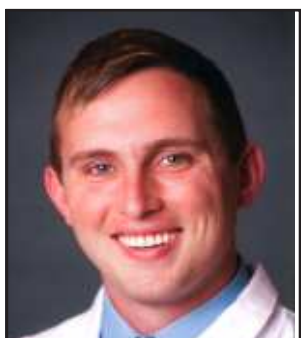

Warsaw Man Flees Scene Of Accident

A Warsaw man fled the scene of an accident on U. S. 65 at Route MM in Benton County on September 3 at 5:30 PM.

The crash occurred as a 2002 GMC driven by Bradley W. Harris, 46, of Parkville, was traveling north and a 2001 Kawasaki driven by Todd Gemes, 46, of Warsaw was stopped at the intersection of U. S. 65 and Route MM. The Bradley vehicle swerved to avoid the motorcycle as it entered the intersection. The Bradley vehicle entered the southbound lane and was struck by the motorcycle. Gemes fled the scene of the crash and was later located and taken into custody.

Gemes suffered moderate injuries and was treated by the Warsaw/Lincoln EMS and refused further treatment.

Tpr. D. C. Belardo of the Missouri Highway Patrol investigated the accident. Belardo was assisted by Tpr. B. G. Katzing.

Sheriff's Office Needs Eye In The Sky

A child wanders away from home, a senior citizen becomes disoriented and walks away, an accident occurs and a person is un-

able to move, these are all situations in which the local law enforcement officials may be called to search for someone. Benton County Sheriff Eric Knox is on a quest to obtain a drone for his office to aid his officers in case of an emergency.

"I decided after the situation with the man who shot

our Chief of Police that we needed a drone and I am determined to make this happen," said Knox. "When we were chasing the suspect, he ran into a wooded area. If we had a drone we could have found him much sooner and we might have been able to capture him before he shot our Chief."

Unmanned aerial vehicles (UAVs) or drones have been used for domestic police work in Canada and the United States; dozens of US police forces had applied for UAV permits by March 2013. UAVs can be powerful surveillance tools by carrying camera

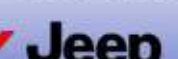

All classes will be held at the Warsaw/Lincoln Ambulance conference room at 1206 Medic Dr. Warsaw. The C.E.R.T. classes will educate individuals about disaster preparedness, about hazards that can impact the immediate areas involved in the disaster and provide training in proper basic disaster response skills. These skills will involve fire safety techniques, light search and rescue techniques, team organization, disaster medical operations, life saving skills with an emphasis on decision making processes, rescuer safety, what to expect in terms of immediate services and how to do the greatest good for the greatest number of people. All classes will be held in the evenings at 5:30 PM to 8:30 PM to enable those citizens who cannot attend day classes an opportunity to be a part of this vital community service team. 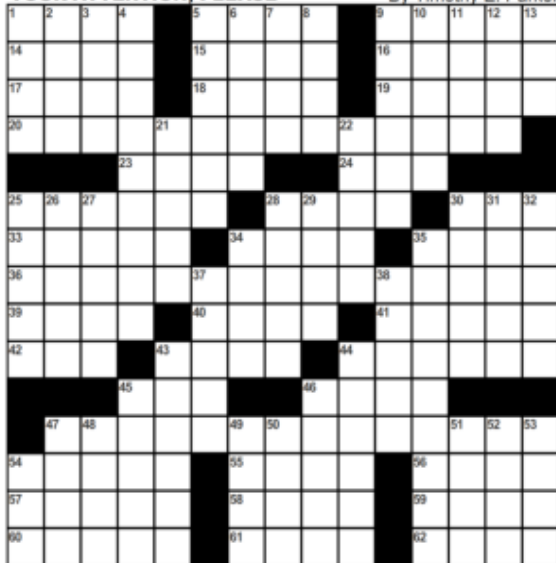



systems capable of license plate scanning and thermal imaging as well as radio equipment and other sensors. UAVs have been used by U.S. Customs and Border Protection to patrol United States borders since 2005, and the agency currently owns 10 UAVs [21] with plans to use armed drones.

Drones, in general are highly appealing to the police because UAVs can reach places that your local police can't. That can range from a place too high to climb or a position simply too dangerous for an officer to put himself or herself in. In addition, drones can capture footage for days, provided the storage capacity of the drive is large enough. That can allow law enforcement to tend to other things, while the UAV takes care of recording valuable footage.

