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"Wings of a Bird" Author Takes Flight At Clinton Middle School

It's been a year ago, but Daniel Peek remembers lying on the floor of the Clinton Middle School gym he was on the red part of the key under the goal — and writing his winning entry. It was the day that author Stephen Kozan visited the school and challenged the students to enter one of his publishing company's "Flash Fiction" contests by writing a narrative passage for a book in 15 minutes.

The prize: having your book published by Kozan's company, publishing ReadyAimWrite Kids, which publishes books written for kids by kids.

Last Friday, Daniel, who is 14 years old, was back in the gym for the launch of his book, "Wings of a Bird." Kozan took the entries from the three grades at CMS, a total of almost 400 students, back to Pennsylvania and chose two finalists, out of which he picked Daniel's as the winner. Kozan, who made the an-

nouncement to the school via video, said both the entry by Peek and the one by the other finalist, Maeghan Scott, were good, but he found Daniel's more creative. Daniel's entry was about a boy who fights dragons, dark dreams and a witch to lift a curse and in the process, masters his

Daniel was born in Kansas, and has lived in Clinton since he was adopted by Jeanne and Charles Peek when he was two and half years old, Jeanne said. Her husband, who was battling cancer at the time, passed away three months after

Woman Forges Ahead, Honoring Friend's Commitment To Business

The idea for opening a Blush Boot Camp in Clinton started when Charice Staley and her husband, Ryan, were driving from Garden City to Clinton. During the drive, Charice received an email from the women-only fitness and exercise business, announcing that the company wanted to expand into other towns in the area.

Clarice remembers joking to Ryan, "We could open a gym in Clinton."

Then Charice got an email from her friend, Missy Mc-Coy Moretine, asking Charice if she had gotten the email. Charice and Missy were neighbors in Garden City, and both worked out at Blush Boot Camp in Harrisonville. Charice answered, yes, she had gotten the email, and Missy texted back, "We should

open one in Clinton." "We started out joking about the coincidence of us both thinking the same thing," Charice said. "After we thought about it for a couple of days, we just jumped on it."

Last week, Charice signed the 140th member of Clinton's Blush Boot Camp, in the east-side shopping center between Hibbett Sports and Tractor Supply. She runs the business with

her daughter, Charlee, who stepped in to help. Missy passed away on Dec. 3, 2022, a week and a half before the scheduled open-

Missy's cancer was re-diagnosed last July, Charice said, but she worked right up until her last week to get the gym ready for the Dec. 12 opening. The funeral was held that day. Charice got up before 3 a.m., drove to Clinton from

her home in Garden City, worked until mid-morning, then drove to Garden City for the funeral. Then she drove back to Clinton for the evening sessions.

"We had pushed so hard to open" Charice said. "I knew that's what she want-

Charice worked 77 hours the first five days the gym was open, but has since cut back to working 4 a.m. to noon. Missy, realizing that she would not be able to help run the gym, asked Charice's daughter Charlee to help. Charlee holds down the office during the evening sessions, at 4:30 p.m., 5:30 p.m. and 6:30

Charlee, 17 years old, has elected to attend high school online, so she can fulfill Missy's request.

"She's really stepped up," Charice said.

Continued from page 1 children and a step-daughter, added up to a family of 11. Six of the children are grown. Daniel's oldest sister and family friends attended the book launch and signing.

Clinton Middle School principal Jill Chapman welcomed friends, family and guests, including Clinton Mayor Carla Moberly, school board members, district administrators and former teachers. Jenny Corson, former CMS principal, described how author Stephen Kozan spoke to the students on his visit about the process of writing a book, and recalled the students covering the gym floor, busily writing.

Jim Kalberloh of Lowry City, R-state representative for Henry and St.Clair counties, presented Daniel with a framed resolution from the state legislature, commending the eighth grader for his accomplishment of becoming a published author.

CMS librarian Kiera Green interviewed Daniel about his writing regime. Daniel said he wrote the book the past summer, working in one-hour increments, then taking a break. Background music helped with the process, he said. What surprised him:

"My writing skills improved as I wrote the book," Daniel said.

Clinton Middle School staff and the student body of 6th, 7th and 8th graders attended the book launch, which took place after lunch, and lined up to have a book or bookmark signed by Daniel.

