# **Artesian Park Pool Opens** After Magnificent Makeover

The Artesian Park outdoor pool officially reopened July 22 after being closed for remodeling. The project, which because of construction supply and weather delays has taken a little longer than expected, but Clintonians will be glad nonetheless that it is open.

The opening comes on the heels of Clinton hosting an impromptu swim meet the weekend before and will open just time for the swim team to host finals for five area teams and be ready afterwards for kids of all ages to take a dip in be pool just for fun.

The project was funded by a voter approved 1/8 cent limited (5-year) tax which includes new designs for the pool house, restrooms and family area as well as a new concession spot. The redesign has been a long time coming as the pool house itself has not underwent any significant improvements since it was built in the 1970s. Gone now is the old "Pizza Hut" style peaked roof for the pool house (thanks councilman Roger House for the comparison) and the antiquated family changing areas. New restrooms, shower areas, new plumbing and stalls are included in the improvements. Also

Although not complete yet, the parking lot and roadway are going to be rehabbed and bids for that portion of the project opened Friday (July 23). Not only will parking for pool-goers improve but it will also improve for the populous ball game nights across the street.

Originally the design engineering came in above project cost, but with the cooperation of city staff and employees, value-engineering was applied to bring the cost down to what Clinton taxpayers approved - and it is nice.

"It's a great day to go to the pool and for all who live in Clinton, said Mayor Carla Moberly at the ceremonial opening. Instead of a ribbon cutting, the city held a "pool noddle cutting" more appropriate to the occasion. The redesign and improvements should be a draw for the area. "It was worth the wait, said Mayor Moberly.




## Have I Got A Line For You!

four buildings on the west side of the dam, with some seasonal workers billeted in houses.

Funding for utilities and maintenance ran out in 2021, he said, and with the Visitor's Center plus four other office buildings to keep up, Sandberg is looking for money-saving options.

The Kansas City District of the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers owns the TVC building and pays the utilities, he said. If the COE offices were consolidated, he said, he could cut utility bills in half. It would also be more efficient to have everyone in one place instead of spread out.

"My ultimate goal is to find a win-win solution that is advantageous for the public at large, and for us to find usable office space," Sandberg said. "That is the challenge."

The second option is building a new operations building large enough for the COE's 15 to 20 employees. The third is to build onto the current operations building. However, the city of Warsaw is interested in leasing the COE's current property to develop a high-use recreational area, Sandberg said.

Media across Missouri have picked up the controversy, fanning a rumor that the TVC will close. Sandberg emphasized that's not happening, and that no decision has been made regarding how the TVC will resolve its office-space issues. The decision is not even in the cards for this fiscal year, he said, adding that developing a good plan for everyone is a goal for the next fiscal year, July 2024 to 2025.

"The Corps is aware that the public does not want to lose the observation deck," he said.

One of ten COE "Class A" visitor centers in the United States, the TVC is a regional center as opposed to a Class B project center or Class C information center. Designed by Linscott, Haylett and Associates of Kansas City, the TVC draws 50,000 people a year and has 16,282 square feet of floor space.

"It's big," Sandberg said. Given the layout of the TVC and the current entrance, however, the only space that could be closed off for offices is the observation deck level on the bluff side. Locating COE offices away from the observation deck is not feasible because the public would be passing the office doors of federal workers to get to the deck, he said, which in this security-conscious world, is a no-go.

Also not feasible is renovating the 67-seat theater, where videos on local wildlife and history are shown. The theater, which is also used for public meetings, has a sloped floor, making it difficult to convert, Sandberg said. And like other locations near the current entrance, presents a security issue.

Having COE employees working on site does open up the possibility of having the visitor center open year round, seven days a week during the tourist season, Sandberg said, and five days a week through fall and winter. Traditionally, the TVC was open from mid-April through September from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m..

Since COVID, however, it has only been open Fridays, Saturdays and Sundays and Monday federal holidays during the spring and summer. Due to damage from a storm on July 1, which blew out a window, the observation deck

and the area underneath it is temporarily closed for safety reasons.

