Making All The Right Moves, Al **Bottling Stays Fluid With Market**

When Garrett Vandenberg and Brian Lynch started their own bottling company in 2014, it was on a very small scale.

"We had one small machine in the corner of Good Spirits Distilling in Olathe," Garrett said. "We wheeled it in and out on weekends."

Garrett and Brian are now the co-owners of their own company, AI Bottling, with a total 40,000 square-feet of production and storage space in four buildings.

Al stands for Advanced Innovative, which they have had to be, to navigate their company through the economic shoals of Covid. They started out as contract manufacturers for other companies, Garrett said, but when the pandemic hit, a lot of the entrepreneurs who had created flavored alcoholic drinks dropped out of the market, he said.

So Garrett and Brian decided to create their own brand of spirits, and now have three lines— Truman Reserve Bourbon, Honey Creek Hollow Rum -silver, gold, and spiced— and Crave Cocktails, ready-todrink cocktails in nine flavors, including pina colada, mojito, strawberry daiquiri and sangria.

"My big thing is making flavored drinks," Garrett

Originally from Kansas City, Garrett served in the Air Force, then earned a chemistry degree from Washburn University in Topeka. He has 23 years experience in product development, he said, 12 of those years at McCormick Distilling Company in Weston, Mo., His mentor at McCormick was Jim Graf, he said, and it was the golden age of product development, Garrett said. Contract manufacturing flavored drinks is seasonal, Garrett said, so creating and selling their own brands helped carry them through what is known in business circles as "OND,"

October, November and

December. Garrett now lives with his family in Clinton, and is the company's product development director. He'd rather be in his lab in Clinton, he said, but usually spends only three days a week in town and the rest of the week on the road. Last week, he was headed to a Whiskey Walk in Excelsior Springs and to Lucas Oil Speedway to conduct product tastings.

"When people ask me what one of our products tastes like, I tell them, 'I want to know what it tastes like to you," he said. AI buys barrels of alcohol aged in oak barrels from MGP in Lawrenceburg, Indiana, Garrett said. The

CHARTing Success! Coalition Lifts Up Health In Henry County HENRY COUNTY HEALTH CENTER BY JENNIFER JACKSON Staff Reporter

Fifteen years ago, people who worked in health care in Henry County got together and formed CHART, the Community Health Assessment and Resource

The purpose: to identify health needs in the county and find resources to meet those needs.

Team.

"Henry County needed a health-care coalition that would involve all of our community partners," explained Tyler Pulcini.

Gary French, who works at the Henry County Health Center (HCHC), was president of the group for many years, Tyler said. Now Tyler, community outreach coordinator at HCHC, is the coalition's president.

CHART addresses health concerns identified by the Henry County Risk Assessment study, Tyler said. The members recently chose reducing food insecurity in families with school-age children as a priority. Through its inaugural Healthy Communities Golf Tournament last

June, CHART raised enough money to erase the entire school-lunch debt of students at Henry Elementary School, he said, which was \$4,200. CHART also gave \$2,000 to the Windsor School District, which erased three-fourths of the school-lunch debt, Tyler said. Smaller school districts in Henry County received \$600 each.


"School-lunch debt follows a student through the school system, and prevents the student from receiving a diploma," Tyler

A graduate of Missouri State University, Tyler is originally from Springfield. Part of his job in Clinton is teaching life skills classes once a week for sixth graders, and health education to teenagers in high schools.Tyler is married to a Clinton kindergarten teacher, and they have two school-age sons.

Tyler said he loves his job as community outreach coordinator.

"I enjoy going out and talking to people, and helping in any way that I can," he said.



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
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Alleged Cheating At The Missouri State Fair 4-H Judging Competition

Missouri parents and youth Involved in 4-H, an organization representing 4-H families across Missouri, are calling for a formal investigation into judging practices at the Missouri State Fair 4-H competitions after reports of unfair

treatment and cheating. According to multiple reports from Youth Project Leaders, 4-H participants, and their families, judges at the Missouri State Fair showed preferential treatment to certain competitors, in some cases those with personal connections to the judges. There are also allegations that some entries were allowed to break clearly outlined rules in the

"mash bill" (recipe) for Truman Reserve Bourbon is 75 percent corn, 21 percent rye and 4 percent malted barley.

