Clearing Up The Confusion, Marijuana Use In Missouri

On November 8, Missourians voted "yes" on Amendment 3, which legalized recreational use of marijuana, meaning anyone over the age of 21 is now able to buy weed, like marijuana flower or edibles, effective on February 6.

The "yes" vote amended the Missouri Constitution to Legalize the purchase, possession, consumption, use, delivery, manufacture and sale of marijuana for personal use for adults over the age of twenty-one. It also allows individuals with certain marijuana-related offenses to petition for release from prison or parole and probation and have their records expunged and enact a six percent tax on the retail price of recreational marijuana.

Medical marijuana has been legal in the state since a ballot measure passed in 2018, but voters went



PASSED IN NOVEMBER, questions remained about what the legalization of adult-use marijuana looked like. The constitutional amendment allows adults 21 and older the right to possess and consume marijuana, with limits, but there was no legal way to buy it without a medical license. That changed on February 6.

a step further this past November by approving a constitutional amendment legalizing the drug for anyone 21 or older. The new law makes Missouri the 21st state to allow recreational

use. Under the amendment, non-medicinal pot use became legal in the state in December. But sales were stalled because the health department had until

Monday, February 6 to issue business licenses.

Benton County Sheriff Eric Knox was not pleased with the vote to legalize recreational marijuana.

"What someone does in

their home is one thing, but when they are out on our county roads and highways, we have to deal with impaired drivers," said Knox. "It will be dealt

Jason's Automotive at 805 Wood Street in Warsaw had its truck stolen over Christmas weekend by someone who dragged it behind a white car, down Main Street, during the night. Cameras located nearby at Benton County Tire were checked to see if the thief could be spotted driving down Main Street, but no photos were found. However, a neighbor of the business's owners, Jason and Ashley Judd, saw the truck being dragged and informed them.

"We didn't even know our truck was missing when we returned to work after Christmas until an employee asked if we had taken it home with us," said Ashlie Judd. "The truck had flat tires and wasn't even running when it was stolen. We offered a reward of \$500 for information about the theft and a family living between Lincoln and Windsor called me and said that they had found

Valentine's Day is just around the corner. Americans on average spend \$198.50 on valentine gifts and cards. But where did this holiday originate?

You might be surprised to learn that there are three possible St. Valentines.

One defied the Emperor Claudius II of Rome, until

he was martyred, in the 3rd century. His crime against the emperor: Marrying people. The emperor wished for his soldiers to remain single and focused on war.

The bishop Terni is another possible St. Valentine who was also beheaded by Claudius II.

Other stories say the true namesake is St. Valentine, who helped Christians escape from brutal Roman prisons. Imprisoned himself, he penned a love

note to the jailor's daughter and signed it, "From your Valentine", a phrase we still use today.

The oldest recorded valentine was authored in the year 1415 by the French Duke Charles who, at the tender age of 21, was imprisoned in the Tower of London. He wrote to his lover, "I am already sick of love, my gentle valentine."

February 14 was originally the pagan festival of Lupercalia: a festival that

I was gifted with some fabulous avocados a few weeks ago. One of my favorite quick and easy lunch recipes came to mind; and serving right out of the avocado shell makes for a perfect presentation.

2 ripe avocados
2 Tablespoons balsamic vinegar

allow students to transfer wherever they want. Fewer students in our rural school district means a huge reduction in funds for activities, teacher/staff salaries and transportation. In the bill, transportation will be the parent's responsibility unless the student qualifies for free/reduced meals. And if our rural schools have to consolidate, they plan to tack on "parameters" (free/reduced meals AND live within 5 miles of the school). The goal of this bill is to destabilize and defund the Benton County School District - Cole Camp, Lincoln and Warsaw - which will lead to school consolidation. HB253, as outlined, would necessitate knee-jerk, reactive measures that would disrupt staffing, cause financial hardships, and ultimately result in negative outcomes for working families and students. Benton County Schools are the center and binding force in our rural community. Thriving communities have graduates who return to give back to the community who raised them. Public schools must be fully funded and supported, not set up for this "haves or have nots" mentality.

with the same as a DWI. If a driver is weaving in the lanes, crossing the center line or making wide turns then he/she will be pulled over.”

