Local Farmer's Voice A Big **Boom For MO Agriculture**

When Garrett Hawkins was in grade school, he wanted to be an archaeologist. His interests as a boy: Native American artifacts and dinosaur bones.

Instead, on the advice of an 8th grade guidance counselor, he decided to follow in his father's and grandfathers' footsteps, and signed up for agricultural education courses at Appleton City High School. Now, he delves into the

soil of his St. Clair County farm for his livelihood, and helps stake out a path for future farmers while raising the profile of Missouri agriculture at the state and national levels.

"I knew I wanted to be involved," he said of choosing an agricultural career. "The farm is where I wanted to raise my kids."

The choice hasn't kept him down on the farm. Garrett is starting his second two-year term as president of the Missouri Farm Bureau, based in Jefferson City. Next Monday, March 13, he will lead a 75-member delegation to Washington, D.C., to talk with Missouri's U.S. senators and congressional staff about

issues affecting farmers.

Two key concerns: the 2023 Farm Bill Congress will start writing, which determines policy and funding levels for agriculture, food assistance programs and natural resources, and secondly, Biden's Waters of the United States (WOTUS) Rule and how it impacts Missouri farmers.

"It's an expansion of the

Environmental Protection Act and Corps of Engineers regulations, not just of water, but of dry land as well," Garrett said, "and that obviously affects farmers and ranchers."

In addition to his office in Jefferson City, Garrett works on the 300-acre family farm he owns with his brother west of Appleton City, on the boundary

of St. Clair and Bates counties, where they raise beef cattle.

Like all farmers, Garrett is up early, seeing to the morning feeding and checking livestock. Helping him are his three children, Adelyn, 13, Colton, 11, and Tate, 8. They are frequently "chute side," Garrett said, but in a safe place when





"They love being engaged on the farm," Garret said. "Colton is our livestock handler and Tate is a fix-it guy —he's really good with tools."

Adelyn has been blessed with leadership skills, like her father. A 1998 graduate of Appleton City High School, Garrett earned an agricultural business degree at Missouri State University in 2002, and is a graduate of the Missouri Agricultural Leadership of Tomorrow program.

He is on the leadership program's board of directors, and was involved in the Farm Bureau's Youth Ambassador Program and MSU's collegiate chapter of the Missouri Farm Bureau.

He is now a regional vice-president of the national board of Alpha Gamma Rho (AGR) agricultural fraternity, and serves as the liaison with AGR chapters at universities in Missouri, Arkansas and Louisiana.

He has also worked with the Missouri Future Farmers of America program to provide advocacy training for high school students and summer internships.

Garrett said the next generation of farmers are part of the delegation heading to Washington, D.C., including two Youth Ambassadors, members of the Collegiate Farm Bureau, and young farmers and ranchers, as well as Farm Bureau board members and county presidents.

"We've set up meetings for the Collegiate Farm members with young professionals working in agriculture in Washington, D.C., to show them what is possible," he said. "We're also visiting the American Farm Bureau to learn more about the national organization."

Garrett had led national lobbying efforts, helped shape Farm Bureau policy at the state and national level and has worked in agribusiness. From 2017 to 2019, he was deputy director of the Missouri Department of Agriculture, working with Governor Parson and the department director to protect and promote agriculture.

"We are fortunate to have leadership at the highest level behind agriculture as economic development," Garret said of the current state administration, "and that embraces our strong farm heritage."

As the leading industry in Missouri, agriculture is the number-one economic driver in the state, Garrett said. Missouri ranks second in the nation for number of farms, after Texas but before Iowa, with the average size of a Missouri farm being 300 acres.

Missouri also represents the diversity of agriculture in the nation, Garret said.

"The only two products we don't have are citrus and sugar," he said.

Garret said he switched his focus from archaeology to agriculture because of his family's long legacy in agriculture. Garret and his brother are the third generation of their family to farm in west St. Clair county, and the fifth generation involved in production agriculture, he said, which included row crops, dairy and beef cattle.

His father owns a 500acre farm near his sons' farm. In addition to beef cattle, Garrett and his brother have added sheep for diversity, but it's been a steep learning curve, he said. When he's working in the field, Garrett keeps in touch with his office by telephone from the cab of his tractor.

