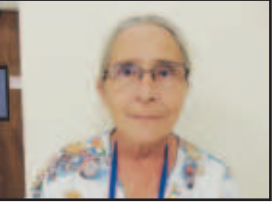

Then on Saturday, Breakfast with Santa was also a sell-out. "We planned for 150 but somehow we managed to feed 170," Cooner said.

decorated Christmas trees in the Community Building, the American Legion tree was picked as the winner with their Patriotic themed tree. The winning tree was selected by penny votes and the prize amounted to \$700.

Children were able to visit with Santa at the Community Building on Saturday. "It was definitely a packed house for Santa," said Cooner.

The Warsaw Community Cantata was held in the Community Building on Saturday with a huge crowd. "All the chairs on the gym

floor were full with many people sitting on the bleachers," Cooner said. "We had very positive feedback on having the Cantata in the Community Building. The talent of this community is amazing."

Deadline Looms For Health Insurance

This Friday, December 15 is the last day of the healthcare open season that began November 1. The Affordable Care Act, "Obamacare," is still the law of the land. Everyone, regardless of job status, must renew or sign up for minimum essential healthcare for 2018 or be

subject to a penalty, unless eligible for an exemption.

"Minimum essential" means that plans must meet 10 conditions, including outpatient and hospital care, preventive care, maternity and newborn care, prescription drugs, lab, rehab, mental health and substance abuse programs, etc., and pay 60 percent of covered charges.

Benton County residents with incomes between \$16,240 and \$64,960 who

have not yet done so may get help to enroll, or they may wish to complete the process themselves by going to <https://www.healthcare.gov>, referred to as the "Marketplace," i.e., a health exchange in each state that has one. Missouri has no state exchange; therefore, the federal exchange serves as its marketplace.

Note that Medicare Part A, or Medicare Parts A and B coverage meet the

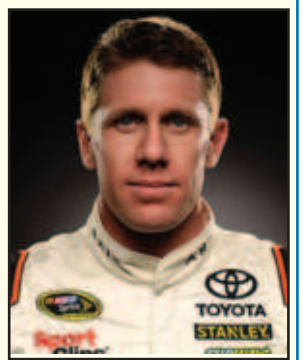

John Smith left Warsaw with Lois Jennings, a friend visiting from Kansas City, at 5 AM on Monday, November 27, for the drive to the VA Hospital in Columbia, MO where he had an appointment with an eye doctor at 8:30 that morning.

Traffic was heavy and moving fast, and he remembers deciding never again to take an early morning appointment.

They had the green light and were going through an intersection on Stadium Boulevard about three miles from the hospital, when they were hit from behind. The driver, without stopping, quickly drove

around him and sped off. The force of the impact moved Smith's car over concrete, bending both wheels and flattening both tires on the passenger side.

"I thought I was really in a mess," Smith said. "Not only was I going to miss my doctor's appointment, but to get the car fixed was going to cost more than money I had on me."

But then, not more than five minutes later, a young man wearing shorts, a T-shirt and tennis shoes stopped to help. Smith, a member of AAA, told the fellow he would need to call them,

MDC State Ornithologist Sarah Kendrick offers these CBC tips:

If you've never participated in a CBC, tell the organizer so they can place you with an existing team of birders.

Share your level of birding knowledge when you contact the CBC organizer so they can make sure you're with a team with the experience to properly identify birds seen or heard.

Dress warmly. Most CBCs will be held regardless of weather, unless inclement weather is dangerous.

Bring snacks to stay fueled for a long day.

MDC Encourages Audubon Christmas Bird Count

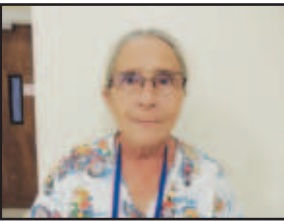
The Missouri Department of Conservation (MDC) encourages experienced birders to become citizen scientists by helping with the National Audubon Society's annual Christmas Bird Count (CBC) – including about 20 counts in Missouri.

Christmas Bird Counts are held annually between December 14 and Jan. 5 to gather data on winter bird populations and to track the long-term status of species and large-scale trends. More than 2,500 CBCs are coordinated by local Audubon chapters and experienced birders across the United States, Canada, Latin America, the Caribbean, and the Pacific Islands.

