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Winner, Winner, Chicken Dinner! Art Auction Raises Funds For Meals

The first ever "Art for the Ages" auction raised more than \$2,300 last Sunday for the Clinton Senior Center.

With 164 tickets sold, the event, on March 26, drew lovers of local art and fried chicken, prepared by Robert Perryman of Kickin' Chicken. Diners filled the 40 tables set up in the senior center, their cars filling the parking lot of the Clinton Senior Center, 970 E. Sedalia St. across from the community center.

While they dined, the Clinton High School Jazz Band, led by Pat Miles, entertained the crowd. To start the auction, David Lee, director of the Clinton Chamber of Commerce, warmed up the audience with jokes before handing the microphone over to Lora Anstine of Anstine Reality and Auctions.

With her crew — Melinda Kirk as clerk, Cliff Kirk and David Pleacher as assistants — Lora auctioned off 75 pieces of art. Art of local scenes by local artists prompted the the most spirited bidding. A watercolor of a barn by Ike Parker sold for \$260. Mike and Lois Miller, founders of

Miller Seed Company, donated several paintings of Missouri's iconic farm animal, the mule. A watercolor of a mule team brought \$120, and "Mule Skinner" a sketch Joseph Vick did for Miller Seed brought in \$85. Charles Dundas donated paintings by Patti Ridenour. The Cuttin' Up Quilt Club, which meets at the Senior Center, made and donated a fence-rail quilt, which sold for \$130. Jennifer Hinton bought

several paintings of local scenes for the Bed and Breakfast she is building on South Main, including a water color by Ed Walker of the White Sulphur Springs Hotel in Artisan Park. Trish Meyers of Gallery Three also bought pieces by local artists

The silent action of 85 items raised the total for the day to \$4,000, organizer Kathy Wilson said. It included gift baskets donated by Schreiber Cheese.

Madison Kennels in Creighton donated artwork for the auction, and gift certificates for boarding in the silent auction.

The event was organized by Wilson, who is Henry County Services Director for Care Connection, a nonprofit agency. The art auction was a new idea for fundraising, Kathy said, and also offered the community a different social event. She began assem-

The year 2000 marked the end of the second millennium, but the start of Pat Findley's life.

"It was that summer that the Lord got a hold of my life," he said. "The call came on the heels of the Lord saving me."

Pat answered the call to ministry, and is now Pastor Pat, the new minister at First Baptist Church. He succeeds Dr. Randy Shipman, who retired. Randy Shipman was on the staff of South Haven Baptist Church when Pat was growing up, he said.

Pat is actually Dr. Findley, having earned a doctorate in divinity, but when he was in high school, was mainly into sports, he said, and hardly ever cracked a

book. Now, he loves to read.

"My father thought it was funny that I had books on my Christmas list," Pat said. Pat grew up in Springfield, Mo., and attended Greenfield Lab School on the University of Southern Missouri campus but was not academically inclined, he said, and had no career plans. Instead, he was heavily involved in sports — basketball, soccer, foot-

ed from Southwest Baptist University in Bolivar with a degree in ministry. He completed a masters of divinity at Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary in Fort Worth in 2009, and earned a doctorate of ministry in expository preaching at the Fort Worth seminary in 2018.





last October. For \$15, attendees got a traditional Sunday supper fried chicken, mashed potatoes with gravy, green beans, a roll and iced tea. Rosa, the senior center cook, made cake and brownies for dessert. Leftover chicken was sold by the bag at the auction, as was a tray of cakes.

The Clinton Senior Center serves inexpensive meals at the Senior Center five days a week, plus delivers meals to home-bound seniors in the county. In the past fiscal year, the center provided more than 42,500 meals for older adults in Henry County.

The Center also has card games, activities, and exercise classes throughout the week, and live music on Tuesday afternoons. When someone told her that the Senior Center is the best kept secret in Clinton, Kathy replied, "I don't want us to be that."

Kathy said that the Senior Center serves fried chicken on the third Thursday of the month, and she hopes people who came to the auction will come and enjoy it.

"Let's get our parking lot this full every month," she

Pat said he is honored to preach and happy to pastor, but is just a normal guy bringing his "first fruits" best efforts — to the table. He has served in churches where they were walking through difficult situations, he said, but he and his wife have loved the people and the places he's been called to serve.

"It is an honor to be an under shepherd and to be one of the sheep," he said. "A pastor is both."

When he goes home at night, he tries to relax, then remembers — there are still boxes of books to unpack.

crews, does plastic welding and as a hobby, buys old

"Sometimes we fix them up, sometimes we keep them," Beth said.