Knox's plans are to purchase a DJI drone which would cost between \$20,000 and \$23,000.

Sheriff Knox is a licensed UAV pilot, however, he does intend for his officers to be licensed as well.

For those who feel the use of an UAV is an invasion of personal privacy, the International Association of Chiefs of Police (IACP) in 2012 published a list of recommended guidelines for use of UAVs in law enforcement. Endorsed by the American Civil Liberties Union (ACLU), its recommendations include the following:

- Police should obtain warrants to use drones where subjects have a reasonable expectation of privacy.

- Police should not retain images captured by drones unless they are relevant to a crime.

- Police should give the public meaningful notice of drone use.

- Use of drones by police should be subject to tracking and audits, with accountability for misuse.

- Police should not use weaponized drones.

The Friends of the Benton County Sheriff's Office are currently holding various fundraisers to help with the purchase of the BCSO drone. Chief of the Deer Creek Fire District also happens to be president of the community center, making it easy to recruit festival volunteers from both organizations. Spry remembers that when he was a teenager, in 1980, the festival was called the "Wing-Ding" and included a big carnival. Ida Mae Campbell was instrumental in planning the festivals in those days, and also donated land to the community center. The two Edwards organizations are a driving force in the community, bringing many of the 2,000 plus residents in the 65326 zip code together at different events during the year.

Vendors included the familiar pumpkin patch, farmer's market, bake sale, and Tupperware. There was also a raffle for \$250 (that will continue past the end of the festival) and a 50/50 raffle where the winner shared proceeds with the festival sponsors. Plenty of food and drink was available for sale at the firehouse where major volunteers, Sheila Patton, Terri Proctor and Margaret Spry hung out during the day.

A corn hole tournament took place at 10 AM where contestants threw bean bags through a hole trying to be the first to earn 21 points and be declared the winner. Chief Spry said that it was called a corn hole tourna-

ment because the game originated when corn was stuffed in bags instead of beans. A color guard performed at noon, the same time that the pie auction began. A silent auction had more items this year than in the recent past, and ended at 2 PM.

Although the amount of funds raised by the festival has not been determined as of press time, the money will go towards maintenance of the community building, and two scholarships to high school seniors awarded in the spring.

Rieman's mother, Carrie Rieman, of the Benton County Enterprise staff, believes that he is the youngest person, at 29, to have filled this position.

"I haven't checked any of the prior directors to see if that is true," said Kyle Rieman. "But, I am currently the youngest person in my office."

The Fiscal Oversight Division prepares fiscal notes on bills and joint resolutions before action may be taken on them. The fiscal notes must 1) state the cost of the proposed legislation to the state; 2) whether the proposal would establish a program or agency which would duplicate an existing program or agency; 3) whether the provisions of the proposal were federally mandated; 4) whether the proposal would have significant direct fiscal impact upon any political subdivision of the state; 5) whether any new physical facilities would be required; 6) and, whether the proposal would fiscally impact small business.

This non-partisan job takes a lot of math and critical thinking skills, and Rieman has to ask himself how a bill is going to solve a problem and what areas it will impact. He says that a lot of research involves checking other states to see what similar legislation

was enacted and how it was implemented. His Division also reads subject matter publications by college professors to get information on bills.

I consider myself a public servant, and my goal is to gather factual information and data, to hopefully help construct good policies to benefit the citizens of Missouri," said Rieman. "Our office helps members of the General Assembly to create or change programs such as reducing incarceration rates for juveniles, or fixing inefficiencies in State Government. There are sometimes oddball things that I have to gather facts and data about, but I don't judge."

The process in preparing a fiscal note begins when the drafter in either Senate Research or House Research forwards a copy of the bill draft to Oversight with a request for fiscal note. Oversight reviews the draft and forwards a copy to all affected state agencies and local political subdivisions as required by statute.

Once the agencies have reviewed the legislative draft and have determined what fiscal impact, if any, it will have upon their agency, they respond to Oversight. Oversight compiles all agency responses and together with their own independent research, prepares a fiscal note stating the estimated fiscal impact to state government, local governments and small businesses.

The Oversight Division prepares approximately 2,200 fiscal notes during a regular legislative session. In addition to preparing fiscal notes, the Oversight Division also performs program evaluations as directed by the members of the joint committee. An evaluation generally includes examination of state agency records, interviews of agency staff, surveys of affected citizens, on-site observation of program operations and review of similar programs in other states. The division is currently conducting an evaluation of the State Legal Expense Fund, which pays for all legal expenses and settlement costs in cases involving a state entity.

