Ready For Takeoff! A New Airport Manager For Clinton

In 1992, Joel Long was sitting in an aerospace class at Middle Tennessee State University when the instructor asked people to raise their hands if they worked as a pilot. Half a dozen students did. Then the instructor asked how much they got paid. One said \$8 an hour. Several said they worked in exchange for health insurance or other remuneration. The highest paid person made \$500 a week, Joel said. The sad part — he knew those students had paid \$80,000 to get their pilot's certification.

That's not true at this time, Joel said, because commercial airline pilots are in short supply. Airlines are offering cadet programs that pay a large percentage of the cost of training in exchange for coming to work for them. "It's a viable opportunity to step into," Joel said. With a degree in aerospace management, Joel stepped into the manager job at Clinton Regional Airport in June, after two months working under the wing of former manager Wallace White. White is now retired and

enjoying time to travel, not something the manager, as the only employee of the airport, has much of. "This is more than a full-time job," Joel said. Joel formerly worked as an aviation operations specialist at the Cape Girardeau airport, but took the Clinton job because he likes general aviation, as opposed to working at a commercial airport. He enjoys having the opportunity to talk to pilots who fly in to the Clinton Airport, he said, which

serves corporate business activity, aerial agricultural sprayers, the armed forces, medical facilities, search and rescue operations and recreational flying, plus is a place to go for flight training. Two to four planes come in a day, he said, which he keeps track of with an app on his phone that lets him know when they are arriving. Last week, he had two planes bringing people to Clinton on business, he said, and two crop-dusters who came in to refuel. Crop

duster pilots buy upwards of \$20,000 worth of fuel at a time, Joel said. The airport makes good revenue, but airports are an amenity, not a profit center, he said. He likes to be on hand to help with refueling, although there is a self-service option. The airport manager's job is both physically and mentally demanding. His day starts with maintenance of the lounge area, then he goes out to sump the fuel tanks, **Airport 7**

Appleton City Takes Ride Through History As It Celebrates The Model T

In 1916, Dee Zink was living on his family farm, southeast of Appleton City, when it was hit by a tornado. Dee decided he didn't want to farm any more, and hearing that the Schuller Brothers wanted to sell their automotive sales and service business, Dee decided to buy it. The only problem: he didn't have the cash, so he sold 80 acres of land his wife had inherited and still finding himself short, borrowed \$10,000 from his brother, Jack. Buying the business, the Motor Inn, he renamed it Zink Motor Company. Started by the Schuller Brothers in 1913, the company is now one of the oldest continually-operating Ford dealerships in the country. "We're definitely towards the top, especially in the oldest building," Steven Cross said. "It was built back in Henry Ford's heyday, at the peak of the Model T's popularity." Steven Cross is the son

of Jeff Cross, who bought the dealership from Wilbur Zink in 2002. This Saturday, July 8, Appleton City hosts two car shows — one in Forest Park, the city park on the main street through town, and one across the street at Zink Motors. "We'll have model A's and Model T's on display, and there'll be 200 cars over there," Jeff Cross said. "It will be a full day of automobile ecstasy for those of us with motor oil in our blood." The Kansas City Antique Car Club is bringing Model A's and Model T's, Steven said, and Zink Motor Co. has four Model T's, which Ford started making in 1908. In 1913, the same year the Schuller Bros. started the Motor Inn, Ford introduced the integrated moving assembly line, which reduced the time it took to produce a car from a day and a half to an hour and a half. Also on display at Zink's is a Dort, one of the makes originally carried by the Schullers, along with Ford, Buick, Overland and **Model T 7**

EPA Fines Nine Springfield, Missouri, Home Renovators for Lead-Based Paint Violations

Nine home renovation companies in Springfield, Missouri, have agreed to pay over \$30,000 collectively in penalties to the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) to resolve alleged violations of the federal Toxic Substances Control Act (TSCA).