Other days, he dons a suit and tie and drives to the Missouri Farm Bureau office in Jefferson City to attend meetings and conferences.

According to the last farm census, covering 2012 to 2017, there was a decrease in farm acreage in Missouri. Census data for the next five years won't be available for another year — his census form is at home on his kitchen table, waiting to be filled out, he said.

"While we have seen a decline in numbers, we have seen growth in agricultural tourism," Garrett said.

He predicts the next census will show a continued increase in agri-tourism, which provides the public with access to farms through you-pick plots and corn mazes, for example. Long a leader in agri-tourism, Missouri was the first state in the nation to have an agri-tourism committee, Garrett said.

"I also think we will see growth in the number of farms operated by women," he said.

Having local support for farming is important, he said, and not just during "Thank a Farmer" Week in

Garret says it's as simple as remembering the connection between the food you eat and the farmers who produced it. In addition to farming, Garrett serves on the board of directors of Ellett Memorial Hospital, which his great aunt and uncle founded, and as a deacon in the First **Baptist Church of Appleton**

"As you sit down at the table for breakfast, lunch or dinner, or even if you're not at a table, but going through a drive-in window to pick up a meal, I encourage people to pause and think about where their food comes from, and the work that goes into it," he

Throwing a spanner in the mix is Sam, played by Sam French, who Lucille picks up at the cemetery, but who likes Ida.

"The Cemetery Club" was on Broadway in 1990, and was made into a movie in 1993 with Ellen Burstyn, Olympia Dukakis and Diane Ladd. It is also the name of a documentary about a group of people who meet in a cemetery in Israel every week to sit, talk and settle world affairs.

The first act of the play takes place in Ida's living room and at the cemetery. During the intermission. refreshments will be available. The second act of the play revolves around the women being bridesmaids in the wedding of their friend Selma, who is into serial matrimony. The

fourth member of the cast is Becca Fox as Mildred, another wedding guest.

It was the humor plus the small cast that drew David Scott to choose the play, he said. When he was in "You Can't Take it with You," with a cast of 18, it was rather crowded backstage, he said. The way the women deal with life after loss also caught his heart, David

"It's like 'Steel Magnolias," he said. "It's got a lot of humor in it, and there are scenes that we can all relate to '

Sam has the best lines on grief, noting that people should do what feels right for them, not follow what other people advise. He is ready to move on, despite his first awkward attempts at dating.

"What is life, if not one chapter after another, waiting to be written?" he asks. Like Sam's forays into dating and the friends' emotional ties with their spouses, the past continues to intrude on the present, revealing the conflicts inherent in moving on. The play ends with two of the characters back at the cemetery.

"The Cemetery Club" opens Friday, March 10 at 7 p.m., and continues Saturday, March 11, at 7 p.m., Sunday, March 12 at 2 p.m. and Saturday, March 18 at 7 p.m. Tickets are \$12.50 and are available at the Clinton Chamber of Commerce, 202 S. Main Street, Re/Max Truman Lake real estate, off Hwy. 7 east of Clinton at 5 NE 91 Rd., and at the door.

The theatre is experimenting with having an extra Saturday night performance instead of a Thursday night one.

Heartland Community Theatre's 2023 season has two more comedies scheduled. In June, it's "Just Desserts," by Craig Sodaro, a murder mystery farce set at a charity bake-off, on stage June 9, 10, 11 and 17. The fall production is "West of Pecos," a western spoof by Tim Kelly. Shows are Sept. 15, 16, 17 and 23. Heartland Community Theatre is located just off the northwest corner of the Square, at 108 Washington St., Clinton, MO 64735. Acoustic screens are being built for the interior walls of the theater, which used to be the Crest Movie Theater, with plans for them to be in place for this production. Actors in "The Cemetery Club" wear microphones, which improve audibility considerably.

Heartland Community Theatre is a not-for-profit organization that relies on ticket sales to cover expenses, with the goal of providing the experience of live theater by seasoned performers and stage crew.

cember 2021. The case, however, stems from events that occurred in 2009.

