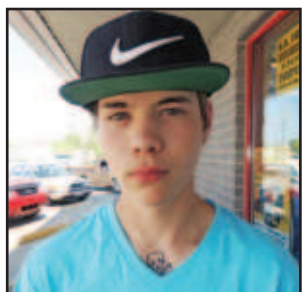

Danny Morrison Named WHS Principal

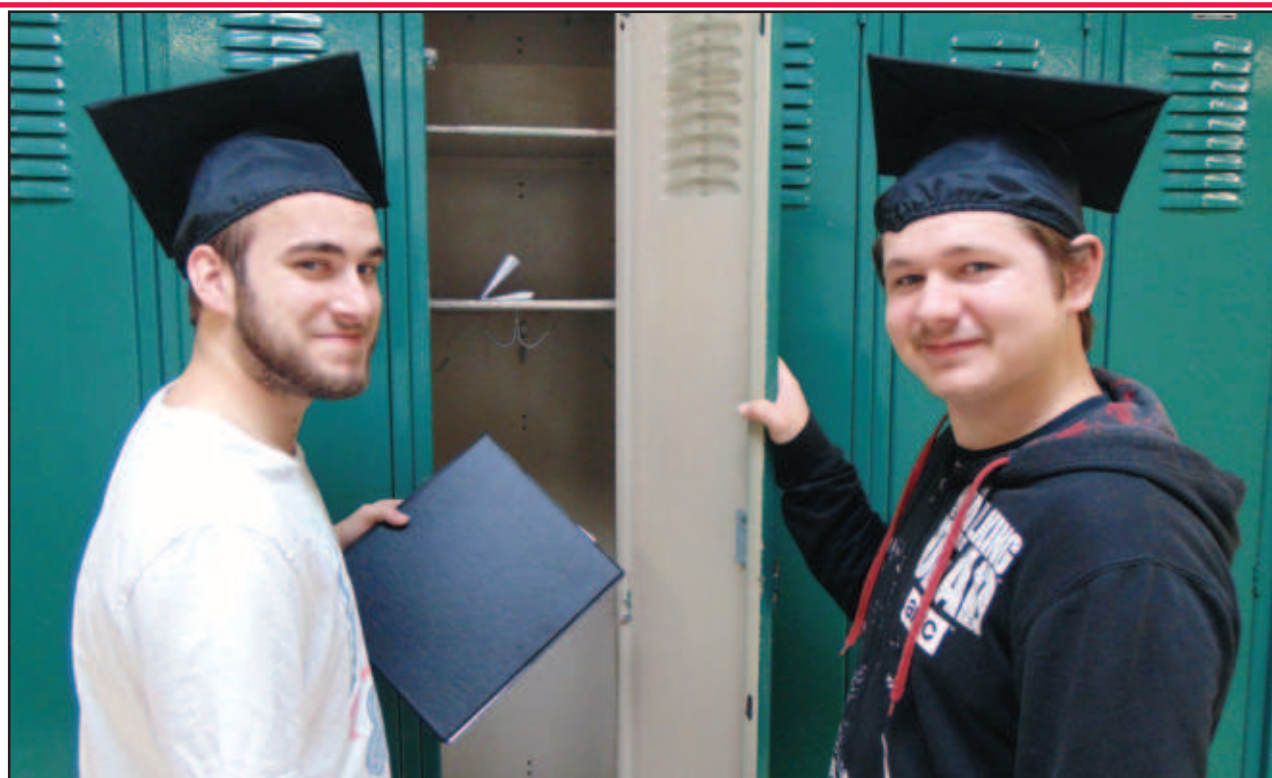

The Warsaw R-IX Board of Education voted at their April meeting to hire Danny Morrison as the Warsaw High School Principal for the 2018-19 school year.

Morrison, who has served as the WHS Assistant Principal this year, is a 1998 graduate of WHS. After graduating from WHS, Morrison attended the University of Central Missouri where he completed his Bachelor of Education degree in physical education and health. He was hired by the Lincoln R-II School Board as a high school and junior high physical education teacher. He was also the head football coach as well

A Woman In Blue- Warsaw's Newest Female Police Officer

"There really was a lot to take in," Officer Chasady Botteron said about her first day of duty with the Warsaw City Police. "I was shown so many things during that first day, I asked myself, what have I gotten into?"

