Warsaw Sets Hearing Date For Revocations

In late session Monday evening Aug. 20, Warsaw Alderpersons set a 5:45 PM Tuesday September 4 hearing date, for revoking City Business Licenses for non-payment. City Clerk Jessi Kendall said there are presently about 25 businesses with unpaid licenses.

The meeting opened at 6 PM, with Alderpersons Lou Breshears, Eric Flores, Adam Howe, Eric Masoner, Dave Williams, Terry Marshall Sr. present. Mayor Eddie Simons was absent, and Alderman Flores served as pro tem. City Clerk Kendall recorded. First business conducted was to approve a revised agenda, and minutes of Aug. 6 regular and executive sessions, then authorize payment of bills presented.

Visitor Mac Vorce, Executive Director, Warsaw Area Chamber of Commerce, proposed slight modification of the upcoming Heritage Days format, to allow for a hunting and fishing venue in the Drake Harbor area, in a newly designated See WARSAW Page 7

The Warsaw Fire Protection District (FPD) recently purchased a new Peterbilt fire truck that far outshines

and replaces the Department's 1967 model that has served the District for about 50 years. The new glossy red model is 10 feet tall and 29 feet long, compared to the old truck that is about seven and a half feet tall and 22 feet long. The new vehicle has the ability to

pump 1,250 gallons of water per minute, compared to 750 GPM in the old truck, and firefighters can now sit on air ride seats in the cabin with power steering and air conditioning. They will be more comfortable than they were while riding on a bench seat without modern

equipment. Oh! The back of the new truck sports an eyecatching picture of the Warsaw High School Wildcat. "The truck is a 2014

model that was built from scratch and purchased at Fire Master Fire Equipment, Inc. in Springfield," See TRUCK Page 7

No-Change Tax Ordinance For Cole Camp

In mid-session Thursday eve, Cole Camp City Clerk Ruth Eckhoff announced that the City has finally reached its target goal of 200 natural gas customers, actually numbering 202 as of October 17, which will henceforth require Summit Natural Gas of Missouri, serving Cole Camp, to periodically remit five percent of gas sales dollars as a franchise fee to the City, beginning Feb. 15. She had no figure on actual income to be generated for the City but, in view of its tight budget, any extra income will help.

The Board opened its meeting at 7 PM Oct. 17, with Alderpersons Philip Luetjen, Cristin Fox, Cheryl Petersen present. Alderman David Locke was absent. 

THE BENTON COUNTY, MO COMMUNITY EMERGENCY RESPONSE TEAM (CERT) classes have been scheduled for Benton County in Warsaw, MO. All classes will be held at the Warsaw/Lincoln Ambulance conference room at 1206 Medic Dr. Warsaw. The C.E.R.T. classes will educate individuals about disaster preparedness, about hazards that can impact the immediate areas involved in the disaster and provide training in proper basic disaster response skills. These skills will involve fire safety techniques, light search and rescue techniques, team organization, disaster medical operations, life saving skills with an emphasis on decision making processes, rescuer safety, what to expect in terms of immediate services and how to do the greatest good for the greatest number of people. All classes will be held in the evenings at 5:30 PM to 8:30 PM to enable those citizens who cannot attend day classes an opportunity to be a part of this vital community service team. There will be no charge for the classes.

The C.E.R.T. Classes will be held on three consecutive Mondays and three consecutive Thursdays. September 10th - Disaster Preparedness, Personal Protective Equipment & C.E.R.T. Organization; Sept. 13th - Fire Safety and Search & Rescue; Sept. 17th - Medical Part I & 2; Sept, 20th - Disaster Psychology & Terrorism; Sept. 24th -Hands on Demonstrations and Practice; Sept. 27th Communications Training & Course Review. Oct. 2nd - Final Testing & Full Disaster Simulation. Since different phases of the program are covered in each session, it is necessary to attend all the classes for a total of 20 hours. (Continued from Page 1) said Rob Lane, Chief of the Warsaw FPD. "The truck sat on the lot until we bought it, so it is in brand new condition. The purchase price was a good deal at \$245,000. We had been putting money aside for a new truck for a while and were able to buy it outright without having to ask for additional taxpayer money."

The new model has ladders, on the side, and hoses on top. Some firefighting equipment will also be moved from the old truck to the new one. The truck is a 2,000 gallon pumper tanker. It can be used as a pump tank or as a tanker that shuttles water from wherever it can get it during a response to a fire.

"We find water to fill the tanker in whatever location we can, including swimming pools with owner permissions," said Lane.

The old WFPD fire truck had a front mounted pump, and was jointly owned by the rural fire department and the City of Warsaw. It is being sent to the Central Polk County Fire Department in Missouri.

