

Beth Drake will be working as well at her establishment Osage Mini Mart.

'I've worked every Thanksgiving for as long as I can remember so this one won't be any different."

"Thanksgiving is the most traveled holiday so people will need gas," Drake said.

Osage Mini Mart will be open regular hours on Thanksgiving from 6 am until 11 pm.

"My mom will have dinner with us either on Saturday or Sunday," Drake said. "My children do the cooking I just supply the turkey."

Drake commented Osage Mini Mart will be closed on Christmas Day. "That is the only day we close," Drake said.

Of course, the local Warsaw/Lincoln Ambulance crews will be working during the Thanksgiving holiday. Paramedic crew chief Kerry Keys will be working Thanksgiving as well as the day after.

'We work on 48 hour shifts so we won't be off until Saturday," Keys said. While the 6 person crew will be at the Ambulance Center during the holiday, they will not be without a Thanksgiving meal.

"Our administrator makes sure that we have the ingredients for a Thanksgiving meal but we fix the meal ourselves," Keys said.

The meeting opened in regular session at 7 PM November 16, with Alderpersons Wayne Karman, Earlene Oglevie, Eric Hoke, Bob Meuschke present. Mayor Burton Bormann presided; City Clerk Amie Dieckman recorded. First actions by this group were to approve the evening's agenda and minutes of the October meeting, then agree to pay bills presented.

Under old business, the group discussed a proposed ordinance modifying the City's Funeral Leave policy. "If it ain't broke, don't fix it," was the prevailing mood among Cole Camp Alderpersons, as debate over a proposed "fix" to the City's Funeral Leave policy got underway. The issue was brought about because of a concern relating to City employee Roy Wagner, who reportedly attends a number of military veteran funerals each year, as part of an honor guard ceremony. No one criticized his presence at such events; all applauded his dedication to duty. Randy Healan, with American Legion Post 305, spoke against the proposed ordinance, which died from lack of support.

Under new business, Rex Smarr, with Mike Keith Insurance, discussed a proposed renewal of City Property/Liability Insurance for 2018, with an approximate increase of about \$2,000, due mostly to an additional

PW Director Bohling said a new and more accurate water tower gage has been purchased at \$4,178. He added PW has been winterizing City properties. Alderwoman Oglevie reported that some Parks equipment has been received and should now be erected.

The meeting closed about 8:05 PM, to go into executive session on a personnel matter. These meetings are usually held on 3rd Thursdays; visitors are welcome.

Raising Chickens

Since beginning my venture into the wonderful world of raising chickens, I have discovered the dreaded predators of the woods. raccoons! I wanted to raise just enough chickens to keep the family with all the eggs we wanted. I started out with six little chickens which I raised. The grandchildren loved the chickens and liked to help me water and feed them every morning. In fact the chickens became more like pets and the boys especially enjoyed chasing them. My problem was that we somehow had raised all roosters. It is hard to tell when they are chicks so even though we were fond of the roosters, I traded with some friends to get a few hens. Now we were in business.

Not only did the chickens supply us with eggs, I enjoyed talking to them and petting them while they sat on my lap and we watched the sun set. The morning I went to the chicken house to discover a predictor had invaded the chicken house during the night and killed all my sweet chickens, I was literally heartsick. My hubby had to take care of cleaning up the mess because I just couldn't face the carnage.

After a great deal of soul searching I decided to try again. My hubby helped me secure the chicken coop and I found some chickens for sale on the internet and I bought some more chickens. I wasn't as attached to these chickens but I started getting eggs and I started talking to the new chickens. Then it happened again! I went out one morning and all the chickens were dead. The raccoon didn't even eat all the chickens but he killed

them all.

Now I was mad! My sonin-law came over and put a roof over the top of the chicken wire. I set a trap inside the chicken coop and the next day there was a raccoon sitting in the trap. Again we secured the coop and I set the trap again. Another raccoon was sitting there staring at me as I walked into the chicken coop. When I finally thought the coop was secure my son-in-law set up a camera to record what happened at night and that night we caught a possum. The film revealed several possums came in the coop but only one was caught in the trap.