Yet, after only about two months, Botteron seems to

have found her niche. Chief Jason Wenberg said "Botteron was the best qualified of the two candidates we interviewed in late January," and since joining the department on February 26, "she is doing very well."

Botteron is Warsaw's first female police officer since Nikki Ehlers vacated the position. The same Jason Wenberg, now the chief of police, filled that vacancy when he joined the department 12 years ago. Ehlers

became a deputy sheriff and is currently the court bailiff.

Uniforms are customized for each officer; they use the men's and women's public restrooms, so no additional or special gender-based accommodations have been necessary. The rapport among all the officers is good.

Botteron grew up and went to elementary and high school in Windsor. She attended State Fair College

Derenda Miller of Warsaw, was taken aback on April 28th when she discovered a huge swarm of honey bees attached to a tree in her front yard. She thought there were at least 10,000 and found out later that there were many more. She called a friend of hers who had bees and asked what she

should do. The friend sent her husband, Keith Johnson, a member of the Benton County Honey Bee Swarm Rescue and Removal group, over to harvest the swarm.

"It was amazing to watch," said Miller. "Keith didn't have any protective clothing except some latex gloves, and he put his hand into the swarm with no harm done. He said that the bees swarm when they are looking for a new home and since they have no baby bees, or hive to

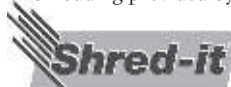

Come to the Warsaw High School Ag Building between 8 a.m. & 3 p.m. or call 660-438-2427. Kewpies Exhibit On Display At Warsaw Library

Through the month of May, a large window display at the Warsaw branch of the Booneslick Regional Library will chronicle the life and work of Rose O'Neill, renowned illustrator and "mother of the Kewpies". From 1894 until her death in 1944, Rose lived intermittently at her home deep in the Ozark hills near Branson. The family homestead, named Bonniebrook, is now the location of a museum and gallery of fine art produced by Rose, and her home is open for tours.

Cynthia Bolinger of rural Warsaw is the member of the Bonniebrook Historical Society who designed the display. She wants area residents to learn more of the life of this amazing woman. Mrs. Bolinger says, "Rose O'Neill was such a talented woman who lived an exciting life. I want people to come visit her home and walk next to the babbling brook and appreciate the beauty of Bonniebrook that is so near to us yet so little known by many."

Rose was born in 1874 just 10 years after the Civil War. Her outstanding talent made it possible for her to live a life much different from other women of her time. Her talent was first publicly recognized at age 13 when she won a drawing contest. Her artistic expressions included producing hundreds of illustrations for novels and commercial magazine covers. Her work was much admired by Thomas Hart Benton who called her "the best illustrator in the world". She published novels and poetry, studied sculpture with Rodin in Europe, and after becoming a millionaire was a friend and financial benefactor of countless artisans when she lived in New York City and later at her mansion in Westport, Connecticut.

She was an original—not following the norms of the day. At age 19, when most young women were contemplating marriage, she was living in a convent in New York City showing her portfolio to magazine editors. She was married twice and divorced twice and had no children yet she

supported her parents and 5 siblings throughout her life. While others were wearing tight corsets, she wore long, loose-fitting "auras" of fine fabrics. While most never left their home area, Rose traveled the world. Her illustrations provided a steady income, but it was her comic strip of the Kewpies and the Kewpie dolls which made her world famous and wealthy. While she enjoyed drawing her joyful Kewpies, she also found pleasure in drawing her "sweet monsters". Over one hundred of her sweet monsters series were shown in Paris, France in 1921. Her show was so successful that it was held over.