In 2009, Albin had a 16 year old female girl at his home that he shared with several others to assist him in the care of several smaller children overnight.

At some point in the night, the girl awoke to Albin touching her and having sexual intercourse with her. Albin also held her down and covered her mouth throughout the course of the event. The young girl suffered an injury as a result of this incident.

In 2021, while investigating and preparing another pending matter against the defendant, Prosecutor Gray and detectives with the Clinton Police Department discovered that this matter had not ever been

Albin, who, in 2009, was on parole, had his parole revoked shortly after this incident and returned to the Missouri Department of Corrections. Due to that and changes within operating systems, the investigation had mistakenly been closed and thus not pur-

A trial was held March 1, 2023 with Judge Jacqueline Cook presiding. Prosecutor Gray presented and argued the matter on behalf of the State of Missouri.

Albin was represented by counsel. On March 2, 2023, Judge Cook announced that the Court had found Albin guilty as charged.

According to Prosecutor Gray, with the sentencing enhancements of predatory and persistent sex offender, Albin must be sentenced to imprisonment for life.

Prosecutor Gray stated, "Bringing closure and justice to the victim of this heinous act, no matter how late, was worth all of the effort."

surfacing for an area approximately 1932 sq. ft. underneath the swings and teeter totters. Due to the temperature requirements for the poured surface, this project will be completed sometime later this summer in June or July by Frye & Associates, Kansas City, MO. Preparation for this project will require parent volunteers and maintenance employees to remove pea gravel from the area that will receive the resurfacing. As part of the grant, we will be having a representative from the Quad-Lakes Waste Management Office present a short presentation about recycling in an all-school assembly for grades 3-12 later this spring in the CCA gym.

CCA received a DNR grant in the amount of \$30,000 for Phase 1 of this project in 2021 during which approximately 1607 sq. ft. of area underneath the large yellow playground equipment received the new pour-in-place surfacing was completed. Our goal is to eventually have the pour-in-place surfacing on the entire 11,607 sq. ft. of playground area. Special thanks to Amber Hansen, CCA parent, who has volunteered her time to write both of these grants for our school! CCA plans to continue to submit for grants through DNR and other sources until the recycled pour-in-place surfacing covers the entire playground area.



Rival Teams Get Skunked at Coyote Tournament

Neither the all-female team or their male counterparts came home with bragging rights from last weekend's VFW Post Coyote Tournament in south Henry County.

Sarah Bourland, spouse of tournament organizer Colby Bourland, along with Colby's sister, Katie Koshko and Colby's brother Colton's partner, Maggy Ruth, challenged themselves to win this year's tournament, or at least to beat their partners' totals.

"Only five teams killed any coyotes,"Colby said. "It wasn't a good year."

The tournament drew 21 teams, who each paid \$100 to enter. First place went to Micheal Ashley and Conner Bock of Rockville, who

brought in 15 coyotes and also took first prize for largest coyote, 40.3 pounds. A total of 26 coyotes were brought into Sunday's 3 p.m. check-in. The tournament usually results in 50 to 100 animals taken, Colby said.

The warm weather may have affected the success of the hunters, as warm temperatures are not good for coyote hunting, according to Travis Gillis, who organizes the Bates County Elks Lodge Coyote Hunt in Butler, held in February.

The 7th annual Coyote Tournament is a fundraiser for the VFW Post in Montrose. This year, the tournament raised \$1,000 for the post, Colby said, which supports youth programs and services for veterans, and paid out \$1,100 in prizes.

Coyote hunts provide

sport hunting and predator control, according to Drew Davis, the Henry County agent for the Missouri Department of Conservation. Coyotes, which are omnivorous, eat small deer and livestock. Populations are thriving throughout North America.

Tri-Lake Fly Fishers to Hold Expo

When most fishermen think of fly fishing, they immediately think "trout". That's because fly fishing and trout are deeply intertwined. However, the Tri-Lakes Fly Fishers is doing its best to convince anglers that isn't necessarily the case.

The club is the organization putting together the 2023 Fly Fishing Expo in the Benson Center next Saturday, March 11. Attendance is free, and the Expo is open from 9am to 4pm.

