Nearly Broke Down, Three Car **Buffs Keep Cruise Night Running**

On Saturday, May 13, Clinton will host the first cruise night of the season. Although cruise nights on the Square have been going for 20 years, the tradition was in danger of ending last

Then long-time car guys in the community decided to keep it going— same time, same day, same place.

"Most people won't even know it's changed," Matt Wray said.

Matt, along with Brent Winter and Marty Loyd, are the three officers of a new not-for-profit that formed to run Clinton's cruise night. What's different— formerly under the aegis of Main Street, it is now steered by a group of community volunteers who are all "car people," Matt said -- both guys and

What they are 100 percent committed to:

"It will always be free, and it will alway be on the Clinton Square," he said.

Clinton's cruise night is the second oldest cruise night in central Missouri,

Matt said. Since 2017, it's been run by Chris and Crystal Church, who built it up from 75 cars to 150. The Churches, while working and raising a family, volunteered their time to keep it going despite a decreasing number of people who wanted to help, Matt said.

That, combined with concerns about the chipseal surfacing done on the streets around the Square, led to talk that Clinton's cruise night might have to be moved off the Square.

It was not something the local car crowd wanted to see happen.

"So we thought, 'What would it take to keep it here?" Matt said, "and we realized it would take getting the whole gang getting back together."

So they sent out the word, and now have enough volunteers to work at all six cruise nights this year, he said. They decided to officially name it Cruisin' to

There will be some new twists: There will be a live DJ at every event, Matt said, who he met at a car show in Deepwater. Bud

Prosecuting Attorney: Young Man Sentenced in Home Invasion Case

Colby Thornton, 20 of Calhoun, Missouri was sentenced to seventeen (17) years in the Missouri **Department of Corrections** for burglary in the first degree, kidnapping in the first degree and sexual abuse in the first degree.

The Henry County Prosecuting Attorney filed the case against Thornton in December 2019. The case stems from an investigation by the Henry County Sheriff Office of a home invasion that occurred in Calhoun on December 17, 2019. Thornton who was 17 years of age at the time broke into the residence at night. While in the residence, Thornton sexually assaulted the elderly homeowner and tied the victim to furniture with electrical tape. Thornton then left the scene with the victim's vehicle and a number of items including the victim's debit card.



tim's vehicle in the area some time later and followed footprints to Thornton's location, where he was then taken into custody. DNA evidence later confirmed Thornton's presence in the home and in physical contact with the victim. Video footage obtained from local businesses also assisted in confirming Thornton's involvement.

Interactive Mystery Raises Stakes For Calhoun Colt Show

It is a cool night in October of 1874, the night of the final game of the poker tournament at the Deadwood Saloon. At the table are Gambling Jack, card shark Clay Coldwell, land speculator Montgomery Money, southern belle Holly Hickok, the dealer, Poker Alice, and a traveling salesman, Mitch Maverick.

But for one of the players, it was the last hand.

Last Saturday, townsfolk of Calhoun and Henry County cowboys and gals gathered at the Colt Show building in Calhoun for an interactive murder mystery dinner. Called Murder at the Deadwood Saloon, the fundraiser was staged by the Broke & Busted Saddle Club and drew 66 people, most in western garb gamblers in black suits, lawmen in black hats, Levis, vests and boots, cowboys in chaps and dusters, saloon girls in satin dresses.

Bartender Jason Smith cooked the chicken for the dinner and served drinks. Dee Ensor and Kelly Marriott, plus officers of the Broke & Busted Saddle Club and the Calhoun Colt Show committee, also prepared and served food.

After dinner, saloon girls circulated, soliciting dances from patrons in return for play money. When the poker game started, everyone gathered around the table to watch the action, but drifted away until a gun shot rang out, bringing everybody's attention back to the front of saloon, where a body lay on the floor.

