Meet The People Who Work On Thanksgiving

Thanksgiving. A day to be with family, have a day off, maybe watch the Macy's Thanksgiving Day parade in your pajamas while sipping coffee, the smell of cooking turkey wafting through the

Not everybody has that luxury.

For troopers at the Missouri State Highway Patrol, medical personnel and hospitality workers, it's just another day at work.

Thanksgiving isn't the busiest day for the highway patrol, according to Sgt. Bill Lowe of Troop A, who is based in Lees Summit. That's the Wednesday before Thanksgiving and the Sunday after Thanksgiving, he said.

"The travel day before Thanksgiving and the Sunday after Thanksgiving, everybody is required to work," Sgt. Lowe said.

That means all 120 uniformed officers of Troop A, which serves 10 counties, including Henry and Benton. They are out assisting motorists, enforcing speeding laws, addressing hazardous moving situations and stopping drunk drivers, Sgt. Lowe said, as well as responding to acci-

Troopers work day shift, he said, starting as early as 6 a.m. and going to 4 p.m, or the evening shift,

4 pm. to midnight. To have Thanksgiving dinner with family, they schedule it around their shift, he said, although some use their lunch breaks to be with family.

"You do it whenever you can, like any job where you work every day," he said. "It's a normal day."

Out at the Parkfield Inn, just off Highway 13, Thanksgiving is also just another day at work, according to manager Michelle Carroll. She oversees a staff of 14 at the Clinton location and 11 at the Warsaw Parkfield Inn, she said.

On Thanksgiving, five or six staff members have to work, plus two or three housekeepers, she said. The desk clerks work in three shifts — 6 a.m. to 2 p.m., 2 p.m. to 10 p.m., and 10 pm. to 6 a.m.

"It just comes with the job," she said. "Most people in the hospitality industry know it's 24/7. Our doors never close."

Crews at LifeFlight Eagle work even longer shifts, so the company contributes towards providing a Thanksgiving dinner at their base, which is like a small apartment. LifeFlight has four bases, at Clinton, Harrisonville, Odessa and Chillicothe. Each crew consists of three people -- a pilot, who works a 12-hour shift, a flight nurse and a flight paramedic, who both work 24-hour shifts.

"The crew will make themselves a Thanksgiving meal, but have to be ready to go at a moment's notice if they get a call," said Pat Dougherty, director of business development. "They may come back to a raw turkey."

Some crews opt to do a barbecue or Italian meal, he said. Around holidays, they see a lot of accidents, plus heart attacks and strokes.

"It's not uncommon to see those conditions emerge after the holiday," he said. "People look forward to being with family and then are let down afterwards.

across the region— flu, respiratory cases and Covid," he said. "Being with family just compounds it."

Michelle said Parkfield Inns are busy year round, so there is no down time. They do decorate for Christmas, she said, and have a Christmas party for staff, but Thanksgiving pretty much passes like any other day.

"We'd like to be with family, yes, but this is our job," she said. "We're a family

Paws, wild plums and hickory bark, plus pecans and walnuts.

"These are different flavors than most people have had," Ginger Miller said. "People either love them or hate them."

Hunter Hodge, 7, gave it a thumbs up.

"I liked it all," he said.

Hunter and his mother, Kristin Hodge, came from Lowry City for the workshop, along with friends Eli, 12, and Ethan, 10, and their mother, Nicole Neeld. The Neeld family lives on 20 wooded acres near Osceola, where she homeschools the two boys.

"We would like to know what we can find on our land," Nicole said, noting they have black walnut and persimmon trees, and have planted PawPaws and elderberry.

When learning about foraging, the first thing to talk about is safety, Ginger said. Properly identifying a tree or plant is paramount, she said, noting that she always checks multiple guides. She recommends "Wild Edibles" by Jan Philips, which Ginger has downloaded on the MDC website (go to mdc.mo.gov and put "Wild Edibles" in the search bar. The MDC office in Clinton has numerous resource books on tree and plant identification, she said. She also recommends "Foraging the Ozarks," by Bo Brown, whose new book, "Foraging the Central Plains," is coming out soon. Ginger also makes sketches of plants, which she recommends to help develop your eye for details.