While the Expo is the club's headline event, last Saturday the Tri-Lakes Fly Fishers held a white-bass fly tying workshop at the Fairview United Methodist Church northeast of Bolivar. At the event, open to the public, over 25 anglers were tying flies intended for white bass and offering advice on rods, reels and lines necessary to catch them.

While many of the techniques used to tie flies for white bass are similar to those used for trout flies, the flies, generally are different—larger, brighter and intended to imitate the minnows upon which white bass feed rather than the aquatic insects that are big on the trout's dinner menu.

The tyers produced a host of patterns—Clouser Minnows, the Cypert Minnow, various streamers (minnow imitators) as well as fly patterns of their own invention.

The Tri-Lakes Fly Fishers has a region-wide membership with folks from Springfield, including the vice president Deb Hall. Kimberling City is where Wayne Essary, the lead on white-bass fly patterns at the workshop, hangs his rods. The Diggons couple live in Nixa. Branson has its share of members, and there are five members from Clinton, Nathan Bettencourt, Scott and Sherri DeHart, Larry Davison and Andrew Englehart.

Overall, the club boats 45 family memberships with "probably 75 members in total" says club president Sandy Halteman.

Its name comes from the members' interest in fishing Stockton, Pomme de Terre and Truman lakes.

The folks at the white-bass tying workshop brought out another point: membership fees (\$15 per year) are for the family. And with more and more women starting to fly fish, the club has a large feminine membership. Fully one third of the active club members are women, as are the top three officers of the club.

The club is a group of fishermen who welcome new members, and if someone is new to fly fishing or is curious about the sport, that is even better. "We will do anything we can to help someone who wants to learn to fly fish or to tie flies," says Halteman. "All our events—we have 12 or so a year-- are all open to the public."

Club members also do a lot of outreach. In last week's issue of the Daily Democrat, Clinton resident Nathan Bettencourt was pictured helping a beginner in a fly-tying class he taught for the Missouri Department of Conservation. Members also have worked with Boy Scouts on merit badges as far away as Raymore as well as The Good Samaritan Boys Ranch and Project Healing Waters. New outreach is working with The May Fly Project for youth in foster care.

The club meets the first Monday of every month in Bolivar, a central location for the geographically scattered members.

With the club having such a diverse membership, why hold the Expo in Clinton?

"There are two reasons," says club president, Sandy Halteman. "First, the Benson Center has the space we need, but also, the people and businesses in

Clinton have been very supportive." Fortunately, with the financial help, the Expo is free for vendors as well as for those who attend.

Hawthorn Bank and Mike Keith Insurance paid for the rental of the Benson Center, which is a huge cost. Also, area businesses stepped up as well.

"We have auction items donated by folks in Clinton: Mallard's Roadhouse, Ben Franklin and El Camino Real have contributed auction items, and Furniture City added a "really cool lamp" to the list of items up for auction. And wait—there's more! Everharts, Simple Pleasures and Bread of Life also provided auction items.

"I have a whole garage full of items for the auction," says Nick Halteman, the president's second-in-command. "We have at least 150 items. And while a lot of them are fishing related, we also have home décor, a quilt and target baskets full of things that don't have scales or are related to fish." Of course, there are guided fishing trips on offer, rods, and well, other fishing-related items in the

Halteman's garage.

There are two types of auctions that will be held on Saturday, a live auction and a silent auction.

The TLFF club started holding expos in 1997; although, this is the only the second year at the Benson Center. Previously, it was held in a church, at a hospital, at an airport—wherever the club could find space. Now, with over 45 fly tyers actively tying flies, 30 vendors selling their wares and guest speaker Brian Wise doing two seminars, the exhibition room has enough space.

Wise is an internet personality with at least 51 videos on fly tying subjects on youtube.com.

Breakfast and lunch will be available, prepared by the former managers of Gunflint Lodge in Minnesota. Biscuits and gravy, breakfast sandwiches, pulled pork sandwiches, burgers, dogs and other show fare is available.

For more information on the Tri-Lake Fly Fishers, the club has a Facebook page and is working on a website, which should be up and running in April.

