Why did Arlene Crawford of Urich start a local chapter of Women on Wheels?

'Because I didn't have any women to ride with," she explained, "Men have different priorities when they ride."

"They don't stop for ice cream," Karen Cox said.

"Or antique malls." said Sherry Spencer.

Arlene, Karen and Sherrv are members of the Golden Valley Gals, the west-central chapter of Women on Wheels, which Arlene founded in March of 2007. In the past, they have had more than a dozen members, but now are down to five full members and two support members.

and are looking for more. "The Covid pandemic knocked a lot of people off their bikes," Karen said.

You can join even if you don't have a motorcycle. If the weather is not conducive to riding motorcycles, they drive, like they did last weekend to the Cabin Fever rally in Ames, Iowa. "There were 400 men,

Karen said her longest trip on her bike, a Harley Night Train, was to a rally

A trip north to Lake George, in upstate New York, was the most challenging, because it poured rain the five days it took her to get there. She made it back in the rain as far as Springfield, Ill., when she called her husband to come and pick up her.

On another stormy trip, she looked in the rear view mirror, saw a funnel cloud and thought, "I'm done."

Women on Wheels is a

national organization with members in all 50 states, Karen said. The organization has a directory that provides a network of women motorcycle riders throughout the country. Ages in the Golden Valley Gals range from a woman who is in her late '80s to a child who rides with her grandmother.

In June, the GV Gals will be heading to Kearney,

Mo., home of Jesse James. for the Missouri state Women on Wheels ride-in. The next national ride-in is in Harrison, Ark., in July. Arlene said they will probably go down on the Pig Trail, a curvy route that she hasn't done before.

"I did do the Dragon, when I was going to South Carolina," she said, referring to a route in Greenville, North Carolina.

Daniel made the stair railings and railings around the mezzanine at Show Me Rv, a new and used recreational vehicle dealership at 148 NW 7 Hwy, in Clinton. He also made racks for Powell Meats.

Daniel said he honed his craft at the Buckeve Career Center, a vocational-technical school in Ohio. He grew up in Bolivar, Ohio. a small town south of Akron. A state wrestler in high school, he helps coach boys' wrestling in the Clinton School District, which his nephew is involved in. and football.



In 2016, she flew to Rome, rented a Harley and went with a group of seven women on a motorcycle trip through Italy. One of the other riders was a woman she met at the Gettysburg rally, she said.

Sherry, who lives in Clinton, is the rookie in the group, she said - her longest trip was 150 miles. She has a relatively small motorcycle, a Yamaha. She used to live in Chicago, which has a short motorcycle season, but had friends who rode on New Year's Dav.

UCM Team Captures National Criminal Justice Title for 20th Consecutive Year

While finding a place to display 19 new trophies may pose a small problem for an award-winning program, it is a welcome challenge for the University of Central Missouri's Department of Criminal Justice and Criminology. This shiny new hardware comes after a team of students and faculty members captured UCM's 20th consecutive Sweepstakes Award at the American Criminal Justice Association-Lambda Alpha Epsilon (ACJA-LAE) National Conference Competition.

UCM's Gamma Epsilon Delta (GED) Chapter of AC-JA-LAE traveled to Louisville, Kentucky,

March 12-16 to compete in the event. Team Advisor and Professor of Criminal Justice Dr. Gregg Etter said the UCM team garnered a total of 38 total points in a wide variety of competitive categories that led to awards in individual and team placements in the Lower, Upper, and Professional divisions of this annual event. Students, faculty, alumni and other professionals in the criminal justice field participated in the competition that attracted participants from some of the most prestigious colleges and universi-

He noted that UCM fin-

ished six points ahead of the second highest-scoring team. This was a thinner margin than UCM has encountered in recent years. In addition to taking home the Sweepstakes trophy, other highlights of the competition included the Top Gun Award. Richard Gillespie, an emeriti staff member who is retired from the UCM Department of Public Safety continues to work with students on firearm training and has been a successful competitor in the annual competition, both individually and as a team member. Gillespie captured first place in the Firearms (Individual) category, and was part of a three-member team that finished third in the Firearms (Team) Professional Division. UCM also captured first place in the Lower and Upper divisions for individual firearms and teams, and took two second-place awards in these same divisions for both individuals and teams. All members of the Gamma Epsilon Delta Chapter who participated in the

"When you think about it, all of these 20 years of nationals, what are the constants," Urban asked students and faculty who gathered in Wood Building for the celebratory event. "The first one is hard work. Have you ever stopped to think about how many hours it took you studying? 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






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
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

They moved on to play Lee's Summit for the Regional Title and a chance for the State Championship. Unfortunately, the Lady Cards fell flat and lost 57-23. The Lee's Summit team went on to become State Champs. The '78 players still remember that painful ending to their season.