Each CBC has a coordinator that assigns portions of a 15-mile diameter count circle to participants to count all birds seen and heard.

Missouri hosts about 20 CBCs, including the following list. If interested in

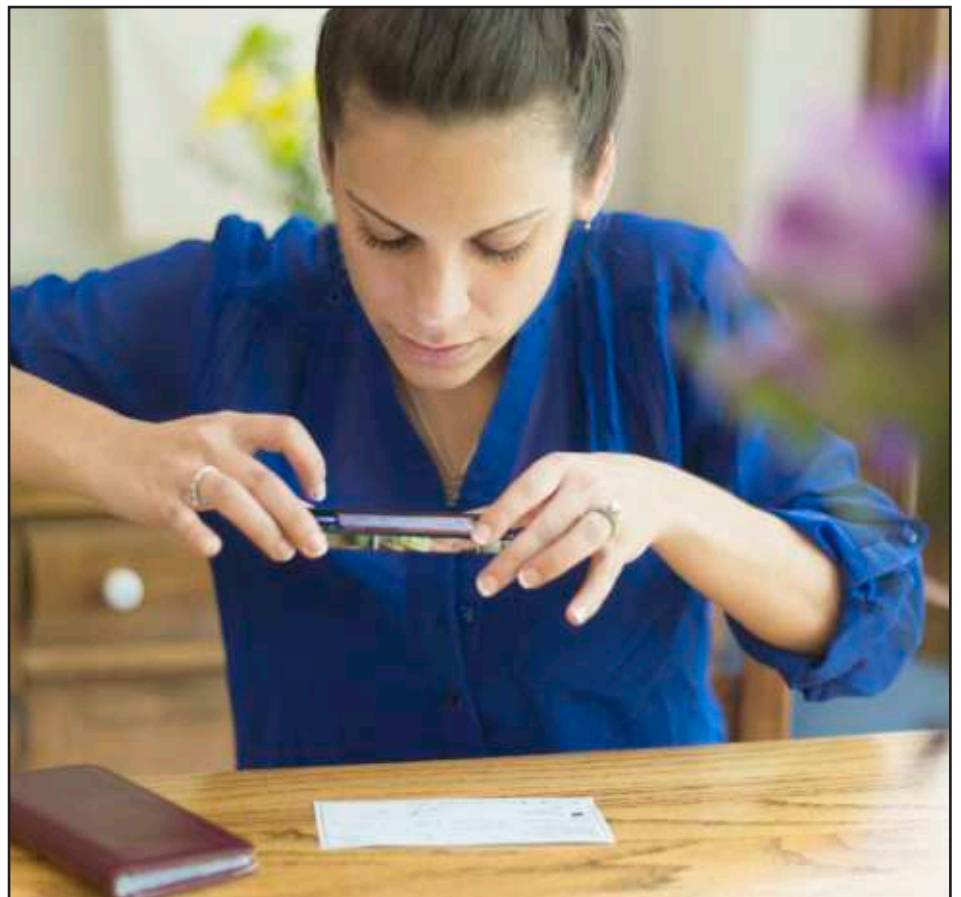

to have the WHS Band," Vorce said. "You just can't have a parade without a band."

People lined up for the horse drawn hayrides until almost 9 PM. Downtown merchants were also open late to accommodate all the Christmas visitors.

"It was wonderful how everyone worked together for a common goal," said Conner. "Several merchants told me that they had a steady flow of customers all day Saturday but the parade brought in even more business."

Cooner mentioned that Benton County Tourism, Benton County Human Service Council, the Ladies Auxiliary of the Knights of Columbus, the Warsaw Chamber of Commerce and the Warsaw Parks and Recreation department all worked together to pull off the expanded Christmas celebration.

Plans are already underway for next year's celebration which will remain the second weekend in December. "We are so excited about the turnout this year that we are planning for more people next year so we won't run out of food," Cooner said.

Vorce mentioned that he was pleased with the spirit of the various organizations which came together to make Christmas at the Harbor such a wonderful experience.

minimum essential mandate, but coverage under Medicare Part B alone does not. Recipients of qualifying Medicare cannot use the exchange.

