## Library Powers Up For Super Summer Of Fun

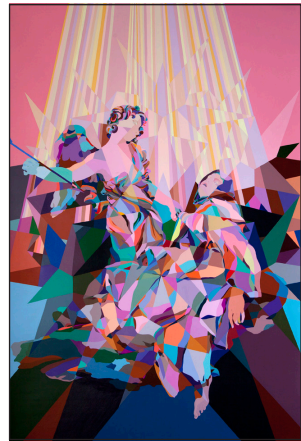

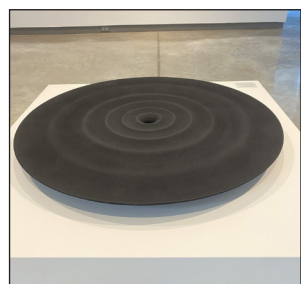

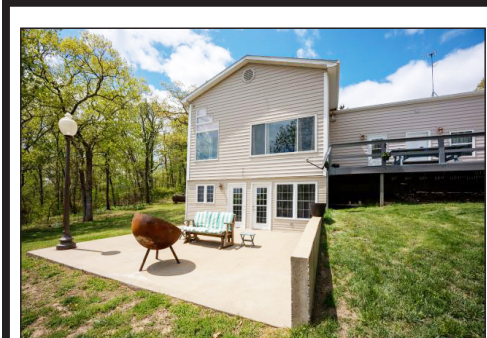

Helen was born on 11/01/1920 to Lester and Beulah Pierson in Iowa. Helen was one of eight children to Lester and Beulah. The Railroad expansion was well underway, and they packed up the family and took a free train ride from Iowa to Colorado when Helen was only six months old. Colorado offered them an open range farm and they lived in an adobe house. Life with eight children and an open range farm there was always plenty to do.

Helen was nine years old when in 1929 when The Great depression began in the United States. Helen and her family didn't personally feel the effects of this until 1932. When her parents put money in the bank and the next morning it was gone. When the Dust Bowl begin in 1931 the state of the US economy was dire. Millions unemployed and relief did not appear imminent. In 1932 the dusts returned with greater intensity. By 1933 the frequency and intensity of dust storms endangered the health of livestock and people alike.

In 1934 appendicitis killed 3193 people in the US including Helen's sister. In that same year Helen lost a bother to a runway horse team. This took a toll on the family. In 1940 Helen married Don Webb. Don and Helen had four children Danny, David, Jim and Jenienne. In 1960 Don and Helen moved to Missouri. Helen started working for H.D. Lee jean company in 1965. Helen was also a full-time farmers wife. She loved the farm life. You could either find Helen making homemade bread or somewhere outside. She would rather be

Helen is our oldest living resident at Clinton Healthcare and Rehabilitation at 102. She became a resident on July 20, 2021. You can find Helen at most of our activities and has a smile that lights up the room. What an honor it is to celebrate life with her every day.

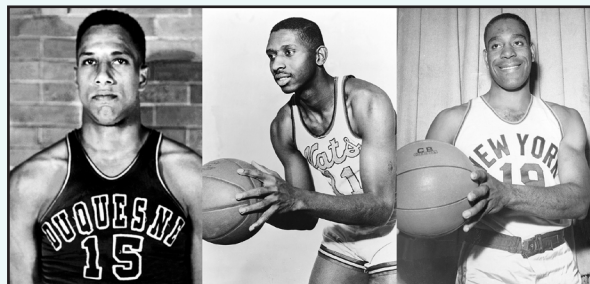

## Sweetwater's Legacy

I bet about 99% of folks over the age of 10 know about the legacy of #42 Jackie Robinson, and they should, right? What an important event in America's growth. But, not all-important legacies are kept alive or are not well known. How many of us remember Nathaniel 'Sweetwater' Clifton?... I'll wait. Now, if you are a big-time NBA fan you are probably on top of such things, but... Yes, Nat was the first black man to sign an NBA contract. He came into the league in 1950 with two other African-American players, Earl Lloyd, and Chuck Cooper. As we all know it took WWII and Truman's integration of the military to lay the groundwork for any meaningful integration to happen in our general society, including sports. 1950 was three years after Jackie Robinson stepped onto a Major League baseball field. They recently made a movie about this NBA integration and I hope to see it soon. The movie Sweetwater, will be in theaters in December 2023, streamed in July.

**Nat Clifton:** Don't let me spoil it for you, but let me tell you some interesting things about Nat Clifton. He was born in 1922, and his birth name was actually Clifton Nathaniel. His HS, DuSable, used his first name 'Clifton' as his last name out of convenience, the papers pick up on it, so he kept it. His nickname 'Sweetwater' came from his love of soda pop. 'Sweetwater', played one year of college ball then served three years in the Army during WWII in Europe. Later he played with the Dayton Metros, the all-black NY Rens, then the Harlem Globetrotters. In 1950, the Globetrotters sold Clifton's contract for \$12,500 to the Knickerbockers with Clifton netting \$2,500 of it. Clifton later said he felt his journey along with Lloyd and Cooper's journey may have been easier for them because fans were already used to blacks playing college ball. He averaged 10.3

points a game for the Knicks over his seven years with them. He was an All-Star in '57. Clifton was traded to the Fort Wayne Pistons. He retired in '58, but played two more years for the Globetrotters. After a knee injury, he started to drive a cab in Chicago. Clifton was a hero in his neighborhood, but kept a low profile with his family nearby. He struggled financially because he was not eligible for an NBA pension. Pensions were not offered before 1965. Michael Jordan once said, "Justice ought to be served. Players like Nat Clifton should get some kind of reward for making the NBA what it is today. Without the guys like him, guys like me would not be getting what they are getting." Clifton died in 1990 at the age of 67 after having a heart attack while working as a cab driver. Twenty-four years after Clifton died, the Basketball HOF inducted him posthumously (2014). Several awards have been named in his honor.

