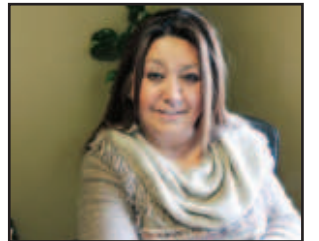
There are success stories regarding the adoption of some

Chamber Is On The Move With New Office Location

The Chamber of Commerce office has moved from their location next to the Enterprise to the office at the front of the Warsaw Community Building. The Warsaw City office has moved to the basement of the Community Building.

"We think this is an excel-

lent spot for the Chamber since all the other offices are there," Warsaw Chamber Director Mac Vorce said. "We will be able to communicate quickly without the need for setting up a meeting."

Vorce also commented that the Community Building office would serve the Chamber well as people coming to events would be able to pick up flyers and other information to keep them up to date on Chamber

events. "The Community Building is centrally located so everyone will have easy access to finding out what is going on with the Chamber," Vorce said.

The City of Warsaw donated the space to the Chamber so that is also a savings on rent previously paid for office space.

Despite Rural Population Trend Benton County Holds Steady

RURAL POPULATIONS across the country have been shedding population at an unprecedented rate. However, population growth in Benton County has held steady due to its desirable geographic location on Truman Lake and Lake of the Ozarks.

USDA reported in the 2017 edition of Rural America at a Glance, that: "Overall, the rural population is shrinking for the first time on record, due to several factors, including long-term outmigration of young adults, fewer births, increased mortality among working-age adults, and an aging population."

America's land area is 72 percent rural with 46 million residents, down from 46.2 million in 2015.

Numbers matter. Based on official U.S. Census data collected every ten years, the federal government allocates approximately \$650 billion per year in funding, grants and other support to states and counties for schools, hospitals, roads, and public works programs.

Missouri's Budget and Planning Division of the Office of Administration (MOA) uses the same U.S. Census data to make

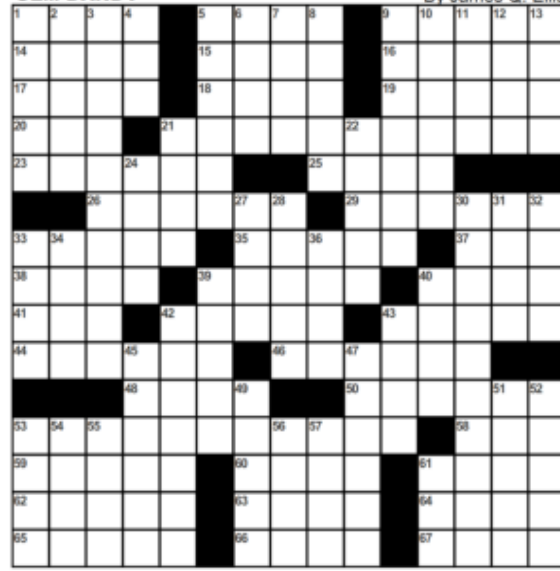

Warsaw R-IX January Board Meeting News

The Warsaw R-IX Board of Education met in regular session on the evening of Monday, January 22, 2018. The meeting was called to order by President Tracey Spry at 6:00 p.m.

The first action of the board was to approve the Consent Agenda, which included approval of minutes from the previous meeting, finance report, bills for payment and approval to transfer funds.

Following approval of the agenda, Dr. Shawn Poyser, Superintendent and Mr. Randy Luebbert, WHS Principal, recognized WHS Art Teacher, Mrs. Jenny Greene for receiving the "Outstanding Area Teacher Award" from the American Legion. Mr. Luebbert informed the board of Mrs. Greene's dedicated oversight and planning of the Veteran's Day Assembly. "The Veteran's Day Assembly is a highlight every year for our staff and students alike" said Luebbert. "Mrs. Greene does a wonderful job in planning and organizing this event each year and also does an outstanding job as WHS Art Instructor."

In the lone agenda item under Old Business, the board approved a Surplus Property bid for (2) ten foot and one (5) foot countertop which had been declared Surplus Property in the December Board Meeting.

Under New Business, the board moved to declare two busses (19) passenger and (65) passenger as Surplus Property.

Next, the board certified the board candidates who have filed for the April 3 election. The candidates are Michael Schockmann and incumbents Rickie Caswell and Brandy Fajen.

Following, Dr. Poyser discussed with the board, information to consider re-

garding the District Unused Sick Leave Policy. Poyser informed the board that they may want to revisit the current leave reimbursal policy for employees hired after January 2018. Any changes to the policy would not affect current employees.

Next, Dr. Jim Hinson, Ed. Counsel presented to the board information pertaining to a potential Early Separation Incentive Plan for Certified Faculty eligible for retirement. The board asked questions of Dr. Hinson, but took no action at this time.

Under Items for Information, Mr. Randy Luebbert, WHS Principal informed the board of recent accomplishments of WHS students including; Academic Team, Speech Team, Wrestling and Basketball. Next, Dr. Shawn Poyser, Superintendent of Schools, updated the board on the recent Faculty/Staff Survey results regarding a potential Four-Day Week Calendar for 2018-19. "I would like to thank everyone for their input regarding the 4-Day Week Schedule," said Dr. Poyser. "We had 105 certified responses (out of 113). 93.3% of the responses were in favor of the 4-Day Schedule. Roughly, 80% were strongly in favor of the proposal. We had 91 classified responses. 83 of the 91 were in favor of a 4-Day Week (91.2%). Again, roughly 80% were strongly in favor of the 4-Day Week. Out of 196 responses, 92% of our employees were in favor of the 4-Day Week. Obviously, that is an overwhelmingly positive response. So where do we go from here? We will be setting up a community night or two with information about a 4-Day Schedule. I will also be asking superintendents, and possibly parents and board members from districts who are currently using the 4-Day Week. I think it is important for our community, but particularly our parents, to ask questions and/or re-

ceive information. After we provide information in person and hopefully online as well we will conduct a parent survey. Once the data is reviewed from our staff surveys and other surveys we can make a decision on a 4-Day Week Calendar, which would likely take place at the March board meeting."

