A Kit-Kat candy bar was turned into the Benton County Sheriff's Office after a 12 year old girl bit into a sewing needle embedded in the candv.

It is unknown how the needle ended up in the candy bar. The child had been Trick or Treating in the Warsaw area and had gone door to door in various neighborhoods.

While the child was not injured, parents are being warned to check all candy collected during the Halloween season. The wrapper on the candy bar had not been open prior to the child opening it; however, it is difficult to tell how the needle was placed inside the candy.

"No one has come forward with any more information on this crime, but I do want to caution parents to be careful about what their children are eating," said Benton County Sheriff Eric Knox. "I am afraid the days of going door to door on Halloween are over. To be on the safe side, it would be better to take children to an **SEE CANDY Page 4**

Page 4 **Woman Fatally Shot Inside Lincoln Home**

Benton County deputies were dispatched to Eagle Bay at approximately 5:15 AM, on October 31, where they found Kathy R. Bolejack, 32, fatally shot at her residence, 28160 Spirit Drive, Lincoln. The reporting party, Shawn P. Jones, 47, residing at the same address, has been charged in the shooting and is presently being held in the Benton County Jail.

Deputies found Jones waiting outside when they arrived at the scene, and Bolejack was located in a northeast bedroom, lying on a bed with a single gunshot wound to her left temple area. Although there was a .22 caliber rifle leaning next to the bed, it was determined that Bolejack's head wound was not consistent with that of a SEE MANSLAUGHTER

Community Building Bustles During Annual Craft And Collectibles Show

A good crowd of shoppers as well as many new vendors showed up for the traditional Country Crafts and Collectibles Show on November 3rd, in the Warsaw Community Building. The Show has been a popular event for a long time, and has raised thousands of dollars each year for Cancer charities.

"The funds raised at this show will be grouped with funds raised by other BSJ Cancer Fighting Team (CFT) events, and will be donated to three cancerfighting organizations in March," said the team coordinator, Sharon Guess, who has been raising funds for Cancer since 2005. "The organizations chosen to receive funds in 2019 are Hope Lodge of Kansas City,

Sarah Cannon at Research Medical Center in Kansas City, and Bothwell Regional Health Center's Susan O'Brien Fischer Cancer Center."

Guess stated it is expected that \$10,000 each will be donated to the Cancer Center and Sara Cannon at Research Medical Center, and that Hope Lodge has requested that its equal donation be in the form of paper goods.

"The money being donated for fighting cancer is not my money," said Guess. "And, I want to know where these donations are going. Before cancer-fighting organizations are chosen, I sit down and talk to representatives of each one and specify how we want our donations to be spent. For instance, we had been giving to the Sarah Cannon Cancer Foundation

in the past, but after finding out that a 501(c) treatment center had been opened, our donations were specified for that facility instead. It is important to us that the money be spent on cancer treatments.'


The Country Crafts and Collectibles Show bustled with eager shoppers shortly after opening at 9 AM. There was a variety of wares being sold by 38 vendors, including Kettle Corn, baked items, epoxy wooden bowls and other wooden products, including a small outhouse-designed toilet paper holder. There were many jewelry booths including one with copper items; crocheted and vintage items, and glitter galore in Christmas-themed booths with small decorated trees for each member of the family, and shutters painted as snowmen. Heavenly-scented skin product and room scents, as well as homemade jams, butters, pickles and vegetables drew in customers with their fragrances, and sports enthusiasts could buy Kansas City Chiefs accessories. Of course, there were many kitchen items including refrigerator magnets, dish towels and the newly popular microwavable bowl cozies. Drawings were held throughout the day for prizes donated by

the vendors. New vendors this year were LaDonna Meuschke from Cole Camp, who sold Style Dots; Christy Bevel from Ozark, who sold 31 Gifts; Kathy and Sara Green from Marshall, who sold hand-crafted jewelry; Crown Customs from Sedalia, selling designer T-shirts, signs and caps related to the Kansas City Chiefs; S & B Kettle Corn of Warsaw; Dee Johnson from Stover, selling decorated ladders and shutters; and River Church Youth, from Warsaw, selling

baked items. "We let one non-profit organization set up a booth without paying a fee," said Guess. "The River Church Youth were only allowed to sell baked items.



The Benton County Court Clerk's Office reported that absentee voting began on September 25, and really picked up around October 24. There were about 50 absentee voters a day during the last week before Election Day, and about 25 a day the previous week. Absentee voting ends Monday, November 5, at 5 PM.

