Marijuana **Initiative Gets** Major Interest

Missouri supporters of medical marijuana will have their say in the November election. The only question: Do they cast a yes vote once, twice, or three times?

Thanks to successful petition drives for three competing proposals, all three are on the ballot. Two would amend the Missouri Constitution; the other would simply change state law.

According to local physician Dr. Donald Allcorn of Lincoln, citizens should vote no on all three proposals.

"There are no proven benefits to smoking marijuana," said Allcorn. "The Missouri Medical Association has taken a stand against all three proposals because of the lasting effects of smoking marijuana."

Allcorn explained that children who smoke even one marijuana stick can experience a permanent drop in their IQ. Long term effects in adults smoking marijuana leads to a reduction in cognitive skills. Many MARIJUANA on Page 4



Lawrence Harms is a long-time traditional country singer from Missouri that has been 'keeping the music alive' for a very long time. He worked for Silver

way back when the music was old-time fiddling and old-time mountain-country Ozark style music. It's fun to listen to that again, and brings back fabulous memories of where 'real' country music originally came from in our part of the world. The Ozarks, like the Appalachians, is a mountain life-style that incorporates into local and regional music 'truths' that stand out, not only in feeling, but in historical happenings. Lawrence (better known as Larry) Harms is also a tremendous writer of these kind of 'truth' songs. He's a strong traditionalist and keeps that 'spirit' alive. Unknown where this was recorded at, but his voice is strong and clear, and stands out just as it should. The old-time methods used for recordings sometimes overlooks the obvious, but even this is not a critique for Larry's voice is loud and clear. Not one 'chase fame' he has always been a participant rather than a competitor, and keeps good old-time gospel music at the forefront of his repertoire as well. A well liked local and regional singer, Larry has been in forefront of Missouri Ozark traditional country music fro something like fifty years. I certainly welcome the opportunity to listen to, and review favorably, this recapture of a great musical genre that is rapidly disappearing from the American scene. Still, as long as there is a Lawrence Harms, there will be the very focus of

MISSOURI **DEPARTMENT** OF CONSERVATION

Preliminary data from the Missouri Department of Conservation (MDC) shows that young hunters ages 6 through 15 harvested 13,560 deer during Missouri's early youth portion of the 2018 deer hunting season, which ran Oct. 27-28. Top counties for the early youth portion were Howell with 350, Osage with 316, and Franklin with 263 deer checked. Last year's harvest total for the early youth portion was

"Warm temperatures and gusty winds this weekend presented much more challenging hunting conditions compared to last year, but Missouri's youth still pulled off a respectable harvest," said MDC Cervid Program Supervisor Barb Keller.

For the latest deer harvest totals by county and portion, visit MDC's website at http://on.mo.gov/1jjz7Ew. Archery deer hunting continues through Nov. 9 and again from Nov. 21 through Jan. 15, 2019. Up next for deer hunting in Missouri is the November portion of firearms deer season, which runs Nov. 10-20. That will be followed by the late youth portion of firearms deer ason on Nov. 23-25. The antlerless portion of firearms deer season runs Nov. 30-Dec. 2. Lastly the alternative methods portion will run

(Continued from Page 1) of the people who develop severe drug habits such as heroin or cocaine stated with a marijuana habit.

Allcorn went on to say that if a person wants to use marijuana for pain then an oral medicine containing marijuana can be prescribed.

Marinol is FDA approved medication for chemotherapy-induced nausea and vomiting, and anorexia from AIDS. Currently, there is no FDA-approved medical indication for prescribing marijuana.

Marinol is a synthetic form of THC (delta-9-tet-rahydrocannabinol), as its active ingredient.

THC is a natural component of the marijuana plant, Cannabis sativa, and it's psychoactive, which means it attaches to chemical receptors in your brain and produces a feeling of euphoria, or what we call a "high". Oral dronabinol is the chemically manufactured form of THC that is FDA-approved to treat chemotherapy-induced nausea and vomiting (in patients who didn't respond well to conventional nausea and vomiting treatment), as well as anorexia related to weight loss in patients with AIDS.