Having offices in the visitor's center would make it a little smaller, but given the average office size of 150 to 175 square feet per employee, the COE would require, at most, less than one-fourth of the total square footage of the center.

Even if just the grounds were open in the off-season, nature lovers, bird watchers and architecture fans could visit. Now visitors who drive to Warsaw in late fall or winter and up to the center, off the Dam Access Road, find the gate closed at the end of the center's curving driveway, barring access to the center, the grounds and the view. The grounds around the center have picnic tables, a nature trail and a block of outside restrooms. Originally named for

Originally named for Kaysinger Bluff, the dam and reservoir it created were built in 1965 to provide flood control, generate hydro-electric power and create outdoor recreation. Congress changed the name in 1970 to honor Missouri native son Harry S Truman, the 33rd president of the United States. Truman died in 1972 in Kansas City at the age of 88.

Built in the mid-1970s, the TVC is used in winter for the annual Eagle Day program, and every year, hosts visiting students from around the region. The space-age design has served the community well, providing plenty of room for the bus loads of students who arrive, and for whom the field trip is an anticipated outing for the whole school or a grade-level.

For families who visit regularly, seeing the stuffed eagle coming in to land, talons-spread, to its nest and the stuffed spoonbill on the wall are part of shared family memories. A large exhibit on mastodon skeletons found in the area has a sand pit where young archaeologists can dig for bones. Black and white photographs illustrating the history of the Osage River Valley hang on the walls, along with colorful watercolors of local scenes

by Ike Parker. But it's the possibility of losing the view over the dam and reservoir that is turning any changes to the center into an emotional issue for locals. Using part of the TVC for offices for the people who built and run the dam would align with the COE visitor centers' primary purpose, to provide interpretive information to the public about the Corps, its mission, the project and its facilities. Visitor centers also provide information about the geographic area to ensure a safe and enjoyable use of Corps facilities. The U.S. Corps of Engineers was established in 1802 as a separate branch of the military to build military and civil structures. Throughout the 19th century, the Corps built coastal fortifications, surveyed roads and canals, eliminated sandbars, snags and navigational hazards on the Ohio and Mississippi rivers, and explored and mapped

the Western frontier.

The COE also built lighthouses, jetties and piers, as well as dams and locks. The agency's 37,000 civilian and military personnel are responsible for safety issues related to waterways, dams and canals, environmental protection, emergency relief and hydroelectric power.

jail once a week. They are currently remodeling a former church building on Ohio Street to provide a residence where men who have served time in jail can make a new start.

make a new start.

The response to the Cel-

ebrate Recovery team's float along the route was heart-warming, Darren Huev said, and even more so when they got to the Square -people would push their way through the crowd and tell how much the program means to them, Darren said. The response by the community to remodeling the church, renamed the Men's Discipleship Center, has also been heartening, Darren said.

"Every time we've asked, we've always had crew show up," Darren said, "Somebody is here almost every day doing something."

Church Baptist First bought the building in April from the New Beginning Ministries congregation, after former First Baptist pastor Randy Shipman discovered it was struggling to keep the doors open. On track to be finished in the next two to three months, the center will accommodate 10 men, who will live there for a year in order to have a place to make a new start.

"We have already received five applications, and more than 30 requests for applications," Darren said. "We are going to have to turn people down, which is sad."

Through the help of volunteer labor, the project, known as Forged by Christ, is more than halfway finished. Almost all the demolition has been done, Darren said, a wall has been constructed on the main floor separating the sleeping area from the living area, and showers installed upstairs.

One of the biggest things that happened at the building was an open house for First Baptist Church members, who came to put prayers and scripture verses in the walls before the drywall went on. People also donated "everything," Darren said —furniture, new televisions and household goods.

hold goods.

Somebody has also donated half a beef, he said, with promises of more, which will help the men, who have to provide their own food. Businesses have also contacted the FBC group.

"They say they will employ whoever we send," Darren said.

