Warsaw Man Shot In Clinton

One man is dead and another man is being held in jail after a shooting Saturday evening in Clinton, Missouri, according to police.

Jonathan Joseph Nahrstedt, 24, of Warsaw, Missouri, was pronounced dead after being shot multiple times. A 21-year-old man was being held in Henry County jail while police investigated the homicide.

The shooting occurred about 8:40 p.m. in the 500 block of South Carter Street. Arriving officers found Nahrstedt suffering from multiple gunshot wounds and attempted life-saving measures on him.

An ambulance rushed Nahrstedt to a hospital where he was pronounced dead.

A 21-year-old Clinton man was arrested at the scene and was being held on a 24-investigative hold while detectives interviewed witnesses and examined evidence, police said. No charges had been filed in the shooting as of Enterprise press time.

Deputies with the Henry County Sheriff's Office were helping to investigate the shooting.

Warm House Fashions Heat Up The Runway

About 60 people participated in the Spring Fling Fashion Show on May 2, at

"The portion of funds that

will go to the Senior Center will be used to help defray the cost of meals served in the Village Café, and for exercise equipment," said Sue Ann Mische, Center volunteer who organizes and teaches exercise classes and helps with fundraisers. "Donations are accepted for meals, but some seniors cannot always afford to give much."

Food Pantry Runs Low On Supplies As Demand Grows

While Christmas time is when most people think about giving, there are people in Benton County who need help now. The Benton County Food Pantry gives out food to those in need practically every day.

In March 2019, the Benton County Food Pantry

served 1,011 families in Benton County with 80% of those below the poverty level.

They also served 2,421 individual in Benton County with 875 of those being 60 and older.

They passed out 178 senior boxes, 25 veterans boxes and welcomed in 87 new clients.

"Donations are down this year," said Benton County Food Pantry manager Jeanie Arnold. "We hear the

economy is better, but we don't see that here."

Arnold said her staff is helping 60 to 120 families a day with only a 1/3 of the donations that they received last year.

"Some months our donations are down to half of what they were last year," said Arnold. "But we don't turn anyone away."

Arnold reported that many of the Food Pantry customers are on disability

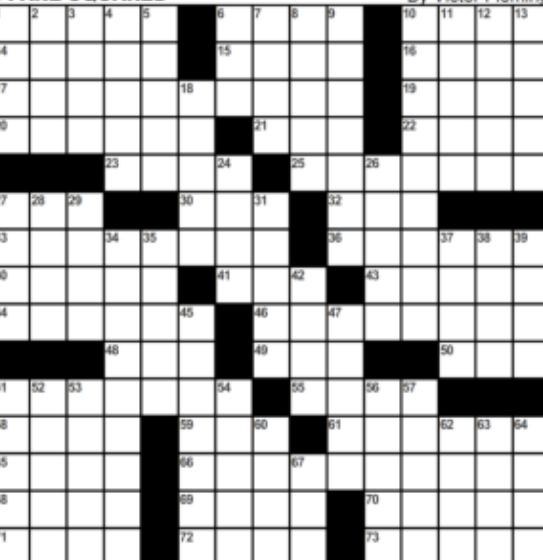

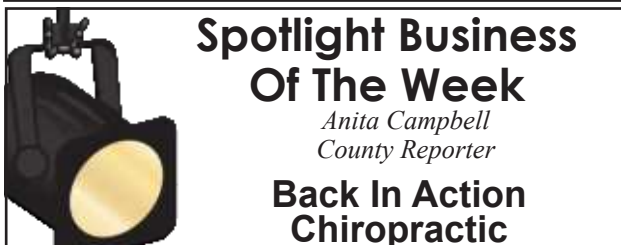

The show began with a short speech made by Phil Moore, President of the Warm House Board. Margie Hetherington, who manages the senior food program also spoke about meals at the Center and those delivered to seniors at home.

in regenerating damaged muscles.

Science on Wheels is an outreach program that was launched at the university in 2017 by doctoral student Arianna Soldati to connect people in rural communities with scientists. It is run by graduate students and postdoctoral researchers to provide practical education across the state about such topics as volcanology, agriculture, business and health. A small group of UM science students take the Science on Wheels program to a different part of the state once a month where the public is invited to participate. They try to focus on subjects that are applicable to the counties where the presentations are made.

Alexandra Diller Costello, 2nd year Ph.D candidate, spoke about her study of muscles and used models of muscles to demonstrate how they can constrict and expand. She explained that all muscles come from stem cells, and when there is an injury, some of them are destroyed. Her research involves looking into ways to improve wound healing with less physical therapy through regeneration. She said that regeneration of one's own stem cells is preferable to transplants, because a body's own tissue will not be rejected. Costello is doing her research in the Department of Zoology, and is working toward her doctorate in Biology. Afterwards, he hopes to enter into a regenerative medicine career.