There are 24 members of the all-volunteer WFPD. One is a certified EMT and another is in EMT training. The department is not required to have EMTs, since an ambulance often accompanies fire trucks to their calls, but in the event that an ambulance is unavailable, medical help is still available. Members train two times a month on such things as basic fire fighting, extraction, rescue, and they practice pumping and doing water shuttles.

The WFPD has responded to two major, news-making fires in recent history including the arson fire at the American Legion Hall on August 11, 2017, and one at The Landing, Restaurant and Boutique, in August of 2016, thought to have been caused by an electrical short. The Department has also recently performed a vehicle extraction and had to rescue a gentleman who fell between buildings.

"However, we haven't rescued any cats from trees," said Lane. "Have vou ever seen a cat skeleton in a tree?"

(Continued from Page 1) didn't regain her confidence and feel safe until she was accepted into Place at the Lake, Benton County's domestic and sexual violence resource center.

Anna said that when she was taken into Place at the Lake (PALS) several months ago, she was emotional, crying and hysterical, but the Lord told her to call their hotline and there was a room for her that had just opened up. After only a short period of time, her seizures came down, as well as stress and medicines. She said that it is a Christian-based shelter which is awesome, and the place is beautiful with fantastic support from the staff. She has been put in charge of organizing the PALS fundraiser that is coming up August 24-25, and it has boosted her confidence tremendously.

"I was told by my abusive husband that if I left him, or went to a domestic violence shelter, I would be arrested and jailed as he didn't file the immigration papers," said Anna. "He said that I was illegal. I believed this, so felt trapped and had no one to turn to. I was totally alone. But what he told me is not true. I want other women who are being held against their will, because they were deceived & brought here from abroad to be abused, robbed or used for sex trafficking to know that there is a special section in immigration for victims of domestic abuse and entrapment. You can go to any shelter in America! They can and will help you, give you a safe place to stay, and find you an attorney to take your case. Often, many work for free on cases for victims

of entrapment & domestic abuse of immigrants. So, please don't think you are trapped forever like I did. Call the hotline for domestic abuse. Walk in to your nearest police station or stop a police car if you have to. Even the police will help. You have the same rights as any other victim to be protected and kept safe from your abuser! Without Place at the Lake and another shelter I went to, I would never have known that most shelters don't even know about U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services (uscis.gov) that spells out the rights of people like me. I only learned about this from an attorney.

Anna is trying to give back to the shelter by volunteering every day in its PALS Treasures Thrift Store at 201 E. Main Street in Lincoln. She also talks to other victims who come to the shelter to give them hope that they will survive their past abuse. She has moved out of the shelter and is being helped by a partner while she works with a legal advisor on her immigration status. She is presently not able to get a job or benefits because of the lack of the green card, but is going through the immigration process that may take as long as two years.

Place at the Lake is a faith-based, non-profit organization that provides shelter, education, advocacy and empowerment so domestic and sexual violence survivors can affect positive change. The victims who seek help from the shelter can suffer from sexual violence; physical, psychological, emotional, verbal and economic abuse. PALS provides education, legal and medical resources, hospital advocacy and helps victims with employment searches, resume building, furnishings and clothing, life skills classes and emergency shelter. But most of all, the shelter and its staff provide love and encouragement to

rebuild self-confidence. The all-volunteer center began organizing in 2006 by a group of ladies who said that domestic violence was terrible and decided to do something about it. PALS Treasures, the group's thrift store, opened in 2008 and is one of the only stores that receives and sells used furniture. The shelter opened in 2012 and can house up to nine people (a combination of adults and children). The shelter often houses victims who are on the run from abusers in other parts of Missouri and other locations. It helps men, women and children of all ages, and teens who report sexual abuse can be referred to helpful resources.

"There are more women than men who request help," said Judy Cline, President and shelter manager. "That is probably because men are less likely to report abuse. Men seem to suffer more from financial and emotional abuse."

Although PALS is generously supported by local businesses, churches and individuals, its financial needs are substantial in order to maintain the shelter facilities. A fundraiser entitled PALS Thrift Store Outdoor Flea Market and Fun Day is planned for August 24-25 from 9 AM to 4PM to help with expenses at the shelter. It will be held in the parking lot at the thrift store and there will be hamburgers and hot dogs, a bake sale, and an auction of items donated by local businesses on Saturday at 1:30 PM. There will also be children's activities including animal balloons and face painting. A ten-foot vendor booth is \$20 and an eight-foot table can be rented for an extra \$10. Vendor and attendee information can be obtained by calling 240-210-3740.