The second thing is to be mindful of your surroundings, Ginger said. She does not forage near roadways, railroad tracks and agricultural areas, because she doesn't know what's been sprayed there.

'You need to ask yourself, "Is this a place where this plant should be?" she said.

Her third rule: when tasting something new, take tiny amounts of it or rub it on your lips. If it causes a tingling sensation, you may be allergic to it and should not eat any more of it. Try one new thing at a time.

"If you learned one new plant a week, you'd have 52 new plants to eat by the end of the year," Ginger

Ginger said people who moved to the Missouri territory learned from indigenous people what could be gathered and eaten here.

"They used nuts for a lot of things, and parts of trees," Ginger said.

The Clinton area is the second best place in the country for pecans, she said, with Bates County being the best. Pecan trees are tolerant of flooded areas, and the nuts float, so spread around the floodplain, creating groves of pecan trees. The Clinton area is first for walnuts, she

All hickory nuts are edible, although some are sweeter than others. Boiling shagbark hickory bark to make syrup is easier than tapping a maple sugar for sap. Ginger said, but can have a rougher taste. Other plants are edible, but may be too mucilaginous or bitter.

"There is a difference between what you can eat and what is enjoyable to eat," Ginger said.

This is the first year she and Kara have given the Tasty Tree Treats workshop. They presented it twice in Warsaw on Nov. 15 at the Lost Valley Hatchery, receiving rave reviews, she said, and twice on Nov. 16 in Clinton.

Along with learning about foraging for tasty treats, people attending the free workshop were treated to plates full of goodies thumbprint cookies topped with jelly that Kara made from wild plums, holiday cookies and fudge made with chewy pieces of red persimmon pulp, hickory nut sandies, shagbark hickory syrup, candied pecans and walnuts.

The moist banana/Paw-Paw bread was a particular favorite. PawPaw, Ginger explained, is the state fruit tree of Missouri, and Missouri's only native tropical fruit tree, having survived from warmer times out of 2,000 species that once flourished here. For those who only know of Paw-Paws from the "The Pawpaw Patch" song, which children used to sing in grade school, the fruit is about the size of a potato, and tastes like a combination of banana, mango and pineapple, Ginger said. It needs to be peeled, rinsed and the large seeds removed, she said.

Tasty Tree Treat tasters also tried a persimmon, which is similar to a fig in texture and not sour when fully ripe. The flat brown persimmon seeds are used to predict the weather, Ginger said. When split open, the inside of the seed shows the small white shape of a knife, fork or spoon. The knife predicts cutting through a lot of ice, Ginger said, the fork denotes a bountiful harvest, and the spoon means

"We always hope for forks," she said. "We've been seeing a lot of spoons."

Treats were served by Roxanne Stockdall, Kathy Allen of Windsor, and Jeff Steffens, who are members of the Hi Lonesome Chapter of Missouri Master Naturalists, based in Cole Camp. The chapter covers four counties, Roxanne explained, and is sponsored by the University of Missouri Extension and the Missouri Department of Conservation. Master Naturalists take 11 weeks of classes, go on field trips, and help with everything from native gardens and bird and reptile surveys to

prescribed burns and prai-

rie maintenance, she said. "You can find something to do about anything you are interested in," she said.

"We're always learning." The MDC is planning more new workshops, Ginger said, including using natural plant dyes, making baskets from natural materials and sowing winter seeds. Nathan Betterncourt of Tri-Lakes Fly Fisher attended the workshop to learn more about edible plants, and helped serve treats. He is planning on offering a workshop on tying flies for fishing, he said.

A unique experience coming up on Dec. 17 at Lost Valley Hatchery: MDC is offering "Fishing with Santa." Mrs. Claus will also be there, Ginger said, and the trout pond will be open for fishing.

