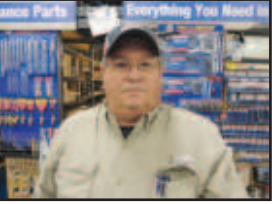

Sheriff's Office Challenged By Rising Calls And Budget Shortfall

The Benton County Sheriff's Office faces a staffing shortage amid rising calls, coupled with a budget shortfall. Despite this, as 2017 comes to an end, Sheriff Eric Knox can take pride in what he and his deputies have accomplished. More than one challenge has been met or overcome. They acknowledge support of residents, of County Commissioners, the fundraising by Friends of Benton County Sheriff's Office, and the collabora-

tion and assistance of other equally-dedicated public safety and law enforcement colleagues.

Between January and November 2017, the sheriff's deputies responded to a total of 17,033 incidents, an average 1,548 per month. December's numbers, not yet final, will bring the year's total close to 18,500. Since the population of the jurisdiction is also in the 18,000 range, the workload can be equated to one incident per every man, woman, and child in Benton County.

"To keep my word about being transparent," Knox said, "I want to inform and explain that sometimes there

are lag times in between calls and responses because of sudden life-threatening situations we have to respond to first."

Knox gave an example of a deputy on his way to respond to a call about vandalism who was interrupted by emergency calls three separate times. That was the reason he could not get to the scene of the first call as soon as the victim of vandalism expected.

Diana Marmino volunteers as a data analyst and gives 30 to 40 unpaid hours per week. She maintains a spreadsheet of monthly numbers and categories of incidents that the 12.5 full-

time road deputies respond to. The ".5" represents one deputy whose other half-time duties include court appearances and transporting inmates. She also serves as the training coordinator and serves the office in other vital functions.

The secretary Michelle Bruns, has responsibilities as jailer, administrative assistant, accountant and janitor!

For the Sheriff and deputies, besides the to-and-from the scene response times, following each incident they spend an average of 60 minutes or more completing the detailed, mandatory

Cole Camp Approves 5% Pay Raise

Under new business, Thursday evening December 21, Cole Camp City Board approved a 2018 salary raise, averaging about five percent for City employees, while also approving the City's 2018 budget. Visually Impaired Girl Sees World Through Ham Radio

Blind since birth, Kelly Stanfield of rural Lincoln didn't let her disability stop her from becoming a ham radio operator. Stanfield came to Benton County from Kansas and soon found a group of people who enjoyed talking on the airwaves like her-

self. She joined the Benton County, MO ARES and Twin Lakes Amateur Radio Club in August 2017. She attended meetings, contributed ideas and participated in weekly nets. She attained her General Class and then Extra Class licenses within a span of two months.

"I became interested in ham radio because my grandfather enjoyed it and he encouraged me as well," said Stanfield.

When Jim McNally and Rick Wade heard Stanfield had obtained her General Class license, they wanted to give her the ability to speak with people all over the world. They worked with members of the BC ARES to raise the funds needed to purchase a Kenwood TS-590s HF radio with a VGS-1 voice synthesizer board, and a Powerwerx 30 Amp power supply. An 80-10 meter di-

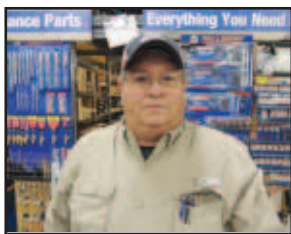



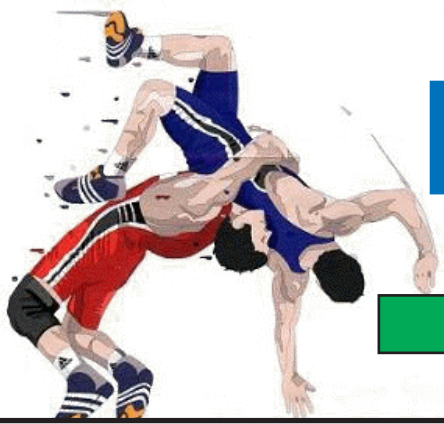

Warsaw Tames Buffalo Bisons

It was a game with some 12 lead changes, seven in the first quarter but a poor third quarter by Buffalo allowed the Warsaw Wildcats to break open a close game. The home win on Tuesday night of 71-62 put the Wildcats at 6-3 on the season.