To learn more about Rose O'Neill and Bonniebrook, visit the display at the library and go to the website www.roseoneill.org. Several books have been written about Rose, including her own autobiography. Now through August 5th, the Springfield Art Museum is featuring a major exhibit about Rose entitled "Frolic of the Mind: The Illustrious Life of Rose O'Neill". If you are in New York City, visit the New York City Historical Society's Women's History Center featuring Rose's involvement and artwork to support the Vote for Women. David O'Neill, Rose's nephew runs an amazing small museum in Springfield named simply the Rose O'Neill Museum of Springfield at 4414 Lone Pine, Springfield. See the website for more information.

(Continued from Page 1) protect, they have no reason to sting. The whole procedure of transferring the bees into a nuc box for transfer to a new home only took about 45 minutes. The helper bees made a ladder so others in the swarm could go into a hole in the nuc box. It was the coolest experience. The bees were crawling over me and I wasn't afraid. They emitted a lemon scent that their glands produce to entice other bees to join their swarm."

Miller said that Johnson found an old hive in the tree that the bees were leaving for the purpose of starting a new hive. The bees usually take everything they need from the old hive which is necessary to start a new hive. She said that she is now a great admirer of bees and glad they can be rescued instead of exterminated because they have an important purpose.

"I learned that queens are born first," said Miller. "They hatch after four days and become pupae. Then after a total of 16 days after they are laid, they are queens. Worker bees take 21 days to become their destined form of bee."

Keith Johnson and his friend Matt Corpening are honey bee hobbyists who have been interested in the insects for many years. They recently put together a Facebook page called Benton County Honey Bee Swarm Rescue and Removal to "spread awareness of the importance of honey bees." They know that the swarm season is upon us and want people to know that if someone happens to come across a swarm of honey bees, he or she can contact Johnson or Corpening at any time so they can try and relocate the bees to a safe place. The two men would also like to eventually band together with other local beekeepers and enthusiasts in the area. Hopefully by doing this they can help each other to more effectively manage honey bee colonies.

"In addition to the swarm in Derenda Miller's yard, we had another call early in May about a swarm that had clustered in a ball around the queen and answered the call for help," said Corpening. "We had a pre-made box with frames and honeycomb and just sat it next to them. Sometimes people will lay down a trail of honey leading to the nuc box. When they swarm, they are looking for a new home. They eat all the honey in the old hive and are swelled up and big as they look for their new home. We like to rescue a swarm, place it in a hive box and give it a new place to call home. Sometimes we can split the swarm into two hives. We sometimes use a swarm to boost the population of another hive. I take some of the swarms that

I rescue to some land that belongs to my father in the northern part of the county. Like many bee enthusiasts, my experience is passed down through generations. I also took a course on bee keeping. I have been rescuing bee swarms for five years, and Keith has been in the business a year."

Corpening said that he only works with honey bees, and that there are three kinds in Missouri including Italian, Carniolan and Russian honey bees.

"I started beekeeping last year when a swarm showed up on April 12, 2017, in my back yard," said Johnson. "I called my neighbor, Matt Corpening, and he helped me collect the swarm. The new hive has been successful and I have expanded my numbers. I did a 'cut out' for a farmer out of the county who had called an exterminator, but found that it would cost him \$500 to kill the bees, but they would still be in his building. I told him not to kill the bees - and that I would get them. I brought home these swarming bees and extended my apiary. A friend who is a master beekeeper said the 'cut out' that I did was a very advanced project for me. I had four hives going into this last winter and lost one colony. Since the winter, I have rehomed the swarm in Warsaw, and my youngest daughter and I went to Harrisville and brought home another swarm. I am doing a mating nuc which involves a small colony of honey bees. I initially thought that I would teach after retiring from my current (day) job, but now think I would like to do beekeeping. They are fascinating to me, and are an escape from reality."

Johnson said he wants to promote the coalition of beekeepers who might be available to help rescue swarms and give them a better chance at survival. He said the bees who are on their own have about a 40 to 50 percent chance of survival. When they are rescued and placed in a safe place their survival chances rise.

According to www.sustainweb.org, globally there are more honey bees than other types of bees and pollinating insects, so they are the world's most important pollinators of food crops. Local honey is also said to be good for wound healing and help for allergies, but not good for babies under the age of one year.