Umbarger of Blue Springs said much the same thing. "I was in one pro's boat, and he didn't even know how to turn on his fish finder, without thinking about it."

To help this, Angler's Port Marine is holding a series of seminars focusing on the newest fishing electronics. The Lowrance and Humminbird seminars have concluded, and one on Garmin products has been scheduled for February 11.

Even though the two seminars are over for this year, the Garmin seminar in February is worth attending as it will go over areas that pertain to all fishing electronics, regardless of brand.

The reality of modern fishing electronics is that all units function at a level that is beyond what most anglers expect, and it often takes a conscious effort to understand and interpret what the fishfinders show. And until that effort is made, the anglers are "wasting their money," said Umbarger.

He pointed out that electronics often are 30 percent of the cost of a new boat, and if you don't uti-

lize all of the features you need, then it is a waste.

The Humminbird seminar provided a good foundation for using some f the features as well as interpreting the images they provide. It was oriented to people who currently own Humminbird sonar/GPS units including some of the forward-facing, all-around viewing technology that show things that are happening all around the boat, not just under it.

The Lowrance units, in contrast, don't have that option but can show what is off the one side or the other as well as below the boat. When equipped with the appropriate gear, Lowrance units also have forward-facing sonar that shows the angler what is ahead of the boat—both structure and fish.

Umbarger pointed out how the angler can use the forward-facing sonar to mark the fish ahead of the boat as well as its distance and direction, making it possible for the fisherman to cast directly to a specific fish. With the right lure, one that shows up in the sonar imagery, it's also possible to watch the lure

descend to the fish and judge the fish's reaction to the lure.

While these two seminars are over, there are plans to repeat them again next year, including other seminars.

The Garmin seminar scheduled for next February is just he start of the season—or it might be regarded as the end of the 2022 seminar series, granted a bit late.

Humminbird's Van Natta said that he'd be back with an event that will help fishermen understand.

Recognizes Antibiotic Awareness Week

"Appropriate dosing and duration of treatment are paramount in preventing resistance to antibiotics. It is the responsibility of those that prescribe, dispense and administer these medications to ensure we comply with that."

Ucm Announces In-State Tuition Rate For Military And Veteran Dependents



AS A CAMPUS LEADER who frequently engages with individuals who serve their country, Air Force veteran Courtney Swoboda, director of Military and Veteran Services at the University of Central Missouri, spoke to members of the Leadership Missouri program this fall about different ways UCM assists active duty military members, veterans, and their families in pursuit of a higher education.

While the University of Central Missouri has a longstanding commitment to making higher education more affordable for individuals who currently serve in the military as well as veterans, UCM is not forgetting the families of those who dedicate their lives to this country. When it met on campus recently, UCM's Board of Governors approved a recommendation to expand the university's in-state tuition rates to dependents of service members and veterans.

Bill Hawley, vice president for finance and operations at the university, presented the dependent tuition proposal to the board, noting that it aligns with best practices and also is in compliance with Veterans Affairs (VA) requirements related to students who are using transfer of entitlement under Post-9/11 GI Bill® and the Survivors and Dependents Educational Assistance Program. Following board approval, it is now effective for fall 2023.

This measure benefits dependents of active duty, guard, and reserve members of the military regardless of the state where the military member is serving. It also applies to dependents of veterans who do not have VA educational entitlement, and to dependents who have exhausted their VA educational entitlement, according to Hawley.

ment, according to Hawley. UCM's Office of Military and Veterans Services will manage the new initiative, which is expected to contribute to the institution's reputation as a university committed to creating a military friendly environment.

This reputation was validated earlier this year when the university received the 2022-2023 Military Friendly® School Gold designation from VIQTORY Media. It also was named a Best College for Veterans by U.S. News & World Report.