With no further business to discuss, the meeting adjourned at 7:30 pm.

In a much anticipated rematch of long time Benton County rivals, the Warsaw Wildcats defeated the Lincoln Cardinals 66-61 in boys basketball action on Monday night, January 23.

of these animals. Lauren Refett of Warsaw, rescued an abandoned dog after her friend reported on Face Book that it was going to be euthanized. The dog had been dropped off at a business in town by someone who could no longer care for the animal.

"I was told that she is a Mastiff mix," said Refett. "She is a little over a year old now and doing fine. I have named her Mattie, and she gets along with my other dog 'Bella.'"

Cole Camp Chief of Police, Stephen Phillips tries to help with the local problem by manning a small kennel that will house two or three dogs when they are picked up in Cole Camp.

However many animals are not so lucky. A couple recently bought some land in Edwards and lived there, in a trailer, with their children, a mother dog and its pups. Not long afterwards, the family disappeared leaving the trailer and the dogs without notifying anyone. A few volunteers have been trying to feed the puppies, and apparently the mother dog has died. No one has stepped up to adopt the puppies and their future is unknown.

Some of the city's large stray cat populations are fed by volunteers who visit the Truman Dam where many strays live, or they provide food for those hanging around businesses. Other people trap them and take them to a veterinarian to be spayed or neutered. But they are still without homes and subject to becoming prey to other animals.

Janet Perry has spent her life helping owners find lost dogs, and helping dogs that aren't lost find homes. She is the administrator of Angels For Paws Lost and Found. The organization has a Face Book page that helps her with her volunteer work. She and many volunteers recently were instrumental in locating a lost dog named Hank, who belonged to a couple from Texas. The dog had found a temporary home with Kurt and Jeanene Bagley and their 8-year-old son Reed, and often ate "off the land" before the Bagley's found out who it belonged to.

Perry offered some advice about what to do when a stray animal is encountered. 1. Try and contain it and keep it safe by putting it in a kennel or something in your home. 2. Contact your local Face Book and post a picture of the animal to see if it can be identified. 3. Call the Sheriff. 4. Contact the radio station and the Benton County Enterprise. 5. An animal may have a microchip, so the owner can be tracked if the animal is scanned by a veterinarian or pet shop.

However, Perry said to be cautious about people who say they would like to have the animal, because dog fighting rings are sometimes looking for free dogs and may offer to take a stray. (An anonymous dog lover in the county said that some people are looking for dogs to take to Arkansas to be sold for research.) Perry said not to give a complete description of the stray animal, leaving some things out that only the real owner will know about. Another anonymous animal rescue volunteer in the county suggested that a small re-homing fee could be charged for the animal. If a person is not legitimately interested in giving an animal a good home, he or she would probably not want to pay a fee.

Upon finding a stray animal, it is important to know that the Missouri Department of Agriculture requires that a stray animal must be kept for 7 to 10 days before giving it away. For more information from the Animal Health Division, contact them by phone at 573-751-3377.

website reported that the enormous pet homelessness problem in the U.S. continues. The animal rescue organization researched and compiled top facts about this problem, and a few of these follow.

There are roughly 70 million stray cats and dogs living in the U.S. Only about six to eight million of these animals find their way into the nation's 3,500 shelters each year. Only 10 percent of animals entering shelters have been spayed or neutered. According to North Shore Animal League's Spay USA, one un-spayed female dog and her offspring can create 67,000 dogs in six years, and one un-spayed female cat and her offspring can produce 2,072,514 kittens in eight years. Only three to four million cats and dogs are adopted from shelters each year. Nearly half of all animals that arrive in U.S. shelters are euthanized because there is a lack of space and adopters.

Broadway Barks recommends that we say adopt pets from animal shelters or rescue organizations, before considering a pet store. They also recommend that pets be spayed and neutered to ensure they will not reproduce and contribute to the problem. We can also support groups working to solve the animal homelessness problem.

Cindi Zimmerman, who owns a pet sitting business in Warsaw called Elite Pet Care Services, is an animal lover who has been actively trying to find homes for strays that she encounters. She does not take in stray animals, but works with individuals and groups to try and find solutions to the stray problem. She talked to Sheriff Eric Knox about the need for an animal shelter, and he said that if a new jail was built, he would love to eventually get an attached animal shelter where the animals could be taken care of by exceptional inmates. This would be something positive for the inmates to do. Prisons across the U.S. have instituted such programs that have saved money, and benefited the inmates and pets.

Warsaw has not always been without an animal shelter. The last one was disbanded in 2005 while owing money for utilities and vet bills. An organization called "Critters 'N Crisis" formed in 2010 to raise funds for a shelter, but it was unable to reach its goal. Last year, a petition was sent to the Benton County Commissioners requesting the building of a shelter, but the building of a new jail is the priority for now.