At the Clinton plant, the alcohol is put into tanks and finished. In 2022, Truman Reserve took a platinum award at the Las Vegas Global Spirits Awards, and a gold at an International Spirits Competition in Denver. Both were blind taste tests, Garrett said.

Garrett said he and Brian met when they both worked for the Sharkbite Cocktails brand in Olathe. Wanting to start their own business, they looked all over the state for a place to establish it, Garrett said. At the time, Garrett was working in Springfield at a Purina feed mill for Land O' Lakes, which owns Purina, and Brian was living in Kansas City.

"Mark Dawson called us "Project Halfway," Garrett said, after they bought the building in Clinton.

Garrett built a porch on the building, gutted the interior and put a drain line down the middle. He also installed a water line to the building.

"You're looking at the chemist, the plumber and the electrician," he said. "To start up a business, if you can't do it yourself, you have to have deep pockets.

"It's not everyone who can say they built their own break room."

Before the pandemic, they employed 26 people, Garrett said. But those first five years, they had no products on the shelves locally, he said —everything was shipped out to Maine, Massachusetts, Florida and all around the country.

Dawson, the economic development director for Clinton, was instrumental in keeping the company in Clinton, Garrett said. Mayor Carla Moberly sold them their second property, formerly a transportation building, when AI was expanding, before the contract manufacturing market dropped.

Now, that market is coming back, Garrett said, and he is fielding deals, including one to produce vodka for the Napoli Culinary Academy, which runs a cafe that combines cooking classes and dining in Sacramento, California.

"A rabbi is coming down tomorrow from Kansas City to certify that it is kosher," Garrett said of the vodka.

In the Clinton area, Al products are on the shelves at Powell's, the Liquor Studio, Price Cutter, Buck Stop and Primitive Olde Crow & Winery, among others. Garrett said he considers the owners of those stores as business partners.

Their goal now is to have distributors for their line of spirits in all 50 states. Once a brand takes off, there is the possibility it will be picked up by a larger company, Garrett said.

Brian, who lives in Blairstown, is the sales side of the team, so is mostly on the road. He's now in Oklahoma, finalizing a statewide distribution deal, Garrett said. Their business is three-tiered, he explained, composed of manufacturers, distributors and retail

"We have to sell our products three times, to the distributor, retailer and the end user," he said.

Al now employs two people, other than the owners, including one who dips the tops of the Truman Reserve bottles in wax. Crave cocktails are packaged in plastic pouches by an automated, vertical form-fill-and-seal machine, Garrett said, the pouches making the drinks easy to take places you don't want to take glass. Cocktails come in boxes of 12, making the cost about \$1 a piece, he said.

The first product with bourbon that AI contract-

ed to make was FI (Fisher Island) Lemonade, Garrett said. The owner owned one of the oldest bars in the country, Pequot, on Fisher Island in New York.

The bar was accessed by ferry from Connecticut, Garrett said, but he never visited the island. He was in a bar in Boston, on the harbor, where he was inspired to make one of Al's ready-to-drink cocktails, a "Frosé," after hearing young women in the bar order Rosés. It's not a big seller in the Midwest, he said, but is a good drink for people looking for a lowcarb alternative.

Since Garrett and Brian started AI in 2014, the business has had its highs and lows, but keeps evolving.

"We had to re-evaluate our business plan every year," he said. "It you don't market, you will be in trouble."

Asked why he started his own business, Garrett responds jokingly, "I wanted to work 100 hours a week instead of 40 hours a week." It's like a game, he said, but he loves what he does and is passionate about it, and has turned down lucrative-paying jobs.

"It's what we do," he said. "It's our life."

They don't hold tastings or sell products at the plant, he said. But he does enjoy introducing people to Truman Reserve Bourbon, Honey Creek Hollow Rum and Crave cocktails at tastings, and turning tasters into fans and buyers.

