Once Doomed, Dorman House Is Saved By Historical Society

BY JENNIFER JACKSON Staff Reporter

People coming to town this year for Olde Glory Days will find a special attraction. For the first time in two years, the Dorman House will be open to the public.

"We are hoping to have it open by Olde Glory Days, so people can go through it," said Suzanne Bush, director of the Henry County Historical Museum. Built in 1852, the Dorman House was closed in June of 2021 because of structural problems. Now, work is going ahead to put it back on a firm foundation. To help cover the costs of the first two phases of the project, the Henry County Historical Society, which manages the museum, has launched a campaign to raise \$250,000.

The first phase started in March. In order to secure the walls, builders had to remove wallpaper, and in some places, replace bricks in the interior walls with concrete blocks. Steel lintels were installed over doorways, pier supports were placed under the east and north sides, and a concrete floor was poured under the living room and music room. New

ducts for heating and air conditioning hold metal rods, which tie the inside walls to the outside walls to prevent bowing.

Workers also removed the front hall staircase, and installed steel posts to support a new staircase and the upstairs landing. The work revealed the old strongbox, built of brick into the floor of the office.

The box was found years ago, so held no secrets, Suzanne said. A plexiglassglass cover will be placed over it, she said, so it remains in view.

By next fall, the Historical Society hopes to be entering the second phase of the Dorman House project, putting the interior back together.

To help pay for the project,

the Historical Society has planned three fundraisers —a chicken dinner and auction on June 10, a hamburger and bratwurst cookout on Sept. 23, and a Murder Mystery Dinner on Oct. 2. bers.





to the chicken dinner are \$20 (\$25 at the door). It will include live music and a silent and live auction. The Delozier Building was built in 1874 as the First National Bank of Clinton, Dorman which Judge helped organize.

The Homestead, across from the museum annex, will be the site of the Sept. 23 burger and brats cookout, which will be held in conjunction with Old Settlers Days. A free family event, Old Settlers Days will include demonstrations of pioneer crafts.

"Murder the Ball," Masquerade а murder-mystery dinner, is on Oct. 2, is a leadup to Halloween, with participants in masks and costumes, and actors from the Levity Players Group in St. Louis.

Suzanne estimates that it will take another \$50,000 to complete the third phase of the project, preserving the exterior of the Dorman House by sand-blasting and applying a treatment that allows the bricks to breathe but keeps moisture out.

Most of the bricks of the Dorman House are sound, she said, but parts of the walls had to be tuck-pointed because the mortar between them had dissolved.

"People don't realize how much maintenance is needed for a brick building," she said.

Cracks and gaps in the interior walls, slumping exterior walls and soft floor joists prompted the museum to have an engineer come and evaluate the house for safety.

After examining the house, the engineer asked if it was still open for tours. When Suzanne said yes, he replied "It shouldn't be." The city inspector seconded the judgment. So the Dorman House was closed and the furnishings removed the antique settee and Victorian occasional tables in the parlor, the desk and law books from Judge Dorman's office, the carved wood furniture from the upstairs' bedroom where Jerubial and Udolpha slept, connected to the bedroom where they raised six children.

After the last Dorman to live in the house moved to a nursing home, caretakers lived in the house, according to Thom Knott, a Dorman descendant. But by that time, the house was in such a state of disrepair that he invited engineers from the state to give him options of what to do with it. Their conclusion:

"They said it would have to be rebuilt brick by brick," Thom said.

In 1996, he sold the house to Clinton Main Street for the price of the lot, he said. Main Street has used the Dorman House for its offices. Volunteers who spent the next six years restoring it included Dr. Glaspy, Barry Glasscock, Jerry Mosley and Dwight Whitten.


In 2008, the Henry County Historical Society acquired the Dorman House, and the house, in the second block of Franklin, became part of the complex of historic buildings on Franklin Street, just off the Square. The stone horse trough from the yard of the Dorman House, which was a stage-coach stop, is on the museum grounds.

In 1983, the Dorman House was placed in the National Register of Historic Places, the fourth of eight landmarks in Henry County to have that honor. In the fall of 2021, the Henry County Historical Society applied to Missouri Alliance for Historic Preservation to have the Dorman House named to its "Place in Peril" list of

historic sites in need of

rescue. It made the list, but the honor didn't attract any funding, so the Henry County Historical Society was thrown back on its own resources.