Professional help is available from "assisters" and agents/brokers listed on the website whose offices are within a 45-mile radius of Warsaw. They have all been trained and certified or registered by the Marketplace. A difference between them is that while assisters must remain impartial while explaining plan options, insurance agents can give advice on which plan is in an applicant's best interest.

Assisters at Katy Trail Community Health of Harbor Village, 17571 North Dam Access Road, Warsaw are available to Benton County residents.

Although Suzie Brodersen of State Farm in Warsaw is a Marketplace-registered agent-broker, she belongs to an insurance alliance that does not offer products in Benton County; only in Hickory and two other counties.

There is another option for anyone who would like the advice of an insurance agent, but who does not have time or opportunity to call around or visit offices out of town to find one offering policies for Benton County. The "Get Contacted" link on the healthcare.gov home page takes the user to a Help on Demand request form to be filled out and submitted. For assistance from an insurance agent or broker, usually within 30 minutes, submit the form on weekdays between 9 AM and 5 PM. At this point, of course, it should be done right away.

"It is confusing and frustrating for most people,"

said Rachele Fiene, "to understand healthcare requirements." Fiene is an assister, and outreach and enrollment manager at Katy Trail Community in Sedalia who helps people understand their options for insurance on and off the exchange. For plans on the exchange, besides income level, family size affects the amount of assistance available as subsidy credits that offset monthly premiums.

Last year there were four, but this year insurance carriers have pulled out of the exchange, citing losses of millions in revenue and uncertainty about the future. Therefore, Benton County is left with fewer options for 2018.

Blue Cross-Blue Shield of Kansas City dropped coverage in 32 counties. While keeping group plans, it no longer offers direct pay plans. BCBS enrollees covered prior to October 2013, however, will remain so. But for new enrollments, BCBS will offer short-term plans only.

Only one insurer, Ambetter from Home State Health, will cover Benton County, offering five (5) choices among Bronze, Silver and Gold health plans, all EPOs that must be bought on the exchange. Only services from "exclusive provider organizations" are covered; consumers must pay 100 percent of charges by healthcare providers outside the limited network. A provider search on the healthcare.gov website will produce names of doctors and facilities within 200 miles of the zip code or location entered. Likewise, a prescription drug search for specific medications produces names of those covered under the five plans.

"Ambetter is adding providers daily," Fiene said, "so it is a good idea to call the providers directly to ask if they are on the covered list." For example, Katy Trail and Bothwell Family Medical clinics in Warsaw are in the Ambetter network. To date, however, Golden Valley Medical in Warsaw is not.

The exchange is not available for people whose incomes are lower than the exchange minimum or higher than the maximum. Fiene said earners of less than \$16,240 fall within the "Medicaid gap" and eligible for assistance from county and community health organizations. They can receive services on a sliding fee scale, with no monthly premiums but copays between \$25 - \$55. They can apply for financial plans for hospital expenses, and a program to help pay for medications for chronic illnesses, and \$4 prescriptions at Walmart. They are exempt from the penalty fees.

Fiene refers people who earn more than \$64,960 to private insurance companies. One of her contacts in Sedalia, Kim Horstman of Prueitt Insurance Services, said many higher income earners enroll in short-term (usually three-month) coverage plans and pay the penalties. Short-term plans do not meet the 10 minimum essential conditions or cover pre-existing conditions.

Another alternative to the marketplace exchange for people on lower incomes, the uninsured or underinsured, is the Public Health division of the Benton County Health Department.

Tammy Lawler said, "Where should I go?" is the question most people ask. She works with anyone who comes in or calls for assistance, whether to help them on site or to steer them to the right resources.

"Our primary concern is how to keep people in their homes and as healthy as possible," she said.

They provide services under Medicare, Medicaid, the VA, private insurance, donations and memorials. They offer reduced rates, such as tuberculosis shots for \$5.00 and children's immunizations at no cost. People come to the office for their pill and medication boxes to be set up every week. They help with the Women, Infants, and Children (WIC) nutritional supplement program for pregnant women, new mothers, infants and children up to 5 years old.

