# Carousel Set To Spin Again In Appleton City

In 2021, Linda Lampkin learned that the traveling carnival that came to the Appleton City Fair every year wasn't coming. The reason — Mary Reinke, who owned the Southern Fun Carnival, had died the previous year, and the carnival, based in Anderson, Mo., was being dismantled and sold.

Linda, the fair chairperson, was disappointed that the carousel, which children had ridden on every year for 11 years, would not be there for future generations.

So she went to Anderson with a mechanic friend and bought it.

She will open the gate at 4 p.m. on May 27 and set the animals spinning. The opening, on the Friday of Memorial Weekend, is a much anticipated event for Appleton City residents, for whom Linda bought it.

"It's a thank-you for all the parents and grandparents who did business with my father, uncle and greatuncle," she said.

Linda's father and her uncle owned the Lampkin Bros. Grain Company from 1954 to 1974. Her greatuncle owned the hardware

store from 1924 to 1963.

Linda said she bought the carousel because she wanted to contribute something to keep the town going. Originally a school teacher, she worked in Kansas City for Ralston-Purina as the first female salesperson west of the Mississippi, then at Kansas City Metro Community College as program coordinator of business

and industry.

It isn't an old carousel, Linda said, but was made by the San Antonio Roller Works between 2000 and 2002. Run by an electric motor, it is a menagerie model, with a variety of animals, from a rooster and a rabbit to a giraffe, zebra and elephant, plus eight horses.

The animals, 18 in all, are made of aluminum,

so there is a maximum weight limit for the rider of 150 pounds, set by the manufacturer. It is strictly enforced for safety. Young children must be accompanied by a person at least five feet tall.

Linda set the carousel up as a non-profit. The price for a ride is whatever people want to pay, she said, as long as it's a U.S. **Carousel 3**

"I Spent the Day at the Zoo with an Elk" may sound like the title of a Dr. Seuss book. But for hundreds of students in Henry and St. Clair counties, it's a reality. They even got the T-shirt. On May 3, Scott Humphreys and 25 members of the Clinton Elks

Lodge took 184 students,

teachers and aides from four school districts on a field trip to Dickerson Park Zoo in Springfield. This is the 20th year the Elks has sponsored the field trip, which is for students who qualify for special services. Scott is the youth activities chairman for Elks Lodge 1034 in Clinton, which started the annual zoo field day with 100 Clinton

School District students in 2003. It has grown to five school districts and almost doubled in participants. Each district chooses which students go, and arranges for bus transportation, Scott said.

The Elks Lodge reimburses the district for the transportation costs, pays for entry fees and zoo train tickets, provides everyone with a hot lunch, and gives each student a T-shirt and a bottle of water and a box of animal crackers for the ride home.

"There is no cost to any of the schools," Scott said. How it started: Scott was visiting his daughter's classroom at Clinton Middle School. He got to know the students well, **Zoo Day 3**

paper bill and you don't want change — she doesn't want to deal with change or coins.

All the animals go up and down, but the project itself had to jump some hurdles. After buying two lots and having them surveyed, the workers found evidence of the previous building on the site -- when it was demolished, the pieces were buried on the lot. Someone who wanted the huge stones hauled off 25 truckloads of it, she said.

Next, Linda had to bring in gravel, which was an unexpected cost. In July of 2022, the concrete was poured, and Linda put her initials, LL, in it.

Linda had seen the antique carousel in Story City, Iowa, which is in an octagonal building, and knew that's what she wanted. Construction of the framework for the building started last October and was finished in late December.

"It was all my plan," she said. "It's what I envisioned."

They had a time getting the center supports up, said. She had all the metal frame work nowder-coated she said, to minimize future maintenance. Then the brickwork for the walls was started, and doors and windows were installed.

The day after New Year's, the walk-in doors went in. In mid-January, members of the carnival owner's family came and installed carousel, backing the central mechanism through the door.

The carousel didn't come with a sound system, so she decided to invest in one. They told her she could use a boom box, but she figured that since she had 'spent a dime' on the project, she might as well spend another nickel. For music, she contacted the operator of the Fort Leavenworth carousel, who sent her ten discs of callione music.

Linda said she looked for a good book on carousels to guide her, but never found one. She put her own labor into getting the carousel ready, and spent hours scraping pieces of contact paper off the ovals that will hold mirrors.