They buy old houses to flip them, but are keeping one of the houses they rehabbed in Clinton, which they turned it into an arcade and flea market that opened this month. They decided on the premise after canvassing local people on the need the house could fill in the community.

"We went on Facebook and asked what people wanted," Beth said. "The response was 'something for the kids to do."

The result: Storecade, which has an arcade-game center on the main floor and second-hand store upstairs. It's open Wednesday through Sunday for all ages during the day, 2 p.m. to 7:30 p.m., and for adults 7:30 p.m. to close. Arcades have made a comeback, after a drop in popularity due to the availability of home-based game technology, but are now found in cities and small towns, where they provide social outlets for families, youth and adults.

The Goodson's goal: to create a safe and fun space for kids of all ages, Beth

"We are small-town people with small-town roots," Beth said. "We like to make things better if we see a need."

Bryan and his crew are still working on renovating the house next to the apartment house on Ohio, Beth said. She commutes once a week from their home in Blue Springs to check on Storecade, and to tweak the flea market displays. Storecade is staffed by a local woman with the help of an arcade game repairman, who is getting the vintage machines up and running.

On order is "17,000 Games," Beth said, a freeplay game that has classic games from Playstation on back. The Goodsons acquired many of the arcade games by sending out the word to their circle of friends, she said.

Family has also been supportive - her father came and checked out the building, she said, and her mother has also worked for the couple.

"I couldn't have done this with the support of many people," Beth said.

To uncover the building's roots, Beth went to the genealogy library at the Henry County Museum. Originally a private residence, it housed an interiors business, a restaurant and teahouse, and most recently, a flower shop called Bloomers, which moved further east on Ohio.

"I love that building," Beth said. "It's got a lot of histo-

Despite its age and provenance, there aren't any lingering essences of former residents, Beth said. But when the Goodsons removed the old carpet upstairs, they found a circle inscribed in the hardwood floor, about 10 feet in diameter, with 10 cats around the circle. They have no idea what the circle — or the cats — represent. They also found a bread-dough proofing (raising) box built into a radiator.

The original residents of the house, she learned, were coal miners. Richard and Elizabeth Bowen owned a coal company near Windsor, on the border between Johnson and Henry counties.

Lampkin's History of Henry County has an entry on John Bowen, a former mayor of Windsor. John was one of Richard's three sons, with whom he organized the Bowen Mining Company. Richard was born in England in 1839, according to the entry, and was the son of a British soldier who fought in the War of 1812 and at Waterloo.

Richard immigrated to America in 1863, where he was employed as a coal miner and mine manager. He came to Henry County in 1876, and managed Osage mines and was a member of the Tebo Mining Company before organizing his own company. There was also a town named Bowen in 1901, Beth said, that no longer exists.

From sources at the Henry County Museum, Beth learned the Bowen house has stained-glass windows imported from Bolivia in the late 1800s, and a wrought-iron fence from England, and is number 20 on the list of historic buildings in town. The house became Bowen House Interiors in 1983. In 1990. the Bowen home morphed into Tara's Teahouse and Restaurant and in 1993 was reborn as Bloomers Flower Shop.

Beth is looking for people who want to teach art, crafts or life-skill classes at the building — perhaps pet portraits or bread-baking would be appropriate - and is also going to offer special events at the Storecade. She will have a schedule out soon, she said, listing classes and special events, which will include bouncy castles.

She also will have a lifesize Jenga game to play, and invites people to come by and enjoy the shade of the front porch. Cold drinks and snacks are for sale. Pokemon tournaments or other card game are another possibility.

Beth said she frequently gets the "you are handling a lot" comment when people find out about the six businesses and six children, ages 4 to 18.How does she keep all the details of her jobs and family life straight?

"I'm a list person," Beth said.

The Storecade is located on the southwest corner of South Main and Ohio. Parking is around back.

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

Clinton Main Street purchased the home in 1996 from the Dorman family and spent six years restoring the house using volunteer labor. Clinton Main Street utilized the home as its office until 2008 when it was deeded to the Henry County Historical Society. While the historical society has kept up with minor maintenance over the years, larger issues with the structure have become more apparent. The east side of the home exhibits minor cracking and separation — and after many severe rain showers for several years in a row the house has developed a serious foundation and wall issues. The Henry County Historical Society needs to take immediate action to prevent further damage and possible loss of the Dorman House. It is hoped that listing as a Place in Peril will raise awareness for the Save the Dorman capital improvement campaign and help the historical society find the expertise needed to guide them through the creation of a historic structures report and the proper restoration



coaches that were good role models."

