

It's been 11 weeks filled
with ups and downs, glory
and pain, many cheers and .
. . . now tears, as the Warsaw

Wildcats football team saw
it's amazing turnaround sea-
son come to an end with a
42-28 road loss to the Hus-
kers of Lafayette County (Hig-
ginsville) in the MSHSAA
Class 2 District 5 semifinals
on Friday night.

"We knew coming in that
we needed to play a mis-

take-free game in order to
win," Warsaw coach Ryan
Boyer said. "Unfortunately,
we were not able to do that
in all three phases this week."

The Wildcats found them-
selves down early after the
Huskers' Gabe Nevels re-
ceived Warsaw's kick from
Thomas Hooiveld, eluded

the Wildcats coverage team
and returned the opening
kick-off for a touchdown.
Kyzer Gann-Vega came on
and tacked on the PAT for a
quick 7-0 Higginsville lead.

But the Wildcats answered
on their first possession and,
after picking up several first
downs on the ground along

(Continued from Page 1) the way, Warsaw offensive coordinator Danny Morrison dialed up the perfect play on one of them. With first and ten from just across midfield, 'Cats quarterback Brady Slavens dropped back, stepped up in the pocket and hit Cameron Seevers over the top for a 43 yard touchdown pass. Hooiveld's point-after-try was no good, but the Wildcats were on the board, trailing 7-6.

The home team struck again on their first offensive possession when they churned up the tall grass on their home field and capitalized when Nevels took a handoff and crossed the goal line from 12 yards out. Gann-Vega's kick was good this time too and Higginsville stayed in front with a 14-6 score.

The Lafayette Countians scored their third touchdown of the opening quarter when they turned to their vicious ground game once again on their next drive. This time, the Warsaw defense got a heavy dose of the Husker's 6'1", 222 pound fullback, Austin Gard. The senior found paydirt on a 2 yard touchdown run with under one minute remaining in the period and Gann-Vega split the uprights once again to stretch the Higginsville lead to 21-6.

In a fairly quiet second quarter, both offenses slowed down a bit and neither managed to produce a touchdown. Instead, it was the Wildcats defense this time that scored their second TD in as many weeks when, with 3:11 left to go in the first half and with Higginsville driving again, James Kellner would come up from his linebacker position and punch the ball loose from Nevels' vice. Slavens was there on the play too, reached down, hauled in the fumble and returned it for another Warsaw touchdown. Slavens would also opt to keep the ball himself on the 2-point conversion. He dove in and the Wildcats cut their deficit to 21-14. Coincidentally, this was Kellner's first game action upon returning after breaking a bone in his foot in this year's Jamboree earlier in the season.

The one score lead stretched back to two again soon though after Warsaw chose to kick deep on their next possession in an attempt to keep the ball away from Nevels. Instead, the kick would be hauled in by the Huskers Aron Vazquez inside his own 10-yard line. He dodged the Wildcats kick coverage and slipped by the last defender on his way to the endzone for another kick-off return for touchdown for Higginsville. Gann-Vega came on to hit the PAT and the Huskers had Warsaw doubled up at halftime, 28-14.

The resilient fight from the Wildcats in the second half was indicative of their season and, moreso, was a sign of what the team and program have been working on for the last few years; putting War-

saw football back on the map.

On the first drive of the second half, Slavens and the offense came out swinging. After using chunk running plays and driving the ball to inside the Higginsville 20-yard line, Slavens slipped the outreached grasp of the Huskers defense, moved to his left and found Seevers in the back corner of the endzone for a 17 yard touchdown pass. Hooiveld came on to nail the PAT and Warsaw tightened things up at 28-21 and that is how the scoreboard read at the end of the third.

The fourth quarter was pivotal in more ways than one. On their first possession of the fourth and final frame, the Huskers drove the ball inside the 5-yard line and stretched their lead again on a 3 yard touchdown run by the Higginsville signal-caller, Brad Hayes. Gann-Vega capped the drive with another PAT to make the score 35-21 with 11:55 left on the game clock.

Perhaps even more paralyzing than the Higginsville touchdown was that Slavens laid on the ground following the play and in obvious pain after helping to extend the tackle in the endzone. He was aided off of the field by other Wildcats players and staff and would be relegated to the trainer's table. After an assessment by Wildcats AT Lisha King, Slavens was seen with ice on his right knee and on a set of crutches as he was done for the night.