Rieman became a leg-

islative intern as part of a Missouri State at Springfield program. The internship turned into a career in 2011 where he worked for the Secretary of State in the Elections Division. He handled all elections and initiative petitions. He verified with county clerks to make sure there were enough signatures on petitions to put them on the ballot. He did this job for two years before going to work for the Office of Administration, for three years, as a budget and policy research analyst. He and other non-partisan staffers followed legislation, reporting to the Governor, making recommendations and looking for problems that needed to be addressed.

The two years prior to his current position as the Oversight Director, Rieman was a budget analyst for the Missouri House of Representatives. There his duties were similar to those of his previous position with the Office of Administration, except he was working for the legislative branch instead of the executive branch.

Rieman plans to stay in public service helping to enhance government efficiency and assisting in creating data driven public policy.



I am somewhat of a martinet when it comes to my cooking equipment. Everything and I mean everything has a place. Since I am somewhat lazy it also means I don't have to spend time looking for something. I can grab it and go; which means less time spent rummaging about. I have a huge pegboard on my kitchen wall and everything has a place. Some might think it looks like a garage but I love it. The late Julia Child also had a pegboard kitchen. Her husband Paul had outlined the pans on the board so everything had a proper place. Now on display in the Smithsonian, it is a tribute to a real working kitchen used by a real working cook.

Julia was also a martinet when it came to cooking classes and demonstrations. I am often asked "Wasn't it a lot of fun assisting her" No, it wasn't 'fun'. It was demanding, hard work, attention to detail, and dedication to doing my best. I loved it. I was blessed to be able to assist the top chefs and cooks from around the world, since Macy's San Francisco was the top promoter of all things foodie at that time. You had to know your way around a kitchen to assist them. When someone says mince, you needed to know how to mince, not chop, not dice, but mince. When you know the terminology and the technique, instructions are easily communicated.

Julia did not tolerate fools or pretentiousness. Let's cook was always her beginning instruction to me. And so we did, from advanced recipes to the most basic. In the Napa Valley one year we were gifted a lot of apples, so we made applesauce. This applesauce stands on its own but is useful in many other preparations like pies, ice cream, etc.

Applesauce
3-1/2 to 4 pounds apples, your choice, I like Granny Smith, Baldwin, Rhode Island Greening.

1 medium lemon, zest and juice
1/2 teaspoon cinnamon
1/2 cup sugar, more if needed
1/2 vanilla extract

Prepare apples, wash, core, seed, cut into quarters but do not peel. The peel gives body and flavor.

Place apples, lemon zest, lemon juice, cinnamon in saucepan, cover and slowly cook over low heat, stirring and mashing occasionally, apples will soften and render their juices.

Puree the apples through a food mill, return to pot, add sugar, stir and boil slowly, add sugar to taste, until the puree is thick enough to hold its shape on a spoon. Stir in vanilla. This will keep in the refrigerator for several days.

MCA Gains A Greater Voice In Environmental Compliance

EPA changes structure of National Compliance Initiatives

Missouri producers and the Missouri Cattlemen's Association (MCA) gained a more powerful voice in environmental regulation through the decision of the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) to change its longstanding National Enforcement Initiatives to National Compliance Initiatives. A change in name goes hand-in-hand with a change in the structure and selection process of EPA environmental priorities that result in regulation programs.

Previously, National Enforcement Initiatives were created and enforced by the EPA based on priorities decided at a national level with little state or local input. As a result, cattle producers often became the victim of overbearing, unrealistic enforcement that did not take into account the unique needs of Missouri producers, according to MCA Executive Vice President Mike Deering.

Now, the EPA intends to use state and local representation as a resource when creating priorities in order to ensure real conditions are recognized and addressed. The structure change also adds additional means for ensuring compliance before the need for enforcement. When implementation becomes necessary, the EPA encourages local bodies to do so if authorized.

With a more regionally-centered approach to National Compliance Initiatives, compliance and enforcement will be more reasonable. With more focus on local needs, cattle producers can now be better stewards for the protection of natural resources. The shift from enforcement-focused to compliance-focused is expected to remove great burden from producers statewide.

"This shift in focus will provide great relief to the farming and ranching families of Missouri," said Deering. "It is about time that producers stop being the target of environmental protection and start being seen as partners."