In a high scoring first quarter with Warsaw leading 22-20 that Buffalo probably didn't do their homework as Matt Luebbert had ten after one and 19 at half. He would have 35 with some four

minutes to play but missed a couple of free throws and never scored again.

While Luebbert was showing his athletic skills, Logan Davis was running the floor and the offense Davis had 21 points on the night. Buffalo pressed sparingly. Teams that have beaten Warsaw have used the press as their main weapon over the past three years.

It was tied 34-34 at the half and the fouls had Buffalo in the lead at 11-5. Buffalo had an balanced attack with four players in double figures.

Warsaw led 55-38 after thee. However, Buffalo

would make a run behind the three point shooting of Freshmen Bode Abraham and Josph Pons to cut the lead to eight at 70-62. Layton Moody made a great play by stealing the ball from Luebbert and hitting his open team mate for a quick score.

Luebbert would pick up his fourth foul but Warsaw had matters well in hand.

Cole Branson, Warsaw's 6'5 center, was ill. He started but played sparingly.

Warsaw scoring was completed by Keegan Glenn with six, Lane Bates with 5 and Trey Palmer with four.

Warsaw's New Conference Ready To Merge

As some of you already know, Warsaw is leaving the tri-county conference after this season. However their new conference (Ozark Highlands) will have a short life. A new conference is being formed called the (Ozark Mountain Conference). The newly formed Ozark Highlands Conference, consisting of (Warsaw, Buffalo, Butler, Eldorado Springs, Sherwood, and Cole Camp {football only}) was slated to start in the fall of 2018.

However, there will be a merger of the remaining schools of the (Mid-Lakes Conference) (Skyline, Stratford, Fair Grove, Stockton, Clever, and Forsyth), which will take place in 2020/2021. There will be a north and south division, with the north comprised of (Skyline, Eldorado Springs, Warsaw, Butler, and Stockton). The south will be (Buffalo, Fair Grove, Stratford, Clever, and Forsyth). Schools will play each team in their division in all team sports, and all conference schools each year in basketball. Specific guidelines will be in place to determine conference champions in each team sports. There will also be an academic bowl competition beginning in 2020/2021.

Warsaw's Superintendent and President of the Ozark Highlands Conference, Shawn Poyser, the acting President of the Ozark Highlands Conference, commented "We are really excited about the new conference! There is strength in numbers, we have the ability to add schools, especially to the north. Schools in the Ozark Mountain Conference have strong traditions academically along with rich histories with extra and co-curricular activities. This move is better for our students and our patrons, as we compete against schools our size, and more in our geographic location".

Finally, Mr. Luebbert shared the 1st Semester Finals Schedule that will run

through this Thursday for WHS students.

Mrs. Beth Love, North/RME Principal informed the board of the recent Family Movie Night held last Friday at North Elementary.

Mrs. Cross, South Elementary Principal informed the board of the recent 2nd/3rd Grade Christmas program and that Santa will be visiting South Elementary this Thursday, December 21st. Mrs. Cross also shared encouraging recent Evaluate Testing Results in English Language Arts with the board.

Next, Dr. Shawn Poyser, Superintendent of Schools, updated the board on plans to share information, answer questions and survey faculty/staff on the January 2nd Professional Development Day, regarding the possibility of a 4-Day Week Calendar for 2018-19. Dr. Poyser commented, "After sharing information, answering questions and surveying the staff, if there is not at least a two-thirds majority in favor of further looking into the 4 Day Week we will not go any further and will go with a more traditional calendar."

If district staff is favorable, a survey of district parents and a panel of educators from other schools currently using the 4-Day Week Calendar will be assembled for a community forum to share information and answer questions from parents and the community.