Gard added another touchdown for the Huskers on their next possession to extend the lead back to 42-21 after another Gann-Vega PAT and then a 1 yard touchdown from the Wildcats' Gage Whitaker, coupled with another successful Hooiveld PAT would round out the scoring for the 42-28 final.

"I was very proud of our team Friday night," Boyer said. "The boys played hard for the entire game, handled some adversity and just continued to battle."

Slavens finished with 58 yards on the ground and completed 8 of 11 passing attempts for 146 yards and 2 touchdowns. In relief of Slavens late in the game, Tayten Boyer hit on 5 of 12 passing for 112 yards. Before taking over under center, Boyer was also on the receiving end of 1 pass for 6 yards.

Whitaker had 34 yards on the ground and 1 touchdown while Seevers and Nick Bagley rushed for 13 and 11 yards, respectively. Seevers hauled in 8 receptions for 189 yards and 2 touchdowns and Bagley caught 1 pass for 8 yards.

Grant Chapman contributed 55 tough yards on 3 receptions with several of those yards coming after the catch. Hooiveld was 2 for 3 on his PAT's on the night.

Slavens also led the Wildcats defense with 14.5 tackles as he was all over the field. Whitaker notched 5.5 tackles and Riley Taylor tallied 5.

Chapman had 4 tackles for Warsaw. Kellner and Garrett McGann both had 3.5 and Seevers racked up 3 tackles.

Kellner also had 1 forced fumble and Slavens had the fumble recovery for the TD for the Wildcats.

The unfortunate reality of all high school sports is that, once in playoff rounds, only one team will escape victorious. The other, no matter how spectacular their regular season may have been, and no matter how valiant the effort, a loss means a disappointing end to someone's season.

But this year's Wildcats have no reason to be disappointed. They finished with an overall season record of 9-2, their best mark since the 2010 campaign under former head coach and now Missouri high school hall of famer, Randy Morrow.

Though this year's team had their sights set on team goals, many players threatened WHS records. Slavens (1,748) fell just 104 yards shy of Jonathan Gott's (1,852) record for rushing yards in a single season. Slavens (19) was also just 4 touchdowns short of Seth Bauman's (23) record for rushing touchdowns in a season. Cameron Seevers (189) fell a mere 8 yards short of breaking Bradley Jelinek's (197) record for receiving yards in a single game when he put up 189 against Higginsville. Seevers (9) was also just 3 TD's short of Bailey Jelinek's (12) record for receiving TD's in a season.

The Wildcats will graduate 9 seniors in the class of 2022, all of whom contributed statistically, as well as leaders on and off the field. But the class has re-built the foundation for Warsaw football for years to come.

The Enterprise will have a complete recap of this year's run with season statistics in next week's edition.

City Clerk Brown said she has received information about a Broken Vessels ministry, a Christmas project which obtains wish lists from persons in area long term care facilities, then gets people to donate items requested. She asked Aldermen to approve use of City Hall Dec. 13th, to assemble items received so they can then be delivered to those persons. Her request was approved.

Under new business, the group approved Chad Mullins' proposal for renewal of property and liability insurance with Mike Keith Insurance Co. There will be about a five percent increase in fees. They also approved an ordinance to enter into a \$25,000 to \$32,000 contract with Gram Engineering & Design for professional design services for extension of the City's water and sanitary sewer system northward. And lastly, the group also established a pay schedule for newly hired Deputy City Clerk Jazmin Henkel.

Alderman Nelson reported sales taxes are up about 16%, use taxes about \$3,000 above budget, water revenue up about 1.6 %. sewer revenue up about 2.4%. Mayor King reported there will be a small fly-in at the City's airport on Nov. 13, and a City employee dinner will be held December 17. The meeting closed about 7:20 PM. These meetings are usually held on 2nd Monday eves; visitors are welcome.

(Continued from Page 1) 11, 1919, "Armistice Day" to commemorate the end of fighting in WWI, "with solemn pride in the heroism of those who died in the country's service and with gratitude for the victory." Germany and the Allies had signed an armistice agreement in 1918, "at the eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month."

British author, H.G. Wells, dubbed WWI "the war to end all wars." Yet, 21 years later the Second World War began in 1939 and continued to 1945, and cost the lives of over 400,000 U.S. military personnel. By law signed by President Eisenhower in 1954, Armistice Day became "Veterans Day," described by the Department of Veterans Affairs (VA), "to honor America's veterans for their patriotism, love of country, and willingness to serve and sacrifice for the common good."