In addition to the fundraisers, the museum started a Go Fund Me Page, "Help Save the Dorman



Every contribution helps, Suzanne said.

"It's okay if it's just a little bit at a time," she said. "It adds up over time."

From Ziegfield Follies to the DAR: **Dorman Family Holds Decades of** History

The oldest two-story house in Clinton, the Dorman House sheltered three generations of the Dorman family, whose saga brings a century and a half of American history to life, from the 1849 Gold Rush to the 1990s.

The house, on Franklin Street, was built in 1852, the year Jerubial Dorman returned to Illinois from California. Jerubial had sailed to Central America, traveled across Honduras to the Pacific Ocean, then sailed back up the coast to join the Gold Rush. But when digging for gold proved harder than advertised, he returned by ship around the Horn.

Born in Kentucky in 1818, Jerubial found farming dull, so sought work on flatboats on the Ohio River, traveling to St. Louis, then down the Mississippi to New Orleans. He also took a government job blazing a military road from Boonville, Mo., to Fort Scott, Kansas.

According to research by county historian Tom Colwell, Jerubial remembered passing through Clinton, where he stayed in a log tavern on the northeast corner of the Square with Col. Joe Davis, who had a corn patch where the courthouse is

In 1850, according to Colwell, Dorman returned to the Mississippi, purchased part interest in a steamboat and worked as a riverboat captain, running between Quincy, III., and New Orle-

Two years later, he embarked on the sea of matrimony with a widow, Udolpha Miller, in Quincy. In 1856, the Dormans moved to Clinton with their oldest son, Charles Douglas, and opened a general store on the north side of the Square. A second son, William H.,

was born soon after. By the time their third son, George Harris, was born in 1857, the Dormans were living in the house at 301 W. Franklin. It originally had four rooms down, bedrooms upstairs and a summer kitchen connected to the back of the house by a porch. As the family grew, a two-story addition was built on to a back corner of the house, and later, a kitchen and a large music room were added.

In 1860, Jerubial was elect-

ed county judge, which as the chief judicial officer made him captain of the Home Guard when the Civil War broke out. But in a town where many residents were pro-Confederacy, Judge Dorman's role as the local representative of the Union was something of a balancing

Udolpha Miller Dorman was born in 1830 in Frederick County, Maryland, which like Kentucky and Missouri, was a border state. Udolpha was descended from colonists who grabbed their guns when they heard the Redcoats were coming, and the local chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution is named in her honor. Udolpha Dorman, who survived eight pregnancies, died at 76 years of age in 1906 while visiting her daughter, Victoria, in Kansas. According to Udolpha's obituary, the M.K.& T. Flyer brought her body back to Clinton, where she was buried in Englewood Cemetery. Jerubial, 12 years older than his spouse, outlived her by four years, dying at 91 years old. His younger brother, Mathew Dorman, fought in the Mexican War, and died in 1892, and is buried at Englewood Cemetery. The eldest Dorman son, Charles, and the Dorman's third son, George, both died in 1938. The youngest son,

age 77. That left the second son, William H., 84, as the last surviving brother. Also surviving Oscar were the Dormans' daughters, Miss Emma Dorman, born in 1864, and Victoria Dorman Phillips, born in 1867. Attending Oscar's funeral with Victoria were her daughters, Miss Udolpha Phillips, and Katharine, who was Mrs. J. Mullaly.

Oscar, died the next year, at

Her grandmother's namesake, Udolpha Phillips was born in 1903 in Kansas, but moved to Clinton with her family when she was a freshman in high school, living in a house across from the Dorman House. She graduated from CHS, and the family moved to St Louis, where Victoria and her daughters are listed as being from at the time of Oscar's funeral.

In 1914, Emma organized the Udolpha Miller Dorman Chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution. She lived through two world wars, dying in 1947 at age

Victoria gets the longevity award in the family — she died at the age 97 in 1964 in Clinton, where she returned to live in her childhood home. Udolpha Phillips also returned to Clinton to take care of her mother.

Udolpha Phillips continued to live in the house for 20 years after her mother's death. Suzanne Bush, among other Clinton residents, remembers when Udolpha would drive her big Cadillac around town, and pick up a take-out meal from the restaurant on the Square where Suzanne worked.