Finally, Dr. Poyser shared information on the newly formed Ozark Mountain Conference of which Warsaw will be a member beginning next year. Dr. Poyser shared that he is excited about the schools that will be joining to form the conference and feels that the size of the schools and proximity for travel are optimal. The Ozark Mountain Conference will have a North and a South Division made up of approximately 5-6 schools in each division.

With no further business to discuss, the meeting adjourned at 7:41 pm.

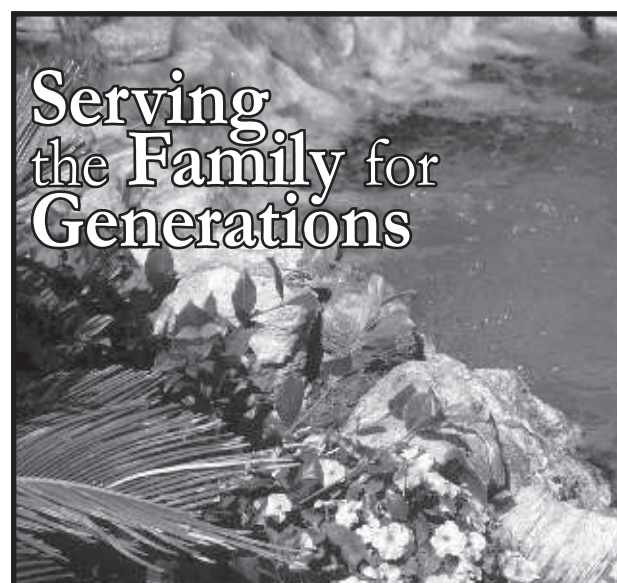

Time for New Year's Financial Resolutions

We've reached the end of another year- which means it's just about time for some New Year's resolutions. Would you like to study a new language, take up a musical instrument or visit the gym more often? All these are worthy goals, of course, but why not also add some financial resolutions?

Here are some ideas to think about:

- Increase contributions to your employer-sponsored retirement plan. For 2018, you can contribute up to \$18,500 (or \$24,500 if you're 50 or older) to your 401(k) or similar plan, such as a 403(b), for employees of public schools and some nonprofit groups, or a 457(b) plan, for employees of local governments. It's usually a good idea to contribute as much as you can afford to your employer's plan, as your contributions may lower your taxable income, while your earnings can grow tax-deferred. At a minimum, put in enough to earn your employer's matching contribution, if one is offered.

- Try to "max out" on your IRA. Even if you have a 401(k) or similar plan, you can probably still invest in an IRA. For 2018, you can contribute up to \$5,500 to a traditional or Roth IRA, or \$6,500 if you're 50 or older. (Income restrictions apply to Roth IRAs.) Contributions to a traditional IRA may be tax-deductible, depending on your income, and your earnings can grow tax-deferred. Roth IRA contributions are not deductible, but earnings can grow tax-free, provided you don't start taking withdrawals until you are 59-1/2 and you've had your account at least five years. You can put virtually any investment in an IRA, so it can expand your options beyond those offered in your 401(k) or similar plan.

- Build an emergency fund. Try to build an emergency fund containing three to six months worth of living expenses, with

the money held in a low-risk, liquid account. This fund can help you avoid dipping into your long-term investments to pay for unexpected costs, such as a new furnace or a major car repair.

- Control your debts. It's never easy, but do what you can to keep your debts under control. The less you have to spend on debt payments, the more you can invest for your future.

- Don't overreact to changes in the financial markets. We've had a long run of rising stock prices - but it won't last forever. If we experience a sharp market downturn in 2018, don't overreact by taking a "time out" from investing. Market drops are a normal feature of the investment landscape, and you may ultimately gain an advantage by buying new shares when their prices are down.

- Review your goals and risk tolerance. At least once in 2018, take some time to review your short and long-term financial goals and try to determine, possibly with the help of a financial professional, if your investment portfolio is still appropriate for these goals. At the same time, you'll want to re-evaluate your risk tolerance to ensure you're not taking too much risk - or possibly too little risk - with your investments.

Do your best to stick with these resolutions throughout the coming year. At a minimum, they can help you improve your investment habits - and they may improve your financial picture far beyond 2018.

