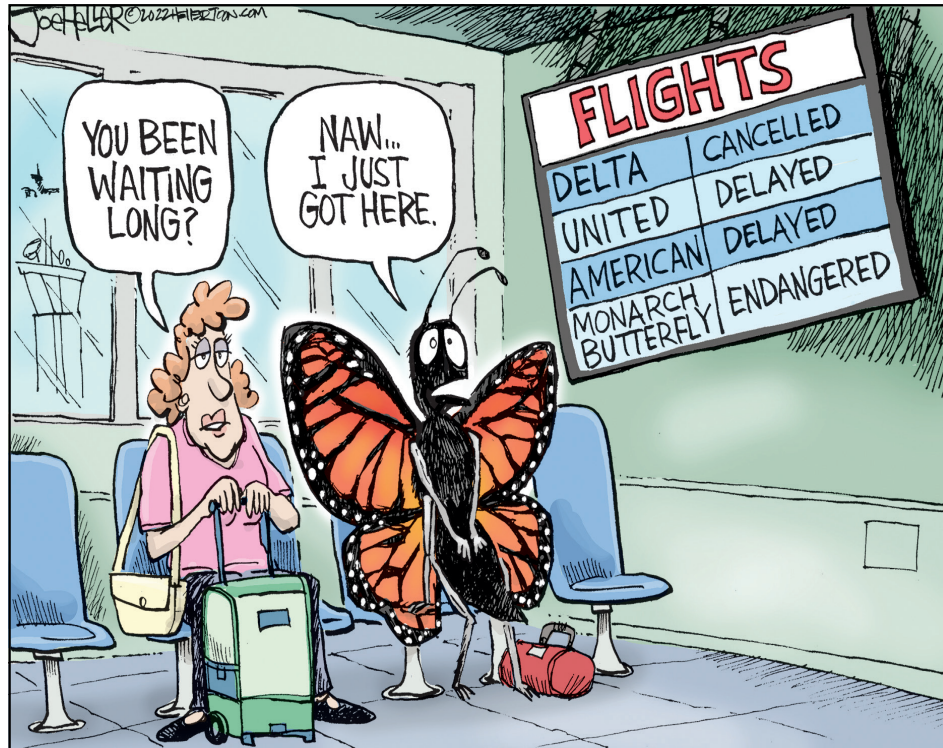

Recent Acquisitions

The Henry County Museum could not function without the donations of folks who continue to help grow our valuable collections and expand the histories of and for the folks in our county.

Recently, Dan Miller donated two paintings to the Museum which gives us an opportunity to not only show off our art collection, but fill in some important historical aspects unique to our county. Mr. Miller's donation expands an important aspect of the Parker family's artistic talents—specifically, those of E.M. "Ike" Parker's brother—Woodrow.

Woodrow, like his brother Ike, was a gifted artist. However, many of his paintings are not in Missouri. Like his brother, he went to California in the 1930s, and served in WWII. But, instead of coming back to Henry County, he made his home in Iowa. There he thrived, running a construction business, but also served as Mayor of Dike, Iowa for two terms. Whether in California, Iowa, or Missouri he continued to paint and even joined art clubs and associations. His works were often featured at art shows in Iowa, too. Woodrow's first wife passed away in 1954 and eventually he would make his way back to Clinton. In 1982 he remarried and lived in Clinton until his death in 2000. The Henry County Museum has a few works of art he made from that two-decade time period, but little from his time elsewhere. Mr. Miller's donation were paintings,

not from Iowa, but from Woodrow's early years in California. They are dated 1936 and 1937.

We couldn't be happier to have these pieces and are even happier to let patrons compare his and his brother's styles: when examined closely side-by-side, Woodrow and Ike's works are often strikingly similar in subject, theme, and tone. The main difference appears to be that Woodrow mainly worked in oil and Ike tended toward watercolor as his preferred medium.

Both of the new acquisitions are on display in the Museum Lobby Annex and, as with all of our displays, we invite you to come take a look at them and enjoy these priceless works of art for yourself.