Caroline Robinson is at the end of her second year of Ph.D studies of HIV. She had cartoon-like models of a protein, stem cell and antibody to help with her discussion of how HIV has killed millions. She said that there is still no cure, that the virus has mutated since it first appeared, and that the virus hijacks our body machinery and turns it against us. The virus can hide with the help of a protein called VPU, so she is working to design a drug that can work with other drugs to get rid of the protein. She explained that testing different drugs takes a long time and that 674,000 drugs have already been tested on HIV. Robinson is working on her doctorate in Microbiology and Immunology.

Aditi Mishra, a Ph.D candidate from India, is studying the brain, and degenerative diseases that affect it such as Parkinson's disease. She spoke about a current brain surgery procedure where some of the shaking caused by Parkinson's can be alleviated. However, she has been working for three and a half years on a non-invasive procedure to restore stabilization. She studies fruit flies that have been found to have the same gene that causes Parkinson's, and works specifically on a protein in the flies. Mishra is working on her thesis, and will complete her studies for her Ph.D in December, in the field of Biology with an emphasis in neuroscience. She wants to get a four to six-year post doctorate fellowship in a lab, and then apply for a faculty position in England. She says she

wants to do more world traveling too.

The graduate students fielded many questions from the curious audience, especially from one middle school student who said that he was very interested in science. Everyone seemed in awe of the presenter's knowledge, and the interesting subjects that they discussed. A member of the audience said that if Star Trek Science Officer Spock had been in attendance, he would have responded to the presentation by saying "Fascinating!"

Ron Dent, President of the Benton County Extension Council Board said that he was impressed by the graduate student's enthusiasm, and by how well they made their information understood.

Dr. Amie Breshears, Community Engagement Specialist in Agriculture Business for the UM Extension in Benton County, said she was really impressed by the kinds of research being done at the University that she had not known about before.

"My Dad has Parkinsons, so I was especially interested in what research is going on in that area and how it might be able to reduce the impact of the disease," said Dr. Breshears. "The young ladies were so approachable, hopeful and brilliant. Although the research on Parkinson's is complex, it has the power to improve the world. As we become older, it becomes more prevalent."

Cole Camp Board Swears In Jeremy Pirtle & Robert Meuschke

In new business April 18, Cole Camp City Clerk Ami Dieckman read an election certification furnished by Benton County Clerk Susan Porterfield, affirming that Jeremy Pirtle and Robert Meuschke had been elected to positions as City Aldermen. Each recited an oath of office and took his place on the Board. Also, in early session, the Board heard Community Emergency Response Team member Samantha Henley discuss proposed training sessions to be held in Cole Camp, Mondays and Thursdays in September and October. She invited all interested persons to attend the free training.

The meeting opened at 7 PM, with Aldermen Meuschke, Greg Ives, Wayne Karman present. Alderman Eric Hoke, citing conflicts with his duties as City official, had resigned prior to that session, according to Mayor Burton Bormann, who officiated. Clerk Dieckman recorded the session. First actions by the group were to approve minutes of its March meeting and a special meeting of that group on the P.D. remodel project. They then approved the evening's agenda and payment of bills presented. A financials presentation by Clerk Dieckman was received without comment.

Under old business, the group discussed but tabled the proposed P.D. remodel project. Aldermen then heard Public Works Director Klarke Bohling present one bid received relating to a proposed street resurfacing project, but was advised to advertise the project through a local newspaper in late April and early May, so bids may be received by that Board's next meeting. Bohling also presented four bids for a water tower renovation project, and was approved for a \$146,000 contract with Ozark Applicators. He then discussed proposed fencing at the City's Wastewater Treatment Plant. Alderman Karman advised that he and several others had visited that site, and suggested that the City pay for half of related land clearing, but not for fencing, since that fencing was needed by the owner of adjacent land, not by the City. No action was taken by the group.

Under new business, Mayor Bormann appointed Alderman Karman as Mayor pro-tem, Alderman Pirtle as Water Dept. Commissioner, Alderman, Ives as Sewer Dept. Commissioner, Alderman Meuschke as Parks & Streets Dept. Commissioner. The group then approved issuance of credit cards for each Department, also okayed an ordinance redefining "agricultural use" as a minimum of three acres. Aldermen also adopted a resolution to hold a public hearing on a voluntary petition for annexation of a small parcel of land on the east side of the City. The issue will be advertised in a local newspaper.