Taking charge of the scene was Marshal Dalton, played by Henry County deputy Rob Hill of Deepwater. Sheriff Sam (Travis

Quigley) was also on hand. Suspicious characters included the outlaw Jesse Wales, played by Crystal Stevenson, and Stage Coach Mary, played by Deborah Schreiner. Linda Freese of Heartland Community Theatre, was Elizabeth Money, wife of Montgomery Money.

As Harry and Henrietta High-Stakes, owners of the saloon, Rick and Shelly Acosta welcomed guests to the event, and explained the premise — that neither the murder or the murderee knew who they were until they opened their characters' instruction envelopes. Everyone was a suspect, even Banker Bob, played by Cass County deputy Mike Klinefelter of Urich. Sound was provided by Kenny Price.

Popular vote for murderer was the saloon owner, Harry High-Stakes, Shelly said, played by her spouse, Rick Acosta.





"Budman" Powell will emcee every show, and play nostalgic car songs from the '50s and '60s.

"We are committed to it being a community event," Brent said.

Brent, who grew up in Clinton, CHS Class of '87, has a '29 Ford Roadster salt flat race car. He recalled that teenagers used to come down and cruise around the Square.

Marty has a Plymouth Duster. Matt grew up in Peculiar/Harrisonville area, but has lived in Clinton for 25 years. He met Brent and other car guys through their mutual interest. Matt has a '37 Wild Rod and a '34 coupe, which his son drives.

Taking over cruise night, they have streamlined the running of it, Matt said, getting rid of committees and meetings, which no one wanted to attend. Now the three men and a group of advisors direct things, mostly by phone, Brent said. People volunteer to help. They've already lined up two volunteers for each of the six cruise nights, he said, to set up traffic cones, help the DJ unload and set up, eand direct car parking, then help take down afterwards. The job comes with a premier parking spot for your car, Matt said.

Versailles has the biggest cruise night, Matt said, drawing more than 300 cars. Clinton has the biggest town square in Missouri, so has the potential to grow as big. Now, Clinton cruisers fill up the parking spaces on the east side of the square, and lap around the south side.

"We have the best cruisenight facility around," Matt said. "We have the parking, the shade, the Square and the nostalgia."

Some towns' cruise nights are staged in parking lots, with maybe one tree for shade.

"Everybody is standing under that tree, like cows in a field on a hot day," Brent said

Cruisin' to Clinton will start a new tradition of cruising by a nursing home or senior citizen nousing facility at the close of each cruise night, at 7 p.m. On May 13, they will cruise to Clinton Healthcare, then drive out to the Olde Crow and Winery on Highway 7.

Cruise nights will also have food trucks at every event, Matt said —in May, TLC BBQ and Maw's Kettle Corn. Vendors are welcome to apply, with no fee required, but must have a local vendor permit.

On June 10, Cruisin' to Clinton will have a special attraction —a vintage bicycle show, Matt said, with bicycles from Clinton collector Skipper Buckley. Buckely collects models from the '60s and '70s, including Schwinn Krate Sting Rays, a classic hotrod version. Another bicycle collector is planning to bring a big-wheel bike, Matt said, and Charlie the Window-Washer will be on his bike in costume, complete with handlebar mus-

The goal of a cruise night is to meet other car people and have a good time, Matt said, not have a competition, like at a car show. Cruise nights bring car buffs of all ages together, Brent said, and all types of collectible cars are welcome— originals, hot rods, racers and new cars.

On May 6, the C to C volunteers will bring their cars down to the Square for a prom night photo shoot at 4 p.m. Students will be photographed on a red carpet in front of vintage cars, with the photographs posted on Facebook afterwards. There is no charge for the event, which is being organized by Main Street's Amanda Johnson. Cruise night volunteers continue to work with

Main Street, Matt said, and also appreciate the continued support of David Lee at the Clinton Chamber of Commerce.

Both Matt and Brent have photos on their phones of their sons at a young age at car events. Matt remembers attending one of the first Clinton Cruise Nights with son Tanner when Tanner was an infant. He is now 21 and a big-time car guy, Matt said.