Chapter of the Kansas City Buffalo Soldiers. With him will be George Pettigrew, great-grandson of an original Buffalo Soldier, and Donna Madison, who portrays Cathy Williams, the only woman ever to be a Buffalo Soldier.

Their motto: "Deeds, Not Words."

The encampment is the following Saturday, Sept. 17, from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m., along with a "Save the Dorman House" cookout, from 11 a.m. to 2 p.m. The cookout is a fundraiser to repair Clinton's historic ante-bellum home.

On Saturday, Sept. 24, at 2 p.m., Matthew Hulbert appears via the internet to give a virtual lecture on the topic: "Killing Quantrill: The Hunt for Missouri's Most Notorious Civil War Guerrilla." Hulbert's research included interviews with descendants of people involved in the hunt. It did not end happily for Quantrill.

On Thursday, Sept. 29, at 6 p.m., Joyce Slater tells stories in first-person of both Union and Confederate women, who were spies, nurses and wives. The code of the Civil War forbade harming women. As a result, wives were left at home to face recruitment press gangs, and served as spies or envoys, smuggling men and supplies through enemy territory.

"We hope to educate and entertain our community with this heritage project," Grisier said.

Although no Civil War battles were fought in Clinton, it was the site of a skirmish near the Dorman House, which is part of the museum complex. The house is named for Judge Jerubial Dorman, who was in charge of the Home Guard, which was required to be loyal to the Union.

When Union soldiers came to town, however, men who didn't want to be conscripted to fight hid out in the river bottoms west of Clinton. According to a former museum director, a white sheet was flown from the second floor of the Dorman House when it was safe for the men to return home.

Structural deterioration to the foundation of the Dorman House has resulted in it being closed. The Henry County Historical Society, which operates the museum, is holding a fundraiser/cookout on Sept. 17. Cost for a barbecued hamburger or bratwurst on a bun with toppings, sides of potato salad, baked beans, coleslaw and a dessert, is \$10.

The Dorman House is listed in the National Historic Register.

During September, the museum will have an exhibit, "A County Divided: The Civil War in Henry County," with artifacts from the era. The exhibit will be in the museum annex, 203 Franklin St., Clinton, Mo., 64735. There is no charge to visit exhibits in the gallery area of the annex.

Speaker presentations will be in the annex or the DeLozier Building, on the Square at the corner of Franklin and Washington. There is free parking on the street, and in the museum lot.

"The goal of the speaker series is to bring alive a significant era in history and show the effects of the Civil War on the central and western counties of Missouri," Grisier said.

Civil War September is sponsored by the Henry County Museum, the Henry County Library and the Clinton Chamber of Commerce, with support from the Missouri Humanities Council and the Missouri Speakers Bureau. Kline Spangler, president of the Henry County Historical Society board, is on the organizing committee, along with Grisier and Edwards.

Organizers hope Civil War buffs, people interested in learning more about local

history and families with students who will be studying Missouri and U.S. history will take advantage of the free speaker series and visit the encampment and exhibit.

Organizers also hope for a good turnout for Henry County Museum's Cemetery Walk in October.

Scheduled for Oct. 22 at Englewood Cemetery, the Cemetery Walk will feature actors in period costume portraying local citizens who served in the Civil War. For more information about events at the museum, call 660-885-8414.

His father bought the hearse on eBay 25 years ago, but Curtis said he doesn't remember what his father paid for it. The hearse is so rare that the National Museum of Funeral History in Houston wanted to buy it from them, Curtis said.

But the Mills did not want to let it go.

"There are only about four of them in existence," he said.

The Mills family restored the hearse and use it for funerals if people request it. He also drives it in parades, Curtis said, or just takes it for a spin round town.

And it's perfect for Halloween, when the Mills family participate in the annual "Trunk or Treat" community event, where children are invited to trick or treat at local business and church parking lots. Last year, the Mills chose a Ghostbuster theme and dressed as characters from the movie, he said. The Packard was also dressed for its star turn.

"That's the year we put the ECTO-1 plate on the front," Curtis said.

