Roger L. Reedy, Benton County Assessor, will mail approximately 12,000 personal property lists to Benton County residents who own taxable personal property, as of January 1, 2018, who must furnish the assessor a list by March 1, 2018, to avoid late penalties. Taxable personal property includes vehicles, boats, boat motors, airplanes, travel trailers, mobile homes, livestock, farm machinery, and all licensed trailers. If you have lifetime plates on your vehicle or trailer, you still need to list this.

If you do not receive a list in the mail by January 22, 2018 please call the assessor's office at 438-5473 so that one will be sent to you. Office hours are 8:00 to 12:00 and 1:00 to 4:30.

In addition, the assessor will be at the Cole Camp City office to take lists on the following mornings from 8:30 AM until noon: Fridays, January 5, 12, and 19, 2018.

Year In Review: A Look Back At 2017

As the year 2017 draws to a close, we at the Enterprise flipped through the files of the big stories here in Benton County.

In January, the Humane Society of Missouri rescued 31 dogs from what it called "filthy" conditions at a home near Windsor in northwestern Benton County.

Thirty of the dogs were small mixed-breed, and one

was a Labrador retriever. They were removed and taken to Humane Society headquarters in St. Louis for treatment.

Also in January, Former Navy SEAL officer Eric Greitens became the Missouri governor. He pledged to bring an outsider's perspective to a state which for the first time will be overseen by a Republican governor paired with super majorities of Republicans in the Legislature.

Greitens took the oath of office in front of the Capitol building and a crowd of

more than 6,000 people on a chilly, overcast day. The state's first Jewish governor placed a hand on a Bible once owned by a World War I veteran as he recited the oath to become Missouri's 56th governor. His wife, Sheena, held the Bible and his two young children were held by their grandparents.

Greitens replaces Democratic Gov. Jay Nixon, who served eight years as governor and was barred by term limits from seeking re-election. Four other newly elected Republican statewide officials - Lt. Gov.

Mike Parson, Treasurer Eric Schmitt, Secretary of State Jay Ashcroft and Attorney General Josh Hawley - also took the oath of office.

In February, Donna Stearns, from Harrisonville contacted Troop A, Lee's Summit, and requested Troop A officers assist her in locating her missing 49-year-old husband, Kenneth Stearns. Mrs. Stearns stated she and her husband were camping in the area and Mr. Stearns was reportedly fishing by boat on Truman Lake near

Airbnb Takes Off In Small Towns

Cheryl Groves, of Warsaw, has a talent for hospitality, and has put it to use by offering visitors to the area a comfortable place to stay while in town. She and husband, Don Groves, have a spacious lodge at their home that has a separate entrance and is perfect for paying guests. Cheryl had

wanted to run a bed and breakfast, but her daughter told her about the popularity of Airbnbs, and helped her start this type of temporary lodging business in the summer of 2016.

"I had to interview with Airbnb officials and find out the guidelines" said Cheryl. "Approval took about a week and a business account was set up at my bank for all Airbnb transactions. I had to tell what kind of space I had and submit pictures for the website. There are

12 pictures of our lodge online, including the bedroom, bath, and back yard. Visitors have access to the lanai, barbecue grill and fire pit, and there is a dog pen if they have pets. I serve breakfast outside in spring and summer, and in the house during cold weather."

Cheryl has hosted 35 guests since she opened her home as an Airbnb. Guest ratings have been so positive that she is considered a five-star hostess by

Teen Marijuana Use On The Rise



AS LEGALIZATION SPREADS, worries about teen addiction to marijuana continue to grow. Though not legal in Missouri, marijuana use among teenagers increased in 2017.

With twenty-nine states having legalized either the medical or recreational use of marijuana, it's no surprise that it is becoming more accepted nationwide. But just as with drinking alcohol, there is no way to guarantee that minors will not smoke weed, whether it is legal in their state or not.

Marijuana is not legal in any form in the state of Missouri- but that doesn't mean that kids aren't using it in secret. According

to the US Department of Health & Human Services, 39% of teens, grades nine through twelve, admitted to smoking weed at least once in their life. The Jackson County Combat website reported that 21% of high school seniors had admitted to smoking in the last thirty days.

Although it would be easiest to believe that our own community's teens don't use drugs, that is not the case. A few Warsaw High School students were asked off the record about the drug use at the high school, and their answers

I used to love the smell of a pine tree in the living room. One year after church I drove to a tree farm near Harrisonville and determined that the girls and I would chop down our own tree. I didn't think this venture through very well because after I cut the tree down I realized I was at the bottom of a snowy hill and my station wagon was at the top. Daughters #1 and #2 were only 6 and 4 but they helped me pull that tree up the hill. About halfway up, Daughter #1 determined that her shoes were getting wet so she left us and proceeded to the car. Daughter

#2 continued to help me struggle with the tree and we managed to get it to the top of the hill.

I also had underestimated the size of the tree and the only way to get it into the station wagon was to shove it as far as I could into the car and drive with the back window down. My dear neighbor Ethel and Daughter #3 had to sit with a pine tree between them. It was also a snowy evening so I had to turn the heater on high in order to make the trip back to Warsaw.

I decided he was okay but the next morning was the only Christmas morning that I had to wake #1 Son.

This Christmas was especially fun with all five children and their families in the house on Christmas Day. The seven grandchildren enjoyed playing games, opening presents and eating more chocolate than their parents usually allowed. We had 24 people at various tables throughout the house and loads of fun. The big laugh of the day was when

(Continued from Page 1) her company. She prepares an elaborate cupcake for guests on their birthdays, and all are welcomed with a basket of fruit and fresh-baked chocolate cookies when they arrive. There is wine and cheese available, and she cooks a variety of foods for breakfast. Cheryl went to local businesses to gather maps of the area, as well as restaurant menus and brochures of local tourist sites for her guests.

The idea for Airbnbs began in 2007 when roommates Brian Chesky and Joe Gebbia could not afford the rent for their loft apartment in San Francisco. They came up with the idea of putting an air mattress in their living room and turning it into a bed and breakfast. In 2008 Nathan Blecharczyk joined the roommates as the Chief Technology Officer and the third co-founder of the new venture called AirBed & Breakfast. They put together a website. Then, they were approached by other companies which provided them with training, and money for a small interest in the company. By March 2009, the company name was changed to Airbnb.com and the site expanded to 10,000 users and 2,500 listings. Listings varied from entire homes and apartments, private rooms, castles, boats, manors, tree houses, teepees, igloos, private islands and other properties.

Airbnb.com is now operating internationally, but is also seeing a spike in business in U.S. rural areas. A USA Today article from June 2017 reported that 3.3 million guest arrivals occurred at rural listings in the U. S. over the last year, an increase of 138 percent over the year before. According to Airbnb's research, there are more Airbnb hosts than corporate hotel chains in many rural communities in the U.S. The states with the fastest year-over-year growth are Oklahoma, Illinois, Arkansas, Missouri and Alabama. This research also reveals that many of the most popular rural destinations are near national and state parks or places that play host to youth sports tournaments. The Airbnb platform is that this form of temporary rentals is supporting the middle class, and brings tourism to places that haven't benefited from it before.

Airbnb.com provides security to hosts and guests by verifying personal profiles and listings. Every Airbnb reservation is scored for risk before it's confirmed; running hosts and guests against regulatory, terrorist, and sanctions watch lists, as well as background checks for those in the U.S. Hosts can also request free carbon monoxide and smoke detectors for their homes. There is a messaging system allowing guests or hosts to get to know each other and ask questions before committing to a stay.