The Washington Post reported on October 31 that voters in at least 17 states had surpassed overall early and absentee voting numbers from 2014. The article also stated that in some cases, early and absentee vote totals were on track to double since four years ago. High voting turnout appears to be due to the high levels of engagement on the part of Democrats and Republicans, and because more and more states are offering easier ways to vote early.

Absentee voters in Missouri are required to provide one of the following reasons for voting absentee. a) Absence from your jurisdiction on Election Day; b) Are ill or disabled; c) Religious belief or practice; d) Are caring for an incapacitated person; e) Incarceration, provided all qualifications for voting are retained; f) Are employed as an election official; or g) Certified participation in the address confidentiality program established under sections 589.660 to 589.681 because of safety concerns.

Voters in Missouri can request absentee ballots from their local election authority in person, by mail, or by fax. Voters requesting an absentee ballot by mail, who have registered by mail and have not voted in person, are required to submit a copy of their personal identification unless they provided a copy with their registration application. Examples of acceptable identification include identification issued by the state of Missouri, an agency of the state, or a local election authority of the state, or identification issued by the U.S. government. (www.sos.mo.gov has a complete list of acceptable

identification.) States can choose to provide three ways for voters to cast a ballot before Election Day. 1) Early Voting. In 37 states (including three that mail ballots to all voters), and the District of Columbia, any qualified voter may cast a ballot in person during a designated period prior to Election Day. 2) Absentee Voting. All states will mail an absentee ballot to certain voters who request one. 3) Mail Voting. A ballot is automatically mailed to every eligible voter (no request or application is necessary). According to www.google. com, Colorado, Oregon and Washington are the only states that practice Mail Voting.

(Continued from Page 1) .22 round. When Jones was asked to describe what had occurred, he stated that he heard a "pop" while taking a shower, and found Bolejack on the bed with a gun in her hand. Jones stated that he removed the gun from her hand, got scared, and took the gun outside and threw it into the woods.

Sheriff Knox, who always goes to the scene of shootings, arrived at the residence soon afterwards and talked to the deputies. They found quite a few inconsistencies that did not match Jones' version of the shooting incident. Then, the Coroner arrived and after he and the Sheriff talked about the scene, they too found inconsistencies with what a suicide should look like. Investigators spent many hours looking into the shooting and finding evidence to prove what really happened

that morning. A couple of hours later, the Missouri State Highway Patrol – Division of Drugs and Crime Control (DDCC), arrived with truckloads of

equipment to use when going through the crime scene. Jones was asked to report to the Sheriff's office and members of the DDCC team held more interviews with him, presenting the case against him. Jones then changed his version of what happened and admitted that during an altercation with Bolejack, he took a firearm away from her and shot her with that firearm.

"Jones was charged with Voluntary Manslaughter, Armed Criminal Action. Unlawful Possession of a Firearm, and Tampering with Physical Evidence," said Sheriff Knox. "His Bond has been set at \$500,000.00."

Jones is a classified felon and was in possession of three firearms, two revolver pistols and one rifle. He was convicted of a felony in Caldwell County in 1998.

There have been other shootings in Benton County during 2018 including that of Caleb L. D. Shephard, of Lincoln, who died from a gunshot to the abdomen in January. Warsaw Police Chief, Jason Wenberg was shot in the chest by a 16year old suspect in May, and was released from the hospital after treatment. Fortunately, he was wearing a bullet-proof vest.

My friend, Rachel Kissinger, owns eleven acres of remnant tall grass prairie. I spent a few days there last week cutting sumac and treating the stumps with chemicals in an effort to reduce its presence. That got me thinking about succession and the effects it has on ecosystems.

Before European settlements (which dates to 1800), Missouri had over 15 million acres of tall grass prairie. Today we have less than 1/2 of 1% or about 75,000 acres. Tall grass prairies are one of the most threatened ecosystems in the world.

prairies Historically, covered more land area than any other ecosystem in North America. More than the deciduous forests of the East that run from Maine through Georgia, more than the deserts of the Southwest and more than the boreal forest north from Maine through Minnesota. If grasslands aren't somehow managed to control woody invasion, they will eventually become forests. In geological time, forests are young. They all started out as grasslands or wetlands. Fire was the principle agent in maintaining our prairies and Native Americans were the principle source of ignition. For a variety of reasons, they actually managed the landscape with fire. Grazing by native herbivores (and insects) was the second biggest factor in maintaining grasslands.