As well as prayers, First Baptist Church members have written checks to cover most of the costs, according to Joe Hilty, a member of the church board and Forged By Christ. Donations of contracted work have also kept costs down, including from the company that installed the highend hot-water system.

"I was handed a bill with the value of the work estimated between \$5,600 and \$6,000 on it," he said. "The balance due was 0. I didn't expect that." The company that installed sound-proofing between the sleeping area and the living area did the same thing, Darren said.

Wanda Batshelett of First

Wanda Batshelett of First Baptist is organizing a library for the center, and is finding bookcases and books to put in them, Joe said. Due to arrive in August are ten heavy-duty bunk beds that have been ordered from ESS Universal. The beds, called "Missouri Bunkbeds" are made in Michigan and with shipping, cost a total of \$5,000, but will never have to be replaced, Darren said.

As the on-site manager, Darren will have a bedroom in the lower level, which includes the kitchen and more sleeping and living space. Joe estimates Darren has put in 1,000 hours or more on the project, and the all-volunteer crew puts in 100 hours a week. One of the first men to apply for a place in the center, who is out of iail but under court supervision, shows up two to three days a week to work, Darren said.

The FBC group has also met with court justices and parole and probation officers, with whom they will be working. Communities who have halfway houses see a dramatic drop in recidivism rates, which can be as high as 75 percent. Clinton has Hope House, a halfway-house program for women, but until now, nothing for men. People who run a halfway house in Springfield have inquired about space here, but the FBC center is for local men, Darren told them.

Organizations interested in starting halfway houses in their communities have sent people to Clinton to see how the FBC group is accomplishing it, Darren said. The project is called "Forged By Christ" because the aim is to reshape men's lives, Darren said. Like a forge, the process may get a little heated at times, he said, but when they come out, it will have broken the cycle of their former lives and shaped them into something stronger.

Darren, who has been

said finding God turned his life around, and through him, is restoring lives. In addition to leading Celebrate Recovery and the building remodel, he is going to college online to get a degree in theology and substance abuse counseling. Several times a week, Joe said, Darren sends out a progress report on the remodel to the church board, under the subject "God Has Done It Again."

Last Tuesday, July 25, First Baptist launched an addiction recovery program called "The Landing" for teens ages 12 to 17, which has a similar curriculum to the adult Celebrate Recovery program.

First Baptist Church of-

fers a CR program at the church, 1531 N. Vansant Rd., Clinton, for adults, and Celebration Place for children 12 and under.

On August 31, Overdose Awareness Day, Celebrate Recovery will sponsor a Candelight Vigil on the Square like the group did last year. By the end of September, which is Recovery Month, the Men's Discipleship Center should be planning its opening celebration.

A collaboration that will enhance learning experiences for individuals seeking law enforcement careers, the Sedalia Police Department has donated a used patrol car to the Missouri Safety Center at the University of Central Missouri. The formal presentation event took place on July 19, the same week a group of 27 Central Missouri Police Academy (CMPA) cadets began a training program that will allow them to utilize the car at the Safety Center's Highway Safety Instructional Park, south of UCM's main campus in Warrensburg.

Sedalia Police Chief Matt Wirt was joined by three SPD command staff members, Adam Hendricks, Josh Howell, and David Woolery, to deliver the 2017 Dodge Charger, equipped with siren and emergency lights. They were met by UCM President Roger Best, representatives of the Missouri Safety Center, UCM Harmon College of Business and Professional Studies and members of area law enforcement agencies that are sponsoring cadets in CMPA's 166th class. Three of the class members, Tyler LaBoube, Lyndon North, and Jesse Page, are sponsored by the SPD. Other area police and sheriff's departments that attended the event and are sponsoring CMPA cadets represent Johnson, Lafayette, Morgan, and Pettis counties and the Warrens-

burg Police Department. In talking about how the gift of this patrol car was made possible, Wirt said, "As we were transitioning from Dodge Chargers to Durangos, it gave us this opportunity. Members of the academy and the safety center indicated they needed more modern cars for their operation, so I went to the (Sedalia) city administrator and the mayor and asked if there was something we could donate that could help."

nate that could help."