Latest census data shows approximately 15 percent of Benton County residents do not have health insurance. Some may be eligible for a penalty exemption based on one or more of the following: religious objection to receiving health insurance benefits; illegal immigrant; incarcerated; member of an Indian tribe; individual income in 2017 less than \$10,400; family income in 2017 less than \$20,800; paid more than 8.16 percent of income for health insurance after deductions, and employer contributions; or eligible for a hardship exemption.

Many are hopeful about the possibility that the healthcare law will change soon, or will go away entirely someday. But for now, for the county's 85 percent majority who need or want healthcare, the December 15 deadline is real, and nearer than ever.

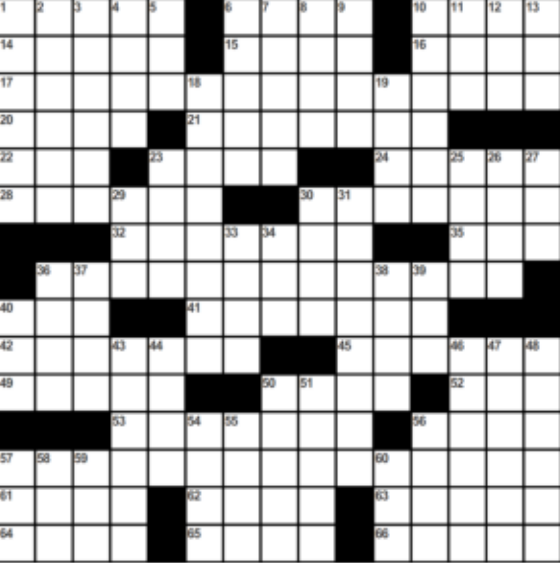

Main St.; (3) a bill providing for a 25 cent/hour raise to employees other than department heads; (4) a bill appointing Lauber Law Firm as City Attorney, and appointing Sean Pilliard as City Prosecutor. The group also heard a Benton County Tourism and Recreation update from Executive Director Lynette Stokes.

"I'll get you to the VA Hospital," he said, and indeed he did. Smith said everyone seemed to know the young man when they walked into the hospital.

In fact, he went along while Smith checked in, then sat with Jennings in the waiting room for the next two hours. She said they did not expect him to wait, but if he had not, they would have been stranded.

"I see you're here with a celebrity," Smith's eye doctor said. "That's Carl Edwards II, the NASCAR race driver!" Smith said he felt a little guilty then, because he did not recognize Edwards or even know much about NASCAR.

Edwards, whose home is in Columbia, MO, retired last year, ranking 4th among professional race drivers. Fans and promoters were hoping he would return, but the Sports Business Journal edition of September 18-24, 2017 reported that Edwards signed with ICM Partners to represent him exclusively in marketing, speaking, broadcasting, literary, acting, etc.

When Smith came out from the doctor's office, Ed-

wards told him and Jennings that he was taking them to his mother's house to wait until the car was fixed; that Edwards' brother was towing the car to a repair shop for new rims and tires. Shortly after introducing them to his mother, he left and that was the last Smith and Jennings saw of him.

His mother fixed sandwiches and coffee for the couple, and sat talking with them while they waited the next 3-4 hours. She was looking after her grandkids, and could not take them herself, but called a friend of hers who came to pick up Smith and Jennings to take them to the repair shop.

Another pleasant surprise! Everything is paid for; you owe nothing," said the mechanic. On top of that, Edwards had left a cell phone for them to take with them in case they had any problems on their way back home.

Obviously, Smith's day started out and ended up differently than expected. Usually he and Lois stop at the casino on their way home from a VA Hospital visit. But this time they decided to go straight home, concerned about Smith's little dog, Sam, who had been left inside for several hours. Thankfully, they found all was well when they returned home, and very happy to be there.

Smith and Jennings said the Edwards brothers and their mother are the nicest people they've ever met. He sent thank you cards to them all and will send Christmas cards as well.

Smith said this was not the first time good people have come to his rescue. In August 2008 Smith collapsed and died from a heart attack while at a Cancer Fund Dance. He is grateful for Lisa Keele and James Anderson who revived him through CPR, saving his life, he said, and arranged an airlift to the hospital where he had pacemaker and defibrillator implants.

"Somebody up there keeps looking out for me," Smith said, "I'm sure of that."

JONES (Continued from Page 1) ready to do so.

"But now that the paperwork is in, that's it," he said, matter-of-factly, "It's been a good run."

The chief talked about how his law enforcement

career began. He was born in Branson, MO. His family returned to Missouri from Louisiana in 1972 and settled in Warsaw. He had no plans or intentions to become a police officer, but he said the police chief at the time, Wilbur "Skipper" See, kept asking him "How old are you now? Come and see me when you're 21 and I'll make you a police officer."

See asked that question again in 1977 when Jones turned 21. "Go to Sedalia and buy a gun and holster," See told him, "then come back and get your uniform." So that's what Jones did, and how he became a reserve police officer, working weekends. His on-the-job training began when Chief See handed him the keys to a police car and sent him out on patrol.

Jones became a full-time officer with regular patrol duties in 1992. Since then he has held every rank, promoted from Corporal to Sergeant, then to Lieutenant until appointed Chief of Police in July 2004. His mentors were chiefs of police he had served with. He especially respected and admired Gary Friar, the police chief from July 1993 to December 2000 who then served as Benton County Sheriff for four years. Friar taught him how to handle everyday operations. He showed Jones by example how to build relationships and work well with people. They stayed close as co-workers and then as friends for the rest of Friar's life.

Jones' own words show that he has never focused only on getting "the facts," but on serving the community according to what he believes about relationships. Quoting from an article in the Enterprise on July 14, "Jones said his department's goal is to help people - to treat everyone with respect. They build good relationships in several ways. They respond to calls about animal pests overturning trashcans, help the elderly who have no one else to call on; and he personally likes to hand out toys and candy to the children playing in the neighborhoods."

Looking back over the past 40 years, Jones said, "The city has changed completely." Warsaw was largely a farm town where many people knew everyone else who lived and worked here. There was tourism before, yet since about 2000, there has been a large and steady influx of tourists.

The design of the city has changed; the enhancements at Drake Harbor are among the most dramatic changes. All this is a good thing for the city Jones said, at the same time personally, he misses the many people he knew for a long time who are now gone.

He remembers when patrol officers wrote their various reports in their cars on single sheets of paper; how hard and time-consuming it used to be to find files in the boxes of records. Having a typewriter used to be a great thing, Jones recalls.

Technology has changed everything for the better, but officers were skeptical at first. Now, with computerized databases they just click on the screen to retrieve documents online. Police wear body cameras and patrol cars are equipped with cameras as well. Videos from the car cameras upload electronically to the main computer whenever an officer returns and parks outside the station.

For all that, Jones said, "The main job is still helping people out. Real police work was never about kicking down doors or busting up people. It is about answering calls from whomever and responding to whatever the need is."

Christmas Day will find Jones, three days out of uniform, spending time with his family. Later, he plans to go fishing more often. An avid reader, he prefers "real life" stories about hunting, motorcycles, and civil and military history. Likewise, when he watches television, he prefers shows closer to reality, like "Cops, and "Forensic Files."

Jones has loved his job and his coworkers. Life in his hometown is rewarding because of the people he has come to know over the years. He was once the sole proprietor of a construction business, and he may go back to that. No doubt, he said, "I will find something to do because I cannot stay idle for long."

Mayor Simons received notice this week of Jones' retirement, and respects the chief's decision. "I am very grateful," Simons said, "and I personally thank Chief Jones for his 40 years of dedicated service; for being on call 24/7 all these years to fill a very important position."

The Mayor and alderpersons will begin the process to select a new chief of police at their next meeting

on Monday, December 18, 2017.

City officials and employees will host a retirement party for Chief Jones on December 22 in the Community Building. The Enterprise joins the mayor and the people of Warsaw to wish Chief David Jones a long, happy, healthy and adventurous new phase of life!

Cattlemen Push to Minimize Tax Burden on Farm Families

Missouri Cattlemen's Association (MCA) President-Elect Greg Buckman testified Tuesday, December 5, 2017, in Jefferson City, Missouri, at the Missouri Tax Commission's "Agricultural Land Productivity Hearing." The Commission is required by state statute to review farm and ranch productivity values every two years and are tasked with deciding whether or not to recommend an increase to the tax rate.

Buckman stated that MCA accepted an increase four years ago and was a leader in defeating the recommended 5 percent increase just two years ago. The association is aggressively pushing for no increase in 2019-2020, despite the formula presented at the hearing suggesting a 17 percent increase on crop ground and a 10 percent increase on pasture ground.