Hard to believe that it is almost 2018, especially since I just got used to writing 2017 a few months ago. This year went by very fast indeed.

Since I have OCD, obsessive cooking disorder, and food is usually on my mind, I like to remember all the different foods I have eaten during the past year. It was a retro year in my kitchen, concocting many favorite old recipes from my family.

A standby was our **cuppa, cuppa, cuppa dip**, so named because it was easy to remember.

1 cup mayonnaise
1 cup shredded Swiss cheese

1 cup minced onion, important it is minced, not chopped

Preheat oven to 350, mix everything together, place in shallow 1 quart baking dish and bake until golden brown, about 20 minutes.

Serve with crackers or sliced bread.

And then the wrapped olives were always a hit.

36 small pimento-stuffed green olives, drained
3/4 cup all purpose flour
1/2 teaspoon paprika
1/4 teaspoon salt
4 tablespoons unsalted butter, softened
1 cup coarsely shredded cheddar cheese, room temperature

Preheat oven to 400

Combine flour, paprika and salt, then blend the butter and cheese together, add to flour and mix to make a smooth dough. Using a teaspoon of dough, shape into a ball, flatten in palm of your hand, and wrap olive, encasing it completely. Bake on baking sheet (I use parchment to keep them from sticking) 12-15 minutes or until dough is set.

Bacon is now really trendy but we must have been trendy in Northwest Missouri before our time since we used to make and eat a lot of these. (who doesn't like bacon?)

Candied Bacon Knots.
Vegetable cooking spray
1-1/2 cups packed light brown sugar
1-1/2 pounds thinly sliced bacon

Preheat oven to 350 degrees

First version
Place brown sugar in shallow dish, tie bacon into a loose knot, dip one side into brown sugar to coat well. Bake sugar side up until bacon is crisp and bubbly.

Second version
Honey or maple syrup instead of sugar

Tie bacon in loose knot, brush with honey or syrup, grind black pepper on top and bake.

Bacon wrapped water chestnuts

Oven preheated to 400 degrees

1/4 cup soy sauce
1 tablespoon brown sugar
1 can water chestnuts, drained
Thin slices bacon

Mix soy sauce, sugar until blended and sugar dissolves. Add chestnuts and let marinate for 15 minutes. Wrap each one with a slice of bacon, secure with a toothpick. Bake until bacon is nicely browned.

One of my favorites was and still is the **Oyster Stuffed Biscuits.**

Preheat oven to 425
Drain a can of smoked oysters. Take a can of refrigerated biscuits, cut each biscuit into quarters, roll out into 1/4 inch rounds. Completely wrap each oyster in the dough, bake seam side down until golden brown, about 10-15 minutes.

Smoked Oyster Dip was another favorite.

1 (8 ounce) package cream cheese, softened
2 tablespoons mayonnaise
1 teaspoon lemon juice
1/4 teaspoon garlic salt
Dash hot pepper sauce
Mix together then fold in
1 can smoked oysters
1/2 cup chopped ripe olive
I used to make my own pepper jelly to spread on

cream cheese. It's easy enough to find now, so it makes a handy to have 'on hand' treat.

paperwork.

"It takes about 4 hours to cover a DWI," Knox said. Traffic stops from January to November totaled 1733, and in the same period, careless and imprudent driving stops numbered 556.

The category with highest numbers for the period were 911 calls - 2,039. Fifty-three percent of those calls, 1081, ended in "hang ups". Nevertheless, a deputy was dispatched to the address or, if unknown, to the general area, to investigate.

"Probably 99 percent of 911 hang-ups do not involve a crime in progress," Sheriff Knox said, "but we respond because we don't want to ignore the one percent chance that someone's life is at stake."

Enhanced 911 (E-911) systems display a caller's address and phone number. In the event of a hang up, or an open line call where the connection is live but there is no audible response to the operator, deputies are dispatched and can most often locate the caller. Sometimes a person dials 911 by mistake, as happened 208 times as of November 30 this year. But repeated misuse - 119 separate events in the same period, is a Class B misdemeanor that may result in up to six months in jail and a fine up to \$1,000 (RSMo. 190.308).

