Possible Suicide In Warsaw Death

Michael Kephart, a 50-year-old white male, was found dead in the Cedar Gate subdivision near Warsaw on Monday.

According to Benton County Sheriff Eric Knox, Kephart had substance abuse problems and was staying with his mother in Cedar Gate awaiting a court appearance.

"It is a sad situation," said

Knox reported that the Kephart had died from an apparent self-inflicted gunshot to the head

Lincoln Enacts A No-Change Tax Levy For

Preceded by a Tax Levy Public Hearing, which drew no comment from visitors, Lincoln's Board of Alderpersons, in regular session, adopted an ordinance levying an ad valorem property tax for 2018, said to be unchanged from 2017.

The regular meeting opened at 6:05 PM Aug. 13, with Alderpersons Janice Swearngin, Katie Hollis, Glen Nelson, Phil Fisher present. Mayor John King presided; City Clerk Ruth Eckhoff recorded. First business conducted was approval of the evening's agenda and minutes of the July meeting, then agreement to pay bills presented.

Visitor Charles Sassman, speaking for a group of the City's residents living in one neighborhood, spoke about property maintenance problems including, in one instance, a person parking in front of a mailbox, which caused a postal employee to decline delivery of mail to that box. Work has begun at the Warsaw Cemetery to repair and restore the tombstones which were vandalized this spring.

According to City Clerk Jessie Kendall, several stones were uprighted then sealed on Monday. Wommack Monument Company from Bolivar did the work with assistance from the Warsaw City crew.

We will keep on repairing the stones until they all are back," said Kendall. "We don't want the stones to disappear."

Some of the stones were broken, so those will need more extensive repair. All the work is being paid for through donations.



CARDINALS SWEEP **ROYALS**

Get the broom out. The St.Louis Cardinals swept the Kansas City Royals in three games 7-0, 8-3, 8-2 in Kansas City over the weekend.

The three games weren't' even close. K.C. did beat St. Louis two games to one earlier in the season in St. Louis. The Cardinals had six players on the DL at the time.

Dockery will have the position as the Chairman of the Osage Trails District Eagle Advancement. His job will be to review Eagle Scout projects. He will also be the Boy Scout Charter organization representative from the Lions Club.

During July and August, matching funds grant checks for rural fire departments are being distributed by the Missouri Department of Conservation, Forestry Division staff. One hundred seventy-four (174) fire departments are receiving checks for up to \$4,000 to help with the purchase of personal protective gear, communications equipment and wildfire suppression equipment to help increase the fire departments capacity to suppress wildfires safely and efficiently. The total funding awarded to Missouri fire departments through the matching funds grant program this

year is \$389,603.56. Fire departments are required to match 50% of the funds which are provided by the Missouri Department of Conservation and the US Forest Service, Volunteer Fire Assistance Program. Throughout the last 30 years, over \$8 million has been distributed to rural fire departments to help them increase the safety of their firefighters and provide them with better firefighting equipment.



Students are taught everything from manners volunteering in the community, giving back to the community, they are taught to deal with daily stress and use their time wisely. Keeping hands busy!

There are 20 locations in Missouri including centralized programs in Columbia, Kansas City, Mashall, Springfield, St. James and St. Louis.

Children are given a quilt when they arrive and that quilt stays with them until they are released. The quilts are so important because it is something of value that belongs to them along with other things they might have brought with them like a broken toy or pieces of paper that are important to them. The quilter's will discuss at out next meeting, September 12, on other areas we might help this organization.



I think it is really important to get kids interested and involved in our outdoor world and nature. The very future of our natural resources lie with them.

Now is a perfect time to get kids outside and introduce them to nature. Butterflies, moths and caterpillars are out in great numbers and are the perfect way to spike children's curiosity about our environment and nature. For example, our grandkids spend lots of enjoyable time outside collecting caterpillars and using their butterfly nets to stalk and capture a variety of butterflies and moths.

There are over 180,000 species of butterflies and moths worldwide, found on all continents except Antarctica. Butterflies and moths belong to the order Lepidoptera, from the Greek lepis "scale" and petron "wing". Butterfly wings, which are transparent, are made up of chitin, the same protein as exoskeletons of crustaceans, which make them related to crabs and lobsters. These wings are covered with tiny overlapping scales that resemble shingles on a roof. These scales, of which there are about 125,000 per inch, reflect light.