"That's the rewarding piece of it," he said. # For more information, go

In addition to running the HCHC Facebook, henrycohealth.org, and sending out press releases, he is a Clinton Chamber of Commerce Ambassador and a member of the Clinton Rotary Club.

Tyler's office is deep in the warrens of the Henry County Health Center, which is located inside Compass Health, off of north Second at 1800 Community Dr. in Clinton. The HCHC is the place to go if you have young children and need necessities — a free car seat, a safe crib or vaccinations. Nutrition supplies for mothers and babies are available through WIC, the women, infants and children program.

The Health Center also ofters lab and medical tests, and a rabies clinic for pets. It issues birth and death certificates, processes septic permits, and does water testing. Sacks of free condoms are available to pick up at the front desk. The center is moving in two months to its new building at 111 N. 3rd St., behind Hawthorn Bank.

Members of CHART come from churches, school districts, businesses and non-profits as well as from Compass Health, Golden Valley Memorial Healthcare and Four Seasons Hospice. School counselors who attend meetings keep CHART aware of the needs of students they see at the schools, Tyler said.

"The needs are big," he said.

School Leesville The District used funds from CHART to buy shoes and coats for students, he said. CHART donates \$2,000 every year to the local Back to School Fair, he said, where free school supplies are distributed.

CHART also supports health-related projects that people bring to the group's attention. They include a running group for girls that a teacher in Windsor started to promote exercise. The girls also receive education in nutrition and eating right. At a local church, CHART supported a stop-smoking class.

"I would love to grow CHART and have more members," Tyler said.

The more members, the more input CHART would have into what is going on in Henry County, he said, and the more insight into the needs of the community. Besides food insecurity, transportation is a recognized need in Henry Country, he said.

CHART meets on the fourth Tuesday of the month at 11 a.m. at the Rotary Building, 200 W. Franklin. The public is welcome to attend. On a good day, as many as 30 members show up, he said, and give organizational reports on events they are holding.

"We all support each other's events," he said.

CHART's next fundraiser is a Pickleball Tournament on Oct. 28, and is a benefit for the Angel Tree and Christmas Cheer, both local projects that provide Christmas gifts and food to families whose budgets don't stretch to extras.

the early 1980s in Missouri and protects Missourians from gouging. Any county entity that gets money from taxes in the county may only take what they got last year plus the CPI (Consumer Price Index/ inflation rate, capped at 5%) plus any value for new construction. What that means for the tax payer is that no matter how much, or how little, your property values go up or down, your taxes should stay within a margin of whatever you paid the previous year. In essence, an assessor cannot just go raising property values just to get more taxes. Conversely, they may not lower them just to decrease taxes either. Not all states have this protection.

The Hancock Amendment does have some loopholes: for instance, there are two levies school districts work with: an operating levy and a debt-service levy. Only one of those is protected through the Hancock Amendment. In some instances, school districts may decrease one levy according to law but push the other one forward to compensate for the "lost" revenue. You might be glad to know that the Clinton School District has decided to roll back both the operating and debt-service levies, which will save the

tax payer at the end of the year. Not all schools do this - and most in the State of Missouri tend to take advantage of this, much to the taxpayer's dismay (and drained pocket-book).

Assessed values: the Hen-

ry County Assessor's office sent out about 6,000 increase notices this year - the average increase was 12% (the range was 5 – 15%, unless you built a new structure). If you didn't get a notice your values stayed the same or went down. If you got an impact notice from the Assessor's Office, there are two important categories to look at: the assessed value, and the appraised value. The appraised value is basically the market value of your property, home, etc. If it looks a little low it is because, in general, Henry County's property values were running on the low side. To be more precise. the "higher-end" properties were running low and the "average" properties were running high (which creates a disparity in tax burdens). The vast majority of properties in Henry County did not increase at all, but rather staved the same or reduced slightly. Compared to Jackson County, Henry County residents experienced a very mild adjustment and were able to talk to the assessor's office and resolve matters. There was only one local appearance at the Board of Equalization hearing this year and that person wasn't even complaining about their

appraisal value. Assessed value is the number you are taxed on. For residential properties that value is 19% of the appraised value (by state statute). So, if your property is appraised at \$100,000 than your assessed value will be \$19,000 - and it is that number by which your levy rate is applied.