As the winning author, Daniel received a contract, and was assigned a due date for submitting his manuscript and a date he would start designing the illustrations. Daniel likes to read, write, create and draw, Jeanne said. He drew the cover illustration for the book and also the inside illustrations, she said, and is already planning a sequel.

"He's always been a bright kid," Jeanne said.

Daniel said he completed the book with the encouragement of his mother, who CMS Principal Chapman thanked for impressing on her children how important education is. Jeanne works full-time as a direct support staff in Strasburg, Mo., near Pleasant Hill.

The Peek family also includes Miss Patsy, the woman who brings the Shetland ponies to Olde Glory Days for the pony rides. In 2015, Jeanne met Miss Patsy, and when she learned that Patsy, who is from Oklahoma, was battling cancer and having trouble finding a place to park her trailer, Jeanne invited Patsy to park the horse trailer, which has her living quarters, at the Peek's house.

She's come back and stayed every year, Jeanne said.

"The kids love the ponies," Jeanne said. "She's become family to us."

The summer visitors to the Peek home, along with Daniel's four siblings, the family's three dogs and their three cats are mentioned on the back cover of the book.

"Wings of a Bird," written and illustrated by Daniel Peek, is available from ReadyAimWrite Kids of Harrisburg, Penn. Soft cover. 52 pages. \$15. Authors receive royalties on books sold. To order or for more information about Stephen Kozan and his Flash Fiction contests, go to kidswritestories.net.

"Wings of a Bird" is also available at the Clinton Middle School office, 600 E. Clinton St., Clinton, Mo., for \$15. The school ordered 50 copies and has sold all but 12, but can order more, librarian Kiera Green said.

Stephen Kozan is the author of four books for middle readers: "The Great Green Tree and the Magical Ladders — Metropolis, and the sequel, "Suburbia," both fantasies about a child who goes on magical adventures, "Town" and "The Journal of a Lifetime."

"We do try to make it as convenient as possible," Charice said.

There's a day-care room, with baby-sitting during an exercise session included free with a membership for children 12 weeks to 5 years old. Preregistration is required to reserve a place, as there's a limit of children from six families per session.

Also free is a Kids' Boot Camp once a month for ages 2 through 13, and a Spouse/Significant Other Boot Camp once a month. At their first session, the guys were surprised by how challenging the workouts were. Charice said.

"There was a lot of complaining," she said. "They kept asking for a break. There were no breaks."

The goal of each workout is to burn between 500 and 1,000 calories a session. Each woman wears a heart monitor that tracks her heart rate. The "Blush Zone" is the optimal rate of increasing the heart rate. Charice said she had difficulty dieting and exercising, but lost 30 pounds in the six months after she joined the Blush Boot Camp gym in Harrisonville. The most important thing,

Charice said, is to keep moving. They employ four trainers, including Autumn Anderson of Clinton.

Prior to opening the Clinton Blush Boot Camp, Charice worked from home in Garden City as the bookkeeper for her husband's company, RC Remodel and Repair. Working long hours in Clinton was an adjustment, Charice said, but watching women fall in love with Blush Boot Camp has been very motivating.

"Everybody supports everybody else," she said. "It is really a sense of community."

The week before the gym opened was a bit frantic, she said, trying to bring all the pieces together in time. Her husband's work crew put in long hours to get things ready for the opening on Dec. 12, she said, as she and Missy had planned.

The important thing, Charice said, is that they honored her wishes.

Clinton Blush Boot Camp is located at 1832 E. Ohio, Suite 8, Clinton, Mo 64735, off Hwy. 7 South in the shopping center. The first session is free. To register, go to the Clinton Blush Boot Camp Facebook.

On the outside of the building, the sign for the Moose Lodge appeared in December of 2022, donated and installed by the Kansas City, Kansas, Lodge 1999. The Jackson, Mo., lodge donated the sign on the south side of the building, Gibbons said.

A large part of Lodge life is community service. Since organizing last year and going from a Moose Service Center to a Moose Activity Center, the Truman Lake lodge members have held at least one Heart of Community project every month, Gibbons said.

When school started, the Lodge members donated snacks and reward coupons for treats for special-need students in the middle school, and delivered school supplies to the Teachers' Closet. In November they donated to the Adult abuse prevention center. In December, they collected paper products for Zoe's Home and went Christmas caroling at Bristol Manor and The Arbors.