The hearse the Ghostbusters drove in the movie was a white, 1959 Cadillac Miller-Meteor Sentinel, a limo-style endloader combination, described as an "ambulance conversion." In small towns in the old days, if someone was injured, the hearse was commandeered for transport, Curtis said. My father used to tell this story from his teenage years in Licking, Mo. When his father, a doctor, had a patient who needed to go to the hospital in Rolla, Dad and Grandfather Reed had to go to the local funeral home and borrow the hearse. Then they picked up the injured person, who was loaded in the back.

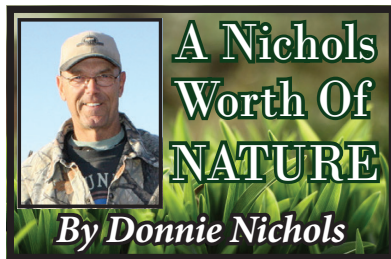
Grandfather Reed would drive like a "bat out of hell" up to Rolla, Dad said, where he would perform the necessary treatment or operation. Leaving the patient in the hospital to recover, my father would drive the hearse home, letting my grandfather climb in the back and go to sleep.

One time, Dad was hungry and stopped at a roadside diner, leaving his father sleeping in the hearse. It was a nice night, Dad said, and there were lots of people out visiting in the parking lot.

But when he came out, he said, it was dead quiet. Everyone had left.

That's odd, he thought, until he realized that his passenger was no longer in the hearse. Grandfather Reed had woken up, gotten out and walked into the diner, leaving a story in his wake that people are probably still telling their children and grandchildren.

The Mills' ECTO-1 is in the shop for a tune-up, Curtis said, which is understandable, given the miles on the engine, and stories that it has rolled up on the odometer.



Our native flora follows an ancient pattern of blooming schedules. Early in the spring the smaller short stemmed plants are the first to reach for the sun to flower and produce seed before the taller plants shade them out. It's all about harvesting energy and different species occupy different niches to capture the sun's energy and propagate.

This time of the season

there are many white native plants blooming; different species of beard tongue (Penstemon), horse nettle, poison and water hemlock, Indian plantain, Indian hemp, white indigo, daisy fleabane and others plus the non-native Ox-eyed daisy and Queen Anne's lace (wild carrot) but it is the time of the yellow flowers. Tickseed and tall coreopsis, gray headed and yellow coneflowers, brown and black-eyed Susans, compass plant, prairie dock and numerous varieties of sunflowers plus others dominate the landscape. Scattered among this wave

of yellow is the orange butterfly milkweed. Some of the pink and purple species are also beginning to bloom. Common milkweed, wild onion, tickseed trefoil (stick tights), lead plant, ironweed, glade and purple coneflowers and several species of liatris, thistle (we have "good" native thistle) and others.

Are you hunting for antiques to furnish your home, or pieces to add a focal point to a modern room? Looking for paintings, tapestries, mirrors, rugs, jewelry or vintage clothing?

Mike and Dana McIntyre are the owners of a new business on South Main that is based on an old one. It's name, Mid-MO Antiques, Furniture, Coin and Jewelry, reflects the variety of merchandise inside.

The McIntyres bought the stock of the former Hunt's Home Decorating store from Phyllis Hunt last November. Hunt's, formerly owned by Phyllis and spouse Chuck Hunt, was in the yellow-brick Burnham-Ortner row of store fronts, built in 1947, in the 300 block of South Main.

The Hunts carried Benjamin Moore Paint, window blinds and wallpaper, and offered picture framing. Phyllis Hunt added antiques to the mix after going on buying trips to the East Coast. The result: tons of stuff in storage that needs to be processed and placed on the sales floor.

"It's continually going to be coming out," Mike said. "It's going to be an adventure."

In addition to taking over the stock of Hunt's Home Decorating, the McIntyres took over the same space, which still has the "Hunt's" sign over the door. The McIntyres rent three sections of the row of store fronts along that block of South Main. The central one is their store. The one to the north is their daughter Matilda McIntyre's Photography and Design Studio (660-869-7742).

