No-Change Tax Ordinance For Cole Camp

Preceded by a well-attended public hearing on a proposed property tax levy, Thursday eve August 16, Cole Camp Aldermen established a 2018 tax rate of \$0.4941 per \$100.00 assessed valuation. That action was said by Mayor Burton Bormann to be "no change" to the 2017 levy.

The meeting opened at 7 PM, with Aldermen Bob Meuschke, Greg Ives, Eric Hoke, Wayne Karman present. Mayor Bormann presided; Acting City Clerk Dawn Paul recorded. First business conducted was to approve the evening's agenda, minutes of the June session and two subsequent closed sessions, then agree to pay bills presented. City Clerk Paul furnished financial information, received without comment.

Visitor Sandy Schlesselman began a discussion about bringing bike routes into the City, then passed the conversation to Mac Vorce, Executive Director, Warsaw Area Chamber of See TAX Page 16

Cedar Grove Baptist Church Remains Resilient After Fire

An early morning fire at Cedar Grove Baptist Church located on Missouri Highway 7 north of Warsaw caused damage to the west wall of the structure on Monday.

A driver passing by spotted the flames and called 911 at 5:30 AM. The Warsaw Fire Department responded to the call and extinguished the flames in about half an hour according to Warsaw

Fire Chief Rob Lane.

Lane said that two tanker trucks, two fire engines and two brush trucks responded to the fire with eight fire fighters putting out See FIRE Page 7

District 1 Commissioner Dale Jr. Estes made a motion to accept the bid from Warsaw Oil Company for Road District #1 for red diesel fuel at a cost of \$2.52 per gallon. The motion passed. The other bid received was from Zollicker Oil Company at a cost of \$2.535 per gallon. The Commission accepted the low bid price.

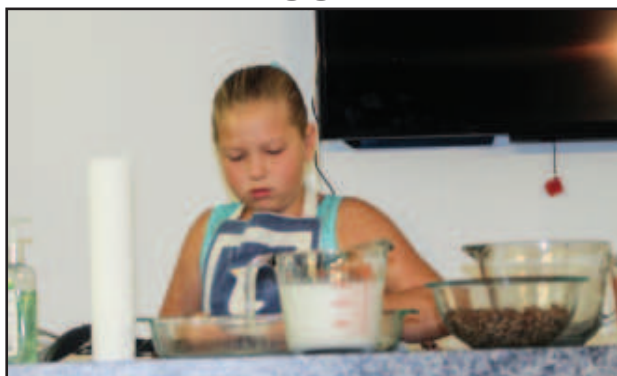
in agriculture, and/or participate in local outreach and extension programs such as 4-H or FFA.

Amelia Roberts represented Benton County at the Missouri State Fair on Sunday, August 12, at the Missouri Egg Council's Egg Contest as she demonstrated "How to Make A Farmers' Breakfast" in the 4-H Building. Of the many contestants from across the state, Amelia won second place in the Missouri Contest. Amelia is the eight-year-old daughter of Amber and Gary Roberts of Warsaw and is a member of the All-Arounders 4-H Club. Amelia presented her demonstration at the Benton County 4-H FFA Youth Fair and was selected to present at the Missouri State Fair.

Demonstrations are a great way of sharing what the youth has learned in 4-H projects focused on science and technology, healthy living or citizenship. Prepar-

ing for demonstrations helps 4-H youth develop research, organizational and communication skills. Presenting a demonstration in front of a group helps 4-H youth build poise, confidence and public speaking skills.

Over 104,000 young people between the ages of 5 and 18 participated in a 4-H education program this year. One out of every ten Missouri young people were touched by 4-H. Nearly 1,359 young people and adults volunteer in Missouri, their devoted time was valued at \$38.2 million.

The Missouri 4-H Foundation raised \$789,424 from private sources, member fees and investment income to support Missouri 4-H programs. The Foundation also provided 60 college scholarships each ranging from \$500 to \$2,500.

SEPTEMBER 3 - BOONSLICK REGIONAL LIBRARY will be closed Monday, September 3 in observance of Labor Day.