Both Marinol and dronabinol come in capsules of 2.5 mg, 5 mg and 10 mg strengths. The medication takes about 30 minutes to an hour to start working, with peak effects at 2 to 4 hours.

Marinol is approved by the FDA for medical uses, whereas marijuana has not been approved for any medical use at all at the federal level. In states where medical marijuana is legal, a healthcare practitioner provides an "authorization" for use that is considered by the federal courts to be protected physician-patient communication.

Additionally, Marinol, or dronabinol, does not contain all the components of the full marijuana plant. The medication is a synthesized version of THC (delta-9-tetrahydrocannabinol), one of over 60 cannabinoids found in Cannabis sativa. Two cannabinoids in marijuana have been studied for medicinal

been studied for medicinal uses: THC and cannabidiol.

But what happens if all three proposals are passed?

According to the Missouri Secretary of State's office, the constitutional amendments take precedence over the state law proposition. If both constitutional amendments pass, the one with the most "yes" votes takes effect.

But legal experts agree that passage of more than one measure will almost certainly result in a court fight. Former Missouri Solicitor General Jim Layton said one key issue remains unclear: If a measure passes but is nevertheless trumped by one of the others, would its non-conflicting provisions also become law?

Former Missouri Supreme Court Chief Justice Michael Wolff figures such nuances will be irrelevant to most voters.

"If they want medical marijuana, they're going to vote for all three of them," Wolff said.

All three would allow patients with cancer, HIV, epilepsy and other conditions access to medical marijuana. The differences largely involve how marijuana would be regulated and taxed, and where the new tax dollars would go.

Backers of the two competing constitutional amendments are waging a bitter fight.

Amendment 2, from a coalition of patients, doctors and veterans called New Approach Missouri, emphasizes the value of medical marijuana for veterans. Post-traumatic stress disorder is among the conditions that would qualify, and a 4 percent sales tax would go to a newly-created fund for health and care services for veterans. The sales tax revenue also would be used to administer licensing of

medical marijuana busi-

New Approach Missouri spokesman Jack Cardetti said the measure would "put the decision-making process back in the hands of doctors and patients when it comes to medical treatment options."

The competing Amendment 3 effort is financed almost exclusively by Brad Bradshaw, a Springfield personal injury attorney who also is a medical doctor. It would impose a 15 percent tax on the retail sale of marijuana as well as a wholesale tax on the sale of marijuana flowers and leaves. Those funds would be used to create a new state institute to research "presently incurable diseases."

Critics say the Amendment 3 tax would be far and away the highest in the nation on medical marijuana. Cardetti was critical of a provision in Amendment 3 that would give Bradshaw broad powers over operation of the new research institute, including choosing its board members.

Bradshaw, who has loaned \$1.5 million to the Amendment 3 campaign, also is dealing with two tax liens amounting to more than \$119,000. He and his wife were subjects of an \$88,166 lien from the Missouri Department of Revenue in November. Bradshaw's company was the subject of a \$31,375 federal tax lien in April.

Bradshaw filed lawsuits that sought to have the other two measures removed from the ballot over petition signature issues. A judge in August tossed out the suit over Amendment 2. Bradshaw in September withdrew the case against the state law proposal, Proposition C.

Proposition C would impose a 2 percent tax on the sale of medical marijuana to be used for veteran services, drug treatment, early child-hood education and public safety in cities with medical marijuana facilities.

Mystery surrounds its backers: Proposition C is supported by Missourians for Patient Care, a political action committee. It has not disclosed its financial supporters. E-mail and phone messages left with the PR and lobbying firm behind the petition drive were not returned, and an attorney involved in the effort declined comment.

Kevin Sabet, CEO of Washington-based Smart Approaches to Marijuana, said his group opposes all three Missouri measures.

Thirty other states have passed medical marijuana laws. Missouri legislative researchers have estimated that more than \$100 million worth of medical marijuana could be sold annually if it becomes legal.