"The Moose Lodge does really good things," Gibbons said, "and I am proud to be the president."

They also raise money through raffles, and right now, have a raffle for a Pit Boss flat-top griddle going on, and are raffling off two signed Kansas City Chiefs jersevs. A Lodge member has also made fudge to sell, with proceeds benefiting the Clinton High School's junior class prom.

Upcoming social events at the Truman Lake Lodge include a Valentine steak dinner with raffle prizes on Feb. 10, a Super Bowl The Lodge did have its watch party on Feb. 12,

and a St.Patrick's party in March.

"Pitch" card games start at noon on Saturdays. Lodge meetings are held the second and fourth Monday.

The Loyal Order of Moose was founded in 1888 in Louisville, Kentucky, as a fraternal organization combining ritual and social activities. The name Moose was chosen because of the animal's size, strength and devotion to protecting its family, according to the organization's website. National projects include supporting Mooseheart, a children's home, and Moosehaven, a senior citizen home.

Jerry Dawson is the vice-president of the Truman Lake Lodge. Roxanne Thompson is administrator. The Lodge is a non-profit organization, Gibbons said, and everyone, including the administrator, is a volunteer. In a special category of membership are the Moose Legionnaires, who donate their time to do jobs around the Lodge, such as hanging the bigscreen TVs.

Gibbons is a former federal law enforcement officer who retired in 1997 and moved to Clinton, where he served as mayor from 2010 to 2014. He plays the trumpet for veterans' funerals and community events and with his spouse, Linda, has a music ministry that serves churches in the

The Lodge welcomes interested people to tour the facility, he said, noting that guests will be signed in by a member, and are allowed two visits before applying for membership.

To be considered for membership of the Truman Lake Moose Lodge, applicants must be persons of good standing in the community. Along with getting rid of the gender requirement, the Moose organization has gotten rid of other outdated restrictions, Gibbons said. The Truman Lake Lodge,

workout, Charice said, and offers modifications of each exercise. Blush Boot Camp offers a patented workout schedule that is designed to be effective for women, she said, and exercises a different muscle group each day. The variety, the music, the

environment and the guidance of a trainer combine to make the workouts interesting and effective.

"It's a very unique experience," Charice said. "You never have to wonder if

you are doing it right." A membership entitles women to come to as many sessions as they want, she said, noting that some women like some of the workouts so much, they attend twice a day. The gym offers five 50-minute sessions on weekday mornings, on the hour from 5 a.m. through 9 a.m; three evening sessions starting at 4:30 p.m., three workouts on Saturday mornings starting at 8 a.m., and two on Sunday morning, at 7 and 8 a.m.

In 1985, Capt. Richter founded the Marine Corps Mustang Association for Marines like himself, who served as an enlisted person and earned promotion

to officer. The Marine Corps Mustang Association is based in Philadelphia, Penn., with chapters in the United

Rev. David Mills conducted Capt. Richter's funeral, with veteran Sam Gibbons reading the military service. Capt. Richter lay in a flag-draped coffin in his Marine Corps uniform, blue coat with a row of medals, white gloves and white belt, his red Marine Corps League cap folded above his head.

Son Robert Richter, Jr., said his father, a long-time Clinton resident, had been admitted to a hospital in Kansas City with pneumonia, but was expecting to go home. Offering words of comfort to the family, Rev. Mills compared the temporal life of humans to the life of a soldier, who spend much of their lives in tents or other temporary lodgings, but always long for

"Our flesh is just a tent that is taken down," Rev. Mills said. "Our new homes are our homes forever."

Daniel Beebe, chaplain of the American Legion Post, read the closing prayer, then an honor guard of Marines from Belton, Mo., composed Sgt. Jeff Kellum, Brice Townsend and Fred Stewart, marched up the aisle. Two of them stood at attention at either end of the coffin, after saluting, held the flag from the coffin level while outside the chapel, three Marines fired a gun salute, followed by Gibbons playing Taps.

Then the Marines folded the flag and presented it to Richter's sons, "as a symbol of appreciation on behalf of the President of the United States, the Commandant of the Marine Corps and a grateful nation for their father's faithful service."

Asked what led his father to found the Mustang Association, Robert Jr. said it was something his father started thinking about.