As more settlers poured onto the Plains, native tribes were displaced. In 1809, the Osage Indians signed a treaty and left Missouri. By 1809, buffalo were almost extirpated from Missouri (in 1806, the only buffalo Lewis and Clark encountered in Missouri were a few in what is now the Kansas City area). Gone with the Osage were the annual fires. This, coupled with no buffalo, early successional plants were no longer being controlled. Young timber started up and developed rapidly.

When pre-settlement soil was exposed, the exposed areas were rapidly colonized by short-lived native weed species, such as horseweed or fleabane. that would invade quickly and stabilize the soil. When burned, these weeds gave way to prairie pioneers such as grey-headed coneflower, black-eyed Susan, wild bergamot, and eventually to legumes such as compass plant and other conservative "long-lived" species. Without fire, or some kind of control, our grasslands became forests.

Sumac is an early successional plant that invades grasslands. Unless controlled, it rapidly colonizes absorbing the sun's energy, spreading leaves that shade the ground below. This deprives energy to the lower plants which now cannot survive. The sumac, in turn, gives way to late successional plants such as oaks and hickories. Within 100 years, without any controls, what once was a grassland or wetland will become a mature forest.

Another early successional plant is cedar. I was giving a prairie tour two weeks ago and was expounding how grassland people hate cedars when a lady on the tour told me about a cedar fence her grandparents had planted years ago. I told her I felt she was only partially correct. There might indeed be a "cedar fence" on her grandparents' land, but if she looked close she would find evidence of a wire fence that was originally there.

The fruit (berries) on the cedar, contain the seeds for future generations of cedar



trees. Many birds eat cedar berries. If you have noticed, birds often perch on fence wire. As they sit there, they poop and the seeds from the berries are deposited in the fence line. Cedar grows rapidly and in a short time the whole fence line is

its original condition. Last year we cut the cedars and sprayed sericea lespideza. In February we burned to reduce thatch, kill small woody plants and increase forb production. The results were rewarding. Rachel observed not only more, but a greater variety of plants than in years past. Future plans include the removal of an old fence row that is grown up in hedge

grown up in cedar. Cedar trees are allelopathic. Allelopathic plants exude chemical compounds in the soil from roots or shed parts that inhibit germination and /or growth of other species. Cedars drop some of their needles changing the acidity of the soil beneath them preventing most plants from growing. Sumac seeds, by the way, won't germinate unless the outer seed coat is softened by passing through a bird's digestive system. A process known as scarification. Rachel really enjoys and appreciates her prairie, and being a good steward of her land is working to maintain

and cedar. Thanks to Rachel and others like her we will hopefully have native ecosystems for future generations to enjoy.

MISSOURI DEPARTMENT OF CONSERVATION

The Missouri Department of Conservation's (MDC) feral hog strike team has tallied up elimination numbers from January through September 2018. So far, they've yielded a total of 7,339 feral hogs removed by MDC, partner agencies, and private landowners. In 2017, 6,561 feral hogs were removed from the landscape.

Crews in southeast Missouri removed 3,849 feral hogs, which is where the highest density of feral hogs occurs. The Ozark region removed 2,358 and the Southwest region removed 823 feral hogs. St. Louis region removed 186 feral hogs, Kansas City Region removed 116 feral hogs, and Northeast Region removed one. The highest densities of feral hogs occur south of Interstate 44, with very few feral hog sightings in the north portion of the state.

"We've been very strategic in our efforts, focusing on removal of whole groups of feral hogs at a time, before moving onto another area," said Mark McLain, MDC's feral hog elimination team leader. "This strategic approach

is important because if we leave even a few feral hogs behind in an area, they can reproduce quickly and put us back where we started."

McLain said it's essential that the public understand why feral hogs must be eliminated.

"Feral hogs are a destructive, invasive species that don't belong here; they're not a native species," McLain said. "They outcompete native wildlife for habitat and food. For example, places with a lot of feral hogs will see their wild turkey and deer populations diminish."

McLain said feral hogs are known to carry diseases that could possibly spread to humans, pets, and livestock. He hopes the message that hunting is not an effective method for eliminating feral hog populations is starting to catch on.

"For over 20 years, unregulated hunting of feral hogs was allowed in Missouri, during which time our feral hog population expanded from a few counties to over 30 counties," he said.