Butterflies and moths range in all colors and sizes, with wing size of less than 1/2 inch to over twelve inches. Weighing only as much as two rose petals, they are capable of flying thousands of miles at speeds up to five miles per hour.

A butterfly's life cycle is one of complete metamorphosis. Four distinct stages: ovum (egg), larva (worm or caterpillar), pupa (chrysalis) and adult. The larva is the only stage in which growth occurs. Ovum, pupa, and adults do not grow. Little butterflies do not grow into big butterflies.

Many species of butterflies and moths live only a few days to a few weeks. Some species of adults actually lack mouth parts and cannot eat. Their goal is to mate, lay eggs and continue the cycle. Some of the species that over winter, the monarch and morning cloaks for example, live as long as nine months.

Butterflies and moths, especially in the caterpillar stage, are enormously important to terrestrial food webs. Ninety-six percent of all bird species depend on insects to feed their young.

After collecting caterpillars or butterflies and moths (which with a little patience can be done with little or no damage) it is very rewarding when our grandkids ask Granny or Grandpa to please get the butterfly or caterpillar books so we can try to identify what species they captured.

Go buy or make a butterfly net, get a couple of reference books, take your children or grandkids outside and introduce them to nature. Help instill in them the wonders and importance of our natural environments. It will depend on this generation of children to ensure that future generations have the opportunity to enjoy our native flora and fauna.

MISSOURI DEPARTMENT OF CONSERVATION

The Missouri Department of Conservation (MDC) reminds hunters that migratory bird hunting starts Sept. 1 with the opening day for dove, snipe, and rail, followed by waterfowl hunting with teal season starting Sept. 8.

Mourning doves, Eurasian collared doves, and white-winged doves may be taken from Sept. 1 through Nov. 29 from one half hour before sunrise to sunset with a combined daily limit of 15 and a combined possession limit of 45 for all species. MDC provides numerous conservation areas around the state for dove hunting, including many planted with crops of sunflower, corn, millet, wheat, and buckwheat to attract the popular game birds. Find conservation areas for dove hunting and dove-field maps online at nature.mdc.mo.gov/discover-nature/places/dove-

Wilson's snipe (common snipe) may be taken from Sept. 1 through Dec. 16 from one half hour before sunrise to sunset with a daily limit of 8 and a possession

Sora and Virginia rail may be taken from Sept. 1 through Nov. 9 from one half hour before sunrise to sunset with a combined daily limit of 25 and a combined possession limit of 75 for both species.

Blue-winged, greenwinged, and cinnamon teal season runs Sept. 8 - 23 from sunrise to sunset with a combined daily limit of 6 and a combined possession limit of 18 for all species.

American woodcock season runs Oct. 15 through Nov. 28 from one half hour before sunrise to sunset with a daily limit of 3 and a possession limit of 9.

Duck and coot season is divided by three geographic zones with hunting allowed one-half hour before sunrise to sunset. The North Zone season runs Nov. 3 through Jan. 1, 2019; the Middle Zone Nov. 3 through 9 and Nov. 15 through Jan. 6, 2019; and the South Zone: Nov. 22 through 25 and Dec. 3 through Jan. 27, 2019. The daily bag limit for ducks is 6 and the possession limit is 18 with daily bag limit species restrictions of: 4 mallards (no more than 2 females), 3 scaup, 3 wood ducks, 2 redheads, 2 hooded mergansers, 2 pintails (new limit), 2 canvasbacks, 2 black ducks, and 1 mottled duck. Coot limits are 15 daily and 45 in possession.

Waterfowl youth hunting days for those 15 years of age or younger are Oct. 20 and 21 in the North Zone and Middle Zone, and Nov. 17 and 18 in the South Zone.

Canada goose and Brant goose season runs from onehalf hour before sunrise to sunset Oct. 6-14 and Nov. 11 – Feb. 6, 2019, with a daily limit of 3 for both species combined and a possession limit of 9.

Snow goose and Ross's goose season runs one-half hour before sunrise to sunset Nov. 11 through Feb. 6, 2019, with a limit of 20 blue, snow, or Ross's geese daily and no possession limit. White-fronted goose sea-

son runs one-half hour before sunrise to sunset Nov. 11 through Feb. 6, 2019, with a daily limit of 2 daily and a possession limit of 6.