According to EPA, the following companies failed to comply with regulations intended to reduce the hazards of lead-based paint exposure during renovations:

- ServPro of Springfield/Greene County
- Inside and Out Building and Remodeling LLC
- Top Tier Homes LLC
- A.M. Wyssmann LLC
- Martin Remodeling and Investments LLC
- Scott Builders LLC
- Autumn Exteriors LLC
- LR Remodeling LLC
- The Gutter Experts LLC

"Reducing exposure to lead-based paint - especially among children and pregnant women, and in communities already overburdened with pollution exposure - is a top priority for EPA," said David Cozad, director of EPA Region 7's Enforcement and Compliance Assurance Division. "The Agency is committed to ensuring that home renovators follow the law and protect workers and residents from lead exposure."

EPA discovered violations of the lead-based paint regulations during inspections conducted in Springfield last year and determined that most of the properties being renovated were in communities already affected by pollution exposure. EPA is strengthening enforcement in such communities to address disproportionately high, adverse human health or

environmental effects on vulnerable populations.

Companies that perform home renovations or hire subcontractors to perform renovations on pre-1978 housing are required to comply with regulations under EPA's Lead Renovation, Repair, and Painting Program. The regulations include requirements to train employees in proper work practices; obtain certification from EPA prior to performing renovations; as well as compliance with lead safety practices, records retention, and notification to homeowners about the hazards of renovation-related lead exposure.

Reducing childhood lead exposure and the associated health impacts is a top priority for EPA. Lead-contaminated dust from chipped or peeling lead-based paint in homes built prior to 1978 is one of the most common causes of elevated blood lead levels in children. Infants and children are especially vulnerable to lead-based paint exposure because their growing bodies absorb more lead than adults do, and their brains and nervous systems are more sensitive to the damaging effects of lead. They can be exposed from multiple sources and may experience irreversible and lifelong health effects. Lead dust can be generated when lead-based paint deteriorates or is disturbed by renovation work, such as window installation, demolishing painted surfaces such as walls or porches, and scraping and repainting of homes.

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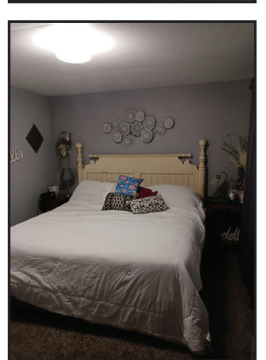

meaning to drain the low parts of the tanks to remove water that condenses in the tank. He also monitors fuel tanks and logs fuel levels to check for leaks.

Next is airfield inspection, including lighting systems. Runways have four approach lights, he said, red and white, that let the pilot know if their plane is coming too high or too low, or is on the right approach, known as the "glide slope."

Then he takes the Kubota on a "FOD" drive, inspecting the runway for foreign object debris. He also has to check imaginary surfaces, meaning any obstruction to a plane coming in to land.

He also has to keep the grass mowed, which takes several hours almost every day. While operating the mower, he wears earphones to alert him to any arrivals. After inspections and mowing, he spends several hours at his desk, doing bookkeeping and paying bills.

An airport is a community asset because when businesses are looking for places to locate, he said, they have two major questions — "How close is the Interstate?" and "What condition is the airport in?"

The Clinton Airport is in good condition, Joel said, and is getting better. There are two runways, Runway 18/36, 5,000 feet long and 100 feet wide, and the crosswind runway, 4/22, 4,000 feet long. Runways at public and military airports are numbered by rounding to the nearest 10 degrees of the compass bearing of the approach, and then truncating the last digit. The opposite end of the runway is numbered 180 degrees from the other.

Having a crosswind runway, at an angle to the main runway, allows planes to land no matter what direction the wind is coming from, Joel said. Pilots can call the airport's Automatic Weather Observation System to get wind direction, speed and cloud height, Joel said.

The City of Clinton owns the airport property, the runways and the navigational aids, and is overseen by a board of citizens, the Clinton Airport Association.

Now on Joel's desk: plans for the new terminal building, which has been funded. The project went out to bid the first of June, he said, with bid opening scheduled for the end of June. State and federal grants cover 90 percent of the cost, he said, and the economic benefit to the city of Clinton is more than the 10 cents on the dollar it cost the city to improve the facility, he said.