"We always need volunteers at the store, on the Board of Directors and those qualified to work with clients," said Donna Harms, Vice-President. "We especially have the need for organizations to plan and hold fundraisers for us. Many of our volunteers are advanced in age and need help with this extra responsibility."

(Continued from Page 1) spot. The group agreed. Vorce also mentioned that Warsaw recently received an award for its work in trails improvement.

Under new business, the group approved an ordinance providing "common sense" guidance for employee personal cell phone use at work; also approved an ordinance wherein the City will enter into a contract with City Attorney Cale Haddock for services outside presently contracted attorney services. The matter involves a \$50,000 USDA grant for the City's Main Street project.

Alderpersons also authorized the Mayor to execute an agreement with the Missouri Highways sand Transportation Commission, in connection with a Traffic Engineering Assistance Program, with \$8,000 federal and \$2,000 City money involved. That project will be budgeted for a 2019 project. And lastly, the group approved an ordinance authorizing the Mayor to obtain what is expected to be a short term loan relating to costs of constructing an eight-unit hanger at Warsaw's Municipal airport, initially approved Aug. 6. Grant funds are expected to pay off that loan before long.

City Planner Randy Pogue informed the group that several architectural firms will soon receive RFQs related to construction needed at the former UMB Bank on Main St., to be eventually occupied as City offices. He also updated the group on a TAP grant project which will see sidewalks, curbs, gutters, etc., constructed between Cosmic Coffee and Cow Patties, on Main St.

Pogue then mentioned that Proposition D, a state fuel tax increase idea, will be on the November ballot and, if passed by citizens, the City stands to receive more than \$33,000 as its share, and Benton County might receive as much as \$435,000 ... all funds to be put in transportation budgets. He did not comment on the proposal. People Service Sycamore St. Reports from other departments, boards and commissions were received without comment.

The session closed about 6:25 PM, to go into executive session on a real estate matter. The open sessions are usually held at 6 PM, 1st and 3rd Monday eves; visitors are welcome, but check with City offices (Ph: 660-438-5522) for up-todate information.

The Community Emergency Response Team (C.E.R.T.) classes have been scheduled for Benton County in Warsaw, MO. All classes will be held at the Warsaw/Lincoln Ambulance conference room at 1206 Medic Dr. Warsaw. The C.E.R.T. classes will educate individuals about disaster preparedness, about hazards that can impact the immediate areas involved in the disaster and provide training in proper basic disaster response skills. These skills will involve fire safety techniques, light search and rescue techniques, team organization, disaster medical operations, life saving skills with an emphasis on decision making processes, rescuer safety, what to expect in terms of immediate services and how to do the greatest good for the greatest number of people. All classes will be held in the evenings at 5:30 pm to 8:30 pm to enable those citizens who cannot attend day classes an opportunity to be a part of this vital community service team. The classes will be taught by the Samantha Henley, Deputy Director, Benton County, MO Emergency Management with the assistance of Marie Payne-Bowman, C.E.R.T. Coordinator; Christy Barber, Martha Foster, Sal Rios, Jude Kelly, Deputy Sheriff Storm Walker and numerous professional members of the various EMS and medical services in Benton County.

BENTON COUNTY **DEMOCRATIC CLUB**

The Benton County Democratic Club met August 15 at the library in Warsaw. The meeting started before 6 PM with everyone in conversation. There were a record number of attendees so members grabbed chairs out of vehicles so most could sit. At 6 pm we all stood and said the Pledge of Allegiance. While our speaker was getting set up Nicki Goers, chairperson, thanked everyone for the work they had done to defeat Proposition A that was voted down on August 7.

Our speaker, Matt Williams, helped us to understand The Clean Missouri

Amendment 1. On the November 6th ballot it's called Missouri Amendment 1, the Lobbying, Campaign Finance, and Redistricting Initiative (2018). Matt informed us that currently MO law allows elected officials to accept an unlimited amount of lobbyist gifts which include travel, sporting events, rounds of golf, and expensive meals. These hundreds of thousands of dollars lobbyist gifts are often given to influence how a legislator votes. The new law would limit gifts to no more than \$5.00. Also, the law would require legislators and legislative employees to wait at least 2 years after serving in these positions before they could become a paid lobbyist.

The Campaign Finance section forbids the Missouri State Legislature from passing laws allowing for unlimited campaign contributions to candidates for the state legislature. The contribution limits would be \$2,500 for the state senate and \$2,000 for the state house. Other regulations would prohibit using someone else's name to contribute or using methods to hide the identity of the donor.

