2023 Garden Tour Blooms With A Blend Of Town And Country

Terri and Paul Cornell's yard on Truman Street has a screened gazebo on the lot next to their house, and a garden shed in back. The toy fire truck and the fire hydrant in the yard are reminiscent of Paul's career as a fireman. Terri added the other accents, including the ones on the side of the garden shed.

"I got to decorate the outside, but the inside is his," Terri said.

The Cornells' yard is one of seven stops on this year's Garden Tour on June 17, the weekend of Father's Day. For \$10, you can tour seven gardens, three in town, one on the edge of town, and three in the country. They range from secluded backyard shade gardens in Clinton to large acreages in the country with orchards, vegetable gardens, berries and pumpkin patches.

Hours are 10 a.m. to 4 p.m., allowing plenty of time to cover the tour, plus have a break.

Tickets are available at any of the gardens, along with

and directions to the other stops. The tour is organized by the Twilight Garden Club in conjunction with the Designing Gardeners. Tickets are available from members of either group or by calling this year's tour coordinator, Brenda Roberts, 660-351-5139.

"All the gardens are unique and wonderful," Brenda said.

The Henry County Garden Tour has been going for about 30 years, Brenda said, and for a comparable ticket price. It's a chance to tour some beautiful gardens and get ideas to take home, she said, as well as go for a drive in the country and be welcomed into people' yards.

On the edge of Clinton is Tom and Sandra Spooners' garden at 607 Booth Rd. The Spooners' house was originally the barn of a farm where Royal Booth started a chick hatchery in Clinton. Spooners made the barn into a house, landscaped with borders of roses on trellises, clematis, and other perennials.

Joseph Matthew Albin, 53, also known as "Nikki Blades" of Clinton, Missouri has been sentenced to spend the remainder of his life in prison without the possibility of parole for forcible rape.

Albin had previously been found guilty of other sexual assault cases as well as the felony of conspiracy to commit murder. Because of the nature of his prior criminal convictions, Prosecuting Attorney LaChrisha Gray charged Albin as a predatory and persistent sex offender.

local cruise night on the Square, will also feature muscle bikes.

Skipper Buckley of Clinton is sharing his collection of Schwinn Sting-Rays at Bike Fest, plus bringing four vintage bicycle collectors to town. There will also be drawings for a Mongoose bicycle and BMX bicycles.

Skipper, 58, grew up in the 1970s. His parents saw the family had everything they needed, he said, but the budget didn't extend to the bicycle of his dreams: a Schwinn Krate Sting-Ray.

"That was my crush," he said. "I rode a hand-medown."

In 2010, Skipper started collecting bicycles, mostly from the "muscle bike" era that started in the 1960s. His favorite bicycle in his collection is a '69 Schwinn "Pea Picker," a type of Sting-Ray Krate Bike, which were named for their colors. The metallic green and silver Pea Picker is like

the one coveted by Robin Williams and Tommy in David Duchovny's comingof-age movie, "House of D," Skipper said.

It was the black and white Huffy Penguin that started the muscle bike craze in 1963, Skipper said. The Penguin had extended handlebars, known as "high bars" or "ape hangers," a sissy bar in back, and a banana seat, like on a


motorcycle. Muscle bikes also featured 5-speed stick shifts, suspension systems, disc brakes and slick tires, and a smaller wheel on the front, like a drag racer.

Skipper doesn't have a Penguin in his collection they are now too expensive —but does have two Huffy bicycles from 1968-1969. "What's unique about

them is they have steering wheels instead of handlebars," he said. Another collector participating in Bike Fest is Charlie Dixon, a window-cleaner in town. Charlie has bicycles from earlier eras, including a high-wheeler known as a Penny Farthing from the 1890s. He and Charlie became best friends, Skipper said, after he saw Charlie riding his high wheeler

and chased him down the



Continued from page 1 you get to the Country Store, is Shawnee Mound Orchard. Owned by Debra Dolly and Ron Papsdorf, the orchard, at 85 NW 1150 Rd., Chilhowee, has peach trees, apple trees and blueberry patches.

From Shawnee Mound Orchard, it's 8.5 miles across to Lee and Lynda McGhee's property, at 7603 NE Hwy. AC, Calhoun, Mo. The acreage has large vegetable gardens, berry patches and pumpkin patches, all fenced, with irrigation and fertilizing systems, Brenda said. The McGhees grow enough produce to can for their entire family, Brenda said.

