McNack Makes CHS History **As First State Champion**

Amirtia McNack took home the first-place trophy for Clinton High School in the 145 lb weight class. Lucas McCemmy also went to state but was not as successful as his female peer. Clinton High School held a parade while they awaited her arrival back to Clinton from Mizzou Stadium in Colombia, MO. Coaches, fans, family, and friends are extremely proud to welcome Clinton's first female wrestler into the trophy case. "First off. Lucas had a fantastic tournament. Firsttime qualifiers usually get a little humbled by the entire atmosphere and level of competition but he stayed completely composed and wrestled outstanding all week. I couldn't be happier for him and what he accomplished this season. He's such a great kid on top of all of that. Amitria, what a night, what a week. She gave us all a scare in the semifinal match by pulling out a very close 11-10 win. I told Amitria back this summer that the expectation was a state title, nothing else. I'm a firm believer in progressing in everything you do, and after a 3rd place finishes for her

Anglers who wanted to learn how to tie flies and crappie jigs are learning the essentials in a series of classes put on by the Missouri Department of Conservation at the Lost Valley Hatchery in Warsaw. The classes started February 21 and will conclude on March 9th. The series, presented by the MDC's education division, is led by volunteer Nathan Bettencourt of Clinton with help from Bill Grammer of

Eight students enrolled in the classes, filling all available spots. The students were equally divided between those who wanted to learn how to tie flies specifically and those who were more interested in learning how to tie crappie jigs. The techniques, skills materials required and transfer from one to the other.

duces enough food and fiber for 172 people, 106 in the U.S. and 66 abroad. American consumers benefit from this bounty, yet spend less than 9 percent of their disposable income on food. of Tightwad. "I crappie fish a lot, and I wanted to learn how to tie crappie jigs, so I signed up."

Thomas Barker of Cole Camp said much the same thing. "I got a fly rod last year, and I wanted to learn how to tie flies. I saw Nathan tying at the Fish Expo." He then joined the class.

Another student, Rob Armstrong, of Burlington, Ky., learned of the class online. "I'm a retired Delta Airlines pilot," he said. "I bought an RV and am traveling around. Right now, I'm parked down at Shoal Creek near Joplin. This class was the only one I could find that was more than a one-day class." He makes the drive up from the Joplin area for each class.

The four classes focus on giving the students the basics of fly tying, a hobby that readily transfers into tying jigs intended for crappies.

The first two classes introduced students to the San Juan Worm, an extremely easy fly to tie, and one that is deadly on trout as well as bluegill. The second tie was a crappie jig, using a jig head from Everharts and sporting a marabou tail and chenille body.

The second class reviewed the basic knots and then launched into tying the Wooly Bugger-a fly that incorporates the marabou tail that was part of the crappie jig tied during the previous session. It's a universal fly that catches most fish when its size and colors are adapted to conditions. The second fly tied was a Lady Bug-a foambacked fly that is a floating beetle imitation and one that is very effective for trout and bluegill.

According to Bettencourt, in the final two sessions, students will learn to tie the Hare's Ear Nymph and a partridge-and-yellow soft hackle. In the final session, the students will learn how to tie a marabou streamer and a dry fly, the Grizzly Hare. The flies tied in the beginner's class cover the basic groups of flies: nymph, wet, dry, streamer, attractor and jig.

This series of classes was the first at the hatchery, so it is a learning experience, said Kara Entrop, the Community Education Assistant at the Lost Valley Hatchery. "We want to see what works and make any needed adjustments before we schedule others. But we are planning to offer more of the beginner's classes along with some intermediate classes at some point." Entrop said that a crappie jig tying class would work well and likely would be popular for this area.

joy it a lot."

They also submitted coverage of a global news story on the Ukraine/Russian war, Ava said. They'll present both stories again at the state FBLA competition in April at Missouri State University in Springfield, and if they place in the top four, will advance to nationals.

At the radio station, Ava has broadcast pre-game interviews with CHS football Coach Cody Carlson, interviewing him about his plans for the upcoming game and the season. She learned a lot about football from Carlson, she said.

She also got to broadcast one of the CHS football games, which was a little daunting at first, she said, but got easier as it went along. Participating in a precast of a football game with Spencer Edwards was also a good learning experience, she said, as was interviewing Clay Bradford about sports reporting.

At CHS, Ava said her favorite class is Laura Daniel's English composition. Ava has already picked out a topic for the next assignment, "Sexism in Sports Media," for a problem-solving essay. She said she thinks it's awesome that women are breaking down the barriers to become members of professional sports teams. The CHS football team is currently recruiting a kicker from the girls' soccer team to be on the football team next year, Ava said.

"I hope she ends up doing it," Ava said. "I think women are just as tough as men. If you believe you can do it, you should do it."

Ava works at 95.3 KDKD FM on Saturdays from 8 a.m. to 10 a.m., and is also

On January 1, 2017, two significant changes occurred that impacted the availability and use of antibiotics in the feed and water of food producing animals.

One change was that antibiotics classified as medically important by the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) could no longer be used for production purposes such as growth promotion or increased feed efficiency.

