County Assessor, will mail approximately 12,000 personal property lists to Benton County residents who own taxable personal property as of January 1, 2018, who must furnish the assessor a list by March 1, 2018, to avoid late penalties. Taxable personal property includes vehicles, boats, boat motors, airplanes, travel trailers, mobile homes, livestock, farm machinery, and all licensed trailers. If you have lifetime plates on your vehicle or trailer, you still need to list this.

If you do not receive a list in the mail by January 22, 2018 please call the assessor's office at 438-5473 so that one will be sent to you. Office hours are 8:00 to 12:00 and 1:00 to 4:30.

In addition, the assessor will be at the Cole Camp City office to take lists on the following mornings from 8:30 AM until noon: Fridays, January 5, 12, and 19, 2018.

Conquering The Cold To Get The Job Done

Below freezing temperatures and significant snowfalls kept many people at home on Monday. But, those same conditions also made it necessary for City of Warsaw road crews to arrive at their posts early to begin plowing snow and placing sand and salt on roads to make them safer for drivers.

"Even though it was a holiday, our workers were out at 2 AM on Monday and are to be commended for a job well done," said Doug Hedrick, City employee directing the road crews. Hedrick said that City

trucks are kept in shape, with good maintenance, so they are safe to operate when needed. All of the trucks have heaters, and crews are advised to layer their clothing to help prevent cold stress.

"We take care of all City roads, and our coverage area is increasing with construction of new businesses such as the Casey's that is going up near McDonalds," Hedrick added. "Our road crews have been accident free as they have performed their

Monday was a regular

work day for first responders, including the staff of Warsaw/Lincoln Ambulance Service. Three paramedics and three EMTs staff the station every day, and they are provided winter gear, and heated ambulances for trips they must make in cold weather. Their three ambulances have rear wheel chains that can be dropped onto tires while the vehicle is moving, but if the ambulance skids off the road into a ditch before activating the chains, they won't be deployed.

"Winter weather slows our response time," said Paramedic David Jenkins. "We are just like other vehicles in that we can have mishaps on the road and must drive a little more carefully in bad weather."

"Anything that happens to a person is an emergency to them," commented Jenkins. "But if it is not what an emergency room considers to be a true emergency, the person arriving by ambulance will be sent back home. If all three of our ambulances are called out, the next person needing one may have to wait until one from another district can respond."

Heating Bills Could Go Up, Way Up

Colder than usual temperatures as 2018 begins are an omen of higher bills to come for homes and businesses, specifically, those heated with either propane or natural gas.

Natural gas is a fossil fuel, and propane is a 'green fuel' but both burn clean and are deemed environmentally

friendly. Natural gas is a combination of propane, butane, ethane, and methane gases. Propane is processed with crude oil to separate it from the other components. Therefore, the price of propane that depends on the costs of natural gas and crude oil is usually higher.

In mid-2009, Missouri Gas Utility (MGU) offered customers in Benton County free installation of natural gas service to replace their existing propane tanks and systems. Many accepted based on the expectation of lower monthly bills. However, MGU's plan, certified by the Missouri Public Service Commission (MPSC) in November 2009, was delayed for more than two years.

In March 2012, MGU acquired Southern Missouri Gas Company and changed the business name to Summit Natural Gas of Missouri, Inc. (SNG). The Public Service Commission approved SNG's new See Heating on Page 3

Man Gets Murder Charge In **Brutal Shooting Near Lincoln**



A 2nd DEGREE MURDER CHARGE has been entered against William J. Heffernan in the shooting death of Caleb Shephard on Friday evening.

approximately 9:08 PM, Benton County Central Dispatch was notified of a possible shooting victim at a mobile home park, 19078 Zion Church Rd, just outside the city limits of Lincoln. Deputies arrived on scene and found Caleb L.D. Shephard, 27, outside the residence occupied by William J. Heffernan, 21, with an apparent gunshot wound to the abdomen. Deputies and EMS provided aid on-site before transporting Shephard by ambulance to a predetermined helicopter landing site, where he succumbed to his injuries. After the initial investigation, Heffernan was arrested for the shooting death of Sheph-

William J. Heffernan was charged with MUR-DER 2nd DEGREE, ARMED CRIMINAL ACTION and TAMPER-ING WITH EVIDENCE. A bond of \$100,000 cash or surety was issued. This is an ongoing investiga-

(Continued from Page 1) Chief of Police for Warsaw, said that the department's response time is slower in winter weather. But, as of late Monday morning there had not been any calls.

