Farming Out An Education: CHS Students Take Pride & Learn Skills Raising Livestock

A red ribbon draped across the gate to the Clinton High School farm was cut Friday by Caroline Wagoner, a senior who is president of the CHS chapter of FFA, to officially

open the farm. Caroline also announced its official name — the Cardinal Pride Farm and Educational Facility which reflects the educational purpose of the farm, to provide students with hands-on experience raising livestock.

Tom Smith, who donated his bobcat and fencing expertise to enclose the pastures around the farm's red barn, said that plans at first called for the farm to be fenced with barbed wire. When he saw that the farm was adjacent to the school's front parking lot, he called Brett Williams in Kansas City and told him they were going to need something stron-

Brett is in charge of construction projects for Burns and McDonnell engineering firm, which had pledged funds to pay for the barbed wire. Brett immediately agreed to pay for the heavier, more ex-

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When The Cane Breaks: Seat Caner Keeps Frontier ALIVE

Clark demonstrate her craft at heritage festivals, they have two questions.

"The first question is always 'How long does it take you to do that?" she said. "The next is, 'How much do you charge to do it?""

What Diana does is replace broken cane seats on chairs and stools by re-caning them in the traditional way, weaving thin strips of rattan into a pattern. It's very meticulous work, and very time consuming.

"And it's not cheap," she

Diana was demonstrating seat caning in the dog-trot cabin at the Henry County Museum's Old Settler's Day on Sept. 23 in Clinton. She will be at Pioneer Heritage Days at the Truman Visitor Center in Warsaw on Oct. 21.

Because she lives in rural Missouri, Diana doesn't charge as much as a seat caner might charge in an urban area, she said. She always has chairs waiting for her attention in her home workshop in Glasgow, Mo. Customers come to her

through referral or by picking up one of her business cards when she demonstrates seat caning at heritage festivals.

"It's a dying craft," she said.

Originally from Pennsylvania, Diana got into seat caning in 1975, she said, after she was cleaning out her grandmother's house after her grandmother passed away. In the attic, Diana found old chairs that she thought looked neat. The

only problem: they didn't have any seats. So she signed up for class at the local community college in seat caning, and replaced

the seats herself. Seat caning is the craft of weaving rattan cane or rattan peel on a piece of furniture, to make a back or seat. Rattan is a material made from a fibrous tropical plant, similar to bamboo, is lightweight, durable and flexible, and has a structure similar to human

bones, so can be made into artificial bones.

Diana buys the material cut ready to use, she said, pre-soaks it and works with the cane wet. As it dries, it tightens, which means she doesn't have to pull it tight, so it's not hard on her hands.

Diana said not many places teach seat caning anymore. She used to teach it at craft camps in northern Missouri, she said, but her Caning 3



students were usually people who just wanted to replace one chair seat. She has lived in Missouri for 32 years, and said she has met only one other person in central Missouri who does caning as a business. She calls hers "Sit-a-While Seat Weaving."

Diane also weaves seats using fiber rush, flat reed and shaker tape. Fiber rush is made of paper and resembles twisted bull rushes. Flat reed is large, machine-cut rattan, flat on both sides, like strips of thin wood, that you often see in basket-making kits. Shaker tape is a nubby fabric tape that comes in colors, and can be woven in contrasting colors to make the traditional checker-board patterned chair seat.

Diana said her largest re-caning project was a settee made in Argentina. The job was commissioned by a couple from New Mexico she met at Silver Dollar City, where she was demonstrating seat-caning three summers ago. They dropped the settee by her house on the way through the area, Diana said, and she re-caned it and shipped it back to them.

Diana also uses pine needles to weave baskets, a craft she learned four years ago at a camp where she teaches seat-caning. Her sister in Delaware sends her a big box of pine needles, Diana said, which are two to four inches longer than the pine needles in this area.

"It lasts me about a year," Diana said. "The biggest I make are eight inches around. The process is similar to making sweetgrass baskets, like they do in North Carolina."

She sees a lot of chairs with broken cane seats, she said.

"Usually by the time they bring it to me, I have to redo the whole seat," she said. "If they would bring it in when they first see a broken strand, it would be more of a repair than a replacement."