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



"We Are in the Hands of God, for God is Our Maker" Scriptures: Jeremiah 18:1-6, Isaiah 64:8, Romans 9:20-23, Isaiah 45:9-23

Jer 18:1-6. The word which came to Jeremiah from the LORD, saying, Arise, and go down to the potter's house, and there I will cause thee to hear my words. Then I went down to the potter's house, and, behold, he wrought a work on the wheels. And the vessel that he made of clay was marred in the hand of the potter: so he made it again another vessel, as seemed good to the potter to make it. Then the word of the LORD came to me, saying, O house of Israel, cannot I do with you as this potter? saith the LORD. Behold, as the clay is in the potter's hand, so are ye in mine hand, O house of Israel. (KJV)

The potter has a process in the making of vessels from clay. If the clay has a flaw, he must start over.

He mixes clay with water to remove stones, thereby producing a finer grade of clay. Straw and shells are added to

strength the clay. Once the clay is to his liking, he has the choice of dying it in the sun. Which will allow it to hold dry goods or flowers. Or he can put it through the fire. This process, when completed, allows the vessel to hold water.

Food for thought; when we are baptized, it removes things from us.

It tells us in Isaiah 64:8: But now, O LORD, thou art our father; we are the clay, and thou our potter; and we all are the work of thy hand. (KJV)

God showed Jeremiah the potter making his clay vessels, so he would understand God's message to the people.

The vessel by the potter. He completed the process by adding ingredients to strengthen it, then fired it to get the result he wanted. As the clay is in the potter's hand, so are we in the hands of God. He shapes us and molds us.

For the clay to hold up, it has to go through the firing process. God takes us through the firing process to strengthen us, so we can stand against the bad that exist around us.

The fire we go through is the trials and tribulations that come. If we can withstand that fire, we will come out

Christians who don't go through the fire are not strong enough to endure what comes at them. When trials come, they are ready to give up.

The Apostle Paul was more than willing to keep the thorn in his side if it meant he would be strong in the Lord.

God is our maker. If he can create heaven, and earth, he has the power to change us. It is up to us to stand, endure the heat and go through the fire. We will come out of it stronger. God Bless.

Looking Back: Lady Cardinals' **Basketball History**

Making History: I hope you have been following the 22-23 Lady Cardinal Basketball team. They are one of the scrappiest Cardinal teams I have ever seen. They ended their historic season with a record of 23-6, the most wins in the program's history. They lost to a very good Nevada team in the District Championship game. The varsity Lady Cards included: Mercedez Vyla Brown, Brown, Skyte Wilson, Briley Wishard, Ava Potter, Hannah Campbell, Allison Cardwell, Allie Goucher, Kathryn Schaffer, and Riley Heerdink (injured). The latest looked at records for the '22-'23 shows: Most squad rebounds in a single season with 1059, the most steals in a single season with 364, and the most 3-point baskets with 107. Coach Rankings (by wins): Last year the Lady Cards under the direction of first-year coach Stacie Womack, won Districts and had a record of 17-11. In fact, the Lady Cardinals have had only one losing season in the last 11 years. So now, after two years Coach Womack has captured 40 wins. This puts her 5th overall on the all-time win list. The top five ranked coaches are Ron Aldridge (118), David Rogers (62), Josh Dorr (62), Roger Bancroft (41) then Stacie Womack (40). Aldridge, the "God Father" of Lady Card Basketball, collected his wins over 11 seasons. Rogers and Door toiled for four years each and Bancroft was the Lady Cardinal coach for six years. Recovery **After Crisis**

In 2020, the world as we knew it stopped, suddenly parents, students, and grandparents are all stuck at home together.

Since COVID-19, schools have been struggling to get their student sections back to their normal capacity. Kids are just used to staying home, and getting out for sports games is not as important as it once was.