"My mother came from Hawaii to visit my family last summer, and stayed at Cheryl Groves' Airbnb," said Jodi Orton, of Warsaw. "She was only a short distance from our farm and was able to visit us often. Cheryl spoiled my mother. The lodge was like living in a log cabin, and Cheryl opened up her home to her. It was a quiet place which is what my mother is used to in Hawaii. She was wonderful with my kids coming around to visit. I would absolutely recommend Cheryl's Airbnb. She and Don are business people who take pride in their community."

Other guests at Cheryl's Airbnb included a young lady who had an exhibit at the State Fair and stayed 11 nights, and a couple with a baby who stayed a couple of days just before Christmas. Cheryl Groves said her lodgers are not required to pay local or state taxes, making their stays cheaper than in traditional hotels, which makes Airbnbs more attractive. Some members

of the hotel industry have been trying to lobby for commonsense regulations that level the playing field between the two types of lodging industries. An April 2017 New York Times article stated the American Hotel and Lodging Association planned to lobby politicians and state attorneys general to "reduce the number of Airbnb hosts, funding studies to show Airbnb is filled with people who are quietly running hotels out of residential buildings and highlighting how Airbnb hosts do not collect hotel taxes and are not subject to the same safety and security regulations that hotel operators must follow."

The Association claimed the legal and regulatory victories during 2016 in Chicago, San Francisco and Los Angeles, as well as in states like Virginia, Tennessee and Utah.

proved that they are a part of the statistics as well. "Lots of kids smoke weed, it doesn't even surprise me anymore when I hear about it," a junior female said. With a pro-legalization climate, teens feel like there is no risk to smoking marijuana- if everyone is doing it, why is it so bad? "I wasn't afraid to smoke weed for the first time because I knew so many people that did it," said a sophomore female.

WHS took drug prevention to the next level this year after multiple students were caught at school with marijuana and paraphernalia last year. Now, to even park your vehicle on school property, you must be admitted to the random drug testing pool. "You would be surprised how many kids were scared by the new rule- at least I was," said a male senior.

Looking for reasons as to why teens might smoke marijuana is like looking for a needle in a haystack, there are many reasons they could be making these decisions. A study by ParentFurther showed that only ten percent of teens said they had not been influenced by peer pressure. Other studies showed teens may experiment with drugs because of boredom, curiosity, or to make them feel better. A WHS student said they first smoked weed because "there was nothing better to do."

There will always be a trend teens want to try and something new they want to experiment with. But by knowing the signs of drug use you can stop them and prevent them from trying other drugs as well. An article from Livestrong.com reported that as well as physical signs such as red eyes and imbalance, there are signs in the grades and friend groups as well.

Tourism Grant Applications Available

The Benton County Tourism Commission has announced that Tourism Promotion Grants for 2018 are available using funds raised by the Guest Tax in Benton County. These funds are to be used to promote, encourage, and attract visitors to Benton County and will be for the specific promotion of Benton County Tourism Attractions/Events to be held in 2018.

Grants are available on a competitive basis to any visitor attraction, community event, or area (more than one community) event held within Benton County with nonprofit (501c3), or other non-profit status whose primary purpose is to encourage tourism and generally promote Benton County. Grant projects must be completed within the 2018 calendar year.

Applications for 2018 grants will be accepted from now thru January 8, 2018.

Our New Year Eve was spent in my house with special friends watching TV sports and finally the celebrations of New Year all the world. After that 12:00 ball drop I dropped also. It

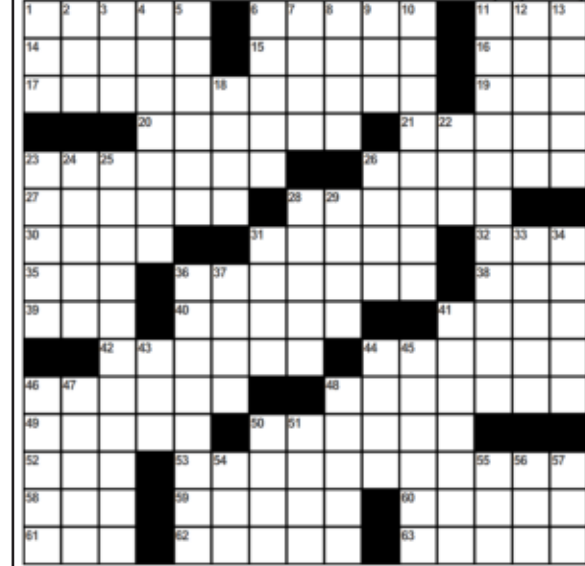

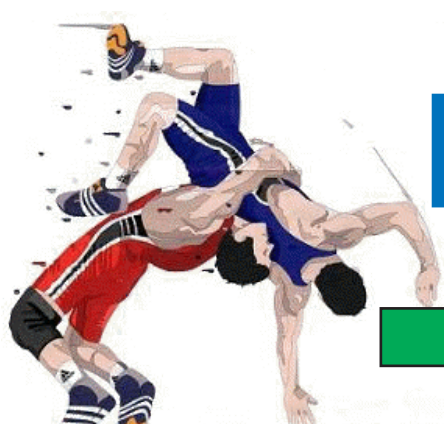

Baseball: 137-47 overall record, four Conference titles, three District Championships, three Sectional Titles, three Quarterfinalists, two Final Fours, the 2003 State Championship, four time Conference Coach of the Year and 2003 Class 1 State Coach of the Year.

Football: Assistant football coach on two undefeated regular season teams: 1993, Stockton (lost to Warsaw) 1997, Pierce City.