UCM has a strong relationship with individuals who serve in all branches of the military. While it is in close proximity to Whiteman Air Force Base and offers courses at the base, it has online course and degree offerings that can reach individuals across the globe, including those military members who may be deployed. The university also offers instate tuition for all active duty and military veterans and a Military Tuition package that helps reduce costs not covered by traditional military benefits. Additionally, it provides a Command Pass that enables military members enrolled at UCM

'Nothing New To Report' From The Dangerous Buildings Commission

The Clinton City Council met in open session Tuesday, November 15, at city hall. The meeting was preceded by the convening of the Dangerous Buildings Commission (chaired by Councilman Daniel Wilson). The meeting was short: "I have nothing new to report," said City Administrator Christy Maggi. "It is in a 'holding pattern'; they are still waiting for the insurance companies to generate reports." The body deliberated for a minute about the next best date to meet and decided not to dissolve the commission. The next meeting for the commission will be at the January 17 council session. Mayor Carla Moberly called the regular council session into order: Council persons Roger House and Rick Pereles were absent. Following the saying of the Pledge of Allegiance, the previous meeting's minutes were accepted as written.

A personal appearance was made by Joyce Puckett, who spoke at the previous council session. She told the council she was following up, but that the previously reported problem was still persisting. Puckett again reported that the issue of dogs barking nightly at the animal shelter was ongoing and provided an audio recording for the council to listen to. The disruptions are still mainly between 10 pm and early morning hours and appear to be related to when staff enter the animal shelter at those times; Puckett is still keeping a log of the disruptions. C.A.R.E. posted a statement about the housing of six dogs in the outside kennels "due to being full." However, Mrs. Puckett again suggested the use of bark collars, muzzles and even that euthanizing 10% of the dog population at the facility would keep CARE in the "no kill facility" boundaries. Mayor Moberly asked if Joyce had met with the C.A.R.E. Board: 'No," she replied. Councilman Gene Henry said he was supportive of Puckett's requests/concerns and suggested it be referred to the appropriate committee for action; the matter will appear on the Public Safety committee agenda.

The Public Works report was given by Councilman Cameron Jackson. Following the lengthy discussion about cost cutting measures for the Artesian Pool Project at the last council meeting, a resolution with those amended agreements was presented to the council and approved (Resolution No. 30-2022). The amended contract was approved by the council. A change order (for \$11,000) was approved by the council regarding the concrete approaches on the recent Third and Eighth Street side street approaches. Councilmen Gene Henry and Daniel Wilson asked several questions about the change order for clarification: it appears that the approach distances were not a known factor when the water company made repairs on those streets. The concrete portions were made at that time using without finishes because of that – hence, the change order to effect the paving to those approach-

The upper level pump replacement at the Waste Water Treatment Plant will be \$62,000; the originally budgeted amount was \$46,000, however price increases are affecting the replacement costs. The pump is an essential part for the function of the Waste Water Plant and the council approved the purchase. Also, the council approved the replacement of

the UV system at the Waste Water Plant (also necessary for for the plant's function) for \$20,400 (through Trojan Technologies).

The delayed city wide clean-up, usually held in the Fall, will now be held in the Spring of 2023. Councilman Jackson reported that the Sewershed monitoring program at the Waste Water Treatment Plant (monitoring COVID materials) was slightly up, but "nothing to be alarmed about." The roof replacement at the plant has been completed and he also reported that the Compost Site will be closed Thanksgiving but will return to normal operation Saturday, November 26.

Under Community Development, it was reported that the planning commission will be hearing a matter on 3rd story height restrictions in town. The matter will appear before the council at the December 6 meeting. The changes are being considered because of improved capabilities of the Clinton Fire Department to reach higher structures.

A review of the standards for street, alleys, curb/gutter, and driveways will also be going to the planning commission. It was proposed that the alleyways be struck from the revision process as there are very few in town. This, too, will be on the December 6 council agenda.

The city is currently working with MoDOT on proposed revision to the Street Map here in town. The reclassification of some of the streets is necessary to update standards of streets of concern: particularly, Price Lane, Vansant Road and, potentially others (such as Hillcrest Drive). The city may employ counters at various streets to get a better idea of the needs in certain areas.