Until a time when a contact portion is added to the Facebook page for the honeybee group, those who need help with rescuing a swarm of honey bees may call 660-723-3146 and Johnson or Corpening will do what they can to help. It is also possible to call the dispatch center at 911 if need be.

(Continued from Page 1) in Sedalia, then transferred to University of Central Missouri - Warrensburg. Unsure about a career choice at the time, she took some criminal justice courses at UCM before deciding to enroll in the police academy earning 15 elective credit hours two years ago.

She worked two years at the Henry County jail, and

originally wanted to find a position there, but none were available. Checking online for other opportunities, she was surprised to learn about openings in Warsaw. Botteron said she did not expect a reply, but applied anyway because she hoped to be able to work in a small town that was nearby; like the one where she had grown up.

Police academy training was top notch, she said. They taught the basics, with insight into real-life situations police officers face. Even so, Botteron said, "It was a new world when I was on the job. It is a new learning curve when facing things a person wouldn't know until actually involved in a situation."

"People in Warsaw have been very welcoming to me," she said. "Many people say 'thank you' for the work we're doing. And although we don't work for the thanks, it really is appreciated. Building good relationships is important, especially so people do not hesitate to call when they need us."

Officer Botteron is the single mother of three: 13-year old and 4-year old sons and a 6-year old daughter. Her mother helps with childcare. As for her career choice - both of her parents support her wholeheartedly; they are proud of her and happy that she is pursuing her dream, she said, although they are understandably concerned about her personal safety.

Two of her children say they want to be police officers, she said. "Sometimes they complain about my long hours, but so far they are adapting well."

On her days off, Botteron enjoys swimming, and when she can spend hours fishing, doing things with her family and friends, which is her priority. As another way to take her mind off work, she likes to spend time in her garden, growing fruits, vegetables and flowers.

Botteron said everyone in the department has been very helpful, but she knows she still has a lot to learn. "I wanted to find a department where I could learn and grow, in a good place for my family. I believe I have found that place, and I hope to stay with the Warsaw Police Department for many more years."

(Continued from Page 1) minutes of the group's April 16 and 27 meetings and a revised agenda, then agree to pay bills presented.

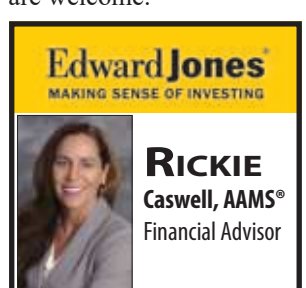
Jubilee Days representative Chuck Allcorn then requested and received an okay from Alderpersons to close several downtown streets during the June 6-9 celebration for several Jubilee Days events; including Fri.-Sat. night shows in front of the Post Office. Scout Leader Darin Henderson requested and received permission to use a portion of the Drake Harbor area for an August 12, 1 PM-3:30 PM, Boy Scout Court of Honor event, with permission to use the Community Building in case of inclement weather.

Also under new business, the Board adopted three other ordinances: (1) accepting Progress Drive within the BDN Subdivision to the City and will set traffic patterns

therein; (2) authorizing the Mayor to execute a notice of waiver of first refusal to purchase the property which will (hopefully) become the new County jail; (3) authorizing the Mayor to execute an agreement between the City and Andrew Ehlers for lease of a trailer home at the Warsaw Municipal Airport.

In late session, Cory ten Bensel, Director of Member Care, Co-Mo Electric Coop, said that a lack of technical data has prevented the City from pursuing broad band service with Co-Mo at the present time. But he encouraged the City to continue exploring options as they arise. He hoped Co-Mo could sooner or later, partner with the City in that venture. Note: Before the meeting, ten Bensel spoke of a seemingly chaotic funding situation in Washington DC, which frustrated local efforts to get projects such as broad band service, into their cities. Co-Mo Electric's subsidiary, Co-Mo Connect, is already available to the electric coop's customers in northern Benton County. So the question is: Why not the cities in Benton County?

The open meeting went into executive session about 6:25 PM. Meetings of this group are usually held on 1st and 3rd Mondays; visitors are welcome.