"Everything has been quiet and calm so far in Warsaw," said Senberg. "But, the Sheriff's office has had to respond to some calls in the county."

Senberg said that police officers are provided with winter coats, hats and gloves to keep them warm during this time of year.

Monday was also a workday for employees of Ozark Disposal who are always concerned about road conditions as they make pickups in Benton and several other adjoining counties.

"Road conditions worry us when there is snow," said Kevin Dockery, owner of Ozark Disposal. "We do many pickups in resort areas where snow plowing is not always done by the City. We also worry about visibility. Usually in bad weather our start up is delayed. On Mondays we begin start ups at 3 AM, but we delayed it until 6 AM this Monday when visibility was better and some roads had been plowed. Our drivers also use their judgment (based on experience) to decide if they should pick up in an area where they might get stuck. We often change our routes during bad weather so that our last scheduled stops are picked up first and our first scheduled stops are left until the end of the route."

Dockery said that safety is the company's biggest issue, so employees are provided with high visibility coats. Since most of them are in and out of their trucks, there is little danger of over exposure to the elements. However, those who have many pickups on a street are asked to take breaks inside the heated trucks before getting too cold.

"We have not had to close our routes this year because of weather," said Dockery. "But we have done so in the past when the snow was deeper and some bags left out for pickup were buried."

The City of Warsaw subcontracts water meter reading and maintenance to People Service. The company was due to read meters on Monday, but was unable to carry out the job because 15 to 20 percent of the meters were covered by ice and snow and could not be found without a metal detector. Company representative, Mark Breshears, said that readings would have to be estimated, or read when the weather warmed up.

"We are big on safety," said Breshears. "We don't stay outside in the cold more than 20 minutes at a time. After that amount of exposure, we get back in vehicles to warm up. In the event of a water main break, we wear water-proof and insulated clothing. I have been in this business a long time and have had icicles on my whiskers many times."

Employees at Henderson Ranch in Edwards find that cold weather causes mishaps to occur. Water has frozen and heaters have gone out on water tanks during this cold spell. Four ranch hands have been out in their winter clothes giving extra feed to the cattle, as they need to eat more when it is cold.

A call to the Edwards Post Office confirmed that its local mail was being delivered on Tuesday morning without any problems.

The Occupational Safety & Health Administration (OSHA) website provides tips to protect workers in cold environments. It reports that prolonged exposure to freezing or cold temperatures may cause serious health problems such as trench foot, frostbite and hypothermia. In extreme cases, immersion and exposure can lead to death. Danger signs include uncontrolled shivering, slurred speech, clumsy movements, fatigue and

confused behavior. Tips to employers include: Recognize the environmental and workplace conditions that may be dangerous; Learn the signs and symptoms of cold-induced illnesses and injuries and what to do to help workers; Train workers about cold-induced illnesses and injuries; Encourage workers to wear proper clothing for cold, wet and windy conditions, including layers that can be adjusted to changing conditions; Be sure workers in extreme conditions take a frequent short break in warm, dry shelters to allow their bodies to warm up; and Try to schedule work for the warmest part of the day. OSHA also suggests that workers: Avoid exhaustion or fatigue because energy is needed to keep muscles warm; Work in pairs so that one worker can recognize danger signs; Drink warm, sweet beverages and avoid drinks with caffeine or alcohol; Eat warm, high-calorie foods such as hot pasta dishes; and Remember that workers face increased risks when they take certain medications, are in poor physical condition or suffer from

cardiovascular disease. OSHA does not require employers to provide clothing for normal exposure to outdoor cold weather, however, many employers provide their workers with winter weather gear.

request in July 2012 "to construct, own and operate a natural gas distribution system providing service in Benton, Morgan, Camden and Miller Counties in Missouri." SNG's territory has expanded since then.