Knox reminds that parents, and others, may not be aware that disabling a mobile phone, for instance, does not automatically disable the emergency dial feature. If the phone is On, even little fingers at random play can unwittingly generate a 911 call.

Dispatchers do more than receive phone calls. They are "...also short staffed... these folks who ride along with us in our patrol vehicles through radio contact, who share our experiences with each call. ... It takes a special person to be a dispatcher," wrote Sheriff Knox in his December 13 Facebook post.

Besides responding to 911 calls, between January and November, individuals called the Sheriff or a deputy directly for assistance 1,590 times.

Calls for response to animal abuse (96), animal control (357), and animals in the road (271) - all from January to November, rank fourth highest, with a combined total of 724. Fifth are responses to public and domestic disturbances involving physical and or verbal abuse - 632.

In addition to responding to crime-related calls, the Sheriff's Office has performed 611 well-being checks in the eleven months recorded so far. The least, 33 in January 2017, and the most, 74 in July equates to at least one every day of the month, every month of the year.

Of course, budget short-

falls are among the other challenges. The Sheriff's Office has faced hardships beyond the already well-known problem of the aged and deteriorating building that houses the jail. On the other hand, there have been some positives.

In May, commissioners approved the purchase of a Malinois, "K-9 Billy", for \$7,500. His photo hangs alongside all the other members of the office.

In late July, County Treasurer Renno notified the Sheriff and Commissioners that the first deposit of proceeds was made to the law enforcement account (from the one-eighth percent sales tax approved in November 2016 and implemented in April 2017). Prisoner board is one of the expenses authorized to be paid from this fund.

In September commissioners notified Sheriff Knox that HMN Architects had been selected for the new jail project. In October, Knox reported that \$11,342 had been raised from the community and that Friends of Benton County Sheriff's Office had raised an additional \$2,424 for body armor.

On the downside, however, the bat infestation problem in the Sheriff's Office attic reached crisis level in mid-June, increasing operating costs and creating health and safety problems that required closing off the second floor entirely. A five-year lease of offices in the downtown Hawthorn Bank was signed to provide new space for deputies who had to be relocated. A new ventilation system was installed for the jail in July at a cost of \$2,500. Thereafter, furnaces were cleaned in the old building where the sheriff and jail remain operating, and renovations began of the new office spaces in preparation for the deputies' move.

Recent follow up revealed more guano present than before, although at least 9,400 bats left the building through the exclusions installed this fall. Indefinite numbers remain.

The second floor was quarantined for health and safety reasons, yet operating from two different locations is less efficient. Chief Deputy Canfield, who also manages the vehicle fleet, walks back and forth between buildings several times a day. Good exercise,

but time-consuming when time is short.

In November, a near tragedy was averted when the lone jailer made a random check, just in time, on an inmate who had attempted to hang himself. The inmate was caught on camera, unconscious, with strips of bedsheet he had torn off and twisted into a noose around his neck.

Incidents like these justify Knox's request for additional jailers. He needs four additional deputies and a full-time investigator. However, he has asked for two additional deputies for the current time. (See the announcement posted December 8, 2017 on Facebook using the URL address above.)

An investigator would relieve each deputy from the substantial time spent - or that needs to be spent, to follow up his/her own cases - 469 in the first 11 months of 2017. Taking several hours from each new day's requirements to follow up pending cases is difficult at best, and sometimes impossible to do in a timely fashion.

The Sheriff has discussed his office's budget issues at Commissioner's meetings throughout the year. He said, Commissioner Jim Hanson stated the budget would have a \$400K shortfall if every office's requests were approved as submitted.

Treasurer Renno reported sales tax revenues up in February, slightly up in April and May, down in June. Commissioners amended the budget in July and again in September to cover extra expenses. Sales tax revenues were down again in November, but up in December. Knox presented his budget request to the commissioners for review on December 5.

In the meantime, all who work in the office continue to do their duty day by day. They thank everyone for their support thus far, and ask with high hopes that

they continue to "Support Your Local Sheriff!"