Thom Knott, owner of the Thom Knott insurance agency in Clinton, is the grandson of Victoria's other daughter, Katherine Mullaly. Thom remembers spending time in the summers at the Dorman House when he was growing up, and said he knew his Great-Aunt Udolpha well when he was a child and a young man.

When Udolpha Phillips needed care, her sister, Thom's grandmother, moved her to a nursing home. After Katharine died, Thom became Udolpha's unofficial guardian, he said, visiting her in the nursing home, although she thought he was one of her uncles.

Udolpha Phillips died in 1992, at age 88, in the Westwood Nursing Home in Clinton, and is buried at Englewood Cemetery. Her obituary states that she attended Stephens College in Columbia, and was an interpretative dancer who "received offers from the Ziegfield Follies."

In Clinton, she was a regent in the DAR, a member of Colonial Dames, served as chairman of the Clinton Centennial, led the Humane and the Historical societies, and was a member of the Episcopal church. Thom remembers attend-

ing her funeral. He also remembers how active his grandmother and his greataunt were in the DAR, and how hard his grandmother

worked to keep the house from falling apart.

Thom, who toured the Dorman House last week to view the work being done, said he is delighted the Henry County Historical Society is committed to saving the historic home.

He said, however, once he became a coach himself, he had to worry about things he never had to worry about before: where to park the bus, will the bus fit there? How do I get all the students to McDonald's? In other words, the logistics of taking groups of students anywhere comes with worry and extra planning. But little did Barnes know he had an ace-in-the-hole: a seasoned driver who had taken generations of students to track meets, State or otherwise, and had through long years of experience the solution to all those problems. It was a worry-reducer for a new coach.

Not only had this particular awardee drove a bus for many years, but she has also served on the School Board for the past ten years and used her experience to help guide decisions made for current and future students in other capacities. She is, as Barnes said, one of the rare examples of a selfless person.

So - congratulations to Distinguished Alumni Award winner Marilyn Parratt – CHS Class of 1965! And, by the way, she was shocked once she realized who the awardee was - another example of not thinking of herself first. A well deserved award!

We as her family are truly proud and honored to call her Wife, Mother, Grandma and Great Memaw. she will be missed beyond words!



Amos 7:1. (KJV) A Plumb Line:

Is a string with a metal weight at one end that, when suspended, points directly towards the earth's centre of gravity and so is used to determine verticality, perpendicularity, the depth of water.

Like the plumb line points to the earth in a straight line, we should ask ourselves if we are straight with God. Amo 7:7-8. (KJV)

God has set rules for his people. He put a plumb line on his people because of their wickedness. He could see the amount of wickedness they had. They were far from the foundation of where God wanted them to be.

Amos told the people he was not a prophet, but was called by God to tell them his prophecy.m

Galatians 1:6-9. (KJV)

The Galatians did not build on the foundation of the apostles. To pervert something is to divert what was intended to be.

It tells us in Galatians 2:4 And that because of false

brethren unawares brought in, who came in privily to spy out our liberty which we have in Christ Jesus, that they might bring us into bondage.(KJV)

Gal 5:1. (KJV)

Somebody bewitched the people for they did not build on God's foundation. Don't get off course and veer from God. Don't allow people to entangle you in other things. Gal 5:4 Christ is become of no effect unto you, whosoever of you are justified by the law; ye are fallen from grace. (KJV)

The Clinton City Council met in open session May 2 at City Hall; absent were Councilmen Gene Henry and Cameron Jackson.

Preceding the council session the dangerous buildings commission met. Community Development Director Chuck Bailey reported to the commission that the owner of the property at 118 – 120 South Main (on the downtown square) was "aggressively seeking to complete" the remaining work there. Although there is hope the commission will be able to dissolve soon, a motion to reconvene at the June 6 council meeting was approved.

Mayor Carla Moberly called the regular council session to order. Following roll call and the saying of the Pledge of Allegiance, the previous meeting's minutes were approved. There were no personal appearances.