"If you take a look back at pictures from 2016, 2017, and 2018, the stands were packed, no matter the team's record or if it was a boys or girls game", said Alex Johnson, Cardinals AD. Johnson and the current administration at Clinton High School are working on bringing in a leader in student sections and fan hype. This would cost the School District \$6,000-\$9,000 so it is taking a while to be approved and put into motion. The company in reference that CHS is looking at is "Biggest Fan Consulting". The CEO of Biggest Fan Consulting used Grand Canyon University as a pilot school for his company when he first started and it has taken across the U.S.A. like wildfire ever since his success at GCU. The process Biggest Fan Consulting uses is coming in and giving a presentation to students and faculty, while also giving the Athletics Director all of the direction he needs via email and in-person conversation while they are here.

"One of the problems our student section faces is we have the number, not the energy," said AD Johnson. "If you have ever visited a Cardinals basketball game, that is a prime example of the number; we have enough kids coming to the game but we need those kids to be involved. "

He added, "Another place we lack is when our student section leader, Ava Potter is playing a game, we don't have anyone that carries the same energy level as her. Ava is a no-shame kind

of person; she loves to be heard and is good at what she does with the student section," said Johnson.

Parent involvement is another big contributor to the other side of the stands being full. You do not have to have a kid playing the sport to come to watch high school sports. If we can't get the student section energy where it needs to be, our sports teams will not play with the same energy they should at a home game.



Baseball in general has been resistant to change throughout the last hundred or so years. I mean, the Chicago Cubs didn't even have night games until 1988. The last major rule change that rocked the baseball world was the designated hitter rule - which was adopted by the American League in 1973 and been ignored by the National League ever since.

So it goes without saying that multiple changes for a single season are going to be met with quite a bit of resistance. I don't know if it will drive fans away or attract them. But I do know if you tinker with

something too much you might just break what you were trying to "fix." Some of the new changes are already causing issues, even in Spring training - just ask the Atlanta Braves how an automatic strike ended a bottom of the ninth tiegame on the first day of pre-season.

But, If you like baseball you will have to get used to it because I can't imagine these new rules not impacting games in significant ways. Even the new pick-off rules seem, to me, take away a fundamental aspect of the game; the pitcher can now only step off the rubber twice in an at-bat or it's a balk.

All this is an attempt to shorten the game.

The last time I checked, games lasted on average about three hours with the odd game here or there hitting extra innings and lasting longer. That's about how long it takes to play a football game.

The games don't need to be shorter. If you went to a game and complained about its length you shouldn't have went to the game to begin with. I can see where this is going, though. Picture this: designated inning times with a big clock counting down in the background. When the time is up, the game is over. Oh, wait: that's what basketball, football, and soccer already do. I guess they just didn't want to make it that obvious.

University of Central Missouri Interim Vice President for Intercollegiate Athletics Kathy Anderson announced Wednesday, March 1, that Doug Karleskint has resigned from his position as head men's basketball coach. Karleskint recently completed his ninth season as Mules head coach.

"UCM athletics thanks Doug and his family for all of their contributions and for being such a positive

part of our athletic family. Doug gave tirelessly of himself to the men in his program and UCM athletics. We wish him and his family all the best in the future," Anderson said.

UCM President Roger Best also noted, "Coach Karleskint is a person of tremendous character and integrity, and I appreciate his leadership and development of the men in our basketball program over the last nine years. His strong commitment to UCM and our mission during his tenure was unquestioned, and I wish him much success in his next opportunity."

In his nine seasons with UCM, Karleskint posted a win-loss record of 135-119. During his time as head coach, the Mules won 20 or more games three times. His 25 wins in 2014-15 are the most ever for a first-year head coach in

program history, allowing the Mules to advance to the second round of the NCAA Division II Regional Championship. He led Central Missouri to top-five MIAA finishes three times, including runner-up performances in 2014-15 and 2016-17.

"I want to say that it was my honor and privilege to serve as the head men haskethall coach at LICM I want to thank our administration, alumni, students and fans for the opportunity and support. Most of all, I'm grateful for our players, past and present, and my staff for their tireless efforts and the energy they poured into this program," Karleskint said. "The memories and relationships we've built here will stay with us forever. The Karleskint family will be rooting hard for the Mules and Jennies.

The 55th Annual Citation Show will open March 13 at the University of Central Missouri Gallery of Art and Design's main gallery. It is one of three art shows and a visiting artist's lecture that are planned at the gallery this month.