Federal law effective in 1968 changed observance of Veterans Day and most other holidays to Mondays to create three-day weekends. However, pushback from the public led to President Ford's decision in 1975 to restore observance to the original date. Now, and since 1978 Americans celebrate Veterans Day on November 11, regardless of the day of the week.

Some local businesses offer regular military discounts, others reserve them for holidays.

For example: Dollar General's 11 percent dis-

count for veterans and active military who register at dollargeneral.com/military will be honored in November on the 11th instead of the regularly-scheduled second Wednesday of the month. McDonald's in Sedalia and Warsaw offers free breakfast combo meals to retired and active-duty military on November 11; and R-Bar & Grill in Warsaw offers a free 6-oz. sirloin steak dinner from 11 AM to 8 PM on November 11 to active or retired military who show military ID or Form DD-214.

Yet, highlighted this week are the veterans organizations in Benton County that organize and participate in annual Veterans Day events. They also, throughout the year, raise funds for and donate time and services to their members and to the community at large.

At 11 AM on November 11 as in every year, American Legion Post 217 in Warsaw performs the "Wreathing of the Waters" ceremonies at Drake Harbor wherein representatives set out in a boat to lay a memorial wreath. Veterans from Warsaw Leathernecks Detachment 1254 attend the wreathing ceremony during which the ringing of bells at 11 AM on the 11th day of the 11th month has historical significance.

Immediately following the ceremony, Post 217 will host a chili/soup lunch at its headquarters on Hwy MM, open to the public for a free will donation. Then, at 12:30 PM, dedication of **VETERAN Page 16**

Lincoln's Season Ends In Blowout In Urbana

The Lincoln Cardinals traveled to Skyline last Friday to play the Tigers in second round district action. Lincoln seeded fourth went into the contest with the number one seeded Skyline Tigers looking for the upset.

The possibility looked promising as Lincoln took just seven plays to score as QB Connor Lynde scored from six yards out on a nice sprint to the right corner. Included in that drive was a 41-yard bomb to Caden Smallwood. Their point after two-point conversion failed and it 6-0 at the 7:59 mark.

Ricky Woodhouse would score at the 2:06 mark on a nice four-yard run. Their kick was good and it 7-6 after one.

Skyline would score again at the 10:30 tick of the clock and with the kick it was 14-6 and the tide was beginning to turn but not before the greatest defensive play of the season by Lincoln. Woodhouse would break free and somehow Lynde came out of nowhere to trip him up at the one. It was one of those plays where you ask yourself what I just saw. Woodhouse would then score from the one.

Lynde, who was called Lindy all night by the stadium announcer, would

throw a twenty yard pass down the sidelines to Kyle Eckhoff, who would accidentally tip the ball right into the hands of a Skyline DB.

Things was not going Lincoln's way as they were later penalized with 12 men on the field.

Skyline would drive and complete a touchdown pass to Zack Williams with 19 seconds in the half. Kick was good as Skyline held a 27-6 halftime margin.

The second half was a nightmare as it took Skyline less than a minute to score on a pass from Lawson Beem to Zack Williams over Caden Smallwood in the endzone. It marked the first time anyone had scored over Smallwood this season. The ball was perfectly thrown to the taller receiver. Williams was All-State last year as a junior.

It was now 34-6 and the fat lady was ready to sing.

Lincoln would score again making it 34-12 on a four-yard run by Ross Johnson only to have Skyline countered to make to 41-12. Another score and a safety with the JV playing made it 50-12.

Lynde had ten tackles. Nine solo which is good but not what you want from your safety. Shows the other team is breaking through your line and secondary defenders in most cases.

Levi Campbell had eight tackles. The senior will

leave a void in Lincoln's defense.

Lynde was 6-20 passing for 83 yards. He had 63 yards rushing.

Ross Johnson had 17 carries for 83 yards. He broke a 32 yard run in the second half setting up his TD. Skyline closed the middle for most of the game and Johnson had to work hard for his yardage.

Coach Drehle commented after the game, "I am sorry it ended this way. Skyline is a good team. They had a good game plan. Number 21 (Woodhouse) is a great runner.