Redistricting would change how the state sets up its legislative districts. Districts would be more equal in population, promote partisan fairness, make districts more compact, and strive for competitiveness. Gerrymandering or mapping congressional districts to favor one party would not be allowed.

Not mentioned in the title, but a part of the amendment, is a Public Records section. Legislative records and proceedings would be considered public records. Matt explained the amendment possess bipartisan support and encouraged us to vote Yes on Amendment 1 to clean up our state politics so our legislators aren't influenced by lobbyists' gifts or by big money donors, especially hidden donors. Joe Poor, MO State Senate District 28 candidate and Chase Crawford, MO House District 125 candidate were both in attendance. They echoed Matt's drive to pass Amendment 1 and agreed on the importance of making our state politics more open and less influenced by lobbyists and anonymous donors.

In other business, financial contributions to November 6th candidates were determined. Then club members were thanked for their presence and participation with our candidates in numerous events including the State Fair parade, State Fair Democratic booth, and other parades within the 4th US Congressional District. Renee Hoagenson, candidate for US Congress 4th District, led a large Democratic contingent of over 50 people, 4 vehicles and floats in the State Fair parade. We also discussed upcoming events including several parades and Heritage Days. For Heritage Days, we will have a booth with candidate information, signs and handouts.

The next Benton County Democratic Club meeting will be September 16, 6 PM at the Warsaw Library.

Sometimes you just want something creamy and chocolate: which for me is most of the time. Since I am totally immersed in my own personal pity party after being informed that this mono fatigue will last for a lot longer than I had anticipated, I decided to use up my diminished energy to make something chocolate and creamy to help assuage my ongoing crankiness.

The following recipe for a Mocha Marshmallow Mousse fills the bill. It is light and fluffy and the marshmallows (which are a type of meringue) give the mousse structure. I add a little espresso powder to elevate the taste.

3/4 cup milk, whole or 2% 4 cups mini marshmallows 3 ounces bittersweet chocolate, finely chopped

2 teaspoons instant

espresso powder 3/4 cup cold heavy cream (it whips better when cold

chill the bowl and beaters)

1 teaspoon vanilla extract Combine milk, marshmallows, chocolate and espresso powder in a medium sized heavy saucepan; heat over low heat, whisking constantly until marshmallows and chocolate are melted and incorporated. Then set pan in bowl of ice water and let stand, whisking often, until cool and thick, about 15

Meanwhile, combine cream and vanilla and beat with electric mixer until the stiff peak stage. Fold cooled chocolate mix into whipped cream. Ok to leave some streaks so you don't over fold. Spoon into dessert goblets, serve or refrigerate up to one day. (Cover with plastic wrap).

Time To Put Excess Cash To Work?

ing, then okay payment of bills presented. In early session, Girl Scout leader Barbara Donnell thanked the Board for its support of Girl Scouts, then asked for and received approval from the group for a "Haunted Park & Carnival" to be held Saturday Oct. 26, "6:30 PM to ?" at the City's Ezekial Williams Park. She added that the event, held by Girl Scouts from all parts of Benton County, will include games, shows, concessions, a bake sale and souvenirs, and music and dancing for all. Admission is \$1.00, with proceeds going to Girl Scouts and the Park.

Under old business, Mayor Gerald Green reported that the City's Boonslick Library continues to leak in several places, but "There's nothing wrong with the roof or vent turbines. Perhaps the leaks are caused by condensate," yet in reality their cause is "mysterious." The Board's consensus was to find someone who has the knowledge to tell them where the problem lies. Under new business, Alderpersons discussed a possible 2013 budget amendment, with some departmental expenditures under budget, at the nine month mark, and some over, yet overall a "little more than expected," with employee related overbudget items probably accounting for the majority of unforeseen expenses. Total amended 2013 budget, to be soon studied, was expected to be minor. The big issue now is projecting a 2014 budget.

Mayor Gerald Green reported he had made a recent visit to the City sewer plant, and found parts of an access trail muddy. The City has a permit to build a bridge over the muddy part, and should seek cost figures, he thought. Public Works Director Klark Bohling reported he will travel to the Lodge of the Four Seasons, Halloween eve, to receive an award as Water District Manager of the Year. Streets & Parks Supervisor Roy Wagner reported that the roof project at Shelter House No. 1 is done, and he thanked volunteers who helped. He added that he had received several financial donations from area clubs, for renovations of Park shelters, and he noted that they, City Lions Club, American Legion and Cocadamen ... had expressed an interest in adopting several Parks shelters.

The meeting closed about 9:05 PM to go into closed session to discuss matters of litigation, legal action, and/ or communications from the City Attorney as allowed by law. The open sessions are usually held on third Thursday eves; all are welcome.


