






## **Looking Back: Bobby Richardson**

When you think of the Yankees back in the '50s' and '60s' most of us think of Mantle, Bear, Maris, Ford, and maybe Martin. But, few of us would think of Bobby Richardson (Robert Clinton Richardson, Jr.). I remember the name and that he was an infielder for the Yankees (1955-'66). Bobby was considered an average hitter (.266 lifetime), but a good defensive player (5 Gold Gloves). Yet, he had some very good years, and post-season highlights. For example, in 1962 he came in second for the AL MVP behind. you guessed it, Mickey Mantle. Richardson at age 87 is living in his hometown of Sumter, SC. Bobby and his wife Betsy of 64 years have five children.

Yankees were The dominant back then and of course, Mickey Mantle was the face of the team. So. Yankee infielders did not get a large share of the attention. Those

infielders included: Clete Boyer (3), Tony Kubek (SS), Richardson (2), and Moose Skowron (1). Bobby spoke well of his teammates. He said very positive things about Elston Howard. In 1955 Elston became the first black player for the Yankees. That was a full eight years after Jackie Robinson. In 1959 Boston was the last club to integrate (begrudgingly). The only person Bobby made clear he did not 'understand' was Casey Stengle. Casey was the old manager that platooned a lot. This was a time when Bobby was fighting for a starting job. He did not want to share the position with anybody.

Bobby was a good player (maybe not great) but he did go to eight All-Star games (but only starting in two). He won 5 Gold Gloves, and of course, was an integral part of winning three World Series Championships. In 1961 he also had the distinction of being the only World Series MVP to



come from the losing team. That is hard to do.

Bobby's 2012 book "Impact Player" made an impact on me. I read sports books to learn about the people, the back stories, their struggles, not their statistics. Bobby Richardson has a great backstory. He was "impactful" on and off the field. Bobby became a Christian at the age of twelve and walked that path right into the not-sowholesome Yankee locker room. Bobby talked a lot about the Yankees' wins and losses, especially in the post-season, but he mainly talked about how his beliefs "fit in" with the times. He was clear that in his playing days, being an open Christian in MLB was not something that was encouraged. His teammates knew and accepted his beliefs and his "squeaky clean" lifestyle

but, of course, the party guys got the attention. You would think the "party guys" would not call Bobby a friend or vice versa, but that is not the case. In fact, Bobby was close friends most, including Mantle. He witnessed to Mickey right up until the time of Mantle's death in 1995. Mantle finally told Bobby just days before his death that he had accepted Jesus Christ. Bobby has been asked to preside at five of his former teammates' funerals. He has witnessed at countless events, including the Billy Graham Crusades. One could say Richardson was Tim Tebow, decades before Tim Tebow.

In 1966 Bobby retired. At age 31 he was still in his prime, but he had five young children at home, so he retired early to spend more time with his family and to do more

Jenn said she started being a shoe artist by going out to Shoe Sensation and buying pairs to practice on. Her forte is pop culture characters, she said, but she also does shoes for sports fans — Kansas City Chiefs or Clinton Cardinals. Cartoon characters, movie characters and team logos

she said, and are excluded from copyright laws.

Jenn has also personalized motorcycle helmets, and paints murals — every room in her house has one, she said, except her art room. Jennifer Jones, the owner of The Game Box, made Jenn a Fainting Goat T-shirt with her logo, an F and an upside-down G.

"l'm Capricorn," Jenn explained, "and I think fainting goats are hysterical."





Isa 41:10 Fear thou not; for I am with thee: be not dismayed; for I am thy God: I will strengthen thee; yea, I will help thee; yea, I will uphold thee with the right hand of my righteousness. (KJV)

2Co 4:8. (KJV)

Php 3:13-14. (KJV)

three years. "I am excited to see my former classmate Aaron Scully receive the endowed professorship for the coming year," Meridith Sauer said. "His original works, creativity on stage, and leadership in the department is to be commended and we all look forward to an exciting year of UCM theatre."

"I am deeply humbled by this recognition," Scully noted. "My sincerest appreciation goes to the Harmon family for their generous and continued support of UCM Theatre and Dance. I look forward to the scholarship and creative work I have planned for the professorship - and my hope is that it is of the quality deserving of this honor."

In his application for the award, Scully included proposals for a program to bring theatre to addiction treatment centers and research related to this program, writing and producing a new play, taking on a major acting role, and continuing his training in stage combat.

Scully earned his Ph.D. at the University of Missouri-Columbia in 2018, having joined the faculty at UCM the previous year. Since arriving at UCM, he has climbed the faculty ranks from instructor to assistant professor, teaching courses in Acting, Playwriting, Theatre Management, Theatre History, Directing and General Education. He also directs for the Mainstage season.

Extending his expertise beyond the UCM campus, Scully is in his third and final year of service as the Kennedy Center American College Theatre Festival (KCACTF) Region V National Playwriting Program Chair. This year, he concludes a six-year commitment to the organization, although he plans to continue serving KCACTF in a different capacity. He also recently completed his third year as the co-coordinator for the Judith Royer Excellence in Playwriting Award for the Association of Theatre in Higher Education (ATHE) and will continue serving in this position. Scully regularly presents scholarship and creative work at the Association for Theatre in Higher Education (ATHE) and the Mid-America Theatre Conference (MATC).