Colorado legalized medical marijuana in 2009 and then legalized marijuana for other use in 2012.

According to the new report by the Rocky Mountain High Intensity Drug Trafficking Area entitled "The Legalization of Marijuana in Colorado: The Impact," the impact of legalized marijuana in Colorado has resulted in:

- 1. The majority of DUI drug arrests involve marijuana and 25 to 40 percent were marijuana alone.
- 2. In 2012, 10.47 percent of Colorado youth ages 12 to 17 were considered current marijuana users compared to 7.55 percent nationally. Colorado ranked fourth in the nation, and was 39 percent higher than the national average.
- 3. Drug-related student suspensions/expulsions increased 32 percent from school years 2008-09 through 2012-13, the vast majority were for marijuana violations.
- 4. In 2012, 26.81 percent of college age students were considered current marijuana users compared to 18.89 percent nationally, which ranks Colorado third in the nation and 42 percent above the national average.

5. In 2013, 48.4 percent of Denver adult arrestees tested positive for marijuana, which is a 16 percent increase from 2008.

6. From 2011 through 2013 there was a 57 percent increase in marijuana-related emergency room visits.

7. Hospitalizations related to marijuana has increased 82 percent since 2008.

Even if Missourians approve the legalization of marijuana for medical purposes at the state level, cannabis would remain illegal at the federal level. Marijuana remains a Schedule I controlled substance alongside heroin and many synthetic opioids.

The Benton County Enterprise asked several local, state and federal law enforcement officials whether they had a position on any of the medical marijuana measures as well as whether their offices have started planning for how to adapt if Missourians legalize marijuana for medical use.

Benton County Sheriff Eric Knox: "The passage of any of the three proposals will make our job harder at the Sheriff's office," Knox said. "When we pull over someone under the influence of alcohol we can easily determine whether or not that person is driving under the influence by having the person take a breath test but when we pull over someone who is high what would the test be? Also it will be harder to police the marijuana growers."

The main objective is that voters need to be informed about the issues before they head to the polls on November 6.

Mary has seen many changes in banking during the past 38 years. One of the biggest changes was when Mr. Crudginton retired and sold the bank to Larry Beach. Later the bank was sold again and the name was changed from Osage Valley Bank to Hawthorn Bank.

Although Mary never left the bank, the position of president of the bank changed several times from Orla Crudginton to Larry Beach to Betty Beach to the now head man, Chuck Allcorn.

As well as working for several different bosses, Mary also worked with many special people as well. "When I started in the bookkeeping department, I worked with Deanna Spencer, Trixie Barshe, Jannelle DeLong and Susie Barb," said Mary. "We posted and filed every check by hand. In fact, if we were behind, the tellers such as Blondean Arnett would come back and help us as well."

Banking has changed as well over the past 38 years.

"When I went to work for Osage Valley Bank, the only bank was downtown in a building which had been a bank for many years,"

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Mary said. "Everything was manual. We counted checks by hand. We prepared all the statements and mailed them right here in town. In fact, our customers could come into the bank, pick up what we called counter checks and just fill in the name of the bank. I remember one elderly man who refused to buy personalized checks when we switched over to personalized checks. He said he had never paid for a check that was the bank's responsibility. I think the bank just bought his checks and gave them to him because he was so upset by the change."

Change, however, comes to every company and change is something all employees have to accept. Mary commented that when the bank switched to using computers it was a big change for all the employees; however, she said that having all the information on the computer makes her job much easier.

Even the hours of the bank have changed since Mary began. "We use to open from 9 to 3 and we were closed on Thursday because we had to be open on Saturday from 9 to 3 because that was when the farmers came to town," Mary said.

Mary has also held several positions in the bank from teller to bookkeeper to assistant cashier to vice president of operations.

"I applied for a job at the bank because I enjoyed bookkeeping and I grew up on a farm and I knew I didn't want to work on a farm," Mary said.