"The Navy had a Mustang group, and Dad thought they (the Marines) needed one, too," Robert Jr. said.

The sons received a letter of condolence from an officer of the association, who said the members will be informed on his passing. Its website, marinecorpsmustang.org, has a paragraph about Capt. Richter below its symbol, the red and black Marine Corps seal of anchor, globe and eagle, flanked by two Mustang horses.

Music at the funeral included "Amazing Grace" and "The Old Rugged Cross," the line "Til my trophies at last I lay down" particularly appropriate for a decorated veteran. Trophies can mean objects won in battle or awarded for valor, according to a commentary on the hymn, and also symbolize the reward for striving to live a life of Christian service.

Rev. Mills also read two poems: "The Last Tattoo," and "The Few." Referring to Hebrews Chapter 12,

Rev. Mills said that Robert Richter was surrounded by a cloud of witnesses when he was baptized into the Catholic faith as a baby, and again by those gathered in the chapel that day to mark his passing.

As well as Robert, Jr. and son Gene Richter, Robert Richter. Sr., is survived by 10 grandchildren and 12 great-grandchildren, many of whom attended the funeral.

Robert Richter, Sr. was born on May 5, 1937, in the Bronx, New York. He worked in Philadelphia after retiring from the military, Robert Jr. said. His body will be interred at Lakeview Memorial Park in

Cinnaminson, New Jersey, a suburb across the Delaware River from Philadelphia.

Looking Back and Ahead: 100th Fast Approaching

The Clinton Invitational Tournament (CIT): Then and Now

Boys CIT: We are fast approaching the 100th year of the boys CIT tournament. Talk about tradition. It all started in 1926. This year (the 98th annual) the Cardinal boys won two out of their three games and took second. They beat P. Hill (71-55) and Skyline (83-65), losing to Lincoln (36-49), the eventual tournament Champs. A former player was wondering about the last time the Cardinal boys had scored over 70 points. I looked it up. The boys only scored over 70 points once in their last 52 games. These CIT games scoring 71 and 83 clearly shows the Cards are improving. The Lincoln Cardinals are 20-0 at this writing. Wow.

Girls CIT: The girls started in 1979. This year was the 45th annual girls tournament. The Lady Cards won the title by beating Adrian (48-28), P. Hill (64-34), and Smith-Cotton (56-36). That would be a total of 168-95. That makes the Lady Cards CIT Champions

three years in a row. How about that? For the local team to get a first, and a second in the CIT made it a pretty good week to be a Clinton Cardinal.

Boys CIT History: If you like history try this. The Cardinal boys have won the tournament 20 times over the first 98 years. The Cardinal boys won the first tournament in 1926 then in '28. They also captured the title in '31, '32, '33 and in '36. Things slowed down for them after that. The Cardinal won in 43, but their 1950 win was big as they also got third in State. In the 1950 CIT the Cards beat Warrensburg, North KC, and Maryville to win the title. The next highest winning school in CIT history is Nevada with 15 titles. The Cardinal boys latest win was in 2012 when they beat El Do 57-55.

Small School History: Interestingly there have been several small schools win this long tournament. running Calhoun won in 1934, '40 and '41. Windsor won in 1930 and in '44, '45 and '64. In 1945 the directors the tournament establish a Big and Small Division. It lasted until 1963. During this time LOOKING Page 12

2) What do you do outside of practice to further build relationships with team members? "We do many community service and outreach activities. Visiting rehabilitation centers over the holidays, signing cards and passing them out alongside comfort items. Alumni games and interacting with former Cardinal basketball players. Basketball camps for the local youth on MLK Day, and recently a visit to Missouri State to watch the Bears take on Southern Illinois. We were able to take both Senior and Junior High School players. 6) Would you rather play a game at home or away? "Away. Simply because our energy and effort has been the worse at times at home. On the road we appear to play with a little more urgency. Until we can learn to defend our house and play fearless in front of our fans, students and parents, I'd much rather take our act on the road. I have too much respect for this gym, and the fans to allow my guys not give the full effort....EVER."

7) How do you get your team reset after losing a game? "Still trying to figure this out. Losing can weigh a ton on you. And if more losses build up than wins, that will cause your season to appear wavy. Up and down. Turbulance on the plane but you know in a few seconds you will fly past it. We are currently 10-10 and I feel like we are starting to turn this corner at the right time just before we head to districts. So I can't say we reset, but we revisit our mistakes and areas we need to improve. We just keep building on the foundation we've already built."

