





(Continued from Page 1) the most part the districts that switched to the four-day week did not go back to five days after the switch."

"It is too late to change to a five-day week this year because school districts are already planning their calendars for next year," "No one said Gemes. seemed to care when it was just smaller districts going to the four-day week but now that some of the larger school districts are making the move, the legislature has begun to take notice."

The Independence School District recently voted to go to the four-day schedule for the 2023-2024 school year. Missouri State Senator Beck of St. Louis County was the lawmaker who proposed adding mandatory five-day school amendment into Senate Bill 4 or the 'Parents Bill of Rights.' amendment did not go in the bill, so the Independence School District can continue with their planned four-day school week, which would begin next year.

"This goes completely against local control," Cole Camp Superintendent Steve Hubbard said of the lawmaker's idea. "Every school district has a dually elected school board that makes these decisions. This is quite a bit of overreach by the state legislature to come in and take away that control from local school boards."

According to the Missouri Department of Elementary and Secondary Education, the state has 144 school districts operating four days a week this academic year, instead of the traditional five-day school week. The shortened learning weeks are used by many rural districts as a teacher recruitment tool.

In the era of workforce shortages, larger districts are catching on – potentially leading to teacher recruitment problems for rural districts. Independence is shifting to a four-day school week. St. Joseph is considering whether to do


During last week's Missouri Board of Education meeting, President Charlie Shields said he has heard a lot of discussion in the Capitol over the past week about the four-day school week movement.

"I think, rightfully so, there's a lot of concern. Is that the right thing for students and is there any data that shows that moves us in the direction of greater student achievement," Shields asked. "I think at this point, there is not that data out there but districts continue to move in that direction."

The schools with shortened weeks must still fulfill the same number of hours of instruction as schools running five days a week.

Shields, who is a former Missouri Senate President Pro Tem, said the intent of allowing districts to make the switch to four days a week has changed.

"Way back when the school districts were facing a transportation crisis, we were not fully funding the transportation, categorical fuel costs were increasing the legislature's response was to move to allow districts to move to a four-day school week, primarily focused on those districts that had really large transportation costs. The idea was that they could do



that to solve some of their financial difficulty around transportation. And now, what we're hearing is that districts are doing that as a teacher and staff recruitment issue. It was done to solve the transportation crisis. It was never envisioned as a teacher recruitment and retention issue," he said.

In the current state budget year, Missouri fully funded the formula used to bankroll K-12 public education to the tune of \$3.56 billion. It fully funded its share of school bus transportation costs by providing a total of \$328 million to schools. The state also offered grants this budget cycle to help schools boost teacher pay for new educators and experienced

Legislative bills have been filed this session to increase Missouri's minimum teacher pay to \$38,000 annually over a three-year period. The minimum salary for a teacher with a master's degree and at least ten years of teacher experience in public schools would increase from \$33,000 to

Another bill would provide a student loan forgiveness program for students who become teachers in public schools with high needs.

Missouri has about 550 school districts and charter schools.

Missouri Commissioner of Education Margie Vandeven told the state board Tuesday that it gives her "great pause" to see the number of districts switching to a four-day school week as a strategy to improve teacher recruitment and retention.

"Eventually, if we are a state full of four-day weeks it will no longer be a teacher recruitment and retention strategy and we will have a number of schools operating on a four-day week, which is not typical for the workforce that they are preparing to enter," she said.

Early in the meeting, as part of a legislative update, Vandeven and two members of the state Board of Education questioned the academic impact of the truncated schedule now adopted by 145 — roughly 27% — of districts in Missouri.

Although the four-day week schedule will continue for some schools for the 2023-24 school year, the legislature may bring this up again in future legislation.

Placemaking Grant must be on public land and must be outdoors. The site must be accessible to everyone, and the site should not charge admission.

(Continued from Page 1) and the evening's agenda, then agree to pay bills presented. A citizen asked if there was anyone local, preparing grant applications for senior housing. Mayor Nelson responded there are no longer many builders in Benton County.

Economic

Director

Development JoAnn Lane informed the group there will be a February 22 Economic Development Meeting held in Lincoln, and a September Connecting 19-21 Entrepreneurial Committee conference scheduled for Benton County. The CEC conference Pre-Event will be held at the Drenon Ranch Arena in Lincoln on Tuesday evening, September 19. The main conference will kick off on Wednesday, September 20 in Cole Camp with lunch and a keynote speaker before breaking into sessions. The evening networking event will be in Warsaw. The breakfast, day two sessions, and closing keynote of the conference will be held in Warsaw. She added the CEC conference will be a non-traditional event where some sessions are hosted by local entrepreneurs in their business establishments.