"I was up that ladder five to six hours a day," she said. She also bought 100 replacement bulbs for the small round colored lights that cover the carousel. The poles that hold the animals are painted in rainbow colors because Linda is active in leadership of the Rainbow Girls. The colors serve a practical purpose— if she needs to balance the platform, she can direct a rider to an animal on a different colored pole.

Linda applied for a permit from the Missouri Division of Fire Safety and Amusement Rides, and the carousel passed inspection. She visited carousels at the Columbia Mall, in Branson and in Oklahoma City, and developed a list of rules to deter any problems. Linda is putting up signs for the

behavior she's hoping to engender in the riders: Kindness and Respect, for the carousel and for each

Other safety regulations: Riders need to be suitably clothed — no swimsuits —and have on firm sole shoes, not flip flops or slide sandals.

People in Appleton City have been anticipating the opening of the carousel for months, she said, but especially since the lettering went up. She has received 40 photographs from people of their children riding the carousel, and one parent sent photos taken of their child at the fair on the same carousel animal two years in a row.

Starting Memorial Day weekend, the carousel will be open on weekends. Friday, Saturday and Sunday, from 4 p.m. to 7 p.m., through Labor Day.

Linda has roots in Henry County as well as Appleton City. She lives in a farmhouse on a hill west of Montrose, and can direct you to the original site of the dog-trot log cabin that was moved to the Henry County Museum grounds in the 1990s. It's close to the place where her great-parents settled in 1865, she said, and near the corner where Mt. Hope Church was built in 1880, and where Linda's club still meets.

Linda has the pier mirror and organ lamp her mother bought that were in the house that was built around the dog-trot cabin. Another historic note: Linda's uncle, Charles Lampkin, was the youngest presiding judge in Missouri in the 1950s.

In Appleton City, Linda is active in Appleton City Landmarks Restoration, Inc., which operates the Appleton City Museum and History Center, at 503 N. Maple, and restored and maintains the original Appleton City Library, the third oldest public library in Missouri, and the railroad depot, the last remaining depot on MK&T line.


Appleton City's For 2020 sesquicentennial, Linda compiled photographs and researched the history of the city's buildings. She has a photo of the building where the carousel is now. in the 100 block of the main street (4th Street), just past the city park.

Tin signs across the top of the building in the old photo identify the main occupants, the IOOF lodge and Herald Printing.

Down the street from the carousel, at the Appleton City librarian set up a gold carousel horse in the library window, and Ramona Swisher at 3 Wishes put her white unicorn in the window of her art gallery.

"They are welcoming the carousel to town," Linda

he said, and that's when he realized —some of the students had never been out of town, much less to the zoo."They don't usually get out with their class," he said.

That first year, Scott arranged for the Elks to take Clinton students to the Kansas City Zoo. But the trip took too long and was so complicated, the Elks switched to the Dickerson Park Zoo on the north side of Springfield, an easier drive from Clinton and the school districts south of town. They have been happy with the choice, he

This year, the Clinton School District sent two buses of students, and the Calhoun, Montrose and Osceola school districts one bus each. Lakeland usually goes, he said, but had a conflict this year. The students are all ages, preschool through high school, and are accompanied by staff.

The drill: each school sets its own schedule when they want to arrive at the zoo and start touring-Osceola usually arrives first, he said. Meanwhile, Scott and a crew of Elks and family members set up grills and tables in the pavilion, and prepare a hot lunch.

The zoo lets the students and staff go through the gate without stopping, Scott said, then afterwards, he gives them a list of the number of participants this year totaling 184 and settles up afterwards.

"They are very easy to

work with," he said of the Dickerson Park Zoo staff. Because it is the program's 20th year, Mike Crocker, the zoo director, came out and spoke to them, Scott said, thanking them for introducing students to conservation and wildlife protection. He also posted a photo of the Elks on the DPZ Facebook and a few years ago, the zoo published an article in its magazine about the program.

The zoo train was not working this year, Scott said, so they traded their train tickets to buy lettuce to feed the giraffes.

The giraffes and the monkeys are the students' favorite exhibits at the zoo, Scott said. The Dickerson Park Zoo has more than 500 animals representing 160 species, including kangaroos from Australia, tigers and elephants from Asia, and lions and giraffes from Africa.

The North American exhibit includes black bears and mountain lions, but Scott is not sure if it includes any actual elks.