The third is stuffed with items that Phyllis Hunt bought on her antique hunting trips — furniture, paintings, prints, pottery, etc., plus bolts of upholstery fabric and wallpaper from the previous store. Mike also has the old Benjamin Moore signage from the Home Decorating store, plus a box of painters' caps and paint stirrers, Mike said.

"It's all collectible," he said, noting that vintage Benjamin Moore paint-can openers now sell for \$10.

The McIntyres have a history in the local antiques trade. For six years, they rented space at Wagon Wheel Antiques, going from one to three booths after Dana started working there one day a week. They have always bought antiques for their home, Mike said.

Mike said he sees owning the antique business as a means of transitioning into retirement. The McIntyres moved to Clinton in 1982, where Dana grew up, after Mike's job with an oil com-

pany required him to travel. Dana is the daughter of Bob and Audrey Browning and a 1971 graduate of Clinton High School. Two of the McIntyres' four children live in Clinton, as do six of their 17 grandchildren.

The McIntyres live a 1880s-era house on North 3rd, which they furnished with antique pieces. Subsequent finds circulate through their living spaces.

"I'm sitting here right now thinking about what I'd take home," Dana said. "I'd trade some of my stuff out."

The most challenging part of starting the business has been going through all the stock, Mike said. It ranges from antiques, at least 100 years old, to vintage items, defined as made between World War I through the 1970s. Stock includes old toys, knives and tobacco pipes. He has also found a lot of Disney memorabilia, and recently, found a Beatles poster when he was going through a stack of prints.

"It's a discovery," he said of sorting through stock.

They also have pottery, including Rosewell. Serving pieces of transferware, pewter and silver are displayed on antique tables throughout the store, along with lamps and vases. Brass chandeliers hang from the ceiling. A display of baby gifts is arranged on one table.

"None of it is junk," Mike said of what Phyllis Hunt acquired on her buying trips. "She had good eye."

A jewelry collector comes in to check their stock of jewelry, Mike said. Mike has always dealt in coins, he said, and is interested in buying coin estates as well as estates with antiques and furniture.

"We work with dealers, wholesale or retail," he said.

While much of the stock is from the East Coast, an item with local provenance is the shoe-shine stand from the Cozart Hotel, which used to be on the Clinton Square. The upholstery on the seats is gone, Mike said, but the stand is pink marble with brass covers for the foot stands.

"It's a classic," he said. They also have old books, including a first edition signed Harold Bell Wright, Windsor.

Mike and Dana are not discouraged by antique stores closing in Clinton and the area, they said. While Wagon Wheel Antiques is still rolling along at 219 E. Douglas, between 2nd and 3rd, the last antique store on the Square has closed, as has the large antique store on Highway 7 South, near the Bucksaw turn.

Instead, they see it as creating an empty space in the market.

"It was an opportunity for

us," Dana said. The McIntyres are open by appointment. Call 816-

289-0065. They hope to be open on regular days by September.