THE BENTON COUNTY, MO COMMUNITY EMERGENCY RESPONSE TEAM (CERT) classes have been scheduled for Benton County in Warsaw, MO. All classes will be held at the Warsaw/Lincoln Ambulance conference room at 1206 Medic Dr. Warsaw. The C.E.R.T. classes will educate individuals about disaster preparedness, about hazards that can impact the immediate areas involved in the disaster and provide training in proper basic disaster response skills. These skills will involve fire safety techniques, light search and rescue techniques, team organization, disaster medical operations, life saving skills with an emphasis on decision making processes, rescuer safety, what to expect in terms of immediate services and how to do the greatest good for the greatest number of people. All classes will be held in the evenings at 5:30 PM to 8:30 PM to enable those citizens who cannot attend day classes an opportunity to be a part of this vital community service team. There will be no charge for the classes.

The C.E.R.T. Classes will be held on three consecutive Mondays and three consecutive Thursdays. September 10th - Disaster Preparedness, Personal Protective Equipment & C.E.R.T. Organization; Sept. 13th - Fire Safety and Search & Rescue; Sept. 17th - Medical Part I & 2; Sept, 20th - Disaster Psychology & Terrorism; Sept. 24th - Hands on Demonstrations and Practice; Sept. 27th Communications Training & Course Review. Oct. 2nd - Final Testing & Full Disaster Simulation. Since different phases of the program are covered in each session, it is necessary to attend all the classes for a total of 20 hours. However, things do happen, so a Make-Up class will be held on Saturday, Sept. 29th from 9:00 am to 12:00 noon.

The classes will be taught by the Samantha Henley, Deputy Director, Benton County, MO Emergency Management with the assistance of Marie Payne- Bowman, C.E.R.T. Coordinator; Christy Barber, Martha Foster, Sal Rios, Jude Kelly, Deputy Sheriff Storm Walker and numerous professional members of the various EMS and medical services in Benton County.

The C.E.R.T. program trains citizens to be better prepared to respond to emergencies (tornadoes, floods, earthquakes, terrorism) in their communities when they happen, as well as assisting with non-emergency projects that help improve community safety. 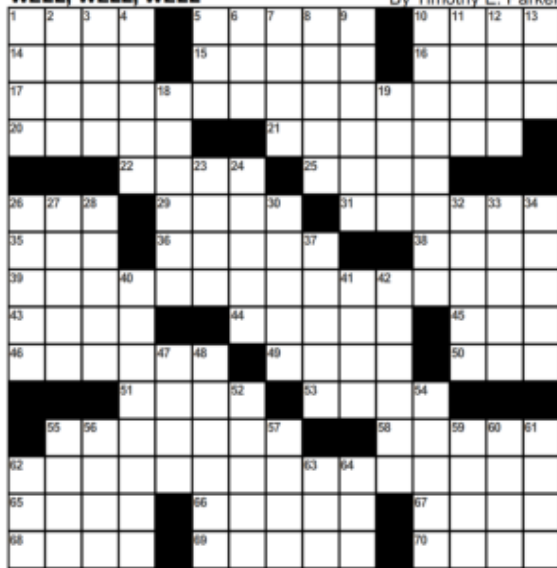

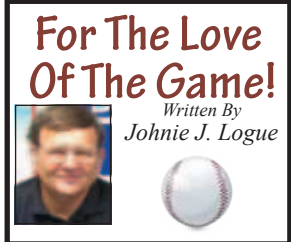

The Warsaw volunteers had been called out earlier to a control burn fire which lasted from 10:30 until midnight and then a false alarm at the Warsaw Health and Rehabilitation Center.

"It has been a busy twenty four hours," said Lane.

While Lane would not speculate on the cause of the fire, he reported that the Missouri State Fire Inspector was contacted to examine the structure.

Lane reported that the fire fighters had to cut the ceiling inside the structure to make sure the fire had not spread.

"About a 25 foot section of the outer wall was damaged as well as the roof," Lane said. "Of course, there will also be smoke damage inside the church as well."

Cedar Grove Baptist minister Barry Edwards expressed his gratitude to the fire fighters.

"This could have been much worse if someone hadn't noticed the fire and called 911," Edwards said. "I am also grateful that the fire fighters reacted quickly and put out the fire before it could spread."

Edwards said that the Cedar Grove congregation will hold services on Sunday but those services will be in Faith Hall. At press time Edwards was not sure of the time for those services, so he suggested that members check the Cedar Grove Baptist Church Facebook page and the web site.

Church services for Wednesday and Thursday have been cancelled. The church office is also closed for now as well.

by Hawthorn President Chuck Allcorn. The money had been raised by employees who sold candy and nuts throughout the year.