Under old business. Mayor Nelson said there was much confusion over a proposed marijuana sales tax; he recommended the group delay action on it, pending receipt of more information. He added that a proposed water/sewer line extension project was not as far along as he had hoped, and initial anticipated costs may be more than expected. He recommended the group look into financing options. Then Mayor Nelson commented on the city's dangerous buildings/ nuisance ordinance. He said the city has politely warned several places which violated that ordinance, but was met with no appropriate response. He added it was now time to send complaint letters to those places.

Under departmental reports, Police Chief Jason Wenberg reported that two applicants for police officer positions have backed out, and that his department had experienced a slow month. Public Works Director Josh Cole said his employees had installed a number of meters; and the department has gotten the "ball rolling" on northside projects. He added his employees had been recycling some scrap metal, but have not gotten started on the proposed Municipal Airport project. City Clerk Brown reported that auditors will arrive in the city next month.

Alderman Swearngin asked the group to allow volunteers from her church to plant potted flowers on Main Street, and was approved to do so. The meeting closed about 6:35 PM. These sessions are usually held on 2nd Monday eves; visitors are welcome.

a good rebounding team." Senior Night seems to bring out the best in some teams.




Can you benefit from new RMD age limit?

When you're working, you may spend decades contributing to retirement accounts such as your 401(k) and IRA. Once you're retired, though, you'll likely need to begin withdrawing from these accounts to help pay for your living expenses. In fact, you'll be required to take money from them at a certain age — but that age requirement is changing, and it could lead to changes

in your financial strategy. Let's look at some background behind development. You put in pre-tax dollars to a traditional IRA and 401(k), so your contributions can lower your taxable income and your earnings can grow on a tax-deferred basis. Eventually, though, you must take withdrawals from these accounts or face tax penalties. (A Roth IRA does not have the withdrawal requirement; you can essentially keep the money intact as long as you choose.) As part of the SECURE Act 2.0 of 2022, the age at which you must take these withdrawals — technically called required minimum distributions, or RMDs has increased from 72 to 73. So, if you turn 72 in 2023, you now have another year before you're required to take RMDs.

The SECURE Act 2.0 also mandates that, in 2033, the RMD age will increase again — to 75 — so, depending on your current age, you may have even more time to plan for the effects of RMDs. Of course, you may need to start taking withdrawals from your retirement accounts before you reach either RMD age — 73 or 75 — so the additional time may not mean much to you.

But if you can afford to wait



until you must start taking RMDs, what issues should you consider?

Perhaps the most important one is taxes. Your RMDs, which are based on your life expectancy and account balances, are considered taxable income in the year in which you accept the money. If you have sizable amounts in your traditional IRA and 401(k), these RMDs could be large enough to bump you into a higher tax bracket, leading to greater taxation of Social Security benefits and a Medicare surcharge. So, the ability to delay taking RMDs can be beneficial from a tax standpoint, at least for a time. On the other hand, by delaying RMDs, you might eventually have to take bigger taxable withdrawals from your accounts that may have larger balances because they've had more time to potentially grow.

You could address the issue of taxable withdrawals by converting your traditional IRA to a Roth IRA before

you're faced with RMDs — and now, you have more time to do so. Roth IRAs have no RMDs, and since a Roth IRA is funded with after-tax dollars, your withdrawals are tax free, provided you don't begin taking them until you're at

591/2 and you've had your account at least five years. Again, though, taxes are the issue — any pre-tax dollars you convert from a traditional IRA to a Roth IRA will be taxable in the year of the conversion. To reduce this tax hit, you could space out the conversion over several years.

When thinking delaying RMDs or doing a Roth IRA conversion to avoid RMDs, you'll need to consult with your tax advisor. But the new RMD age limits do give you more flexibility in these areas, so think carefully about how you might benefit from the added time.



Trying to wrap up a busy week at the Capitol! Committee hearings are in full swing now and keeping us hopping! In my committees we heard bills in Transportation Oversight and Budget Appropriations. I also presented one of the bills I filed, HJR 17, which would freeze the assessment on personal residence for anyone over the age of 70. If passed, this would keep seniors property tax on their residence from increasing so dramatically and running some out of their lifelong residence. It would not reduce or eliminate it, but would keep it at where it is presently and those on fixed incomes would better be able to budget this expense.