And in early session, the group heard Cole Camp Chamber member Joyce Schlesselman request June 29 closure of Olive St. between Hwy. 52 and Junge St., for a "Booze 'n Bluegrass" event, noon-10 PM that day. Aldermen agreed. Mayor Bormann reported that a planned Purple Heart ceremony will likely be held Sep. 5, during the Cole Camp Fair. Clerk Dieckman said electrical work is being done at City Hall, and may cause some inconvenience to all. Police Chief Stephen Phillips reported "steady" Departmental activities, adding that the P.D. will be

doing training next Wednesday.

The group went into executive session about 7:50 PM. Visitors are welcome to the open sessions, but please check with City Hall (Ph: 660-668-4444) for latest information.

Warsaw City Board Honors Dave Williams

Warsaw City Board convened at 6 PM May 6, with long time Alderman Dave Williams absent due to his recent demise. The group observed a moment of silence before conducting business. Aldermen present were Eric Masoner, Adam Howe, Terry Marshall Sr., Eric Flores. Alderman Lou Breshears was absent. Mayor or Eddie Simons presided, City Clerk Jessica Kendall recorded. First action by the group was to approve the agenda and minutes of an April 15 meeting, then okay payment of bills presented.

Lynette Stokes, Director, Benton County Tourism, invited attendees to meet the Benton County Tourism & Recreation Board May 9, 5-7 PM at the Landing Bistro, to help celebrate National Travel and Tourism Week. She said visitors would learn about Benton County's tourism-related efforts, with free appetizers provided. Also, information was received that the City's Municipal Swimming Pool, 1009 W. Jackson St., will have a May 25 grand opening for the summer season, preceded by a 5-7 PM May 22 opportunity to meet and greet the lifeguards at the Pool. The public is invited.

Under new business, and with approval of the Board, Mayor Simons appointed Alderman Flores as Mayor Pro-Tem; Mayor Simons and Aldermen Marshall and Breshears to the Finance Committee; Aldermen Flores, Masoner and Howe to the Police Commission; Aldermen Masoner and Howe to the Parks and Rec Committee; Alderman Howe as Golf Liaison; Alderman Marshall as Planning and Zoning Liaison; Alderman Breshears and Flores to the Public Works Committee; and appointed Kathi Gatliff to the Parks and Rec Committee. The

group also reappointed City Attorney Cale Haddock and City Clerk Kendall.

Aldermen then approved two resolutions: the first continuing membership by the City in the Kaysinger Basin Regional Planning Commission; the second seeking funding through a \$500,000 Community Development Block Grant for downtown improvements. Continuing new business, Aldermen approved five ordinances: (1) changing some boundaries in wards 1 and 3 due to population changes in those areas; (2) authorizing a \$395,453 contract with Do-Rite Construction Company for Main St. improvements from Ferry St. to Seminary St. (3) authorizing a 100% grant project with Do-Rite for new parking and sidewalks on Main St.; (4) extending a lease with Warsaw Leathernecks Marine Corps Detachment #1254 for office and meeting space; (5) a contract between the City and Burns and McConnell Engineers to perform a storm water study for the Town Branch. About \$201,500 costs will be shared, 60 % federal, 40 % local The study is said to address all concerns as storm water makes its way through the City.

In late session, the group considered fishing restrictions for safety concerns, in the Drake Harbor area. City Administrator Randy Pogue will bring proposed regulations to the next meeting. The Administrator also mentioned he will put out for bid needed repairs to the Community Building. The group agreed. They also okayed expanded membership in the Whiteman AFB Leadership Council, at a minimal cost. And, in late session, the group agreed to participation in a joint website between the City, Chamber of Commerce, and the Tourism group, with the Calgon Co., which will be providing assistance with marketing this area, with a small increase in yearly website fees.

The group went into executive session about 7:10 PM.

Visitors are welcome at the open sessions, usually held on 1st and 3rd Monday eves, but check with City Hall (Ph: 660-438- 5522), for current information.

Hartzler Introduces Bipartisan Veteran Employment Bill
Measure expands veterans preference for Reserve, National Guard, and retired service members applying for federal position

WASHINGTON, D.C. – Congresswoman Vicki Hartzler (MO-04) today introduced the bipartisan Veterans Preference Parity Act, H.R. 2433, which would allow more Reserve, National Guard, and retired service members to receive preference when competing for federal jobs.

“Whether in the Reserves, National Guard or on active duty, our service members have made tremendous sacrifices for our nation’s safety and security,” said Congresswoman Hartzler. “However, outdated federal hiring rules prevent many of these patriots from being recognized when competing for federal positions. The Veterans’ Preference Parity Act rights this wrong by modernizing the archaic federal hiring process and recognizing those who have served our nation,” added Hartzler, who represents over 65,000 veterans in her Missouri congressional district.