The Clinton Elks Lodge youth program also sponsors a Little League team, softball and boys' and baseball. gives scholarships to high school seniors. Last Thursday night, at a concert by the middle school and high school jazz bands, the Elks presented a check for \$500

to Pat Miles, director of the Clinton School band program, to help buy a new sousaphone for the band. The Lodge also provided the room free of charge for the concert.

Scott's daughter is now 36, but is one of three people, counting himself, who have gone on the trip every year. Other Elks also bring their wives and family members.

And everyone —students, school staff, zoo staff, Elks and their families —enjoy

"It's a fun deal," Scott said.

Zoo Director Mike Crocker published a book last year, "True Tales from the Dickerson Park Zoo." Subtitle: "There's a Crocodile in the Bathtub!".





God has anointed us to bring good tidings to the afflicted. Jesus reveals his love to us, which renews and sustains us. He sees our value and affirms his love for us.





The Henry County Commission met pursuant to adjournment at the courthouse in Clinton, Missouri. Those members present were: Jim Stone-Presiding Commissioner, Rick Fosnow-North District Commissioner, Dale Lawler-South District Commissioner, Rick Watson- County Clerk

At 9:00 a.m. Commissioner Stone brought the meeting to order.

The minutes from the Thursday, April 27, 2023 meeting were read; Commissioner Lawler made a motion to approve the minutes. Commissioner Fosnow seconded the motion, motion carried.

Expenditures from the following were approved to be paid: County Payroll, Inmate Security,

Court Administration, 27th Circuit Treatment Court, Buildings and Grounds, Law Enforcement Fund, Road and Bridge

Clerk Rick provided an ordinance, required by the Department of Revenue, which enacts the 3% sales tax on the purchase of tangible personal property of adult use marijuana products, as a result of the April Election. After review, Commissioner Lawler made a motion adopt the said ordinance, Ordinance 050223. Commissioner Fosnow seconded the motion. The motion passed with a roll call vote of Lawler – yes, Fosnow – yes and Stone - yes.

Commissioner Stone returned a call to Amanda Johnson, Main Street, as she requested permission to block out a portion of the street, next to the bandstand, for a school bus to drop off students for a field trip. The Commission agreed to block off the parking spaces just north of the bandstand on Franklin Street for the students field trip.

Clerk Rick presented an estimate of costs, from the Jackson County Circuit Court, for juror and court personnel required for the McCarthy trial coming up in June. The court estimate came to \$83,814.30.

Collector / Treasurer Ann Julian met with the Commission to discuss the depository bid for the county. It was mentioned that Ivan Schraeder, the county attorney, stated that we could "proceed as desired" regarding bidding out or renewing the current contract for a two year period. The group discussed statutes that state we "shall" bid out for depository services every four years. After discussion, it was decided to bid out for depository services.

Sheriff Kent Oberkrom presented a contract for the Deputy Supplimental Salary Grant, which begins on July 1. He stated that 1 deputy will fall off the grant, due to the increase in wages of the county. He also stated that numerous other deputies would not be eligible for the grant next year. Kent also presented a renewal contract for Aramark, which provides meals for inmates. Kent then presented a renewal contract for Encartele, which is a vendor that sells phone cards to inmates, via a kiosk at the

jail. After discussion, Commissioner Fosnow made a motion to contract with the Department of Public Safety for the Deputy Supplemental Salary Grant. Commissioner Lawler seconded the motion. The motion passed with a roll call vote of Fosnow - yes, Lawler yes, and Stone - yes.

The group discussed the renewal contract for meal services provided by Aramark. After discussion, Commissioner Lawler made a motion to renew the said contract. Commissioner Fosnow seconded the motion. The motion passed with a roll call vote of Fosnow - yes, Lawler yes, and Stone – yes.

The group discussed the renewal contract with Encartele. After discussion, Commissioner Fosnow made a motion to renew the said contract. Commissioner Lawler seconded the motion. The motion passed with a roll call vote of Fosnow - yes, Lawler yes, and Stone – yes.

Dennis Bowers, Road and Bridge Supervisor, shared that he had met with Bill Kelsay, of White Oak Township, to inspect a bridge on NW 700 Rd, just off of

NW 1421 Rd. He concurred with Bill that the bridge needed to be repaired or replaced. The group discussed the project, and decided to replace the bridge, as the bridge department already has the needed material.

The group discussed the MoDot bridge report.

Dennis shared that the bridge on SW 700 Rd has moved up on the permit list. He also shared that the bridge on SW 351 Rd must be engineered prior to replacement. He stated that the county should not proceed as the bridge could potentially be under water 4 months of the year, as it has in the past. He continued by stating the engineering may be as much as \$20,000.00, alone. The Commission agreed to wait to see what the next bridge inspection would say about the bridge.