We passed 3 bills out of the house this week as well, as bills are now coming to the floor for the full house

approval: Missouri House Approves Vital Public Safety Legislation (HB 301)

301) House Speaker Dean Plocher and the members of the Missouri House of Representatives took an important step this week to provide assistance to areas of the state plagued by violent crime. The House approved HB 301 by a vote of 109-35. It was during his Opening Day Address that Speaker Plocher told his colleagues they "cannot be bystanders as unchecked crime causes the systematic destruction of our proud state." He called on House members to make it a priority to enact common sense reforms and provide the resources necessary to protect every Missouri community. Plocher said HB 301 represents a good faith effort by the legislature to provide assistance to areas of the state such as St. Louis where violent crime has run rampant.

HB 301 is a wide-ranging

public safety bill that includes a key provision that would allow the governor to appoint a special prosecutor in areas of the state with excessive homicide rate. The bill specifies the governor would be empowered to appoint a prosecutor in any circuit or prosecuting attorney's jurisdiction that has a homicide rate in excess of 35 cases per 100,000 people and where the governor determines there is a threat to public safety and health. The special prosecutor would be appointed for a period of up to five years.

The sponsor of HB 301, who previously served as director of the Missouri Department of Public Safety, said it's important that the state act to help with the problem of violent crime in St. Louis or in any part of the state.

HB 301 also contains several other provisions designed to improve public safety in Missouri. The bill would establish the Peace Officer Basic Training Tuition Reimbursement Program to help address the shortage of police officers in some parts of the state. The bill would also ensure the Department of Corrections to implement a policy to help offenders apply for Medicaid and obtain vital documents such as a birth certificate or Social Security card. Additionally, the legislation establishes factors for a judge or judicial officer to consider when setting bail, includes protections for a judicial officer's personal information, and creates Blair's Law.

House Approves Bill to Allow Direct Access to Physical Therapy (HBs 115 & 99)

Lawmakers gave strong bipartisan approval this week to legislation that would allow patients to have direct access to physical therapy. The Missouri House approved HBs 115 & 99 by a vote of 147-1.

The sponsor of the bill noted that 47 states currently allow some form of direct access to physical therapy. She pointed out that studies show patients with direct access have fewer visits and less overall cost. "Direct access is about individual choice in health care decisions through the elimination of unnecessary and burdensome regulations," said bill's sponsor. She added,

regulations," said the bill's sponsor. She added, "Allowing individuals to make their own decisions regarding their own health care is really great policy, and eliminating the referral requirements is one step to making health care more accessible to all people."

Under HBs 115 & 99 a

physical therapist would no

longer need a prescription or referral from a doctor in order to evaluate and initiate treatment on a patient. To qualify, the physical therapist would need a Doctorate of Physical Therapy Degree or five years of clinical practice as a physical therapist.

The bill also states the physical therapist must refer to an approved health care provider any patient whose condition is beyond the physical therapist's scope of practice, or any patient who does not demonstrate measurable or functional improvement after 10 visits or 30 days, whichever occurs first.

Missouri House Approves Supplemental Budget Bill (HB 14)

This week the members of the Missouri House approved a supplemental spending bill that will allocate additional funds for the current state operating budget. The House gave initial approval to the bill by a vote of 148-2.

In total, the bill allocates more than \$627 million in funding. Some of the highlights of the supplementing spending plan include:

· 8.7% pay increase for state workers

o Does not include general assembly and statewide elected officials

o Additional \$2 an hour shift differential for night shift direct care workforce (prisons, hospitals, other care facilities)

\$286.5 million in spending authority for the State Emergency Management Agency.

• \$628,750 appropriation to the Department of Agriculture to help address the growing black vulture problem impacting livestock owners statewide.

\$20 million to establish school safety programs, including physical security upgrades and associated technology, bleeding control kits, and automatic external defibrillators.

Plus, natives better serve songbirds, pollinating wildlife. insects. and Thoughtful species choices can also provide a series of wildflower blooms from spring into autumn. Native prairie grasses provide backdrops in summer, golden-red color in autumn, and interesting patterns in winter.

Late winter is a good time to prepare for spring planting. Cydney Ross, MDC native landscape specialist, will provide suggestions and talk about how selecting the right plants and designing with intent can help a gardener achieve the colors and patterns they seek. A backdrop for the class will be the extensive native plant garden at the Anita B. Gorman Discovery Center in Kansas City, where Ross is based. That garden showcases how natives can be used in landscape designs.
