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Rolling Into The Future: Clinton **Tour And Shuttle Service Departs**


When COVID hit, Greg Shannon decided to call it quits after 35 years in health care, seven of those years at Golden Valley Memorial Hospital.

Last Friday, the Chamber of Commerce held a ribbon-cutting ceremony at the KATY Trailhead for Katy Trail Tours and Shuttle, Greg's new venture.

"I'm doing something I enjoy," Greg said at the ribbon-cutting. "I am passionate about bicycle riding."

His new business provides shuttle services for people and bicycles, baggage transfer and ride assistance for people riding the KATY

Greg describes himself as "semi-retired" but the new business is keeping him busy. After wielding the giant scissors, he was off to Sedalia in his station wagon, pulling a trailer, to pick up four pieces of luggage at the Bothwell Hotel and ferry them to the Hotel Frederick in Boonville. He also got a call about riders needing a shuttle from Sedalia, so was picking them up. The next day, he

was scheduled to shuttle three people from Clinton

back to Sedalia, he said. The first step before putting the pedal to the idea was talking to people riding the trail to see if the need was there. Then he called the Chamber of Commerce and asked "Do you get requests for shuttle service?".

"They said 'All the time,'"

Greg said.

The answer was a slight exaggeration — shuttle service for the KATY Trail is a seasonal business, he said. But the answer inspired him to incorporate the business last October. With the spring weather, his services are in demand, and he's already had repeat customers, he said.

People join a Master Naturalist chapter because they have a strong interest in some aspect of the natural world. In the Hi Lonesome Chapter, which serves Henry and Benton counties, there is the prairie guy, the snake lady and even an edible bug expert. Roxanne Stockdall is the exception.

"I know a little bit about a lot of things," she said. "I love the birds, I like the plants. I even went on the frog and toad surveys, which were at night and a lot of fun."

Roxanne is president of the Hi Lonesome Chapter, whose members are planning to celebrate Earth Day by participating in programs as varied as their interests.

On April 21, the chapter is presenting an International Dark Skies (IDS) night at Knob Noster State Park in conjunction with the Astronomical Society of Kansas City. One of three IDS events at the site, it offers night sky viewing and promotes awareness of light pollution. The ASKC will have telescopes, Roxanne said, and the Hi Lonesome Master Naturalists plan to

On Earth Day, April 22, they'll be at an Earth Day fair on the campus of her alma mater, the University of Central Missouri in Warrensburg, sponsored by the Citizens for Environmental Action.

On April 29, the chapter will be in Arrowrock, Mo., for the Birds, Bees and Blooms festival. The annual spring festival at the state historic site is sponsored by the Missouri River Bird Observatory (MRBO), which the chapter has

been involved with since it started.

"We've helped with bird banding and bird surveys," Roxanne said.

Roxanne will show her collection of pressed flowers and give out seed bombs at the chapter's table at Birds, Bees and Blooms, she said. She's not the chapter's expert on native plants, but said she is her grandsons'

go-to person about them. "They'll pull something up and ask, 'Grandma, is this edible?' before popping it into their mouths," she said.

Hi Lonesome's native prairie expert is Donnie Nichols, who helped in the relocation of prairie chickens, going to Kansas where the birds were captured, and brought them back, to reintroduce them in Missouri prairies. The Hi Lonesome Master Naturalists also helped with a program to reintroduce black bears to southern Missouri, Roxanne said, helping tag bear



ing him to St. Charles, then driving the man's car to Clinton, saving the customer time that could be better spent on the trail, Greg said.

KATY Trail cyclists tend to be self-directed riders, Greg said, but in addition to shuttle services, he offers trip planning, with distances mapped out and places to stay set up ahead of time. Ride assist is another option.

"We do have people who are worried about being in a storm, or a breakdown on the trail," he said.

Almost all of his customers are from out-of-state, he said, who are looking for a local contact. He's even gotten a call from a woman in Ecuador. Cyclists he shuttles seek his advice on where to stay or camp in Clinton, and where to

"I consider myself a complement to businesses in town," Greg said.

He also has bicycles to rent, including regular bicycles, hybrids and electric(e) bicycles. Renting an ebike opens up the opportunity for Clinton residents to make weekend or threeday excursions on the KATY Trail, riding to Columbia or even Jefferson City, he said.

"Then they can jump on Amtrak and ride back to Warrensburg, where I will pick them up," Greg said. He recently met a 70-year-

old woman from Georgia, who was riding an ebike on the trail, he said.

Greg said he loves to ride the KATY trail, but has never made any of the big supported rides, like Big BAM (Bike Across Missouri). This year, however, he has been hired to provide support for organized rides, including one sponsored by ROADS Scholars, for people

Greg provides shuttle service the whole length of the KATY Trail, he said. At 240 miles long, it is the longest continuous recreational trail in the country, created when train tracks were removed from the bed of the Missouri, Kansas and Texas Railroad, known as the K-T. The corridor is now a Missouri state park, with the trail winding through Missouri's wine country and along the north bank of the Missouri River to Boonville, then dropping down through farm country to Sedalia, Windsor, Calhoun and Clinton.