We dealt with a lot this season and the boys have grown through it all. It is a shame somebody must lose at the end of the season. I am enormously proud of our team."

Lincoln ended 6-3 with missing two winnable games to the virus. They lost to Windsor, Butler and Skyline. They defeated Cole Camp back-to-back at the end of the season.

Skyline is 8-3 and will host the undefeated and defending state champions Windsor this Friday.

At the annual event of the best runners in the state, Alcantara finished in the top half of the field by completing the course in 21:19.00, good for 60th out of 170 runners.

"It's been one fun ride to be a part of her high school XC running career," Warsaw coach Ehren Banfield said. "She has fought injuries and pain and still managed to wrap up a strong XC career." About Alcantara, Banfield went on to say, "I know that she (Alyssa) will move on and do amazing things."

Warsaw's George Montez, still just a junior, came in 88th out of 170 runners with a time of 18:14.70. It was Montez's second fastest time in his three years of running high school cross country and to reach that feat at the state championship is impressive in itself.

"George enjoys the atmosphere and likes to soak up the fun at the championships," Banfield said. "I look forward to George's senior year. "He has made a goal to push himself and prepare for this final year and I cannot wait to be a part of it!"

On Veterans Day, we honor the men and women who have served in our armed forces. If you've recently separated or retired from the military, or you will be leaving soon, you can be proud of the service you've provided to your country. But once you're a veteran, away from the structure and imperatives of the military, you may need to take greater control over managing your finances and protecting your family.

For starters, consider housing. When you were on active duty, you may have moved around frequently and found it more convenient to rent, but you may now want to purchase a house. Assuming you meet the eligibility requirements, you could apply for a VA loan, which typically does not require a down payment and is usually offered at a favorable interest rate. Make sure that you only take out a mortgage you can afford – you don't want to become "house poor."

You'll also want to save and invest for retirement. While on active duty, you could invest in the Thrift Savings Plan (TSP), but when you separate from service, you can no longer contribute to it. Now, if you get a job in the civilian sector, you may have access to a 401(k) or similar employer-sponsored retirement plan, and you might be able to roll your TSP balance into your new employer's plan. If you become self-employed or open your own business, you may be able to choose from several retirement plans, including a SEP-IRA, a SIMPLE IRA or an "owner-only" 401(k). But no matter what plan you have, try to contribute enough to meet your income needs in retirement, which could last two or three decades.

Furthermore, once you become a civilian, you may need to consider two topics that have special importance to you and your family: health and life in-



urance. Regarding health insurance, you should be able to get coverage through TRICARE and/or the Veterans Administration, but you also may want to take advantage of employer-sponsored health coverage. As for life insurance, you will lose the coverage offered by the military (Servicemembers' Group Life Insurance, or SGLI) shortly after you separate from active duty, so you'll want to consider your options for your SGLI, such as converting it to either Veterans' Group Life Insurance or a civilian policy. Your new employer may provide some form of insurance as an employee benefit, but it might not be sufficient for your needs. In any case, if you have dependents, it's essential you don't lose life insurance coverage, even for a short time.

Finally, be prepared for one negative aspect of becoming a veteran: fraud

attempts. It's unfortunate, but scam artists frequently target veterans. Scammers may tell you that you qualify for "secret" government programs, but you must first pay a fee or provide personal information, which can then be used for identity theft. Or they might try to charge you for access to your service records, even though you can get them free from the Department of Veterans Affairs. As a general rule, be suspicious of anyone you don't know who seems overly eager to help veterans.

Entering a new phase in your life can be exciting and rewarding – and you'll enjoy it even more when you get comfortable with your new financial arrangements.

opened, and they will leave the realm of darkness and enter the kingdom of light. They will leave Satan's domain and enter into God's kingdom. All of this takes place through faith in Jesus Christ.

True Christians also receive things from God. Jesus mentions two of those items in this verse. First, they receive forgiveness of sins. True Christians have received the blessing of forgiveness of all their sins. Because our sins are washed away, we receive a second blessing, an inheritance. I believe our primary inheritance is the gift of everlasting life. I hope we all know without a doubt that we have received these two blessings.

Then there is that word "sanctified." It means we are set apart for service in God's kingdom. As we serve God in the name of Jesus, our assurance of forgiveness and everlasting life grows abundantly. The more we serve, the stronger our confidence in God. So here is the question for reflection. How secure is your assurance of salvation? If you are full of doubts, lacking assurance that you are unquestionably in God's Kingdom, the second question is this: How active is your service in the Kingdom of God? Faith that does not go to work in God's Kingdom will grow weak.