What does this all mean? It means that most of Henry Countians' taxes are not going to go up – and if they do, it will only be marginal. "I am very pleased with the decision of the Clinton School District to roll back both their levies in the spirit of the Hancock Amendment's true meaning," said Henry County Assessor Scott Largent. "It makes it easier to do the job the state has mandated this office with, when county entities cooperate for the good of the citizens - especially to save them money during these tougher economic times. The Clinton School District was the only district in the area we are aware of that did right by the taxpayers; if you see a Clinton School administrator or board member, be sure to tell them 'Thanks' because they are one of the few in the state to roll both levies back," said

Largent. The Assessor's Office is not responsible for taxes: that is what the levy hearings are for (in August of every year). The Clinton School District's hearing is August 28 (as mentioned above, however, they are doing the right thing). Windsor and Montrose have already held theirs, and chose not to roll theirs back. The Henry County Library and other entities have rolled theirs back after meeting. It is important to go to those levy hearings, though. Informed citizens are the best defense against many things - especially higher taxes.

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

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

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Phase One Done: Dorman House Back on Its Feet



THE BRICKS WALLS of the Dorman House are now stabilized. Phase Three calls for removing the paint on the bricks and covering them with a breathable finish.

Good news for Dorman House fans: Phase One of the restoration on the historic Dorman House is completed. The rotted floor boards have been replaced, holes in the brick walls have been filled and a concrete floor has been poured.

With the walls and foundation stabilized, City Inspector Chuck Bailey has signed off on the safety of the Dorman

"Things are not quite square," said Suzanne Bush, Henry County Museum director, "but the walls are no longer moving."

Built in 1852, the Dorman House is the oldest two-story brick house in Clinton. Descendants of Judge Jerubial Dorman owned the house until 1996, when it was sold to Clinton Main Street. In 2008, the house was acquired by the Henry County Historical Society.

The house, with 19th century furnishings, was open for tours and used a meeting and event venue. But after structural problems became evident, it was closed in June of 2021. Crack in the walls, interior woodwork pulling away from the walls, and bulging exterior walls warned of imminent collapse, and the museum was advised to remove all the furnishings. That year, the Dorman House was named

a "Place of Peril" by the Missouri Alliance for Historic Preservation.

In Phase 1, support piers were put on top of the sandstone foundation, metal pins placed in the walls to maintain the integrity of the structure, and a new HVAC system installed.

"We still have a lot to do," Suzanne said, "but we are well on our way."

Suzanne said at first, the historical society couldn't find a contractor to take on the job, and looked both locally and in the Kansas City area. They found both a contractor and a stone mason when they were hired after the Whitlow building collapsed on the Square, she said.

Of the \$250,000 budgeted for Phase One, \$210,000 was used, she said. Suzanne said the HCHS board had to use reserve funds to save the house from collapse, as it wasn't feasible to wait to receive a grant.

Phase two, to restore the interior, will start with the \$40,000.

"We are waiting 30 days for the concrete to cure," she

A previous restoration in 1990 replaced the original plaster walls with wallboard. Suzanne said the historical society hopes to use as many in-house resources as possible to restore the interior walls of the Dorman House, which will need painting and wall-papering.

The HCHS Board had hoped that Phase Two would include an ADA-compliant bathroom and an addition to the kitchen, but have had to cut back on those plans, she

The staircase that was attached to a crumbling interior wall was removed, but will be reinstalled, Suzanne said. Concrete was poured around the brick safe set into the floor of Judge Dorman's office, and the safe will be covered with plexiglas to allow visitors to see it, she said. Unfortunately, there were no hidden hordes in the safe.

Phase One has left the museum reserves low. Fundraisers — including a chicken dinner and auction — raised \$30,000 this summer to replenish reserves, Suzanne said. Tickets are now on sale for the Oct. 7 Murder Mvstery dinner theater, Murder at the Masquerade Ball, a lead-up to Halloween with dinner guests in masks and costumes, and actors from the Levity Players Group in St. Louis.