Another highlight was when the Friends of the Benton County Sheriff's Office won the "Best Decorated Tables" at the special evening. They were presented a special Decorating Trophy.

"We were very fortunate to have donations from many businesses in Warsaw, Sedalia and Clinton," said Swerline. All the money raised goes to the Benton County Food Pantry, which provides food for approximately 1500 families per month.

"Most of our families are the working poor," Swerline said. "That means that the adults in the family are working but they aren't making enough to feed their family all month."

The Benton County Food Pantry receives most of the food they distribute from the Food Bank of Central and Northeast Missouri in Columbia.

"Last year we received over a million pounds of food from the Food Bank of Central and Northeast Missouri," said Swerline.

The Food Bank for Central & Northeast Missouri is a regional disaster and hunger relief network that acquires and distributes millions of pounds of food annually to partner agencies across a 32-county area.

A member of Feeding America, The Food Bank is able to work with manufacturers, wholesalers, processors, growers, retailers and restaurants to secure donations and food at reduced costs. Because of these partnerships, the Food Bank is able to turn every dollar into \$21 worth of groceries.

The Food Bank works with 132 food pantries, soup kitchens, shelters and other agencies to ensure food gets into the hands of those who need it most.

"Since we receive most of the food from the Food Pantry many people ask why we need additional funds," Swerline said. "But, of course, we still have to pay rent, the electric bill, gas for the truck and other expenses; however, no

one working at the Benton County Food Pantry gets a pay check everyone who works there is a volunteer."

Swerline commented that sometimes people who have been sentenced to serve Community Service come to work at the Food Pantry and many of them come back after their sentence is finished.

The Benton County Food Pantry is open Monday through Thursday from 9 until 12 and 1 until 3. The Pantry is closed on Friday because that is the day volunteers travel to Columbia to pick up 16,000 pounds of food to distribute to those in need.

In order to qualify for food, a person simply has to provide proof of residence in Benton County. Each household can pick up a load of groceries once a month; however, no one in need is ever turned away.

"We don't give out special baskets for Thanksgiving or Christmas," Swerline said. "There are many other organizations that do that, instead we help families month by month."

In addition to helping families, the Food Pantry also gives out 25 veteran's food boxes every month.

"We are a pilot program for the veteran's boxes as the money for those food boxes comes from private donations," said Swerline.

Swerline also commented that the Food Pantry also receives donations from Panera Bread, Pepsi and many other businesses.

"One of our volunteers drives to Sedalia twice a week after Panera closes at 10 PM to pick up food that they did not sell that day," said Swerline.

"We even receive fish from area fishermen and venison during deer season," Swerline said.

Senior adults are the fastest-growing group needing food assistance. Commodity Supplemental Food Program boxes provide nutritious food to help older individuals supplement their diets. Benton County Pantry provides 187 boxes each month to senior citizens in the county.

"Benton County has many retired senior citizens who thought that Social

Security would be enough to take care of their needs in retirement but with the rising cost of prescription drugs, many retirees have to choose between food and their medicine," Swerline said. "We give out more senior boxes than any other county in the state." In order to qualify for a senior box, the person must be 60 years old and provide proof of residence in Benton County.

While most of the food distributed does come from the Food Bank, the Benton County Food Pantry also relies on the donations from local organizations and individuals.

"We receive donations of food and money from area churches, organizations and businesses," Swerline said. "One church gives \$100 each month which helps us with the expenses of keeping the Food Pantry open."

For 35 years, Feeding America has responded to the hunger crisis in America by providing food to people in need through a nationwide network of food banks.

The concept of food banking was developed by John van Hengel in Phoenix, AZ in the late 1960s. Van Hengel, a retired businessman, had been volunteering at a soup kitchen trying to find food to serve the hungry. One day, he met a desperate mother who regularly rummaged through grocery store garbage bins to find food for her children. She suggested that there should be a place where, instead of being thrown out, discarded food could be stored for people to pick up—similar to the way "banks" store money for future use. With that, an industry was born.

Van Hengel established St. Mary's Food Bank in Phoenix, AZ as the nation's first food bank. In its initial year, van Hengel and his team of volunteers distributed 275,000 pounds of food to people in need. Word of the food bank's success quickly spread, and states began to take note. By 1977, food banks had been established in 18 cities across the country.