According to the Department of Health and Senior Services spokeswoman Lisa Cox, almost all of the state’s medical marijuana dispensaries applied to sell recreational pot.

Under Amendment 3, recreational marijuana is allowed anywhere smoking tobacco is. However, it is still illegal to smoke while driving or operating a motor vehicle, including trains, aircrafts and boats.

In addition, marijuana cannot be consumed or possessed on the grounds of any public or private schools (pre-k through higher education) or correctional facility.

The penalty for smoking in a prohibited area is a civil penalty and a fine of no more than \$100.

According to Benton County Presiding Commissioner Steve Daleske, the Benton County Commission is working with legal counsel to determine how Benton County will deal with recreational marijuana.

“While the city will be able to add tax to the sale of marijuana, we are still researching how the county will deal with this,” said Daleske. “I don’t see the sale of marijuana as a benefit to our county.”

According to the Missouri Department of Health and Senior Services, 97% of medicinal cannabis dispensaries requested to expand their licenses to recreational.

Whether it’s flower, vape pens, edibles or even sparkling water — it’ll all be available to Missourians, or really anyone. A customer just needs a valid ID and must be 21 years and older.

Without a medicinal card, a consumer is allowed to purchase up to three ounces at a time. With a medical card, the minimum limit is six ounces, and a customer can get up to a four times [possession] limit.

Under Missouri’s medical marijuana law that passed in 2018, Missourians were granted the ability to grow their own cannabis at home if they registered as a patient cultivator.

DHSS began accepting applications for personal cultivation for recreation as soon as February 6. Once applications are accepted, Missourians 21 and older can cultivate marijuana for personal, non-commercial use at an enclosed and locked facility at their homes. Those licenses cost \$150 and are valid for three years.

Missourians will be allowed to have six flowering plants and up to 18 nonmature plants.

The 6% tax for recreational marijuana will be collected and distributed to a number of organizations in the state through the “Veterans, Health and Community Reinvestment Fund.”

First, an amount determined appropriate will be distributed to the Department of Health and Senior Services to regulate the programming established under Amendment 3.

Second, an amount determined appropriate

will be distributed to government entities carrying out responsibilities in the expungement of criminal records.

The remaining funds will be distributed in thirds to:

1) the Missouri veterans commission and allied state agencies, exclusively for health care for military veterans and their families,

2) agencies and nonprofits to increase access to drug addiction treatment through grants and

3) the Missouri public defender system.

It’s worth noting that local governments can additionally tax the sale of recreational marijuana up to 3%.

According to Warsaw Mayor Eddie Simons, the Warsaw City Board voted to add an additional 3% sales tax to marijuana sold in the city limits with voter approval.

The first half of Amendment 3 addresses the state’s medical marijuana industry and there are two notable outcomes.

First, nurse practitioners and primary care physicians now can recommend medical marijuana. Previously, the Department of Health and Senior Services had to certify patients.

And second, medical facilities will have the first opportunity to produce and/or sell recreational marijuana.

Any medical marijuana cultivation facility, medical marijuana dispensary facility or marijuana-infused products manufacturing facility holding an active license can convert their licenses to a comprehensive marijuana license. This means the facility could produce and/or sell both medical and recreational marijuana.

Marijuana microbusiness licenses are different than comprehensive and medical marijuana licenses.

To qualify for a microbusiness facility license, an applicant must meet one of the following criteria:

-Have a net worth of less than \$250,000 and have an income below 250% of the federal poverty level; or

-Have a valid service-connected disability card issued by the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs; or

-Be a person who has been or a person whose parent/guardian/spouse has been arrested, prosecuted or convicted for a non-violent marijuana offense; or

-Reside in a ZIP code where 30% or more of the population lives below federal poverty level, the rate of unemployment is 50% or higher than the state average, or the historic rate of incarceration for marijuana-related offenses is 50% higher than the rate for the entire state; or

-Graduated from a school district that was unaccredited

By June 2023, the Department of Health and Senior Services will make license application instructions and forms for marijuana microbusiness

facilities available to the public. The department will begin accepting these applications by early Sept. 2023.