Meanwhile, in order to help a lost or found dog, go to www.pawboost.com to list the dog and print a flyer to distribute. Go to www.hsmo.org/adopt/lost-and-found to browse the database of stray and found pets, report a missing pet and find helpful tips to bring a lost animal home. For a local group - Angels For Paws Lost & Found -- go to www.facebook.com. It is a Benton County and surrounding area page that tries to bring awareness of missing, stolen and dumped pets in the local area. But, people can post from anywhere in Missouri. Remember to put where the pet is lost/found on your post.

30-year projections, in 5-year increments, for each of the 114 counties. In addition, information that the Census breaks down by sex, age, race and other factors is used by "planners, designers, policymakers, grant writers, and others interested in Missouri's future population trends."

The Census Bureau does not define "rural," but whatever is not "urban" is rural by default. "Urban" can refer to 'Urban Areas' with populations at or above 50,000; or to 'Urban Clusters' of cities with popula-

tions of at least 2,500 that, combined with adjoining areas, have a total population up to 50,000.

Kristi Pfeleiderer, executive director of Kaysinger Basin Regional Planning Commission, shared information on population changes in Benton County between 2000 and 2010:

- Overall population increased by 1,876 or nearly 11 percent from 17,180 to 19,056.

- New residents, mostly 50+ years old, were among 1,562 who moved to the county but outside the city limits of Cole Camp, Lincoln or Warsaw.

- City of Cole Camp population increased by 93, or 9 percent from 1,028 to 1,121; the highest increase in the 20-50 age group.

- City of Lincoln population increased by 164, or 16 percent, from 1,026 to 1,190; among all age groups.

- City of Warsaw population increased by 57, or 3 percent, from 2,070 to 2,127; the highest increase in the 20-50 age group.

Missouri's formula to project population trends applies the net results of births and deaths, combined with net results of in- and out-migration. Benton County projection for 2020 is 19,934.

Current county population is 18,854 (per DataUSA.io); the next official census will be taken in April 2020. More than 29 percent of Benton County's population today is 65 or older. Young people, under age 18, represent about 17 percent. MOA estimates Benton County population in 2030 will be 20,228, with 48 percent or 9,652 between 65 - 85, or older; 15 percent between 0 - 19 years old.

An uptrend in deaths of working age adults between 25-29, also between 20-24 and 30-54, contributes to population decline nationwide. Although mortality rates declined in rural areas overall, deaths in these age groups increased by 20 percent in 1999-2001 and 2013-2015. USDA attributes the trend to rising prescription drug abuse, especially opioids, and a rise in heroin-overdose deaths.

On a more positive note, an important distinction gives hope to some rural communities. USDA's 2017 report said, "This first-ever period of overall non-metro population loss may be short-lived... especially in tourism and recreation destinations." Missouri's report agreed that its population is shifting to urban areas, and to tourist and recreation destinations in the state.

The description fits Benton County. A growing number of tourists every year come to enjoy the lakes and marinas, the dam and reservoir, fish hatchery, bike and hiking trails, a state park, golf courses and museums. In addition, three active chambers of commerce as well as local organizations sponsor numerous and special events that draw participants from near and far.

"As a rural community, we share the same challenges as other rural communities in Missouri," Randy Pogue, Warsaw city administrator said. "Our benefit is our location in the state and the geographic features we have; our outdoor environment and the many ways to enjoy it is a marketing tool that many rural communities do not have."

Lynette Stokes, executive director of Benton County Tourism and Recreation (BCTR), foresees a bright future. Partnerships with the county, the cities of Cole Camp, Lincoln and Warsaw and the chambers of commerce among other organizations, support BCTR's efforts by contributing funds and resources to promote tourism in the area.

The Missouri Division of Tourism reported a 17 percent growth in tourism-related employment, with

Benton County expenditures reaching nearly \$16.5 million in FY16, a 19 percent increase from FY10. The county commissioners authorized BCTR to manage the annual proceeds from guest tax revenues, \$49,899 collected in 2017, an increase of 16 percent from 2014.

BCTR's 2018 agenda focuses on broader marketing. "We will be sponsoring a major fishing tournament with national media coverage, a media/press tour, "and utilizing publications and other tourism-related organizations that target tourism."

A billboard on Hwy 7 will promote Warsaw events, and billboards on Hwy 65 will promote Lincoln and Cole Camp events. A year-long digital billboard on Hwy 50 (Sedalia) will promote county events and attractions.

"We will increase BCTR's social media presence and target demographics on Google which may not otherwise find us," Stokes added. "We are planning a new marketing video and new marketing brochure, information for the Missouri Life Biking/Trails publication, literature distribution to the major Welcome Centers throughout Missouri, and marketing at out-of-state sports shows, to name a few," she said.

A Social and Economic Profile by University of Missouri Extension estimates 5.8 percent growth in 2020, and 7.3 percent by 2030. MU Community Development Specialist in the Warsaw office, Connie Mefford, works with individuals and organizations in a variety of programs for rural development, including "Economic Development through Tourism."

Amenities that attract tourists should also benefit long-term residents by providing a positive environment for daily living. However, creating only seasonal service jobs that do not pay enough to support a reasonable standard of living is a potential pitfall of tourist-based economies. Rural communities without employment opportunities lose population because young people move to metropolitan areas to find jobs to provide sufficient income for their growing families.

Warsaw's waterfront and harbor contribute to the enjoyment and well-being of residents countywide while providing a pleasant experience for tourists, some of whom decide to move to the county permanently.

Pogue said Warsaw's focus is shifting from waterfront to roadway projects. Trails efforts will continue at a slower pace while focusing more on parking improvements enhance local recreational opportunities. Parts of town are underused for residential development, he said. Improvements already made, and others planned or in the works should assist local realtors and developers to market the area.