Brent has a selfie that his son Zach, who was 4 years old, took at a drag race. Zach is now 20, but is not into cars.

Their goal: to get more young people involved, Brent said. The car culture was dying back in 2005, he said, until car manufacturers reintroduced the Mustang, Camaro and Challenger, which revived it. The Cruisin' to Clinton volunteers hope to support the trend by raising enough money to fund scholarships for vo-tech students in the future, Matt said. A 50-50 raffle held at each event will help cover costs. they said.

Clinton had a handful of car enthusiasts with large private collections, Matt said, but that number is down one, after Rich Theiler, who owned R.A.T. Rods in Clinton, passed away. Three other car collectors have their collections stored downtown, or one at his home. Cars that show up at Clinton's cruise night can range from a few hundred dollars in value to models worth thousands of dollars, Matt said.

"If it's your pride and job, bring it," Brent said. "No one will be turned away."

Cruisin' to Clinton takes place on the second Saturday of the month from 4 p.m. to 7 p.m. May through September, plus the third Saturday night of October. No entrance fee for cars or spectators. Cruisers afterwards will drive through the grounds of senior or rehab complexes, depending on the weather, but may skip July and August because of the heat, Matt said. For more information, check the Cruisin' to Clinton facebook.

Upcoming car shows include the Clinton Technical School Car show fundraiser on May 6, and the Clinton Senior Center Car Show. also a fundraiser, on June 17. Both are fundraisers, with entry fees and awards.

Amanda Sears, playing debutante daughter Minnie Money, was named Drama Queen. The Broke & Busted Saddle Club, headed by Shelly Acosta, and the Calhoun Colt Show committee, headed by Nicole Smith, put on fundraisers throughout the year to help cover the costs of the community celebration. The Broke & Busted Saddle Club hosts the Colt Show Follies and the Equestrian Day events during the weekend at the Lonnie Price Memorial Arena north of Highway 52,

both free to spectators. Founded in 1900, the Calhoun Colt Show is one of the oldest town festivals in the state, evolving from a fall event at which horse breeders showed young stock to other breeders. It always on the second weekend of September. The theme of this year's festival, the 114th, is "Kicking Up the Dust in Jugtown," as Calhoun was known in the 19th century, when dozens of kiln towers of potteries dotted the landscape, supplying earthenware throughout Missouri

Contests, games, and activities for families and children are scheduled on the Square, on Hwy. 52, for the Colt Show plus a parade, car show, outdoor church service, pie auction, and a host of other events (see www.coltshow.com.) Free concerts on the Square with a beer garden and concessions take place on Friday and Saturday evenings. New events for this year are a stick horse rodeo, Pinewood Derby and karaoke contest, and possibly a revival of the Men's Legs contest.

For more whodunits, check out Heartland Community Theatre's summer production, an interactive murder mystery titled "Just Desserts." Set at a baking cookoff contest, it will presented on June 9, 10, 11 and 17, and is directed by Linda Freese. The theatre is located just off the Clinton Square at 108 N. Washington.

The weekend after the Calhoun Colt Show is the HCT fall production, "West of the Pecos," a frontier-themed comedy, on Sept. 15, 16, 17 and 23.

The Broke & Busted Saddle Club also hosts murder mystery dinners at Halloween and on New Year's Eve, Shelly said. Check the club's Facebook for information.

ton pleaded guilty and was sentenced to five years for burglary, twelve years for kidnapping and five years for sexual abuse. The five year sentence for the count of sexual abuse is to run consecutive to the other counts. Therefore, controlling Thornton's sentence will be seventeen years. Because of the nature of the crimes, the law requires that he serve nearly twelve years of that sentence before being eligible for release on parole.



The Clinton City Council met in open session, April 18, at City Hall. Council Persons Debbie Smith and Cameron Jackson were absent. There were no personal appearances or second readings of previously

Councilman Roger House gave the Public Works Committee report. The council approved that the old leaf vac, used by the Street Department, to be surplus property and to be sold at Cook Auction.