As the number of food banks began to increase, van Hengel created a national organization for food banks and in 1979 he established

Second Harvest, which was later called America's Second Harvest the Nation's Food Bank Network. In 2008, the network changed its name to Feeding America to better reflect the mission of the organization.

Today, Feeding America is the nation's largest domestic hunger-relief organization—a powerful and efficient network of 200 food banks across the country. As food insecurity rates hold steady at the highest levels ever, the Feeding America network of food banks has risen to meet the need. We feed 46 million people at risk of hunger, including 12 million children and 7 million seniors.

The Benton County Food Pantry was established in 2001 then moved to their present location in 2007.

"We signed a year lease when we only had enough money for three months," Swerline said. "But we just stepped forward on faith to feed the hungry."

The Food Pantry has also been able to give seed to people in the spring so they can grow their own fresh produce. In return some of those same people bring in extra produce for the Food Pantry to distribute.

A USDA grant of \$86,000 in 2011 allowed the Benton County Food Pantry to purchase commercial freezers and refrigerators, computers and a truck.

"We always can use more volunteers," Swerline said. "Our Board is made up of volunteers who also work at the Food Pantry. Everyone works whether it is unloading a truck, sorting through produce or helping someone pick out food for the month. Whatever your talent, we can find a job for you."

Jeannie Arnold is the Benton County Pantry manager.

"We all appreciate all the volunteers as well as the Knights of Columbus who not only catered the annual fund raiser but also work at the Food Pantry once a month," Swerline said.

CERT operates under the

umbrella of Benton County's Emergency Management Office. Marie Payne-Bowman is the coordinator of CERT, and Martha Foster is the assistant director. Samantha Henley, Deputy Director of Benton County Emergency Management, is the government contact that sponsors CERT.

"There are four levels of commitment for those taking the classes," said Henley. "The first level is for those who want training in order to take care of themselves and their families. The second level is for those who want to take care of themselves, family, and the community. The third level is for those who want to take care of themselves, family, community and are willing to be deployed in Missouri if needed. The fourth level is everything listed in the first three levels, plus being willing to be deployed anywhere."

CERT volunteers had been sent to such places as Houston, TX, and Puerto Rico in the past."

Henley said that this program was first launched in Los Angeles, California, in order to give people the ability to take care of themselves after an earthquake while waiting for help from first responders. She said that there are not a lot of first responders in our area, so CERT volunteers can play

an important role helping their families and the community during emergency situations."

The CERT training involves a mandatory 20 hours of instruction. The classes in September will be held on Monday and Thursday evenings, from 5:30 to 8:30 PM, in the Warsaw/Lincoln Ambulance Barn at 1205 Medic Drive. The dates are September 10, 13, 17, 20, 24, 27, and a make-up day is scheduled for September 29. Classes in March will be held during the day from 9 AM to 3 PM. Schedules are still in the planning stage. Active CERT members will also have tabletop training available during other times of the year, lasting about three hours, to help them stay up to date.

"The ideal class size is 10 to 15 trainees," said Henley. "That way they get more hands-on time and have an equal opportunity to learn. We are looking for volunteers to sign up for classes."

CERT trainer for classes in September is Samantha Henley. Marie Payne-Bowman will take over in March. Guest trainers will be Christie Barber, Martha Foster, Sal Rios, and Jude Kelley.

Community partners in Warsaw have volunteered to provide dinners for CERT trainees. They are McDonald's, Subway, Sonic and Pizza Hut.

Drought Feeding Management Options

Depending upon where you are in Missouri, short forage supplies may be an immediate emergency or may be mainly a winter feeding problem. Recently, some MU Extension colleagues and I have been holding drought management meetings throughout central Missouri, and more are scheduled. I would like to highlight a few points made in those meetings, which address more immediate forage needs.

In dealing with drought conditions, livestock producers need to be flexible in their management responses. The goal is to provide adequate nutrition for the lowest total cost in order to maintain animal production goals. It is important to maintain adequate body condition on cows throughout the fall and winter so they will calve and re-breed next spring.

Livestock feed requirements need to be matched with forage supplies and forage quality. Management adjustments, such as early weaning spring-born beef calves, limiting hay access, or limit feeding hay plus a grain supplement to beef cows, can help producers manage short forage supplies.