"All of Main Street has a great potential for commercial development," Pogue said. "We are at the threshold of attracting new visitors and potential new residents; this will also open up the opportunity for more businesses."

Business license applications are positive indicators, for Cole Camp with 100 licenses issued in 2017, and for Lincoln, where 58 business licenses in 2017 were an increase over the previous year. Most of Warsaw's 313 licenses are held by businesses physically located in the city. Median residential property values rose also, by 5.5 percent.

Efforts to recruit major manufacturers and retailers for creating jobs is important and ongoing. In Warsaw, a new Casey's General Store is under construction at the intersection of Commercial Street and Truman Dam Access Road, a sign that the developers have confidence in

the area's economy, and of job opportunities to come.

Yet, there are additional ways to revitalize a community and its economy that brings together local government and private citizens, including retirees and the unemployed, to work toward a mutual goal. The Environmental Protection Agency's Smart Growth initiative encourages rural communities to follow the example of others of similar size, by taking the following steps:

- Identify and build on existing assets.

- Engage all members of the community to plan the future.

- Take advantage of outside funding.

- Create incentives for redevelopment, and encourage investment in the community.

- Encourage cooperation within the community and across the region.

- Support a clean and healthy environment.

Along with the county's 'existing assets' already mentioned, Cole Camp has a rich and distinctive German heritage to draw on. Additionally, recently it became the first "Monarch City USA" to be designated by the organization established in Maple Valley, WA in 2015 whose motto is: "We help the monarch butterfly recover, city by city. Wings up!" A Monarch Festival at a time in the future would attract swarms of lepidopterists and butterfly enthusiasts to the area.

Lincoln is home to the Mozarkite Society of Lincoln - Rock and Gem Show that held its 58th annual event last September, drawing rock hounds from all over the Midwest. Every year vendors sell or trade their gems, minerals and jewelry, including semi-precious Mozarkite, the Missouri state stone found in abundance in and around Lincoln. Visitors can also go on digs for their own stones at sites nearby.

Events like these, along with Warsaw's Jubilee Days and Heritage Days and many others throughout the county, when advertised on one of the billboards that BCTR plans to set up, will draw even more attention than usual, and bring greater returns to the county and its residents.

Adding variety to the lives of residents, bringing people together for a good cause, and attracting a steady stream of visitors not only boosts tax revenues and the local economy, but keeps Benton County growing and thriving.

in the new office location. The Chamber office is open from 8 AM until 4:30 PM, Monday through Friday.

The Chamber will be hosting the Fishing and Hunting Expo on February 24 from 9 AM until 4 PM in the Community Building.

"We already have over 30 hunting and fishing experts lined up to be on hand in the Community Building for the Expo," said Vorce. "We are expecting a big turnout."

Events will be both inside and outside of the Com-

munity Building. There is even a possibility of boat ride alongs in the Harbor so those selling boats can show off their newest models. The Expo will also feature demonstrations, vendor booths, a silent auction and advice from hunting and fishing professionals.

Next on the agenda for the Chamber will be the Missouri Mountain Bike State Championships to be held in Warsaw at the Truman Lake Mountain Bike Park again on May 19 and 20. This is the largest mountain bike race in Missouri and qualifies bikers to compete in the National Mountain Bike Race held in West Virginia. Local biker Joe Vorce won his division last year and competed in West Virginia.

"With all our trails and gravel roads, Warsaw is the perfect place to live if you are a mountain bike enthusiast," said Mac Vorce. "We have seven adult state champions living in the Warsaw area and the interest is growing."

There are different styles of racing such as short course, which is very intense, cross country and marathon (which involves biking 36 miles). There are also different levels of competition such as Beginner, Intermediate and Expert level. There are also levels for children, Junior Level, 15 through 18 years old and Junior Level, 14 years and under.

Vorce commented that the Missouri Bike Federation now uses Warsaw as an example of a unique place for biking as the USB Route 51 makes plans to make Warsaw part of the route from Bolivar to Sedalia. When this is complete a biker could safely travel from Springfield to Sedalia.

According to Vorce, Bike Packing is a growing national trend that will be important to the Warsaw area. "Warsaw has so many great places for bikers from our numerous campgrounds to all of the convenience stores which makes bike packing easier," Vorce said. "Bikers who are going long distances look for places to spend the night and pick up groceries so Warsaw is a prime location."

Other Chamber events include: The Dam Experience, June 30, on the Truman Dam; Heritage Days, October 20-21; Halloween Hoopla, October 31 and the Warsaw Chamber Christmas Parade, December 8.

I didn't think it was possible to love grandchildren the way I love my children but there are no limits on love. It happened the moment I looked at him. When Daughter #3 called me from California to wish me a happy birthday, I had to laugh. I had forgotten it was my birthday as well as his.

1. Daycare costs for many will see an increase. School is not free daycare, but this is still a valid concern for parents who have accounted for daycare in their budgets.
2. An absence from school during a 4-day week is a larger fraction of the school week that a child will miss.
3. Low-income students generally have fewer learning resources at home and stand to lose disproportionately from the loss of a school day.
4. How much savings would this create and what how will the savings be used? Where are the savings coming from? Are busses still needed for activities on non-school days? Will food service subsidies decrease? Administration costs? Utilities? If teachers are at the school on the "5th day" to work on lesson plans,

was, "When the sign says ooze, you can ooze, when the sign says top, you stop". And promptly gave me a ticket; the rule of law.