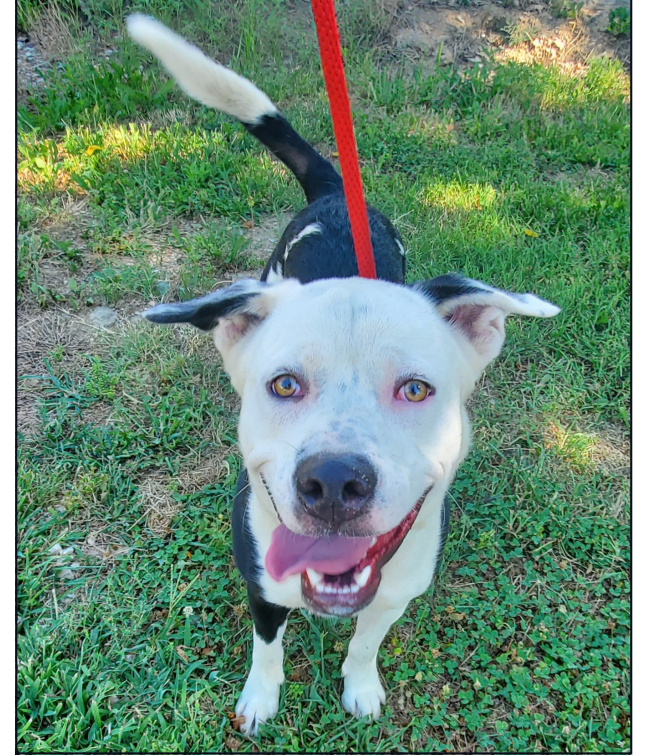

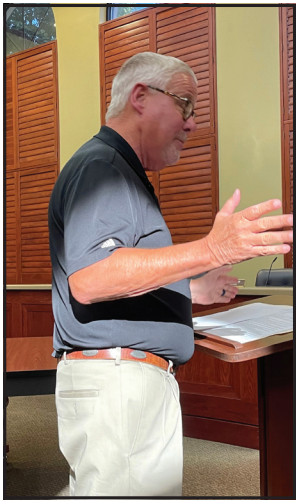

'Project Bond' Should Be Breaking Ground Near the End of the Year

The Clinton City Council met in open session July 19 at City Hall. Prior to the meeting the Building Commission convened; the meeting was very brief as there were no changes from the previous meeting to report, and the commission adjourned a few minutes after opening.

The regular city council meeting was called to order by Mayor Carla Moberly; absent were Councilpersons Debbie Smith and Roger House. Following the approval of the previous meeting's minutes and the saying of the Pledge of Allegiance, a report from Economic Development Director Mark Dawson was heard. He kept his report brief – he reported the economic team had followed up on eleven leads this year so far and that "Project Bond" should be breaking ground near the end of the year. He also reported "Project Queen" was still being pursued. The project has been alternately off and on for a while now: "This project has more lives than a train full of cats," said Dawson. He also reported expansion projects of TC Continental and that the Henry County Health Center should start construction this fall on their new building. He also reported that, at last, he was able to secure a housing senior housing study. Dawson has been trying for a few years to secure this study. "Things are going well," he concluded.

Councilman Cameron Jackson gave the Public Works report: he said the Calverd Pump Station replacement bids for two pumps would cost \$149,000 and that the delivery date for actuator replacements at the Waste Water Treatment Plant was 17 weeks. The sewer surveillance project, looking for COVID traces in the sewer supply, did not indicate any the new variants of COVID, but did show a slight "uptick."

A start date for the Franklin Street Bridge Project has been tentatively announced for August 15. It was also reported that the initial cost of \$100,000 (the city's portion) for railroad crossing repairs was no longer required. Reported, too, was that the street sweeper for the city was out of commission (and awaiting parts) as is the

city's boom-mower.

The open-top trash containers located at the Transfer Station were approved to be declared surplus property to be sold. The roll-off style containers have been repaired multiple times and are no longer deemed safe for use. Dates for the closing of the Community Center's gym for repairs were reported. The floors will be re-done, and repairs start August 11. It will re-open on August 22 (for complete closure schedule contact Parks and Rec). A short discussion about potential shoe requirements while in the gym was held. It was reported that a repair to one of the Artesian Park restroom toilets will be effected after some fireworks were flushed during Olde Glory Days events.

The Park Board had met to discuss the design for the bathhouse rehab project at the outdoor pool but did not have a quorum. The bathhouse option design the council approved will largely leave the shape of the original building unchanged, but with modifications and upgrades throughout the interior.

A motion to declare a 2003 F-150 with 80,000+ miles surplus property and for sale was made and approved by the council. Midwest America Pool's work on the outdoor pool is not technically complete yet: anchors which hold the ropes that separate the deep end of the pool from the other portion will need to be repaired/replaced. The matter may have to wait until the pool closes for the year. Retainer fees have been withheld from Midwest America Pool until the repairs are effected.

In regards to a request at a prior council meeting to determine ownership of the Sweeney-Owen Cemetery (by Nick Smith), the city attorney has been investigating the deeds for the property in question. The assessor's office did provide the documents for review, however, they are quite old and hard to read. A request for other documents has been made. It was also reported that Code Enforcement will be taking another look at junk vehicle violations.