Existing forage supplies should be tested for nutrient content to ensure properly balanced diets can be fed for the lowest cost. Producers should carefully monitor bale weight and pounds of supplement being fed in order to manage feed inventories and control cost.

Reduce feed storage and feeding waste as much as possible. For example, open bottom bale feeders can have feeding losses of up to 20 percent of the original bale weight. Bale feeders with skirting around the bottom of the feeder can reduce this waste by one half or more. Cone styled feeders can reduce hay waste to 3 to 5 percent.

Keep in mind long-term ramifications of drought conditions to pastures. Consider having a pasture or paddock that, if necessary, will be abused now and plan on renovating that area next year. Confining overgrazing damage to forage resources may help more of your forage acres recover and be productive next year. Be prepared to apply appropriate weed control next year if necessary.

Economics cannot be ignored in this situation. Brent Carpenter, Ag Business Field Specialist's message to livestock growers is to consider all reasonable financial options before overspending on hyper-inflated feedstuffs. In the current environment, feed costs per day, at quoted hay prices, are about 2-3 times normal and the feeding period could be twice as long as normal.

Ultimately, producers must address the question of how to know when it is just too expensive to feed cows. It is best to work this out on paper before being forced into a decision. There are tipping points where it makes financial sense to execute a stepwise plan to downsize the herd, starting with cows that will generate the least net revenue in the near future.

These tipping points are unique for each farm. It boils down to how cash moves in and out of the business over several years. One red flag is when costs associated with drought cause additional short-term borrowing. Debt snowballs quickly on a stressed cow-calf operation, potentially

to a place beyond an orderly recovery.

This is certainly an abnormal situation, so normal management strategies are probably not going to be effective. The items mentioned above are options to consider, and details can be adapted as necessary for individual producers. So with Mike doing a lot of grilling, opening bagged salads, etc., I occasionally still crave a good dessert which is not going to take a lot of time and energy. One of my easy go-to recipes is sautéed bananas; I love them with vanilla ice cream. The best bananas for this recipe are just ripe, yellow with barely any brown spots. This is easy enough to double and terrific with just about any of your favorite toppings.

- 4 bananas, ripe but not too soft
- 3 tablespoons unsalted butter
- Flour for dredging
- 2 tablespoons sugar, plus more to pass at the table
- Fresh lemon juice for the table
- Peel bananas; cut them in half crosswise, then lengthwise, so each banana has been made into four pieces. Place butter in large, deep skillet over medium high heat.
- Dredge banana pieces lightly in the flour, shaking them to remove the excess.
- When the butter foam subsides, add the pieces to the skillet. Cook, turning frequently until they are golden and beginning to brown, about 10 minutes. Sprinkle with the two tablespoons sugar, cook one minute more.
- Serve, passing additional sugar, lemon juice, topping of your choice.

New Law-- Marriage In Missouri Now For 16 And Up

Governor Mike Parson recently signed legislation to modify age requirements for marriage licenses in Missouri that will take effect on August 28.

Senate Bill 655, which was passed by the Missouri Legislature and signed into law, prohibits marriage licenses from being issued if either party is under 16 years of age. Additionally, the legislation bars the marriage of individuals 21 or older to anyone under age 18. Parental consent will still be required for minors to marry someone under age 21.

All marriage license applicants will be required to provide proof of age to the Recorder of Deeds through a certified copy of their birth certificate, passport, or other government issued identification. The Recorder will document this proof of age.

Recorders of Deeds are committed to preserving records, including marriage licenses, with the utmost care and consistency. The duty to fulfill all legal requirements for documents is paramount. As with any statutory change, the Benton County Recorders Office will modify its policies in order to implement the marriage age law as soon as it takes effect.

Financial Tips for Alzheimer's Caregivers

- Gather all necessary documents. You'll be in a better position to help the individual living with Alzheimer's if you have all the important financial documents – bank statements, insurance policies, wills, Social Security payment information, deeds, etc. – in one place.
- Get professional help. You may want to consult with an attorney, who can advise you on establishing appropriate arrangements, such as a living trust, which provides instructions about the estate of the person for whom you're providing care and names a trustee to hold title to property and funds for the beneficiaries. You also might want to meet with a financial advisor, who can help identify potential resources and money-saving services. And a tax professional may be able to help you find tax deductions connected to your role as caregiver.