While he was working on his doctorate, Scully received the Kennedy Center American College Theater Festival (KCACTF) Region V/ATHE Innovative Teaching Award for graduate students. In 2022, he was honored with the UCM College of Arts, Humanities, and Social Sciences (CAHSS) Non-Tenure Track Excellence in Teaching Award. Scully is not only active in the classroom, but he shares his passion for his subject matter through his work in UCM Theatre and Dance productions. In fall 2022, he directed "Stop Kiss," which received several meritorious achievement awards, including one for Ensemble Performance. In 2021, he directed his own adaptation of the Greek play, "Oedipus the King," for which he received a meritorious award for adaptation from KCACTF. Last spring, he co-directed and wrote the "danceplay" "Remember the Dance," which was produced at UCM. The seasoned UCM educator

also serves as a co-advisor for Bachelor of Science in Speech Communication and Theatre Education majors; he advises several student organizations: Central Missouri Playwrights (which

founded), Shenanigans Improv Troupe, and Dr. Ed See's Student Teachers' Association. Additionally, he is the chair of University Research Council and is a member of the Faculty Senate and the Academic Programs Review Committee.

People can come down to the building Monday through Friday, from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. and Saturdays, 9 a.m. to noon, to walk through and view items for sale online at OzarkBid.com.

The City Market hours are Friday, 4 p.m. to 8 p.m. and Saturday, 8 a.m. to 2 p.m. Sometimes there have been 50 or 60 customers in the parking lot, Chase said, looking for vendors. To attract more, he's offering spaces for no fees through the rest of the year.

The produce vendor has been selling out in an hour, he said.

"It's a great location, wedged between the two busiest streets in town, with great visibility and lots of parking," he said.

All the Crawfords are certified auctioneers and attended the Worldwide College of Auctioneering. They handle real estate auctions, business liquidations and house-hold auctions, he said, either onsite or online. The family still holds an annual machinery consignment sale on the Fourth of July at his father's house in Cross Timbers, where Chase rapped his first gavel in 2009, at the age of 24.

Auctioneers often meet people when they are overwhelmed by all the things they have to deal with, Chase said, making it a stressful time in their lives. The Crawfords consider themselves problem solvers.

"It's a challenge mentally and physically," Chase said of the job. "There is a lot of traveling. The reward is you get to help people."

It can also be stressful working with your own family, he said, but at the end of the day, it's a blessing. With Dad as the boss, every day is Father's Day, Chase said.

Part of the philosophy he inherited is to leave a place better than you found it.

"That's what my Dad always said whenever I wanted to borrow the truck," Chase said.

As an auctioneer, Chase has sold a collectible '69 Mustang for \$85,000 to a person in Alaska, and an oil painting found in a stack of paintings for \$3,700. Sales of collectible lunch boxes, toy trucks and comic books also do well. The least tangible thing he's sold were business rights, he said.

Chas said some days he's like a job where you shut the door and go home, but in the auction business, there are always phone calls to take when you get off work. What buying and selling things has taught him — that you can't buy more time.

Owning an auction business is a busy lifestyle, he said. He's planted the seeds for the City Market and hopes it takes off. He would be thrilled to have more food vendors, he said, and will do anything he can to accommodate them.

"I'm in it for the long haul," he said.

Multiple Arrests Made In Child Exploitation Investigation

The Missouri State Highway Patrol's Division of Drug and Crime Control announces the arrest of three people in connection with a child exploitation investigation, which began in March 2023, in Jackson County, Missouri.

On March 6, 2023, the Grain Valley Police Department requested the assistance of the Missouri State Highway Patrol's Division of Drug and Crime Control/ Digital Forensic Investigation Unit with an investigation into a missing juvenile female from Grain Valley, Missouri. After being reported as missing, the female returned home. Grain Valley investigators then learned she had possibly been sexually exploited. Evidence and interviews led investigators to three men who, on separate occasions, met the minor female to engage in sexual acts.

The following individuals have been charged in this case:

The Jackson County Prosecuting Attorney charged August P. Gildehaus, 27, of Grain Valley, Missouri, with sodomy first degree, sexual exploitation of a minor, statutory sodomy second degree, and statutory rape second degree. Gildehaus was arrested April 11, 2023.

The Clay County Prosecuting Attorney charged Tryston M. Hastings, 24, of Kansas City, Missouri, with two counts of statutory sodomy second degree and two counts of statutory rape second degree. Hastings was arrested May 24, 2023.

The Jackson County Prosecuting Attorney charged Antoine Richardson, 24, of Leavenworth, Kansas, with two counts of possession of child pornography and two counts of statutory

rape second degree. Richardson was arrested June 9, 2023.

The charges for which the above individuals were arrested are mere accusation and not evidence of guilt. Evidence in support of the above charges must be presented before a court of competent jurisdiction whose duty is to determine guilt or innocence.

The Grain Valley (Missouri) Police Department, Springfield (Missouri) Police Department, and Leavenworth (Kansas) Police Department assisted with the investigation.

The Division of Drug and Crime Control encourages internet users to promptly report to the Patrol or local law enforcement anyone who attempts to engage in unwanted, inappropriate, or sexualized communications with children. The Digital Forensics Investigative Unit is partially funded by the Missouri Internet Crimes Against Children Task Force. Matheny was arrested on June 16, 2023, for five counts of possession of child pornography, following an investigation by the Division of Drug and Crime Control's Digital Forensics Investigations Unit.

On Friday, June 16, 2023, investigators executed a search warrant at Matheny's residence and business, both located in Warrensburg, Missouri. During the execution of the search warrants, investigators discovered images of child pornography on Matheny's computer. On June 17, 2023, the Johnson County Prosecuting Attorney's Office formally charged Matheny with five counts of possession child pornography. of Matheny is currently being held in the Pettis County Jail on a \$100,000 bond. 