A request to close a street for the Clinton Technical School Skills USA Car Show was also approved by the

council. Councilman House said that the Artesian Park pool house: "Is a good work in progress," and reported that work on the interior walls has started, although the roofers have not started yet. City Administrator Christy Maggi filled in the report about the Aquatic Center pool closure: the pumps and motors, which circulate the water in the lap pool there, will sent off for diagnosis before further reocmmendations for action can be taken. The therapy pool, however, is running at the Aquatic Center. Councilman House said that discussions with pickleball enthusiasts will be held to help clarify what is needed to stripe four of the Artesian tennis courts for that purpose. Striping can be done for \$500 per court. At the Waste Water Treatment Plant, HDR (Engineering) has forwarded the improvement projects for the plant to the city attorney for review. The document

repairs - which developed more problems during the last repair; also, the city still does not have firm dates on the delivery of the remote monitoring devices for the various pump stations. There was no date on the upper-level pump delivery date, either.

Public Notice period for the permit renewal for the Waste Water Treatment Plant is from April 7 through May 8. A copy of the notice has been placed at city hall as required.

The first reading of Bill No. 2023-11 was held – the council approved the first reading of the bill regarding a conditional use permit for property at 1601 N. Water for a travel or camping park

The first readings of Bills No. 2023-12 and 13 were also held and approved by the Clinton City Council -Councilwoman Becky Raysik abstained voting from each. Both bills involve the annexing of land into the city (1206 and 1208 N. Vansant Rd.). Although both first readings were approved, there was considerable discussion among the council members asking for clarification from City Attorney Doug Harris about the annexation - specifically about "when the road a property is annexed by becomes city responsibility." At present, Chelsea Drive will not become part of the

city's responsibility. The council approved a motion from Councilman House to negotiate a contract with Whitehead Consultants to plat the south part of Englewood Cemetery.

The Public Safety report was given by Councilman Gene Henry. The council approved that the John Deer 997 Z diesel mower be declared as surplus property and sold at Cook Auction. Also approved as surplus property were a Coleman generator, leaf blowers, an

air compressor, floor buffer, another air compressor, a ventilation fan, and a wire fram stokes rescue litter. The fire department will establish a "viewing date" for these items and a few weeks after that, allow sealed bids on any items. As Council Henry commented, however: "These are of lesser value; some of these work and some don't."

The sound barrier installation will soon be installed at the Clinton Animal Shelter. The panels have arrived and the installation will be put out ti bid.

Councilman Henry also reported that two new police officers will be starting at CPD: One will be returning to work in Clinton and the other will be transferring from the Henry County Sheriff's office.

Councilman Daniel Wilson gave the Finance Committee report. First on his report was that two companies bid for the new sign at Gerhart Industrial Park. However, both came in higher than expected and will be re-evaluated for "value engineering." The first and second readings of Bills No. 2023-14 and 15 were held (the rules were suspended to accommodate timing issues). Both concern that Airport Runway 18/36 and Taxiway B rehab project. Both were readings were approved by the council. Recall that the city match is 10% (MoDOT pays 90% of the project). Unfinished business for

the council was accepting the certified returns: Wendee Seaton read the oaths of office to the newly (and re-elected) officials. Daniel Wilson, Roger House Shelley Nelson, and Austin Jones all took their oaths. Recognized for their service on the council were Rick Pereles and Becky Raysik. Pereles served for eight years and Becky Raysik for six. Both received plagues.

The council reconvened and was called to order with the new members in place. A motion to appoint Councilman Daniel Wilson as Acting President Pro Tem was made and approved. Mayor Moberly announced her appointments to the standing committees: Public Safety will be Debbie Smith, Gene Henry, and Austin Jones. Public Works will be Cameron Jackson, Roger House, and Shelley Nelson. The Finance Committee will be Carla Moberly, Martha Nichols and Daniel Wilson.