The other change was many of these antibiotics, which had been available over the counter, now required either a Veterinary Feed Directive (VFD) if used in feed or a prescription if used in drinking water. This brought a significant number of antibiotics under veterinary supervision, but some continue to be available over the counter. That is about to change, however.

On March 16th, Dr. Craig Payne, veterinarian with University of Missouri Extension, will be at the Henry County Cattlemen's meeting to discuss these changes in greater detail and how it will impact animal owners. Luther's words some 500 years ago still ring true today:

"So, when the devil throws your sins in your face and declares that you deserve death and hell, tell him this: I admit that I deserve death and hell. What of it? For I know One who suffered and made satisfaction on my behalf. His name is Jesus Christ, Son of God, and where He is there I shall be also!"

University of Georgia Cooperative Extension Bulletin reported that heifers that did not conceive during their first breeding season and were kept have an 55% average lifetime calf crop. Therefore, Davis urges cattle producers to cull these open heifers to promote optimum reproductive efficiency in the cattle operation.

"Open heifers need to be marketed to the feedlot by approximately 18 months of age to get optimum salvage value," says Davis. Heifers that enter the breeding season at approximately 14 months should be approximately 18 months at pregnancy check time and can still be marketed to meet the choice grade. If culling is delayed and heifers are marketed later their value may be reduced due to inability to reach the choice grade. Therefore, Davis urges early pregnancy checking and marketing the open heifer within that 18 month window for optimum cattle operation profitability.

"Culling these open heifers also makes more feed resources available to cattle that will be producing calves in the coming year," says Davis. With limited feed resources it is important to feed bred heifers that will provide the cattle operation return. Davis urges cattle producers to cull these heifers that did not conceive in their first breeding season because feeding them is wasting money and negatively affecting the bottom-line of the cattle operation.

This article outlines why keeping heifers that did not become pregnant in the first breeding season is detrimental to the cattle operation. Therefore, Davis urges cattle producers to pregnancy check approximately 60 days post breeding season and cull open heifers. ENTERING THE HALLS OF HEAVEN

Buck O'Neill, the black baseball great, was among thirty-nine baseball players being considered for entrance into the Baseball Hall of Fame in Cooperstown, NY. Unfortunately, the committee of twelve baseball historians who make those decisions chose not to let him in. According to the Kansas City Star, "they snubbed him" It is sad. I believe both his life and his baseball record should have earned him this honor. For what it is worth, I say, "Buck, I am sorry. I believe you should be granted entrance."

I did not know Buck O'Neill personally, but his words and actions lead me to believe he was a man of faith---a believer. In response to the word "children," he answered, "gift of God." When he spoke at Olathe High School, he asked the students to get on their knees and pray that the committee would see fit to induct him into the Baseball Hall of Fame. When he learned he was not chosen, he responded like a true Christian gentleman.

I am certain Buck was disappointed; but I suspect if you could ask him he would agree that the glory of entering baseball's Hall of Fame is nothing compared to the glory of entering the halls of heaven. Entering the Hall of Fame is a glory that comes to only a few. In much the same way, Jesus indicated that entering heaven's glory comes only to a few. He said, "Narrow is the way that leads to (eternal) life, and few there be who find it." (Matthew 7:14) "Few find the way." That is really sad, because all that is required to enter heaven is to trust Jesus.

You must earn your way into the Baseball Hall of Fame. It takes years of labor and great skill. In the final analysis, it is in the hands of a committee that decides whether you get in or not. The committee can be wrong, as I believe they were in this case. Entering heaven is quite different. You cannot earn your way into heaven. Your entrance is not in the hands of a fallible committee. Heaven is a gift of God. Jesus paid for it with His life; however, you do have to accept it. Have you? Will you?

In 2022, sixteen years after declining to include Buck in the Hall of Fame, he was added posthumously.

Last Saturday, the Clinton Rotary Club overflowed with people in gray and red shirts who came to a chili lunch and raffle. The mood of the room was exuberant, but the event was not a celebration of the Kansas City Chief's Super Bowl win.

It was a fundraiser to support Brenda Hunter in her battle against MDS, which is related to non-Hodgkin's Lymphoma.

The chili lunch was organized by a team of Brenda's family, including her sister, Bretta Plumlee, plus friends and former coworkers at Golden Valley Memorial Healthcare. The team planned the chili lunch on Zoom meetings, Bretta said, and donated food and tableware.

Brenda is retired after working at Golden Valley

Memorial Health Care for 35 years, her sister said. She was diagnosed seven years ago with MDS, and has received chemotherapy treatments and blood transfusions at M.D. Anderson Cancer Center, a research hospital in Houston, Texas

Brenda is now in need of stem cell transplants. At the end of March, Bretta is scheduled to go to Houston to donate stem cells. Then Brenda will go to Houston for the transplants, followed by intensive chemotherapy, and possibly stay for months, until her immune system responds, Bretta said.

The family is hoping for quicker results, Bretta said. Bone marrow transplants or blood stem cell transplants, which replace unhealthy stem cells with healthy ones, can cure MDS or delay a relapse.



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