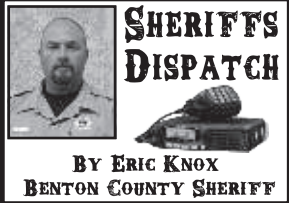

Hello Benton County, it's been awhile since my last dispatch! The winter months and cold weather didn't slow down anything for us in law enforcement. A lot has happened in the time since my last posting. Benton County voters approved our sales tax creating the ability to build an updated, safe and efficient facility! Thank you to those who trust and believe in our ability to make good decisions with your tax payer dollars. To those of you who didn't vote yes, I look forward to the opportunity to change your mind when you see the positive impact on the community and the numbers after the first year of operation. Remember, my office is transparent, so you will have all the data!

The work didn't stop there, now the real work begins! The County Commissioners did not slow down after the vote. They immediately went to work on finalizing the land purchase and submitted requests for some of the preliminary site testing that has to be done to ensure structural integrity and to help aid in better bids from the excavators. Knowing exactly what's under the grass before you start digging is a huge benefit and just plain common sense! Many other things are in motion at the same time. Just to mention a few: (RFQ) Request for Quotation on a construction manager; firming up the financing; adding detail to the layout, and the list goes on! This cycle is not new to Benton County and other third class counties who can't afford to compete with communities who have huge tax bases. Please be patient with the staff and the new deputies training. Although we have lost some experience and wisdom from our battle tested deputies, we have eager, motivated and intelligent new deputies ready to prove they are up to the challenges presented in Benton County. I expect the same polite professionalism extended to you as I did out of the experienced staff. If you see anything other than that, I need to know about it! Each and every one of these deputies are an extension of the Sheriff; carrying the same authority governed by the Constitution and a direct reflection on myself and this Office.

He was born on Sept. 24, 1952, at Clinton General Hospital. Mahlon was the son of the late Daniel Black and Kathleen White Miles. He is survived by two daughters, Elizabeth Huenefeldt and her husband, Sam, Cape Girardeau, and Catrina Jurdan and her companion, Douglas King, Jr., Grandview; one son, Justin D. Jurdan and his spouse, Belinda, Urich. Three grandchildren, Miles Huenefeldt and Brice Hunefeldt, Cape Girardeau, and Carina Jurdan, Urich. Two sisters, Ellen Miles-Taylor, Warrensburg, and Janie Miles-Smith and her husband, Paul, Kansas City; two brothers, Dan Miles and his wife, Kathy, Clinton; Frank Miles, Warsaw; nieces and nephews in addition to his two beloved cats, Lili Marlene and Phat Phat.

Mahlon lived in Warsaw during his early youth. He attended Warsaw Elementary School for several years. He moved in 1960 to Chevy Chase, Maryland, where his father was Chief of Staff/Administrative Assistant to U.S. Senator Edward V. Long of Missouri. Mahlon attended school at Our Lady of Lourdes Parochial School in Bethesda, Maryland. He was a Boy Scout there in a Scout Troop which was one of the first fully integrated troops in that metropolitan area. Mahlon greatly enjoyed camping in Maryland, Virginia and Pennsylvania with the troop. He was a carrier boy for The Washington Daily News for several years.

He personally witnessed the funeral procession and ceremony at the U.S. Capitol for the funeral of President John F. Kennedy and many other historical events while residing as a young man in that area.

From 1964-1966, Mahlon attended Holy Rosary School in Clinton, and in 1967 and 1968 Western Junior High School in Bethesda, Maryland, where he was an outstanding player on the football team. He was a student at Clinton High School beginning in 1969, where he was on the football, wrestling and track and field teams.

Mahlon attended Benedictine College, Atchison, Kansas, following high school for several years and then Central Missouri State University.

While he loved the journalism field, Mahlon fully

embraced law enforcement even more. At various times he was a Clinton Police Department Officer and a Henry County Sheriff's Department Deputy Sheriff. Mahlon had a trained K-9 named "Duke" who often accompanied him on duty. He also served as an Officer and Photographer for the Missouri Rural Crime Squad.