Mayor Moberly told Mr. Pereles and Mrs. Raysik they had both done fabulous jobs in their tenure as council persons. City Administrator Christy Maggi reported to the council that work should start on the roof at city hall soon and that insurance adjusters are also evaluating for other damage to city buildings from the recent weather event.

The council had no new business and adjourned at 6:39 p.m.







Looking Back: Drafts in Other Sports

The NFL was reviewed last week.



The MLB draft has been going since 1965 and is held in the middle of the season. Generally, the teams pick in reverse order based on last year's results. The MLB has a lot of high school (prep) athletes picked. In 1965 Rick Monday from ASU was the very first pick (he went to the KC Athletics), but the next seven picks were all high schoolers. But note, very few of the MLB draftees go directly to the Major Leagues (only 23 have done it), and only three since 2000. Pitchers have the best chance to make it to the Majors quickly. MLB is based on the minor leagues developing players and the needs of the parent club. The MLB drafts for 40 rounds compared to NFL's seven, and the NBA two rounds. The MLB draft was first broadcast on ESPN in '07. The MLB draft history is complicated, but the main theme is controlling the cost of procuring new players.



National Association: The NBA draft is an annual event that typically focuses on college basketball players, but international players are also eligible. College players who have finished their four-year college eligibility are automatically eligible, while underclassmen have to 'declare', and give up their remaining college eligibility. International players at least 22 years old are automatically eligible, while players <22 have to declare. The NBA draft started in 1947, and takes place near the end of June. Since '89, the draft has consisted of two rounds, drafting sixty players. In the past, high school players were also eligible, (2003 Lebron James for example). However, starting in the '06, 'prep' players were not eligible directly after graduating. They now have to wait one year after graduation, and be at least 19. The


NBA Draft also includes a Lottery, where teams who did not make the playoffs participate in state-lottery-style process in order to determine the first picks of the draft. The NBA introduced the lottery process in 1985. The league was attempting to counter accusations

that teams were losing

on purpose. Since 2019,

the first four picks have

been determined by the



National Hockey League: The NHL Entry Draft started in 1963. Requirements: North American players 18-20 years old and European/ international players 18-21. The NHL drafts for seven rounds. The teams have two years to sign their pick. During the draft, teams take turns selecting amateur players from junior or collegiate leagues and professional players from European leagues. The NHL Draft was known as the NHL Amateur Draft until 1979. In 1994 the draft was solely determined by using the reverse order of the standings. In '95 'weighted' lottery system was started where only non-playoff teams participate and the team's chances of moving up or down in the draft is determined by the lottery. (It's a bit complicated.) The playoff teams follow the lottery teams. Their order is determined by how they did in the playoffs.



Major League Soccer: The MLS drafts have evolved based on the league's needs. The types include: Inaugural, Supplement, College, Super, Contraction, Expansion, and the Re-Entry Drafts. Currently, only the Super Draft is being used. The league has expanded from 10 to 29 teams. The first college draft was held in 1996 and the first Super Draft in 2000. Expansion clubs get the first pick. Teams that did not make the playoffs are ordered by their regular-season record. Teams that made the MLS Cup Playoffs are LOOKING Page 12





VanBlarcum also has been a member of The Honors College all four years at UCM, and has maintained an exemplary GPA throughout her collegiate career while being employed both on and off campus.





SERVING JESUS

Matthew's gospel tells a story of Jesus going home with Peter for lunch. It is a simple story but contains several examples Christians should note. (Matthew 8:14ff)

Worship participation: Mark's gospel tells us Jesus and Peter were arriving home after attending church (synagogue). (Mark 1:29ff) If for no other reason but example, Christians should faithfully attend worship. Many have said to me, "I don't have to go to church to be a Christian." True, but why would you not want to worship with other believers? If Jesus found worship attendance important, shouldn't we?