Finally, use your experience as a caregiver

to remind yourself of the importance of planning for your own needs. For example, a financial professional can suggest ways of preparing for the potentially huge costs of long-term care, such as those arising from an extended stay in a nursing home.

Caring for an individual living with Alzheimer's has its challenges. But by taking the appropriate steps, you can reduce uncertainties – and possibly give yourself and your family members a greater sense of security and control.

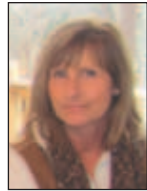

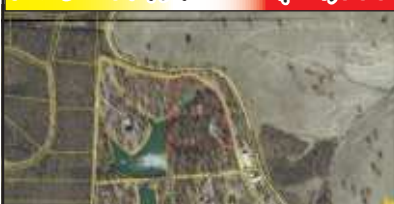

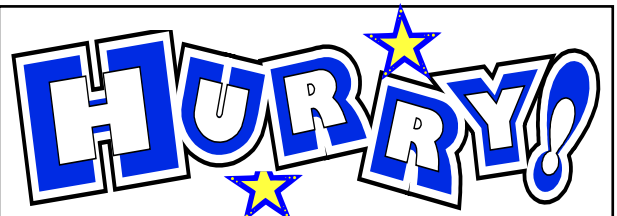

LIVING WATERS RANCH

Living Waters Ranch in Osceola has been offering free day camps for special needs adults and their caregivers since 2009. Each year this program has grown and is now meeting the needs from campers from Clinton, Bolivar, Nevada, Osceola, Lowry City and areas in between. Each monthly day camp consists of a luncheon, preceded by activities like BINGO, crafts, music therapy, games, and special programs or field trips.

The September day camp is scheduled for Thursday, September 13. The day camp will consist of a field trip to Gordon's Orchard for a tour, then crafts and lunch at the Osceola Assembly of God Church, north of Osceola on 13 highway. The day camps are free to special needs adults and their caregivers, but an RSVP is required to ensure ample food and craft supplies.

The day camps started with a small number of campers coming from Osceola and Clinton. It was soon very apparent that there was a serious need for opportunities for special needs adults to be able to enjoy fellowship with others doing fun, educational activities, outside their homes. This program is also a blessing to the caregivers as it gives them an opportunity to spend an enjoyable day outside of the normal routine. It's a wonderful blessing for everyone involved, even the volunteers, who give of their time to make this happen each month.

Funding for the free day camps comes from generous, caring individuals, churches, organizations, and businesses. Truman Lake Community Foundation, Knights of Columbus - Clinton, Easy Living INC, Osceola Assembly of God Church, and other donations have made these events possible. The biggest need right now is in finishing the handicap accessible restroom building at Living Waters Ranch. The future of the day camps involves expanding the number of day camps offered during the spring and fall to incorporate more outdoor events at the ranch. Right now, portapotties are used, but that leaves out the wheelchair bound campers.

The roof of the handicap accessible building was recently completed by the Men's Ministry led by Pastor Ferguson from the Osceola Assembly of God Church. Specific needs to finish the building include electrical labor and supplies including lights, a concrete pad and sidewalk poured in from of the building and connecting it to the shelter house, plumbing supplies, toilets, sinks, and faucets. The 20x30 concrete block building needs sealed and painted, inside and out, and the ceiling, including an attic fan, needs finished. Financial donations and in kind donations are all tax deductible as Living Waters Foundation (Ranch) is a 501c3 nonprofit organization. If you have the skills, materials, or financial means to bring this building to completion, please contact the director, Joyce Brown at 660-924-6890.