Councilman Gene Henry gave the Public Safety Committee report: a request from Clinton Main street to close a portion of the downtown square on November 25 (for the annual Lighting Ceremony) was approved. Also, permission was granted for the Clinton Fire Department to use the property (scheduled for demolition) at 1701 Vansant Road for training purposes.

American Recovery Plan Act grants are available there are three grants of particular interest for the Clinton Fire Department and the Clinton Police Department (which have been applied for). The fire department would like to use the grant money to purchase a digital fire extinguisher training tool, and Clinton PD would like to purchase AED's and use the remainder of the money to upgrade their in-car

computers.

The Finance Committee report, given by Councilman Daniel Wilson, included the report that the switch from Equity Bank to Hawthorn Bank has been time consuming. Also, a matter concerning the pricing of materials for the City Hall roofing project will appear on the agenda at the next council meeting.

Mayor Moberly wished to thank all of the people who serve on the 55 or so commission boards for the city and also wish everyone in general a "Happy Thanksgiving." She reported, too, that the city has gotten several compliments about the Third and Eighth Streets' paving.

City Administrator Christy
Maggi reported that, other
than some recent weather delays affecting the
concrete work, the Franklin Street Bridge project
is moving along on time.
She also reported that the
grants the city submitted
on through the Department of Natural Resources

will be announced Friday (November 18). The results will be made known at the next council meeting.

Before adjourning, Councilman Gene Henry complimented the staff at Parks and Rec for changing light

bulbs and improving the brightness at the Community Center.

As there was no unfinished or new business, the Clinton City Council adjourned at 6:50 p.m.



The Missouri State Highway Patrol and the Missouri Department of Transportation continue a special education and enforcement campaign titled, "Show-Me Zero Fatality Reduction Effort," aimed at reducing fatalities on Missouri's highways. This campaign which began in April 2022, shines a light on drivers who are impaired, distracted, and driving above the posted speed limit. It also focuses on seat belt use.

The Show-Me Zero Fatalities campaign is taking place on interstate corridors in St. Louis and Kansas City with the highest crash numbers and instances of traffic violations. From 2019-2021, there were a combined 22 fatal crashes and 105 serious injury crashes within the selected corridors.

Since April 2022, law enforcement officers have targeted these areas in a focused education and enforcement effort.

In Jackson County, law enforcement officers continue to focus efforts on the following corridors:

- I-70: mile marker 17-22 (west city limits of Blue Springs to east city limits of Blue Springs)
- I-70: mile marker 10.5-17 (west city limits of Independence to east city limits
- of Independence) • I-470: mile marker 5-10A (CST View High Drive
- to Colbern Road/I-470) In St. Louis County, law enforcement officers con-

tinue to focus efforts on the following corridors:

· I-270: mile marker 28-33 (Elizabeth Avenue to Lilac Avenue)

· I-170: mile marker 4.5-9.5 (Hazelwood city limits to Vinita Park city limits)

· I-55: mile marker 197-201B (I-270 ramp to Weber Road)

· I-270: mile marker 13-19 (Route AB ramp to west city limits of Maryland Heights)

The Patrol and MoDOT are working on a dashboard report that will provide real-time information on speeds in segments of the corridors to help ensure the data driven enforcement efforts are focused in the most needed areas. A traffic safety presentation about the Show-Me Zero Fatalities education and enforcement campaign has also been developed. The program is available to schools, businesses, and civic groups in these areas. Those interested in the program should contact Troop A Headquarters in Lee's Summit or Troop C Headquarters in Weldon Spring, MO, and ask for the public information and education officer.

This joint effort between the Patrol, MODOT, and local agencies will continue through Spring 2023. The campaign will be reevaluated at that time to see if it needs to be revised or moved to additional corridors.

While this campaign is aimed at these specific corridors, drivers are reminded to drive sober, obey the speed limit, put their cell phone down, wear their seat belt, and obey all traffic laws no matter where they are driving. When drivers consistently adopt these good driving habits, all Missouri's highways become safer.