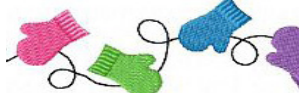

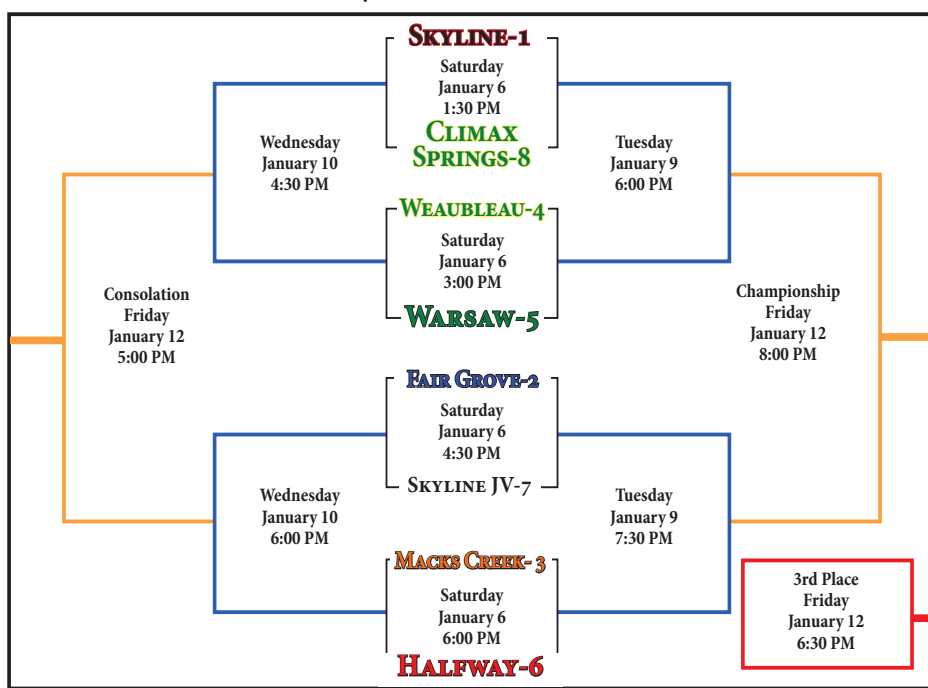

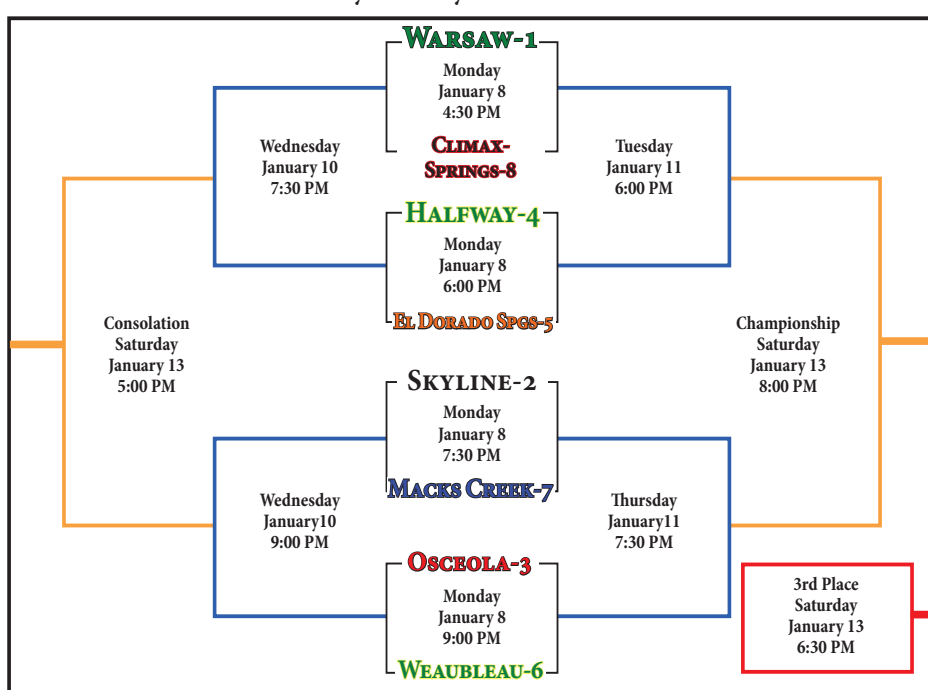

This property is described as the 15' alleyway between Lot 7, Block 3 and Lots 1 and 4, Block 4, and the alleyway between Lot 4, Block 1 and Lot 1, Block 2, all in Iris Addition to McKenna Villa.

Preparation of the 2018 budget continued as Commissioners met with officials concerning their 2018 budget requests.

Sheriff Eric Knox met with the Commission to present his 2018 budget requests. Captain Jeff Canfield and secretary Michelle Bruns were also present. Budgets for Law Enforcement, Sheriff Civil, DARE, Deputy Sheriff Supplemental Salary, Sheriff Revolving, Inmate Prisoner Security and Law Enforcement Sales Tax funds were also present.

Public Administrator Lori Dunkin submitted her 2018 budget request to the Commission.

Lynette Stokes, executive director of Benton County Tourism and Recreation, met with the Commission to give an update on marketing efforts being implemented to promote tourism throughout the county, and to request continued support for this purpose.

Further discussion will be held on these matters at a later date.

County Clerk Susan Porterfield presented monthly budget reports for each department. Bills were submitted for approval and payment.

Deepwater Woman Injured In Benton County

A Deepwater woman was injured in an accident on Route Z at Puddle Jumpers in Benton County on December 28 at 3:15 PM.

The crash occurred as a 2019 Ford Edge driven by Kristina L. Schliefert, 23, was eastbound on Route Z. Schliefert travelled off the right side of the road, returned to the road overcorrected and crossed the center line into the opposing lane. Schliefert overcorrected again and went off the right side of the road, struck a ditch and overturned.

Schliefert was transported by the Warsaw Lincoln Ambulance to Golden Valley Hospital in Clinton with minor injuries.

Sgt. N. K. Johnson of the Missouri Highway Patrol investigated the accident. Johnson was assisted by the Benton County Sheriff's Office.



Missouri State Highway Patrol

The Missouri State Highway Patrol reports that there were seven fatalities during the New Year's holiday counting period from 6 p.m., Friday, December 29, 2017 to 11:59 p.m. Monday, January 1, 2018. Troopers investigated 229 traffic crashes, which included 77 injuries and five of the seven fatalities. The St. Louis Metropolitan Police Department and Sullivan (MO) Police Department each investigated one traffic crash fatality during the counting period. In addition, troopers made 129 arrests for driving while intoxicated and 49 drug arrests during the 2018 New Year counting period. There were no boating crashes or drownings during the 2018 New Year's holiday counting period.

Last year over the New Year's holiday counting period, Missouri law enforcement agencies reported 539 traffic crashes, which injured 302 people. There were eight fatalities during the 2017 New Year's holiday counting period. In addition, troopers made 103 arrests for driving while intoxicated and 67 drug arrests. There were no boating incidents or drownings during the 2017 New Year's holiday counting period.

Three traffic crash fatalities occurred in the Troop C, Weldon Spring, MO, area; two traffic crash fatalities occurred in the Troop E, Poplar Bluff, MO, area, and one traffic crash fatality occurred in each of the Troop G, Willow Spring, MO, area and the Troop H, St. Joseph, MO, area.

There were no traffic crash fatalities during the counting period Friday, December 29, 2017.

Three people died in traffic crashes on Saturday, December 30, 2017. Gregory A. Reynolds, 73, of Clarkton, MO, died when the vehicle he was driving began sliding, ran off the roadway, and overturned. The crash occurred in Dunklin County on Missouri Highway 25 north of Clarkton. Dunklin County Coroner James Powell pronounced Reynolds dead at the scene of the crash. Reynolds was not wearing a seat belt at the time of the crash.

Gary D. Greenwood, 19, of Mountain Grove, MO, died when the he overcorrected, causing the vehicle he was driving to travel off the roadway and overturn. Greenwood was ejected from the vehicle. The crash occurred in Texas County on Missouri Route AM east of Mountain Grove. Texas County Coroner Marie Lasater pronounced Greenwood deceased. It is unknown whether or not Greenwood was wearing a seat belt at the time of the crash.

Phillip G. Hoenig, 49, of St. Charles, MO, died when another vehicle ran a red light and struck Hoenig's vehicle as he was turning left. The crash occurred in St. Louis, MO, at the intersection of Hall Street and Adelaide Avenue. Hoenig was transported to St. Louis University Hospital where he succumbed to his injuries. Dr. Jennifer La'Plant pronounced Hoenig deceased at the hospital. The St. Louis Metropolitan Police Department investigated the crash.

Two people died as a result of traffic crashes on Sunday, December 31, 2017. Bonita D. Fuller, 67, of Jackson, MO, died when the vehicle she was driving traveled off the right side of the roadway, struck a utility pole and a ditch, went airborne, then struck a tree and a house. The crash occurred in Cape Girardeau County on U.S. Highway 61 in Fruitland, MO. Cape Girardeau County Deputy Coroner David Taylor pronounced Fuller dead at the scene. Fuller was wearing a seat belt at the time of the crash.