Living Waters Ranch offers other outreach programs. Fall Festival, Prom-a-Palooza, and Christmas from the Heart are all free annual events that are available for area children and families. It is the desire and mission of LWR to share God's love with those in the rural areas surrounding Osceola. Visitors come from as far away as Springfield, Joplin and Kansas City. The Ranch as been described as a diamond in the rough, as it's grown bit by bit, and new programs offered as the needs are revealed, since it's humble beginnings in 2007. 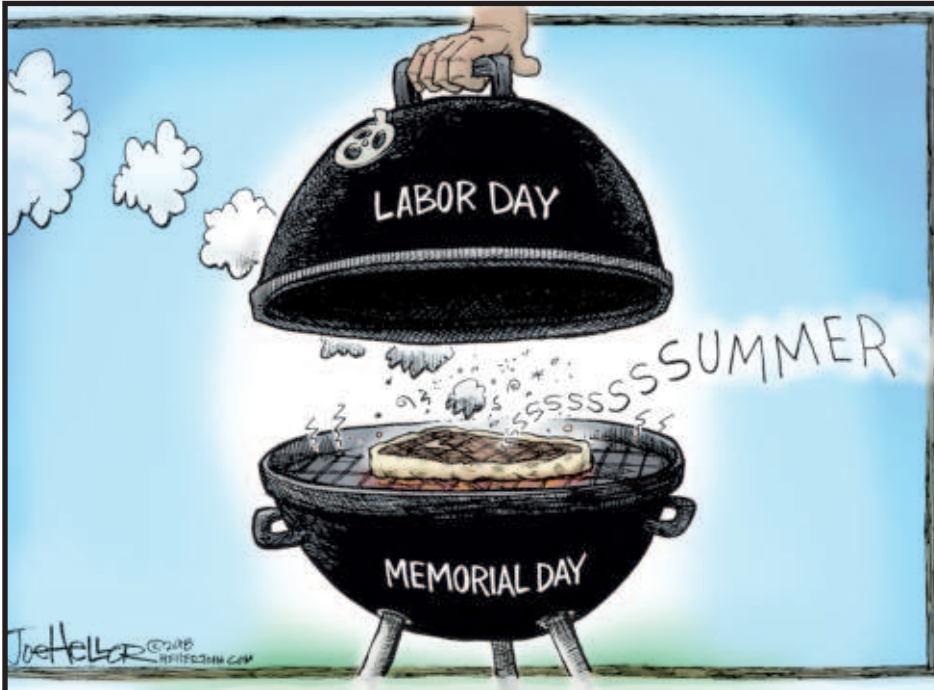

Dear Editor and Readers,

I want to thank Benton countians for voting NO on Prop A. In Benton County we defeated the proposition by 65%! And the percentage of voters was higher than usual for a primary! The percentages state-wide were 67.5% no and 32.5% yes. We've sent a strong message to the state legislators that we DO NOT WANT Right to Work (RTW)!

But as I write this, there are 3 sources that have promised to put this back into the legislature as the January session starts. Holly Rehder from the 148th district in southeast Missouri sponsored the original RTW law and will reintroduce it in January. She's running unopposed.

David Humphreys, owner of Tamko Shingles in Joplin also has promised to put the bill for RTW back into the MO legislature. Mr. Humphreys, a billionaire, has been contributing millions of dollars to candidates who will support RTW and fighting against those who don't support it. Mike Lewis, president of the Missouri AFL-CIO said, "At a time

when working people are struggling to earn wages to raise a family, millionaire corporate CEOs like David Humphreys are trying to buy elections to make sure the rules are manipulated to benefit their own selfish interests. Middle-class Missourians need to speak up together against big corporate donors and do what is right for working families."

The third source of concern is the MO Chamber of Commerce. Dan Mehan, the president and CEO fought hard for RTW before the August 7th election. Now Mr. Mehan says that the debate over RTW is not over.

To protect the power of your vote, there are a couple things you can do. Vote YES on the Missouri Amendment 1, the Lobbying, Campaign Finance, and Redistricting Initiative that will be on the November ballot. This would help slow down David Humphreys and others like him, including dark money donors, since it would limit the amount of money they could contribute to a candidate. David Wilson of the Committee to Protect Missouri Families also said, "We're boycotting Tamko building products to show Humphreys that we don't support businesses whose CEOs attack the middle class by reducing wages and

benefits.

Another important action is to vote for pro-labor candidates. If the legislature is made up of state representatives and senators who support anti-RTW, an introduced bill to make RTW a law wouldn't get passed. Again, this is a bi-partisan issue. The candidates I'm listing for pro-labor in Benton County do happen to be democrats, but in many areas of Missouri there are republicans who support working class families and pro-labor. For the MO House District 125, Chase Crawford is pro-labor and Warren Love supports RTW. Joseph Poor, MO Senate District 28 is pro-labor. I don't have information at this time for MO House District 57 which includes part of northern Benton County. Be sure to ask candidates their opinion. On the national level Vicky Hartzler openly supported making MO a RTW state. Both Claire McCaskill and Renee Hoagenson support working families and are pro-labor.