The 53rd annual Boys

Clinton Invitational Tournament was held in 1978. The tournament had evolved many times trying different formats. In '78 the tourney only had six teams: Butler (seeded #1), Ray-Pec, Clinton, Warsaw (#2), Harrisonville, and Sherwood. Clinton beat Ray-Pec in a nail-biter 58-56 to advance to the semifinals Butler. Harrisonville beat Sherwood 65-47 moving on to face Warsaw in the semifinals. Clinton lost a cliffhanger to the Butler Bears 60-59. I bet the old gym was hopping that night. Warsaw beat Harrisonville 64-58 in OT after the Harrisonville coach had two Tech fouls called on him. Butler won the CIT Title beating Warsaw 60-59. The Cards beat Harrisonville 62-55 to take third. Clinton's Dennis Hayes was on the tourney's All-Star team. The girls' side of the CIT did not start until 1979. The CHS boys' team won the CIT Title in 1979.

The Cardinal wrestling squad was led by Fran Schwenk. He had a hardworking group to include Mark Ellis (1st in WCC), Randy Creek (1st), Bobby Honn (2nd), Buddy Littleton (2nd), Bill Skaggs (3rd), Wayne Shriner (4th), Mike Blackwell, Mike Wykoff, Jim Mock, and Rick Hunter. The team took third in the WCC wrestling tournament, and were 5-8 in duals. The wrestling program was still on the young side. It started in 1965 making the '78 season their 13th year. A group of boosters sponsored the 50th reunion of the program in 2015, and many of the '78 squad attended. Great stuff.

CENTRAL MISSOURL Board of Governor

Sets Instructional, General Fees for FY 2024

While seeking to maintain the most affordable education possible for students amid rising inflationary costs, the University of Central Missouri's Board of Governors approved slight increases in instructional tuition and general fees Fiscal Year 2024. Action on these matters took place when the board met in its March 23 plenary session on campus.

Bill Hawley, vice president

for finance and operations, presented the board with proposed fee increases, effective for the fall 2023 semester. The new fee structure presented to the board will increase the per-credithour charge for in-state undergraduate courses by 3.5 percent and in-state graduate courses by 5 percent. This means undergraduates from Missouri will pay \$277.50 per credit hour this fall, up from the current \$268. The cost for in-state graduate students will become \$356 per credit hour, up from \$339. These percentage increases are also the same for non-resident undergraduate and graduate students, regardless of modality. Non-resident students' tuition is double the

rate of resident tuition. The board also approved general fees to cover costs related to athletics, facilities, Pertle Springs Recreational Area, student activities, technology, the Elliott Student Union, health services and the Student Recreation and Wellness Center, which was student approved. Students who are taking under nine credit hours per semester will pay \$47 per credit hour, an increase of \$1.35 per credit hour above the current rate. Students who are taking nine or more credit hours will pay a flat rate of \$705, which is an increase of \$20.25 per credit hour over the current charge. --more--

In discussion about room and board, it was noted that meal plan rates are based on the Dining Service contract with Sodexo. This allows for an increase based on the Consumer

Price Index for Urban Consumers - Food Away from Home. The Food Away from Home index for 12 months, ending Aug. 31, 2022, was 8 percent. Housing rates will increase approximately 4 percent overall. These rates are affected by variables such as enrollment, salaries and accompanying fringe benefits, student wages, health insurance rates, Missouri State Employees Retirement System (MOSERS) contributions, utilities, property insurance premiums, maintenance, repairs, and administrative overhead, which impact the University Housing budget. The board also approved

an increase in aviation fixed wing flight fees to address rising flight operations costs and to establish funding to implement a fleet modernization and sustainability plan. The hourly rates for aircraft and simulator rental will increase by 12 percent. In terms of flight hours, these changes in rental cost per hour can range from an increase of \$13 for a PA-18-150 Super Cub to \$48 for a BRE-58 Beechcraft Baron. Simulator cost will go up \$3 per hour for the Redbird simulator, and \$6 for the Frasca simulator. The instructor cost will increase by 22% from \$45 per hour to \$55.