Cole Watson, 20, of Sul-

livan, MO, died when the vehicle he was driving drove off the roadway. Watson was ejected from the vehicle. The crash occurred on Vine Street in the city of Sullivan, MO. Watson was pronounced deceased at Missouri Baptist Hospital. Watson was not wearing a seat belt at the time of the crash. The Sullivan Police Department investigated the crash.

Two people died as a result of traffic crashes on New Year's Day, Monday, January 1, 2018. Brandon M. Scott, 28, of Independence, MO, died after the vehicle he was driving failed to stop at the intersection of Missouri Route A and Missouri Route H in Turney, MO, in Clinton County. The vehicle then traveled off the edge of the intersection and struck a hedge post, coming to rest on its driver's side. Clinton County Coroner Lee Hanks pronounced Scott dead at the scene. Scott was not wearing a seat belt at the time of the crash. Clinton County Sheriff's Department and Lathrop (MO) Fire Department also responded.

Gerald J. Beers, 79, of Festus, MO, died when the vehicle he was driving failed to yield while attempting to cross northbound U.S. Highway 67. A northbound vehicle struck Beers' vehicle which rotated counter-clockwise into the left lane and was struck by a second vehicle. The crash occurred in Jefferson County on U.S. Highway 67 at Montauk Drive. Dr. Evans at Mercy Hospital pronounced Beers deceased at the hospital. Beers was wearing a seat belt at the time of the crash. The driver and a passenger in the first vehicle that struck Beers' vehicle sustained minor injuries; neither were wearing seat belts. The driver of the second vehicle that struck Beers' vehicle was not injured; he was wearing a seat belt.

"Oh, I forgot to tell you I got a cat for Amelia to play with," I replied.

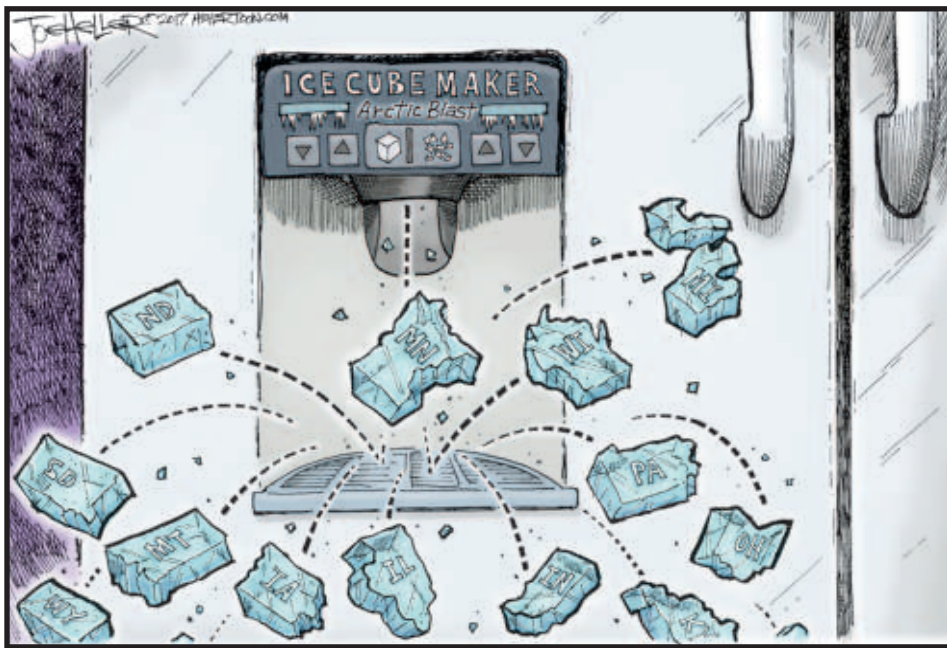
"Then why isn't that #*C! cat at her house?" he asked.

Time is a Key Factor in Investing
With the arrival of the New Year, many of us will pause and ponder the age-old question: "Who knows

where the time goes?" And, as is always the case, none of us really do know. However, wherever the time goes, it will usually be a key factor in your success as an investor.

But along the way, you'll probably also have some shorter-term goals - making a down payment on a home, sending your children to college, taking a round-the-world trip, and so on. Each of these goals has a specific time limit and usually requires a specific amount of money, so you will need to choose the appropriate investments.

•Risk tolerance - The element of time also will affect your tolerance for risk. When you have many decades to go until you retire, you can afford to take more risk with your investments because you have time to overcome periods of market volatility. But when you're on the verge of retirement, you may want to lower the risk level in your portfolio. For example, you may want to begin moving away from some of your more aggressive, growth-oriented investments and move toward more income-producing vehicles that offer greater stability of principal. Keep in mind, though, that even during retirement, you'll need your portfolio to provide enough growth opportunity at least to help keep you ahead of inflation.

Thus far, we have looked at ways in which time plays a role in how you invest.

But there's also an aspect of time that you may want to keep out of your investment strategies. Specifically, you might not want to try to "time" the market. The biggest problem with market timing is it's just too hard. You essentially have to be right twice, selling at a market top and buying at the bottom. Also, as humans, we appear to be somewhat wired to think that an activity - especially a long-running activity - will simply continue. So, when the market goes up, we seem to expect it to keep rising, and when the market drops, we think it

will continue dropping. This can lead to big mistakes, such as selling after a major market drop even though that can be the time when it may be much smarter to buy because prices are low.

As we've seen, the way you interact with time can affect your investment efforts.

So, think carefully about how you can put all the days, months and years on your side. Time is the one asset you can't replenish - so use it wisely.

Ozark Foodie

Cake
It's a new year but an old favorite recipe is on my mind. This recipe is straight from King Arthur Flour, one of my preferred sources for all things baking.

They just declared this recipe their recipe of the century. Well, I'm not that old, but I have made this cake for decades. It's easy, everybody loves it (well, everybody who loves chocolate), it's a great keeper and all around great cake.

- Cake**
- 1 1/2 cups King Arthur Unbleached All-Purpose Flour or Organic All-Purpose Flour
 - 1 cup sugar
 - 1/4 cup Dutch-process cocoa or natural cocoa
 - 1/2 teaspoon salt
 - 1/2 teaspoon espresso powder, optional
 - 1 teaspoon baking soda
 - 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
 - 1 tablespoon vinegar, cider or white
 - 1/3 cup vegetable oil
 - 1 cup cold water

- Icing**
- 1 1/2 cups semisweet chocolate chips
 - 1/2 cup half & half

Directions
1. Preheat your oven to 350°F. Lightly grease an 8" square or 9" round pan that's at least 2" deep.

2. **Traditional method:** Measure all the dry ingredients into the prepared pan. Blend the ingredients together thoroughly with a fork or whisk and scoop out three holes, or indentations. Pour the vanilla into the first hole, the vinegar into the second, and the vegetable oil into the third. Take the cup of water and pour it directly over everything in the pan. Stir all the ingredients together with your fork until well blended.

3. **Updated method:** Whisk the dry ingredients together in a medium-sized bowl. Whisk the vanilla, vinegar, vegetable oil, and water in a separate bowl. Pour the wet ingredients into the bowl of dry ingredients, stirring until thoroughly combined. Pour the batter into the prepared pan.

4. Bake the cake for

30 to 35 minutes, until a toothpick inserted into the center comes out clean, or with a few moist crumbs clinging to it.