Sedalia municipal leaders were in favor of the donating the former patrol car to the Missouri Safety Center, which oversees CMPA. Following approval by the Sedalia City Council, the vehicle now has a new home, helping to prepare individuals for law enforcement careers.

"The commitment to the work of the police academy and our law enforcement continuing training is essential for safety in the

profession," said Joanne Kurt-Hilditch, Ph.D., senior director of the Missouri Safety Center." With newer technology and equipment, such as donated vehicles, our cadets and officers are able to practice in more real-life scenarios and become better equipped to being safe and effective on our roadways."

Tim Lowry, a career police officer who serves as director of CMPA, said the car will help create realistic scenarios for testing cadets' driving skills, including learning how to make traffic stops. The emergency lighting that comes with the donated vehicle enables its use for both daytime and nighttime training.

President Best had an opportunity to test drive the patrol car before joining Missouri Safety Center Senior Program Manager Mike Perkins to formally accept the vehicle. Both of them participated in photo sessions with cadets and law enforcement personnel from various other organizations attending the event.

Wirt, who has served the Sedalia Police Department for 24 years, said he was pleased to be able to give back to a program which helped him prepare for his law enforcement career. After serving as a reserve officer in Sedalia, he attended the CMPA in the 1990s. His community's investment in his training paid off with Wirt continuing to work full time, eventually becoming Sedalia's police chief.

"It's nice to give back. I have a soft place for people who want to come into this profession," he said. "It's getting harder to find people, especially those who are really dedicated. So anything I can do to help them to enjoy this experience and to get a realistic training opportunity with a patrol car, it is great. It means a lot to me."

The Missouri Safety Center and the CMPA are part of the Harmon College of Business and Professional Studies. Between July and December 2023, members of the 166th class will receive 835 hours of training in the academy, which is licensed by the Missouri Department of Public Safety's Peace Officer Standards and Training Program.







### WHEN GOD SAYS GO

God often says, "Go!" Think Abraham, Moses, Israel. When God says "Go," He has a mission for you in another locale. Let me share some of our goings and missions. On August 26, 1956, my wife and I married and moved into our first apartment, a two-room upstairs flat for \$18.00 a month. When I say, "moved into," I am speaking of our clothes and a few college textbooks. It was a simple exciting move.

A year later and across town we moved to a larger, more expensive apartment above a couple who complained about our noisy walking though they had an organ they practiced regularly.

Next, we purchased a small trailer home, 8x26, from a fellow student and traveled to Wake Forest North Carolina to Southeastern Seminary---an exciting move!

During our third year in seminary, we purchased a larger trailer. Despite its ample size, we had great difficulty fitting our accumulated belongings into it. Moving had become more difficult and less pleasant.

After completing seminary, we traveled from North Carolina to Tennessee, to a small church with a parsonage and typical parsonage problems. Our first issue came when we changed the color of the living room.

From Tennessee we moved to the Missouri bootheel and learned what "Show Me" means.

Eleven years later, we were called to Kansas City, Missouri. My wife's father was convinced our children would be kidnapped and murdered in the big city; but

Twenty years later we moved to Northeast Missouri, where our friends insisted we would freeze to death. I was Director of Missions for 42 churches plus two missions. My job description called for me to be a pastor to the pastors. Eleven years, I loved it; and we did not

In 2005, I "retired" to Harrisonville for 10 years of interims and respite.

Our move to Bolivar, Missouri was traumatic. It rained constantly (5 inches). The movers left much of our belongings; they did not have room in their trucks. Despite the downsizing, we could not fit in the new house. We

On July 11, we moved to a duplex on the lovely Baptist Home Senior Adult Campus in Ozark, Missouri.

It was not always clear why God said "move." But upon arrival, His plans would become clearer. Ministers should not just go; they must also serve. Having been led of the Lord to dwell in this lovely setting, I have asked God to make my purpose clear. I await His answer.