Scott attended Missouri Valley and Pitt State as his 'Media Arts' path unfolded. I asked Scott about his film work. "Regarding film work I have spent time producing and directing short films and videos mostly focusing on sports, music videos, and promotional videos with some short fiction and experimental film. I've also made films at grad school at the University of Montana and Colorado. I also had international experience in Costa Rica. My future endeavors are to keep creating documentaries to inspire travel and people to have new experiences and hobbies."

Like most career paths, a jog in the road found Scott working as a cook at the Glacier National Park in 2013, and as a guide at other NPs. Soon after he got his Master of Fine Arts (MFA) in media arts in Montana. It does not take long to realize Scott has an adventurous side.

Then in April 2022, Scott made a big decision and joined the Space Force. (If you are like me, you know very little about our newest armed forces branch.) The U.S. Space Force was established on Dec. 20, 2019, when the National Defense Authorization Act was signed into law, creating the first new branch of the armed services in 73 years. Space Force was added to: Army, Marines, Navy, Air Force, and Coast Guard. Scott's job is in electromagnetic warfare which focuses on detecting, characterizing, and monitoring satellite signals on the electromagnetic spectrum around the world. (OK, I am not sure what that actually is, but I did not think I should ask too many questions, either.) Scott did offer, "My job is technically space systems operations, electromagnetic warfare as one of the three disciplines within SSO that you get to apply for." Scott feels there is a strong chance the Space Force will be a long-term career move. He could eventually become a commission officer. He obviously has an interesting career path.

When I talk to young people about their future, I remind them that career paths are often a winding road and sometimes a bumpy road, and that is OK. Of my four children only one ended up working in the field they trained for. So, young and old, keep learning, stay flexible, and enjoy the ride. Thanks for sharing Scott, keep us safe and have fun. 

Angler's Pro **Seminar Adds** Ride N'Go

After a winter of short days and long nights, most fishermen are ready for spring, or at least ready for spring weather. For those not ready, Angler's Port Marine is holding a seminar on Humminbird electronics and Minn Kota trolling motors on April 8th at the shop on Highway 7.

The seminar will cover Humminbird products and how to use them, as well as information on Humminbird's One Boat Network, a system that allows anglers to control the Minn Kota trolling motor, shallowwater Talon anchor and Cannon downriggers from the Humminbird sonar chartplotter. The One Boat system allows the angler to direct the trolling motor along a path or to a specific point. It also can direct the trolling motor to hold the boat in a specific position in relation to the bottom. It directs the Talon anchoring system to deploy its anchoring arms to keep the boat in position or to retract them, freeing the boat to move.

In the Humminbird

seminar at Angler's Port Marine this past November, J.E. Van Natta, company rep for the area, talked about the Mega imaging system and its potential. For those fishermen who are not conversant in the Mega Live system, it uses transducers to shoot sonar beams ahead, to the side of the boat as well as directly below or in all directions at once.

With practice, the fisherman will be able to detect fish, establish the depth at which the fish is holding and the direction and distance to the fish. Finely tuned, the Mega Live Imaging system can follow the angler's lure as it descends toward the fish and enables the fisherman to judge the fish's reaction to the lure, assuming, of course, that the fish doesn't strike the lure.

The seminar, held at

the Angler's Port Marine building on Highway 7, starts at 10 am. Registration is necessary although the event is free. Donuts and coffee are served before the seminar, and a burger and hotdog lunch is served afterwards.

The seminar is followed by two events at the Sterret Creek Marina at 18174 Marina Road, Warsaw, on Truman Lake. The first is an event for Humminbird owners. Humminbird staff will go out on anglers' boats and train the owners on how to get the best out of their Humminbird and Minn Kota units.

The second is a Ride N'Go event featuring APM's 2023 boats and pontoons. If you want to run a certain model, you need to call Amber Becker at 660-438-4600 or by email at abecker@ anglersportmarine.com.











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

ors. Bikoy, a sophomore guard, was named to the Second Team. The honors are based on votes by Region 16 coaches.

Ellis played in all 31 games for SFCC and started in 23. He led the team in scoring, averaging 13.3 points per contest. Seeking Main Street Committee and



NEW MAIN STREET Director Amanda Johnson is busy acclimating to her new role. She reported to the council (March 7) that she was actively seeking younger members and volunteers for Main Street committees and activities.