Another fundraiser for the Dorman House will be Sept. 23, when the Cattlemen's Association will be grilling and selling burgers and brats on the grounds of the Homestead during Old Settler's Day.

The living history event will also feature traditional Ozark music by the Shortleaf Band at 11 a.m. and 1 p.m. Organizer Connie Grisier has lined up Sam Vansant to give demonstrations of chuckcooking, wagon/cast-iron and craftspeople who will be making brooms and rope, blacksmithing, weaving rugs, carving scrimshaw, spinning yarn and making lace.

Old Settler's Day is a fun, free event with a hint of history for all ages.

Henry County Historical Society volunteers operate the museum complex through donations memberships, and admission fees. The

museum does not receive funding from the county. The complex of buildings include the museum located in the Anheuser-Busch Building, a meeting and performing arts venue in the Delozier Building, formerly the First National Bank, the Annex with a walk-through village, the Exchange Building and the Dorman House.

"They're all old buildings," Suzanne noted. "The reserve funds need to be replaced to keep up the maintenance of the museum complex."

The complex also includes the Homestead grounds, where Old Settler's Day will be held. Children enjoy playing school in the one-room schoolhouse, imagining life in the dog-trot cabin's two rooms, and viewing the smoke house, mule barn and corn crib.

The stone water trough that was in front of the Dorman House when it was a stage stop is also on the Homestead grounds.

THe HCHS board hopes to get a grant to complete Phase Three of the project, Suzanne said, which will replace windows, remove exterior paint and apply a breathable finish to prevent further deterioration by moisture trapped in the interior brick and mortar. People have asked Suzanne

if they had removed the sheet rock on the interior walls and seen how much structural work the house needed, would she have gone ahead with the project? Her answer:

"I can't imagine letting go of something so significant in our county's history," she

The Dorman House generates tourism, she said, and is a tangible link to decades of American history from antebellum days through the 20th century. The historic home also provides a meeting space for local groups, including the Udolpha Miller Dorman Chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

The chapter is named for Judge Dorman's spouse, a descendant of colonists who fought in the American Revolution. The chapter was founded in 1914 by a Dorman daughter who was born during the Civil War and lived through two world wars.

Judge Dorman was a "Constitutional Unionist," Suzanne said, who believed in states rights but voted for Missouri not to secede from the Union. Missouri's entry as a slave state into the Union precipitated the Civil War, she said. Despite divisions in the state — there were rival state governments and governors — Missouri remained a "wishful star" on the Confederate flag.

Judge Dorman remained on the fence.

"He never chose a side in the war," Suzanne said.

Judge Dorman died in 1910 at age 91, and is buried at Englewood Cemetery. His younger daughter, Victoria Dorman Phillips, lived to age 97 in Clinton, dying in 1964. Locals still remember Victoria's daughter, Udolpha Phillips, who lived in the house for 20 years, and died in 1992 at age 88.

The remaining local Dorman descendant, Thom Knott of Thom Knott insurance agency, is the grandson of Victoria Phillips' daughter Katherine, Udolpha Phillips'

Suzanne said the community has supported the preservation of the Dorman House in the past, and will support it in the future through donations and fundraisers.

One way for your family name to (literally) go down in Henry County history is to buy a brick for the walks on the Dorman House property. The brick can be engraved with your name and family members.

Other options are to attend Old Settler's Day on Sept. 23 and buy a grilled burger or brat, or purchase tickets to the Oct. 7 Murder at the Masquerade Ball. Tickets are \$50 each, and can be reserved by calling 660-885-8414. The dinner entree is a choice of chicken Alfredo or penne Bolognese, served with a vegetable and roll, dessert, soft drinks and cof-





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

Most good teams are filled with players with travel experience. The Cards not only have a full roster (Varsity and JV) but have some younger players that can already contribute at the varsity

Middle School Softball: The new CMS softball program had a great first year. The program may not make a significant contribution at the varsity level this year, but it will in the years to come.

So, with a little luck, our Lady Cards should have a good year, maybe even a great one. Go Cards!

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