Applicants must pay an initial \$1,500 application fee. If granted, licenses are valid for three years and renewable for \$1,500.

By October 2023, the Department of Health and Senior Services must issue six marijuana microbusiness facilities licenses per the state’s eight congressional districts. At least two must be dispensary facilities and four must be wholesale facilities.

According to Amendment 3, six more licenses will be added per congressional district 270 days after the department issues initial licenses. And another six will be added 548 days after initial issuing.

There are two types of marijuana microbusiness facilities:

-Wholesale facility: Work internally and may cultivate, process, manufacture, transport and sell marijuana products to any other microbusiness facility

-Dispensary facility: Work both internally and with the public and may process, package, deliver and sell marijuana products to other microbusiness facilities or directly to patients and consumers.

Marijuana microbusiness owners will have the ability to apply for licenses of other marijuana or medical marijuana facilities in the future.

Individuals with certain non-violent marijuana-related offenses will have their records automatically expunged, or cleared.

Expungement of records is not automatic for everyone, though.

According to Amendment 3, the state’s circuit courts will expunge the criminal records of individuals with misdemeanor marijuana offenses who are no longer incarcerated or under the supervision of the department of corrections by July 2023.

Within the first year of Amendment 3 being effective, the criminal records of individuals who are no longer incarcerated or under supervision by the department of corrections but have completed their sentence for any felony marijuana offenses will be cleared.

For all class A, class B, class C, class D and felony offenses for possession of more than three pounds of marijuana, the circuit courts will expunge criminal records after individuals have completed their incarceration, including supervised probation or parole.

“The person whose record is expunged shall be treated in all respects as if he or she had never been arrested, convicted or sentenced for the offense,” Amendment 3 states. “Such person shall not be required to acknowledge the existence of such a criminal history.”

Non-violent offenses include drug possession, gambling or disturbing peace. Violent crimes are

those that include bodily harm, including murder, domestic assault, some types of robbery and armed criminal acts.

There are three instances where incarcerated individuals can petition for release:

-Any person who would not have been guilty of an adult or juvenile offense if the law was in effect at the time of the offense.

-Any person who would have been guilty for a lesser adult or juvenile offense if the law was in effect at the time of the offense.

-Any person who is serving a marijuana offense that is a misdemeanor, class E felony or class D felony involving possession of three pounds or less of marijuana (excluding offenses involving distribution/delivery to a minor, violence or operation of a vehicle while under the influence).

Release dates are dependent on the severity of one’s offense. Amendment 3 organizes them in the following order:

-By March 2023, sentencing courts will have completed the adjudications of all cases involving only misdemeanor marijuana offenses.

-By June 2023, sentencing courts will have completed the adjudications of all cases involving class E felony, or successor designation, marijuana offenses.

-By September 2023, sentencing courts will have completed the adjudications of all cases involving class D felony, or successor designation, marijuana offenses.

“I am totally against the way the new law is written,” said Sheriff Knox. “This is going to cost our state a great deal of money. The urban areas of Missouri passed this new law. The rural areas of Missouri are more conservative and didn’t want recreational marijuana legalized.”

As of Thursday, Missouri Courts reported 5,203 marijuana expungements have been granted by the state. The county-by-county breakdown shows Clay County leads the state with 1,305 expungements granted thus far.

Fourteen counties in the state have expunged at least 100 marijuana cases, including Buchanan, Carroll and Pettis counties.

The courts have until December to expunge felony cases and until June to expunge misdemeanors per Amendment 3.

As of February 2, there are 27 marijuana expungement cases that have been filed throughout the state that have yet to be determined.