The purpose of veterans’ preference is to provide eligible veterans with an advantage when they compete for federal employment. These longstanding guidelines acknowledge the economic loss suffered by citizens who served their country in uniform, restores veterans to a favorable competitive position for government employment and recognizes the larger obligation America owes to disabled veterans. Currently, federal hiring preference rules require “more than 180 consecutive days” of active duty time for service members to qualify for this preference. The Veterans’ Preference Parity Act modifies the current guidelines from a consecutive day requirement to a non-consecutive total day threshold. This change will allow Reserve and National Guard members to have an equal opportunity to qualify for veterans’ preference when competing for federal positions.

Additionally, existing federal hiring preference rules ban many retired service members from receiving veterans’ preference points. Current guidelines exclude those who retire in the rank of Major, its equivalent, or higher. The Veterans’ Preference Parity Act will remove this restriction.

“The exclusion of so many retired service members from veterans’ preference is outdated, unnecessary, and unfair,” said Hartzler. “Service members of all ranks, including higher ones, enter the civilian workforce after their military service concludes. There is no reason to penalize them. The Veterans’ Preference Parity Act addresses this issue and, in doing so, will open up eligibility to over 130,000 of our working-age retired heroes.”

The Reserve Officer Association (ROA) is among numerous Veterans’ Service Organizations who have voiced their support for Hartzler’s bill: “ROA applauds Rep. Hartzler and those who join in reforms that help members of the Reserve and Guard participate in a federal workforce that needs the nation’s best, to serve the nation. Gainful employment is also a key in the fight against homelessness and suicide among our citizen-warriors and veterans.”

Congresswoman Hartzler’s legislation is also endorsed by the Veterans of Foreign Wars of the United States, Enlisted Association

of the National Guard, National Guard Association, Fleet Reserve Association, Jewish War Veterans, American Veterans, and Association of the United States Navy.

Representatives Paul Cook (R-CA), Michael Turner (R-OH), Joe Wilson (R-SC), Gwen Moore (D-WI), Sanford Bishop (D-GA), Rodney Davis (R-IL), Louie Gohmert (R-TX), Tom McClintock (R-CA), Julia Brownley (D-CA), Don Bacon (R-NE), Jim Baird (R-IN), Don Young (R-AK), Joe Cunningham (D-SC), Rob Wittman (R-VA), and Tom Cole (R-OK) have signed onto this measure as original cosponsors.

Floor Action

House Approves Plan to Empower Local Voters to Decide Potential Merger of St. Louis City and County (HJR 54)

Members of the House have advanced a proposal that would allow Missouri voters to decide whether to change the constitution to ensure local residents get the final say on a potential merger of St. Louis City and St. Louis County.

The legislation comes in response to the Better Together ballot proposal that would utilize a statewide vote to decide if the city and county should merge into a metropolitan city with a unified government.

HJR 54 would also prohibit ballot measures to dissolve any city or county or merge any city or county with another city or county unless there is a majority vote in each affected city or county authorizing the dissolution or merger. The sponsor of the bill said the provision will protect all counties in the State of Missouri.

“This is not just singling out St. Louis City or St. Louis County. In the event there is ever a statewide vote to force consolidation of two counties, you can rest assured that HJR 54 will come to your aid,” he said. The legislation now

moves to the Senate for consideration. If approved by both chambers, the proposal would go on the November 2020 ballot for voter approval.

HB 1137 establishes the criteria of a worker to be considered as an independent contractor. It states that independent contractors shall have a written contract that states the person is an independent contractor, not an employee, and that the person is responsible for all costs, fees, and taxes as an independent contractor. Supporters say the bill will help define who is considered to be an employee. They also say the bill provides a definition of an independent contractor and an objective analysis. They say the bill will give statutory clarity that would be helpful for businesses, employers, and employees.

One of my favorite go to recipes during fresh vegetable season is his all purpose stir fry sauce. Add a protein to vegetables and stir-fry away.

Martin Yan's All-Purpose Stir-Fry Sauce

- 1/2 cup chicken broth
 - 1/4 cup Chinese rice wine or dry sherry
 - 1 Tbsp. sesame oil
 - 2 tsp. sugar
 - 2 tsp. soy sauce
 - 1/2 tsp. salt
 - 1/2 tsp. ground white pepper
 - 2 Tbsp. vegetable oil
 - 1 Tbsp. minced garlic
 - 1 tsp. cornstarch dissolved in 2 tsp. water
- Combine the broth, wine, sesame oil, sugar, soy sauce, salt, and white pepper in a small bowl and mix well.
- Place a wok or stir-fry pan over high heat. Add the oil, swirling to coat the sides. Add the garlic and ginger and cook, stirring, until fragrant, about 20 seconds. Pour in the seasoning from the bowl and cook, stirring, until the sugar dissolves. Add the cornstarch mixture and cook until the sauce boils and thickens, about one minute. Store in a covered container in the fridge.