Why Diana likes about the process:

"I find it relaxing once you learn the steps," she said of caning. "It's an over and over thing. I also like the fact that it's a heritage craft that people are still interested in today. I like that it keeps the craft going, keeps the history going."

Diana was demonstrating seat caning in one side of the dog-trot log cabin at Old Settler's Day, which brought more than a hundred people to the Henry County Museum Homestead. Other crafters in period costume demonstrated spinty," he said. ning, weaving, rug-making,

tatting and bobbin-lace

making. On the grounds, children bobbed for apples tied to strings, painted pumpkins next to the mule barn and turned the rope-making machine by hand. In the schoolhouse, they learned to weave potholders on a small frame, which they took home, along with their pumpkins and jumprope they had made.

The Henry County Cattlemen's Association donated their time and grills to cook burgers and brats in the parking lot, while the Shortleaf Band from Springfield played traditional Ozark music on mandolin, fiddle and guitar. Sam Van Sant set up his chuck wagon and offered samples of cast-iron cooking. Author D.L. Rogers entertained the crowds with tales of life on the Oregon Trail.

The free event is an annual living history day held by the Henry County Historical Society in the fall.

building on Price Lane in Clinton, and are in the process of converting it into a family-oriented place to play pool, darts and arcade games. They've named it Elite Billiards and Alehouse, and when the interior is complete, Jay will have a place to take his children and introduce them, and a new generation, to the game he loves.

"Pool is coming back," he said. "New people are start-

ing to get into pool." Jay has played in pool leagues for years, he said. A union iron worker for 32 years, he owns Flat Rock Creek Construction, and is using his skills and every spare hour to convert the building on Price Lane into a family recreation center. The Jamseks have ordered 16 new pool tables, they said, which are eight weeks out from being delivered.

Their goal: to provide Clinton with a place that gives pool the respect it deserves, Jav said.

There will also be darts, arcade games for children, TV game nights and a cafe with pizza, sandwiches and nachos. Children will be welcome with their parents until 9 p.m., Jay said. The hall will be non-smoking.

"We'll have a bar, but we won't be a bar," he said.

In the last week, Jay, with the help of friends, gutted the interior of the building, which once housed a church. It's also been a daycare center and a long time ago, a small skating rink. Jay plans to have new flooring laid, the new walls up and everything painted and back together by the time the tables arrive, he said.

Tabetha said owning a billiards hall is something that Jay had been talking about for several months. Originally from the Creighton area, Tabetha attended Sherwood schools, but has worked for several decades in Clinton. In 2010, she helped open Strike Zone, a bowling alley next to Price Cutter, and said she worked there until it closed in 2017. She also worked for 15 years at a Clinton restau-

Despite 20-plus years experience in the hospitality industry, Tabetha said she wasn't sure at first about the billiards hall idea. Then one day, she woke up and said "Let's do it." The Jamseks prayed about the decision to open the facility, she said, and so far, everything has fallen into place. They are aiming for a December 1, 2023 opening.

"This is something I wanted to do for the community," Jay said. "It's what I grew up on, and it's something really cool for my kids to experience."

Tabetha's brother, Tim Fields, made a video of the ongoing construction work and posted it on Facebook, where the news got thousands of likes. The response from the community and offers of support have been overwhelming, Jay said. The Jamseks say the location is ideal, next to the senior center, near the ball fields and across from the community center's inclusive playground.

"There's lots of drive-by traffic,"Jay said. "People have stopped and asked, "Is this the billiards place?"

Pool is also known as pocket billiards, billiards being the original name of the

Jay said he thinks pool is making a comeback because it's an inexpensive activity to get into, and is a fun, social way to spend an evening with friends. The person who oversees pool leagues in the region told Jay that more than 30 teams were added this year.

He also hopes having a billiards hall for league play and tournaments will encourage people who used to play pool to get their cues out and chalk them up. Pool leagues are already planning to come, Jay said.

"We're ready to get these doors open," Tabetha said. Elite Billiards will also have television screens for game nights, and will live-stream tournament pool games, Jay said. The arcade section for kids will award a free hotdog or other prize for playing. Jay and Tabetha have seven children, five of them grown. They plan to send the two younger ones to Clinton Christian Academy, they said.