If recreational marijuana becomes legal at the federal level, Amendment 3 will remain in place in the state of Missouri, unless the federal law states otherwise.

sacrifice, the smacking of women with animal hides, (to encourage fertility) and a lottery to match men and women as couples. It wasn’t until the 5th century that Roman Pope Gelasius declared February 14 as Valentine’s Day, and not until the Middle Ages that the day became associated with love and relationships. February 14 was also the date when it was believed birds began their mating rituals, which is why birds are also a symbol of Valentine’s Day.

Cupid, the apple cheeked cherub with a bow and arrow, is a representation of the Greek God Eros: an incredibly handsome and immortal man with the intimidating ability to make people fall in love. It was the Romans in the 4th Century BC who re-made his image into the flying angelic boy, and not until the late 1700’s was “Cupid” associated with Valentine’s Day. This is also when the holiday really began to take hold and people showed love and affection by sending hand-written cards and letters to lovers and friends.

The tradition of giving flowers on Valentine’s Day can be traced back to King Charles II of Sweden, who after travelling in Persia introduced the idea to Europe. He is also credited with giving purpose to the different colors of flowers given: Red for love, pink for happiness, purple for royalty and white for sympathy. This tradition took off in the Victorian Age (1837-1901) and remains a popular gift for friends and lovers. In fact, almost 250 million roses are grown annually just in preparation for Valentine’s Day.

Liz Hollingsworth, owner of Warsaw Flower Shop, said, “Valentine’s Day is the number one holiday for me for flower sales. Even more than Mother’s Day.”

The first mass-produced valentine cards were created and sold by Esther

A. Howland in 1940. Howland is known as the mother of the American Valentine and is credited with commercializing the holiday with her elaborate cards. Today it is estimated 145 million cards are given on Valentine’s Day.

Dana Koll, owner of Boring Rexall Drug in Warsaw, sells greeting cards.

“People that may not normally buy cards come in around Valentine’s Day.” Koll said.

Chocolate is also a popular gift on this holiday, as it has been considered an aphrodisiac food since the time of the Aztecs. It only grows in the neotropics, so in the past chocolate was a delicacy known only to the very wealthy of Europe. Richard Cadbury introduced the heart-shaped box of chocolates in 1861, and it is now one of the most popular gifts on Valentine’s Day: 58 million pounds of chocolate is produced for this day alone. Charles M. Schulz said it best: “All you need is love, but a little chocolate now and then doesn’t hurt.”

It is hard to know just where to start. The Lincoln Cardinals won the Kaysinger Conference tournament last Saturday for the second year in a row in Sedalia on the campus of State Fair Community College. They defeated second seeded Tipton, 46-39 to establish a school record the longest winning streak for the boys at 22-0. The Lincoln girls record is 23-0.

The Cardinals defeated Tipton at home a few weeks back. Like last time, Lincoln fell behind early and trailed 18-12 after one. Considering they hold their opponents to under 40 per game, 18 points was way too many for Coach Tyler Burke and crew but the Tipton Cardinals hit shot

after shot early on.

Tipton led by nine at 25-16. Lincoln would score eight unanswered points to pull to within one at 25-24 behind two free throws made by Connor Lynde, two nice buckets by Mack Hesse and a driving basket by Kaleb Mundy. Tipton would hang on to a 29-28 lead at the half.

At 6:20 of the third period, Ross Johnson would give Lincoln the lead at 30-29 on a layup and Tipton called time out. Zack Moon would give the lead back to Tipton on a basket underneath at 32-31 after Kyle Eckhoff had made a free throw for Lincoln.

Hesse would force his will on a drive to the basket and then the 6'4" senior center came up with a pancake-like block that saw the ball and the shooter both come crashing to the floor.

A few minutes later, Hesse sent a ball flying across

the court with another intimidating block.

With Lincoln's defense connecting, Lynde would take a huge charge as the momentum switched to Lincoln with a 37-32 third quarter lead.