In one verse, Jesus gives Paul a summary of the

Christian life. Faith in Jesus leads to forgiveness of sins, an eternal inheritance, being set free from Satan's power, and being set apart for service in God's Kingdom. When all these elements are in place in our lives, we know we are among the redeemed.

a monument to the US Marine Corps takes place with guest speaker, LtCol Tom Daniels (Ret).

Commander of Post 217, Barry White, describes Veterans Day as “one day each year the public shows support for veterans who are working every day to support each other.” White served 30 years in the US Coast Guard and retired as a Senior Chief. As leader of the 358 active members of Post 217, with an additional 90+ members of Sons of the American Legion, and 200+ members of the Auxiliary for spouses, mothers, daughters. Post 217 named as No. 1 Recruiter and No. 1 for growth in the state for 2020.

White’s fellow veteran, James Burris, is Service Officer for Post 217 and for the local and Bolivar chapters of Disabled American Veterans. “Veterans supporting veterans is a core purpose of the American Legion,” he said. “Our priority is to increase veterans’ awareness of the benefits available to them.” Burris works closely with the Missouri Veterans Commission and the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs to identify benefits veterans may be eligible to receive according to their individual needs, including basics like eyeglasses and hearing aids.

For Warsaw Leathernecks Detachment 1254, November is a busy month. On Saturday evening, November 6, the detachment celebrated the Marine Corps’ 246th birthday that falls officially on November 10. Traditionally, during a cake-cutting ceremony, the youngest and the oldest Marines present receive the first slices. Tyler Kirby, born October 25, 1994, was the youngest this year, and Bill Roberts, born March 29, 1941, the oldest.

Tuesday, November 9, numerous military groups and individuals including representatives of the detachment attended the “Veterans and Active Military Appreciation Night” at the State Fair Community College (SFCC) in Sedalia hosted by the Booster Club. The honorees received free admission to men’s and women’s basketball games, free soda and popcorn.

Commander, Eric Kirby, formerly a Marine Lance Corporal, heads the 140-member detachment that includes 68 Marine veterans with voting rights, and veterans of other branches that hold non-voting associate memberships. The detachment exists, he said, “to preserve the traditions and promote the interests of the U.S. Marine Corps, and the Marine Corps League.” One member is presently on active duty, Avery Woodbine, inspired by his grandfather’s military service to enlist.

Detachment 1254 newest member, retired funeral director, Curtis Sharp, also a former Lance Corporal, recalled his service in the Marine Corps from 1979 – 1983. His training and deployments included duty at Camps Pendleton and LeJeune, Mount Fuji, Japan, the DMZ in Korea and twice in Okinawa. Working through “stacks of paperwork” to supply items like jeep parts consumed hours of his workday in Supply Office Administration and Warehousing.

In Lincoln, MO., Memorial VFW Post 5925 Commander, Royce Kelb, said members will take the opportunity on Veterans Day to spend time with each other and their families over dinner at post headquarters. “We remember and reflect on what veterans went through when they served, and how we believe in what we do.” Post 5925’s 172 members represent every branch of the military, and include one veteran of WWII. William Vors, a former Marine Corporal,

participated in three beach landings, Kelb said.

Community outreach is common to all these organizations. Dinners and dances and social gatherings bring the community together with veterans to their mutual benefit and enjoyment and raise funds for charitable purposes. Detachment 1254 contributes to Marine Toys for Tots in Warrensburg, and also to the “Christmas for Kids” program managed by Dawn Jelinek at the Benton County Health Department. In addition to toys, the health department program provides necessities like food and coats to local kids. “Last year we helped 120 Benton County kids,” Kirby said. “This year, our goal is to help 125.” Besides holiday programs, Detachment 1254 contributes to summer youth baseball and Scouts BSA (formerly Boy Scouts of America).

Chaplains working with the VA are available for counsel and assistance to veterans with PTSD, or struggling through any situation, especially during the holidays. “And we are all here to help veterans anytime they need it, and to build camaraderie and preserve our values and traditions, and the rights and freedoms in the Constitution,” Kirby said.