Natural gas is priced per 1,000 cubic feet (Mcf); propane is priced per gallon. For cost comparison, measure the energy content in British thermal units (BTU); i.e., the amount of heat required to raise the temperature of one pound of water by one degree, Fahrenheit.

Natural gas generates 1,030,000 BTUs per Mcf; propane generates 91,333 BTUs per gallon. One thousand cubic feet of natural gas equals approximately 11.3 gallons of propane.

Records of the U.S. Energy Information Agency (EIA) show the average price from 2013-2017 in Missouri of a gallon of propane for residential use was \$1.74, or \$19.64 per Mcf. Heating oil for commercial use for the same period averaged \$1.93, or \$21.78 per Mcf. (EIA records prices for propane during the heating season only, from October - March.)

EIA records various natural gas prices year-round, by state. One is the price at the "city gate"; the point or measuring station where the gas utility receives gas from a pipeline company or transmission system. The average price at a Missouri city gate for the period 2013-2017 was \$5.77 per

The average natural gas price for the same period was \$9.67 per Mcf for commercial use by nonmanufacturers that sell goods or services, and by local, state and federal agencies. The average residential price for the period was \$16.36

per Mcf. "Doing the math" shows natural gas to be less expensive on average, to the satisfaction of some who opted for SNG service. Several propane users, however, believe they made the right decision not to switch. Others who opted for natural gas have been increasingly disappointed because their monthly bills have been higher, not lower.

Summit Natural Gas is one of five distributors currently operating in Missouri, including Ameren, Empire District, Spire (formerly Laclede), and Liberty. Summit territory comprises five areas: Gallatin, Warsaw, Lake of the Ozarks, Rogersville and Branson. The Warsaw area includes Cole Camp, Greenridge and Lin-

Linda Allcorn, director of Boonslick Regional Library. was asked about costs of natural gas service to the Warsaw branch and reported annual amounts that since 2014 have averaged a little over \$3,500. This calculates to less than \$300 a month, even counting an aboveaverage bill in January 2017 for \$743.18.

In contrast, J&D Pharmacy switched to natural gas, but after several months decided to incur the expense to revert to a propane system. They made the decision because they were using more gas and paying significantly higher monthly bills. Using propane again is saving them money.

Unable to afford reinstalling a propane system, Avman Ielouch, owner of Warsaw Laundromat, is stressed about the high cost of natural gas. Energy consumption by his commercial-grade washers and dryers, plus the boiler and rooftop furnace is relatively stable year-round, he said, at approximately 1,130 cubic feet.

His January 2017 bill for \$1,662.73 was not as high as his February 2017 bill for \$1,962.23. He is frustrated to know that service from Ameren, Laclede or Spire (formerly Missouri Gas Energy) would cost at least \$700 less for the same volume of gas.

The Consumer Service department of Missouri Public Service Commission receives many complaints every year about high bills. Yet, it can take no action against utility companies if they follow the regulations and charge rates approved by the MSPC. The Missouri Office of the Public Counsel represents the public and ratepayers as a class, but not on an individual basis.

Regardless of the service provider, components of natural gas monthly bills are calculated essentially the same. The Missouri Office of the Public Counsel defined the components as:

1. Customer Charge: Covers a portion of the gas company's fixed costs that it incurs to serve each residential customer. This charge allows natural gas utilities to recover customer specific expenses such as meter reading costs, billing costs and investments in meters and service lines. This charge appears monthly on a customer's bill regardless of usage.

2. Commodity Charge: Covers all other costs to operate the business such as salaries, a return on investment and any other non-gas cost for running the business. The total amount of this charge varies based upon the amount of gas used by the residential customer.


3. Purchased Gas Adjustment Charge (PGA): The cost of gas purchased from producers of natural gas, the costs to store natural gas in storage fields and the cost to transport natural gas via interstate or intrastate pipelines from the production fields [to the city gate] for use by the residential customer.

A local natural gas company pays its suppliers a wholesale price that is not regulated by the Missouri Public Service Commission. Primarily driven by supply, demand and the weather, it usually accounts for 55-60 percent of the total cost. Changes in wholesale prices are accounted for through

PGA in SNG's five service areas was revised in November 2017. Gallatin increased by \$0.099; Warsaw and Lake of the Ozarks decreased by \$0.0328, and Rogersville and Branson increased by \$0.0064.

revisions to the PGA charge.