Mary's family (Breshears) lived on a farm near Fairfield that was covered by Truman Lake after the dam was built.

"There were 7 of us and there was always plenty of work on the farm," said Mary. "We were 17 miles from town so we rode the bus to school and there weren't many trips to town."

Mary and her high school sweetheart Mike also raised a large family with 6 children, Teresa, Michael, Todd, Neil, Levi and Chad. Mike and Mary have been married 50 years and now boast a family of 12 grandchildren and 11 great grandchildren. Employees of Hawthorn

Murrell was fishing nearby and after hearing something, saw two men clinging to tree stumps in the water. They had been in the water for 45 minutes, but a third fisherman had made it to shore. Murrell called his son, State Trooper Tim Murrell, to report the accident, and then he helped the men into his boat. Murrell also gathered up belongings that had floated in the water after the capsizing of the men's boat.

"It was a cold, windy day and I knew that the men who had been rescued would be hypothermic," said Trooper Murrell. "I was in Warsaw when Dad called, so I contacted Mike Eckers (Long Shoal Marina manager/ owner), and asked him to lower my boat into the water and get the motor started. His help enabled me to get to the scene of the accident quickly where I transferred the men to my boat and put them in life jackets. I had called EMTs who were waiting at Long Shoal Marina to treat the men. Mike and Don Eckers provided towels to the men as well as hot drinks until they had been checked out by medical personnel. The men are all recovered from their ordeal."

Larry D. Smith, NRM Specialist Team Lead with the U.S. Corps of Engineers at Truman Lake stated that "The unsolicited and benevolent actions displayed saved the lives of these men visiting Truman Lake. Mr. Murrell's actions is keeping in the spirit of the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers' safety first and caring for the recreation public. State Trooper Tim Murrell with the Missouri Highway Patrol and Don and Mike Eckers, who own the Long Shoal Marina are also to be commended for their assistance and response on that day. Trooper Murrell was the first officer on the scene... The Corps of Engineers is one of the leading water-based outdoor recreation providers in the nation and appreciates the partnerships with all the Truman Lake Marinas, Missouri State Highway Patrol, local law enforcement, emergency response personnel and the visiting public."

(Continued from Page 1) Joseph Poor (Democrat) for the District 28 seat. The district is comprised of Benton, Cedar, Dallas, Hickory, Laclede, Pettis, Polk and St. Clair Counties.

Sen. Crawford was elected to the District 28 position in August 2017 during a special election to fill then – Lt. Gov. Mike Parson's seat. She served in the Missouri House of Representatives from 2010 through 2017.

She is a lifelong resident of Dallas County and a 1975 graduate of Buffalo High School. She received her B.S. in Finance from Missouri State University in 1995 and is a 1998 graduate of the Graduate School of Banking in Colorado. Prior to becoming a State Representative, she enjoyed a 30-year banking career at O'Bannon Bank in Buffalo.

Sen. Crawford is a member of Tabernacle Baptist Church in Lebanon, Dallas County Cattlemen, NRA, Farm Bureau, Buffalo FFA Alumni, State Fair Foundation, FBLA (Professional Division member) and Lebanon Rotary. She is also a

member of five Chambers of Commerce in her district, is on the advisory board for Lebanon Technical and Career Center, and serves as a board member for the Buffalo Area Community Housing Corporation. She and husband, John, raise beef cattle near Buffalo where they reside.

Sen. Crawford wrote about her reasons for running for re-election to her Senate seat as well as the issues she wants to address in that office. A summary of her Candidate Questionnaire responses are presented below.

She stated that agriculture is very important to her and this district, and that she understands agriculture first hand because of her cow/calf operation. She filed the "fake Meat" bill during the past session, and when it passed as part of a larger agriculture bill, Missouri became the first state in the nation to pass legislation protecting the brand that Missouri Cattlemen have worked hard for.

She wants to make our state a better place to live and do business in, and states that it is imperative that we stand up to protect family values and push back on burdensome regulations.

She stated that she has passed many bills that streamline and update processes for the County Collectors, County Treasurers and Public Administrators. She has also worked on bills that streamline unnecessary regulations for businesses. She has passed tort reform and pro agriculture legislation and will continue to work on these issues. She wants to make Missouri government more efficient.

She states that she is the best person for the position because she is a conservative Christian, a lifelong resident of this district, active in all areas of the district, and accessible to her constituents. She also says that her experience and skill at building relationships matter.

"I am pro-life, pro-second amendment, pro-business, and pro-agriculture," said Sen. Crawford.

Joseph Poor is newer to politics than his opponent, Sen. Crawford, and he wants to be a strong voice for working-class Missourians. He is a 2000 graduate of Camdenton High School and grew up in the Lake of the Ozarks region. He has lived in the Bennett Springs area for 10 years, and has a 12-year old daughter. He works in the field of substance abuse recovery at Pathways.

Poor is eager to restore equity to the state and says that "We must return the idea to our Capitol that our representatives and senators are elected to act in the interests of the working majority instead of the wealthy minority." His goals include addressing many issues, but his top three concerns are related to Medicaid Expansion, the Opioid Epidemic, and Educational Funding.

Poor would like to expand Medicaid coverage for the poor by tying in with the Affordable Care Act (ACA). Although Medicaid was funded 100 percent by the federal government until 2016, it is down to 94 percent in 2018 and will level off at 90 percent in 2020. Missouri has not expanded Medicaid coverage, but states that have expanded it via the ACA have increased rural coverage by 40 percent according to Poor

cent, according to Poor.

"This failure to expand Medicaid in Missouri is causing some rural hospitals to close," said Poor.

"Pemiscot County (in the southeastern corner of the boot heel) is especially having this problem. We have the highest internal mortality rate, and this applies to infants too."

Poor would like to pursue a true Prescription Drug Monitoring Program in Missouri to help prevent patients from obtaining more narcotic medications than are medically necessary. He sees the result of "doctor shopping" in his job, where people get addicted to drugs because they are available by going from doctor to doctor and pharmacy to pharmacy.

"These are not damaged people," said Poor. "These are not failures. These folks are our neighbors, coworkers, family and friends and their lives have value... When shown some compassion they can be helped... Our failure to act is a blemish upon our state."

The third issue of great importance to Poor has to do with education funding. He said that in the course of the last two legislative sessions, a quarter of a billion dollars has been cut from education in Missouri. He says that we need to invest in the next generation and fill the occupational needs of the future.

He is also concerned about the debt accumulated by those trying to further their education, and the diminishing worth of that education in today's economy. He says that this generation will not attain the same level of security and financial freedom enjoyed by previous generations due to shifting economic conditions and the high concentration of benefits trickling to the top while neglecting the bottom and middle.

Poor states that we must pass legislation that repeals Right to Work and preserves the right of employees to collectively bargain.

"We must preserve and protect prevailing wage and ensure that hard working tradesmen are paid fairly for their skills. We must codify into law legislation that increases our minimum wage and allows hard working Missourians a real opportunity at achieving The American Dream."

Joan Shores (Democrat) and Rodger Reedy (Republican) are on the November 6 ballot as candidates for the opening seat in the Missouri House of Representatives, District 57 (HD 57). The winning candidate will replace Rep. Wanda Brown, who was first elected in 2010 and has reached her term limits. HD 57 covers Henry and parts of Benton, Bates and Cass Counties.

Joan Shores was born in Paola, Kansas, attending school there before entering the University of Kansas, where she graduated with a B.S. in Food and Nutrition. She worked for decades as a Registered Dietician, spending many of her years in hospitals and long-term care facilities. She is now retired and a member of Missouri Women's Leadership Coalition, American Association of University Women, Greater Kansas City Women's Political Caucus and the Cass County Women's Democratic Club. She is a 37-year resident of the HD 57 in Cass County. and she and her husband live on a farm nearest to Archie, but with a Harrisonville address.