The fourth period wasn't for the faint of heart. Lincoln claimed a hard fought nine point lead but Jack Moon hit a long three to make it 43-3. Mundy would go 3-6 from the line in the final seconds to ensure the win for Lincoln.

Coach Burke commented, "I told our players at halftime that we were okay but we needed to hold them to four points in the third and we held them to three. We have struggled to score all year. Our goal has been to hold teams under 40 points and somehow hopefully we can manage to scrape up 41".

He added, "Tipton is very athletic and they are such a good ball team. It is so hard to do what we have done. To be 22-0 is really an amazing accomplishment."

Lincoln has four more regular season games to go and a tough road trip to Northwest on Friday.

Lincoln defeated Sacred Heart for the second time this season 43-35 in the semifinal of the Kaysinger Conference tournament on Tuesday night at State Fair Community College in Sedalia.

They moved to 21-0, which unofficially is the longest opening season undefeated winning streak in Lincoln history.

However, for a moment, that record looked threatened by the sharp shooting Gremlins.



Take advantage of higher IRA limits

Over the past year, the rising cost of living has certainly been challenging. But for investors, there's at least one silver lining to inflation — a higher IRA contribution limit.

IRAs have been around for nearly half a century, but they've only been pegged to inflation since 2001. Since then, the contribution limit has risen every few years, with the last increase coming in 2019. Now, in 2023, the annual IRA contribution limit has moved to \$6,500, up from \$6,000 last year. If you're 50 or older, you can put in up to \$7,500 a year, up from \$6,500 in 2022.

If you've already established an automatic investment plan for your IRA, you could consider bumping up your payments to accommodate the new, higher limits. However, if you can afford it, you may want to fully fund your IRA as soon as possible, so the money can potentially be growing throughout the year. But you can contribute to your 2023 IRA any time from now until April 15, 2024. (And it's also not too late to contribute to your 2022 IRA — you've got until April 18 of this year.)

If you haven't yet opened an IRA, you might want to do so now to take advantage of the higher contribution limits. Depending on your situation, you could contribute either to a Roth or traditional IRA. Here are the basics for each one:

• **Roth IRA** – When you invest in a Roth IRA, your earnings and withdrawals are free from federal taxes, provided you've had your account at least five years and you don't start taking



money out until you're 59½ or older. In 2023, you can contribute the full amount to a Roth IRA if you are single and your modified adjusted gross income (MAGI) is less than \$138,000; above that amount, your contributions will be reduced until they are phased out completely at \$153,000. If you're married and file jointly, this "phase-out range" is \$218,000 – \$228,000.

• **Traditional IRA** – Generally, you can invest in a traditional IRA regardless of your income level. If you and your spouse don't have a 401(k) or similar employer-sponsored retirement plan, your contributions are typically tax deductible; if you or your spouse do have such a plan, the tax deductibility will depend on your income level. But regardless of whether your contributions are deductible, your earnings can grow on a tax-deferred basis.

If you have a choice, which IRA should you pick? The decision largely revolves around this question: Would you benefit more from the traditional IRA tax deduction (assuming you qualify for it) or the tax-free withdrawals of a Roth IRA? And the answer mostly depends on whether your tax rate will be higher or lower during your retirement. (Continued from Page 1) the truck sitting in their driveway. When the police went to check it out, they found that the vin number on the dashboard had been replaced with a vin number for a 1983 truck. Our truck was a 1986. Further investigation within the glove box and under hood verified that the truck was the one that had been stolen from our business. The family told the police that they bought the vehicle from someone. However, there were many clues that they weren't telling the truth, but not enough to make an arrest. There was a white car parked by the house, and other cars sitting near the house with parts removed. The truck was finally towed back to us, but the family kept asking us for the reward money and I told them that they were not getting paid to steal our vehicle."

Judd said that cameras have now been installed at Jason's Automotive which

can be viewed through cell phones.