Why Should Recent Graduates Care About Retirement Planning?

If you've graduated from college in the past year or so and started your first job, you're no doubt learning a lot about establishing yourself as an adult and being responsible for your own finances. So thoughts of your retirement are probably far away. And yet you have several good reasons to invest in your 401(k) or similar employer-sponsored retirement plan.

First of all, by contributing to your 401(k), you can get into the habit of regular investing. And since you invest in your 401(k) through regular payroll deductions, it's an easy way to invest.

Furthermore, your 401(k) or similar plan is an excellent retirement-savings vehicle. You generally contribute pre-tax dollars to your 401(k), so the more you put in, the lower your taxable income. Plus, your earnings can grow on a tax-deferred basis. Your employer might also offer a Roth 401(k), which is funded with after-tax dollars; although you can't deduct your contributions, your earnings can grow tax-free, provided you meet certain conditions. And with either a traditional or Roth 401(k), you generally have a wide array of investment options.

But perhaps the main reason to start investing right away in your 401(k) is that, at this point of your life, you have access to the greatest and most irreplaceable asset of all – time. The more time you have on your side, the greater the growth potential for your investments. And by starting to invest early in your plan, you can put in smaller amounts without having to play catch-up later.

Suppose, for example, you begin investing in your 401(k) or similar plan when you're 25. For the sake of simplicity, let's say you put in \$100 a month, and you keep investing that same amount for 40 years, earning a hypothetical 7 percent rate of return. When you reach 65, you will have accumulated about \$256,000. (Your withdrawals will then be taxable, unless you chose the Roth 401(k) option.) But if you waited until you were 45 before you started investing in your 401(k), again earning that hypothetical 7 percent, you'd have to put in almost \$500 per month – about five times the monthly amount you could have invested when you were 25 – to arrive at the same \$256,000 when you turn 65.

Clearly, the expression "time is money" applies when it comes to funding your 401(k) – there's just no benefit in waiting to contribute to your retirement plan. This isn't to say that you have a lot of disposable income, especially as you may be paying off thousands of dollars in student loans. But, as mentioned above, the money for your 401(k) is taken before you even see it, so, in a sense, you won't miss it. And you can certainly start out with small amounts, though you'll at least want to put in enough to earn your employer's matching contribution, if one is offered. As your career progresses and your salary goes up, you can steadily increase the amount you put into your 401(k) or other retirement plan.

When retirement is decades away, it can seem like more of an abstract concept than something that will one day define your reality. But, as we've seen, you have plenty of incentives to contribute to your 401(k) or similar plan – so, if you haven't already done so, get started soon.

Bothwell Wound Healing Center physicians, leaders and staff recently celebrated the center's Robert A Warriner III, M.D., Center of Excellence Award.

The Center of Excellence Award is given to wound care centers in the Healogics network that have met the highest level of quality standards for a minimum of two consecutive years. Among the criteria are patient satisfaction higher than 92 percent and a wound healing rate of at least 91 percent within 30 days.

Program Director, Katie Case, said it's the third consecutive year the center has earned the recognition. "This award is great recognition for our team and the great job they do at the Wound Healing Center," she said. It's also great news for our patients, who can feel confident about the quality of the advanced therapies they receive here."

Out of 19 eligible Healogics wound centers in Missouri, the Bothwell center was one of six to receive the award for 2018. The center, which averages about 250 visits per month, offers highly specialized wound

care to patients suffering from chronic wounds. Advanced treatments include hyperbaric oxygen therapy, negative pressure wound therapy, bio-engineered skin substitutes, debridement, biological and biosynthetic dressings, and growth factor therapies.

Case said the most common wounds treated at the center are diabetic ulcers, pressure ulcers, venous leg ulcers and infections that have not healed in a reasonable amount of time. Patients do not need a physician's referral to schedule an appointment.

Bothwell Wound Healing Center is a member of the Healogics network of nearly 800 centers and provides access to best practices in the treatment of chronic wounds.

"Our community is fortunate to have an advanced wound center here in Sedalia," said Keith Morrow, vice president of clinic operations for Bothwell Regional Health Center. "This award recognizes the knowledge, teamwork and commitment of the staff and the outstanding wound care that patients receive here."