Each year, during the spring semester, the gallery invites students with declared majors and minors in Art and Design to submit their best works of art for inclusion in the Citation Show. An arts professional is selected to jury the exhibition, awarding cash prizes to the top artworks across numerous categories.

"The Citation Show is a chance to see the best work of our students and to celebrate their accomplishments in the classroom," said Dr. Rahila Weed, chair of Art and Design. "It is a window into our programs, highlighting the incredible talent of our students and faculty."

This year's juror is Amy Kligman, executive and artistic director of the Charlotte Street Foundation in Kansas City. Kligman will not attend the reception but the public is invited to hear her talk about her work at 4 p.m. Monday, March 27 in Wood Building, Room 100, where she will be the Kleppe Visiting Artist Lecturer. This lecture will be simulcast over Zoom. Free Zoom registration is required, and individuals can register online at shorturl.at/yPW23. It is also easy to find the signup link on social media. The Gallery of Art and Design is on Instagram @ucmartgallery and on Facebook as UCM Gallery of Art and Design. This Citation Show will be on view through March 31. The public is invited to attend the show reception from 4-6 p.m. March 29. Awards will be announced at 4 p.m. All events are free and open to the public.

Also part of Art and Design's spring offerings, in Gallery 115 of the UCM Art Center, "Invented Personas" will also open on March 13. Works in this exhibition represented a curated selection of artworks completed by UCM's Foundations II students working with visiting artist Johanna Winters. Students were asked to create large-scale papier-mâché masks that present and reflect upon invented personas and their aestheticized repre-

sentations. In commenting on the exhibition, Director of Gallery Events, Jamie Platt, noted, "If you only see one UCM art show this year, do yourself a favor and get down here for Invented Personas. I've been watching the projects develop over the course of a couple weeks and they are truly strange and compelling."

Winters' name may be familiar for anyone who has been keeping up with events in the Gallery of Art and Design this semester. She is a sculptor and conceptual artist whose recent body of work is a series of meditations on what it's like to age as a woman. In addition to working with students in a workshop and curating Invented Personas, Winters has curated a five-person exhibition called "Side Stage," and has twice been a guest lecturer in the Kleppe Visiting Artist Lecture Series, once speaking about her own work and the others as a moderator for a panel discussion with the artists of Side Stage.

Invented Personas will be on view through March 31. The reception for this event coincides with the reception for the Citation Show on March 29.

The annual high school art show opens on March 13. The UCM High School Art Exhibition features a selection of outstanding artwork made by high school students from within a 150mile radius of Warrensburg, Missouri. Students are allowed to submit two pieces of work and can enter any original drawing, painting (oil, acrylic, opaque watercolor), mixed media, printmaking (serigraphy, relief, intaglio), design/graphics,

photography, ceramics or sculpture. Upper-level students can sign up for a day of live art competition and workshops with UCM faculty and students at the annual High School Art Contest Day. Both events are free and open to homeschooled, public and private high school students. The exhibition will be on view through March 31. The public is invited to a reception for the High School Art Exhibition from noon to 2 p.m. March 25. Admission is free. SFCC offers new AAS degree in Surgical Technology

State Fair Community College is offering an Associate of Applied Science (AAS) degree in Surgical Technology that will begin Aug. 21. This degree can be earned in 12 months and is delivered in online and onground formats. The curriculum includes laboratory hours on the SFCC-Clinton campus, clinical hours at an assigned site, and virtual reality tools to enhance the learning process. The application deadline is May 1 to begin Aug. 21.

Graduates of the Surgical Technology program will be trained to deliver patient care expected of an entry level surgical technologist and to perform as a contributing member of a surgical team. This training includes the skills needed for preoperative, intraoperative and postoperative patient care.

From the Missouri Hospital Association 2022 Annual Workforce Report, there was a 17.5% vacancy rate for surgical technologists and was listed in the top 10 hospital professions with the highest employee va-

cancy. Salaries range from \$36,650-\$44,990 according to the ACT WorkKeys Assessment for 2020.

Prospective students must complete an admission application to SFCC and an application to the Surgical Technology program. Admission to SFCC does not guarantee admission to the program.

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


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