Missouri receives grants from the federal government, he said, letting the state decide where to put the funds, depending on need. In exchange for grants, the airport agrees to 39 assurances, including maintaining the property and navigational aids, and providing equal access to anyone who has a legitimate aeronautic purpose. Last week, he got a request from a family of stunt pilots, looking for a place to practice for air shows.

His job is also about extending hospitality to pilots, Joel said. Pilots in west central Missouri have a choice of places they can fly into and buy fuel, he said. Clinton Airport offers a crew car that it lends to pilots, so they can go to a restaurant or motel. Pilots also like airports that have a quiet room to rest, Joel said, and company pilots, who often have to wait for their passengers, like a place to shower, neither of which the current building has.

Joel is pretty much on call 24/7, but does have an intern in an aviation management program from UCM. He also values having mechanic Mark Bentsch of Magpie Aviation on site. Pilots fly into Clinton Regional Airport to have Mark work on their planes, Joel said.

The skydiving business no longer exists, he said, and the planes are being sold.

Joel said he hopes once the new terminal is built, the city will hire another employee, but until then, you won't see him around town. He's either at the airport, he said, or driving on Hwy. 7 South between the airport and his apartment.

Joel grew up in Pickwick Lake, Tenn., which is similar to Clinton — farming being the main occupation, with hunting and fishing close by and a large city about an hour away. He learned to fly in a Cessna 150 that belonged to a friend of his father's when he was 17, he said, and when he turned 18, got his pilot's license. He does plan to get back into flying, but for now, is focusing on making sure everything is safe and efficient at the airport.

Joel will be even busier the fourth week in July, when the EEA - Experimental Aircraft Association — holds its annual fly-in to Oshkosh, Wis. Airports with a 1,000 mile radius of Oshkosh stock more fuel to meet the demand, he said. In Clinton, 600 miles away, his problem is figuring if and how much to discount fuel to attract customers.

The advantage to not discounting: "You can be the only one with any fuel left," he said.

Another advantage to working at a general aviation airport is being

able to help local youth interested in flying to get started, he said. He noted that Clinton doesn't have a Young Eagles program, but Wallace White helped many Young Eagles get their wings.

Hupmobile. Zink kept the Ford, Overland and Dort lines.

Steven's family isn't related to the former owners, he said, but when researching the dealership's history, discovered from deeds that it was his great-great grandfather's family who sold the Schullers the original building where they started the Motor Inn in 1913. The Zinks built the current dealership, a Ford-designed building, in 1918. The original building, which also housed the city fire department, is the blue building west of Zink Motor Co., now a NAPA Auto Parts Store.

Jeff Cross had a construction and HVAC business, but learning that Wilbur Zink wanted to sell the dealership, decided he wanted to switch to dealing in cars. He started buying Zink Company stock in 1984, and in 2002 became full owner and started renovation of the historic, two-story building. The showroom was on the first floor, and the service and parts department on the second floor. The second floor is now a car museum.

"We keep the upstairs like it was circa 1918," Steven said.

Steven and his wife once lived in an apartment in the building, he said, but now live in Clinton, where he divides his time between shifts at the Clinton Fire Department and working at Zink. His wife works at the Department of Social and Health Services in Clinton. Zink Motor Co. participates in Crusin' to Clinton cruise nights, brought cars to Promenade on the Square and was a sponsor of the Clinton Technical School's Car Show.

Buck Harness' 1928 Stutz

Bearcat, which Steven is working on, will be on display at Zink during the July 8 car shows.

People come from all over Missouri to buy Fords at Zink Motor Co. The dealership sold and shipped a car to a person in Hawaii, Steven said, and recently, a man flew up from Florida to buy a car and drive it home. The Mustang Club of America came to visit the dealership, and Springfield Model A and T Club members also make the pilgrimage.

Model T's were originally sent to the Appleton City dealership by train in crates, or a cadre of drivers had to go to Kansas City and pick them up and drive them back. The return trip at night was arduous, as the unfamiliar roads were dark.