The Public Safety Committee report was given by Councilman Gene Henry. He reported the police department is down one full time employee (and struggles to fill that position). Fire Chief Mark Manuel (present at the meeting) reported the promotion of three new firemen in rank because of recent departures at the department. He reported the hiring of one additional fireman as well. "They will fill these roles very well," said Chief Manuel in regards to the promotions and new hire.

Councilman Daniel Wilson gave the Public Works report. Since it has been four years since the city adver-

tised for bids for banking services, it was time again to do so. Advertising for those bids will begin soon (an August 11 deadline).

Mayor Moberly's report included the recognition of the hard (and extra) work put in by city staff. "Lots of departments are short of help. Your hard work does not go unnoticed," she said. She also wished to reiterate that the city's work

in decreasing workman's comp claims was something to be proud of. In fact, the city recently won an award for having the most decreased claim amounts in the state.

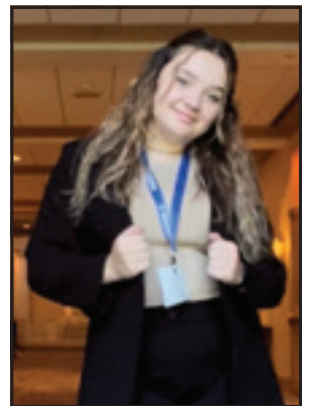
The City Administrator reminded the council of the second budget work session coming up and the Clinton City Council adjourned to executive session at about 6:30 p.m.

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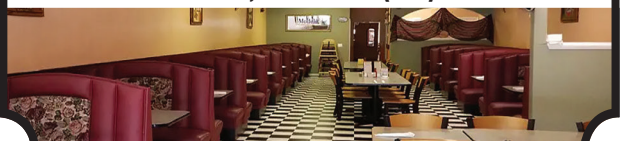
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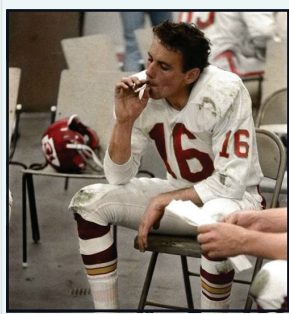

OK, quick... name the top All-Time Chiefs QBs. Most would, of course, think of Mahomes, Trent Green, Joe Mantana, Alex Smith and I hope, Lenny Dawson

(Leonard Ray Dawson). The other QBs would come in second, and there is a lot of them. Remember Rich Gannon, Matt Cassel how about the Chiefs very first QB, Cotton Davidson. I always liked Elvis Grbac, mainly because of his name. Back to Lenny 'The Cool' Dawson.

Lenny was born in Ohio in 1935, the seventh son of a seventh son. A great HS athlete, getting All-State in football and basketball. Dawson was recruited by Ohio, but picked Purdue (Indiana) largely due to his budding friendship with

Hank Stram. Years later this friendship with Stram changed his life. Lenny in his sophomore year threw four TD passes to beat Missouri 31-0 in 1954. If you remember that then you are old. He was drafted by the Steelers, but with no success. He was traded to the Cleveland Browns, but still no success. Asking for a release Dawson signed with the AFL Texans in 1962 and you might remember, he finally had success, Quite a bit of it. He was the league MVP in 1962. He led the Texans to three league titles. The Texans moved to KC to become the Chiefs. Lenny kept getting wins. From '62 to '69 Dawson threw more TD passes than any other pro QB. "Lenny the Cool" as his teammates called him, took the Chiefs to the first Super Bowl in 1967. Losing to the Packers (35-10), but they came back to win Super Bowl IV in 1970 beating the Vikings 23-7. Hank Stram was carried off the field but Lenny was the MVP. Lenny had few injuries (the new moving pocket helped a lot) but in

"We are so excited to help grow this already successful program that took four kids to state last year," says Jake and Melana.