My hubby helped me install another round of chicken wire around the chicken coop and when no predators showed up for several days I decided it was safe enough to get some more chickens. Now I had one chick coop for the six chickens and a duck that we raised from babies and I bought a few grown chickens from a farmer near Sedalia which I put in the big coop.

I was afraid to let the chickens out of the enclosed chicken area so I fed and watered them inside the coop and I watched for raccoons and possums. One night I woke up and thought I heard something outside so I threw on my robe and went out to the chicken house and sat on a stump waiting for those sleazy animals to come out of the woods. I have never fired a gun in my life so instead I took the leftover Roman candles from the Fourth of July. Every time I hear something move in the woods I would light up a Roman candle and shoot it into the woods. I sat out there until the sun started to come up when I ran back in the house afraid that someone might see me sitting on a stump

near the chicken coop with several Roman candles and a package of matches.

As time has passed, I have become a little more relaxed and I allow the chickens out during the day but I make sure that the door is locked as soon as the sun goes down. The chickens all go into the coop and prepare for the night so all I have to do is lock and secure the door. However, one night when I was in Sedalia with Granddaughter #1 I realized it was getting dark and I hadn't closed the chicken coop. I quickly called my hubby and asked him to go out to shut the door to the coop. He reluctantly went out to the coop armed with a flashlight only to discover two raccoons in the coop. Thankfully, no damage had been done and the raccoons ran away as soon as my hubby flashed them with the light.

Anyway, having fresh eggs is harder than you might think and making your chicken pets can be dangerous as you can have your heart broken. Still the grandchildren enjoy helping me feed and water my little flock and they all know that eggs come from chickens not the grocery store.

- Snack on Fruit. One cup of blueberries, for example, has seven grams of natural sugar to satisfy your sweet tooth, but the fruit also comes with fiber to help you feel full and slow the breakdown of the sugars, so you don't crave more calories soon after eating it.
- Bake with Applesauce. Eating fewer baked goods is sure to reduce your sugar intake, but when the occasion calls for you to make a cake, replace a third of the sugar in the recipe with an equal amount of unsweetened applesauce. For a delicious no-sugar added applesauce recipe, visit leaf.nutrisystem.com/recipes.

• Eat Right and Often. When you're hungry, you crave calories and that too often leads to sugary snacking. Reduce between-meal munching by eating healthy, filling foods four to six times a day. Programs like Nutrisystem provide portion-controlled meals and snacks throughout the day, giving you the structure you need to eat right.

Next week we will talk about rebounding. Don't miss it.





Tempus fugit... Thanksgiving is upon us, so without any bloviating, here is one of my favorite bar recipes.

Congo Bars

11 Tablespoons unsalted

- 1 pound light brown sugar 3 large eggs
- 2-3/4 cups all-purpose flour 2-1/2 teaspoons baking
- powder
 - ½ teaspoons salt 2 cups semi sweet

chocolate chips 1 cups walnuts or pecans (first toasted) and chopped

Preheat oven to 325 Butter a 10 x 15 x 1 inch

baking pan (jelly roll type) In a large bowl, mix butter, brown sugar, and eggs, making sure to break up any lumps of brown

In a separate bowl, sift together the flour, baking powder and salt. Mix the dry ingredients into the egg mixture, then stir in chocolate chips and nuts.

Spread the batter into the pan as evenly as possible. It will be sticky, use your fingers to pat it out.

Bake for about 20 minutes or until deep golden brown. Remove from the oven, let cool a few minutes, cut into bars while still warm.

I think these slightly improve after a day in an air tight container stored at room temperature.

The Missouri Adoptee Rights Act, which takes effect on this date, may allow Missouri-born adoptees, ages 18 and older, access to a copy of their Original Birth Certificate. It is estimated that this new law will affect hundreds of thousands of adult adoptees.

G's Adoption Registry, a non-profit 501(c)(3), will be hosting an event called Breaking the Seal at the Capitol Plaza Hotel in Jefferson City from December 31, 2017, to January 2, 2018, when adopted adults will begin receiving their information.

On October 1, 2017, the Department of Health and Senior Services began accepting applications from all Missouri-born adoptees who wish to request a copy of their Original Birth Certificate. According to the revised law, copies of Original Birth Certificates may be released beginning January 2, 2018. Adoptees born prior to 1941 may receive them now.