The Clinton City Council met in open session March 21 at City Hall. Absent were Council Persons Debbie Smith, Cameron Jackson and Becky Raysik. Following roll call and the saying of the Pledge of Allegiance, the motion to accept the previous council minutes was approved.

Clintonians Patty Harmon and Dedee Woods spoke to the council during the Personal Appearance portion. Both have spoken to the council before about matters on Lincoln Street where they live. "We are here again," said Woods. "Now there is a generator problem plus the old problems." Both Woods and Harmon expressed that since their previous complaints to the council, activity at the alleged abandoned home on Lincoln Street had increased to now include the running of a loud generator at all hours of the night and also loud trucks. Both reported there was an increase in traffic to and from an out-building on the property as well. It was reported the police were called multiple times – and that tickets have been issued, but the women are, at this point, frustrated. "Police were called ten times and ten tickets were issued," said Patty Harmon.

"Ma'am, you are doing everything possible," said Mayor Carla Moberly. It is now up to the courts," Moberly said she had sat in on the last court appearance involving the person in question. Harmon and Woods both said they had called Clinton PD when they thought a resolution was not forthcoming as fast as they hoped: "I talked to Officer Nepple," said Harmon. "He was understanding and nice," said Harmon. He, too, told her the matter would need to play out in court at this point.

The Clinton Main Street report was given by new director Amanda Johnson. Johnson said she had attended two workshops — one on downtown housing and the other on marketing for downtown areas. She reported she will be going to a Main Street conference in Boston soon, too.

Her end-of-year report included the information that eight businesses had started or re-located to downtown last year which had created eleven new jobs. She reported that there had been 1,436 volunteer hours as well. The vacancy rate for downtown is down to 3%.

Director Johnson said she is working with the Henry County Museum and help raise awareness for the "Save the Dorman House" campaign. The Dorman Home, Clinton's first two-story home (and now over 160 years old) is suffering from structural issues.

Johnson concluded her report by saying she was trying to get accustomed to, and breath new life into, many of the Main Street committees. "The goal is to educate people on what we [Main Street] is doing and recruit more young people." She emphasized the need to re-build the organizational committee — especially since the passing of Cheryl Craig, who headed that particular committee.

The Clinton City Council approved the second reading of Bill No. 2023-06 (Fire Protection Grant).

The Public Works Committee report was given by Councilman Roger House in lieu of Councilman Jackson's absence. The first item on that agenda was the dates for City-Wide Clean Up. At the recommendation of the Public Works committee, the motion to hold the Transfer Station City Wide Clean-up dates to be April 24 – 29 was approved.

It was reported the metal roof for the Artesian Pool House is to be delivered this week and the concrete portion has been poured. CJW flew a drone over the lot/area and collected elevation and size data for later use. In short, progress on the Artesian outdoor pool is progressing: "It no longer looks like a Pizza Hut," said Councilman House.

Currently, bid specs are being put together for an Aquatic Center boiler building (recall equipment damage is occurring because of excessive moisture) and the only delay for work starting at Hurt Park (by Westport Construction) is some good weather.

There have been a number of inquiries about painting/ striping the tennis courts at Artesian to accommodate pickleball as well. It was also reported that the registration for the Youth Sports Program will change to accept individuals only. Apparently, the process is not equal when outside/ out-of-town travel teams register and Parks and Rec would like it to be uniform for those teams in town as well as not.

At the waste water plant, a date is being sought to bypass the pumping so that an update/repair can be made. And, from here on out, there will be no reports from the Sewershed Surveillance project (concerning viral materials in the sewer system) unless there is a significant change.

A work order has been placed to install monitoring devices for several of the pump stations and parts for the upper-level pump at the plant are to be shipped by April 11. The permit renew-

al for the plant is currently being put together; also, Alliance Water Resource is working to find some solutions for the staffing issues at the plant because of the recent loss of Dan Shearer.

The first readings of Bills Nos. 2023-07 and 08 were held - both concern conditional use permits for properties at 114 and 116 South Main (on the square). Councilman House concluded his report by noting that there were concerns from an individual about trash, speeding, vehicles on properties, and the walking lane along Second Street. The problems reported were referred to the appropriate departments and/or committees to take a look at.

The Public Safety report was given by Councilman Gene Henry. After clarifying discussion about the availability and potential costs of future police car purchases, the council approved a motion to order the purchase of two new vehicles. The move should save money and also take advantage of the soon to be limited availability of the specific model of vehicle Clinton PD uses.

The first and second readings of Bills No. 2023-09 and 2023-10, both pertaining to Clinton Fire Department grant awards, were held. The rules were suspended as the deadline for approval for both is April 8.