Shores is running for HD 57 because she "is worried about education and our children's future, and about our family farms that depend on expanded foreign markets to buy their crops." She plans to demand expansions to Medicaid to help our state maintain rural hospitals.

"I am here to focus on citizens, not special interests," said Shores on a Facebook video.

Shores wants to increase the minimum wage to a living wage and believes that we must provide equal opportunity for all, passing laws to guarantee equal pay for equal work, closing the gender pay gap.

Shores' lifelong career in Healthcare had an emphasis in preventive healthcare for seniors aging at home. She is an active member of organizations advocating for equal opportunity for all, and she has lobbied for such issues as pay equity for women and minimum wage increase for years at our State Capitol.

"I want to work alongside you and together we will raise up Missouri!" said Shores. "Our beautiful state of Missouri is filled with history and plentiful resources. Most important, our Missouri is filled with people who help their neighbors, people who care."

According to Onyourballot.vote411, the candidacy for Shores has been endorsed by the Missouri

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
Women's Leadership Coalition, the Greater Kansas City Women's Political Caucus, and the Missouri State UAW Political Action Committee.



Shearer Adjusts After Severe Football Injury

They are our Friday night warriors. We yell and we scream. We win when they win and we lose when they lose and when one gets hurts, we suffer along with

Evan Shearer, a senior at Cole Camp and the son

of the head football coach, Kevin Shearer, was severely injured last year against Sherwood. He went to Golden Valley in Clinton and received an IV. After a Monday morning seizure, headaches, and throwing up, Shearer went to see doctors at the University of Missouri and received the bad news. He had a subdural hematoma on the right front lobe of his brain.

Being the determined young man that he is, he was able to rejoin his basketball team to end the season and then go on to play a full baseball season. The talk around Benton County was that Shearer was back this year on the football team and that Cole Camp would be that much harder to beat. The wide receiver and middle linebacker was doing well until the sixth game of the season against Buffalo.

Shearer commented, "It was probably the best play of my high school career. The red sea opened up, I saw the running back, I stuck him, perfect form tackle, shoulder pad. It was great, felt amazing.'

Two plays later, he jogged off the field and went to his dad and pointed to his head and said, "It is up here again." He felt "heavy feet" like the first time and knew something was seriously wrong. Well, his parents rushed him to Bothwell where they performed a Cat -Scan and later he was life flighted to Columbia. As the doctors said, "he was struck by lighting twice" as he did not have a pre-disposed issue. It was a different spot on his brain. He had wanted to walk onto a college football program somewhere, but his football playing days were over forever. He had played football ever since the first grade and had dreamed of grander times. He had also planned on going into the military, but that is probably not going to happen now.

Shearer commented, "Parents should not be afraid to let their kids play football because of what happened to me. The odds are greater that they will be hurt in a car wreck than on a football field. This was a one-in-a-million freak accident that happened twice. I don't blame football for this. Life didn't give more than I can handle. I feel I have a good grasp on what has happened to me."

He hopes to be released to play basketball and baseball in a couple of weeks. The 4.2 GPA student has eyes on studying pre-med or pre-law or some kind of engineering career and even perhaps being a football coach one day. Right now, he is a defensive studentcoach along side his father and is having a great time . As the middle linebacker and the defensive captain, his move into coaching was a natural process.

He is not suffering for any physical problems, but mentally it has been tough. He would later add, "It is hard not to walk out on that football field, but I know



Your vote is Important! Be sure to vote November 6th or get your absentee ballot in by the same date.

One issue that hasn't had much discussion so far is Proposition D that is asking to increase the motor fuel tax. Ads on TV promote the proposition as a method of repairing unsafe bridges and roads. This is a plus because it would also mean jobs for middle class workers who would be paid prevailing wages for these public works projects. These jobs also expand the economy in the area and provide more taxes for schools, police and city government.