**Earl Lloyd:** Lloyd was drafted 100th overall by the Washington Capitols and he was the first of the Big Three to actually play in an NBA game. He beat Cooper by one day and 'Sweetwater' by four days. Of course, all three had to deal with racism. He played seven games for the Washington Capitols before being drafted to fight in the Korean War. After the Capitols folded he was redrafted to the Syracuse Nationals. He played nine years in the NBA. He later said he did face some racism, but not from his teammates. Lloyd coached for several years and then worked for the Detroit Public SD in the HR department. His high school basketball court was named after him. He was inducted into the HOF in 2003. He died at the age of 85 in 2015 outside of Crossville, TN.

**Chuck Cooper:** On April 25, 1950, Cooper was the first black player to be drafted by the NBA, 14th overall. He went

After his significant NBA career he went back to Pittsburg to work towards Civil Rights. Cooper also became the head of the Parks and Rec Department and was the first African-American department head in the city. When Cooper was drafted by the Celtics the other teams said, "Hey you can't do that he is black". In response, Celtics owner Walter Brown famously said, "I don't care if Cooper is striped, plaid or polka dot, I am picking him." He was inducted into the Naismith Memorial HOF posthumously (2019). He often said his teammates, especially his friendship with Bob Cousy, another 1950 rookie, made the tough situation a lot more tolerable. Cooper passed away from liver cancer at the age of 57 in 1984.

So remember, along with Jackie Robinson, include these three men in your pioneer discussions. Until next time.

conservation educator, and Chris Brooke, MDC fishery management biologist, will teach the sessions. Participants will learn about catfish biology, catfishing regulations, how to build trotlines, and how to set and run the lines in the lake. They will also get an overview of rod and reel catfishing at the lake. Participants will go out onto the lake in MDC boats with instructors to set their lines.

The June 9 session will be from 8:30 a.m. to 1:30 p.m. Participants will go out in MDC boats with instructors to run the trotlines and remove fish. There will also be demonstrations on how to clean catfish to prepare for cooking.

Colonel Eric T. Olson, superintendent of the Missouri State Highway Patrol, announces the results of the Driver and Vehicle Safety Division's 2023 annual school bus inspection program.
Missouri's 2023 school bus inspection results are as follows:
School buses rated as "approved" upon initial inspection -- 9,995
School buses rated as "defective" upon initial inspection -- 1,088
School buses rated as "out-of-service" upon initial inspection -- 381
Buses with identified defective components require repair within 10 days. Buses placed out-of-service require correction of the component(s), and re-inspection and a return to service by Patrol personnel prior to further usage in transporting passengers.
A total of 256 Missouri school districts earned the Patrol's Total Fleet Excellence award for 2023. During the 2023-2024 school year, 4,769 buses in these award-winning fleets are eligible to display the Patrol's Total Fleet Excellence sticker in the lower corner of the first window on the passenger entry side of the bus.
"Everyone wants to keep our children safe as they travel to and from school. To that end, the Missouri State Highway Patrol personnel, in partnership with pupil transportation professionals statewide, inspected 11,464 school buses in accordance with Missouri revised state statutes," said Colonel Olson.

THE TORTOISE AND THE MAN

No doubt you know the story of the tortoise and the hare. Let me tell you a story of the tortoise and a man. My friend John suffers from rheumatoid arthritis and other maladies. Nevertheless, he still manages to get around with a cane. On an errand in his car recently he saw a turtle trying to cross a busy boulevard. "That turtle will get run over before he gets across this busy street," he thought. So, he stopped his car and with much effort got out to help the turtle cross the road.

He is unable to bend over and pick it up, so he planned to prod it along with his foot. Meanwhile, he would have to make his way back to the side of the road to let cars pass. He realized if he fell, he couldn't get back up; but he started out. While he was trying to help, the ungrateful reptile beat him across the street.

My friend John related the story to us himself, so I'm not poking fun at his difficulty. However, just as there is a moral in the fable about the tortoise and the hare, there is also a moral here---it is seldom possible to help someone else without putting yourself at risk.

When the widow of Zarephath fed the prophet Elijah, she used the last of her wheat and oil. It meant she and her son might starve. Thereafter, as you recall, there was always a little wheat in the barrel and a little oil in the cruse. (I Kings 17)

When Jonathan protected David from the anger of his father King Saul, he risked harm from his father and possibly his succession to the throne of Israel. His friendship with David contributed to Jonathan's death in battle. (I Samuel 18 ff)

When God's Son Jesus came to earth, He left heaven with all its glory and became a poor person on earth. Jesus risked everything to help humanity. In fact, Jesus' journey to earth cost Him great suffering and even His life. He risked it all to help us.

The Bible teaches us to help others in Jesus' name. Then, faithful to its commitment to the whole truth, the Bible goes on to show us that helping others can be personally costly. Maybe that's why we are sometimes reluctant to help.