Chamber Director David Lee reported to the council. Among the multiple new business and anniversary celebrations the Clinton Chamber helped celebrate, he reported that a Katy Trail Tour Bus shuttle business will be opening soon. Also, he reported the Chamber has started a "tag us" campaign which includes businesses tagging the Chamber on their Facebook page,

which will result in them posting the business and the business also being included in David Lee's Friday News-

Of even more interest was the manner of David Lee's appearance at the council: he was dressed in red, white, and blue - promoting Olde Glory Days. This is the 30th anniversary of the Olde Glory Days celebration here in Clinton, and he handed out some pamphlets which have a brief overview of the events (not the complete schedule) which includes the four Main Stage Acts. The first night is "country night" and the second "rock." The final Main Stage act is Disco Dick and the Mirror Balls (should be fun, folks). A copy of the pamphlet can be obtained through the Chamber's May Flyer (at the Chamber).

The Second Readings for Bills No 2023-11, 2023-12, and 2023-13 were held - all were approved. The first is for a conditional use permit for a travel/camping park at 1601 North Water. The remaining two Bills pertained to the annexation of land at 1206 and 1208 North Vansant Road. It should be noted that the roads at Chelsea Drive will not become the city's responsibility to maintain once the city annexes

Councilman Roger House gave the Public Works report. He reported that Cameron Jackson will remain the Public Works Chair. The council approved a request for a street closure from Clinton Main street. For information only: Golden Valley Memorial Hospital contracted with CJW to get cost and repair estimates for OakStar Drive.

The council approved the declaration of a 2022 Dodge factory-ready bed truck as surplus property so it could be sold. Councilman House said work on the Artesian Park Pool House is going well. Some of the work being completed is coming with some cost savings for the project. He reported that the therapy pool at the Aquatic Center is now running. It was determined that the pumps causing part of the problem can be repaired and those repairs have been authorized by the insurance company. The council approved the striping of pickshipped May 8.

The posting period for the Waste Water Treatment Plant permit renewal process will end May 13th. Also, Alliance will continue to search for a manager at the WWTP as the candidate who was previously offered the position did not accept

The Public Safety Committee report was given by Councilwoman Debbie Smith. The council accepted the resignation of Patrolman Mariah Miller from the police department. Also, the city is still comparing companies for the procedural manual software needed at Clinton PD. It was reported to the council that the new fire truck should be delivered in mid-June.

On a side note: Councilman Wilson asked for clarification about the opening date for the Artesian Park Pool of which it was determined there was no clear opening date established as yet.

The Finance Committee report was given by Councilman Daniel Wilson. The first and second readings (the rules were suspended because of time constraints on these Bills) were held and approved by the council of Bill No. 2023-16 and 17. Both pertain to the airport project. Because the airport terminal and road improvement project were over \$100,000, an independent fee estimate has to be obtained as well.

Because of a judgment in a case involving the Collector of Winchester, Missouri vs. Charter Communications, the city will receive a check for \$160,004. However, the old tax remittance is not completely over and it is expected Charter may appeal the judgment. If it is overturned, the money will have to be reutrned. The city will not be spending the money, but holding it until such time as it is finally determined what will happen. The final portion of

Councilman Wilson's report included information about the new sign at Gerhart Industrial Park. The base cost for the sign is \$44,000, however, it is hoped to add "The City of Clinton" at the bottom of the sign with little cost difference of which (if it is not too costly) the amount could be authorized by the Mayor without council intervention (items under \$10,000 can be authorized by the Mayor). The council approved the action.

The Mayor reported on the metal roof being installed at City Hall: "It is a huge improvement." Also, she lamented the fact that Ann Drury stepped down from her long time position of manager for the Aquatic Center and Artesian Pool. You do not have to be much of a sports fan to have heard of Tim Richard Tebow. He has obviously transcended beyond the football field. For example, he has written several, bestselling books.

At Florida, he won the Heisman as a sophomore and led the team to two national championships. He got a lot of attention by putting bible verses on his eye black before his football games. He also became known for kneeling, as in prayer, after great plays. It became known as "Tebowing".

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

Additional information on equipment inspection stations may be obtained from your local troop headquarters.

In addition to an inspection, boaters should familiarize themselves with Missouri laws regarding boat operation and traditional navigational rules. Missouri law requires everyone born after January 1, 1984, who operates a vessel on Missouri lakes to possess an approved boating safety identification card. This includes those operating a personal watercraft. When boaters understand and obey the law, and vessels are in good operating order, everyone's experience becomes safer.