The council regretfully accepted the resignation of Clinton Police Officer Chad Nepple (who has been with the department for 18 years), who took a position elsewhere.

The Finance Committee report was given by Councilman Daniel Wilson. The council accepted the high bid of \$3,001 for the purchase of the surplus mower Parks and Rec had. He reported the new financial software system the city will be using is still in the early stages of implementation - and warned that it will take some time to implement all the changes. He also reported that the City Clerk, Wendee Seaton, was presented an award during the Finance Officer Annual Training Conference. Councilman Wilson said she had done a wonderful job furthering her training in her work for the city.

Mayor Carla Moberly commented that many things were going well for the city: grant awards for both the fire department and police department were positive signs and she expressed her appreciation of City Clerk Wendee Seaton for adding so much professional development above and beyond her normal working hours.

City Administrator Christy Maggi reported that roof repairs at City Hall will begin in April and also repairs at the community center will start soon, too.

Before adjourning, Councilman Gene Henry added that the Clinton Police department does have one officer in training and a cadet candidate (pending approval) who is slated to start the police academy in July.

The Clinton City Council adjourned at 6:41 PM.

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

PHILOS, IT'S A GOD THING

In 1985 I performed the wedding for a lovely young couple. Through the years, we have stayed connected. Thirty years later, I was privileged to have lunch with them in their home along with one of their grown children and two mutual friends. It was a delightful experience. I was blessed.

All too often pastor-parishioner relationships are brief. Sometimes it is intentionally so; there is no reason or desire to continue. At other times, the event demands brevity like encounters in a reception line. Circumstances may demand that people move on to other places and other things. And, of course, death often shortens the relationship; for instance, the wife mentioned earlier passed away several years ago.

Given the brevity of these experiences, it is common for pastors to wonder if they have accomplished anything. An architect can point to a building and say, "That's my work." A surgeon can see a healed patient and be proud of what he/ she accomplished. Ministers must often just hope and pray they have done some good.

Occasionally, like the lunch mentioned earlier, you get a chance to spend meaningful time with past parishioners. That is always pleasant; and you realize that quietly, invisibly your friendship has grown. As I sat at their table, we recounted old stories that we all knew and new tales to bring us up to date. I was proud to have had a small part in bringing this couple's lives together and thankful to have been a tiny blessing in their lives.

Mart De Haan tells the story of two girls who became international friends, Nadia of Bulgaria and Millicent of the United States. Though separated by many miles, they kept in touch. Then, political upheaval prevented all their communication. After 48 years and political changes, they were finally able to meet at Miami International Airport where Millicent exclaimed, "Nadia! I would know you anywhere."

One thing that intrigues me about experiences like this and my luncheon experience is how the heart grows fonder without our knowing it. The Greek language, the language of the New Testament, has a word that describes this invisible growth of friendship. The word is philos, meaning love of or for a friend, brotherly love.

It's a good thing. It's a God thing. "A friend loves like a brother." (Proverbs 18:24)

In Philadelphia, 90% of the dope samples they tested returned positive for having Xylazine. Xylazine is a non-opioid tranquilizer now linked to fentanyl overdose deaths. When someone is overdosing on Fentanyl, Naloxone is administered. When Xylazine plays a factor in the overdose, because it is a non-opioid tranquilizer the narcotic reversal does not impact Xylazine that depresses a persons breathing. This is causing Naloxone to become less effective and the number of overdoses to increase. Recently the FDA has restricted the import of Xylazine due to the increase in it being found in fentanyl and heroin. It is being realized that all manner of street drugs are being being laced with It for profit increase. The problem is that Xylazine's prevalence in drugs is truly unknown because many hospitals don't test for it.

Some signs of withdrawal

- nausea
- body rattling anxiety Xylazine is destroying peo-

still count toward GPA, financial aid, and graduation requirements. This seamless course-sharing experience helps ensure students don't waste valuable time earning the academic credentials they need to launch their professional careers.

"Acadeum is a great plat-

form for course sharing that helps with student progress and completion," said Heather McGrath, UCM registrar. "Under the program, a student is enrolled at UCM and we help facilitate working with the consortium to allow them to take a course at another (Acadeum) institution." McGrath said the initiative is an innovative tool for ensuring that students persist on their education pathway by eliminating potential delays, if a course isn't available. It also allows smaller universities to benefit from economies of scale, providing students access to courses that may be of interest that are not offered at their home institution, while also helping to build relationships between community colleges and four-year institutions. According to Acadeum's