5. Serve the cake right from the pan; warm from the oven, it's wonderful with a big glass of milk.

6. Or, once cool, frost the cake with this simple chocolate frosting: Heat the chocolate chips with the half & half until the chips melt. Stir until smooth, and pour/spread over the cake. For a non-dairy icing, substitute 1/3 cup cold brewed coffee (or water) for the half & half.

7. Yield: about 16 servings.

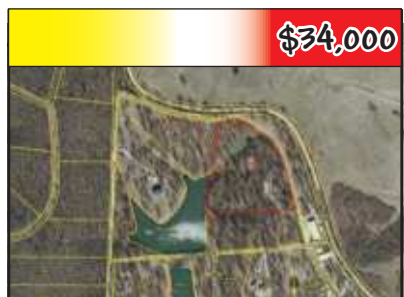

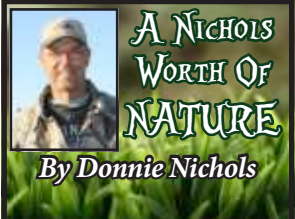

Cole Camp Christmas Bird Count

It's the time of year for the annual Cole Camp Christmas Bird Count (CBC) report. On December 27, Cole Camp conducted its 9th annual Audubon Christmas Bird Count.

On Christmas day in 1900, the Audubon society had the first ever bird count. Prior to that time, hunters engaged in a holiday tradition called the Christmas "side hunt". Groups would choose sides and go afield to see which side could bring in the biggest pile of furred and feathered quarry. Ornithologist, Frank Chapman, an officer in the newly formed Audubon Society, proposed that they go afield and count birds rather than kill them. He and 29 other birders conducted 25 bird counts across the United States. Every year since between December 15 - January 5, people from all across the United States participated in what is known as the Audubon Christmas Bird Count. That first count with 29 people surveying 25 sites has now grown into thousands of sites with tens of thousands of people taking part in the surveys. This year, 2017-2018, is the 118th year and it is the oldest running citizen science project in North America.

Each site is a circle with a 15 mile diameter and the same site is surveyed each year. Our Cole Camp site is centered on Drover's Prairie just west of the intersection of Highways 65 and 52 with a radius of 7.5 miles from that point. The past two years Cole Camp's Missouri Master Naturalists president, Ryan Steffens, has coordinated the logistics of this count. There were 19 people that helped with the count this year. Most of them were local but there were some from Columbia, Jefferson City, Springfield, and Warrensburg. We had five people that had never participated in a bird count before, which is always fun.

Our survey site was divided into six specific sections. After meeting at 8 AM and receiving our assignments, we broke into six groups. Each group has at least one experienced birder and from 8:30 until dusk we counted and tried to identify every bird we saw.

This year my wife Kim and I, along with a good friend Rachel Kissinger, were assigned to section 1A which is north of Highway 52 and west of state Highway E. This was Rachel's first survey and she was a great addition. It was a balmy 3 degrees most of the day with our high reaching 14 degrees in late afternoon. In almost 9 hours we drove 60.5 miles within our section. Each time a bird (or birds) was spotted we stopped and using binoculars and a spotting scope identified the species and numbers which were

recorded on a data sheet.

By 6:00 that evening all birders met at St. Paul's Lutheran Church in Cole Camp for chili and soup and to tally up the counts from each section.

It's always fun to hear the results from other groups and see if you had a species that no other group saw that day.

Kim, Rachel, and I had a count of 4,697 birds in our section which included 44 different species. The highlight of the day for us was the eight trumpeter swans we found resting in a stalk field. We also counted four loggerhead shrikes which was pretty exciting.

The total count for this year's survey was 13,827 birds with 78 different species identified. Species numbers were up but total numbers of birds were down from last year's count.

The extremely cold weather probably played a part. For example, there was very little open water in our survey site therefore waterfowl numbers were way down.

State and national data from these counts will be compiled, analyzed and compared to previous years to help form an understanding of bird species in the United States.

Unfortunately almost all bird species populations are experiencing a decrease in numbers and not just in the United States.

The biggest contribution to this decline is due to loss of habitat and pesticides. Two of the main culprits to habitat in our area are cedars and fescue.

Sparrowfoot campground since approximately 1 p.m. and had not returned.

Troop A officers and Patrol helicopter 93MP responded to assist in the search. At approximately 4 a.m., on February 25, 2017, the Patrol helicopter located Stearns on the lake near a partially submerged sand bar between the Sparrowfoot and Deepwater access, in a remote area of the lake.

The Patrol pilot directed officers by boat to Stearns location where they extracted him and transported him to the Sparrowfoot boat ramp where emergency personnel were waiting. Stearns was transported to Golden Valley Hospital before being transferred to Kansas University Medical Center. Stearns suffered serious health effects from being exposed to the elements.

In March, local bankers were alerted to counterfeit money being passed in Benton County.

Hawthorn Bank employee Mary Gemes stated that in the past several months, four counterfeit bills had been turned in at Hawthorn.

"The bills look like U.S. currency," said Gemes, "however, the words 'motion picture use only' are printed on both the front and the back."

The four bills were two twenty dollar bills and two one hundred dollar bills. The bank turned the counterfeit currency over to the Benton County Sheriff's Office.

"Counterfeit bills are usually turned over to the Secret Service, but since this money was printed as a movie prop it is a local issue," Gemes said.

Local merchants are the ones who pay for this crime since they have handed over services or merchandise and they have received no payment.

Gemes said that the twenty dollar bill and the one hundred dollar bill are the ones most often counterfeited.

"Our tellers can spot a counterfeit bill and our bill counters also will catch a counterfeit bill," Gemes said.

Also in March, almost 400 people filled the Warsaw Community Building at the Seventh Annual Quarter Mania sponsored by the BSJ Cancer Fighting Team. "We sold out of tickets a month before the event," said organizer Sharon Guess. "We were overwhelmed with the response from the community. We couldn't do this without the help of some very generous donors."

This year the funds will go to the American Cancer Society, \$2,000; Bothwell Cancer Center, \$10,000 and Golden Valley Cancer Center, \$10,000.

The Skyline Girls Basketball team from Urbana won its first state title since 2008 in a dominating win over Adrian in the state title game in March. The Skyline girls defeated Adrian 69 to 42 to claim first place in the Class 2 Missouri State Tournament.

Benton County Deputy Odin Spinka's quick reaction led to the return of a Lincoln teenager to her parents in March. Spinka spotted the missing girl in a vehicle in Warsaw. He made an investigated stop of the vehicle and positively identified Erica Kaye McEwen and took her back to her parents.

McEwen's mother notified authorities that her daughter had left the family home and that they were unable to find her. McEwen's picture was given to the authorities and they proceeded to search for her.

Farmers and ranchers in Kansas, Oklahoma, Colorado and Texas suffered horrible losses during the prairie fires that started on Monday, March 6. Wildfires across the country had consumed more than 1 million acres by Tuesday night,

taking at least 7 lives.

Farmers and ranchers in Benton County moved quickly to gather needed supplies to send to those suffering in the fire damaged area. Jeremy Pitts of Fristoe made a trip to Gate, Oklahoma near the Oklahoma/Kansas border on March 19 to deliver hay to a distribution center which in turn distributed the hay to those farmers in need.

"We took 130 bales of hay as well as supplies, horse tack and feed to help out," Pitts said. Pitts mentioned that Jason Salley from Salley Farms near Warsaw and the Vaughn Family at Lazy D Ranch in Fristoe donated hay for the Kansas farms destroyed by the fire. Dale Jr. Estes and Jacob Gant of southern Benton County also made the trip.