Cooking can be creative, fun, and certainly produce delicious results, but you do need to know some rules. For example, knowing the difference between simmer and boil, the difference between stiffly beaten egg whites and soft peaks can totally change any recipe.

My most important cooking rule is to stop and think before I get started. Organize and prepare are the two critical acts in a kitchen, and they happen by thinking first. Ignore them and you have put yourself at risk before you even begin. I was taught that probably 95 percent of kitchen failures can be traced back to a failure to organize and prepare at the outset.

The professional term for organization and preparation is Mise en place (MEEZ ohn plahs). It means everything in its place, on your counter, on the stove, everything you need. So you won't be panicked looking for the cooked chicken (that your significant other decided was lunch) after starting to make a casserole. When I was attending the Cordon Bleu in Paris, we would be sharply rapped on our

hands with a wooden spoon if all was not in place before we started class. And so I taught my students the same (without the wooden spoon!)

The following is certainly easy enough to assemble. It's literally three ingredients and nothing more. It's classic and timeless, can be scaled up or down to feed any number of people, and it's just as good the next day.

Ingredients:

4 chicken thighs (with bone and skin)

1 juicy lemon (I like Meyer, if you can find them)

soy sauce (regular or light or tamari)

Preheat oven to 375°F. Put the chicken skin side up in a baking dish that fits the thighs snugly, like an 8-inch square one. Squeeze half the lemon over the chicken, then splash with just enough soy sauce to moisten, about 1 tablespoon. (If you are a salt fiend, you can sprinkle with a touch of salt at this point). Turn the chicken over with tongs and repeat the lemon and soy procedure. Bake the chicken, skin side down, for 20 minutes then turn the thighs over and continue to bake skin side up until the skin is lacquered golden brown and the meat is tender and opaque at the bone, about 25 minutes more. Serve with pan sauce spooned over.

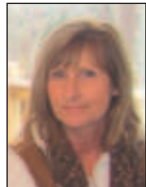

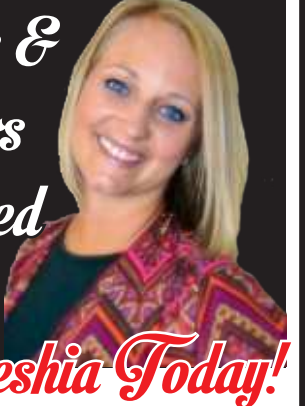

What's the Investment Outlook for 2018?
By most measures, 2017 was a pretty good year for investors. But what can you expect in 2018?

It's difficult to precisely predict the immediate future of the financial markets. However, many signs point to improved global economic growth and rising corporate earnings - both of which are important drivers of stock prices. In the United States, economic growth may be more modest than in other regions, which could result in international stocks outperforming domestic ones.

Here's another consideration: Low interest rates typically benefit the financial markets - and unless inflation jumps sharply, the Federal Reserve will probably remain patient, only raising short-term rates slowly throughout 2018.

Despite these positive signs, there's also reason for caution. Political uncertainty and changes in economic policies may lead to increased market volatility. Another factor is the long-term history of the stock market, which includes a drop of 10% or more - technically called a "correction" - about once a year. We've gone two years since the last correction, so it would not be surprising if we saw one in 2018.

Given this outlook - which could be classified as "moderately optimistic" - what investment moves should you consider this year? Here are a few suggestions:

•Rebalance your portfolio - The market's gains may have increased the value of your stocks so much that they now represent a greater percentage of your portfolio than you had intended - and you may not be comfortable with this increased presence.

So, you may want to rebalance your portfolio to achieve a suitable mix of stocks and bonds, based on your goals, risk tolerance and time horizon. As part of this rebalancing, and in an effort to help reduce the impact of market volatility, you may need to add investment-grade bonds and cash investments. (Of course, bonds carry some risks, too, including interest rate risk and credit risk.) The availability of cash will also make it easier for you to purchase stocks during a market downturn, when prices may be lower.

•Look beyond US. borders

- You may want to consider adding some international equity investments to your portfolio, if appropriate. As mentioned above, these stocks may do better than U.S. stocks in 2018, but regardless of performance, the presence of global stocks can help diversify your portfolio - and diversification can help decrease your overall risk level. (However, diversification can't guarantee profits or protect against all losses.) Keep in mind that international investing carries some inherent risks, such as those related to currency fluctuations and foreign political and economic events.

•Be aware of "big" versus "little" - If you don't own many stocks of smaller companies, you might consider adding them to your portfolio. Smaller U.S. stocks have traditionally outperformed larger ones and may benefit from stronger economic growth and lower corporate tax rates. Be aware though that small company stocks tend to be more volatile than those of larger companies. And as with all stock investments, you may risk losing some or all of your principal.

You may want to consult with a financial professional to determine which of these moves, or any others, are right for you. You can't control the external factors affecting the financial markets, but you can take total charge of your own investment decisions - and in the long run, these decisions can help determine your success as an investor.

Individuals who are 17 years of age in most states (16 with parental consent where allowed by state law), weigh at least 110 pounds and are in generally good health may be eligible to donate blood. High school students and other donors 18 years of age and younger also have to meet certain height and weight requirements.

Blood and platelet donors can save time at their next donation by using RapidPass® to complete their pre-donation reading and health history questionnaire online, on the day of their donation, before arriving at the blood drive. MDC FERAL HOG STRIKE TEAM has tallied up feral hog elimination numbers for 2017. The year yielded a total of 6,567 feral hogs removed by MDC, partner agencies and private landowners.