"I base my logic on reality and not on some formula created by state statute," said Buckman. "The reality is agriculture is the state's economic backbone - the single largest industry in the state. The beef cattle industry is a major player. The reality is Missouri Agriculture is an 88 billion dollar industry and there is a lot of room for growth."

Buckman told the Commission that one way to expand Missouri agriculture is to minimize the tax burden, which consequently creates an environment conducive to growth and expansion. He also noted such action would send signals to existing operators and beginning farmers and ranchers that Missouri is committed to advancing the state's number one industry.

MCA was joined by the Missouri Dairy Association; Missouri Corn Growers Association; Missouri Farm Bureau; and Missouri Pork Producers in testifying at the hearing. The Commission will convene on December 20, 2017, to decide what it will recommend to Missouri's General Assembly. Any recommendation by the Commission will be subject to an up or down vote by legislators and does not need the Governor's signature.

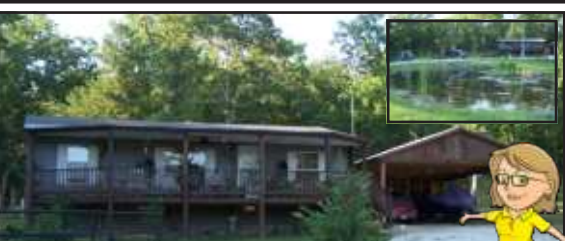

ALTERNATIVE FORAGES

WARSAW, Mo. — Missouri beef producers are fortunate in that dozens of forage species can be grown in pastures and hay fields. The temptation is to be looking for some new, magic forage or potion that will improve forage productivity without the producer doing anything to change their management techniques. Unfortunately, most of these magic forages disappoint at some level. So, how should producers go about selecting forage types and varieties to improve their pastures and hay fields?

In true Extension fashion, I have come up with several questions that producer's need to ask when looking at forage options for their operation. This is not an all-inclusive list, but is intended to get the thought process started.

One starting place is to figure out if forage issues can be solved by changing how the current forage inventory is managed. Can improvements be made in grazing management, fertilizer management, or haying management? Are livestock production management changes possible and will they be helpful? What is the current level of forage management skill? Can new forage management skills be learned and implemented?

Assuming a new forage type can be properly managed, what determines which forage or forages are selected? The following questions come to mind.

When is forage needed? What level of forage quality is needed? What is affordable for both establishment and maintenance of the new forage? Is tillable land available? Does the farm infrastructure exist to manage different forage crops and if not, what will be the cost to bring the infrastructure up to speed? Is there independent research data on the forage being considering?

Alternative forages may include the addition of cover crops into the forage system or renovation of existing tall fescue with one of the newer novel endophyte tall fescue varieties.

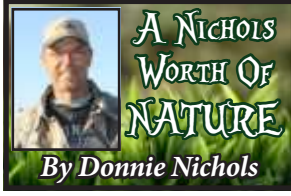
In the case of cover crops, water availability and fencing are two of the most important issues to figure out. Then consider when and how the forage will be utilized. Determine if the goal is fall grazing, spring grazing, or spring hay or haylage harvest. Then select cover crop species that meet agronomic and livestock production goals.

If complete renovation of existing tall fescue stands is desired, begin the process well in advance of the expected seeding date. Soil test and amend as needed. Spring seedhead suppression of existing fescue is recommended. Determine which renovation process to utilize, and follow the recommended steps for that particular process.

As mentioned previously, there are literally dozens of annual and perennial forage crops that can be incorporated into a sustainable forage production system. Many times, the success or failure of these crops boils down to following simple, proven management practices. Select forage crops that fill voids in your current forage system and have a proven track record of

production and management requirements. Then follow those management guidelines.

If you hunt deer, raise a garden, have flowers in your yard, travel in a vehicle or just like to watch them, you are affected by deer and there is a change coming to Missouri's deer herd.

Missouri ranks high in the top 10 states in the nation for deer hunting. Our estimated population is 1.2 million animals. With over 520,000 deer hunters spending over \$1 billion annually, it is a tremendous boost to our state and local economies. Unfortunately, with the discovery of Chronic Wasting Disease (CWD) in deer at big game breeding and hunting facilities in Macon County in 2010-2011 and in free ranging deer (Macon County) in 2012 we have entered a game changing era for our deer population.