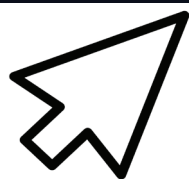

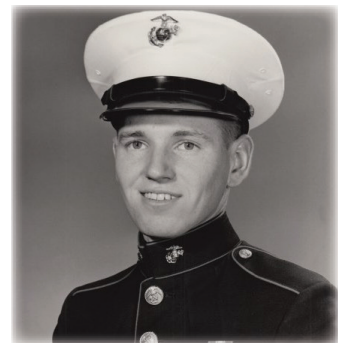

PRAY BUT DON'T BEG

In Luke 11, in response to a disciple's request for prayer instructions Jesus told the following story. Some guests stopped by a man's house unexpectedly. As can happen to anyone, the man's cupboard was bare. In the ancient East, failing to host visitors adequately was considered grievously rude.

The would-be host went to a neighbor and asked to borrow bread to feed his unexpected visitors. The neighbor had already gone to bed and provided the needed bread only because the neighbor-in-need would not stop knocking/asking.

Using this parable, our temptation is to assume God can be persuaded to do our bidding by much supplication. That would make God a reluctant provider and us beggars. That is not a Biblical picture of God or us.

While Jesus certainly wants us to be faithful in prayer, in the same passage of scripture He gives us His understanding of prayer. Long prayers are not necessarily better than short ones. Jesus Himself said prayer is not answered by much speaking. (Matthew 6:7/8). In other words, long prayers are not necessarily better than short ones.

In this same passage, Luke 11, Jesus taught us to pray like one talking to a loving father. If we pray for something we want but the Father knows we do not need, He surely will not give it. If we ask for something that is wrong, the Father whose task it to teach us ethics will refuse.

When I was child, I awoke one morning and discovered a huge cavity in one of my teeth. One of the few things I feared at that time was going to the dentist. In those days it was very painful. For weeks I would begin and end each day praying the cavity would go away. As you might expect, God did not answer that prayer.

When at last I had courage enough to tell my parents, my father took me to the dentist who filled the cavity. Two weeks ago, I finally had that tooth extracted. After confessing my need to my father, the tooth was repaired and served me more than seventy years.

We Christians should pray, i.e., talk to the Father faithfully; but there is no need to beg. God knows our need.



Printer's Devil

Not long ago, a woman from Willard, MO. (Joanne Little) called me: she told me that her family has a painting of the residents and "poor" farm that used to be in our county. The painting was made by, if she remembered correctly, the cook at the poor farm. Joanne is in her late 80s and her folks ran the farm. The painting was made on a green, canvas window blind and has since been framed and now hangs in her daughter's home. Another neat fact about Mrs. Little: her great grandfather was Andrew McQueen. She was tickled that she found an article in The Clinton Daily Democrat about him – and even a photo of he and his wife.

But, the Henry County Farm history is just as fascinating. Here is a little information about it:

The Henry County "Poor Farm" was located a few miles northwest of Clinton; the structure is no longer there, but there was a main residence, and three buildings behind the main residence as well as a brick building which had 24 rooms (which had been added in the late 1880s or early 1890s); that structure is still there today. Two of the out-buildings had two rooms, and one of those also had a cellar. Of the two room structures, one was for those with more severe mental health problems [An 1886 article in The Clinton Eye described it as "the crazy house."] In 1886 all the grounds and structures, including the main residence, were in excellent shape. In a tour of the facilities, the then editor of the The Clinton Eye described it as having a "beautiful lawn." We do know that in 1886, the man who ran the farm portion of the County Farm was T.C. Hemphill; the physician and superintendent was Dr. H.P. Gilkeson. At that time there were seven residents: an

aged (82-year-old) German man, a 62-year-old man from Kentucky who, although considered harmless, had "caused considerable trouble" at times. There was one young man of 21 who had epilepsy, two blind residents, one of which was African American, a 53-year-old man from Missouri who had only been there a month, and one man from Virginia who had also only been there a short time – he was 78 years old.

In 1886, the farm possessed four work mules and ten head of cattle. They had 35 head of hogs and about 15 tons of hay with 800 bushels of corn. That year they had planned on putting out 20 acres of oats. They also had about 30 acres of wheat planted.