Mike's Auto at 309 Washington Street in Warsaw had a customer's truck stolen out of the business driveway during the night of January 2. The switch was torn out of the car, and a screwdriver inserted to start the car. The owner of the car reported the theft to the local police, and it was discovered in a high school parking lot in Kingston, on Hwy 50, and returned to the owner.

A truck belonging to the City of Warsaw's Parks and Recreation Department was stolen recently and found later parked on a street in town. However, tools used for city work were stolen and have not been recovered.

A man living in the Worries End neighborhood off Hwy M, submitted a post on Facebook group Benton County Chatter, on January 19, stating that his cargo trailer carrying a lot of tools that he uses in his home

repair business was stolen from his neighborhood. The trailer was located, but the tools are gone.

Vehicle thefts are going on around Benton County according to Warsaw Chief of Police Sean McCannon. He said that he and his officers have a couple of leads and are getting close to apprehending suspects, but they would appreciate it if anyone with information about anything that doesn't look right would contact the Police Department at (660) 438-9555. He said that that a reward of \$1,000 is being offered by the City of Warsaw for information leading to the arrest of the thief who stole the department's tools. Chief McCannon also added that information on any of the robberies would result in "his sincere gratitude!"

"We have recently been seeing more people that we have put in jail, get out and go back to the life of crime they lived before going to prison," said

Chief McCannon. "Jails are overpopulated and inmates who are not among the most violent offenders are being released before serving their full sentence. Anyone who comes forward with pertinent information can remain anonymous, but the best help would be to identify yourself and sign statements that would help in court."

Sheriff Eric Knox said that he and his deputies recovered two vehicles in the county that were stolen in Sedalia and Kansas City. He said that the suspects have been identified and he and other law enforcement personnel had them in pursuit on the night of February 4, but didn't get them. In relation to these crimes another pursuit was in place on February 6 and 7 for a white male subject, Nicholas Littlejohn, around Poor Boy Road. He was described on Facebook Benton County Missouri 911 as being seen wearing a hooded jacket and all

came and being armed and dangerous. Citizens were warned to avoid this area and residents were advised to make sure their vehicles and homes were secured. In an update from Sheriff Knox on the morning of February 7, he reported that the subject being pursued fired at law enforcement officers.

"It is important to pull keys out of your vehicles, including tractors, side-by-sides and anything after using them and lock up," said Sheriff Knox. "Thieves are opportunists and take the easy stuff first. We have a new judge and two attorneys now and the thieves will go to jail. They won't get away with this."

People making comments to the post on Facebook Benton County Chatter about the theft of the trailer and tools near Hwy M advised that it might help locate stolen items by searching Craigslist and Marketplace as well as local pawnshops.



Department commits to action through new national strategy

The Missouri Department of Transportation has partnered with the U.S. Department of Transportation on a new, comprehensive approach to reversing the rise in traffic fatalities and serious injuries on the nation's highways, roads and streets. This National Roadway Safety Strategy (NRSS) partnership comes after two consecutive years of more than 1,000 roadway fatalities in Missouri, a mark that hadn't previously been met since 2006.

MoDOT was recognized as a "First Mover" for the U.S. DOT's NRSS program. MoDOT has committed to a Call to Action centered around its Buckle Up Phone Down (BUPD) program. The BUPD program challenges Missourians to do their part in making Missouri's roads safer by using their seat belt and putting down, or turning off, their phone while driving.



"Missouri is honored to partner with the U.S. DOT in support of the national effort toward safer roads," said MoDOT Director Patrick McKenna. "The fatalities on our nation's roads and here in Missouri are staggering. On average in Missouri, three people are killed each day on our roads and two of them weren't wearing a seat belt. It's imperative we commit ourselves to safer driving habits and reverse this unacceptable trend. This national partnership is an important step, but the effort requires a commitment from every person on the road every trip."

MoDOT initiated the BUPD program in 2017, and it has spread steadily across Missouri and more than a dozen other states. The current program focuses outreach to drivers through educational materials and a BUPD pledge, which is available to individuals and businesses at www.modot.org/bupd.