CWD is a neurological disease in cervids (deer family). It is caused by misshaped proteins called "prions" which result in degeneration of brain tissue, slowly leading to death. There is no vaccine or cure. It kills 100% of infected animals. CWD is transferred from deer to deer by direct contact and through feces, urine, saliva, contaminated soil, food and water and infected deer carcasses. Potential for transmission increases when deer are more concentrated in an area. It can take months or years for deer with CWD to show symptoms and can spread while they appear healthy, but it is always fatal.

Researchers do not know the origin of CWD. It was first found in a captive mule deer research facility in Colorado in the 1960s. In the 1980s, CWD was documented in Colorado's wild deer herd. It has since spread to almost two dozen states with devastating results in some areas. CWD is impossible to eliminate once established.

The Missouri Department of Conservation (MDC) has set up CWD management zones designating counties where cases of CWD have been confirmed and about 25 miles of where cases have been found. Starting in 2012, MDC implemented mandatory sampling stations within CWD management zones. Currently there are 41 counties included. Prior to the 2017-2018 deer season there have been a total of 42 positive CWD samples: 10 in Adair County, 1 in Cole County, 4 in Franklin County, 1 in Jefferson County, 1 in Linn County, 23 in Macon County and 2 in St. Clair County.

To date, during our 2017-2018 deer season, there have been 14,117 tissues samples taken. At present, 2,298 samples have

been tested (it often takes 4 weeks or more for results) there has been one positive hit for CWD and it was from St. Clair County. This deer was taken one section north of where two positive samples were taken last year. There are 212 more samples from within a five mile radius where this animal was taken yet to be tested.

There are few management options for CWD control. Missouri's efforts to limit CWD closely follows Wisconsin's model to remove deer in hotspots where CWD is known to exist.

In an effort to prevent the spread of CWD the Wildlife Code of Missouri now states: "placement of grain, salt products, minerals and other consumable natural and manufactured products used to attract deer is prohibited year-round within the CWD management zone." There are three exceptions: 1) feed can be placed within 100 feet of

any residence or occupied building, 2) feed placed in such a manner to reasonably exclude access by deer, 3) feeding minerals present solely as a result of normal agriculture or forest management or crop and wildlife food production practices.

Many biologists I know, along with myself, feel that exception number one should be eliminated. It will

certainly result in transmission of CWD where present.

Time to Review Your Investment Strategy for the Year

As the year draws to a close, it's a good time to review your progress toward your financial goals. But on what areas should you focus your attention?

Of course, you may immediately think about whether your investments have done well. And one change certainly happened this past year; you moved one year closer to retirement. Whether it is the performance of your portfolio or changes in your life, you will find that you always have some reasons to look back at your investment and financial strategies for one year - and to look ahead at moves you can make for the next.

I just about always love potatoes, but when the weather turns cold, I really want potatoes. The following is a quick and easy way to dress up tater tots, because even professional cooks love and use frozen potatoes.

- 5 cups frozen tater tots
- 1/2 cup olive oil
- Salt and pepper
- 1 to 2 tablespoons crushed garlic (using fresh crushed garlic really adds to the

flavor)
1/4 cup chopped flat leave parsley (also called Italian, the flat leaf type has much more flavor than curly)

Parmesan cheese, grated, about 1/2 cup
Preheat oven to 400 degrees

Toss the tots with the olive oil, spread on baking sheet until brown and crisp, about 30 minutes.

Remove from oven, toss with salt and pepper, then toss with garlic, parsley and cheese.

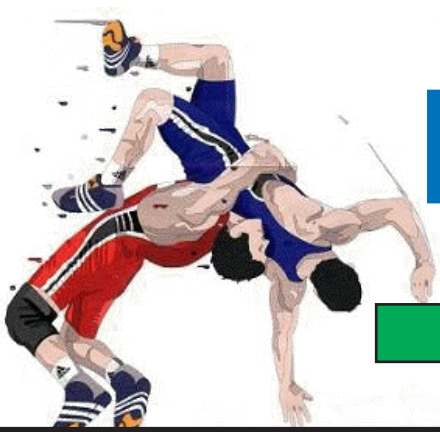

Cattlemen Push to Minimize Tax Burden on Farm Families

Missouri Cattlemen's Association (MCA) President-Elect Greg Buckman testified Tuesday, December 5, 2017, in Jefferson City, Missouri, at the Missouri Tax Commission's "Agricultural Land Productivity Hearing." The Commission is required by state statute to review farm and ranch productivity values every two years and are tasked with deciding whether or not to recommend an increase to the tax rate.