People wanting to enter their vehicles in the July 6 Appleton City Car Show should arrive between 8 a.m. to noon for check-in. A \$10 entry fee for vehicles goes to fund two \$1000 scholarships for local high-school students. Judges will choose the top 70 cars and trucks combined, the top three motorcycles and top three rat rods, with goodie bags and door prizes for entrants.

The show, free to spectators, is from noon to 3 p.m. There will be food vendors, lots of shade and an air-conditioned building. Zink Motor Co., 200 E. 4th, will be open for tours all day, Jeff said.

Ford Model Ts, advertised as "simple, affordable and durable," were produced from 1908 until 1927, and came in any color you wanted, as long as it was black. Fifteen million were sold, making the Model T the best-selling and most famous automobile of all time. When cars first came out, people in Appleton City used their cars only when they went out of town, and kept them in a storage area in the back of the Zink Motor Co. building, Steven said. The dealership had no lot, but was entirely indoors until the 1960s.

"They were open seven days a week, so that people could come here and pick up their cars," Steven said.

His family is proud to own a Henry Ford-era dealership, part of an Appleton City business that has been selling and servicing Ford automobiles for 110 of Ford's 120 years.

books when she was growing up in Shell Rock, Iowa. The city library was small, but the librarian ordered books for Brenda, and taught her how to use the card-catalogue files.

The inspiration for the "Alibi" books, in the youth-sleuth genre, came when Brenda thought of the name Alibi for the main character. The first thing she did was write down the character's backstory, she said. "The Case of the Missing Lizard Food" is the first in a series of six books about Alibi, starting with when she is in kindergarten, and spanning her elementary school years. The lizard, Juliet, is a class pet.

"There'll be one for every year, three picture books and three chapter books," Brenda said.

Brenda attended Shell Rock Elementary, but set the Alibi Monterro books in a southwest St. Louis school, Stone Creek Elementary. With her editor, Brenda is planning to visit St. Louis and give the Stone Creek students small green spiral notepads, like the ones featured on the cover of "The Case of the Missing Lizard Food."

Brenda credits grandson Milo with inspiring her to write a book when he brought her a library book he was excited about reading. Brenda's grandson Ashton rated the first Alibi book an 8 and half, but when he found out that the series gradually reveals clues about a mystery in Alibi's past, raised it to a 9.

Brenda also credits her Grandpa Matthews for his advice: "Don't memorize what you can resource." When she went to school and told her fourth grade teacher that, and she "didn't appreciate it," Brenda said.

Brenda said she also inherited her grandfather's problem-solving spirit and has invented a combination bug repellent, moisturizer and sunscreen. She started with a lotion bar that had bug repellent, she said, then, remembering all her years as a pool manager, urging her lifeguards to put on sunscreen, added it to the mix. She has patented her product and is now looking for a manufacturer.

To capture story ideas, which often come to her while driving, she keeps a recorder in her car. So if you see her driving around Ulrich talking to herself, she's probably dictating her next story.

The second Alibi book is scheduled to come out in August, Brenda said, with illustrations by her daughter Kati, an artist.

The first Grammie book, "Grammie's Funny Hat," is about an encounter between one of Brenda's grandchildren and their great-grandmother's wig. The second book, which will be out in December, is called "Grammie's Magic Wind String," about how Grammie, who is now 97, takes her great-grandchildren "flying" in her porch swing.

Brenda uses a drawing of a porch swing as the logo on her business cards, and said "I'm going to have something about the porch swing in every book."

Brenda, who has a degree in parks and recreation from the University of Northern Iowa, is also planning to write about her experience working at YMCA camp in California. Children from Oakland who had never been out of the city before attended the camp, Brenda said, and before they went on backpacking trips, she would have to go through their backpacks and remove the hair-styling appliances and other items with electric cords.

A two-day manhunt ensued, requiring the assistance of a multitude of law enforcement agencies including the Missouri State Highway Patrol. McCarthy was ultimately located about 15 miles outside of Clinton in rural Henry County.

After several lengthy continuances and a change of venue, trial began on June 5, 2023. A jury was selected on June 16, 2023 from Platte County. Opening statements began on June 20 in Jackson County Circuit Court. Evidence was presented to the jury for the following five days, including Saturday.