Light Goose Conservation Order runs one-half hour before sunrise to onehalf hour after sunset Feb. 7 through April 30, 2019, with no daily or possession

Get more information on related regulations, seasons, species, permits, limits, and more from MDC's "Migratory Bird and Waterfowl Hunting Digest 2018-2019," available where hunting permits are sold.

Get hunting details by species from the MDC website at huntfish.mdc. mo.gov/.

Buy hunting permits from numerous vendors around the state, online at mdc.mo.gov/buypermits, or through MDC's free MO Hunting mobile app, available for download through Google Play for Android devices or the App Store for Apple devices.

The Missouri Department of Conservation (MDC) will host a free Discover-Nature Youth Dove Hunting Clinic 5 p.m. until dark on Sunday, Aug. 26, at the Golden Valley Shooting Range near Clinton. This event is open for youths ages 11-15. Youths who participate in the clinic will also get a chance to hunt doves with MDC staff or volunteer guides at a site in the Clinton area on Sept. 1 and Sept. 2.

This program is an excellent opportunity for youths interested in hunting to get expert training in basic dove hunting skills and firearms safety. MDC will provide shotguns and shells, or youths can bring their own shotgun. The clinic will include instruction on dove ecology, conservation, hunting tips, firearms safety, and hunting regulations.

Advance registration is required. Youths must be accompanied by an adult. They must attend the clinic to participate in the dove hunts. Directions to the hunting site will be provided at the clinic.

How Can You Help Your **Kids Pay for College?**

It's still summer, but we're getting close to a new school year. One day, though, "back-to-school" will mean "off to college" for your children. Will you be financially prepared to help your kids cope with the costs of higher education?

Your first step, of course, is to know what you're up against, so here are some numbers: For the 2017-18 academic year, college costs (tuition, fees, room and board) were, on average, nearly \$21,000 for in-state students at fouryear, public schools and nearly \$47,000 for students attending private colleges or universities, according to the College Board. And you can probably expect even bigger price tags in the years to come.

To help prepare for these costs, you might want to consider putting your money in a vehicle specifically designed to help build assets for college, such as a 529 education savings plan. All withdrawals from 529 plans are free from federal income taxes as long as the beneficiary you've named uses the money for qualified college, trade school or graduate school expenses. Withdrawals for expenses other than qualified education expenditures may be subject to federal, state and penalty taxes on the earnings portion of your plan. (However, tax issues for 529 savings plans can be complex, so please consult your tax advisor before

investing.) You can generally invest in the 529 savings plan offered by any state, but if you invest in your own state's plan, you may be able to claim a tax deduction or

receive a tax credit. By starting your 529 plan early, when your children are just a few years old, the investments within the plan have more time for potential growth. Plus, you can make smaller contributions each year, rather than come up

with big lump sums later on. A 529 plan is not the only education-savings tool you can use, but it has proven effective for many people. Yet you may also want to consider ways to keep college costs down in the

first place. For one thing, your children may be eligible for various forms of financial aid. Some types of aid depend on your family's income, but others, such as merit-based scholarships, are open to everyone. But you don't have to wait until you get an offer from a school's financial aid office you can explore some opportunities on your own. For example, many local and national civic and religious groups offer scholarships to promising young people,

and your own employer



types of grants or assistance. Plus, your state also may offer other benefits, such as financial aid or scholarship funds. It can certainly take some digging to find these funding sources, but the effort can be worthwhile.

Here's another option for reducing college costs: Consider sending your child to a local community college for two years to get many of the "general" requirements out of the way before transferring to a four-year school for a bachelor's degree. Community colleges are typically quite affordable, and many of them offer high-quality programs.

A college degree is costly, but many people feel it's still a great investment in their children's future. And by taking the appropriate steps, you can help launch that investment.

pasta, toss to coat and add


Spaghetti, 12-16 ounces Parmesan to taste

*You can keep parsley fresh for a long time by cutting off about 1/3 inch of the bottom of the stems, place in a jar with cool water, cover top with plastic bag. I use a plastic quart soup container with a top, it works really well.

**Yes, anchovies. They are a terrific flavor enhancer and you won't taste anything 'fishy'. They are packed in either oil or salt, if using salted ones, rinse before using. And if you think you don't like anchovies but you do like Worcestershire sauce, check the label; it is fermented anchovies.