A major disappointment in his life occurred when he and his good friend, Leonard Garzoli, applied to be enlisted in the U.S. Marine Corps. Leonard passed the induction physical. Alas, Mahlon did not. A pin in his shoulder from a football injury prevented his enlistment.

Mahlon was very active in The Young Democrats of Missouri organization in his earlier years.

As Editor of The Clinton Daily Democrat, his investigating skills concerning situations which people were trying to hide from the general public, often led to threats which, once received, always were a "tip" that he was headed in the right direction. The "thrill of the chase" was greatly enjoyed by Mahlon when it became apparent there was a story and he was about to catch the elusive quarry. He was the recipient of a number of awards for his photography and writing work. Bad health necessitated that Mahlon retire early and concentrate on improving his physical state.

He enjoyed reading and researching historical subjects, particularly medieval England. His two cats, Lili Malene and Phat Phat, were his faithful companions. Mahlon greatly appreciated Clinton Healthcare & Rehabilitation staff working with him so that he could keep his cats with him.

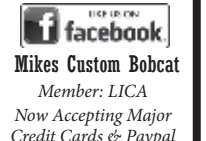

Surviving Open Heart Surgery

A few weeks ago on a Sunday afternoon our daughter Amanda called me and asked if I could watch our grandson Henry for a while. She said our son-in-law Stan wasn't feeling well and on the advice of her sister Dr. Amber Campbell she was taking him to Clinton for an EKG.

"We don't think it is serious but I'll feel better just to be safe," Amanda said.

Later that afternoon, Amanda called back and told me that Stan was being taken by ambulance to Research Hospital in Kansas City. The EKG revealed he had suffered a heart attack and he needed to go to Research for further testing.

"Mom, can you go with me," Amanda said through her tears. "I don't think I can do this alone."

I assured her that I was on my way. The hospital staff had planned to take Stan to the hospital by helicopter but the wind was too strong so he went by ambulance with Amanda and me right behind in my car.

I tried to calm her by telling her that he might need a stent or something and he could probably come home the next day. "After all, Amanda, Stan is only 39 years old so I'm sure this is very minor," I said, hoping to make both of us feel better.

We were both praying all the way to Kansas City while Amanda started texting family and friends to ask them to pray for Stan as well.

Research Hospital in Kansas City is huge so Amanda and I walked around searching for the cardio unit. We finally found a kind nurse who directed us to the cardio waiting room and unlocked the door. We waited for what seemed like an eternity, and then a nurse came to take Amanda back to the recovery room to meet with the doctor.

When she returned she was in tears. "Stan has to have quadruple bypass surgery," she said. "One of his arteries is completely blocked and there is blockage in the other arteries as well," she explained.

Stan was moved to a room in ICU and then we went to see him. We both put on brave faces and reassured Stan that open heart surgery is common anymore and that we were sure he would be fine. I was scared and I knew that my daughter was beyond scared. Stan tried to reassure both of us that he would be fine, but I could tell he had his doubts.

Since they had left home so quickly, both Stan and Amanda wanted me to return to Warsaw to take care of Henry and their dogs. At around midnight I told them goodbye and headed home. I knew Amanda would not leave her husband's side as she sat in a chair by his bed.

The next day plans were made for surgery and Stan asked that Henry be brought to the hospital so he could see him before he headed off for open heart surgery. We all suspected that Stan was afraid he wouldn't ever see Henry again. Four-year-old Henry couldn't understand why Daddy was in the hospital or why he couldn't stay there with him. It was a hard day for the whole family.

The next day Stan was in surgery for six hours as the doctors worked on his heart. It was the longest day that I can remember. Amanda's sisters and her brother as well as Stan's mother and grandmother were with her in the waiting room. I stayed in Warsaw to take care of the children. We were all praying all day long. When we sat down for dinner all three of the grandchildren asked to lead the prayer and each prayed for their Uncle Stan and Daddy to get well.