But did you realize that this measure will generate at least \$288 million annually to provide for the funding of MO state law enforcement? Local governments would receive an estimated \$123 million annually. Be aware if you vote yes for bridges and roads that about 70% of the fuel tax increase would go to State Police, including Highway Patrol and Water Patrol. Around 30% would go to roads and bridges.

We now pay fuel tax of 17 cents per gallon. Voting yes would increase the fuel tax 2.5 cents per year starting July 1, 2019 and continue each year until the fuel tax reaches 27 cents per gallon, July 1, 2022. The tax would also apply to natural gas, liquid natural gas and propane, but only if they are being used as an alternative motor fuel. There are pluses and minuses to Proposition D. Vote for what is most important to you.

In his letter to the editor last week, Warren Love mentioned that a poll he had taken in 2017 had a majority of yes on Right to Work (RTW), and that was why, when it comes up in the MO Legislature next year, he would vote yes. I'm hearing about other candidates in the state who now are pledging

that they would vote against RTW when it's introduced because 67% of MO voters said NO. In Benton County alone, 65% were against RTW. Warren Love should be representing the people of the 125th district.

Another concern was Mr. Love's explanation of voting for charter schools, but in a limited way. Limited or not, funding charter schools and vouchers means less money for local public schools.

Mr. Love is against Amendment 1 because he believes the redistricting of MO representative districts would become partisan. Our present redistricting procedures came extremely close to being over ruled in the courts because of gerrymandering. Redistricting in Amendment 1 is spelled out in a very impartial way. Democrats and Republicans, both, wouldn't be able to do gerrymandering. Limiting dark money and lobbyist gifts is a real plus and would affect all. Amendment 1 is nonpartisan. The money being spent on Vote No on 1 signs and advertisement is coming from wealthy donors who want to give PAC money to candidates and lobbyists. Please remember Mr. Love's views

as you vote. Another important vote on November 6th is for candidates of the MO Senate District 28. Joseph Poor has some really good goals and beliefs. For education, the legislature should budget fewer corporate tax cuts and tax cuts for wealthy people and use this money for higher education and K-12 schools. Joe wants to improve access to higher education and training for lower skilled and blue-collar workers. He believes we should establish prescription drug monitoring programs to battle substance abuse in the state and to stop being able to get prescriptions from multiple doctors for opioids. Joe is against RTW and feels we must Finish the Job we started with our Vote

NO on Prop A. Sandy Crawford, his opponent for the 28th District, mostly states she's running on her experience of having served a few years. Mrs. Crawford voted for RTW, voted to repeal MO's prevailing wage laws and voted against raising the state minimum wage. Sen. Crawford voted to kick 63,000 senior citizens off of the MO RX program, which provides funding assistance for prescription drugs and she voted against a prescription drug monitoring program to fight the opioid crisis. She repeatedly voted down funding for public education. Most of the money for her campaign

Joseph Poor stated, "We can't solve tomorrow's problems with today's leaders using yesterday's thinking, and so often it seems like that's what we're trying to do." This is a very important

election. We need to elect people who can represent us and become part of the checks and balances that our government set up. Congressional, Judicial, and Executive branches are supposed to work independently of each other. U.S. and MO Congresses are supposed to be their own entity to choose nonpartisan judges and help our people strive for liberty and justice for all, and not allow executive privilege to be what is governing us. I couldn't cook when I was younger. After getting married at age 25, I realized that someday, sometime, I was going to have to cook something so I went to

However she couldn't remember the difference between a cake and a pie pan. So she made the cake in pie pans, put them together so it looked like a flying saucer. She did note that it was really hard to frost the sides! Indeed. The entire family unmercifully teased her for years.

My niece showed me some recipes I had given my sister, trying to inspire her to make something. She did make the following, easy enough so that even a confused cake baker could make these.

Quick Oven Buttered Corn Sticks 4 tablespoons butter,

Combine biscuit mix and corn; stir until forms soft dough. If really sticky add a little more biscuit mix. Knead about 15 strokes on a lightly floured surface.

Roll out into 6x10 inch rectangle. Cut into 1x3 inch strips. Take each strip and heavily brush each side with the melted butter. Place in shallow baking pan and bake for 10 to 12 minutes.