Greg also provides tour and shuttle services on the Rock Island Trail, which connects Pleasant Hill, southeast of Kansas City, with Windsor, and which will eventually connect all the way to Kansas City.

Cucumber, green beans, tomatoes and pepper plant starts, including jalapeño, green and banana peppers, will be available, according to agricultural science teacher Jessie Miller. Many of the plants are shipped to the greenhouse as seedlings from a supplier, Miller said.

"We also start seeds in our germination table for the sale," Miller said. "Most of the seeds we start are vegetables and fruit."

Ornamentals include geranium, impatience, coleus, zinnias and begonias,. The sale is very popular, so gardeners are advised to arrive early for the best selection. The hanging baskets make popular Mother's Day gifts, and sell fast.

A Greenhouse class cares for the building and the plants, Miller said, maintaining the seedlings that come in, and propagating and growing plants. Proceeds from the sale go to maintaining the greenhouse, and provide funds for the school's FFA chapter field trips and contests.

The next big project for the FFA program is a school farm, where students will get hands-on experience raising livestock. The red barn was put up last year, Miller said, and a water line installed this month.

"The current plan is to have animals on the property within the next two weeks, most likely calves," Miller said. "Students will be able to show the animals they raise, and sell them at the Henry County Steer and Ham Sale, boosting our students' Supervised Agricultural Experience."

There are also plans to build a coop to house laying chickens, and provide eggs to other programs in the district.

To help with start-up costs for the farm, the Clinton School District received generous donations from local businesses, organizations and individuals, as well as grants, Miller said. Burns McDonnell donated the metal fence, which was installed by Smith Fencing.

Paul Landkamer is the chapter's "bug guy," specializing in edible bugs. He gives programs that are popular with school-age children, Roxanne said.

Roxanne said both her daughters have taken the Master Naturalist course. Her daughter Elizabeth Duckwork is the chapter's "snake lady," interested in all things reptilian.

Marge Lumpe and Ryan Steffans are birding experts who are participating in the May 13 Global Big Day of Birding, sponsored by the Missouri River Bird Observatory.

Roxanne has two birding apps on her phone. "Merlin" has both a photo and a song identifier. She uses the Cornell Lab of Ornithology's app to record bird sightings on her cell phone and to send sightings in. The phone also sends in the coordinates of your location, she said.

Roxanne has also learned to identify amphibians peepers, cricket frogs, bullfrogs — by sound.

Roxanne, who grew up in Odessa, has a bachelor of science degree from UCM. After she discovered a predilection for cooking, however, she worked at her aunt's restaurant, Blackwa-

ter Bottoms, on Highway 50, in the '70s and '80s.

In 2009, she was working at the End Zone in Sedalia, she said, the year her boss was taking the Master Naturalist course.

"Every week after the class, she'd come into the kitchen and tell us about all these interesting things she'd learned," Roxanne said.

So Roxanne thought, "I can do that," and took the course the next year. She is now serving her second term as president of the Hi Lonesome Chapter, which meets in Cole Camp, and is named for a nearby prairie. The Hi Lonesome Chapter has 12 active members, she said, but would like more people to sign up for the course. But for the MDC to offer it, there has to be enough interest. The Master Naturalist course is a class one night a week for 11 weeks, plus three field trips. The cost of \$110 covers materials, and the course is offered online, Roxanne said.

The Hi Lonesome Chapter meets at St. Paul's Lutheran Church in Cole Camp on the first Tuesday of the month at 6 p.m. Members can attend meetings online, she said.

"If we have enough prospective members, the chapter will offer an orien-





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

Looking Back: Draft Day

The old NFL drafts, which started in 1936, were not much more than, "Hey kid, we heard you were pretty good; do you want to play for us?" The first draft had a pool of only 90 players. The draft quickly evolved to, "Hey kid, we know you did well in high school/college (after talking to their coach) can we talk?" Later still, "Hey kid, we saw you play and Tom (a team employee) likes your chances, do you want to play for us?" Then (after scouting really got organized), "Hey kid, I am a scout for the Giants, we

and was learning how to scout and conduct a draft. The NFL 'big bucks' did not show up until the TV money kicked in.

The emergence of the AFL sped up the need for an organized and combined draft. The first televised NFL draft was in 1980 and was aired on ESPN. Pete Rozelle wasn't sure it would draw any fans. He was wrong. The draft grew each year and in 2010 it went to a three-day event. It was in New York, but has been on the road since 2015. Again, it has landed in KC this year. Note: There are different types of drafts. The most covered is the "entry" draft for newly eligible players. But, there are expansion drafts, supplement drafts,

Currently, each of the 32 NFL clubs receives one pick in each of the seven rounds. The number of teams and rounds has changed over time. The order of selection is determined by

are interested in you, do you want to come to NY for a talk and physical?"