American Legion Post 217 held its 1st Annual Shooting Sports Tournament on November 9, with participation of FFA students from nine high schools. Participants received training for high schoolers through courses at the onsite Shooting Sports Complex in which they learn firearm safety including proper handling of guns and ammunition, and Second Amendment rights and responsibilities. The same services are open to the public, members can contact the Post through Facebook or phone.

On Tuesdays and Fridays, from 9 AM to 12 Noon, Service Officer Burris receives walk-ins at Legion headquarters. He has provided veterans with money for gas to get to new jobs; for wheelchair ramp repairs; air conditioner repairs; utility bills and helped widows meet their house payments. Donors including Hidden Lake Resorts and the Donny Keele Memorial Golf Tournament help provide financial aid to veterans in crisis. Members of all the veterans organizations volunteer to help other veterans and people in their communities.

Kirby and White share a desire to attract younger veterans for membership in their respective organizations. Acknowledging that in general younger people communicate via social media, they focus on keeping their Facebook pages updated. As the population grows the number of younger vets also grows, White noted. A member of the Chamber of Commerce, he said he would like Post 217 to become more involved in tourism. The Enterprise publishes Post 217’s weekly activity schedule.

History has made it clear that WWI was not the end of all wars. Rather, WWII, the Korean War, Viet Nam, the Gulf Wars, and the War on Terror all came after. US Census Bureau estimates from 2020 indicate in the U.S. there are 2.2 million living Gulf War veterans, 5.7 million of the Viet Nam war, 990,000 from the Korean War and 330,000 from WWII.

“Public awareness is important of who the veterans are, of our rights and liberties according to the Constitution as endowed by our Creator and protected by the armed forces,” Commander White said. “It is humbling to hear people say, ‘Thank you for your service,’ but hard to know the right reply. It takes America having respect for

the country as a whole; military service is just one part of it.”

“We are seeking people from all areas of the county who are interested in improving our county to serve on the extension council,” said Ron Dent, who chairs the Benton County council. “In order to have an effective council in place, we need good candidates to run.”

The Benton County Extension Council meets on the first Thursday of each month, typically at 7:30 pm, in rotating locations around the county, according to Amie Breshears, Benton County Extension director.

“This year, we have three vacancies to be filled,” Breshears said. “We need individuals from all walks of life and professions who have a passion for helping to make Benton County a better place - people in agriculture, business people, retirees, military, educators, parents, government employees, and more. People may think of us as ‘Farmers-and-4-H’, but we also want to help with Business and Economic Development, Nutrition and Healthy Living, nature and the outdoors, and other services important to Benton Countians. If you know anyone who has those kinds of passions, we’re looking for them.”

LETTER TO THE EDITOR

In the past several months, there have been many remembrances that honored the Indigenous children who died at Indian boarding schools throughout the United States during the 19th and 20th centuries. Most Americans are unaware that more than 350 federal Indian boarding schools operated across 30 states from 1869 through 1978, and that hundreds of thousands of Indigenous children and infants were removed from their tribal communities and forced to attend government and church-run boarding schools. The purpose of the government-sponsored family separations was to eliminate connections to Indigenous languages and culture.

For more than 100 years, these institutions tried to replace Indigenous values, languages and ways of life with Christianity, Western traditions and the English language. At its peak, an estimated 83% of Indigenous children were attend-

ing these boarding schools, where some endured physical and sexual abuse in addition to hard labor and disease. Many children never returned to tribal communities and their families still do not know what happened to them. To date, there have been 3,364 unmarked graves found of Indigenous children and infants in the United States alone and that’s with only 22 residential schools. After conducting many interviews of boarding school survivors, there was a stark revelation that some of the unmarked graves of infants were fathered by priests at the schools.

We must learn the full truth of what happened at Indian boarding schools, given the devastating impact they had on destroying Indigenous families and traditions. It is imperative that we fully understand the damage that was done to Indian Country and the broader social fabric by removing Indigenous children and placing them in these institutions.

Learning these hard truths will be vital for helping the affected tribal nations heal from this tragic episode in American history. Efforts to teach Indigenous history must begin in our schools. Schools need to provide a more thorough accounting of tribal sovereignty, its history, as well as numerous contributions to American society.

Legislation called the Truth and Healing Commission on Indian Boarding School Policies in the United States Act (H.R. 8420) has been reintroduced in Congress. The new commission would create recommended guidelines for Congress to assist tribal communities with the devastating effects of trauma inherited from prior generations’ experiences at the boarding schools.