The Missouri Department of Conservation's (MDC) feral hog strike team has tallied up elimination numbers for 2017. The year yielded a total of 6,567 feral hogs removed by MDC, partner agencies and private landowners. In 2016, 5,358 feral hogs were removed from the landscape.

Crews in southeast Missouri removed 2,858 feral hogs, which is where the highest density of feral hogs occurs. The Ozark region removed 2,576 and the Southwest region removed 932 feral hogs. Other regions across Missouri had around 100 or fewer feral hogs removed.

"We're seeing positive impacts in areas with smaller feral hog populations, such as on the western side of the state," said Mark McLain, MDC's feral hog elimination team leader. "Our overall success for 2017 can be attributed to our strategic approach to eliminating populations of feral hogs."

McLain said it's essential that the public understand why feral hogs must be eliminated.

"These are a destructive, invasive species that doesn't belong here; they're not a native species," McLain said. "They out-compete native wildlife for habitat and food. For example, places with a lot of feral hogs will see their wild turkey and deer population diminish."

McLain said feral hogs present potential for diseases to spread to humans, pets and livestock and that he hopes the message that hunting is not an effective method for eliminating feral hog populations is starting to catch on.

"For over 20 years, unregulated take of feral hogs was allowed in Missouri, during which time our feral hog population expanded from a few counties to over 30 counties," he said.

In 2017, MDC, the Corps of Engineers and the LAD Foundation established regulations against feral hog hunting on lands owned and managed by these three organizations.

"A persistent piece of this story is continued illegal releases of feral hogs, which establishes populations and further spreads the problem," McLain said. "This

is illegal and when caught, those who release feral hogs face hefty fines."

Other attributing factors in the success of the feral hog elimination effort include MDC's "Report, don't shoot" message to encourage trapping, prohibiting the take of feral hogs on conservation areas, and a strong public awareness campaign.

"Landowners and the public are a crucial element of this effort, especially since most land in Missouri is privately owned," McLain said. "We must continue to educate on the dangers of feral hogs and engage landowners in elimination efforts."

McLain said landowners are responding to an increased public education campaign, centered on the knowledge that hunting feral hogs is not an effective way to eliminate them. He said more landowners are starting to understand, and are seeing that hunting feral hogs pushes them onto neighboring property, which causes problems for their neighbors. When neighboring landowners try to control feral hogs through hunting, the hogs simply travel back and forth between the properties, escape and cause more damage. Trapping with no hunting interference is the best method to eliminate them. "They're [landowners]

reporting feral hog signs and coming to us for help, which is exactly what we hoped would happen," he said. "We help by providing technical advice, on-site visits, loaning equipment and training of the trapping and removal process."

Feral hogs are not wildlife and are a serious threat to fish, forests and wildlife as well as agricultural resources. Economic loss estimates from 10 years ago in the U.S. were at greater than \$1.5 billion in damage from feral hogs per year. Since there are more hogs today, this total is likely higher now. Feral hogs damage property, agriculture, and natural resources by their aggressive rooting of soil in addition to their trampling and consumption of crops as part of their daily search for food.

Feral hogs have expanded their range in the U.S. from 17 to 38 states over the past 30 years. Their populations grow rapidly because feral hogs can breed any time of year and produce two litters of one to seven piglets every 12 to 15 months. Feral hogs are also known to carry diseases such as swine brucellosis, pseudorabies, trichinosis and leptospirosis, which are a threat to Missouri agriculture and human health.

She was preceded in death by her parents, her husband, Robert, and three sisters, Delphine, Margie and Gracie.

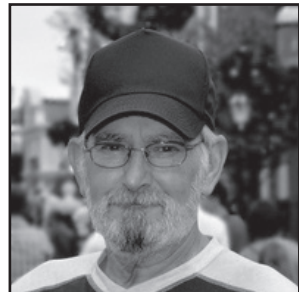

WARREN D. LOVE REPRESENTATIVE

January 25, 2018 Greetings, My Fellow Missourians!

On my way to the Capitol on Monday I stopped by 2 coffee caucuses in Warsaw. The first was at the Boring Rexall Drug Store, and the second was at McDonald's. It's a great way to visit, listen to local concerns, and keep up on community events. Two new construction projects underway are the new American Legion Hall building to replace the structure that had arson fire damage last Spring, and a new Casey's store is going up just north of McDonald's in Warsaw.

Big issues being discussed in committees this week were: expanding broadband, repealing Prevailing Wage, utility rate adjustments, and industrial hemp.

The State of the Judiciary address was delivered by Chief Justice Zel Fischer on Wednesday. He focused

on the opioid crisis and encouraged more funding for treatment. "Drug overdose is the leading cause of accidental death in the United States, with the rate of overdose deaths involving opioids continuing to climb," Fischer reminded lawmakers. "Missouri lost 1,066 people in 2015 and 1,371 people in 2016 to drug overdose. This is a staggering increase in deaths." Fischer mentioned that some people charged with drug or alcohol related crimes, usually first-time offenders, are given the opportunity to work through their issues and addictions rather than just be sentenced to prison through successful treatment courts across the state. Fischer said drug courts are more cost-effective than any other criminal justice strategy to address the growing problem. He pledged to work with lawmakers to help make the treatment courts available in every jurisdiction in the state.