8) As a coach what is your favorite part about the job? "First is the relationships built with the student-athlete. These are relationships that will last a lifetime. There's not a better feeling than following and seeing former students grow up to become productive members of society in thier community and/or fathers. That's the legacy."

This job is different from any other job I've had simply because I'm back to the roots. I'd like to see growth and change from 23 years ago. Everything about the matchup says it will be thrilling, tight and difficult to call in the end. Here's Sporting News' breakdown of Super Bowl 57 from both teams' perspectives and determining why Philadelphia should beat Kansas City.

The Eagles' offense is difficult to slow down for many reasons. They can be a dominant rushing team behind the NFL's best offensive line with Hurts joining the power running success along with Miles Sanders, Kenneth Gainwell and Boston Scott. They also can be a dangerous downfield passing team, with Hurts letting the ball loose to dynamic wide receiver duo A.J. Brown and DeVonta Smith.

When the Eagles have protected Hurts and the ball, they haven't lost. The Chiefs got a couple key interceptions vs. Joe Burrow from a Bengals one-dimensional offense in the AFC championship game. They can't expect the same luxury with their pass rush in the Super Bowl.

The Eagles poked holes in a dominant 49ers run defense because of their athletic blocking. The Chiefs also can expect to be exploited on the ground and will need to bend don't break again for Steve Spagnuolo. It will be difficult to take either Brown or Smith away in coverage and they also need to factor in a tough matchup vs. tight end Dallas Goedert.

The Chiefs' defensive strengths do not line up well with the Eagles' offensive strengths in a balanced, explosive attack. But it's still Mahomes, armed with Travis Kelce and other weapons he can use well in the middle of the field. Mahomes will spread the ball out and get it out quickly and he'll be helped by Reid and Eric Bieniemy adjusting the personnel groupings to find the right matchups.

On paper, the healthy Eagles should be able to limit Mahomes' big-play ability with their sound back-end play behind the league's nastiest pass rush. Mahomes, however, figures to be a lot healthier in a couple weeks to get plenty of wins via more off-script plavs.

The Eagles will have limited surprises for the Chiefs. They have stuck with the toggling dual threat of Hurts because it works so well offensively and trust that Jonathan Gannon will maximize his immense mix of talent defensively. They have a lot of "A-factors" in their favor.

The Chiefs need to find multiple X-factors to help Mahomes and Kelce. Deep threat Marquez Valdes-Scantling has expanded his repertoire to make key catches all over the field for Mahomes in the playoffs. They will hope Kadarius Toney and JuJu Smith-Schuster can be healthy enough to provide more sparks in the Super Bowl. Either Isiah Pacheco or Jerick McKinnon out of the backfield can have a huge impact with limited touches.

Members of the Division of Drug and Crime Control's Digital Forensics Investigative Unit conducted the investigations. The Patrol was assisted by the Knob Noster and Warrensburg police departments.

On Tuesday, January 24, 2023, investigators arrested Denning Fields, 60, Aspen Way, Warrensburg, Missouri; Hunter Harrell, 20, Deerbrook Circle, Knob Noster, Missouri; and Owen Anderson, 59, East North Street, Warrensburg, Missouri, for promotion of child pornography. Investigators executed search warrants and located child pornography at each of the men's residences. Fields was transported to the Warrensburg Police Department and later released pending the application of charges. Harrell and Anderson were transported to the Johnson County Jail.

The Johnson County Prosecuting Attorney's Office formally charged Harrell and Anderson as follows:

Hunter Harrell count of promotion of child pornography, three counts of possession of child pornography

Owen Anderson one count of promotion of child pornography, one count of possession of child pornog-

No bond has been set for either Harrell or Anderson. The Division of Drug and Crime Control encourages internet users to promptly report to the Patrol or local law enforcement anyone who attempts to engage in unwanted, inappropriate, or sexualized communications with children. The Digital Forensics Investigative Unit is partially funded by the Missouri Internet Crimes Against Children Task Force.

The above charges are mere accusation and are not evidence of guilt. Evidence in support of these charges must be presented before a court of competent jurisdiction whose duty is to determine guilt or innocence.