From December 2014 until November 2017, Warsaw area customers were charged the highest combined rates per 100 cubic feet (Ccf) in the state for both residential (\$1.6004), and commercial (\$1.5013) service, compared to rates charged throughout Missouri by all five companies.

After November, Warsaw area commodity charges for residential (\$1.1340) and commercial (\$1.0349) customers were still the highest. And, the residential rate (commodity plus PGA) for the Warsaw area is still the highest in SNG territory, and in the state, at \$1.5676 per Ccf. Branson area service charges, \$1.4801 per Ccf, rose to the highest in SNG territory for commercial services, only \$0.0116 higher than Warsaw.

In addition to the three standard charges, natural gas bills typically include amounts for taxes, franchise fees that are levied by the local municipality (city or town), and in some cases, infrastructure reimbursements to the utility company.

Lizzy Reinholt, SNG's media contact, responded in early October 2017 to questions about the Warsaw area's high rates. She said SNG completed a "rate case" in 2014 that the Public Service Commission reviewed and approved. She added that "...the company brings natural gas to under-

served or unserved rural areas... where the geography can impact the cost to deliver the gas."

Gallatin customers are charged considerably less than Warsaw's: 50 cents less for residential and 39 cents less for commercial service, per Ccf. It could be said that the Gallatin area of eight cities or townships compared to four in Warsaw's area, is no less "rural" with fewer than 300 more people within a wider territory.

Lower costs where the population is greater does not always seem to be the case. For instance, rates for residential and commercial accounts in the Rogersville area comprised of 12 cities and townships, are \$1.1879 and \$1.2314 per Ccf, respectively; considerably lower than in Warsaw but higher than the \$1.0722 and \$1.0833 in Gallatin.

Bottom line: Heating bills go up, sometimes way up, this time of year. Residential customers have some options for relief. SNG's budget billing formula spreads costs more evenly throughout the year. Also, the West Central Missouri Community Action Agency has an

energy assistance program for residential customers on fixed income. To be eligible. an applicant's income must be at or less than 135 percent of the federal poverty level based on family size.

Commercial customers may be able to get help through SNG's "Commodity Charge Flex Provisions." Reinholt described it as "the flexible rate structure that provides commercial customers an opportunity to work with us to find al alternative rate that suits the needs of both the customer and the company.



Our library is a great gathering place, especially in the winter months. I've said it before, and I'll say it again, we're fortunate to have the library in Warsaw and people like JoAnn who keep it humming along. We've been blessed with other dedicated librarians over the years too. Freda Scott and Judy Frank come to mind. The first library was a project of the McCormick Book Club, which was a group that liked to read the latest books that were being published. One of them included my grandmother White. The club was named for a Methodist minister who was accidentally shot and killed by a young man from a prominent Warsaw family, causing grief in a number of households. Reverend McCormick is buried in Riverside Cemetery, not far from the first entrance. This all took place back in the Depression and buying the latest books on the market was expensive. Club members each bought a book and then passed it from member to member. In the late 1930's they lobbied the Benton County Commission to use one of the jury rooms in the courthouse for a library. The small room on the Main Street side was used. When the collection grew large enough, the library was moved to the "new" Community Building, to a room on the right side of the front door. I bet the members of the McCormick Book Club would be proud of our current library and how it's grown over the years. If you are driving through Riverside Cemetery and see Rev. McCormick's grave, maybe you'll remember reading this and know that a young Warsaw minister's life was cut short by a tragic accident. And, you may remember that the

Private Pesticide Applicator Training Dates Set

Agricultural commodity producers who need to obtain or renew a private pesticide applicator license

can attend one of the following training sessions provided through University of Missouri Extension. Those unable to attend one of the scheduled classes may obtain or renew their license on an individual basis at their county extension center. This class also completes the EPA worker protection training program for agricultural employees who handle pesticides. This class does not complete the requirement for either commercial applicators or applicators using synthetic auxin (Dicamba) herbicides. University of Missouri Extension programs are open to everyone but only individuals 18 years or older may receive a license. Classes will last approximately 2 hours and are scheduled as follows:
