The problem is that there are not enough boats to put a warrior in each one, so the Fish for Freedom tournament is looking for volunteers who would be willing to take one of the buddies out for a day's fishing on Truman.

While there are 125 warriors looking to spend a day on the water, the tournament needs more boaters. According to the tournament director, another 20 boats would be nice, and he's looking for local volunteers.

"Some of the boaters say they could take another fisherman, but it would be better to have just one

other person in each boat," says Davison.

The Truman Lake tournament event will be held from October 6th to the 8th. The first two days are shore-based with the military folks getting settled into their lodgings provided by the tournament, attending an introduction and social event at Angler's Port Marine on Friday evening followed by Saturday's fishing workshop at Long Shoal Marina in the morning.

In the evening, there's a pre-tournament meeting beginning at 4 p.m. and located at the Leesville Elementary School followed by dinner and tournament pairings.

Women In The West: Old Settler's **Day Book Historic Fiction Author**

Growing up in Monmouth County in New Jersey, where her mother was from, Diane Rogers was immersed in the history of the American Revolution. And when it came to learning about the Civil War, she was always pro-Union, she said, even though her father was from Tennessee.

"I always thought that if I

learned that her father's family probably would not have sided with the Confederacy, as there were pockets in the state where the residents remained loval to the Union.

That, and moving to Missouri, changed everything she thought she knew about the Civil War, she said, including its causes and the people who fought it. Correcting ignorance about what people know about the Civil War is what motivates her to write historic fiction based on hard fact. "There were good and bad on both sides," she said. "I always try to show someone who helps some-

Clinton Educative Co-op with 30 students who were home-schooled, but whose parents wanted to get together for a few classes and social events.

This year, the group has reinvented itself as Henry's Rebellion.

"We rebranded ourselves," Amanda Stillwell said. "We doubled the number of students and added classes."

Amanda, the group's leader, had the idea to rename the group Henry's Rebellion, which offers enrichment classes for homeschoolers one afternoon a week at First Baptist Church in Clinton. It is the only home-school group in the area, she said, and draws students from Creighton to Tightwad and Warsaw.

"It was a need, and we were able to fill it," she said.

By the time registration closed for the fall semester, Henry's Rebellion had filled its 60 slots in four age groups: preschool and kindergarteners , 1st through

3rd graders, 4th through 6th, and teenagers, 7th grade and up. All the teachers are parent volunteers except for one professional teacher, Dr. Joe Wolverton, co-author of "The Founders Recipe," who teaches an American history class on Zoom from his home in Memphis, Tenn.

The purpose of Henry's Rebellion is to offer classes that enhance home-school curriculums and offer social opportunities, Amanda

said. Classes include ones that are more fun or require a group, like theater and choir.

"We're not taking the place of our own homeschool efforts," Amanda said. "We're enhancing it." Asked why parents choose to home-school, she said there are a variety of reasons, ranging from political and religious reasons to safety concerns at public schools, including bullying. But at the core, she said,

it's being able to spend time with your kids while you have them, she said, and pour into them what you want to pass along. The first semester start-



Judge Sentences McCarthy To Life In Prison For Michael Shooting

On September 8, 2023, after hearing evidence and arguments from both the State and the defense, Jackson County Judge Marco Roldan sentenced Ian McCarthy to life in prison without the possibility of parole for the shooting death of Clinton Police Officer Gary Michael. Henry County Prosecuting Attorney LaChrisha Gray and Assistant Attorney General Kevin Zoellner represented the State of Missouri throughout the trial and in pursuit of the death penalty. Because the death-qualified jury could not reach a unanimous decision whether to sentence McCarthy to death or to life without the possibility of parole, the decision, by law, rested with the judge alone. Missouri's law regarding this procedure, while rare across the nation, has been upheld by the courts. Ultimately, the judge concluded that he would not sentence the defendant to death. Henry County Prosecut-Attorney LaChrisha ing Gray stated, "The actions of the defendant on August 6, 2017 took an honorable and respected officer and the feeling of safety in our community. What can never be taken away, however, is our resolve. The Henry County community proved that even when hurt or broken, our fight for justice and the protection of others will never waiver. It was shown in the way local businesses and people came forward to assist in the investigation, and through the decision of other officers to return to our community to serve. It was also shown by all those that endured a grueling six years long court process with steadfastness and dignity. Officer Gary Michael's legacy will live on because of that resolve. He will forever be a part of this community."

dents stand and recite the Pledge of Allegiance.

Last Thursday, there was an announcement about signing up for the Science Fair, which takes place at the end of October, with the rules about using trifold display boards.

Then Amanda asked students to review the three group rules: Be respectful (of property, teachers and peers), Try, (because everything is better when you put in effort), and have a Good Attitude.

To reinforce the latter, there was a sort of pep rally, except it was for all the students, not just the athletes. Amanda asks the students who they are and what they are doing, and they stand and say "We are Henry's Rebellion," and "We are Growing into Greatness," the school motto.

Articulating goals and expectations, and giving thanks for the teachers in the morning prayer, reinforces a positive attitude towards education and the students' power to use it to excel in life.

the Christmas play they are putting on Presentation Night at First Baptist Church in mid-November. one on the other side."

Diane will be speaking at 10 a.m. and 2 p.m. on Sept. 23 at Old Settler's Day, a free event at the Henry County Museum Homestead. Her topic is "Women's Roles in the Expansion of the West," but Civil War buffs will also be interested, as most of Diane's books are set during the Civil War in western Missouri.

She has not run out of plots.

"I love Missouri," she said. "The history is amazing."

Her biggest seller is "Elizabeth's War," about a Missouri widow and her children who left home in September of 1863 and traveled to Osceola after General Ewing issued General Orders Number 11. The orders, which followed Quantrill's Raid on Lawrence, Kansas, decreed that families in rural areas of four border counties of Missouri had to move their households to within one mile of four forts in the area, or leave those counties completely. The orders were supposedly for protection against bushwhackers, but actually prevented people from supporting them.

The orders caused a mass exodus out of those counties during a heat wave and drought, Diane learned, which dried up the creeks and churned the roads to dust.

The book also relates what happened in Dayton, Mo., which, except for one house, was burned to the ground. The reason: federal troopers heard Confederate recruiters were working in Dayton, so rode 25 miles on New Year's Eve to the town. Failing to catch the recruiters, they ordered the women in town to cook them breakfast, ate every chicken in town, and ordered everyone out of their houses, including an invalid who was carried out, then torched the houses. Diane's "Perils on the Missouri" is about the Steamboat Arabia, and "Crossfire in the Streets" covers the 1862 battle Lone Jack. The books are carefully researched and historically accurate, but not politically correct. "People don't talk about it," she said of that period of history. "I'm trying to talk about it. They fought for their county, or their state, not to perpetuate slavery.

were burned after they were evicted from their property still owed four years of back taxes.

"Enlightening people about that history is big part of what I do," she said. "My books are based heavily on fact, but are not politically correct. You have been warned."

Diane's appearance will also be inspiring to people who have always wanted to write a book. She started her first effort in fifth grade, she said, a mystery with an improbable plot in the youth-sleuth genre, like Nancy Drew books she read. But it was reading formulaic novels as an adult that prompted to start "plunking around on the typewriter" in 1989.

The rewards: readers telling her that they love her books, even the ones that are hard to read, and fans asking her for the next installment of her historic fiction.

The "White Oak" series started as a single book and grew to a trilogy, then to a 10-book series, she said, when an editor told her she had finished the book, but hadn't finished with the story. Readers she met at events every year also kept asking for more. Her first book, "Tomorrow's Promise," starts as a tale of survival on the Oregon Trail and ends when the Civil War starts. Diane has also written a prequel

to the series. Her book, "Maggie," is about a suffragette/reporter who works for the Sun newspaper in Cheyenne, Wyoming, and reports on a fire that destroyed much of the town of Deadwood in 1879.


Missouri history buffs will want to read her book set in Independence, Mo. It covers the history of the town - its opening, the flood, the expulsion of ter in Independence, Mo. Diane, who writes under the name D.L. Rogers, will have copies of her books for sale at Old Settler's Day, and sign them for readers. The bottom line: Diane is unapologetic about writing Missouri history as she uncovers it through her research. "History is being lost,

white-washed and destroyed," she said. "That's not what I write."



Students Get Up Close-up To Civil War

What is the cavalry trooper's main priority?

Why do horse soldiers train their horses to ride in circles?

Which Union general designed the saddle used by Federal cavalry?

The four hundred students who toured the Civil War re-enactors' camps on the grounds of Primitive Olde Crow and Winery last Friday can tell you the answers to these questions ... and a lot more.

Members of the 8th Mo. Cavalry from Springfield, the re-enactors set up their tents in the field in back of the event barn on the winery grounds and tethered their horses to picket lines along the tree line.

Among the groups visiting were students from the Leesville School District and homeschool groups from Clinton and Calhoun. All got a taste of the life of the Civil War horse soldier from Sgt. David Plummer. Plummer, actually commander of the 8th Mo. Cavalry, said he was delighted to see the "new recruits," drilling them to form a straight line, right face, march and halt. Sgt. Plummer explained that a battlefield was hallowed ground, because so many soldiers died on it.

"Missouri had the second largest number of soldiers who fought in the Civil War, after Virginia," he said, "because Missouri fought for both the Federals and the Confederates."

Students tried their hands at fighting with a saber, after Pvt. Chris Britz demonstrated the technique. They also watched two horse soldiers fighting with a saber on horseback, each trying to get their horse to circle the opponent's, with the goal of getting behind him. The saber, favored by cavalry, is a curved sword with a single-edge, 36-inch long blade that can be wielded by one hand.

Stepping carefully to avoid piles of manure, students went over to the picket line to listen to Corp. Heath Plummer, who explained why the priority of the trooper was his horse. The reason, the corporal said, is because if you didn't meet your horse's needs for food, water, rest and adequate foot protection, you would be walking instead of riding. Cavalrymen carried everything they needed for survival on their saddle -food, water, gun, saber, bedroll and shelter, he said, usually camping by creeks or rivers in order to water their horses.

Cavalry didn't charge directly into battle, he said, because that put your horse's safety at risk. Instead, they used the advantage of speed and ability to travel long distances to ride ahead of the ground force to scout, he said, or to gain tactical advantage by getting behind the enemy force and outflanking them.

Capt. Don Greene explained the different types of rifles and pistols used in the Civil War, how to load them, and fired them in the air. Infantry and cavalry loaded their rifles quickly by tearing off the tops of paper cylinder of black powder with their teeth, he said, then poured the powder in the rifle, loaded a patch, added the bullet and packed it down with a ramrod.

And they had to do it quickly, because they were being shot at.

"A good soldier could load in 30 seconds," Greene said. Students also visited the artillery camps at the far end of the field next to the road, and watched as the artillery fired cannon in a neighboring field, far

enough from the winery so that the boom of cannon fire did not cause items to fall off shelves inside, although it shook the building.

Artillery soldiers are the ugliest in the military, the cavalry soldiers joked, because that's where recruits that didn't have front teeth, needed to tear off the powder capsules, were assigned.

The 8th Mo. Cavalry participate in reenactments and have appeared in period movies and documentaries. Capt. Greene said he has been an extra in 15 movies, including "Lincoln" with Daniel Day Lewis, "Teddy Roosevelt and the Rough Riders," with Sam Elliot, and "Jesse James" with Rob Lowe and Bill Paxton.

Paxton wasn't a big star

yet, Greene said, so he'd come over to their camp and hang out.

Greene was also in "Ride with the Devil," an Ang Lee film about bushwhackers, with Tobey McGuire and Jim Caveizel, and has a photo of himself "between Spiderman and Christ," as Greene puts it. "Ride with the Devil" was filmed in Pattonsburg, Mo., he said. For "Lincoln," which was filmed in Virginia, he played a soldier who guarded the president.

"We didn't do a very good job, did we," Greene said.

Greene said attending a re-enactment is more interesting than six weeks on a movie set.

Federal soldiers were not as experienced horsemen as their counterparts in the South, Sgt. Plummer told the students. Their advantage was the saddle designed by Gen. George McClellan, who served in the Mexican-American War along with Grant and Lee. Known as "Young Napoleon," McClellan organized and commanded the Union Army of the Potomac and was at one time general of all federal armies. His cautious approach to campaign strategy was not popular with President Lincoln, and McClellan was relieved of command.

The saddle he designed after traveling in Europe to research cavalry organization and equipment had a longer legacy —adopted by the War Department in 1859, it was used by horse cavalry through most of World War II.

On Friday, students took part in saddle races, "galloping" across the field while holding a saddle under them. Many of the students, when asked, said they had horses they rode.

By the day after the student visits, Confederate reenactors had arrived at Primitive Olde Crow and set up camp at the far end of the field. Two more canons also arrived, and more tents appeared along the Union picket line. The two forces held battles on Saturday and Sunday at Primitive Olde Crow, where owner Lora Anstine and property development partner Max Jeys have added a new building and are starting to build a campground.

Called "The Mercantile," the new building offers travelers less prepared than Civil War horse soldiers modern amenities — ice cream, deli sandwiches, fudge, cheeses, clothing and gift items. You can also have a wine tasting in the Mercantile, as well in the brick-oven pizza restaurant, next to the event barn, which has a wide selection of craft beers on tap and a boutique.

Located on 50 acres east of Clinton off Hwy. 7 S., Primitive Olde Crow is preparing for 55 units on the new campground site, and plans to add another 150 units.

COOL WATER

Jesus said, "whoever drinks of the water I give shall never thirst . . . the water I give shall be a well of water springing up to eternal life" (John 4:14).

If we limit our understanding of Jesus' words to quenching our thirst, we miss much of the metaphor. Water does more than quench thirst.

Water cleanses. Even in the days before soap, water was used to cleanse the human body. Jesus' words could surely include cleansing. From the beginning of creation, God has sought to cleanse humankind of sin. The Psalmist put it this way, "Wash me, and I shall be whiter than snow . . .' Water heals. There are many references in the Bible to the healing power of water. The Old Testament story of Naaman the Leper dipping himself seven times in the Jordan (II Kings 5:1ff). Jeremiah accused the people of forsaking the living waters of God (Jeremiah 2ff). Still, today as close as Arkansas, people journey to Hot Springs seeking the healing power of water. Water calms. I sat in the sand on Waikiki Beach and watched the ocean quietly lap its way to shore. It gave me a wonderful peace. For my daughter's sixteenth birthday, we put a swimming pool in the back yard. Early in the mornings, I would sit beside the pool and drink my coffee. The quiet stir of the pool and the trickle of a small koi pond nearby quieted my heart for the long day ahead. Water is beautiful. Stare at a guiet ocean or a still lake, and soon its beauty will dance before your eyes. Contemplate Jesus' words, and soon their beauty will dance in your heart. Few things are as beautiful to the thirsty as a drink of water. I cannot say what all Jesus had in mind when He told the crowd, "Come and drink, and rivers of living water will flow through you" (John 7: 37 ff). These and other beautiful thoughts crossed my mind as I read Jesus' words. Allow me to use the jargon of the day and say of Jesus' words, "That's cool!" The Sons of the Pioneers had it right, "Cool Water."