By 1963, teams had formed modern 'scouting partnerships'. And now it is, "Hey kid, you have been thoroughly scouted, vetted, and evaluated. checked, your eligibility, so we hope to see you at the scouting combine." The combine pulled all the team's partnerships scouting into one event. The early names of these scouting camps were National Invitational Camp (NIC), or the NFL Scouting Combine. The combine, as we know it today, was started in 1982. TV and the popularity of football have made it an event all by itself. The 2023 draft is being held in Kansas City at Union Station, April 27-

I love the fact that the first player ever drafted was Heisman winner, Jay Berwanger, and he never played in the NFL. Because pro football, in 1936, was not paying big bucks and was not that well thought of, Berwanger passed on the chance. I am sure that does not happen a lot today. The NFL was very young (it started in 1920)

the reverse order of finish in the previous season. Each round starts with the team that finished with the worst record and ends with the Super Bowl champions. Of course, trades can change that order. Teams that didn't qualify for the playoffs are assigned draft slots 1-20. The club with the worst record will pick first, and the one with the best record will pick 20th. Teams that did qualify for the playoffs are assigned draft slots 21-32. The order is determined by the results of the previous year's postseason play. The draft is so important to the serious NFL fan, that mock drafts are held just to see what might happen. Numerous sports talk shows will do nothing but talk "draft" for months, literally. "Do the Giants need a QB? Can the Chiefs finally replace Tyreek Hill?, etc.' It is a feeding frenzy.

The young athletes are put on display, their 40-yard times are established, and off they go to the draft. Many of the top first-round prospects will have camera crews in their homes to capture the LOOKING Page 12

MDC Says Slow **Down And Give Turtles A Brake!**

Watch out for turtles crossing roads this spring as they look for food and a

The Missouri Department of Conservation (MDC) encourages drivers to be cautious on the roads this spring and give turtles a brake! These reptiles are often hit by cars during the warmer months, but are at special risk this time of year because they are more ac-

Common turtles spotted crossing Missouri roads include three-toed box turtles, ornate box turtles, and snapping turtles.

Turtles emerge from their burrows and begin the hunt for food and mates during warm and wet conditions, which can lead them to cross roadways, oftentimes resulting in their death. Thousands of box turtles are killed every year by vehicles.

Young males make up most of the travelers, sometimes wandering as many as six miles searching for territories and mates. Females are also crossing the roads in search of nesting areas.

Turtles are ectothermic, or cold-blooded, and depend on external sources of heat to determine their body temperatures. This is why people see them on warm asphalt during cool, spring days.

Vehicles are one of the leading threats box turtles face in Missouri, and MDC urges motorists to be cautious and slow down if they see a turtle in the road. If helping a turtle make it safely across, check for traffic and always move the turtle in the direction it is traveling.

Additionally, MDC urges the public to leave turtles in the wild. Taking a wild animal, whether a turtle or other wildlife species, and keeping it as a pet normally ends in a slow death. Leave turtles in the wild, follow the speed limit, and keep your eyes on the road.

WHO'S ON FIRST?

More than once, a parishioner spoke with me about his alcoholic son. The boy had great promise but started drinking at an early age. By the time I knew him, he was an adult and an alcoholic.

In response to his father's pleading, "Why do you drink? Why don't you quit?," the son replied, "I just like to drink. From my very first drink, I enjoyed it; and I don't want to quit. All my friends drink." Eventually and prematurely, it cost him his life. Knowingly, consciously, this man chose to be an alcoholic. He chose a bad life over a good one.

There is a similar story in the Bible. A rich young ruler came to Jesus and asked how he could receive the good life---eternal life. (Mark 10:17-27). Jesus told him to obey the commandments; the young man said he had kept those from childhood. "Very good," Jesus replied, "but you have another problem. Your wealth is your God. Sell all you have and give it to the poor; and put God first in your life."

"No, thank you," the wealthy man said, for he was rich. One does not have to be rich or an alcoholic to be separated from God; but you do have to love God with all your heart, soul, and mind. To be a believer, God must have first place in your life.

One of the Renaissance poets wanted to take a wife, but there was a problem. He already had a wife. "Nothing doing," his present wife said, "it's me only or goodbye."

Jesus put it this way, "You cannot serve God and something else, for you will love one and hate the other." (Matthew 6:24-34) In other words, two things cannot be first.

Help Save The Dorman House. Nickolas Smith and Suzanne Bush are organizing this fundraiser to benefit Henry County Historical Society. Built in 1852, the Dorman House is currently the oldest standing two-story home in Clinton and listed on the Na-

tional Register of Historic Places in 1983. The home remained in the Dorman family for over 150 years but fell into disrepair as fortunes dwindled. 