Be ready in November to vote pro-labor and vote for working class Missouri. That will continue your outstanding support of anti-RTW.

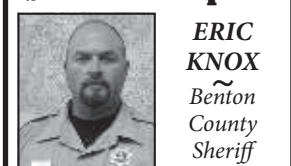

Commerce, and his assistant Lynette Stokes. Vorce spoke at length about plans to establish a network of bike trails across Benton County; most riders wanting food, entertainment, ATMs, shopping; others needing laundry, camping, WiFi, charging stations, possible bike repairs and/or parts. He listed a 25 mile Warsaw to Cole Camp route along the old Butterfield Trail, plus other possible routes, then asked for a bike parking spot in the City, rack to be paid for by the City's Community Betterment organization. The group was interested, but took no action.

Under old business, Aldermen will delay action on street resurfacing plans to

April 2019; and tabled for study, a concern about golf carts on City streets. They did award a \$6,760 low bid electrical contract to Jason Osborne, also noted that a Memorial Park Bench is in the City, needing but a concrete base. The Bench will soon be dedicated to deceased Alderwoman Earlene Oglevie.

Under new business, Aldermen approved a \$21,435 purchase of two four ton HVAC units to replace a system which recently failed, possibly due to a lightning strike. The City's General Fund budget will be increased to reflect that unanticipated expense.

In late business, before the session was closed about 8:50 PM, Public Works Director Klarke Bohling said that Caldwell Tank, a firm the City contracted with to perform periodic maintenance on the City's main water tank, has become unable to perform under that contract. He added that Caldwell is willing to refund the \$39,791 the City has already paid that firm under the contract, in order to cancel it. Aldermen happily accepted Caldwell's offer.

Sheriff's Office Could Receive Professional Drone

It wasn't long ago when you heard the term "Drone" you assumed it meant either a male bee or one of those boring meetings where someone 'drones on' and puts you to sleep. All that has changed during the last decade; drones are now becoming main stream with increased use by both civilian and government agencies. Drones, also known as unmanned aerial vehicles (UAVs) or unmanned aircraft systems (UAS) are aircraft which fly without a pilot on board.

The Friends of the Benton County Sheriff's Office, a nonprofit 501c (3) is establishing a drive to raise funds to help obtain a professional drone for our Sheriff's Office use. We believe having a professional drone in Benton County would greatly help facilitate law enforcement efforts.

Benton County has an area of 753 square miles and a resident population of about 19,000. During tourist seasons the population swells to over 40,000, with no corresponding change in the number of law enforcement. A drone would be a force multiplier for our first responders.

An unmanned drone equipped with a thermal camera can see through darkness, smoke, fog and forest. Aerial data can help direct resources to where they're needed most, and can help protect first responders and emergency personnel by giving them information on the nature of the scene they're entering, so they can avoid risks and keep themselves from harm.

Finding lost children and those with failing memory who have walked off, locating armed shooters, all have occurred in Benton County and most certainly will occur again. By covering large areas in a short period of time, a drone can help save a life by locating a person much more quickly than could be accomplished on foot, so they can get the medical care they need. The drone would provide information by locating those with unlawful intent and anyone "hiding out" in an arrest situation and prevent an ambush on our officers. Drones can provide important information during traffic accidents by visualizing the magnitude of the accident.

The DJI Matrice 200 Drone needed for the Sheriff's Office is no toy. Total package costs include a Zenmuse XT2 thermal in-

tegrated camera with zoom, 12 battery packs for extended use, extra propellers, remote control, viewing screen, charger and the protective case totaling over \$19,000.00.

So the "Dollars for Drones" fundraising efforts are kicking off. We will be having a raffle to raise Dollars for Drones by raffling off (what else?) a drone. We will be selling tickets at the Cole Camp Fair Saturday, September 8, again at our Community Appreciation Day on Sunday, September 30 and at Heritage Days in October. Each event will have its own drone as a prize. Donations can be made on our Facebook page as well at Friends of the Benton County Sheriff's Office.

There will be a live demonstration of the professional drone Thursday, September 13th by Unmanned Vehicle Technologies out of Fayetteville Arkansas at the Warsaw Lincoln Ambulance Bay Meeting Room, 1206 Medic Drive in Warsaw at 5:30 PM. The public is invited to attend. A General Meeting of the Friends of the Benton County Sheriff's Office will follow.