Another event that I attended this week was led by former Lt. Gov. Joe Maxwell. He, along with former Senator Wes Shoemyer, advocate for Family Farm Action, Organizations for Competitive Markets, and Human Society of the United States. Maxwell and Shoemyer paint a picture with a wide brush of doom and gloom for Missouri farmers and rural communities. They are anti Farm Bureau, MO Cattlemen's, MO Pork, MO Corn, MO Soybean, MO Rice and other well-known farm organizations. To hear them tell their story, we have no fair markets for livestock and grains. They try to stir anger and fear in Missouri about foreign ownership of agricultural land. My first year in the legislature, we passed a state statute that drew a line in the sand which capped the allowable acreage for foreign ownership at 1%. Currently, foreign ownership is only .5% of the 1% allowed. I certainly agree that this needs to be continuously tracked and transparent so that it does not exceed the 1% limit. -Just a word of caution to Missourians: Be wary of the so called "Farmers Bill of Rights for Missourians." It sounds good on the surface, but the devil is in the details. I am always willing and available to attend meetings to explain this. It's interesting that the Family Farm Action group chose this name with the same acronym as Future Farmers of America. Don't be deceived.

FARMERS' MARKET MATCHING GRANT PROGRAM:
Missouri is one of the top states for farmers' markets in the nation with nearly 300 farmers' markets that provide venues for agricultural producers to sell their products directly to consumers. The Missouri Department of Agriculture (MDA) has announced the Farmers' Market Promotion Matching Grant Program to support the promotion and advertisement of Missouri's farmers' markets. 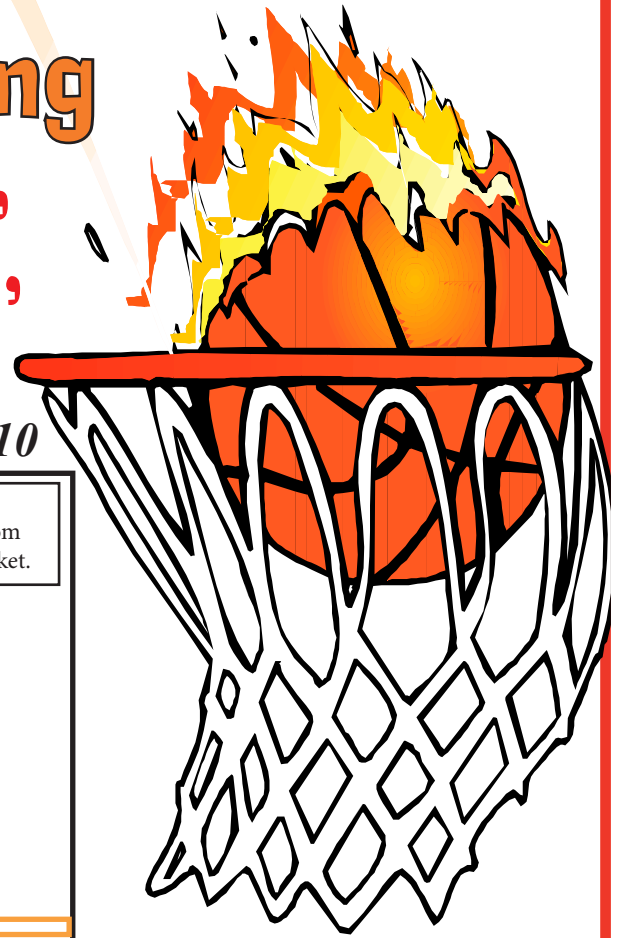