Often the folks who lived at the farm did not meet the criteria for an asylum but had to be placed somewhere. The farm's grounds were about 160 acres total. There is an article from the 1930s about the residents at the farm being taken to town by bus to see the Christmas lights and decorations about. It was recognized in 2013 that there were several unmarked graves located on the grounds as well.

The idea that Henry County should take care of such citizens was established at the May term in 1837 by the court. The body that oversaw funding for these cases, and eventually the farm, became the Henry County Commission. The first person taken under charge of the county was a man named George Manship who was blind and homeless. In 1846, the court ordered that 13-year-old Elijah Gates be bound to blacksmith Asaph Bates, be taught the blacksmith trade and also taught to read and write. He was to be looked after until the age of 21 at which time he should be given two new suits, \$10 in currency, and a Bible. Initially, people put

under charge of the county were bound to someone for a period of time until their situation could resolve or otherwise be taken care of. It was not until 1871 that the County Farm itself came into existence. The 160-acre plot was purchased by the county at the April term of the court from Frederic Crissman for \$7,200. At that time, Bob Allen was the superintendent put in charge, and Dr. J.W. Stewart was the attending physician. The farm portion was managed by a third person, D.E. Henry.

Not long after its establishment (by about 1880), it became tied to the state asylum - I suppose as a way to either help house or otherwise defer some people who might not quite fit the description for that asylum setting, but who still needed assistance or who were incapable of living on their own. It appears that, at one time, the County Farm did fill the role of taking on some of the more "violent insane" although never in great numbers (in 1883 there were five). The most populous of residents continued to be those who were destitute, disabled, or somehow mentally incapable of self-care. By 1883 there were 40 residents, but the number had been as high as 60.

It was noted that a cemetery was located somewhere on the northwest portion of the farm and in 1883 there were six buried there; that number would grow over the years; none of the graves are marked today but it is recognized they exist and we know that there are over 50.

The farm was meant to be self-sufficient and would be added to. As mentioned above, in the 1880s it also had a brick building added which contained 24 rooms, eight of which were cells. In the early 1880s, Dr. Poague looked after those inmates.

The stories of some of the folks there are quite sad, but interesting, nonetheless. Some of the 1880 census of residents/inmates included: Joseph Biggs who was infirmed and "his own received him not." A man named Jerry Caldwell who would wear a funnel-shaped paper hat and run around with it on. He, at one time, demanded money from a Windsor Bank cashier. He was considered non-vio-

lent. Several were simply listed as "crazy" or demented. In some cases, the women were listed as "a tramp." In many cases their exact ages were unknown and sometimes descriptions only included their name and, for instance, "little girl, foolish."

A few residents of the farm had odd enough behavior that the whole town remembered them: Fielding Means, who the town called "the wild man from Borneo" was often seen coming to and from town with a mule and water barrel from Town Creek, at one time ran his mule (and barrel) around the square yelling "the bush-whackers are coming."

Some were listed as having "consumption" and others as paupers. Paralytics were also found among the lists of residents and sometimes those who were blind. Occasionally the identifier for the person was "outcast" as was the case for Emma Williams and her baby boy; the boy died one morning and was taken away with much grief to the mother. Some of the residents were listed as "idiot." Ira Foster was one such resident: born in Germany she fell headfirst from a hayloft which affected her considerably. "Now grown to womanhood, [she] goes crooning and staring about the premises of the county farm."

A contract from June of 1937 is found among the museum archives. The contract appears to allow Mrs. Randolph act as superintendent of the County Farm to fill out the remaining term of her husband's contract in that capacity (it appears HarveRandolph passed away). She was to complete his original term to February 1938 and be paid \$60 per month salary. As the superintendent, she would continue to pay the help, manage the farm, raise the crops, and furnish and feed all who were on the farm which included the indigent poor confined to the home.

It appears the last burial on the property was in 1932; the list of those buried there is incomplete, but in all there were at least 50 known – none of the graves are marked. The brick building that housed 24 is still extant, although not visible from the road.