Square B Ranch near Edwards donated 10 loads of the big bales that were sent to Ashland, Kansas. LaMonte and Austin Yoder drove big trucks loaded with hay to Ashland.

Each load held 34 bales and Brian Bell of Square B Ranch also paid for fuel to get those bales delivered. LaMonte and Austin left on March 19 and returned the next day.

Dr. Haley Dingfelder of Warsaw also collected donations to send to those affected by the fire. She contacted L & B Animal Health in Sedalia who also sent medical supplies for the animals injured in the fire.

Warsaw High School FFA members Ashlyn Yoder, Morgan McGann, Brandi Hubert and Megan Mantonya earned a Gold rating at district competition and qualified to compete at the Missouri State FFA Contest in March. Yoder was also one of the top 10 individual scorers in the contest.

Ashlyn Yoder also competed in the Central District FFA Job Interview contest in Warrensburg on Thursday and placed second. She qualified for the state competition on April 20 and 21. She will be competing at State in two contests. Stan Adler is the Warsaw FFA Advisor.

Pettis County failed to pass the proposed State Fair Community College \$28 million general obligation bond that would have allowed the college to build a new technical education center in April.

Known as the Building Strong Futures Proposition A, the measure needed a four-sevenths majority vote to pass from voters in Pettis and Benton counties, plus the Ottoville R-VI School District and portions of Henry, Morgan, Johnson and Saline counties.

The bond received a 52.17 percent favorable vote in Pettis County, almost 5 percentage points shy of the needed number. Voters cast 2,917 ballots in favor of the proposal, while 2,674 (47.83 percent) voted against it.

Benton County voters were largely against the proposition, with 1,244 voting no (53.14 percent) and 1,097 voting yes (46.86 percent).

If approved, the new technical center would have replaced the current facility, Fielding Technical Center, which was built in 1978.

The Benton County Commission voted to accept the bid from Viebrock Construction for the culvert to be used on the Harper Road Bridge project at their April 25 meeting. The total bid for the culvert was \$41,986.93 with an add-on alternate of \$1,500 for lifting lugs. The only bid received was from Viebrock Construction.

Warsaw High School track members Ashlee Kuykendall and Dallas Larsen broke three School Track Records at SBU on April 25. Kuykendall broke the 3200m record with a time of 11:34.72. The old record was 11:44.92 which she set. Kuykendall also broke the 2000m steeplechase record with a time of 8:22.04. The old record was 10:43.03. Dallas Larsen set a new record in 2000m steeplechase with a time of 7:35.47. The old time was 7:52.19.

The Warsaw Christian Church, located at 320 State Street, celebrated 175 years of organization on April 30. A special worship service took place at 10:15 AM when Pastor Richard Bowman delivered a first person sermon as "Alexander Campbell," one of the founders of the Christian denomination. A historical time line with items relating to the history of the church was displayed in the sanctuary.

In May, Lincoln golf captured third at the Class 1 Missouri State Tournament at Silo Ridge Golf and Country Club in Bolivar.

Boone Kroenke shot a 79 on Monday and 83 on Tuesday for a 162 total. He placed 10th individually for All-State honors. Bo Kroenke carded a 166 and Trevor Kroenke followed at 168.

Windsor placed eighth with a team score of 770, while Stover finished ninth at 815.

Representing Tipton, Tristan Bolin totaled 169 and tied for 22nd.

Jack Daugherty led the Greyhounds with a 173 total. Brenden Bauer paced the Bulldogs at 185.

Tied for first at 677, Gallatin won the tiebreaker with Greenwood by 10 strokes for the team championship.

Graduation for all three Benton County High Schools was held in May. Cole Camp High School's top graduates were Valedictorian Hanna Westermier and Salutatorian Josilyn Harms. Lincoln High School's top graduates were Valedictorian Tyler Kroen-

ke and Salutatorian Matthew Craig. Warsaw High School's top graduates were Valedictorian Cade Chiles and Salutatorian Ashlyn Yoder.

WHS 2017 graduate Ashlee Kuykendall finished 4th in the 1600M run @ MSHSAA State Championships setting a new school record in the event with a time of 5:16.24, earning her second medal at the State Championships this year.

Also in May, the Lincoln Cardinals claimed a 9-3 victory over St. Vincent for third place in the Class 2 Missouri State Baseball Tournament at CarShield Field in O'Fallon on Tuesday. Jackson Beaman was 2-for-3 with a walk and three RBIs. He helped the Cardinals score three runs in the first inning and drove in three runs with a double in the sixth.

Cardinal seniors Aaron Yearout and Connor Spunaugle joined Beaman with multi-hit games against the Indians. St. Vincent starter Mitchell Doubbelare surrendered eight runs on nine hits in five innings.

Lincoln finished 26-2 overall, capturing the Kay-singer Conference and Class 2, District 14 tournaments.

In June, the 51st annual Jubilee Days wrapped up with large crowds attending all the events. Ashlyn Yoder was crowned Jubilee Days Queen while Jaidyn Estes was crowned Jubilee Days Princess. Calie Pearcey was crowned as the Junior Miss Jubilee and Austyn Wright was crowned as Little Miss Jubilee.

Two City of Warsaw projects to improve intersections in North Town and Drake Harbor began on Thursday, June 8 and should be completed late this fall. The City also has signed contracts with engineers for later improvements in the area from the intersection of Main St. and Hwy 7 to Seminary; and for sidewalk and road improvements from North School to Jackson Street. In addition, City Manager Randy Pogue verified that a new Casey's General Store will be built in North Town on the northeast corner of the Commercial St. and access road intersection. Federal grants are helping make these improvements possible, with the federal government paying 80 percent of the cost and the City of Warsaw covering the other 20 percent.

Brandon Mantonya of Warsaw was the big winner at The Voice competition at Harbor Village on June 24. Mantonya singing "I Drive Your Truck" won a tool chest and bragging rights for the next year as this year's winner.

Second place went to Phillip Bosley, third place Raymond Jacobs, fourth place Carl Harris and fifth place Mickey Doberstein. The second place winner received a \$200 gift card from Kohl's in Sedalia, third place received two tickets and buffet dinners to John Conlee. Fourth and fifth place winners received gift certificates.

The proceeds from the event went to help pay for meals delivered to home bound people in the area.

The Benton County Commission voted to rent office space from the Hawthorn Bank at their July 6 meeting. The lease agreement is for five years.

According to Commis-

sioner Jim Hansen, the offices of the Benton County Prosecuting Attorney and the Victim Advocate offices will be located on the first floor of the Hawthorn Bank while the Benton County Sheriff and Deputies will have offices located on the second floor of the bank. The Sheriff and his deputies will use the door located near the back of the bank and a new door will be installed for the Prosecuting Attorney and the Victim Advocate offices near the corner of Main and Van Buren.

The Hawthorn Bank will continue to use most of the main floor for banking purposes.

Rent for the first year will be \$850 per month which will increase to \$950 per month in the second and third year. Rent will increase to \$1,000 per month for the fourth and fifth year of the lease.

Rodeo fans filled the Warsaw Arena for the Twenty-sixth Annual Benton County Rodeo on July 7 and 8.

Brandy Von Holten was crowned Benton County Rodeo Queen. Donna Pitts was crowned Rodeo Princess and Madalyn Arnett was crowned as the Little Miss of the Rodeo.