Hospitality: It appears Peter invited Jesus home for lunch even though his mother-in-law was ill, sick enough to be in bed. Peter's home was in Capernaum, an area known for mosquitos and malaria. Perhaps the mother-in-law had malaria which is often accompanied by a painful and debilitating

Healing: Jesus touched the hand of the sick lady, and the fever left her. Few, if any, of us can heal with a simple touch like Jesus; but we should never underestimate the power of the human touch---a handshake, a hug, or a kiss.

We must also note that in our modern world the early pursuit for healing was led by Christian doctors and church supported hospitals. The healings as recorded in the Bible are impressive; but they pale in comparison to today's medical achievements.

Serving: Jesus' healing of this feverish woman is impressive, but the star of this story is Peter's mother-in-law. She rose from a sickbed to serve. Considering the lackadaisical commitment of many Christians, she might have legitimately offered any of the following excuses not to serve: (1) That worthless son-in-law! Why did he bring company for dinner? He knew I was sick. (2) I have been ill; they should not expect me to help. (3) It's time for these young people to serve. I've served my time. (4) I'm not sure we have enough food. Times are hard. No doubt other matters could have hindered her. No, she made no excuses. She rose to serve Jesus.

Help Save The Dorman House. Nickolas Smith and Suzanne Bush are organizing this fundraiser to benefit Henry County Historical Society. Built in 1852, the Dorman House is currently the oldest standing two-story home in Clinton and listed on the National Register of Historic Places in 1983. The home remained in the Dorman family for over 150 years but fell into disrepair as fortunes dwindled. Clinton Main Street purchased the home in 1996 from the Dorman family and spent six years restoring the house using volunteer labor. Clinton Main Street utilized the home as its office until 2008 when it was deeded to the Henry County Historical Society. While the historical society has kept up with minor maintenance over the years, larger issues with the structure have become more apparent. The east side of the home exhibits minor cracking and separation and after many severe rain showers for several years in a row — the house has developed a serious foundation and wall issues. The Henry County Historical Society needs to take immediate action to prevent further damage and possible loss of the Dorman House. It is hoped that listing as a Place in Peril will raise awareness for the Save the Dorman capital improvement campaign and help the historical society find the expertise needed to guide them through the creation of a historic structures report and the proper restoration of this



And then she posted it: "Ban assault weapons!" It was the latest in a series of tweets from our Vice President, Kamala Harris. As many do, they try to argue that the 2nd Amendment is outdated like somehow it shouldn't evolve with the times and technology that inevitably happens. I guess I could have replied that I expected all her expressions of speech to be officially in proper quill dipped ink and written on parchment because I'm sure our forefathers didn't envision typewriters or, god forbid, iPhone keyboards on a digital social media space, but I didn't. However, I will say that all the hubbub about the second amendment and banning guns is misguided because everyone focuses on "guns" or, as the case

the other night, on that "well regulated militia" phrase. But in reality, the word that really gets overlooked is "arms." When the 2nd amendment was written it didn't just mean "keep your muskets" it really meant "arms;" that is: swords, muskets, knives and cannons. It meant "whatever was necessary to repel a force threatening your individual liberty, life, or freedom and way of life (which had just been hard won from the British by the way).

The flaw in arguing that

the "well regulated militia" clause is outdated is faulty, too. It means that Americans in any city, county, neighborhood, or area, can gather together and begin practicing, arming or organizing against anything they deem a threat to their constitutionally and, literally, God given rights (or natural rights - those given automatically at birth) - that is to say - against tyranny. It didn't mean they had to maintain one at all times, but that if the need arose, the right and means to form one would never be taken away - against small threats or large. From threats from within our own country - or by anoth-

The Second Amendment is in our Constitution on purpose. In fact, James Madison had to hurriedly write the whole Bill of Rights in because several states wouldn't ratify the new Constitution until they were printed and spelled out so there would be no misunderstanding. He thought they were "understood rights." Everyone else was like: "list them, or we won't sign on."

These are important safeguards. Let's not tinker with them.