In 2017, MDC, the Corps of Engineers, and the LAD Foundation established regulations against feral hog hunting on lands owned and managed by these three organizations. Other agencies have passed regulations similar to MDC's to eliminate hog hunting on land they own.

"A persistent piece of this story is continued illegal releases of feral hogs, which establishes populations and further spreads the problem," McLain said. "This is illegal and when caught, those who release feral hogs face hefty fines."

McLain said MDC is partnered with many agricultural and environmental groups as well as hundreds of private landowners, that are all committed to eliminating feral hogs from Missouri. Landowners and the public are a crucial element of this effort, especially since most land in Missouri is privately owned.

'Landowners who've experienced feral hogs on their land have learned that hunting feral hogs pushes them onto neighboring property, which causes problems for their neighbors," McLain

When neighboring landowners try to control feral hogs through hunting, the hogs simply travel back and forth between the properties, escaping and causing more damage. Trapping with no hunting interference is the best method to eliminate them. Landowners can seek help from MDC and USDA such as technical advice, on-site visits, loaning equipment and training.

Feral hogs are not wildlife and are a serious threat to fish, forests and wildlife as well as agricultural resources. Feral hogs damage property, agriculture, and natural resources by their aggressive rooting of soil in addition to their trampling and consumption of crops as part of their daily search for food.

Feral hogs have expanded their range in the U.S. from 17 to 38 states over the past 30 years. Their populations grow rapidly because feral hogs can breed any time of year and produce two litters of one to seven piglets every 12 to 15 months. Feral hogs are also known to carry diseases such as swine brucellosis, pseudorabies, trichinosis and leptospirosis, which are a threat to Missouri agriculture and human health.

Preliminary data from the Missouri Department of Conservation (MDC) shows that hunters checked 2,169 turkeys during Missouri's fall firearms turkey season, Oct. 1-31. Top harvest counties were Greene with 57, Henry with 48, and Laclede with 47. Last year's fall firearms turkey harvest total was 2,899.

MDC's turkey biologist says the low harvest total can be attributed to several years of poor hatches.

"We had really poor production in 2016 and 2017, which resulted in lower turkey numbers across the state," said MDC Turkey Biologist Jason Isabelle. "Unfortunately, on top of those two bad hatches, production was down again this year, so the drop in harvest this fall certainly wasn't unexpected."

Another factor that has resulted in lower fall turkey harvests is declining hunter participation. This year, 10,262 fall firearms turkey hunting permits were purchased. During the peak year of 1987, nearly 53,000 permits were purchased. Missouri has seen a declining interest in fall firearms turkey season as have other

Isabelle attributes the bulk of this declining interest to the popularity of archery season. "Each year we continue to see more and more hunters participating in the archery deer and turkey season," said Isabelle. "Rather than carry a shotgun in the

The 'Head Start' Program In Warsaw

The recently completed month of October was Head Start Awareness Month. In January 1964, President Lyndon B. Johnson declared a "War on Poverty," in his State of the Union speech. Shortly thereafter, Sargent Shriver, then Director of the federal Office of Economic Opportunity, took the lead in assembling a panel of experts to develop a comprehensive child development program that would help communities meet the needs of disadvantaged preschool children. That program has evolved since then (It was originally an eight week summer program.), yet remains true to its original purpose: as a comprehensive child development program serving children from birth to age five, and their families.

The following information, contained in a brochure printed by West Central Missouri Community Action Agency, Appleton City, was furnished by Warsaw Head Start Family Advocate Celina Flores and Director Gail Wallace: Head Start welcomes children of all backgrounds, including those learning English as a second language or those who have special needs. The program's purpose is to educate children in the classroom and, combined with parent education, enhances knowledge in the areas of child development, social-emotional development, health, mental health, disabilities, nutrition, life skills, literacy, job readiness, and community resources. It accomplishes these goals through a creative curriculum which is based on relationships between caregivers/teachers, their families and the community, planning and evaluating, individualizing, creating a welcoming environment, ensuring children's safety, promoting children's health, guiding children's behavior, daily routines and activities.

A child attending the program will benefit by learning to get along with others, and will develop habits of sharing, taking turns, problem solving, self-confidence, self-discipline, safety awareness, brushing teeth, toileting, handwashing, serving self at meal time, learning to follow routines, pre-reading/writing, math, science, music/movement.