Cowboys and cowgirls won over \$100,000 in prize money. C. R. McKellips Rodeo Co., Inc. provided the livestock for the show.

The Warsaw Shrine Club raised \$3,000 at their July Channel Hop Poker Run held on the Lake of the Ozarks. Stops on the Poker Run included: Old Oar House Inn, Buck Naked, Cardinal Cove, Holiday Hills, Possum Holler, Moonies, Fatties, Surfside, and Skippers.

The participants could either go by boat which amounted to 23 miles of water or by land. They started at the 81 mile marker and finished at the 58 mile marker.

Each participant paid \$15 to play. Half of the money went to the winner and half went to the Shriners.

"All the money raised goes to help the kids of Benton County," Shriner Chuck Allcorn said. "We try to help when a child is in need."

The Shriners use the money to buy coats, clothing, shoes and other necessities for children in the area.

Also in July, two Sedalia men were arrested after a three hour stand off at a residence near 52 and 65 Hwy in Cole Camp. Twenty-one-year old Patrick Carrington, and 18-year-old Keyshawn Flowers are suspected of being involved with the shooting of a 16 year old man in Sedalia. The Sedalia Police Department, the Benton County Sheriff's Office, and Missouri Highway Patrol were involved with the apprehension of the suspects. Both men surrendered without further incident.

Truman Lakes Bike owner Mac Vorce was named as the Warsaw Area Chamber of Commerce director in August.

Vorce, who came to Warsaw in 2000, first owned and operated Gasoline Alley, a restaurant and bar on Main Street.

After selling Gasoline Alley, Vorce served as the Parks and Recreation director from 2008 until 2014. In 2011 Vorce opened Truman Lakes Bikes.

The Chamber office will

remain at 109 E. Main Street next door to the Enterprise.

A Benton County woman is dead and a man is severely wounded as a result of an alleged murder/attempted suicide. Deputies with the Benton County Sheriff's Office were dispatched to 25000 Honey Bear Loop on August 13 at 7:29 PM in response to a 9-1-1 emergency call.

According to Benton County Sheriff Eric Knox, Donna Sue Haynes, 49, of Warsaw had been shot and killed.

John E. Hall, 54, of Warsaw was found at the residence with a gunshot wound to the face apparently self-inflicted.

According to Sheriff Knox, Hall allegedly shot Haynes then shot himself. The shot entered Hall's chin and exited through his face. Hall was able to call 9-1-1 asking for help.

"Haynes' son reported that Hall and Haynes were arguing earlier in the day but he left and didn't realize what had happened," Sheriff Knox said.

A search warrant for the residence revealed a marijuana operation resulting in a seizure of a vast quantity of narcotics and narcotic paraphernalia.

"We discovered marijuana plants growing behind the house as well market packaged marijuana," Knox said.

Hall has been charged with First Degree Murder as well as Armed Criminal Action, Unlawful Firearm Possession and Delivery of Controlled Substance. His bond was set at \$500,000.

Four members of a Warsaw family were involved in a serious accident on Route K one mile south of Missouri 83 on August 15 at 3:30 PM.

The accident occurred when a 2005 Ford Fusion driven by Mikayla P Andrews, 17, of Warsaw crossed the center line then swerved to avoid another vehicle and was hit by that vehicle. The other vehicle was a 2010 Ford F150 driven by Adrienne M. Gardiner, 47, of Wheatland.

Colton Andrews, 14 and Sam Andrews, 16, were transported by Air EMS to Cox South Hospital in Springfield with injuries.

Mikayala Andrews and Tanya R. Andrews, 43, were transported by Citizen's Memorial EMS to Cox South Hospital.

Adrienna M. Gardiner and Rachel E. Gardiner, 5, of Wheatland were transported by Warsaw/Lincoln EMS to Bothwell Hospital with moderate injuries.

All of the accident victims were wearing seatbelts at the time of the accident.

In August, Ryan Boyer took over as the WHS Head Football Coach. Boyer, a 2004 graduate of WHS, had formerly been the Head Coach at Smith Cotton in Sedalia.

Traffic was congested in and around the Twin Lake area over the Labor Day weekend as thousands of visitors flocked to the lakes for one last summer weekend.

According to Erin Cordrey, 1,630 visitors came through the Truman Dam Overlook during the Labor Day weekend. This number is up from 1,556 last year. The busiest day was Sunday with 655 visitors on the bluff. "Most of the campgrounds were booked weeks in advance of the Labor Day weekend," said Cordrey.

Also riding in the parade was the 2017 Cole Camp Fair Queen Sydney Neas. Her attendants included first runner up Camryn Schear and second runner up Ellie Marimon, students at Cole Camp High School.

Another queen riding in the parade was Good Samaritan Care Center Queen Frances Ehlers, 87. Ehlers is a long-time resident of Cole Camp. Ehlers worked Town and Country Shoes in Sedalia for 36 years and later as a CNA at Good Samaritan Care Center for 10 years. She became a resident at Good Samaritan in May of 2015. "I checked two items off my bucket list this year by being crowned a queen and riding in a BMW convertible," Ehlers said.

The Grand Marshall of the Parade was Kathy Lehigh-Bruner.

A beautiful weekend in September attracted visitors to Drake Harbor to admire vintage automobiles, trucks and motorcycles at the Fifth Annual Benton County Health Department Car Show.

Best of Show went to Troy Keithley with his 1934 Plymouth 5 Window Coupe and the Fundraising Favorite went to Ray and Joann Knott with their 1957 Chevy Convertible.

Daleske said that the BCHD team had collected close to \$5,000 to be divided between the Benton County Cancer Fund, Devon's Beat, Christmas for Kids as well as continuing the BCHD scholarship program for a graduating senior from Warsaw High School, Lincoln High School and Cole Camp High School.

Another emphasized that city-owned pistols will be returned to the city when an officer leaves employment. In another police matter, the group also approved an amendment to the Police Policy-Hiring procedure, designed to assure promotion of best qualified persons.

jacket and bike accessories; and third place Kyle Brethower of Shawnee, Kansas, bike accessories.

The Warsaw High School Wildcats defeated the Hallsville Indians 40 to 33 at the annual Homecoming game in front of a packed house.

At halftime seniors Keegan Glenn and Hannah Chapman were crowned King and Queen of Homecoming 2017 while juniors Jessie Glenn and Logan Davis were crowned Princess and Prince. Kallie Smith and Chase Weaver were the Little Princess and Little Prince.

The Warsaw Lady Cats lost to Dixon 5 to 1 in the Sectional Playoff game in September. The girls ended their season 20-8. Pitcher Kya Schepker, Catcher Regan Shelby, Infield Aubrie McRoberts and Outfield Rayni Simons were all named to the District 12 First Team. Pitcher Payge Adair was selected Second Team District 12.

WHS Senior Dallas Larsen ran 3.1 miles in 16:57.1 at Eldon in September to claim the overall Tri-County Cross County Championship. He out raced 101 runners to claim the crown. Larsen beat the second place finisher by a commanding 37 seconds to climb to fifth of the all-time course record list. He also won the Tri-County championship last year. Warsaw will no longer compete in the Tri-County after this school year so his feat will be that much more memorable. Middle school student Alyssa Alcantara placed 11th out of 49 runners and medaled. Top 15 runners medaled in the event. Alcantara ran her fastest time all year with a time of 11:26.