According to the National Heart, Lung, and Blood Institute (NHLBI), coronary artery bypassgrafting (CABG) is the most common type of heart surgery done on adults. During this surgery, a healthy artery or vein is grafted (attached) to a blocked coronary artery. This allows the grafted artery to "bypass" the blocked artery and bring fresh blood to the heart.

Open-heart surgery may be done to perform a CABG. A coronary artery bypass graft may be necessary for people with coronary heart disease.

Coronary heart disease occurs when the blood vessels that provide blood and oxygen to the heart muscle become narrow and hard. This is often called "hardening of the arteries."

Hardening occurs when fatty material forms a plaque on the walls of the coronary arteries. This plaque narrows the arteries, making it difficult for blood to get through. When blood can't flow properly to the heart, a heart attack may occur.

According to the National Institutes of Health, a CABG takes from three to six hours. It's generally done following these basic steps:

The patient is given general anesthesia. This ensures that they will be asleep and pain free through the whole



surgery.

The surgeon makes an 8- to 10-inch cut in the chest.

The surgeon cuts through all or part of the patient's breastbone to expose the heart.

Once the heart is visible, the patient may be connected to a heart-lung bypass machine. The machine moves blood away from the heart so that the surgeon can operate. Some newer procedures do not use this machine.

The surgeon uses a healthy vein or artery to make a new path around the blocked artery.

The surgeon closes the breastbone with wire, leaving the wire inside the body. The original cut is stitched up.

Most people who've had a CABG benefit from participating in a structured, comprehensive rehabilitation program. This is usually done outpatient with visits several times a week. The components to the program include exercise, reducing risk factors, and dealing with stress, anxiety, and depression.

It may take up to six weeks before the patient starts feeling better, and up to six months to feel the full benefits of the surgery. However, the outlook is good for many people, and the grafts can work for many years.

According to a study at Harvard University, cardiovascular disease is responsible for about one of every three deaths in the United States. On average, coronary artery disease (CAD) will take a life every minute this year. Heart attacks and cardiac deaths are so common that they almost seem natural and inevitable. When a 70- or 80-year-old succumbs, it gets little attention — but eyes widen when a 30- or 40-year-old is stricken. In fact, the risk of heart disease rises steadily and sharply with age. Still, CAD is far from rare in younger men.

CAD is very rare in males too young to drive, but it begins to creep up after men are old enough to vote. In the U.S., the average age for a first heart attack in men is 65. That's why coronary

artery disease is labeled a disease of senior citizens. But as many as 4% to 10% of all heart attacks occur before age 45, and most of these strike men. It's a reminder that men should not ignore warning symptoms just because they are "too young" to have heart disease.

Stan reported that the worst pain was when he woke up in ICU with a tube down his throat and tubes in his chest. Pains medicine helped; however, he was very uncomfortable until the tubes were removed.

After a few days in ICU, Stan was moved to a regular room and the family was all able to visit. He was up and walking soon after and was able to come home within a week of that frightening Sunday afternoon. Henry was most happy to have Daddy back home, but we warned him that he couldn't jump on Daddy and that Daddy had a "boo boo" on his chest. Anyone who came to visit Stan was advised by Henry to not jump on his daddy.

Of course, Stan was worried about his FFA students at Warsaw High School, but his concern was relieved when his former FFA student Brandy Maddux stepped in to help. Brandy was finishing up her student teaching assignment and was given special permission to come to Warsaw to help out her mentor.

"When I heard what had happened to Mr. Adler, I wanted to do something to help so I was happy when I was given permission to substitute for him while he recovers," Brandy said. Brandy is a 2012 WHS graduate and a 2015 graduate of Missouri State.

Stan is slowly recovering and is very appreciative

of all the support he has received from family and friends. One of the lessons which we have all taken away from this frightening event is that no one should ignore the warning signs of a heart attack. Stan didn't want to even go to the hospital, but his wife wouldn't let him ignore the pain he was feeling. He said the pain before the heart attack was mainly in his back and shoulder. He actually had been having pain for quite a while but thought it was just a pulled muscle. Just because a person is in their 30's doesn't mean he or she couldn't have a heart attack.

"I think the good Lord isn't ready for me yet or I would have never made it to the hospital," Stan said.