Jacque had received her CNA and was working as a caretaker of several patients at the time of her passing.

Gale grew up in Warsaw and graduated from Warsaw High School, the class of



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


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


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Warsaw CTC **Receives New Grant**

By Anita Campbell Enterprise Staff Warsaw R-9 School District Assistant Superintendent Christian Meier presented the Warsaw Board of Education with a Career Technical Education grant that he had applied for during the summer. The Board accepted the grant for \$7,662 which will be divided between the agriculture, business, FACS and health departments.

The agriculture department plans to purchase a plasma torch for their projects. The business department plans to purchase additional software as well as sending their instructors to professional development sessions. The FACS department will purchase a digital camera as well as electronic dolls. The health department will also receive some of the funds but have not decided on their purchase. The grant was specifically designated for career and technical classes.

"I didn't come on board with the R-9 District until July 1 which was when the grant applications were due but I contacted the state and was given permission to apply so I did and luckily we won a grant," said Meier.

In other business, the Board was presented with the results of the Assessment Committee's findings from the Parent Communication Survey. Surveys were distributed to all parents in the R-9 District and of the 1,248 students, 276 parents responded.

Most parents felt most comfortable receiving school information from a phone call from the school (88%). Other forms of communication included: Email, (74.3%); Mail Home, (35.5%); School Website, (20.3%); and Social Media, (19.2%).

Most parents were interested in receiving school information from the following: My student's teacher, (53.6%); Building principal, (31.5%); and District office,

On a scale of 1-5 with being strongly disagree to 5 being strongly agree, how would you rate the district's current efforts to communicate with parents? Parents rated the district as 4 for (33.3%); 5 for (30.4%); 3 for (22.1%); 2 for (7.2%) and 1 for (6.9%).

Of those surveyed, 48.6 percent were parents of high school students; 39.1 percent were parents of middle school students; 36.2% were parents of North School students; 21.7 percent were parents of North School students; 21.7% were parents of South School students; and 11.2% were parents of Ruth Mercer students.

During the principal reports, all principals reported that attendance is up compared to this time last year. A work session for the

Board of Education members will be held on October 30 from 10 AM until noon. The next Board of Educa-

tion meeting will be held on November 15 at 6 PM in the CLC room at the high school.

Cattlemen Reiterate Need for USDA to Regulate Fake Meat

The National Cattlemen's Beef Association (NCBA) highlighted food safety and product labeling expertise within the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) during a two-day public meeting on lab-grown fake meat October 23-24. The public meeting, hosted jointly by the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) and the Food and Drug Administration (FDA), featured a wide range of topics for consideration, including potential production hazards, food labeling, and marketing claims.

NCBA President Kevin Kester and President-Elect Jennifer Houston delivered remarks during the open comment periods of the session. Houston explained why USDA is well-positioned to apply current food safety processes to labgrown fake meat products. Two-thirds of the facilities already overseen by USDA are "processing-only" facilities where harvesting of animals does not take place.

"Ensuring lab-grown fake meat products are subject to strong, daily inspection by USDA's trained professionals is essential," she said. "The health of consumers is on the line, and USDA is far better suited to ensure the safety of lab-grown products."

Kester focused his comments on how USDA oversight protects consumers against false and misleading marketing claims.

"USDA can be trusted to enforce truthful, transparent labeling of the products under its jurisdiction," he said. "Beef producers welcome competition, but product labels and marketing must be based on sound science, not the misleading claims of anti-animal agriculture activists."

The Missouri Cattlemen's Association (MCA) led the effort for Missouri to become the first state in the nation to pass legislation requiring transparency with consumers.

"The Missouri law is all about marketing with integrity," said MCA Executive Vice President Mike Deering. "If it's grown in a laboratory or is derived from a plant, consumers deserve to know that. It's that simple." Deering said MCA supis the agency responsible for regulating and providing oversight of lab-grown food products.