Thousands of visitors flocked to Warsaw in October to attend the Thirty-seventh Heritage Days celebration at the Truman Dam Visitors' Center on Kaysinger Bluff and on Drake Harbor.

According to Kaysinger Bluff Pioneer Heritage Association Board member Cynthia Mos 5,750 wrist bands were sold to visitors riding the buses up to the Kaysinger Bluff area. The rain on Sunday morning may have caused some visitors to the area to go home early, but those who did stay on Sunday had great weather in the afternoon.

Eric Ramsey, former Warsaw High School quarterback, was inducted into the Missouri Sports Hall of Fame as a member of its Elite 11 for 2017 on October 6 in Springfield. Ramsey was the quarterback of the 1990 WHS state championship team. Ramsey was a two time All State Quarterback and an Honorable Mention defensive back.

Ramsey is currently the principal of Parkview High School in Springfield. He is married to the former Heather Perry and is the father of two daughters.

Preliminary data from the Missouri Department of Conservation (MDC) shows that young hunters ages 6 through 15 harvested 17,222 deer during Missouri's early youth portion of the 2017 deer hunting season, which ran Oct. 28-29.

Preliminary data from the Missouri Department of Conservation (MDC) shows that deer hunters in Missouri harvested 191,368 deer during the November portion of fall firearms deer season, Nov. 11-21. Of the 191,368 deer harvested, 99,431 were antlered bucks, 20,148 were button bucks, and 71,789 were does. Top harvest counties were Howell with 4,564 deer checked, Texas with 4,374, and Franklin with 4,095.

WHS players Aubrie McRoberts and Hannah Chapman and Cole Camp player Camryn Schear were selected to the All Tournament girls team by the coaches.

The Warsaw Boys Basketball team won the third place trophy by defeating El Dorado Springs 76 to 62. The Knob Noster boys defeated Lincoln 61 to 51 to take the first place trophy while the Skyline boys won the consolation trophy by defeating Cole Camp 81 to 55.

Matt Luebbert of Warsaw was selected as the Most Valuable Player of the Tournament by the coaches. Logan Davis of Warsaw, Derek Stephens of Lincoln and Grant Eifert of Lincoln were selected to the All Tournament boys team by the coaches.

WHS defensive end Nate Fauquier was selected to the Missouri All State Second Team by the Missouri High School Football Association in November. Fauquier was also second to the All District First team. Jayden Schepker, defensive back, and Keagan Glenn, running back, were also selected All District first team.

Benton County deputies were called to Headwaters Motel south of Warsaw at 9:30 AM on Monday, December 4, on the report of a wanted man who was staying in a room there.

Mark Tousignant, 63, was wanted in Saline County for a parole violation. Tousignant had been charged with weapons and explosives violations.

The Benton County Sheriff's Office was contacted that Tousignant was residing at Headwaters Motel so a county deputy and a Missouri Highway patrolman went to the motel and attempted to talk to Tousignant. When Tousignant barricaded himself in the room, the Missouri Highway Patrol Swat team was called in to assist.

After several hours of attempted negotiations, the Swat Team shot pepper balls in through the windows. When there was still no response from Tousignant, the Swat Team shot tear gas canisters into the room through the windows. At that point Tousignant surrendered to the authorities.

Tousignant was treated by medical personnel for minor abrasions and then

was taken to the Benton County Jail.

According to Benton County Sheriff Eric Knox, the standoff lasted about seven hours with traffic being diverted away from the area around Headwaters Motel.

Warsaw R-9 School District officials were contacted to send afternoon busses a different way for their evening routes since the standoff lasted until about 4:30 PM.

"It was a good day since no one was hurt and we were able to return a fugitive back to jail," said Knox.

What started as a grass fire ended with the total destruction of a house and shed in White Branch near Warsaw on Saturday, December 16. The Warsaw Fire Department responded to a fire alarm at 2:13 PM.

According to Warsaw Fire Chief Rob Lane, Warsaw brought two tankers and a fire engine to the scene with 10 volunteers fighting the blaze. The Lincoln Fire Department responded to the call as well bringing a fire engine, a tanker and five volunteers as well. The combined fire departments fought the blaze until 8 PM.

"We had a red flag warning on Saturday as well as 17 MPH wind," said Lane. "While we were fighting the fire we had another call from a 50 acre fire on Dwyer Road so I had to send five of our volunteers to fight that fire."

Osage Valley Volunteer Fire Department also responded to the Dwyer Road fire. Lane reported that the Warsaw Fire Department had a total of five fires that they responded to on Saturday. "It was not a good day to burn trash," Lane said.

The house which belonged to Danier Johnson was a total loss. A nearby shed belong to Darrell Haymart was also a total loss. Johnson was not present at the time the house caught fire.

Over 400 people enjoyed Christmas Dinner at the Knights of Columbus Hall on Christmas Day according to event coordinator Charlie Smith.

"The Christmas Dinner event was started to make sure everyone had a place to go to enjoy food and fellowship on Christmas Day," said Smith. "However, now it has turned into a yearly tradition for people from all walks of life."

The Knights Cooking Crew consisting of Howard Sullentrop, Butch Mowry, Bob Clark, John Cooner, Jack Hahn and Don Wilde prepared the meal early Christmas morning. The Ladies of the Knights Auxiliary helped serve.

Ham, turkey, dressing, mashed potatoes, gravy, cranberry sauce, green beans as well as dessert and ice tea and coffee made up the traditional Christmas meal.

The meal was free to anyone who wanted to participate. The Knights pay for events such as this with their annual Shrimp Boil, Tootsie Roll sales and renting their building out for special events.

Also in December, the incumbent, Warsaw Mayor Eddie Simons, and former Warsaw Alderman Kevin Dockery, each filed to be a candidate for mayor in the April 2018 election.

Greetings, My Fellow Missourians!

It was not on my calendar to visit the MO Veterans' Home in Warrensburg on Friday, 12/15. However, when encouraged by constituents to make a visit, I felt compelled to work it into my schedule. I arrived unannounced and was really impressed by the professionalism of all the staff and the cleanliness of the facility. Administrator Eric Endsley put his day on hold to graciously give me a tour. Although the Veterans' Home location in St. Louis has been under recent inspection and scrutiny, the Warrensburg home has a very welcoming environment and appears to have contentment among the residents. There are 7 locations throughout Missouri with a total capacity of 1,350 beds. Currently, there are 2,000 veterans on a waiting list. These homes play a vital role in serving the needs of our veterans, and I certainly hope that any recent issues are solved swiftly to ensure continued commitment to Missouri veterans.

On Tuesday, I attended a meeting of the Missouri State Tax Commission in Jefferson City for a vote on Agriculture Land Value. The three-member commission voted for no increases in property taxes for Class 1-4 (tillable land), a 7% reduction in property taxes for Class 5-7 (pasture land), and a 3% reduction in property taxes for Class 8. This is great news for District 125; most of our district is in Class 5-7. This decrease in property taxes is also great news for the Missouri farmer and the agriculture industry in our state.

I have mentioned before that there is a lot of construction going on in District 125, and it is great to see this activity as I drive our local roads. New boat ramp construction is underway in Osceola as well as extensive improvements to the Osceola water district. There are school construction projects going on in El Dorado Springs and Weaubleau, a new facility for the Hickory County Health Department in Hermitage, a new Dollar General recently built and opened in Weaubleau as well as a new community building, and a convenience store/truck stop in Wheatland. I hope this is an indication of a prosperous 2018 for more economic development and jobs for our local citizens.