Head Start participants are required to attend class daily and maintain health by getting routine physical and dental exams, well baby checks, lead and hemoglobin tests, standard immunizations and any recommended follow up. Staff qualifications: Every Head Start classroom is staffed with at least one teacher who has obtained a Child Development Associate Credential, or an Associate or higher degree in Early Childhood Education or a related field. All Head Start drivers are CDL Licensed. All Head Start staff is CPR and First Aid certified.

You may call the Benton County Head Start program at 660-438-3773, for more information, or to sign up for Head Start. The program always takes applications for students, and teachers.

I attended a very informative meeting on Tuesday evening in Bolivar at Smith's Restaurant. There was a crowd of more than 125, including mayors from many local cities across southwest Missouri. The main discussion regarded animal control/animals running at large and the many problems associated with this issue. Animals

running at large can pose potentially serious threats to public safety and health. Several speakers including animal control officers, veterinarians, and staff with the Missouri Department of Agriculture spoke at the meeting and provided insight on what is involved past just capturing an animal; many factors are involved including shelter for the captured animal, staff to run the shelter, and funding. Animal shelters, municipal pounds, rescue shelters, and contract kennels are all options to contain seized, stray, abandoned, or homeless animals. Current and possible ordinances in local area towns as well as potential USDA community facility loans and grants were also discussed. Animal control is a big challenge with no easy answers, but the meeting provided useful information in how to deal with it. At the end of the meeting, Richard Sheets with the Missouri Municipal League advocated for Proposition D and encouraged the passage of this legislation, because municipalities and counties will each receive 15% of this gas tax revenue dedicated to road and bridge

This requirement applies to dwellings in multiple districts, but should not be interpreted to apply retroactively.

Also under new business, the group approved three ordinances: (1) in which the City requires that residents have water service, if living in a City residence. There are possible criminal penalties for violation. (2) authorizing the Mayor to execute a direct loan agreement and promissory note between the City and Missouri Transportation Finance Corp. for improvements at Route 7 and Commercial St. City Planner Randy Pogue made a comment that "A lot of people are excited about this project." (3) approving a lease between the City, which owns a property at 1101 Dogwood, and Stanbury Uniform to utilize that building, at \$1.00/year. The lease is to provide jobs for people in the community; either party can terminate the lease.

In late session, City Planner Pogue remarked he had attended a recent Highway Prioritization Meeting in Springfield, and the City named improvements to Hwy. 65, Warsaw to Buffalo, as one such priority; and a study of possible improvements in Highway 7, Warsaw to Clinton as another. Mayor Simons and Alderman Howe took the lead on a discussion about Municipal Golf Course improvements, which might include refurbishing a lot of its greens. Projects could include zoysia grass on fairways. The group then agreed to negotiations between the City and two engineering firms for their recommendations for local storm water improvements.

Reports from Departments, Board and Commissions were received without comment. And just before going into executive session about 6:43 PM, Mayor

Simons opened a discussion about a possible ordinance which would hold landlords responsible for their tenants' delinquent water bills. The matter will be further discussed at this group's Nov. 19 meeting. These sessions are usually held on 1st and 3rd Monday eves. This year Benton County is stunningly beautiful with the vibrant colors of fall. With the chill in the air, it means major cooking times are approaching. Casseroles, baking, cakes and cookies and pies! Oh my! So with all the temptations coming up I know I have to keep eating my share of healthy foods. Greens top the list. Growing up in Northwest Missouri, we didn't have access to many of the greens available to us now. I thought I hated spinach since the only spinach my mother served was canned, gross and slimy. Now I love fresh spinach, kale, Swiss chard and bok choy.

My favorite fast way to prepare chard and bok choy is a quick garlic sauté. Last week I came home with one very large choy and it was delicious. The baby choys are also quite delicious.

Garlic Greens ½ cup chicken stock

2 teaspoons corn starch 1 tablespoon olive or vegetable oil

2 garlic cloves, minced 2 pounds of bok choy Salt and freshly ground

Wash choy, cut off stems, removed hard core, slice stems into one inch pieces. Chop leaves into one inch pieces. Mix stock and corn

starch together.

Heat oil in large skillet; add garlic, sauté for 20 seconds. Add choy stems, stirring for about one minute, add leaves, sauté another minute. Add stock; continue stirring and tossing about until thickened. Removed from heat, add salt and pepper.

If you have any left, refrigerate and use in frittatas, quiche or soup.