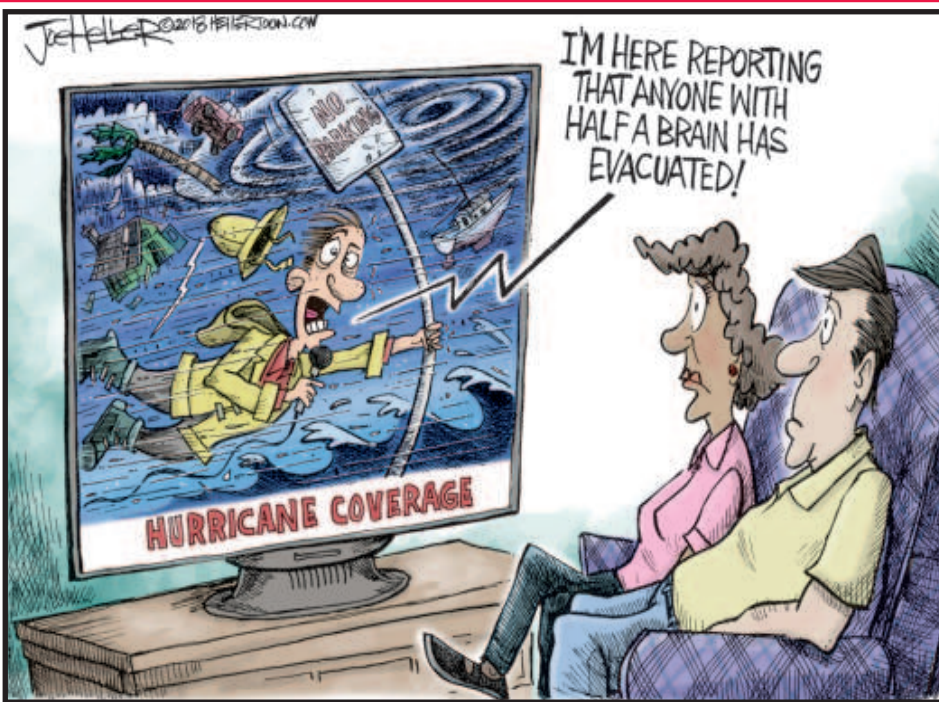

may require it. Other states may also require bowhunter education and will accept this Missouri online course. The course can also be an excellent refresher course for veteran bowhunters.

Each student will receive a temporary bowhunter education certificate once they complete and pass the 60-question final exam with an 80% or higher. The fee for the all-online course is \$30, which is paid directly to the online provider. Individuals 15 years or younger are still required to complete the in-person bowhunter education course to receive certification.

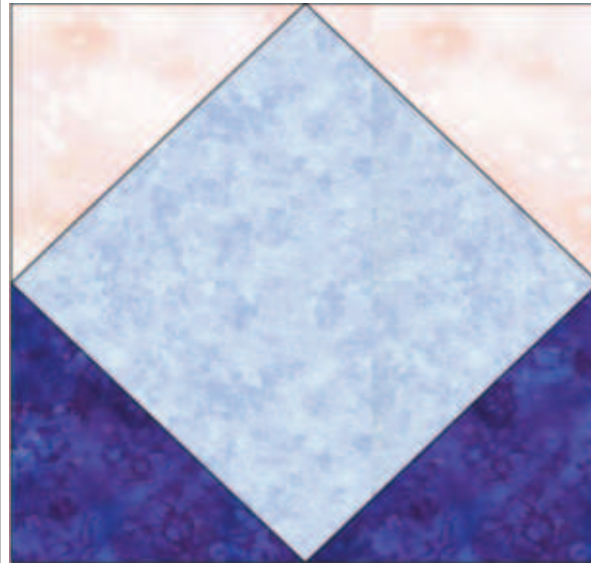

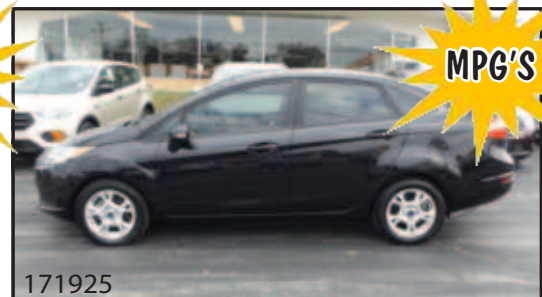