Buckman stated that MCA accepted an increase four years ago and was a leader in defeating the recommended 5 percent increase just two years ago. The association is aggressively pushing for no increase in 2019-2020, despite the formula presented at the hearing suggesting a 17 per-

cent increase on crop ground and a 10 percent increase on pasture ground.

"I base my logic on reality and not on some formula created by state statute," said Buckman. "The reality is agriculture is the state's economic backbone - the single largest industry in the state. The beef cattle industry is a major player. The reality is Missouri Agriculture is an 88 billion dollar industry and there is a lot of room for growth."

Buckman told the Commission that one way to expand Missouri agriculture is to minimize the tax burden, which consequently creates an environment conducive to growth and expansion. He also noted such action would send signals to existing operators and beginning farmers and ranchers that Missouri is committed to advancing the state's number one industry.

MCA was joined by the Missouri Dairy Association; Missouri Corn Growers Association; Missouri Farm Bureau; and Missouri Pork Producers in testifying at the hearing. The Commission will convene on December 20, 2017, to decide what it will recommend to Missouri's General Assembly. Any recommendation by the Commission will be subject to an up or down vote by legislators and does not need the Governor's signature.

Recorder Beverly Burnett met with the Commission to submit her 2018 budget request; this included the budget for the Recorder User Fund.

Bob Berkhoff met with the Commission to discuss conditions of Hastain Bridge.

Rodney Meyer, representative of the Senior Citizens Service Tax Fund Board, met with the Commission to discuss this county entity and recommended the reappointment of Janice Sweargin and Dale Bacon to this Board. Meyer noted that there is a vacant seat on this Board due to the resignation of Shirley Robb.

District 2 Commissioner Jim Hansen made a motion to reappoint board members Janice Sweargin and Dale Bacon to the Benton County Senior Citizens Service Tax Fund Board. The motion passed.

District 1 Commissioner Dale Jr. Estes made a motion to accept the bid from Zollicker Oil Company for Road District #1 for red diesel fuel at a cost of \$2.17 per gallon. Motion passed. The other bid received was from Warsaw Oil Company at a cost of \$2.25 per gallon.

Robert Jones met with the Commissioner to discuss conditions of a road adjacent to Mockingbird Hill.

Friday, December 1, marked the first day legislators in both chambers of the MO General Assembly could pre-file bills for the upcoming session. House Speaker Todd Richardson issued the following statement on the first day of pre-filing: "We came to Jefferson City to get results for Missouri families, and that's what we're going to do. We're taking action on important issues. Members of the House have filed bills today that increase educational opportunities, improve economic growth, and cut burdensome regulations and barriers to innovation." I have pre-filed bills with language including the repeal of prevailing wage, the MO Veterans' Heritage

Protection Act, and outdoor advertising exemptions. It looks like it is going to be a very busy session, because almost 300 bills have been pre-filed already amidst the 163 representatives.

I attended the Missouri Farm Bureau 103th Annual Meeting on Monday, and members were informed of proposed policies and recommendations on many issues including: 1) "MFB urges the Department of Elementary and Secondary Education to support public education that is accessible to all children in the State of Missouri; 2) MFB believes the Davis-Bacon Act, which requires payment of union scale wages on any construction project that is being paid for in whole, or in part, from Federal funds, should be repealed. It is in the best interest of all concerned, especially the taxpayer, that projects con-

structed in the public interest be awarded on a competitive bid basis with no restrictions as to wage rates paid. We oppose MO's "Prevailing Wage" law for the same reasons. We support exempting projects in 3rd Class counties from MO's prevailing wage law; and 3) MFB supports the preservation of all grave sites, historical sites, and historical monuments" celebration and join us for refreshments following the concert.