A life jacket for everyone on board is a must! Children under seven years old are re-

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quired to wear a personal flotation device while in a boat, but you are never too old to wear a life jacket! Although not required by law, children playing along the shoreline or on a dock should wear a life jacket. A drowning can occur quickly, with little or no sign the victim is struggling. Life jackets save lives, please wear

It is important for each boat operator to know the capabilities of their boat. Reducing your speed in unfamiliar areas and being aware of unusual water conditions respective to the size and type of boat you operate are just a couple of environmental considerations.

Extended time in the sun and the constant motion of the water effects every vessel operator. It's important to recognize the dangers of boater fatigue. Stay alert while enjoying Missouri's lakes and rivers. Additionally, if you combine alcohol with boater fatigue your reaction time and thought process will be much slower. Designate a sober captain if you choose to consume alcohol.

Additional safe boating tips: 1) Be a defensive boat operator ... creating distance from other boats gives you more reaction time.

2) Adjust your speed for the conditions ... if visibility is poor, or the water is rough, slow down!

3) Turn off the boat while passengers are entering/exiting the water.

4) If you will be out on the water after dark, check your navigation lights before you leave the dock or ramp.

5) Each boat operator is responsible for doing whatever they can to avoid a crash. Don't expect other boats to move out of your way.

6) Be courteous with your

Boaters are reminded to contact the Missouri State Highway Patrol by dialing *55 on a cellular phone if they need assistance or observe another boater operating a vessel in an unsafe manner.

Watercraft operators must consider the effect their actions have on others: Share the waterway and use common sense, good judgment, and courtesy to ensure the safety of all. Life jackets save lives. Wear It!!



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

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

The Charles's of England England is now on its third Charles...

When Charles I took the throne, England had been undergoing a religious power struggle. The year was 1625. Some 75 years after Henry VIII declared himself head of his own church and broke away from the Catholic Church, the struggle between religious freedom, control and dominance played out in the rulers of England. Charles I, who was decidedly pro-Catholic and was what we refer to as an "absolute monarch," got into it with Parliament multiple times and was heavy handed. While he was at the reins, the English Civil War broke out. In the meantime, Englishmen had been fleeing the countryside and heading to places that were more tolerant of the then illegal brands of worship and religious beliefs: the Pilgrims were part of this group and would, of course, end up in the New World starting a fledgling colony. But, to be sure, when England entered its period of the Commonwealth, and Charles I was executed, the resulting decade until there was again a monarchy accomplished something else: it left the New World English Colonies to their own devices. During that time, they grew autonomous.

When Charles II restored the monarchy (after Oliver Cromwell died), he re-established the Church of England and tried to impart a little religious freedom, but he fought Parliament over all sorts of issues and eventually dissolved it. By the time England got back on track about 1688, things in the colonies were already in motion and their basic character set: by the turn of the 18th century most of the colonies had been functioning on their own and would not take kindly to being told what to do. England had been largely distracted by their internal strife and in many ways ignored their brethren overseas. When King George III needed the colonies' revenue to pay for the French and Indian War 60 years later, the colonies decided they were better off on their own. Hence, the American Revolution.

So, what of Charles III? Well, I watched the coronation and found the process interesting. Coronations of the Crown have their own unique histories, but I don't think this one will result in anything so abrupt as the dissolution of Parliament, an edict about religious freedom, or anything drastic. The monarchy these days is not the same as those of the 17th and 18th Centuries. Indeed, the British Crown is largely a diplomatic and representational role these days as they have a constitutional monarchy. The King or Queen does get to appoint the Prime Minister, though, and has some input on laws which are to be passed.

Charles III now has the distinction of being the oldest monarch in England to begin his rule.

But, more importantly, Americans have enjoyed a long-standing alliance with our cousins across the pond. And, I don't see Charles III doing anything to change

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



through the set they will play for Thursday's concert. They started off with "Funky Stuff," then swung into "Good Times," followed by "Afternoon," a mellower tune which features solos by Gabe Simmons and Lilianne Simmons.

"Afternoon" is one of the students' favorites, they said. The other is "Birdland," featuring a solo by Alex Crawford.