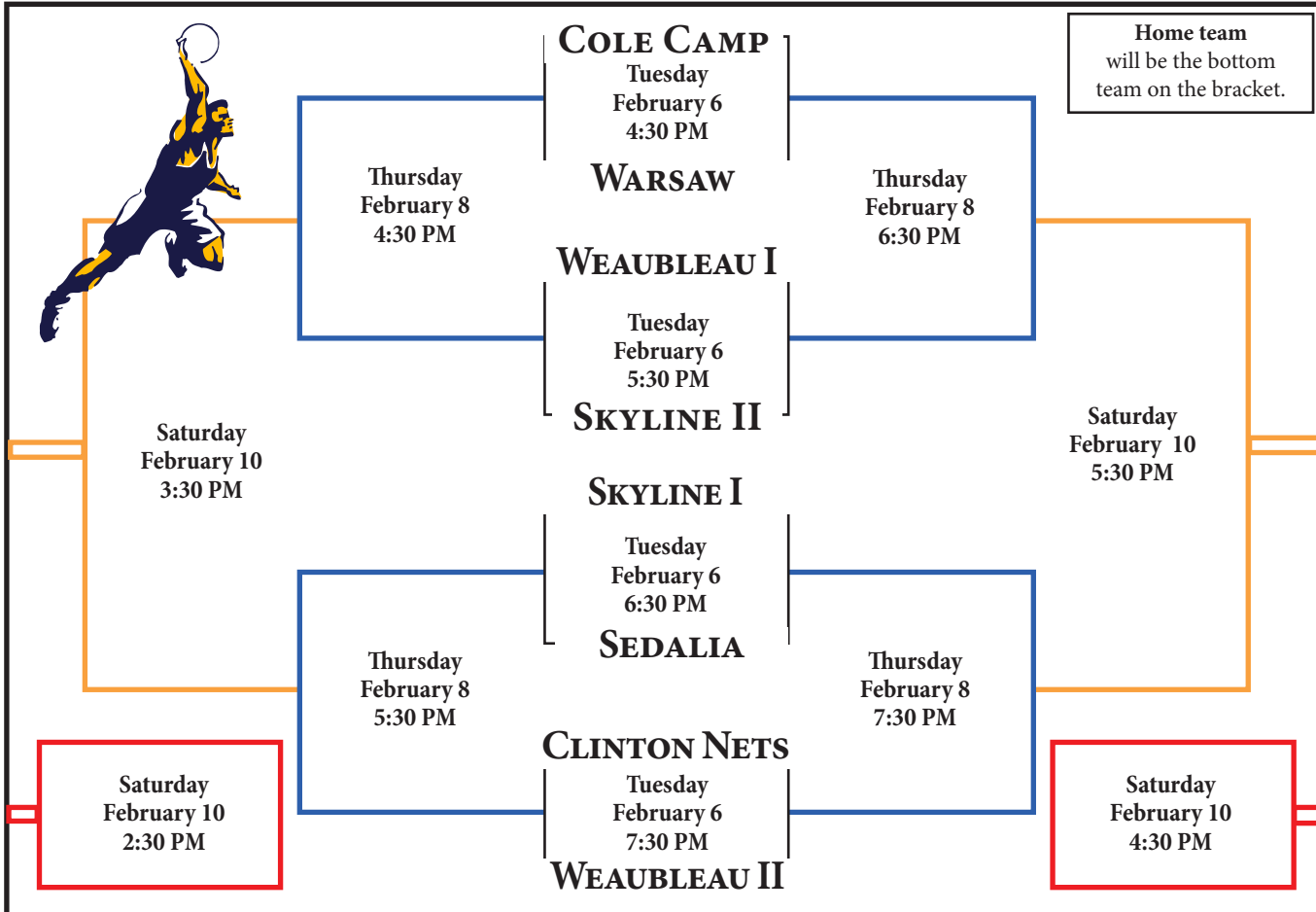

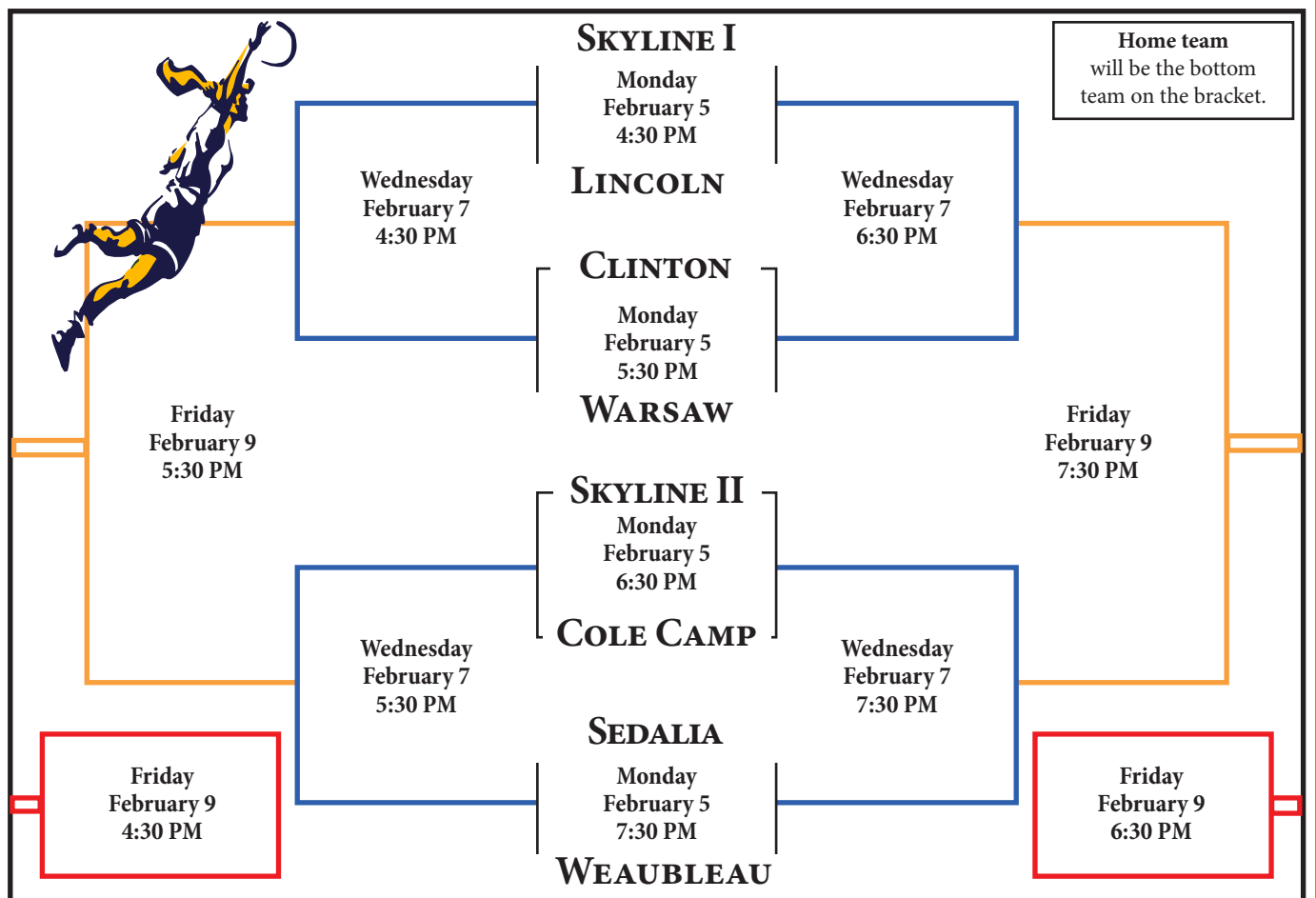