On June 26, 2023, after deliberating for less than two hours, the jury rendered a verdict of guilty of murder in the first degree. On June 27, 2023, the trial continued to the penalty phase. Closing arguments regarding penalty were given June 30.

After ten hours of deliberation, the jury, on Saturday, July 1, indicated to the court that it could not reach a unanimous decision regarding the sentence. The jury did unanimously find, however, that a sentence of death could be appropriate. Because of that, the court will decide the defendant's sentence. The sentencing hearing is set for September 8, 2023 at 1:30 pm in front of Judge Marco Roldan.

MSHSAA Approves NIL Benefits For High School Athletes That Meet Requirements



The Missouri State High School Activities Association (MSHSAA) has approved an amendment to its handbook that will allow high school athletes to profit from their name, image, and likeness (NIL), but only after signing a National Letter of Intent.

The recently approved change was added to the organization's handbook effective Saturday, July 1, 2023.

KY3 Sports and Ozarks Sports Zone contacted MSHSAA Communications Director Jason West.

West provided KY3 Sports and Ozarks Sports Zone with

the following language from the new handbook.

By-Law 3.6, Amateurism and Benefits, outlines the requirements of amateurism and was amended on the 2023 Annual Ballot to speak to Name, Image, and Likeness. Likewise, during the 2023 Legislative Session, this topic was discussed and a new statute was passed that affects a small sub-group of Missouri secondary school student-athletes.

As per State Statute RSMo 173.280, a high school athlete shall have the right to earn or attempt to earn compensation from the use of such athlete's name, image, likeness rights, or athletic reputation ONLY AFTER signing an athletic letter of intent (NLI) or other written agreement to enroll in a postsecondary educational institution in the state of Missouri.*

**This refers to the National Letter of Intent program, managed by the NCAA and with governance oversight provided by the Division I Collegiate Commissioners Association. There are very specific rules and regulations governing this program and the signing of the NLI. Written agreements through programs run by other collegiate athletic associations (NAIA/NJCAA) would meet this provision as well.*

Therefore, all students must meet the specific provisions of By-Law 3.6, except for those who: 1) sign such an agreement for collegiate sport-specific participation and 2) that agreement is with a Missouri

college or university that is participating in the official NLI program or a like program that can be documented.

Other rules do apply for athletes wishing to profit from NIL. If an athlete meets the necessary criteria for NIL benefits, the MSHSAA Handbook states:

However, in the NIL Activity, the following may be utilized only with advanced approval by a school administrator: member school name, colors, nickname(s), mascot(s), logo(s), uniforms, etc.

A student may use his/her name, image or likeness (NIL) and receive a benefit (allowable or prohibited) if he/she is not representing a school, not representing or depicting the specific sport desired for amateurism, and is not through such use promoting his/her participation, fame or prowess in that particular sport.

In 2021, the NCAA approved a name, image, and likeness policy for Division I, Division II, and Division III athletes. Since then, more than two dozen other states have adopted similar policies for high school students.

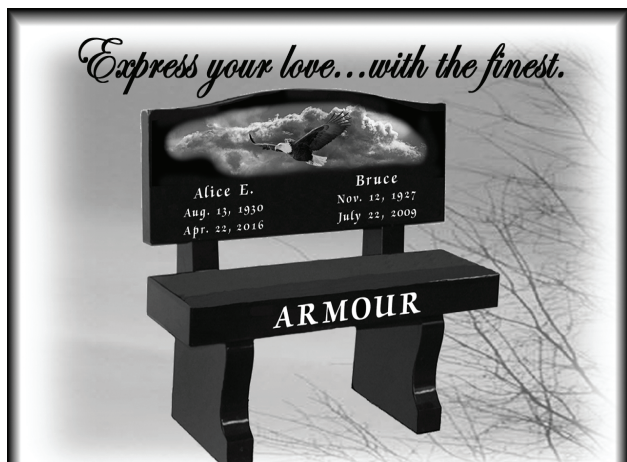