Jay said he doesn't remember the name of the pool hall his father took him to in Nevada, only that it's not there any more. When he was 13, he got a job at the hall racking up balls, he said, for which he was paid 25 cents a rack, half of the 50 cents it cost to play a game in the 1980s. He could make \$5 to \$6 an hour, he said, but it wasn't the money that made the iob attractive.

"It was something I wanted to do," Jay said. "It was somewhere I wanted to be."



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Renowned KC Artist Harold Smith Exhibition Comes to UCM Oct. 2-31

The University of Central Missouri Gallery of Art and Design is pleased to announce the opening of "We Just Be," an exhibition of paintings by renowned Kansas City artist Harold Smith that will fill the walls of all three galleries at the UCM Art Center, Oct. 2-31. A lecture by the artist on Oct. 9 provides an opportunity for all who are interested to learn more about Smith and his work.

Smith is a prolific artist, educator, and writer. In addition to painting, he works in collage, mixed media, performance, video, sound, and assemblage. His work has been exhibited widely, both nationally and internationally including recent exhibitions at the University of Omaha, Nebraska and at the Nelson Atkins Museum of Art in Kansas City. Smith's films, called, "Abstractumenataries," have been screened throughout Kansas City including at the Kemper Museum of Art, and his work has been the subject of multiple magazine articles and books. In addition to his work as an artist, Smith writes for "KC Studio Magazine."

Smith's work focuses on the complexity of black masculinity in America by exploring and expressing the simultaneously complementary and contradictory internal and external narratives that black men in America must navigate in order to survive and flourish.



According to Gallery Director, Jamie Platt, "We Just Be," is an immersive experience. She noted that in his exhibition, large scale, colorful, expressively painted figurative paintings line the galleries' walls, each one carrying emblems of humanity.

"The paintings stick with you," Platt said. "Harold's brushwork is layered frequently with text, sometimes glittering bits of ephemera, and occasionally actual glitter. For all their bombast of scale and

material, the paintings have a quiet gravity, pulling one in. Text embedded in many of the paintings evoke cultural references, adding layers of meaning, sometimes the text asks questions directly."

"We Just Be" can be viewed at the UCM Art Center Galleries from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday and Friday, and noon to 4 p.m. Saturdays. On Thursdays, the galleries are open until 8 p.m.

Smith will give a talk

about his work as a Kleppe Visiting Artist Lecturer, beginning at 4 p.m. Monday, Oct. 9 in Wood 100. Admission is free and all are welcome. The lecture will also be available to watch online. Free Zoom registration is required. https:// tinyurl.com/yc2xeycx. Immediately following the



THE REST OF ETERNITY

I call this the "thief on the cross syndrome." Here is an imaginative story that can help us face this syndrome. The thief on the cross arrives in Paradise filled with joyous wonder at his new-found faith in Jesus. "Oh, my, he thinks this is magnificent. Why did I not come to know Jesus sooner? Think of all the good years I missed. I could have shared this joy with my family and friends. Instead, I wasted my life making myself and those I love miserable." When at last he is able to meet the risen Lord, he plans to apologize to Jesus for his errant lifestyle. Before a word

comes out of his mouth, Jesus knowing his thoughts ex-

claims, "Not to worry, friend. We will enjoy the rest of

eternity together." You may be struggling with my thief on the cross story. You are thinking, "Why would you concoct a story like that?" Here is why. We have lost our sense of the spiritual. The majority of our Christian service caters to the things of this world. Are you aware the New Testament speaks directly or indirectly on almost every page about the spirit within us. Who you are is not what one sees; that is just a body. The body is temporary. Who we are is within us i.e., what you cannot see.

J.B. Phillips had it right when he said we have become humanists with a tinge of piety. The Christians of the first century were driven by a sense of the spiritual, "One day, maybe sooner than you think, we will go to be with the Lord in heaven."

To the unbeliever, heaven is a fantasy. It is difficult to communicate. We have no words adequate to describe it. It involves concepts difficult for us---spiritual bodies, living forever, walking with Jesus. But make no mistake, who we are is the spirit (the soul) within us and the proof is in the resurrection of Jesus.

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
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