At 11:40 Commissioner Lawler made a motion to go into Closed Session, via 610.021(1) to discuss legal matters. Commissioner Fosnow seconded the motion. The motion passed with a roll call vote of Lawler -yes, Fosnow - yes, and Stone – yes.

as the defendant, Clinton

After the deputy made initial contact with the defendant in a nearby field, Glaspy ran on foot. The deputy pursued Glaspy, eventually catching up with him in a cornfield across Missouri Highway 7 from Hobbytime. As the deputy attempted to detain Glaspy, the two fell to the ground, and Glaspy was able to get on top of the deputy. Glaspy then began strangling the deputy. Their positions were such that the deputy could not retrieve his firearm.

During the struggle, the deputy could not breathe, but was eventually able to bite Glaspy's hand, which allowed him to get free of Glaspy's grasp. The defendant then took off on foot again. Glaspy was located by the Henry County Sheriff's Office and Clinton Police Department hiding at a residence in Clinton the following morning.

Trial had been set earlier in 2023, but in February the defendant changed his plea to guilty for assault in the second degree with a special victim (law enforcement) and felony property damage for the damage caused to ten or

more ATVs at Hobbytime. The minimum sentence for assault in the second degree when it is a special victim is five years in prison, with a maximum sentence of fifteen years.

A sentencing hearing was held on May 9, 2023. Prosecuting Attorney LaChrisha Gray argued and presented evidence on behalf of the State. The defendant presented evidence and argument through his counsel.

The Court heard from the deputy, who believed he was going to be killed by the defendant while he was being strangled. The Court also heard from Henry County Sheriff Kent Oberkrom, who testified that this event has impacted his office and deputies. Several deputies from his office attended the hearing in support of the deputy involved. Sheriff Oberkrom added that the deputy would have been justified in using his firearm had he been able to retrieve it.

Αt the hearing, Prosecutor Gray requested that the Court sentence Glaspy to the maximum sentence of fifteen (15) years and the defense requested probation or a small number of years.

After hearing from both sides, Henry County Circuit Judge M. Brandon

Baker sentenced Glaspy to seven (7) years in the Missouri Department of Corrections on both counts with the sentences to run concurrently.

Because the sentences are to be served concurrently, the defendant will not serve any more than seven years. His time in prison will count towards both sentences. The law requires the defendant to serve a minimum of eighty-five percent of the seven-year sentence as the assault is considered a dangerous felony, but he will also receive credit for the time he served in the Henry County Jail.

Prosecutor Gray stated, "This deputy's service and sacrifice to the Henry County community cannot be overstated. Unfortunately, our law officers enforcement face incredibly difficult and at times impossible situations. Our community is fortunate to have officers like this deputy. who even while being held on the ground, continued efforts to deescalate the situation. His actions and quick thinking saved his life and our community a tremendous loss. My office will continue to prosecute cases involving the assault of our law enforcement officers to the full extent allowed by law."

#### WHAT JESUS SEES IN US

While sitting at a banquet table, a couple passed by; and I heard a lady behind me say loudly, "I'll never know what he sees in her." That made me wonder what people see in me or, more importantly, what does Jesus see

William Barclay said, "If Simon the Zealot had met Matthew anywhere other than in the presence of Jesus, he would have stuck a dagger in him." Jesus' wisdom in choosing this group could be seriously questioned.

Anyone who has ever worked with groups knows how difficult it is to keep even a friendly group of twelve people focused and united. As one might expect, the disciples were not only different, but they also had personal difficulties. The brothers James and John sought to finagle the left and right seats beside the throne in Jesus' new kingdom. As you might expect, this did not sit well with the other disciples. That whole affair proved the disciples had no idea about the nature of Jesus' Kingdom. Judas was so displeased with Jesus' Kingdom con-

cept he became a traitor and then killed himself.

Despite all these differences and difficulties, these disciples led a Jesus movement that turned the world upside down. Ten of the twelve died martyrs' deaths. Peter, who rose to be the leader of the group, was joined in the ministry by his wife. The two of them were martyred together in Rome. Peter was forced to watch his wife being slaughtered and shouted words of encouragement to her in the process. Then, he was crucified upside down.

These were the same men who hid in an upper room during the crucifixion of Jesus.