"They also have friendly pygmy goats," she said. You can follow their drive

around a small lake to Hwy. 52E and back to Clinton. There, you might want to tour the gardens in town and take a lunch break. Then head south to Susan Evanoff's garden, at 747 SW 750 Rd., near Montrose. There will be directional signs put up on the day of the Garden Tour, Brenda said, and maps included with the tour ticket.

Or start with the gardens in town, then head south or north. If it rains hard enough to create soggy ground on the day before or the day of the tour, the tour will be held the following Saturday.

"We don't want people walking on wet ground and tearing up yards," Brenda said.

Each club gets the money for the tickets its members sell, Brenda said, plus half of the gate the day of the tour. Funds raised by the Twilight Garden Club provide money for college scholarships to graduating seniors interested studying horticulture or agriculture.

The Twilight Garden Club also uses the funds for

its community projects: planting and maintaining the gardens at the Henry County Museum courtyard, the Dorman House and the Blue Star Memorial at the Benton Civic Center.

Educating residents about what grows well in this area and the importance of growing plants that support bees, butterflies and birds are other goals of the tour, Brenda said.

Twilight Garden Club was organized in 1952, Brenda said, with the membership set at 22 in order to have a hostess and co-hostess for each of the club's 10 meetings a year.

Sandy TGC member Swanagon, whose garden at 205 Michael Drive is on the tour, made the tropical plant leaves elephant ears and castor beans — from concrete as part of a garden club project, Brenda said. The Swanagon's property, off of East Franklin, has a rustic theme carried out by a planter that spouse Richard made from an old door.

South of the Swanagon garden, off South Vansant, is the home of Germaine and Jerry Wilson. The created Wilsons secluded backyard by planting straight-trunk hornbeam maples around the perimeter of their property, at 1703 M and M Drive. The trees enclose a shade garden with lots of accents, Brenda said.

Terri and Paul Cornell live in town, at 504 Truman, three blocks south of Clinton Technical School. The gazebo on one of their two landscaped lots is Terri's retreat spot, and has variegated Virginia Creeper growing on it, an unusual type of the plant, Brenda said.

In back is the garden shed, which is reserved for Paul's mower, Terri said, although she is allowed to store pots there in the winter.

Soldier Bicycle and a 1904 Teddy Roosevelt Campaign Bicycle." Daniel, who is a poet, calls his bicycles

"works in progress." "I think of antique and classic bicycle projects much as I do poems or paintings," Daniel writes. "They are never finished, only abandoned."

His collection includes a 1890 Columbus bicycle, made by the Columbus (Ohio) Bicycle Company, a subsidiary of the Columbus Buggy Company, owned by Clinton Firestone, Clinton's nephew was Harvey Firestone, who founded the tire company. World War I ace Eddie Rickenbacker was also an employee of the Columbus Buggy Company. Bicycles that Daniel has restored include a 1950s Jean Aets, named for a Belgian racer who won

11 stages of the Tour de France.

Skipper also considers bicycles as art and history if you know what to look for.

"Each bike had a design of their own," he said.

Skipper said he collects bicycles because they reflect the culture of their time, and he wants to share that appreciation with the next generation. When he was young, bicycles were also a passport to adventure. One of his fondest memories is the day he and his friends -- the "Carter Street boys" -- decided to ride from Clinton to Deepwater, when you could ride all the way down Hwy.13, before the lake went in.

They only made it to the outskirts of Deepwater, he said, but didn't make the trip any less memorable.

The oldest bicycle in his collection is a 1948 Schwinn B-6 Autocycle, a fat-tire bike known as the Cadillac of bikes, he said. It was succeeded by the "Black Phantom," the "King of the 50s."

He also owns his namesake bicycle, a 1961 Schwinn Skipper.

What Skipper doesn't own is an example of one of the most famous bike icons in movie history the Kuwahara BMX bicvcle like the ones in "E.T." He came late to the hobby of bicycle collecting, he said, and for anything collectible, the prices are high. E.T. bikes go for \$5,000 to \$6,000.

"You can't touch them," he said.

Bicycle show protocol calls for not touching the bicycles, Skipper said, much less asking if you can ride them.

A 1983 CHS graduate, Skipper retired three years ago from the Missouri Department of Transportation, where he was a construction inspector for four-lane highways built in the area, including the bypass around Warrensburg. In addition to his passion for bicycles, he is restoring a 1974 Volkswagen bus, a gift from the late Rich Theiler, who owned R.A.T. Rods in Clinton.

Skipper said he has removed five layers of coating from the VW, which is now its original orange. He drives a midsize black Honda pick-up, which he uses to transport bicycles. He now has a collection of 40, which he keeps in a designated bicycle room at his house. His wife is understanding of his obsession with Schwinn Krate Sting-Rays, he said, and his first love, the '69 Pea Picker.

The Schwinn factory no longer makes bicycles, Skipper said, but it's easy to tell the real ones from reproductions — the real ones have a sticker saying "Made in Chicago, III." He recently acquired a pair of Schwinn mechanic's overalls, with the badge to show they were qualified, that he'll have on display at the June 17 Bike Fest. Schwinn trained all its own mechanics, he said.

At the June 10 cruise

night, the Cruisin' to Clinton committee is raffling off a Mongoose BMX-style "Stranger Things" freestyle bicycle, like the one seen in the television series.

Truman Lake Moose Lodge 2723, of which Skipper is a member, is holding drawings for three BMX bicycles, a girl's model, a boy's bike and an adult Cruiser Classic. Jane Marshall at Walmart helped the lodge acquire the bicycles, Skipper said.

Matt Wray, **Brent** Winter and Marty Loyd reorganized Cruising' to Clinton last year. Clinton's cruise night, on the largest town square in Missouri, is held on the second Saturday of the month, May through September, plus the third Saturday in October. It starts at 4 p.m., and is a family-oriented event, free to participants and spectators. Disc jockey Bud Powell plays classic car songs, Kettlecorn is popping, and the TLC Barbecue Truck has pulled pork and burnt ends for sale, along with sides and soda.

All types of cars are welcome —old, new, original or kit cars., organizers say.

Cruise nights end at 7 p.m. with a drive-through of the grounds of local senior homes, then out to Primitive Olde Crow and Winery for brick-oven pizza and craft beer on tap. For information about Clinton's cruise night, go to Cruisin' to Clinton on Facebook.

al as charged. Due to the court's finding that Albin is a persistent sex offender, the law required the Court to sentence Albin to imprisonment for life without the possibility of parole, which the Court

did on May 26, 2023. **Prosecuting Attorney Gray** stated, "This defendant has been preying on girls in our community for far too long. He is a dangerous predator and it's only appropriate that he will finally spend the rest of his life in prison where he cannot hurt another young lady again."

(Note: During the 2022 counting period, the Patrol investigated 301 traffic crashes, which included 129 injuries and nine of the 13 fatalities. Also, over the 2022 Memorial Day holiday: Marine operations troopers investigated nine boating crashes, which included one fatality and four injuries. Troopers made 131 driving while intoxicated arrests and seven boating while intoxicated arrests. No one drowned over the 2022 Memorial Day holiday.)

Troopers investigated all of the traffic crash fatalities. Two fatalities occurred in both the Troop B, Macon, MO, area, and the Troop I, Rolla, MO, area. One fatality occurred in each of the following areas: Troop A, Lee's Summit, MO, Troop C, Weldon Spring, MO, Troop D, Springfield, MO, Troop E, Poplar Bluff, MO, Troop G, Willow Springs, MO, and Troop H, St. Joseph, MO.

Two people died within the counting period on Friday, May 26, 2023.

Danny R. Caudill, 56, of Doniphan, MO, died after being struck by a vehicle on Missouri Highway U south of Doniphan in Ripley County. Caudill was a pedestrian and in the roadway at the time he was struck. The driver of the vehicle that struck Caudill was not injured and was wearing a seat belt at the time of the crash. Ripley County Coroner Mike Jackson pronounced Caudill deceased at the scene.

Jared C. Young, 20, of Hillsboro, MO, died when he attempted to pass another vehicle on a curve and met a second vehicle. Young then swerved to the right and the front of the oncoming vehicle struck his driver's side door. Young's vehicle then traveled off the right side of the roadway and caught fire.