I urge all citizens across the political spectrum to come together to pass this consequential bill and send it to President Biden for his prompt signature into law.



I enjoy all cruciferous vegetables, especially cabbage. And I love the French term of endearment ‘mon petit chou’ which means my little cabbage. The English language just doesn’t have the same appeal; calling someone a little cabbage could sound like an insult. Whatever your feelings about cabbage, most people like coleslaw. The following recipe for frozen coleslaw is handy, since you make and then freeze the slaw, defrosting some when needed. (It is still crunchy) It needs to be vinegar based since mayo based can be frozen but the dressing tends to break down when thawed. This basic recipe is easily embellished with what you like, for example; mustard seeds, more shredded carrots, celery or celery seeds.

- 1 medium cabbage, shredded
- 2 teaspoons salt
- Mix together and let stand for one hour.
- Mix 1 cup vinegar*, 2 cups sugar, ½ cup water, bring to boil to dissolve sugar. Cool slightly, pour over cabbage and refrigerate 24 hours.
- Transfer to containers or Ziploc bags to freeze.
- *Your choice of white or cider. Some recipes use more or less sugar, vinegar, etc. this is what my family used.



I am fortunate to have been involved with many wildlife, conservation, and environmental projects over the years, with a particular interest in grassland flora and fauna ecosystems. Native grasslands are one of the most productive areas in the world. Into the early 1800s, Missouri still had over 15 million acres of native prairie. Today, all that remains is less than 1/2 of 1% (about 75,000 acres). The steady loss of grassland ecosystems has reduced the number of insects and pollinators on which our food supply depends. With few exceptions, almost all grassland species are in decline some perilously so. After decades of grassland converted to row crop production, resulting in millions of acres of soil washed away and polluting our rivers and streams with chemicals, there is hope for change.

Seventeen years ago, Iowa State University embarked on research to reduce environmental damage caused by row cropping. In 2007, they instituted “science-based trials of row crops integrated with prairie strips”, small patches and strips of native prairie were established in farmland to act like speed bumps that slow and absorb storm water, help keep soil in place and prevent runoff of fertilizers and agricultural chemicals. Now called Prairie Conservation Strips, research has proven this program provides multi-functional benefits disproportional to the amount of land converted. In other words, small patches make a big difference. These prairie strips are a diverse mixture of native tall grass prairie grasses and flowering plants uniquely adapted to the climate and soils of the central United States. Because they include warm season grasses like Indian grass, big bluestem and switchgrass, they resist

water and soil movement better than single species cool season plantings. Prairies also provide higher quality wildlife habitat than exotic grasses or single species plantings. Deep rooted prairie plants increase soil organic matter and improve water filtration. The plants stiff upright stems slow surface runoff and help hold soil in place during heavy rain events. Prairie strips provide year round habitat and food for insects including several species such as lady beetles that help control corn and soybean pests. The many flowers that grow in prairie strips support a diverse community of pollinators including 70 species of native bees along with honeybees (which are not native to the United States). This mixture of native plants also support an array of animals and birds that are found only in the central United States.

Studies found that even small patches of grassland habitat within row-cropped landscapes, especially if several different patches are present, can play a big role in maintaining these species. Early experiments found that the addition of prairie strips to under-performing farmland could reduce soil erosion or sediment loss by 90% and nutrient loss by up to 80%.

Iowa researchers documented a 380% increase in native plant species in cropland planted with prairie strips compared to cropped watersheds. Financial assessment by agricultural institutes shows prairie strips are one of the most affordable conservation practices available to landowners.

Iowa’s research results with just 10% prairie strip plantings in row cropped fields: four-fold increase in native plant species, two-fold increase in pollinator species, and three-fold increase in pollinator

abundance, two-fold increase in bird species and abundance, 42% less runoff, 95% less soil export, 89% less phosphorus export, and 84% less nitrogen export. Prairie strip programs have been a success across state lines. In addition to Iowa, farmers in Wisconsin, Illinois, and Missouri are also implementing this program. This summer, the Missouri Prairie Foundation (MPF) entered into a 3-year-grant agreement with Iowa State University to promote

prairie strips. Prairie Strips (CP-43) is a continuous Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) practice under the USDA. There is cost share money available. 