This BUPD Call to Action commitment is just the latest in MoDOT's ongoing safety improvement efforts encompassed in Show-Me Zero, the state's strategic highway safety plan. The plan promotes safety for all road users by focusing on four key messages: buckle up, phone down, slow down and drive sober. Show-Me Zero also embraces a safe system approach which works by building and reinforcing multiple layers of protection to both prevent crashes from happening and to minimize the harm caused when crashes do occur. Members of the Missouri House this week approved a proposed change to the constitution that would allow voters to decide if the state should raise the threshold to modify the constitution in the future. The House approved HJR 43 by a vote of 108-50.

The key component of HJR 43 would change the threshold required to approve changes to the state constitution. Currently, changes to the constitution require only a simple majority for approval. If approved by the legislature and voters, HJR 43 would raise the threshold to 60 percent voter approval for passage.

Supporters of the measure say it will protect what they view as a sacred document that should only be amended when absolutely necessary. They point out the current version of the Missouri Constitution has changed more than 60 times since it was written in 1945. In comparison, the United States Constitution has been amended only 17 times since 1791.

Proponents also say the increased threshold will help minimize the influence of out-of-state groups that have no ties to Missouri but spend millions of dollars to change the state constitution.

The sponsor of HJR 43 said the groups "try to reimagine Missouri in their vision." He said, "I think it should be in the vision of the people of the state of Missouri."

The legislation also requires that voters in each congressional district have the opportunity to review and comment upon all initiative petitions proposing amendments to the constitution. The secretary of state would administer the public forums, which would take place at least 15 days before the measure appears on the ballot.

The sponsor said "This would require that you go into all eight and give people a chance to have their voice heard and submit testimony. We're trying to give them a greater voice and give them a chance also to find out everything that's in that."

Another portion of HJR 43 would clarify that only citizens of the United States of America who are residents of the State of Missouri and who are properly registered to vote in the State of Missouri will be considered legal voters.

Supporters said the goal is to protect the voices of registered Missouri voters in every part of the state, and that ultimately voters will decide if the change is a good idea.

"We're going to ask the people to vote," said the sponsor. "The people of Missouri will decide if we are right or wrong. We are not overstepping the people. We are going to the people and asking them to say what is your opinion of this? Should it be changed to 60 percent?"

The measure now moves to the Senate for consideration.

Lawmakers Observe Missouri Memory Day

Many lawmakers were clad in purple on Wednesday, February 1 as the Missouri House of Representatives officially recognized Missouri Memory Day. The annual observance is meant to raise awareness about Alzheimer's disease and place a focus on the importance of helping those living with dementia and their caregivers.

Approximately 120,000 Missourians currently live with Alzheimer's. Nationally, more than 6 million Americans are living with the disease, and that number is projected to rise to nearly 13 million by 2050. Alzheimer's kills more than breast cancer and prostate cancer combined, with 1 in 3 seniors dying with Alzheimer's or another dementia.

During Missouri Memory Day, legislators learned about the importance of recognizing the needs and rights of those living with Alzheimer's disease, as well as their family members and caregivers. Advocates also informed lawmakers on efforts to advance critical research toward methods of treatment, prevention and, ultimately, a cure.

New Website Launched to Help Prevent Suicide among Service Members, Veterans, and Their Families

Veterans, service members, and their families now have a website they can access that is designed to help reduce the rate of suicide in Missouri. This week, Gov. Mike Parson unveiled the new site located at www.mogovchallenge.com.

Missouri established a Governor's Challenge team in 2021 under Parson's leadership. The Governor's Challenge to Prevent Suicide among Service Members, Veterans, and their Families is a non-partisan state interagency team created to collaborate, plan, and implement suicide prevention best practices and policies for service members, Veterans, and their families across the state. The U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs and the U.S. Department of Health & Human Services' Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration originally launched the Governor's and Mayor's Challenges to bring together leaders in community and state governments to prevent suicide among service members, Veterans, and their families.