Spring forward, fall back or is it spring back and fall forward? I never can remember but the one thing I do remember is spring brings asparagus whichever way it arrives. A harbinger of warmer weather to come, asparagus is one of the ultimate early spring foods as the Midwest begins changing from brown to green. The all too brief season for asparagus means I will be happily indulging with the following preparations.

Roast Asparagus

Roasting is my favorite way to prepare asparagus, it intensifies the flavors and keeps all the nutrients. It is also one of the easiest.

Preheat oven to 425 degrees

1 bunch of asparagus, green or purple

(The thicker stalks work best for this)

Olive oil

Salt & pepper

Lightly coat each stalk with olive oil. Arrange in a single layer on a baking sheet. Sprinkle with salt and pepper.

Roast in oven for approximately 10 to 20 minutes, depending on the size of the stalks.

The asparagus is done when the stalks begin to brown and shrivel slightly.

Asparagus with Lemon Butter

The flabby waterlogged spears that most of us remember from childhood should be a thing of the past. Just cook until crisp tender.

1 bunch asparagus

(I like the thinner stalks for this)

1 Tbs. butter

1 Tsp. grated lemon zest

(The yellow part only, the white part called the pith is bitter)

1 Tbs. fresh lemon juice
Bring 2 inches salted water to boil in a wide (10 inch) saucepan or skillet. Place asparagus in saucepan, cook until just tender, 4 to 5 minutes. Drain well in colander. Return asparagus to dry pan, toss with butter lemon zest and lemon juice. Season with salt and freshly ground pepper

Steamed Asparagus

Steaming keeps the color, taste and nutrients of vegetables.

1 bunch asparagus

Salt & freshly ground pepper

Mayonnaise

Bring plenty of water to boil in pan fitted with a vegetable steamer. (There are inexpensive steamer inserts available that open to fit almost any size pan)

Add asparagus, cover and steam for 4-5 minutes or until crisp tender. Serve with salt & pepper and a small dollop of mayonnaise.

Asparagus Bundles with Prosciutto

This is a great first course that can be prepared hours ahead and just finished off before serving.

Preheat oven to 375 degrees

Cooked bunch of asparagus (cook your favorite way)

6 thin slices prosciutto or ham

3 Tbs. butter, melted

¼ cup grated Parmesan cheese

Divide cooled asparagus into 6 bunches. Wrap each bunch with a slice of prosciutto. Place in baking dish, drizzle melted butter over top and sprinkle with Parmesan cheese.

Bake 6 to 8 minutes, or until Parmesan begins to turn a golden brown.

Warm Asparagus with Eggs Mimosas

A signature spring dish which works as a first course or a side dish.

1 bunch asparagus

2 eggs, hard cooked

1 Tbs. Champagne

vinegar
1 shallot, minced
3 Tbs. extra-virgin olive oil

Salt and freshly ground pepper

Press eggs through coarse mesh sieve.

Whisk together the Champagne vinegar, shallot, olive oil, salt and pepper to make a vinaigrette.

Bring 2 inches salted water to boil in a wide (10 inch) saucepan or skillet. Place asparagus in saucepan, cook until just tender, 4 to 5 minutes. Drain well in colander.

Or

Bring plenty of water to boil in pan fitted with a vegetable steamer. Add asparagus, cover and steam for 4-5 minutes or until crisp tender

Drain asparagus on paper towels, then arrange on warmed plates. Drizzle the vinaigrette over the spears, and then sprinkle the sieved eggs over the center.

Cooks Tips:

You must remove the tough woody end from each stalk of asparagus to prepare them for cooking. You can bend the stalk until it breaks at the tender part, trim and remove the tough ends with a sharp knife or use a vegetable peeler to peel away and remove the tough fibrous parts.

Bunches of asparagus with the same size stalks helps ensure even cooking.

A bunch of asparagus usually ranges from ¾ pound to 1-1/2 pounds but the cooking times will remain the same.

Green or purple, take your pick. Some swear the purple tastes sweeter and some swear there is no difference in taste.
